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TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2024.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

In reviewing the reporting year and considering objectives the Trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and the duty under and of the Charities Act 2011 and received a full induction and Trustee training during the set-up phase of JL12 (Trustee Training by Michele Price – Partner at Gunnercooke)

JL12 OBJECTIVES

Charitable Objectives of the CIO as set out in our constitution are:

"For the public benefit to advance in life and relieve needs of young people (the beneficiaries) through the provision of grants and funding:

- To other charities, voluntary groups, schools and service providers to enable the beneficiaries to open the door of opportunity in areas where their talents or passions lie or where they need additional support, including but not exclusively, in sport, fitness, music, education, the arts;
- To enable the beneficiaries to access or pay for kit, uniforms, equipment, counselling, travel costs, subscription of membership costs, coaching or tuition fees and competition costs, and;
- To enable the beneficiaries to take part in educational, training, sporting, cultural and developmental programmes, courses, qualifications, or accreditations."

The charity makes small, targeted grants in line with these objects and our grant giving criteria.

DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS REPORT

The following report covers the period from 1st January 2024 - 31st of December 2024.

This report aims to demonstrate the progress made during the second year in operation. During this period JL12 developed and implemented a strategy for growth and awarded its first round of funding, building on the positive start made in year one.

Connecting with community organisation's:

JL12's aim is to support organisations that help young people manage challenges and overcome adversity to reach their full potential. During this period, we continued to connect with more community organisations to build trusted collaborative relationships to address issues impacting children and young people facing disadvantage.

Numerous networking engagements took place including attending events and meetings as well as visiting organisations across the 3 priority areas in London, Luton and Greater Belfast.

During 2024 JL12 provided funding to **9** organisations who delivered a range of services directly impacting on **270** disadvantaged children and young people across the **3** target areas, Luton, London and Greater Belfast.

As a secondary outcome, there was a further **600** children and young people engaged in project work that contributed to the delivery on the funded projects which contributed to community cohesion.

2024 Funding generated multiple positive impacts

1. **Increased Access to Extracurricular Activities:** By funding sporting, educational, and cultural programs children from disadvantaged backgrounds have been able to participate in activities they may not otherwise afford, broadening their horizons and promoting personal growth.
2. **Enhanced Well-being and Mental Health:** Many of the funded programs included mentoring, counselling and emotional support services for the children and young people to help them with issues such as anxiety, depression, and trauma, fostering resilience and improving their emotional well-being.
3. **Improved Academic Outcomes:** The funding enabled organisations to offer new or more educational initiatives, including tutoring, mentoring and after-school programs directly contributing to improved performance within education and increasing life chances for future success.
4. **Social Inclusion and Community Engagement:** All the funded programs encouraged social interaction and teamwork. By helping children and young people build stronger relationships with peers and mentors reducing isolation and increasing the sense of belonging, crucial for mental health and social development.
5. **Long-term Skill Development:** The funding has supported skill-building in areas such as music, arts, and sports helping children develop talents that can lead to long-term career opportunities. Being able to access these opportunities instils discipline, teamwork, and confidence, contributing to personal and professional growth.
6. **Support for Marginalized Communities:** Funding has supported children and young people from marginalized groups, ensuring that those most at risk of exclusion in society have been provided opportunities for personal development and success.

Summary of Grants awarded:

