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# WHO WE ARE

One Day Seyoum (ODS) is a community-led organisation focused on human rights abuses in Eritrea and against Eritrean refugees. We organise campaigns and publish research to push for change. We produce media, art and events to raise awareness about the issues we work on. We run support programmes helping Eritrean refugees with asylum-related issues, mental health and professional development. We organise capacity building initiatives to increase the strength of the movement.

A decade since its founding, ODS is one of the most prominent Eritrean human rights organisations in exile. We have over 500 members and combine virtual and in-person activities to achieve impact. Our membership mostly comprises of young people (18-35 years old) and are a mix of Eritrea and diaspora-born Eritreans, and allies. ODS focuses heavily on community engagement and has provided a unique space for people across the movement to learn and get involved.

We are regularly invited to speak and collaborate by institutions like the United Nations, Amnesty International, Human Rights Watch and news organisations like CNN, BBC and Al Jazeera.



# FOREWORD

In 2024, we continued One Day Seyoum's journey of professionalising the organisation. I left my job at Amnesty International to focus on this full-time and truly give this process the dedication and time it required. One of my greatest joys from the year was assembling our executive team. All of them are long-term ODS members and it has been such a privilege to work with them to strengthen an organisation we all love dearly. All team members worked closely with me on the process of formalising the organisation through building internal structures, writing our strategy and fundraising. They were also in charge of a programme each and developed the long-term plans for that programme in our strategy process and ran all the activities for it in 2024. Seeing this kind of dedication, whilst they are balancing work and education, was very inspiring and a great reminder of the immense passion that exists for Eritrea and just needs to be facilitated.

Taking ODS on this transition has not been easy, but we are more motivated than ever to achieve our goals. We are convinced that Eritrea needs an organisation like ours - both now and in the future, and are determined to build a foundation that will ensure that we can fulfill that role sustainably and long-term.

We had initially hoped to pause programmes and focus on building a strong foundation first, but it became evident very early that this would not be possible. Many of the issues on which we work are urgent but neglected - there is just not enough interest and resources to address them the way we do. The many successes we had in 2024 was a great reminder of the importance of ODS's existence.

Thank you to everyone who makes ODS's work possible. We cannot wait to continue building this organisation and achieving the kind of impact the Eritrean people deserve.

# ACTIVITIES

## Campaigns

Stop deporting Eritrean refugees from Turkey: In August 2024, we received reports that hundreds of Eritreans were detained in a town in Turkey called Aydin and that they had no access to asylum procedures and that another large group had been deported to Eritrea in June. A few days after we started documenting the issue and speaking to relatives, we found out over 300 Eritrean refugees had been deported from Turkey to Eritrea. Our team contacted the United Nations, Amnesty International and a local human rights organisation and started an informal coalition to respond to the situation. We interviewed relatives and were eventually able to speak to Eritrean refugees who were detained and documented how bad the conditions and treatment inside the detention facility were not meeting international standards. We also interviewed relatives of the deported individuals and were able to confirm how many had been taken and where they were being held. Together with Amnesty International, we launched a mass campaign targeting the Turkish government to stop deportations and to improve conditions. The United Nations used our information to lobby the Turkish government directly. We put the local Turkish organisation in touch with detainees and they visited them in prison. Their visits and advocacy led to improved conditions in some aspects, including more phone calls for the detainees. The Turkish government eventually replied to the United Nations acknowledging these deportations for the first time. They have not conducted any deportations since.

Free Ciham: We continued to campaign for the release of Ciham Ali and for the US government to intervene in her case. In December 2024, we conducted an advocacy mission to Washington DC with the support of Amnesty International. We planned the mission to coincide with the anniversary of Ciham's arrest. We started off with a meeting at the State Department to hand over the 450,000 signatures we had collected for Ciham in the past years. We then met with three congressional offices to discuss her case. On the 12 year anniversary of Ciham's arrest, we gathered a group at the Lincoln Memorial with a banner that said 'Free Ciham' to commemorate the day. The event was attended and covered by journalists from Voice of America and the TV channel ERIPM that transmits to Eritrea via satellite.

Protect Eritreans refugees in the UK: We did several campaigns to support Eritrean refugees in the UK. We continued to campaign for safe and legal routes to the UK to prevent avoidable deaths that Eritrean refugees have to face when they are forced to escape the dictatorship. I highlighted these calls on BBC News through a live interview that I did in September 2024 after several Eritreans tragically died whilst trying to cross to the UK. We also ran a big campaign in July 2024 when there were coordinated violent attacks by anti-immigration rioters who were targeting asylum seekers. The rioters had chosen one day to target a large amount of asylum seekers' accommodations and whilst there was much information circulating to inform and protect refugees overall, none of it was in Tigrinya (the main Eritrean official language). We produced posters with crucial information in Tigrinya that we circulated on social media and through Eritrean media channels. We made a video that had over 300,000 views across social media. We put together a group of volunteers from our members community to answer questions we received on social media from Eritrean refugees, including finding safe places.

