TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2024.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the association's constitution, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

Objects, objectives and activities

The association's objectives are:

1. The promotion of community participation in healthy recreation for the benefit of the inhabitants of North London by the provision of facilities for playing sport.
2. To promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of North London and the surrounding area the provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, financial hardship or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the condition of life of the said inhabitants.
3. The promotion of religious harmony for the benefit of the public by: (but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing):
 - Promoting knowledge and mutual understanding and respect of the beliefs and practices of different religious faiths.
 - Educating the public in different religious beliefs including an awareness of their distinctive features and their common ground primarily but not exclusively in the context of sport to promote good relations between persons of different faiths.
4. The prevention or relief of poverty by providing grants, items and services to individuals in need and/or charities, or other organisations working to prevent or relieve poverty.

Public benefit

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the association should undertake.

Achievements and performance

2024 was a busy and productive year for Stanmore Jafferys with numerous activities taking place across the club. The club was also proud to officially acquire (on lease) its own facility – SJ Clubhouse. The procurement of SJ Clubhouse, which is based on the 2nd Floor of the WF House at Harefield, introduced an amazing space for social sports and youth activity in a safe space. We are grateful to the World Federation for giving us the space and once again showcasing the partnership between two organisations.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

The first quarter of the year swiftly commenced with the launch of the weekly sports schedule. Record attendances were captured following the fervour of the Unity Games – despite the Winter season. Strong interest was seen across gents, ladies and children's sports.

In May 2024 we held the AGM and the members re-elected Aiman Poptani as the Head of Ladies Sports & Safia Tharoo as the elected independent female Trustee. Aiman duly appointed Sabiha Chagpar to the Board of Trustees and appointed the new Ladies Management Committee.

Fundraising WF Aid:

For the first time, we changed our fund-raising strategy to now run across various sporting events & activities across the year – the main reason for this was to increase the exposure of the great social work we do as a club and keep the rhythm going through the year. The campaigns ran across:

- Inaugural 3v3 Basketball Tournament
- Ramadhan Sports Nights and Clubhouse Launch
- Madressa AAWA Walkathon
- The Big Half Marathon
- Football Tournament

Alhamdulillah with the support of the members and our wider community we successfully raised over the £72,000 target we set.

The Madressa Walkathon, despite the weather, was an example of two separate community bodies combining resources together to deliver a fantastic event. The Madressa children walked around the fields, stopping to learn and commemorate the greatest of all sacrifices – The tragedy of Karbala - and the lessons we can learn from Imam Husayn and the Holy family. At the same time, the Madressa children raised an amazing £30,000 for the AAWA campaign. The funds went towards building a Tube Well in Pakistan which benefits 60,000 people every month.

The Big Half which also supported the AAWA fund raising efforts attracted 100 runners from the club (70 gents & 30 ladies) – showcasing the hard work our running coordinators have put in over the years to increase awareness and the importance of physical exercise.

Gents Sports:

Another successful and ground-breaking year for the gents sports in 2024 which included the commencement and re-introduction of a racket sport as well as participation in several events. Key highlights indicated below:

Inaugural 3v3 Basketball Tournament

We hosted our first ever basketball tournament in February 2024. With the sport growing significantly at SJ, the time was ripe to host such a tournament which attracted over 30 players who, as part of combining sports with social good, raised funds for The World Federation's Gaza Appeal. The tournament run by Reza Ladak and his team proved to be extremely successful with brilliant talent on show.

Boys Football MAMT

For the second year running, boys football MAMT took place in Milton Keynes. We had 172 SJ players representing the club across 26 teams. It was a memorable day of football where our players showcased their technical ability, tactical awareness and collective spirit; making the entire club immensely proud. As a club, we made 6 of the 7 finals, winning 4 of these. A fantastic achievement from the football section and a lot of hard work put in by the coordinators and coaches paid off!