- 1. BOXING SAVES LIVES – LUTON:** Trauma-informed organisation Using the sport of boxing to improve the physical and mental health of young people.
- 2. ALL SAINTS CATHOLIC SCHOOL - DAGENHAM GREATER LONDON:** Breaking Barriers in Judo in collaboration with All Saints Judo Academy and British Judo Breaking Barriers Project, empowers young athletes from Deprived Communities to have **equal access** to training and competition.
- 3. I AM IRISH – LONDON:** Provision of cultural trips to harness a sense of belonging and identity for young people of Mixed Irish heritage, aligning with research that highlights the positive effects of fostering a connection to one's heritage on mental health and well-being. (children from low economic backgrounds were supported by the funding)
- 4. LUTON IRISH FORUM – LUTON:** Interact Youth Group, a flagship project at LIF where young people from diverse and minority backgrounds attend youth sessions to develop leadership skills enabling them to deliver Social Action Projects. JL12 funding supported 13 young people from of the Interact group to go to Scotland to take part in personal development programme.
- 5. MARY SEACOLE – LUTON:** Cultural Harmony Welcome Packs Cultural Welcome Packages for migrant children, including separated migrant Children (UASC) newly arriving in Luton. These children are experiencing extreme hardship with no secure housing, living in poverty and are marginalised from society.
- 6. SPORTING INSPIRATIONS – LUTON:** Sporting Inspirations focus on engaging Young People from disadvantaged backgrounds to support them and transform lives by improving social, physical and emotional well-being through basketball. Sessions are more than providing sport, the coaches and mentors are role models who use their lived experiences to address issues impacting on YP with a focus on understanding the impact of making positive life choices.
- 7. ST TERESA'S YOUTH CLUB – BELFAST:** The only full-time voluntary youth provider serving Greater Andersonstown. The Glen Road and Andersonstown wards are areas of multiple deprivation ranked in the top 8% most deprived electoral wards within Northern Ireland. **The choices not consequences project** delivers fitness, sporting, educational sessions and alternative therapies to address mental health and trauma and the importance of making positive choices versus consequences of negative choices.
- 8. WEST WELLBEING – BELFAST:** West Wellbeing mental health charity offers a safe space for people in need of help, providing counselling services for those experiencing mental distress with the aim to reduce the number of suicides in West Belfast. The area has one of the highest rates of death by suicide across Europe.
- 9. YOUTH UNITY – LONDON:** Thamesmead located in the London Borough of Bexley and the Royal Borough of Greenwich. Youth Unity CIC provides mentoring, workshops and training for young people, professionals, parents / carers to support vulnerable young people affected by gang violence drugs and other forms of exploitation such as human trafficking, CSE and extremism. Funding bursary was needed to distribute to young people who needed support to purchase equipment, kit, travel and food.

CASE STUDIES

ALL SAINTS CATHOLIC SCHOOL - DAGENHAM GREATER LONDON

Thanks to the funding we have been able to take a team of 6 players to their first ever Adaptive and VI (Visually impaired) judo competitions. These players started judo supported by the funding JL12 provided they were equipped with their judo suits and licenses (and first gradings for some).

The team competed in UEL (University of East London) were a mix of EHCP, SEN, PP, FSM students who were able to enter an event against other players from other judo clubs in London and surrounding areas. 6 members participated and 7 medals were won. Two in the VI category and 5 in the Adaptive section.

We have been working closely with the SEN department to grow the class. We now have 25 students consistently involved in our Thursday afterschool adaptive session, 50+ students on our mainstream afterschool club.

**YOUTH UNITY Thamesmead —gang exit work
With Wayne Hill**

Funding used to provide bursaries for 20 young people

Thamesmead, located in Southeast London, is an area that grapples with significant socio-economic challenges. High levels of deprivation, unemployment, and crime have created a tough environment for many of its residents, particularly the young people who are often exposed to negative influences. The limited access to quality housing and essential services further exacerbates these issues, contributing to a cycle of poverty and limited opportunities for upward mobility.

Youth Unity, through the dedicated efforts of our gang exit worker Wayne, is committed to making a difference in Thamesmead. Wayne focuses on young people involved in the criminal justice system, using sport as a powerful tool for rehabilitation and personal growth. By engaging these individuals in positive and structured activities, he helps them find a sense of purpose and direction.

The funding from JL12 funding was for bursaries providing children and young people with the specific items that would be most impactful for them such as clothing, sports kit, travel, mentoring and activities.

An example of this was the provision of six-month gym memberships for three young people, who regularly use the facilities under Wayne's guidance. This access to a supportive and constructive environment is crucial for their physical and mental well-being, offering an alternative to the negative paths they might otherwise pursue. The gym not only serves as a place for physical fitness but also as a space for building discipline, resilience, and a sense of community.

Youth Unity's efforts in Thamesmead, spearheaded by Wayne, aim to break the cycle of crime and deprivation. By supporting these young people through sport and other positive activities, we strive to empower them to make better life choices and foster a safer, more cohesive community.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

JL12 is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)". The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a statement of cash flows.

The financial statements have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, [modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value]. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors or grantors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the charity.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2023.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

Objectives and activities

DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS REPORT

The following report covers the period from 1st January 2023 - 31st of December 2023.

This report aims to demonstrate the progress made during the second year in operation. During this period JL12 developed and implemented a strategy for growth and awarded its first round of funding, building on the positive start made in year one.