# ACTIVITIES

Support Eritrean refugees in Sudan: We continued to raise and distribute funds to Eritrean refugees from the fundraiser we launched in 2023 after the war broke out in Sudan. In 2024, we distributed a total of 6080 GBP.

Political prisoners in Eritrea: We continued to campaign for Eritrean political prisoners by highlighting their cases on key anniversaries such as 18 September.

## Capacity-building

In December 2023, we launched our capacity-building program with a pilot activity in Uganda. In 2024, we started planning the rest of the programme using learnings from our pilot activity. We conducted a survey and feedback call with the participants in the pilot activity. We also had extensive brainstorm sessions amongst ourselves and with external experienced programmers.

## Magazine

We run a magazine called *2001 magazine*, named after the year the free press was shut down in Eritrea. The goal of our magazine is to create informative, thought provoking and engaging content that will inform our audiences about the key issues we work on and motivate them to get involved. Our inaugural issue was published in 2021 and featured pieces from leading Eritrean writers, artists, and activists, as well as allies to our cause, who have all created work around the theme: "*The Past, Present, and Future of Eritrea.*" The magazine received overwhelmingly positive feedback and was profiled by the Columbia Journalism Review. By 2024, we had sold 332 copies.

## Communications

We have continued to use different social media platforms to fulfill our organisational goals of raising more awareness about the crisis in Eritrea and to engage audiences with our campaigns. In 2024, we saw a strong increase in our engagements especially as we posted more on TikTok. A majority of our new members cited in their membership application that they found us through TikTok.

## Speaking engagements

We have continued to raise awareness about the Eritrean crisis and recruit more people to our movement by participating in different kinds of events across the world. In September 2024, our executive director Vanessa Tsehaye led a campaigning workshop at the World Summit of Nobel Peace Laureates and used our work on Eritrea as a case study. In February 2024, she gave a talk at the Cooper Series Symposium 'Africa Is Rising' at Swarthmore College focused on the Eritrean crisis and her work with One Day Seyoum. She also led a campaigning workshop further engaging students with the key aspects of our work.

# ACTIVITIES

## Community mobilisation

We have continued to cultivate a community of members that is knowledgeable, passionate and willing to get involved. By December 2024, we had 598 members. We regularly have online members meetings to bring together our members to get to know each other, to inform them on issues and ways to get involved and to have interesting discussions amongst one another. Sometimes the meetings are themed and sometimes they are just general. We continued to organise book club meetings and for one of the meetings, we had a special guest speaker to further enrich the discussion. We were reading "My country Eritrea" by Abrehe Berhe, the former finance minister who had been imprisoned without trial since 2018 and we were lucky to have his son join the meeting. Abrehe tragically passed away a few months after.

## Operations

One of our key activities in 2024 was continuing to build the infrastructure of the organisation. Our long-term goal is to go from being a volunteer run organisation to becoming funded and staffed. In 2024, we finished recruitment for our executive team. We have always had active members and decided to conduct a recruitment process to ensure that we had a dedicated team focused on taking the organisation through this transition. Together, we worked on our five-year strategy, built internal processes, worked on our fundraising and overall planning work. Each executive team member is in charge of a programme and ran those operations at the same time as we worked on the long-term work specified in this section.

# FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Our total income was 1029 GBP and this came from our Sudan fundraiser.

Our expenditure was 7937 GBP. These costs covered our relief work in Sudan, costs for our website, email marketing service for our members, a shared working space and travel costs associated with advocacy and a conference. Since a vast majority of the income only was for our relief work in Sudan, we used the reserves from the previous year to cover all other expenses.

Our remaining cash funds at the end of the financial year were 1499 GBP.

# GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Our governing document is a 'constitution of a Charitable Incorporated Organisation whose only voting members are its charity trustees.

There must be at least three charity trustees. If the number falls below this minimum, the remaining trustee or trustees may act only to call a meeting of the charity trustees, or appoint a new charity trustee. The maximum number of charity trustees is 10. The charity trustees may not appoint any charity trustee if as a result the number of charity trustees would exceed the maximum.

Apart from the first charity trustees, every trustee must be appointed [for a term of 2 years] by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees. In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees, the charity trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.