Cricket Bonanza

Another successful cricket season came to an end with the showpiece event taking place at Kenton CC. This was the 4th edition of the cricket bonanza, however it was also a sombre occasion as we remembered our dear brother Marhum Abbas Bandali who had sadly passed away in January 2024. We had teams from Birmingham and Leicester as well as two Stanmore teams participating. The final was played between Stanmore and Birmingham, with Birmingham prevailing in a nail biting run chase and clinching the trophy. Overall, the day was a fitting tribute to a legend of SJ.

Community Cup

A Stanmore Jafferys flagship event successfully hosted its 5th Edition in June 2024. A record 154 participants came together to truly showcase the spirit of Stanmore Jafferys. The players were divided into 14 equally balanced teams which meant we witnessed competitive games played in the spirit of community and brotherhood. Mohammed Valjy (Uncle Mo) and his team once again put on a super show and their tireless efforts never go unnoticed.

Squash

After a hiatus of a couple of years, we were extremely pleased to re-launch the SJ Squash sessions which take place on Tuesday evenings at RMS in Rickmansworth. Malik Ali Khan was announced as the new coordinator bringing an unrivalled passion for the sport.

In other news, and as is the norm, we reached the end of the cycle for coordinators across various sports with new members replacing them, thus ensuring continuity across the club and maintaining the high standards that we continue to thrive to offer our members:

- Raza Jaffery stepped down as football coordinator after two years at the helm. Murtaza Janmohamed has taken over the mantle and brings his passion for the sport and our youth to the fore – the new team was in place by the summer of 2024 and have carried on the work set up by Reza and his predecessors.
- Mumtaz Kassam stepped down as seniors coordinator, after six very successful years. Mumtaz uncle stepped back from his position from 1st October. Mumtaz uncle has been a dedicated SJ volunteer with his history at SJ stretching back to 1996. Bashir Ladha has taken over as the new head and continues to deliver a fantastic service for our beloved seniors.
- Sadiq Merchant stepped down as table tennis head. Sadiq led table tennis for two years and delivered an amazing service for our members, including the transition of TT to the Clubhouse and assisting in acquiring our own equipment to make TT more accessible to our community members. Akhtar Jaffer has taken over and continues to grow the sport.
- Nadim Kapadia also bid farewell in his role as running coordinator. Nadim's tenure saw the continued growth of running within the community with a record 100 members participating in the Big Half marathon. Nadim together with his team provided a truly 5-star service to our members. Ali Panju has taken over and brings with him a new team with fresh ideas.

We would like to thank all our past coordinators for the great work and services they have provided to the club and its members. Their dedication, selflessness, sacrifice and love for the club knows no bounds, We pray Allah (S.W.T) blesses them and their families abundantly for their service.

Ladies Sports:

2024 was a year of change, growth and empowerment for SJ ladies. Since the election of our new ladies head and consequently the new Executive Committee in May 2024, the ladies sports club has seen incredible momentum, growth and community engagement.

Expanding the sports horizon

This year, we proudly introduced new sports including table tennis, rounders, basketball and strength training, adding variety and fresh energy to our already diverse offering. We also held a course of prenatal yoga sessions and will be introducing pickleball in 2025 as another new sport. We reintroduced girls' badminton at Rickmansworth School, which was met with fantastic enthusiasm.

We also held various events across our weekly sports calendar including the annual seniors sports day, the inaugural SJ Netball League, the 'Run in Rajab' challenge, tennis coaching for girls and ladies, 'Battle of the Homelands' netball tournament, the 2nd edition of glow in the dark volleyball and the Dahwul Ardh Walk & Clean the Earth event in collaboration with Al-Haadi Youth.

Accessibility & inclusion

To keep our offering open to all, we froze our pay-as-you-go prices and launched December & January promotional sales heavily discounting all our sessions to boost participation and make sports even more accessible for our community. We saw many new SJ members try our sessions and continue to participate over the course of the year.

Community spirit during Ramadhan

Ramadhan was buzzing with energy as we hosted our Ramadhan Sports Night at Harrow Leisure Centre once again—a memorable evening of fitness and friendship. We also held our annual Ramadhan volleyball and throwball night as well as holding multiple fitness sessions after the mosque programme throughout the month. All of our Ramadhan initiatives raised funds for World Federation's Gaza Appeal.