Growth Strategy:

1. Connecting with community organisation's
2. Marketing to grow the reach
3. Developing a robust application, monitoring and evaluation process
4. Appointing ambassador roles
5. Awarding funding

Connecting with community organisation's:

JL12's aim is to support organisations that help young people manage challenges and overcome adversity to reach their full potential. During this period, it was imperative to connect with community organisation's and build trusted collaborative relationships to address issues impacting on children and young people facing disadvantage. Numerous networking engagements took place including attending events and meetings as well as visiting organisations across the 3 priority areas in London, Luton and Greater Belfast. This proactive approach ensured that organisations were able to find out more about JL12 as well as discuss the application criteria and their project ideas.

Marketing to grow the reach

JL12 introduced Instagram to develop the use of social media to increase visibility, to foster a sense of community and to engage with an online audience.

An infomercial was produced with several of the Trustees and Riley the young ambassador presenting key information about funding eligibility and how to apply.

In addition, a case study video was produced to help encapsulate the positive impact of receiving funding and to highlight the great work taking place in communities that benefit children and young people.

To direct followers to JL12 updates, a Linkin.bio was added to connect the website and Instagram together improving connectivity between the two platforms.

Developing a robust application, monitoring and evaluation process:

An application process was developed enabling organisation's to submit their project plan to evidence that they met the criteria and to demonstrate they had the appropriate operational and safeguarding processes in place. Projects were monitored throughout by email, telephone calls and site visits. On completion of projects, organisation's submitted a final report providing information detailing how their project went, the successes, positive outcomes and any challenges faced. Evaluation of year one project funding took place to analyse the effectiveness of the implemented processes, achievements and to identify areas for development.

Appointing ambassador roles:

Ambassador roles were introduced to positively represent JL12, to help raise awareness, visit projects and provide insight on issues impacting on children and young people. Two ambassadors were appointed; Dereece O Callahan, who has volunteered and worked within sport and the wellbeing sector for over 10 years and Riley Tavernier who who enjoys technology and has extensive IT knowledge.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

Awarding funding:

Funding was awarded to 5 projects (listed below) who work with disadvantaged children and young people. Key themes across the projects were developing community relationships, reducing deprivation and financial hardship, reducing the impact of generational trauma separating communities and deterring young people from making negative life choices.

Projects:

6. Kickoff@3 in London: Football community cohesion event with young people from Northern Ireland, London & Luton
7. One Degree Academy in Enfield London: A music scholarship project
8. Wauluds Primary School in Luton: Whizz Kids Wheelers project
9. Hillbough Junior School in Luton: Zen Kids mindfulness & wellbeing project
10. Lagan Valley Education Project & EOTAS in Belfast: Fit for Health wellness & community cohesion project

Summary:

Year two has been a success in terms of growth, creating robust processes, developing working relationships with charities, voluntary groups, schools and service providers. JL12 has been able to add to the wealth of great work taking place in communities, through awarding grants contributing to opening doors of opportunity for disadvantaged children and young people.

Case Study by Claire Ovenell (PE Teacher):

Waulud Primary - Luton

The children attending the school are part of a diverse and rich community however social mobility is low. Deprivation in the area is high being in the top 10% of the most deprived areas in the country and 19% of families residing in the top 5% of the most deprived lower, super output areas nationally. Many of the children arrive at school with barriers to learning such as language acquisition, social and emotional development, and academic skills.

A high proportion of the children attending the school live in multi storey flats resulting in a high number not owning or having access to items such as bicycles or scooters as they don't have space to store these (such as a garden). Waulud Primary recognise the importance of both physical development as well as academic achievement to obtain the best outcomes for children. By offering activities such as scooter club the children can develop their fundamental physical literacy thus improving their balance, coordination, and motor skills in a fun way enabling them to experience a wide range of skill-development through play. **Through the Student Voices Feedback Group pupils expressed that scooter club would be a fun activity to take part in.**

The aim was to provide a scooter club for as many children as possible with the target of enabling the opportunity for **all** school pupils over the academic year to participate (Start date Sep 2023). The Scooters would be used in PE lessons, lunch time clubs, afterschool clubs and offered in free play and structured formats. Young leaders would be trained to support the clubs further developing the children's wellbeing outcomes such as growing confidence through leadership.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

Following the successful funding award from JL12 the scooter clubs were introduced, and the children were very excited to take part. When starting scooter club, it was evident that the children didn't have the knowledge or experience of how to ride a scooter or how to put on a helmet on correctly. This resulted in the first weeks being very slow due to helping to the children put their helmets on and discussions about the safety benefits. As the weeks progressed the children became independent collecting their own helmet and fitting correctly and carrying out basic safety checks on the scooters!