A charity trustee ceases to hold office if he or she: (a) retires by notifying the CIO in writing (but only if enough charity trustees will remain in office when the notice of resignation takes effect to form a quorum for meetings); (b) is absent without the permission of the charity trustees from all their meetings held within a period of six months and the trustees resolve that his or her office be vacated; (c) dies; (d) in the written opinion, given to the company, of a registered medical practitioner treating that person, has become physically or mentally incapable of acting as a director and may remain so for more than three months; (e) is disqualified from acting as a charity trustee by virtue of sections 178-180 of the Charities Act 2011 (or any statutory re-enactment or modification of that provision).

Any person retiring as a charity trustee is eligible for reappointment.

# FOREWORD

2023 marked One Day Seyoum's ten year anniversary. It was a complicated anniversary, mixed with sadness of how the situation for Eritreans remain extremely dire; and with pride of the work we have accomplished and impact we still have managed to have. Ultimately, it was a reminder of the importance of tenacity. Whilst writing an impact report about our first decade, we were able to review and reflect on all of our work and see how much we have developed throughout the years. It is because of all those years and the lessons we have learnt that we now run the strong and impactful programmes we run and have the community that make it all possible. In the Eritrean context, real change is going to require a lot of time and we are more committed than ever to continue this work until we reach our goals, no matter how long that will take.

Last year we decided that One Day Seyoum needed to become a professional, funded and staffed organisation if we wanted to increase our impact. This journey continued to be a priority this year, with endless strategy planning meetings, paperwork and networking, all whilst still running our programmes.

The most exciting part of 2023 was witnessing the growth of the Eritrean human rights movement. When we started in 2013, the movement was relatively small. We have seen how it has slowly grown over the years and the biggest growth happened in 2023 due to the rise of young Eritrean survivors all over the world. Witnessing their anger and passion has filled us with both pride and inspiration. At the same time, many of their actions reminded us of the gaps in the movement that we urgently need to address if we want better results now and in the future. We had been building a capacity building programme since 2022 to address these issues and launched it in 2023 with a specific focus on the new young activists.

As we embark on a new decade, we are very excited to continue our mission and take our work to new heights. We are, as always, immensely grateful to all members, volunteers and supporters who make it all possible.

# ACTIVITIES

## Capacity Building Programme

Eritrea is the only country in Africa without any independent media and one of the only countries in the world without any independent civil society groups. All known critics of the government have either been unlawfully detained or fled the country. Anyone suspected of mobilising people or criticising the government risks detention without trial. Due to this severe censorship and repression, it is impossible for the local population to participate in any human rights campaigning without facing major risks to their safety. That is why all human rights campaigning is led by the Eritrean diaspora. However, the campaigning capacity in the Eritrean diaspora is limited. There are no professional and fully funded and staffed civil society groups. The country's most active campaigners are doing as much as they can in between full-time work commitments but have not received the necessary training or support to conduct strategic campaigning. This is having an impact on their mobilisation and advocacy efforts. As the human rights and humanitarian situation in Eritrea continues to deteriorate, the need for a robust and strategic civil society is stronger than ever. There is also a need to invest into youth campaigners, especially those who have fled Eritrea themselves, and help support the country's future leaders in civil society and politics.

This is why we decided to start a capacity building programme for Eritrean campaigners. The programme is a long term initiative with different components. In 2023, we launched the programme with a pilot activity in Kampala, Uganda that was conducted in partnership with Amnesty International. We organised a one-week in-person training for 15 Eritrean youth campaigners with lived experiences of the Eritrean dictatorship and migration. All participants lived in Kampala as refugees and were conducting their activism despite threats from supporters of the Eritrean government.

The training was divided into two parts. The first part focused on campaigning theory and tools. The participants were given group exercises throughout the sessions to properly engage with the material and apply it to their context. This part was led by an experienced campaigns trainer from Amnesty International with some sessions delivered by other Amnesty staff working on the topics. The second part was focused on practical examples from Eritrean campaigning to strengthen the participants' knowledge about the movement and give them ideas for their own work. One of the speakers in the second part was the esteemed activist Meron Estefanos.

The training was received with overwhelmingly positive feedback from the participants both in person and in a later post-training feedback form. They expressed that they have never experienced this kind of learning before, that the sessions were perfectly suited for their needs and that they wished to immediately continue the programme, even if it had to be online. Based on the feedback and our own reflections, we started planning the next activities of the programme.

# ACTIVITIES

## **Advocacy**

In 2023, we continued conducting high-level advocacy. Some of our public engagements included speeches by our executive director Vanessa Tsehaye at the United Nations and at the European Union. In March, Vanessa was invited by the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights to speak about Eritrea at the UN Human Rights Council. Her speech focused on how tired she and the wider movement are of fighting for change and was widely circulated after being shared by the United Nations's official social media channels. In October, Vanessa was invited to speak at a roundtable about Eritrea at the European Parliament. Her speech focused on the European Union's complicity in the Eritrean human rights crisis.

