Following restrictions on spending by local and public authorities, the Trust undertook from 2013 to raise funds for future research and publications.

The Trust has responsibility for commissioning the historical research for future volumes. During the year work research for the volume covering the Chippenham area (volume 20) was completed and preparations for publication began. Work is also now well underway on a volume covering the Alderbury area (volume 21).

In addition, the Trust has been keen to support the work being undertaken by the Institute of Historical Research to complete Vol. 19 (Mere and neighbouring parishes) and has made a financial commitment to it. Work on this volume is also nearing completion.

In April 2022, the Charity Commission approved the CIO's application to wind up the unincorporated Trust and to transfer its assets to the CIO. The transfer of assets followed during 2022-23. Once necessary procedures had been completed, the unincorporated Trust could be wound up. This happened on 2 February 2024.

During the year, the trustees applied to the Charity Commission for authority to wind up the unincorporated Trust and to transfer its assets to the CIO.
