### **1) Charitable Objects**

Sustainable Hayfield was constituted as a CIO in March 2022, with the charitable object to promote sustainable development for the benefit of the public in the Parish of Hayfield and surrounding area by:

- a) The preservation, conservation and the protection of the environment and the prudent use of resources;
- b) The promotion of sustainable means of achieving social and economic wellbeing and regeneration;
- c) The education of the public in subjects relating to sustainable development and the protection, enhancement and rehabilitation of the environment.

## 2) Main Activities and Achievements to deliver public benefit.

The trustees are confident that we have met our objects throughout the reporting period, and are delighted to update on our main activities as follows:

### Biodiversity Group

Our third full year has seen activities continue at a high level, all with the aim of increasing awareness of nature amongst the community and directly involving people through volunteering.

Tree Planting. This was our main activity over winter 2024 and spring 2025. Our second major project, with 30 volunteers assisting with the planting of 8000 trees and hedge plants on a site at New Smithy, near Hayfield.



Bluebell Wood, off the Sett Valley Trail. With the assistance of grant funding from the government's Species Survival Fund, we have undertaken a programme of woodland management activities, with the aim of restoring the woodland environment, halting its decline and improving its biodiversity. The intention is that this work continues with a small sub-group on an ongoing basis, to maintain and further improve the area.



Wildflower Areas. The project to create a wildflower and seating area on the corner of Lea Road was successfully completed and it has now had one complete growing season. The bench has proved very popular, whilst the wildflower display has given a mixed display so far. Work will take place this autumn to further enhance it for next year. We would like to establish a number of wildflower areas around the village, eventually linked by a trail. We are

actively seeking the next suitable site, and someone or a group willing to look after it (not difficult). Please contact us with any ideas.



Butterfly Survey Walk. As part of a national Butterfly Conservation Trust scheme, we have established a regular weekly survey of butterflies on a route around the Platt's Wood community woodland, with 16 volunteers.

Swifts. Building on a swift awareness campaign we started last year, this year we have established regular logging and monitoring of swift sites around the village. In conjunction with local expert and grant assistance, we have installed several swift nesting boxes in the village, near sites where we know that they already nest. The intention is to continue this work with further boxes next year.



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Himalayan Balsam. Our main activity this spring and summer, continuing work done in the last 2 years. After a late start due to the spring drought we had an early finish due to early seeding. Nevertheless, previously-pulled areas along Hollingworth Clough, the village centre and along the river above the village have been further reduced. In addition, some new areas have been identified and started. It was only possible due to the efforts of 21 volunteers and the landowners, putting in over 230 man-hours of time. There is plenty left to be done, if anyone would like to join us next year, let me know – the more we have, the easier it gets!

Farmers Meetings. In order to help raise awareness amongst the farming community of various schemes which offer the prospect of benefitting their businesses whilst also improving biodiversity, we have facilitated 6 successful presentations by external speakers. We are delighted that this initiative is now to be continued into the next year, led by a local farmer and with the support of Peak District National Park.



Other Surveying Activities. We have successfully launched the Hayfield Big Birdwatch, with the first one taking place in June. This resulted in 19 different observers recording 634 birds, of 55 different species.

The plan is to conduct this twice per year with two objectives - to help build up a picture of birds in the area (and changes over time) and also to simply encourage people to sit and do nothing for a while except watch and listen!

We have continued with our regular bumblebee and bat surveys as part of national schemes. Our bat detector and moth trap continue to be made available for the community to borrow, free of charge, to carry out their own surveying work. We also continue to progressively record the area's ancient, veteran and notable trees on the national register.

Old School Field Improvements. We are pleased to have secured a grant from the Peak District National Park Foundation to carry out work on the Old School Field which will benefit nature. This will be carried out in conjunction with other improvements by Hayfield Parish Council. The work is being planned to take place over autumn / winter 2025, and will be one of our main activities for the year ahead.

Our ambition is limited only by the need for people to get actively involved. ### **Energy Group**

Our main focus this year has been on the Half Hourly (Time of Use) Tariff Project, through which we are seeking to understand how to reduce electricity bills through choosing the most appropriate electricity tariffs. Certain tariffs offer the potential to significantly reduce electricity costs, but it depends on the specific daily consumption of each household. Within this, we have concentrated primarily on looking at Half Hourly tariffs that change the unit cost of electricity every thirty minutes. Typical unit costs for fixed rate tariffs are currently about 27p per unit. With half hourly tariffs the unit costs vary between -1p per unit and £1 per unit depending on the amount of renewable energy being generated that day.