## **Campaign for Eritrean Refugees in Kenya**

In November 2023, we started receiving reports about the treatment of Eritrean refugees by state authorities in Kenya. These reports were coming from different locations in the country and were indicating that groups of Eritrean refugees were not only denied access to asylum procedures, but also that the detention centres in which they are held are overcrowded and in poor and unsanitary conditions. The health of several Eritrean refugees had rapidly deteriorated as a result of these conditions.

We launched a public campaign and extensive casework on behalf of the detained groups in close association with their family members. We published a press release based on interviews with the detained, their lawyers and local organisations who were involved. We launched a social media campaign encouraging our community to target the Department of Refugee Services and Commissioner for Refugee Affairs. We instantly received a reply and we worked closely with the commissioners team to address the concerns.

## **Fundraiser for Eritrean refugees fleeing the Sudan war**

There were 75,000 Eritrean refugees living in Sudan's capital Khartoum when war broke out in April 2023. Many were unable to afford the inflated cost of bus tickets out of Khartoum. They were stranded in a war zone, terrified for their lives and lacking the most basic necessities. But even those who were able to scrape together enough money to purchase bus tickets are struggling. Even after reaching the safety of neighbouring towns, the refugees still encountered a lack of food, housing and medical support. International organisations which are supposed to support refugees have completely abandoned Eritreans caught in the middle of the war. The UNHCR only provided support to those who present themselves at one of their camps — but these camps are notorious for terrible living conditions, poor sanitation, lack of food and clean water, as well as limited medical support.

We came together with Eritrean activists in Sudan and in the diaspora to launch a fundraiser to support Eritrean refugees who had been affected by the war. We ran the public GoFundMe that raised 9400 GBP and also separately collected larger private donations that was channelled to the same fund. We published situation reports and personal testimonies and also spoke at online events to raise awareness about the situation and about how people can help. We worked with our members in Sudan to identify grantees and distribute the funds.

# ACTIVITIES

## **Legal case against harmful UK migration legislation (Nationality and Borders Act 2022)**

Section 12 of the Nationality and Borders Act 2022, which came into force on 28th June 2022 changes how the United Kingdom's Home Office deals with asylum claims. Section 12 allows for 'differential treatment' of refugees, depending on how they came to the UK. When determining an asylum claim, the Home Office can deem someone a 'Group 1' or 'Group 2' refugee, depending on how they arrived into the UK. If, at the end of someone's case, the Home Office consider that they have not travelled 'directly' to the UK - they will be a Group 2 refugee.

Under the Nationality and Borders Act, you cannot have 'come directly' to the UK if you travelled through another country outside the UK, unless you can show that you could not reasonably be expected to have sought protection under the Refugee Convention in that country. If their asylum claim is accepted by the Home Office, 'Group 2' refugees get 2 ½ years status instead of 5. They would have reduced rights to reunite with their families, and would have to make four applications to eventually get settlement in the UK, instead of one.

In 2023, we supported a legal case challenging this section with an expert statement. The case argued that it is effectively impossible for the vast majority of Eritrean refugees to satisfy this criteria and this legislation is discriminatory because it will create a scenario whereby almost 100% of Eritrean refugees are 'second-class'. The case was successful but the legislation was overturned by the more harmful Illegal Migration Act 2023.

## **Campaign for Eritrean refugees getting kidnapped in Khartoum, Sudan**

*In early 2022, we started receiving reports about Sudanese security officials kidnapping refugees off the streets of Sudan's capital Khartoum - sometimes even from their homes or workplaces. A vast majority of the affected refugees were Eritreans. We started documenting these cases - interviewing refugees who were still in detention and refugees who had been freed. Once we had collected enough information, we launched a public campaign calling on Sudanese authorities to immediately stop these kidnappings. We published our findings and launched a petition. We mobilised our community to raise awareness about the issue online and to sign and spread the petition.*

We launched the campaign in 2022 and continued working on it until May 2023 when the war broke out and kidnappings stopped. Our focus then shifted to supporting Eritrean refugees who were affected by the war, as outlined in this report.

# ACTIVITIES

## **Campaign for Ciham Ali, a US-Eritrean national who has been imprisoned since 2012**

Ciham Ali is a US-Eritrean national born in Los Angeles and raised in Eritrea. On 8 December 2012, when she was just 15 years of age, she was arrested by the Eritrean authorities. 10 years later, she remains detained without ever having been tried or charged. Ciham has not had access to her family and lawyers since she was arrested. Her family does not even know where she is being held or her state of health. Under international law, this amounts to an enforced disappearance. Ciham was arrested at the border to Sudan as she tried to flee the country. This happened shortly after her father Ali Abdu, then a foreign minister in President Isaias Afwerki's government, defected and fled to exile. Despite being a US national, the US government has not intervened in her case. We believe that the complete silence and inactivity from the US government on behalf of their citizen has contributed to Ciham's continued detention by the Eritrean authorities.