The month also saw the launch of our SJ clubhouse with a ladies-only social event being a standout moment. Since then, we've hosted monthly social gatherings, creating a warm, welcoming space that's become a favourite among both ladies and girls.

Competitive brilliance at MAMT

In May 2024, SJ proudly hosted Ladies & Girls MAMT for the first time since 2016. The event was held over 3 days and the engagement from our community was fantastic in welcoming other Jamaats and providing a warm atmosphere. Our teams excelled—sweeping all youth football and netball categories, with just one runner-up finish in the 7–9s football bracket. The 16+ ladies football team also shone brightly, securing runner-up status in a fiercely contested competition.

Marhaba – A Festival of Sport (Rackets)

Our Marhaba event was, once again, a spectacular success, setting a new record for participants and matches played. Into its 5th year, the atmosphere was electric and full of joy & sisterhood with 380 participants and over 200 spectators joining in on the weekend which was by far our largest Marhaba to date. Over 1000 games were played across 34 competitions and we can't wait to host our flagship event again in September 2025.

The Big Half & Vitality London 10,000 – Big participation

We were super proud of the phenomenal number of 30 ladies who took part in the Big Half and Vitality London 10k in September 2024. Their dedication and spirit and commitment to training was inspiring, allowing them to complete a major running competition, making way for the London Marathon in 2025.

What a year it's been! A heartfelt thank you to every participant, volunteer, and supporter who helped make 2024 a landmark year for the ladies sports club. Here's to building an even stronger, more inclusive community in 2025!

Financial review

The total funds received during the period was £304,670 (2023: £381,455). The membership income and sponsorships accounted for approximately 20% of total income. The total funds expended during the period was £299,637 (2023: £380,942).

The Statement of Financial Activities for the period shows a net surplus of £5,033 (2023: £513).

The charity did not receive or hold any restricted income during the reporting period. All income and expenditure were related to unrestricted funds.

We are grateful to the members, partners, sponsors and donors who have continued to support the club financially during this difficult year and we have taken this into account in continuing to provide sports and activities at subsidised rates for the year 2025 where possible.

Reserves policy:

It is the policy of the association that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to three months operational expenditure, which amounts to £9,000. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the association's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

Plans for future periods

The trustees of the club are conscious of the rising costs of living and as part of the club's ethos whereby we strive to offer best in class services at affordable prices for our members, we decided to freeze the PAYG prices for 2025 particularly for sporting activities offered to our u16s.

However, as a club, we also need to be sustainable and, in a position, to absorb the rising costs of venues and other services. Therefore the Annual Membership rates were increased by £5 for both Ladies and Gents Adults members for 2025. This decision was taken in line with the budget spend for 2025 to enable the club to run without significant financial pressures.

We also have exciting plans for the Clubhouse which we will Inshallah reveal during Q3 2025, these include refurbishment and increasing the activities on offer together with installing a permanent AV system which enhances the ability to rent out the facility to generate income for the club.

From a sporting activity perspective, the club has big plans for 2025 with 6 Major events taking place, on top of our usual offerings. They are:

1. London Marathon
2. AAWA Fundraiser & Collaboration with Shia Ithna Asheri Madressa (SIM)
3. Salaam Cup (Returning after 6 years)
4. Community Cup (6th Edition)
5. Marhaba x MAMT (Ladies Rackets festival)
6. SJRS x MAMT (Gents Rackets Festival)

Structure, governance and management

The association is governed by the constitution and was recognised by the Charities commission as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) on 21st December 2021.

The trustees of Stanmore Jafferys CIO, acting as a board, carry the responsibility of complying with the requirements of the constitution.

The trustees meet quarterly and defer operational details and day to day management of the club to the management committee which meets more regularly.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Stanmore Jafferys CIO is a CIO with the objective of promoting community participation in healthy recreation for the benefit of the inhabitants of North London by the provision of facilities for playing sport.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the association's governing document, the Charities Act 2011, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)". The association is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The association has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a statement of cash flows.