This can make budgeting very difficult, **so we have created a computer model to help Hayfield residents make informed decisions on the best tariff for their lifestyle.**

The results so far are very encouraging. A few participants have now been on a Half Hourly tariff for over a year and have saved 25- 30% off their annual electricity bills. This represents savings of more than £500 each year.

We are now looking to move to the next stage of the project to include more residents and more types of households. Of particular interest are households with children of primary school age. Additionally, households with Electric Vehicles and/or solar panels, heat pumps and battery storage. A smart meter needs to be installed in order to get 48 meter reads.

Following the success of the Home Energy MOT project, we also ran a zoom session for members of HVCA where we covered the lessons learned from both this project and our

Solar Farm Feasibility project. These were received very well and stimulated a very healthy discussion on a variety of topics, and the potential for future projects across the region. Various members have also attended a variety of meetings on topics such as retrofit of housing stock and MEA opportunities for funding of energy efficiency measures.

Looking to the future, we plan to be at Apple Day 2025 where Roz will represent NEA who give advice on Energy Efficiency and help to pay/reduce energy Bill's and sharing details of our work on Half Hourly electricity tariffs and associated computer model. We will also be presenting our work on Half Hourly electricity tariffs to HVCA in October 2025.

We are now starting to scope out our next big project for the Energy Group. A number of ideas are being considered and we welcome input from members and residents.

### **Active and Sustainable Travel Group Report, 2025**

The group continues to grow our response to how to provide inclusive and integrated active and sustainable travel for our community- both now and in a climate-challenged future.

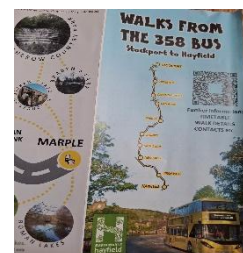
Our main focus continues to be on better buses for our area - buses that are reliable, frequent, affordable and accessible.

There is much talk from our political leaders about their plans to improve bus services in rural areas - the Better Buses Bill from the Government, the £2bn for transport in the East Midlands Combined County Authority. However, our experience tells us that we need to campaign energetically and creatively, and be pro-active to make our voices heard.

Our leaflets "Walks from the 61 Bus" and "Walks from the 358 Bus", aimed to encourage people to leave their cars at home - whether they are residents or visitors to Hayfield, continue to be hugely successful.

We had a second print run of 3000 61 Bus leaflets, funded by a High Peak Borough Council Climate and Nature grant, which has been so popular that we will now need another print run to keep up with demand!

The 358 leaflet (5000 printed under the same grant application) has yet to be fully launched in the Stockport area, but is proving very popular with local people, and people holidaying in Hayfield. We are hoping that a vigorous campaign to deliver these leaflets will eventually encourage people to travel by bus into the High Peak, thus relieving the problems of traffic congestion and reducing carbon emissions in the village.



Both High Peak Buses and Transport for Greater Manchester have responded positively to our leaflets: High Peak Buses have taken 1000 of the 61 leaflets, and statistics show that bus use on the 61 has gone up by 25% (mainly due to the introduction of a second bus each hour).

TGFM are continuing the Our Pass for students travelling from the High Peak into Greater Manchester to study, confirming that bus use in the High Peak is holding up.

High Peak Buses also commissioned the design of a map showing all their bus routes, at the request of some of our more vulnerable residents. There is clearly a demand for this as someone has taken the laminated copy on display in the bus station!

In addition to our actions on buses, one of our group is a member of the Buxton Town Team, who continue to make progress with the Very Light Railway Line from Buxton Station to the Monsal Trail. Again, it is hoped that this will encourage people to leave their cars at home and travel into High Peak by public transport (in this case the Buxton to Manchester line, which is earmarked to become part of the Bee Network).

The Active and Sustainable Travel Group are very proud that the Hayfield Primary School Walking Bus has been so popular and successful. It now runs on two days, Fume Free Thursday and Jam Butty Friday. The wristband scheme has been a great success: three children have received their 30km wristbands. We regularly have over 25 children and six parents/carers on each trip - which is 25 less cars on a Thursday and Friday on Swallow House Lane!

We are delighted that Alan Simpson, the Active Travel Ambassador for the East Midlands Combined Authority will be the guest speaker at our AGM, and hope that this will be the start of an exciting, positive and creative partnership.