When the children started to use the scooters, a high percentage did not know how to get on a scooter or how to move it along. After using the scooters for a term, the children improved quickly and they were able to provide feedback on how **enjoyable the scooters are to use, how going to the club improved their fitness, developed their balance and how they can now use the scooters independently and have lots of great fun!**

From September 2023 to December 2023, 120 out of 419 children attended scooter clubs with the remaining children to take part over the rest of the academic year.

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

JL12 is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation.

1.1 Reporting period

[FRS 102 3.10 An entity shall present a complete set of financial statements (including comparative information as set out in paragraph 3.14) at least annually. 1.2 Accounting convention

The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

1.6 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

Achievements and performance

DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS REPORT

JL12 was created this year and was a rewarding process for the Funder and all those who worked hard to make the vision of providing a grant giving charity into a reality.

Registering the charity, developing the operational structure and strategy was an enhanced learning experience for the team who all embraced the ethos of the charity's aims.

There was a sense of achievement felt by all when the charity was established and began to function. From this point the team were able to see the goals of the Charity would soon be actionable as networking had already highlighted projects who would be able to benefit from small grant funding.

Setting up the charity took considerable time, but it was important that all legal requirements were met. Everyone involved, aside from the necessary use of professionals was a volunteer. Although the team are all very experienced working within a range of sectors this was the first time, they were involved in setting up a charity.

Regular meetings took place with the trustees to establish the operational processes for applications, the criteria they had to meet to be successful, the methodology of application, the scrutiny process, how the funding would be distributed, monitoring of projects, submission of a final report to demonstrate impact of the funding.

**To demonstrate what JL12 has funded we have included an example of what was delivered by a school:
One Degree Academy Music Scholarship Program (www.onedegreeacademy.org)**



One Degree Academy is a new school in Enfield, who are committed to ensuring that all children develop the tools they need to lead a great life. For them that looks like a school that is built upon a strong Core Knowledge Curriculum, Core Values (Scholarship, Teamwork, Responsibility, Integrity, Value and Effort) as well as lots of Cultural Capital Opportunities, all of this is underpinned by great care from the staff. In their school community they have a higher than average number of students from disadvantaged backgrounds.

This means that they have to work higher than most to ensure that children get the best start in the race that is life and are able to compete with their more affluent peers. One Degree STRIVE to ensure that all students and families feel supported and can go on to receive a university offer and make valuable contributions to society. They believe that postcode and parental income shouldn't make a difference to the opportunities that you have as a child and so they work hard to provide these opportunities within school.

As part of the schools Cultural Capital Offer, they want to ensure that all students have the opportunity to learn a musical instrument, not just those whose parents can afford peripatetic teachers, therefore fund all students in KS2 with a term of instrumental lessons. However, they would like to push this further as the twelve weeks offered isn't enough time to fully grasp an instrument. They want to celebrate those children who show real talent for music and who also enjoy and try hard in their sessions who might not be able to afford to continue their studies. They would like to offer children a scholarship programme who have shown great talent, but who might not otherwise be able to afford to continue with their studies.

The school want to ensure that music is a key component of the national curriculum, that it is enjoyed and explored by **all** students. Financial hardship should not be a barrier for students to learn new things and develop their talents.

“There have been countless studies on the benefits of music and learning an instrument whether those be linked to mental health and well-being or the cross curricular links to mathematics. Not to mention the doors it opens in building children’s self-confidence and opportunities to perform. We want to provide these opportunities to children who would otherwise not be able to receive them.”

With a stronger basis of musical instrumental lessons students will be able to engage in more musical opportunities in the future. It will provide them with more confidence to participate actively in class music lessons and, hopefully, join in other school run clubs and groups where they can continue to practice their newfound skill.

The Impact of receiving the grant

The JL12 grant enabled One Degree Academy the ability to provide a targeted music scholarship programme offering 19 KS2 students from disadvantaged backgrounds 12 free weekly high quality music lessons. The lessons included the use of a wide range of instruments provided by a music specialist to introduce, to practice and develop musical literature. Because of this opportunity the children were able to explore new instruments, develop their musical understanding, increase their self-confidence, and accomplish their musical learning goals. This was the first time the music scholarship was offered by One Degree Academy, and the ambition is to continue offering a targeted funded pathway for those children that require financial support.

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