The financial statements have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the association. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the association has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors or grantors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the association.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the association is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the association has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the association has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

(Continued)

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.7 Financial instruments

The association has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the association's balance sheet when the association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the association's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.8 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the association is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the association's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2023.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the association's constitution, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

Objects, objectives and activities

The association's objectives are:

1. The promotion of community participation in healthy recreation for the benefit of the inhabitants of North London by the provision of facilities for playing sport.
2. To promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of North London and the surrounding area the provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, financial hardship or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the condition of life of the said inhabitants.
3. The promotion of religious harmony for the benefit of the public by: (but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing):
 - Promoting knowledge and mutual understanding and respect of the beliefs and practices of different religious faiths.
 - Educating the public in different religious beliefs including an awareness of their distinctive features and their common ground primarily but not exclusively in the context of sport to promote good relations between persons of different faiths.
4. The prevention or relief of poverty by providing grants, items and services to individuals in need and/or charities, or other organisations working to prevent or relieve poverty.

Public benefit

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the association should undertake.

Achievements and performance

2023 was a momentous year in the history of Stanmore Jafferys, bar introducing new sports, running the usual sporting activities, putting in great tournaments and events, we also ran another successful AAWA campaign and participated in the 3rd version of the Unity Games that were held in Dubai over the Christmas period. Ali Asghar Water Appeal (AAWA):

Stanmore Jafferys & WF-AID's partnership carried forward into its 5th year, with SJ once again hosting activities to raise money and awareness for the Ali Asghar Water Appeal - which is a WF Aid project that runs through the year.

This year, SJ successfully ran both the cycling and running sportives across ladies & gents, together in collaboration with our brethren from south of the river (Hyderi Sports). In addition, the flagship event for this year entailed a 'Walkathon' that we hosted in collaboration with The KSIMC of London at the Rugby Grounds. This event combined the sporting element of walking with the Azadari of our beloved Imam Husayn (AS) and we were blessed to host several Mawakib as well as a Majalis and Azadari program featuring our resident Aalim - Shaykh Anwar Jaffer as well as renowned Nawhakhwans (Mohammed Abbas Karim, Yusuf Okera & Abbas Haidar Lalji).

With the support of the community and various BUJUs we were able to host 1000+ people on the day and raised in excess of £75,000 for the water appeal.

Unity Games:

Early in 2023 - there was a significant amount of buzz within the community, rumour had it that there was going to be a 3rd edition of UG over the Christmas period. Confirmation duly arrived in May from the organisers. The response from our members was simply overwhelming, we received over 350 members who expressed their interest to participate and represent SJ & The KSIMC of London at these games.

However, due to the cap in the number of teams we could enter - and also due to the negotiations carried out between SJ & UG organisers, we were able to accommodate approximately 230 participants across all sports.

SJ was by far the largest contingent at the games accounting for about 20% of the total participants and this is before we add the members who travelled to support the playing contingent in Dubai.

We were also the only club/Jamaat that participated in every single sport that was on offer at the games - no mean feat considering we had only introduced padel (Gents) & throwball (Ladies) a few months before the games.

Our performance at the games was truly exceptional. Across the ladies & gents sports, in the team categories we made all finals with the exception of table tennis & cricket in the gents section & throwball in the ladies section.

Another resounding success was the performance of some of our younger athletes, who applied themselves brilliantly whilst competing in the open category and made various knockout rounds across the sports.

Gents Sports:

2023 carried on from the resounding success of 2022, with a huge demand for our weekly sports across the range for both adults & youths. The bulk of our activities run at the maximum capacity and at the same time - for the 3rd year running, we added a new sport to our portfolio (padel tennis). We now offer 14 different sports to our members on a weekly basis, with the bulk of these being 'coach-led' sessions. Together with these activities we also ran the SJRS Tournament (which is a flagship SJ event).