### **Reduce, Reuse, Recycle Group (3 R's )**

This year we continued to support people to reduce their use of plastic packaging - particularly single-use plastic. The Big Plastic Count takes place in March each year and we ask people to take part in both this and Plastic-free July. The former has a higher uptake than the latter. Suggestions for pledges include taking reusable containers to the local butchers and of course always remembering to take re-usable bags when shopping.

One of our series of talks this summer was from Jo Gregory who set up and runs the very successful Hummingbird based on the Circular people to donate anything anything they do. The area people from any and all to use it with no stigma. and a range of household are planning further Hummingbird, and are planning that they will have a collection and information sharing point at Apple Day 2025.



Project in Glossop. This is Economy principle and allows they no longer want and take is set out like a shop and demographics are encouraged School uniform, sporting gear items are freely available. We collaboration with

Apple Day in October 2024 included a repair café, supported by New Mills Repair Café, with small electrical items being the most requested repairs. For the first time we had a local leather worker doing repairs and advising on any further work needed. This proved very popular and we hope to repeat with an electrical repairer at Apple Day in 2025.

Finally, we continued to promote an updated version of our Recycling Directory to help people recycle difficult items locally, working in conjunction with St John's Methodist Church as they progress on their journey to become an eco-Church, and who provide a weekly drop off point for many of the "hard to recycle" items. A digital copy of the Directory is available on our website, and a hardcopy from the local library.

## **Food Group**

**Library Garden** - The food group continued to look after our long established community garden at the library, offering people the opportunity to enjoy locally grown fruit, participate in / learn about produce cultivation and gardening with nature and get involved in socially inclusive community gardening days. The garden is managed by a group of 11 members. The fruit crops were very good this year and the wildflower area is becoming more diverse and established. Signage about the wildflower area has been well received.



The group gardening sessions provide good company in the fresh air and the occasional treat from the produce.



**Plant Swap** - We also held our increasingly popular seed and seedling swap, encouraging gardeners throughout the community to swap and share any seedling and seeds and to encourage those that might not have any seeds or seedlings to enjoy other gardeners' excess. This is set up outside the library in the community garden and runs for a couple of months from the spring to early summer.

**Apple Juicing** – The group organises the apple juicing for the annual Apple Day held in the autumn. This involves pre-juicing apples for tasting on the day and demonstrating how to juice apples at the event. This is a very popular activity at the event and always engages families and children in a heritage activity. The food group also organises for the juicer to be used by local apple growers and around 5 people borrowed it this year.

**Skills share** – in order to share skills, we run the occasional workshop on a particular theme. In February, we ran a well-attended bread making workshop, lead by a local



amateur but very experienced baker. Participants learnt how to make focaccia and potato bread. The food group members also share skills and knowledge through occasional shared meals, preparing food to share that is locally sourced and seasonal.

### **Bulk food purchasing**

For food group members, we also continued to operate a food bulk buying scheme to reduce food waste and packaging, and via the newsletter, signposted others in the community to create similar purchasing groups.

### **Apple Day**

We were again delighted to hold our long established apple day at the local primary school last October, which attracted close to 1000 visitors, coming from as far afield as Manchester, Stockport and Derby. This event not only hosts the juicing of a large number of the community orchard's apples but continues to be very much our shop window, through which we update on our activities, provide information to the public on environmental and sustainability matters and recruit volunteers for the following years



activities. This year, it provided a platform from which to share a local resident's experience of a recently installed heat pump, and the benefit of smart meters and flexible tariffs, to launch our "Walks from the 358 bus" leaflet and to continue to recruit volunteers to the ever expanding Biodiversity and Tree Planting Group. We were also delighted to invite back a wide number of local / regional groups and small businesses, including Hayfield Mummer's Society's production of "Apple Day", all with a sustainable or environmental ethos, making the event an environmentally educational and social hub for all generations of the local community. Our next Apple Day is planned to take place on 18<sup>th</sup> October, and we look forward to welcoming back many of our regular stall holders as well as welcoming Hayfield Artists, The Hummingbird Project and Clog dancers for the first time and christening our new apple juicer!