We have actively campaigned for Ciham for several years, targeting a variety of political actors with ties to Ciham. In 2021, we launched the #FreeCiham campaign with Amnesty International specifically targeting United State secretary of state Antony Blinken. We mobilised support for the campaign through a petition and started organising online and in-person events to raise awareness about her case and increase support for the campaign. The aim of the campaign was also to show solidarity with Ciham and her loved ones. We also started a lobbying campaign in DC alongside the mobilisation efforts. We continued these activities in 2023. Our key public action was a campaign and an event for her birthday where we used the occasion to raise awareness about her online, gather people involved in the campaign or interested in learning more in the event.

## **Birthday campaigns for Eritrean political prisoners**

Petros Solomon was formerly Eritrea's Minister of Foreign Affairs and one of the critics imprisoned without trial in 2001. His wife Aster Yohannes, who was studying in the US at the time of his detention, flew back to be with their kids but was immediately taken from the airport and also imprisoned without trial. Neither of them have been seen since. Their birthdays fall in the same week and we ran a campaign with their daughter Hanna Petros to highlight their cases on social media.

# ACTIVITIES

## **Eritrean festival protests**

We have organised several campaigns and protests against the Eritrean pro-government festivals that are organised every year in cities across the world. In 2023, these protests were led by the Brigade Nehamedu movement. They received global press coverage due to the violence that had broken out at all of the protests. However, the news coverage was often inaccurate and harmful due to the lack of understanding about the Eritrean context. We ran a media and social media campaign to help shape the narrative about the protests and protestors. We did several press interviews, including in Sweden and Canada, and ran a social media campaign that managed to engage a large audience.

## **Events and Conferences**

We regularly attend and speak at events to raise awareness about the issues we work on and to foster connections that can help us further our mission. Our executive director gave the keynote speech at ERISAT's annual symposium in Los Angeles. ERISAT is an Eritrean TV channel that transmits into Eritrea using satellite, circumventing the government's ban on independent media. She also spoke at a panel discussion in Frankfurt, Germany, organised by United4Eritrea (an Eritrean human rights organisation based in Germany). The discussion focused on the current state of the movement. We also attended several international conferences, such as the African Drive for Democracy in Arusha, Tanzania and the Oslo Freedom Forum in Oslo, Norway.

## **Community mobilisation:**

Having a large, informed and motivated community is essential to us. It makes it possible for us to do more work, as we have more individuals volunteering in our team. It also makes our work more successful - as we have more individuals taking action with our campaigns and sharing our informative content online. Our membership is free and offers a space for Eritreans and allies who want to, learn more about human rights issues affecting Eritreans, get to know like-minded people passionate about human rights and Eritrea, stay informed about our initiatives and support in any way you want, work directly with our teams when they have time and get trainings on skills beneficial to the movement. In 2023, we continued to grow and foster our community through our membership. We organised regular members meetings, sent out members newsletter, organised training sessions on campaigning and recruited new members online. By the end of 2023, we had 490 members in over 150 cities worldwide.

# FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Our total income was 8358.98 GBP. This came from our Sudan fundraiser and magazine sales.

Our expenditure was 18729.32 GBP. These costs covered our relief work in Sudan, costs for freelancers, travel costs and all logistical costs (website, domains and email etc). Since a vast majority of the income only was for our relief work in Sudan, we used the reserves from the previous year to cover all other expenses.

Our remaining cash funds at the end of the financial year were 7683.75 GBP.

# GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Our governing document is a 'constitution of a Charitable Incorporated Organisation whose only voting members are its charity trustees.

There must be at least three charity trustees. If the number falls below this minimum, the remaining trustee or trustees may act only to call a meeting of the charity trustees, or appoint a new charity trustee. The maximum number of charity trustees is 10. The charity trustees may not appoint any charity trustee if as a result the number of charity trustees would exceed the maximum.

Apart from the first charity trustees, every trustee must be appointed [for a term of 2 years] by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees. In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees, the charity trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.

A charity trustee ceases to hold office if he or she: (a) retires by notifying the CIO in writing (but only if enough charity trustees will remain in office when the notice of resignation takes effect to form a quorum for meetings); (b) is absent without the permission of the charity trustees from all their meetings held within a period of six months and the trustees resolve that his or her office be vacated; (c) dies; (d) in the written opinion, given to the company, of a registered medical practitioner treating that person, has become physically or mentally incapable of acting as a director and may remain so for more than three months; (e) is disqualified from acting as a charity trustee by virtue of sections 178-180 of the Charities Act 2011 (or any statutory re-enactment or modification of that provision).