SJRS 2023:

Run over the May Bank Holiday weekend - this was no ordinary event as we combined the sporting element together with our first ever 'Eid Fair'.

The tournament was a resounding success with over 400 participants from across the COEJ Jamaats participating across 4 different racket sports.

On the Bank Holiday Monday the festival culminated with the Eid Fair which we hosted in conjunction with The KSIMC of London which saw over 1,200 members of the community attend and enjoy the various stalls & food vendors on offer.

The highlight of the Eid Fair was the collaboration with Hand on Heart whereby the community came together to assemble 300 essential homeless packs which were distributed within the Slough area later on the same day.

The event also witnessed a host of local politicians who visited and were visibly impressed with both the Sporting and Community element of the day and praised Stanmore Jafferys in their efforts to bring the local community together.

SJ takes immense pride in the efforts of all our volunteers, well-wishers & Sports Coordinators who put on a truly memorable event for the members of our community.

Padel:

2023 witnessed the '14th' sport added to the portfolio with the addition of Padel. We are blessed to have two passionate individuals in Mustafa Walji & Abbas Dhalla who are the 'pioneer' coordinators and run the sport with dedication and passion to provide our members with an exceptional experience. We witnessed unprecedented demand for the sport, with each and every session being oversubscribed, this commitment culminated in SJ taking 6 pairs (12 players) to the UG tournament - whereby 2 of the pairs made the semi-finals and the pairing of Abbasali Merali & Sameer Kanji making the final. Inshallah the plan is to grow the sport further in 2024.

Running:

The year started with the Annual 'Teams' Challenge, about 100 gents members participated covering 3,500KM, over 1,050 activities over 28 days.

In March, SJ partnered with WiH to provide support and training to over 25 runners as they trained for the Wimbledon Half Marathon in May.

As we moved into the Summer months, SJ running was instrumental in planning the annual AAWA sportive (see details above), and as part of the campaign we had 50 runners participate in the Big Half through the community spaces that we managed to secure.

Ad-Hoc:

As in the norm, we hosted several internal and external tournaments across the gents side:

Cricket Bonanza - Hosted at Kenton CC in June with teams from SJ, Leicester and Birmingham, we witnessed an all SJ Final, with the 'A' team prevailing and winning the final. Another brilliant tournament put on by Mohamed Vasi Shaikh and his team.

Community Cup - For the 4th year running, 'Uncle' Mo Valji and his team hosted what is now one of the most sought out tournaments in the SJ calendar - The Adults Football Community Cup. With over 150 participants across 14 teams - the event was a resounding success. For further information please visit the gents website for a full review of the event. The 2024 version promises to be the biggest and best one yet!

Father & Son Badminton Tournament - Hosted in November at Aldenham School the Father & Son is another event earmarked by our members. Hosted over two nights on the last weekend of November, we witnessed a brilliant tournament and would like to place on record our thanks to Mustafa Muraj and his team for continuing to provide a platform for our members.

MAMT (Boys Football) - Hosted by Zainabiya Sports Club Milton Keynes, SJ entered a number of teams across each age category, and brought home trophies in the following school years:

- Reception & Year 1
- Year 2 & Year 3
- Year 10 & Year 11

MAMT (Volleyball) - Hosted by Husaini Sports Club of Peterborough, the tournament was classified as a 'Championship' Tournament, where SJ entered five teams. Three of our teams made the Cup Event, with the SJ All Stars prevailing by beating both Leicester teams in the semi finals and final. SJ Legends team made the final of the plate event, narrowly losing out to Birmingham. Another successful tournament for SJ, which paved the way for a brilliant performance by the teams at the Unity Games in December - the theme primarily being around promoting some of our promising youth players into the A and B teams.

2023 also saw a number of sports coordinators bow out with new members replacing them, thus ensuring continuity across the club and maintaining the high standards that we offer all our members on a weekly basis.

Mohamedali Datoos stepped down as the head of the SJRS team and to consolidate we have separated out each racket sport to run individually.