### **Communications, Local Talks, Local Council Engagements & Lobbying**

This year, we ran a schedule of talks for the local community around the broad theme of the Nature and Climate crisis, aimed at widening local awareness of the issues and encouraging collaborative working with like-minded groups. Intended to be both challenging, informative and stimulating, the four talks covered topics ranging from The Peak Park's role in the climate crisis (causation and solution), Peak Cluster, a potential solution to capture the carbon emissions from cement processing, Sunart Fields, a local rewilding project and the Hummingbird project, an inspiration example of the closed loop economy on our doorstep. The talks were well attended, with audiences of up to 75, and we hope they will have inspired individual actions as well as lead to further opportunities to work together and help build a stronger, connected ecosystem across the Region.

Sustainable Hayfield continues to publish a well established quarterly newsletter that goes to all members and followers, providing relevant and current information about the environment and climate change at local, regional and national level. Feedback to the letter

remains extremely positive, with many local residents benefiting from the knowledge and expertise of Laurie James, the editor and group content providers.

In addition to the newsletter, we have a facebook page and website through which we publicise our activities and selective local and national promotions. The website also houses high level content for each group, our newsletters and governance documents. Unfortunately its planned upgrade remains in “proposal” stage in the absence of funding.

Our political lobbying activities this year focused on a letter campaign to local and national ministers for a more sustainable Peak Park funding model, in recognition of its vital role in combating both crises in nature and climate; lobbying our local MP on amendments to the Climate and Nature and Planning and Infrastructure bills as they progressed through the various parliamentary stages; and pushing for the speedy reinstatement of the Sustainable Farming Incentive (or its replacement) on behalf of our local farming community. We also had an initial meeting with our local MP, to gain an understanding of his priorities and areas where we can work together.

Through High Peak Green Network, we participate in various council planning consultations and associated planning activities as they arise, and to lobby the District and Borough Council, seeking to hold them to account against their plans for Climate Change Action and Nature, particularly in the face of more recent back sliding and negative carbon emission performance. We await the Climate Change Annual Report (2024) and Plan for Nature progress update.

Following last year’s restructuring, we have reestablished working channels with the Parish Council, working closely on a number of local community sustainability matters, particularly via the Bio Diversity and Food Groups. We also supported the installation of a finger post at the Sett Valley carpark as a co funder with the Civic Trust.

Looking forward, we are delighted to be hosting Alan Simpson, the Sustainable and Active Travel Ambassador to the East Midlands Mayor to talk at our AGM on 18<sup>th</sup> September, with a focus on regional sustainable travel solutions.

### **3) Financial and Members Review**

Our financial statements have been prepared by our Treasurer and reviewed by an independent observer and can be found on our website at [www.Sustainablehayfield.com](http://www.Sustainablehayfield.com). As per these statements, we have £ 9,203 of Sustainable Hayfield funds in the bank at the time of reporting, an increase of £6200 during the period, but of which £6734 is a committed grant funding to Biodiversity projects. Excluding this, the remaining balance of £2,469, whilst £534 down on last year, remains comfortably in excess of our agreed minimum reserve of £1.5k.

Our main source of funds in the year were apple day proceeds of £897 (£848 PY) and grant funding of £13,508 with £5,925 received from Peak District National Park to support the pending Old School Field project, £3000 from Derbyshire WT for Bluebell Wood restoration and £898 from HPCVS for the new apple press. Our main outlays in the year were the purchase of a new Apple Press, Walk the Bus leaflets and expenditure to support various bio diversity group activity, specifically including the Bluebell project and development of wild flower areas.

We continued not to charge a membership fee this year, to ensure maximum inclusivity, although we may receive a small amount of funding through member donations.

Membership grew 10% to 85 during the year, which continues to represent approximately 20% of our distribution list / face-book following, whilst our active volunteer network has continued to expand by the targeted 20%, with around 75 people now engaged across all group activities.

To enable us to deliver our planned level of activity next year and beyond, we continue to aim to grow our membership and core active volunteer network by 10 – 20% in the coming year.

The trustees are confident that the group is financially and operationally sustainable, though particularly having lost a Trustee during the year, we continue to seek to strengthen our Trustee, Volunteer and Membership base further to secure our long term sustainability, and scale up our response to the fast growing climate and environmental challenges we face.

We remain keen to broaden and deepen our IT / digital communications capability, and are particularly keen to welcome younger members to take on more active roles within the group.

We would like to thank Gill Scott, one of our Trustees who resigned during the year for her energetic contribution to moving the transport group forward and Laurie James for his outstanding contribution to the group over the years. We wish Laurie and his family well in the time ahead in his struggle against serious illness.