Any person retiring as a charity trustee is eligible for reappointment.



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# WHO WE ARE

One Day Seyoum (ODS) is a community-led organisation focused on human rights abuses in Eritrea and against Eritrean refugees. We produce media, art and events to raise awareness about the issues we work on. We organise campaigns and publish research to advocate for change. We run support programmes helping Eritrean refugees with asylum-related issues, mental health and professional development. We organise capacity building initiatives to increase the strength of the movement.

A decade since its founding, ODS is one of the most prominent Eritrean human rights organisations in exile. We have over 500 members and combine virtual and in-person activities to achieve impact. Our membership mostly comprises of young people (18-35 years old) and are a mix of Eritrea and diaspora-born Eritreans, and allies. ODS focuses heavily on community engagement and has provided a unique space for people across the movement to learn and get involved.

We are regularly invited to speak and collaborate by institutions like the United Nations, Amnesty International, Human Rights Watch and news organisations like CNN, BBC and Al Jazeera.



# FOREWORD

I am an Eritrean who was born in the diaspora and raised hearing stories about my home country. When I was five years old, my uncle Seyoum Tsehaye was imprisoned without trial. The older I got, the more I learnt about his case and its connection to the larger crisis in the country. He had been imprisoned in September 2001 as the government was shutting down institutions and imprisoning individuals who were considered a threat to their power. Since then, Eritrea has been experiencing a dire human rights crisis that has forced over 500,000 people to flee.

I started One Day Seyoum in 2013 because I was frustrated by the lack of attention the Eritrean human rights crisis was getting. I wanted to create a space where people, especially young people, could learn more about the crisis and get involved with the human rights movement. The organisation was started in my uncle's name with the aim of continuing his mission. One Day Seyoum was started as a club at my high school in Sweden and quickly spread online and to more schools across the world. By 2020, we had become one of the most active and prominent Eritrean human rights organisations in exile. We were still volunteer run and had no funded programs, but were running several successful programs with the help of our members. Despite our success, we knew that we could do even more. The magnitude of the Eritrean human rights crisis - both inside and outside of the country was immense, and we did not have the capacity to adequately respond to it. The crisis required professional, funded, full-time and strategic civil society. Eritrean civil society is weak - we are forbidden from existing inside the country and the groups outside are, just like us, run by volunteers in our spare time. We knew that we had the perfect base to build from and that the next step was to turn One Day Seyoum into a professional and funded organisation. We started the charity registration process that year and finally received our status in 2022.

We decided to slow down our activities in 2022 to have enough time to facilitate this transition. We reviewed our past work and analysed the overall human rights movement and the political climate we were operating in. We wanted to understand how change could happen and what our role in facilitating that change would be. From there, we built our new organisational structure, restructured our programs and wrote our new strategy.

We are very excited about One Day Seyoum's future and cannot wait to become the organisation we think that the Eritrean people deserve. None of our work would be possible without our members and supporters and we cannot wait to continue this journey alongside you all.

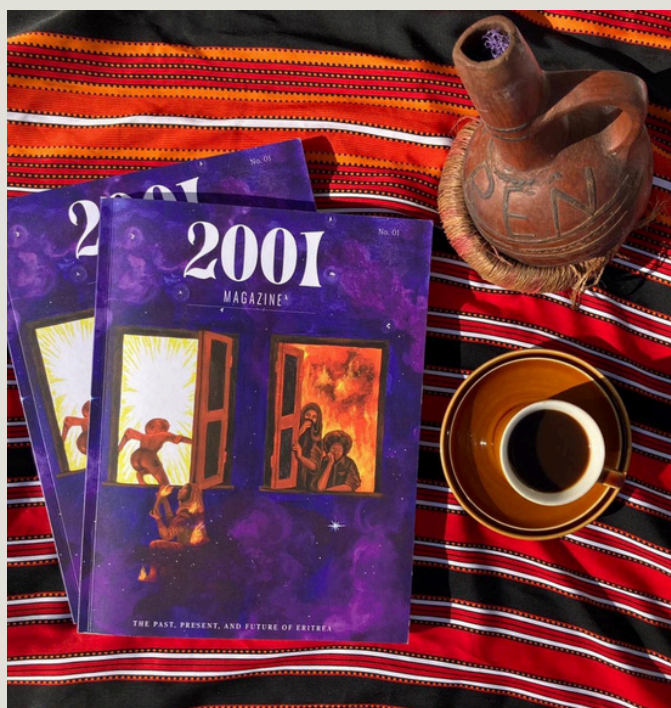


# ACTIVITIES

As outlined in the foreword, we slowed down our activities in 2022 to focus on restructuring the organisation. As you can read in our 10 year report (which you can access on our website), we had the least amount of activity in 2022 out of all our years that we have 2013-2023 and that was because we needed the time to focus on development so that we could build something stronger that could have even more impact. Here are the activities that we did run in 2022:

## Magazine

We run a magazine called *2001 magazine*, named after the year the free press was shut down in Eritrea. The goal of our magazine is to create informative, thought provoking and engaging content that will inform our audiences about the key issues we work on and motivate them to get involved. Our inaugural issue was published in 2021 and featured pieces from leading Eritrean writers, artists, and activists, as well as allies to our cause, who have all created work around the theme: "*The Past, Present, and Future of Eritrea.*" The magazine received overwhelmingly positive feedback and was profiled by the Columbia Journalism Review. By 2022, we had sold 328 copies and set up a team that started preparing for the next issue of the magazine.



# ACTIVITIES

## Campaigns:

### *Commemorating Patriarch Abune Antonios*

In 2005, Patriarch Abune Antonios was unlawfully detained by the Eritrean government after criticising them. In 2022, he died after 16 years in detention. In collaboration with Amnesty International, we organised an event on Twitter spaces to commemorate his life & discuss the systematic practice of unlawful detentions in Eritrea. Invited speakers included the archbishops nephew and esteemed Eritrean journalist Saleh Gadi Johar who knew the archbishop personally. The event had over 150 attendees and received very positive feedback.

### *#StopKhartoumKidnappings*

In early 2022, we started receiving reports about Sudanese security officials kidnapping refugees off the streets of Sudan's capital Khartoum – sometimes even from their homes or workplaces. A vast majority of the affected refugees were Eritreans. We started documenting these cases - interviewing refugees who were still in detention and who had been freed.

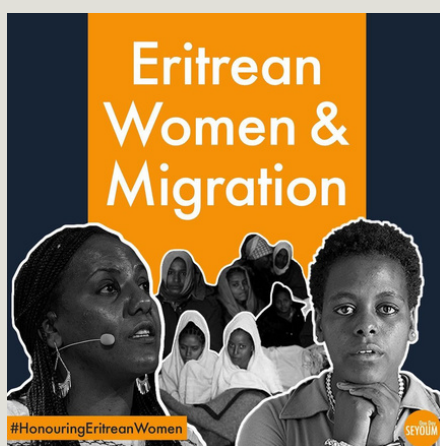
Once we had collected enough information, we launched a public campaign calling on Sudanese authorities to immediately stop these kidnappings. We published our findings and launched a petition. We mobilised our community to raise awareness about the issue online and to sign and spread the petition.



# ACTIVITIES

## *Honouring Eritrean Women & Girls*

On International Women's Day, we ran a campaign shining a light on the suffering Eritrean women and girls experience. The campaign focused on Eritrean women and girls experience in prisons, in the national service and during their migration journeys to safety. We specifically highlighted five cases: 1) 21 year-old Yohanna, one of the victims of the Lampedusa tragedy who drowned while giving birth. The premature baby boy was still attached to the umbilical cord when rescuers found their bodies. 2) Twen Thedros, a young woman who was arrested after she was found participating in an evening prayer meeting in an underground church. She was never charged, tried or had access to a lawyer. She is reportedly held in the notoriously brutal prison Mai Sirwa, where she has endured terrible beatings and torture. 3) Aster Fissehatsion, a liberation fighter who was arrested alongside other members of the G15 group in September 2001 after calling for democratic reforms. No one knows where she is being held or if she's still alive. 4) Aster Yohannes is the wife of Petros Solomon who is a former Minister of Foreign Affairs who was arrested alongside other members of the G15 group in September 2001 after calling for democratic reforms. She was studying in the US at the time of her husbands arrest and was promised by Eritrean authorities that she would be safe if she tried to return to her children. She was arrested at the airport in December 2003. Their children have not seen any of their parents since they were arrested over 20 years ago. 5) We also highlighted Ciham Ali's case, which we will be discussing in more detail below.

## *#FreeCiham*

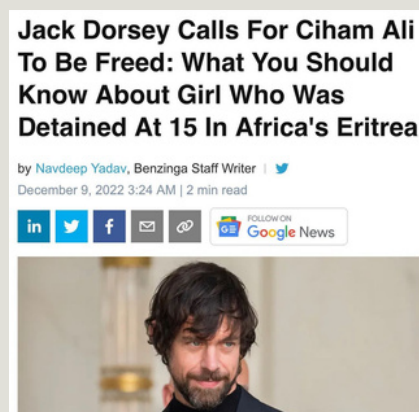

We have actively campaigned for Ciham for several years, targeting a variety of political actors with ties to Ciham. In 2021, we launched the #FreeCiham campaign with Amnesty International specifically targeting United State secretary of state Antony Blinken. We mobilised support for the campaign through a petition and started organising online and in-person events to raise awareness about her case and increase support for the campaign. The aim of the campaign was also to show solidarity with Ciham and her loved ones. We also started a lobbying campaign in DC alongside the mobilisation efforts. We continued these activities in 2022.