Muzzaffar Lalji and Mustafa Muraj also stepped down from their roles as coordinators of adults and youth badminton respectively, to be replaced by Faiyaz Kassam - who takes over the entire badminton portfolio.

Mohamed Jabir Merali also stepped down as SJVB coordinator to be replaced by Kumail Khaki.

Sajjad Meghjee also stepped up to lead SJ Cycling.

At this juncture, we would like to thank all our outgoing sports coordinators for their hard work, selflessness & dedication towards serving the community and our beloved club. We wish them all the best and hope to see them at the weekly sessions!

Ladies Sports:

2023 continued from the success of the previous year with 10 sports continuing to be offered to our members - adults and youth alike. Once again, we held many events during weekly sessions including Mother & Daughter and 'Just a Normal' Netball Tournaments and the SJ Football World Cup. We also held (twice in 2023) the ever popular Seniors Sports Day for the KSIMC of London (Hujjat) ladies seniors which has become a highlight of their year.

Marhaba – A Festival of Sport (Rackets):

Another year, another unforgettable Marhaba. This time, over one weekend in July, we held the rackets festival with over 280 participants, 40 volunteers and 150 spectators on site in what was our biggest event to date. The weekend saw 713 incredible games, 96 worthy trophy recipients, 25 separate tournaments, 3 sports and 1 community coming together in the spirit of rackethood and we are truly humbled by the feedback we received. The standout statistic was that we had 90 participants from external Jamaats across the UK and Europe - a number that we have been seeking to increase year on year. The event was a resounding success and we look forward to this flagship brand continue to flourish.

Adhoc:

Ramadhan Sports - held for the first time since 2019, this event was a sellout with 250 ladies in attendance to either participate in badminton, netball, football, pilates or carrom; or spectate the wonderful talent and games on offer. It was evident that this much loved event had been missed over the Covid period and we were excited to host it once again.

Ramadhan also saw a volleyball tournament and fitness sessions - both first time initiatives that were hugely successful.

MAMT - Ladies MAMT also returned for the first time post pandemic with a 'blind date' badminton concept well as netball, scrabble, swimming and yoga. SJ Shooting Stars returned winners of netball beating MSC Birmingham in the final. SJ also came runners up in scrabble and won the badminton singles and doubles categories. U16 MAMT also returned hosted in Birmingham. SJ returned winners across both netball categories and two football categories, coming runners up in the third football category.

Badminton League - In preparation for Marhaba, we ran an inaugural 7-week internal badminton league taking place weekly at Queens School. We had 14 pairs in the lower intermediate category and 13 pairs in the higher intermediate/advanced category. The quality of games was outstanding and perfect preparation for the Marhaba Festival.

The Big Half Marathon - For the first time, SJ Running received community places for The Big Half which took place on the streets of London in September. Amazingly, we had 20 ladies represent SJ and all completed the half marathon on what was an unusually hot September day. This shows the strength of running amongst the ladies contingent and we are proud of all participants.

Financial review

The total funds received during the period was £381,455. The membership income and sponsorships accounted for approximately 18% of total income. The total funds expended during the period was £380,942.

The Statement of Financial Activities for the period shows a net surplus of £513.

We are grateful to the members, partners, sponsors and donors who have continued to support the club financially during this difficult year and we have taken this into account in continuing to provide sports and activities at subsidised rates for the year 2024 where possible.

Reserves policy:

It is the policy of the association that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to three months operational expenditure, which amounts to £9,000. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the association's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

Plans for future periods

The Trustees continue to remain aware of the ongoing cost of living challenges which lie ahead and are committed to providing affordable, subsidised sporting activities. Very minor price rises have been implemented for 2024 however, these have been put in to cover some of the rising costs the club faces. Membership fees for 2024 were frozen at pre-pandemic levels and local and national grants and subsidies are being sought to bolster the clubs finances and offering and enable us to invest in our members, volunteers and coaches.

Despite some tough conditions, the trustees remain confident that the club will make further progress and prosper with the full range of sports available to its members.