Finally, we would like to thank all of our supporters, volunteers and anyone else who has been involved with Sustainable Hayfield over the past 12 months and helping us to meet our objectives. We very much look forward to working with you again over the coming year and beyond, for the benefit of our local community.

### **1) Charitable Objects**

Sustainable Hayfield was constituted as a CIO in March 2022, with the charitable object to promote sustainable development for the benefit of the public in the Parish of Hayfield and surrounding area by:

- a) The preservation, conservation and the protection of the environment and the prudent use of resources;
- b) The promotion of sustainable means of achieving social and economic wellbeing and regeneration;
- c) The education of the public in subjects relating to sustainable development and the protection, enhancement and rehabilitation of the environment.

### **2) Main Activities and Achievements to deliver public benefit.**

**The trustees are confident that we have met our objects throughout the reporting period, and are delighted to update on our main activities as follows:**

### **Energy Group - Home Energy MOT Scheme follow up and more.....**



Following the success of our Home Energy MOT activity last year, the evaluation report, 'The Hayfield Hundred' has continued to receive a universally positive response from statutory organisations and local community groups. We have responded to requests to share our approach with community groups in Darley Dale, Marple, Kniveton

(near Ashbourne), and with Derbyshire County Council. These have been delivered mainly by Zoom. We also made a presentation at Buxton Energy Fair. Our work was also short-listed for a national award by Community Energy England and several group members attended the awards ceremony in Salford Quays.



Responding to the challenges presented by the HE MOT Scheme, we have been exploring options for insulation of solid stone properties. Most recently, we were represented at a workshop on the use of traditional materials for internal insulation. There are no easy answers, but we are formulating a position for local residents.

We have also responded to several invitations and consultations on energy efficiency and use. These have included Community Energy England's work on 'barriers to community energy generation' which was informed by our recent feasibility study for a solar farm in Hayfield.

Following on from our presentation at last year's AGM on Air Source Heat Pumps by Rich Lowe, we have received and responded to several enquiries, including for example, Rich being asked to present to a meeting of Marple Climate Action. Linked to the financial case for Air Source Heat Pumps, we are now actively exploring the potential for households of new, flexible 'time of use' tariffs provided by some energy suppliers. These vary the price of energy charged every 30 minutes. The electricity price increases when demand is high (and the carbon intensity is high), and much less when demand is low (and carbon intensity is low). Some days, when electricity generation is high (due to high winds), the price of electricity goes negative. We have developed a model by which to evaluate the impact of such tariffs on monthly bills on several households whose scale of energy use we know. To date, this has suggested real opportunities for substantial savings in household energy bills. We are continuing to work in this area, seeking more households to be involved. A couple of members have switched to these tariffs and have confirmed that the models are accurate and are saving over £500 a year on electricity bills. Note that these tariffs are only available with houses that have Smart Meters. We are currently considering how best to take this modelling capability to the residents of Hayfield, but we are hoping to undertake some initial trials at Apple Day.

## **Biodiversity Group**

Our second full year has seen a significant increase in activities, all with the aim of increasing awareness of nature amongst the community and directly involving people through volunteering.

**Tree Planting** was our main activity last winter and spring when we played a key role in working with landowners and funders to develop planting designs and coordinate the site work to plant out 11000 young tree and hedge plants off Lanehead Road, 350 of which were grown in our own tree nursery. We also helped raise funds for and help with the planting of a further 3000 trees between Rowarth and Mellor.



**Bluebell Wood.** Also over last winter and spring, we raised funds for and renovated the wildlife pond/wetland in Bluebell Wood. After a summer growing season, this is now maturing nicely.

**Wildflower Areas.** With the ultimate intention to develop several wildflower sites around the village in publicly-accessible areas, in spring we raised the funding for and embarked on our first wildflower site at the corner of Lea Road. Work has been disrupted and delayed by telecoms contractors in the area, meaning that the main site preparation and planting, plus the replacement of the old bench, will now take place in Autumn this year, with further sites identified for development next spring.

**Butterfly Survey Walk.** As part of a national Butterfly Conservation Trust scheme, we have established a regular weekly survey of butterflies on a route around the Platt's Wood community woodland, with 16 volunteers.

**Swifts.** In order to raise awareness of swifts around the village, and to help stop their decline, this summer we arranged for a local enthusiast to give a walk and talk. This was well-attended, despite the weather, and has resulted in confirmation and recording of approximately 6 nest sites.