On Ciham's 25th birthday on April 3rd 2022, we mobilised our and Amnesty's membership to celebrate her birthday online and in-person. People shared birthday messages and pictures of cakes and balloons they had organised to celebrate Ciham. We organised a virtual birthday party for her on Twitter spaces to talk about her case, how people could get involved and to answer questions. Students in Brussels organised an action outside the US embassy to raise awareness about her case and pressure the embassy to raise her case to the state department in DC. The action included a fashion show where they dressed in purple, Ciham's favourite colour. They ended the action with a meeting with the ambassador.

On the ten year anniversary of Ciham's arrest, December 8th 2022, we organised another action to increase support for the campaign. We asked people to light a candle in solidarity with Ciham and post a picture of it online to raise awareness about her case. We continued to push the petition as a part of the campaign. The campaign was supported with press releases and social media posts from Human Rights Watch and Amnesty International. Jack Dorsey, the founder of Twitter, also tweeted in support of the campaign.

By the end of 2022, the petition for Ciham had garnered at least 430,000 signatures.

## Support services:

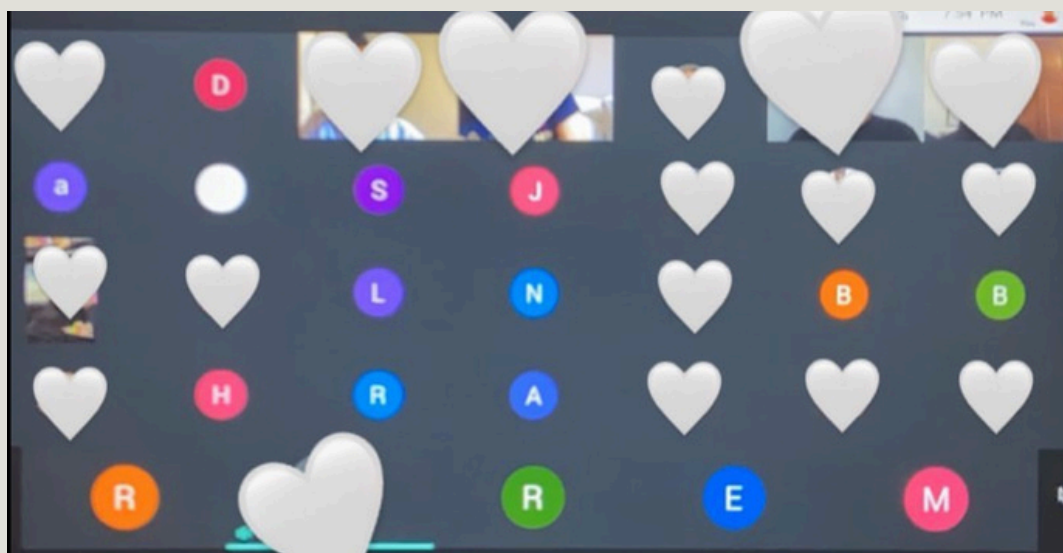
We continued running our support programmes for Eritrean refugees and asylum seekers. Our casework service connected Eritrean refugees to volunteers who assisted them with broad-ranging concerns, from emergency to routine. Our casework service also supported Eritrean refugees who were interested in receiving study and career guidance. The volunteers provided a range of services such as resume advice, career chats, university applications guidance, and finding relevant opportunities. We also have online resources on our website that include lists of organisations, services and opportunities that Eritrean refugees can benefit from in all areas of life. We also have information guides on relevant issues to give them practical and useful advice, including CV guides, advice on writing applications for scholarships and other opportunities. We continued to update these resources in 2022.

Our services were used by Eritrean refugees in several countries, including the United Kingdom, Ireland, Sweden, Germany, Ethiopia, Sudan, South Africa and the United States.

## Community mobilisation:

Having a large, informed and motivated community is essential to us. It makes it possible for us to do more work, as we have more individuals volunteering in our team. It also makes our work more successful - as we have more individuals to take action with our campaigns and push our informative content online. Our membership is free and offers a space for Eritreans and allies who want to learn more, get to know like-minded people, stay informed about our initiatives, work directly with our teams when they have time and get trainings on skills beneficial to the movement. In 2022, we continued to grow and foster our community through our membership. We organised regular members meetings, sent out members newsletter, organised training sessions on campaigning and recruited new members online. We only met and worked virtually but started planning how we can resume our in-person members activities that we stopped when the covid restrictions started in 2020.

By the end of 2022, we had 436 members in over 150 cities worldwide.