We are also actively looking at sporting venues to be able to secure some of our own facilities, and as part of this exercise we have secured the use of the 2nd Floor of WF House at Hujjat Harefield with the primary aim to provide sporting and social activities for all our members across the age range spectrum. We successfully hosted club nights over the Holy Month of Ramadhan, with each night attracting over 200 members each.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Stanmore Jafferys CIO is a CIO with the objective of promoting community participation in healthy recreation for the benefit of the inhabitants of North London by the provision of facilities for playing sport.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the association's [governing document], the Charities Act 2011, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The association is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The association has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the association. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the association has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors or grantors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the association.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the association is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the association has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the association has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.7 Financial instruments

The association has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the association's balance sheet when the association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the association's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.8 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the association is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the association's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the period ended 31 December 2022.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the association's constitution, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

Objects, objectives and activities

The association's objectives are:

1. The promotion of community participation in healthy recreation for the benefit of the inhabitants of North London by the provision of facilities for playing sport.
2. To promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of North London and the surrounding area the provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, financial hardship or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the condition of life of the said inhabitants.
3. The promotion of religious harmony for the benefit of the public by: (but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing):
 - Promoting knowledge and mutual understanding and respect of the beliefs and practices of different religious faiths.
 - Educating the public in different religious beliefs including an awareness of their distinctive features and their common ground primarily but not exclusively in the context of sport to promote good relations between persons of different faiths.
4. The prevention or relief of poverty by providing grants, items and services to individuals in need and/or charities, or other organisations working to prevent or relieve poverty.

Public benefit

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the association should undertake.

Achievements and performance

2022 witnessed the first full year of activities post pandemic, with both the gents & ladies activities resuming across the board. We saw an introduction of new sports across the club. The club also went through the cycle of change across the sport coordinators, with new teams coming onboard to continue the great work carried out by their predecessors. As a club we have also progressed in our digital offering with the introduction of the CRM which significantly eases the back end administrative tasks that are carried out at HQ.

Ali Asghar Water Appeal (AAWA):

For 2022, the flagship project was a Desalination plant in Nzovoni, Kenya and the funding aimed at building a solar powered saline water desalination plant in the remote area of Nzavoni, Kenya to provide 2000 litres per hour of clean drinking water to over 350 families who currently walk more than 10k to access water. We are pleased to announce the plant opened on 14 February 2023. We extended the sportive to include gents & ladies running, walking as well as the traditional cycling ride. Over the course of the sportive we had more than 270 members participate. From the fundraising side, our members generosity meant we collected in excess of £100,000 which is all being utilised to provide sustainable water solutions to areas that need it most.

Below we have a detailed report for each of the gents & ladies sections for the activities across the year. We would like to extend our gratitude to the KSIMC of London for their continuous support and we look forward to increasing the collaboration into 2023.

FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

Gents Sports:

2022 dawned with a full resumption of the gents sporting activities with no Covid restrictions in place. We witnessed strong demand across all gents & boys sporting activities with the bulk of the sessions being utilised to their maximum capacity. We also introduced a new sport within gents through the addition of basketball to the portfolio.

For the first time in our history, Stanmore Jafferys offered a range of 13 sporting activities to its members, accommodating members of all ages from toddlers through to our beloved Seniors.

Together with our weekly sporting activities and the flagship AAWA campaign we also hosted another flagship event in 2022:

Al Wilayah (Volleyball):

We hosted the 4th Edition of the Al Wilayah Volleyball Tournament over the Jubilee Weekend with an unprecedented number of teams attending from abroad (6). Over the course of the tournament, we witnessed a level of volleyball not witnessed on these shores previously, with a record crowd attending on the final day cheering our boys on to winning the coveted trophy. The organising team did a fantastic job, and a mention to our media team who put on a show akin to what is usually witnessed on Sky Sports - we also smashed the number of online views with over 100K views across our Media Platforms over the course of the tournament.