**Himalayan Balsam.** Our main activity this summer, we have focussed on and successfully cleared 1 mile of a 1.3 mile infestation along Hollingworth Clough from Swallow House Lane up to Lanehead Road. We have had good support from landowners along the route and an impressive 29 volunteers (incl. Hayfield Scouts), putting in over 200 man-hours of effort. The nature of this invasive and problematic plant is that we will need to maintain this effort for a few years to remove regrowth and prevent further spread to other areas of the village.



**Farmers Meetings.** In order to help raise awareness amongst the farming community of various schemes which offer the prospect of benefitting their businesses whilst also improving biodiversity, we have facilitated 2 presentations by external speakers – one on identifying the carbon footprint of farms and one on the government’s Environment Land Management Scheme. Both were well attended, and enthusiasm was such that 2 more are planned for September, with hopefully a further two before the end of the year.

**National Trust.** We have established a monthly day for volunteers to assist the NT rangers on their routine tasks, such as rhododendron removal and wall and fence repair.

**Other Surveying Activities.** We have continued our regular bumblebee and bat surveys as part of national schemes. Our bat detector and moth trap continue to be made available for the community to borrow, free of charge, to carry out their own surveying work. We also continue to progressively record the area’s ancient, veteran and notable trees on the national register.

**Future Work.** Our ambition is limited only by the need for people to get actively involved, with plans to continue to build upon many of this year’s activities detailed above. We also intend to launch a ‘garden birdwatch’ project for the village, develop a network of wildflower sites throughout the village, and compliment the tree planting, wildflower cultivation and HB clearance activities with the organisation of some scything and hedge laying courses. We welcome anyone with a shared interest and a little time to get involved!

### **Food Group**

The food group continued our long established tending to the community garden at the library, offering people the opportunity to enjoy locally grown fruit and vegetables, participate in / learn about produce cultivation and get involved in socially inclusive community gardening days. We also held our increasingly popular seed and seedling swap, encouraging gardeners throughout the community to reduce the waste often associated with small scale crop generation, and provided ongoing advice on how to reduce food waste / “growing your own” through our quarterly newsletter updates. For food group members, we also continued to operate a food bulk buying scheme to reduce food waste and packaging, and via the newsletter, signposted others in the community to create similar purchasing groups.



### **Transport Group**

The Transport Group has grown in size since its relaunch last year, and attracted a cycling and active travel champion, a transport expert and a design wizard to our core team. Our main focus has continued to be on providing better buses for the community, and to encourage people to #takethebus: - if the recent challenges over the sinkhole on the Hayfield Road have taught us anything, it is that communities need a range of transport options to stay connected, resilient and thrive, and buses are an essential element of that.

Buses provide a lifeline to remote communities, are a cheap (still! with the £2 flat fare) and environmentally friendly way of travelling, are fully accessible for families with buggies, wheelchairs or small mobility scooters, offer terrific views and are warm and sociable! We believe they are a vital part of a society that values climate and social justice.



As part of our #takethebus activities, we have had two very enjoyable trips - both into Stockport on the 358 following the opening of the fantastic Stockport Interchange: one was to the Hatworks Hat Museum and the other was to the Stockport Air Raid Shelters and the Friday Food Market.

Building on the success of the 358 #takethebus campaign, and supported and encouraged by Anne Clarke, we have also lobbied Derbyshire County Council to use BSIP money to improve the Glossop

to Buxton 61 bus service.

We are pleased to report that some improvements have been made, in that an extra bus from Glossop to New Mills has been added, meaning there is now a bus every half hour from Hayfield to New Mills and Glossop, as well as the hourly bus to Buxton. DCC have produced data to show that since the improvements to the service, 25% more passengers are using the bus.

Motivated by this positive news we are continuing to lobby for an evening service to allow people to travel through the Borough to work evening shifts and take advantage of our growing night-time economy in the High Peak; and are actively wanting to encourage more people to use the bus.

We are particularly excited to be working with graphic designer, Dave Dunford, to produce a "Walks from the 61 bus" leaflet, highlighting walks along this wonderfully scenic route, and have liaised with the Buxton Town Team, who are now producing similar leaflets, and with Regeneration officers at High Peak Borough Council and Visit Peak District Derbyshire who are very supportive of our aims and efforts.

We hope to launch the leaflet at Apple Day, so come along and pick one up, keep down your carbon footprint, make the roads safer for cyclists and take a ride! Please join us as we offer more opportunities for you to #takethebus! - to help us secure a network of bus routes to our neighbouring towns and indeed cities for all who live in our local community.

**Reduce, Reuse, Recycle Group (3 R's)**

This year we have focused on the production and promotion of a Recycling Directory to help people recycle difficult items locally, working in conjunction with St John's Methodist Church who are on a journey to become an eco-Church, and who provide a weekly drop off point for many of the “hard to recycle” items. A digital copy of the Directory is available on our website, and a hardcopy from the local library. The Directory has proved to be very popular, generating a lot of interest and positive comment locally, and we are pleased that another local transition group has asked to use our format as a basis for their own directory as they recognise its value.

In March we joined the national Big Plastic Count run by Greenpeace. We encouraged people in Hayfield to register and count their plastic waste. Those who did so were put into a local draw for vouchers from local sustainability businesses. The local and national results were disseminated through our newsletter and FB page.

In May we ran a Repair Café assisted by our colleagues from Transition New Mills. 17 items were successfully repaired with more being directed to specialist repairers. Items included an earring, a strimmer, a lamp and several items of clothing.



Finally, we look forward to hosting New Mills Fashion Activistas and the “The Alternative Catwalk” at our forthcoming AGM, intending to highlight the hugely pollutive and exploitative nature of the fashion world and offer an environmentally and people friendly alternative.

### **Apple Day**

We were again delighted to hold our long established apple day at the local primary school



last October, which attracted over 800 visitors, coming from as far afield as Manchester, Stockport and Derby. This event not only hosts the juicing of a large number of the community orchard's apples but continues to be very much our shop window, through which we update on our activities, provide information to the public on environmental

and sustainability matters and recruit volunteers for the following years activities. This year, it provided a platform from which to share the success of the Home Energy MOT scheme and to recruit volunteers to the rapidly expanding Biodiversity Group. We were also delighted to invite back a wide number of local / regional groups and small businesses, including Hayfield Mummer's Society's production of "Apple Day", all with a sustainable or environmental ethos, making the event an environmentally educational and social hub for all generations of the local community. Our next Apple Day is planned to take place on 12<sup>th</sup> October, and we look forward to welcoming back the hugely popular clothes swap, Moors for the Future, Marches Energy, New Mills Repair Shop and Forest schools along with being joined by the Tent People for the first time.



### **Communications, Local Council Engagements & Lobbying**

Sustainable Hayfield continues to publish a well established quarterly newsletter that goes to all members and followers, providing relevant and current information about the environment and climate change at local, regional and national level. Feedback to the letter remains extremely positive, with many local residents benefiting from the knowledge and expertise of the editor and group content providers.

In addition to the newsletter, we have a facebook page and website through which we publicise our activities and selective local and national promotions. The website also houses high level content for each group, our newsletters and governance documents. Its planned upgrade is currently in "proposal" stage awaiting confirmation of funding to go ahead.

Our political lobbying activities this year focused on the twin elections of Regional Mayor and local MP, with an emphasis on raising the profile of green issues during the respective campaigns via promotion of the Green Peace manifesto. We also hosted a hustings for the General Election, to which all local candidates were invited. This was well attended and placed a particular emphasis on Environmental and Social justice issues.

Having given the successful candidates time to bed in, we plan to continue our lobbying activities during the forthcoming year, in combination with other members of High Peak Green Network, with a particular focus on transport, water and community / renewable energy issues at national and regional level.

We also continued to participate in various council planning consultations and associated planning activities, specifically contributing at various levels to the HPBC Plan for Nature

Biodiversity Strategy. We await final publication on this report, along with progress feedback on the DCC Minerals Local Plan, HPBC Climate Change Action Plan and HPBC Local Plan to which we previously contributed.

Having previously made a significant contribution to Parish Council Climate Emergency group, helping to deliver their “green” procurement policy, our involvement with them has been paused as they consider their future structure, and we await clarity as to how we can continue to work with them moving forward, for the benefit of maintaining a sustainable community.

### **3) Financial and Members Review**

Our financial statements have been prepared by our Treasurer and reviewed by an independent observer and can be found on our website at [www.Sustainablehayfield.com](http://www.Sustainablehayfield.com). As per these statements, we have £ 3,024 of Sustainable Hayfield funds in the bank at the time of reporting (excluding £495 held on behalf of Save the Royal), an increase of £54 during the period, and comfortably in excess of our agreed minimum reserve of £1.5k. (Note, after the £495 held on behalf of Save the Royal Group, our closing bank balance is £3,519).