In addition to Al Wilayah, we hosted the Annual Cricket Bonanza, for the first time including external teams. We also hosted several internal tournaments to bring the members together in a competitive but more importantly in an environment where brotherhood is fostered. We also went through a cycle of bringing in new sports coordinators as their predecessors stepped down after serving SJ selflessly over the last two years.

Ladies Sports:

2022 was the first full year of activity post pandemic with a range of sports available providing a variety of experiences encouraging members of all ages and abilities to take part.

Sports available to ladies and girls were badminton, cricket, fitness, football, golf, netball, running, tennis, throwball and volleyball. Throwball was a new sport introduced in 2022 and saw great uptake from ladies of all ages. Many events were held during weekly sessions including Mother & Daughter and Xtreme Netball, 'Bond'minton, Glow in the Dark Volleyball and SJ Football Euros.

In girls' sports, cricket continued to be a hit with children participating in the ECB All Stars Programme for age 5-8 years. Regular training every Sunday culminated in U16 MAMT held in October where Stanmore Jafferys returned winners in all age categories for netball and football.

The girls also attended the Women's FA Cup Final 2022 at Wembley Stadium in May. There were many events held across the year targeted to various sports and age groups. This included SJ Golf Day and a Seniors Sports Day for the KSIMC of London (Hujjat) ladies seniors which they thoroughly enjoyed.

The highlight of the year was the return of our flagship Marhaba Festival:

Marhaba – A Festival of Sport:

SJ Ladies held the Marhaba Festival of Sports for the first time since 2019 with two events taking place across two separate weekends covering racket sports (badminton, table tennis and tennis), netball and football. The events were well attended with over 200 participants at both weekends and the community spirit and atmosphere was welcomed after 3 years away. The festival drew good contingents from external Jamaats as far as Mombasa, Dubai and Toronto.

The availability of volunteers continues to be a challenge which the committee are looking to address to ensure sports continue to be provided to the community.

Financial review

2022 was the first full year of operation for Stanmore Jafferys CIO.

The total funds received during the period was £323,621. The membership income and sponsorships accounted for approximately 23% of total income. The total funds expended during the period was £312,416.

The Statement of Financial Activities for the period shows a net surplus of £11,205.

We are grateful to the members, partners, sponsors and donors who have continued to support the club financially during this difficult year and we have taken this into account in continuing to provide sports and activities at subsidised rates for the year 2023 where possible.

Reserves policy:

It is the policy of the association that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to three months operational expenditure, which amounts to £9,000. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the association's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the period.

Plans for future periods

The Trustees remain aware of the ongoing cost of living challenges which lie ahead and are committed to providing affordable, subsidised sporting activities. Most of the discussion at recent Trustee meetings has focused on tackling rising venue costs, membership fatigue and tough economic conditions. Small price rises have been implemented for 2023 however, these have been put in to cover some of the rising costs the club faces. Membership fees for 2023 were frozen at pre-pandemic levels and local and national grants and subsidies are being sought to bolster the clubs finances and offering and enable us to invest in our members, volunteers and coaches.

Structure, governance and management

The association is governed by the constitution and was recognised by the Charities commission as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) on 21st December 2021.

The trustees of Stanmore Jafferys CIO, acting as a board, carry the responsibility of complying with the requirements of the constitution.

The trustees meet quarterly and defer operational details and day to day management of the club to the management committee which meets more regularly.

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Stanmore Jafferys CIO is a CIO with the objective of promoting community participation in healthy recreation for the benefit of the inhabitants of North London by the provision of facilities for playing sport.

1.1 Reporting period

The CIO was registered with the Charity commission on 21 December 2021 and has prepared its first set of financial statements to 31 December 2022 covering a period of just over 12 months.

1.2 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the association's [governing document], the Charities Act 2011, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The association is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The association has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the association. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.3 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the association has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.4 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the association.

1.5 Income

Income is recognised when the association is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the association has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the association has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

1.6 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.8 Financial instruments

The association has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the association's balance sheet when the association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the association's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.9 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the association is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the association's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