Our main source of funds in the year were apple day proceeds of £848 (£825 PY) and grant funding of £2,553 with £1,581 received from Peak District National Park in support of the Farmers Meetings and £870 from Foundation Derbyshire to support the Wildflower site development.

We continued not to charge a membership fee this year, to ensure maximum inclusivity, although we may receive a small amount of funding through member donations.

Membership remained constant at 77 during the year, which continues to represent approximately 20% of our distribution list / face-book following, whilst our active volunteer network has grown from 30 to > 50 in the same period largely through the activities of our Biodiversity, Apple Day Planning and Transport Groups.

To enable us to deliver our planned level of activity next year and beyond, we aim to grow our membership and core active volunteer network by 10 – 20% in the coming year.

The trustees are confident that the group is financially sustainable, and were pleased to welcome two new Trustees during the year, who bring significant energy and skills to our governing team. We continue to seek to strengthen our Trustee, Volunteer and Membership base further however, to secure our long term sustainability, and to enable us to scale our response proportionally to the fast growing climate and environmental challenges we face. We are also still keen to broaden and deepen our IT / digital capability!

Finally, we would like to thank all of our supporters, volunteers and anyone else who has been involved with Sustainable Hayfield over the past 12 months and helping us to meet our objectives. We very much look forward to working with you again over the coming year and beyond, for the benefit of our local community.

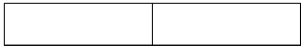

**1) Charitable Objects**

Sustainable Hayfield was constituted as a CIO in March 2022, with the charitable object to promote sustainable development for the benefit of the public in the Parish of Hayfield and surrounding area by:

- a) The preservation, conservation and the protection of the environment and the prudent use of resources;
- b) The promotion of sustainable means of achieving social and economic wellbeing and regeneration;
- c) The education of the public in subjects relating to sustainable development and the protection, enhancement and rehabilitation of the environment.

## 2) Main Activities and Achievements to deliver public benefit.

The trustees are confident that we have met our objects throughout the reporting period, and are delighted to update on our main activities as follows:

### Energy Group - Home Energy MOT Scheme



At our AGM 2022, we launched our 'Home Energy MOT' project, in partnership with Marches Energy Agency (MEA).

This offered all local householders a visit, energy efficiency advice and low level insulation aides installed, for free. Twelve months on, the project has been completed, and an evaluation report written. Over 10% of all parish households, more than 100, took advantage of the

scheme, which we believe to be unique in the UK. The unit cost of each visit, incorporating aides supplied, was around £90. Through its fundraising activities, Sustainable Hayfield contributed about a third of the costs, with our partner, Marches Energy Agency (MEA), providing the rest. All feedback received about the project was very positive.

The scheme has been a real success. Much of this is due to the knowledge and diligence of Graham Hirst, who undertook almost all home visits. Our Energy Group delivered the partnership with MEA, did the fundraising, distributed information house to house and in public venues and coordinated information supply. A good number of participating households benefitted from low level insulation kit supplied and installed (an average of 6 items per house) and have gone on to alter behaviours and make further improvements to their household energy efficiency. This has contributed, we estimate, to at least one tonne of carbon equivalent savings per annum and reduced bills.

This, and the empowerment of households to make informed choices for themselves going forward, as actively evidenced via feedback gained as part of the evaluation report, are substantial legacies of this project, which will we believe continue to bring further future incremental environmental and economic gains to the local community.



The scheme was effective because of Sustainable Hayfield's trusted local brand, perceptions that the advice offered was independent, and because it was free. Our evaluation report, which has lessons for other communities, has been well-received and has been distributed to climate and energy leads in all constituent councils across Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire, with the hope that it will inspire similar projects within the region. The evaluation report is on our website.

## **Biodiversity Group**

Launched at our AGM 2022, the Biodiversity Group has been at the forefront of many of our activities this year, with a particular focus on the preservation, conservation and protection of our environment and the education of local people thereof, but also through their group activities, contributing to the social wellbeing of our community. With a core group of 9, plus volunteers for specific projects building throughout the year to currently stand at 12, the group have undertaken a number of activities this year. We have ambitious plans for next year which will need significantly more volunteers to achieve success and not overburden



people.

**Bats and Moths** – The group’s bat detector has been loaned out 11 times to villagers since spring and 3 of the 8 species known in Derbyshire have been recorded. Similarly, the group’s moth trap has been loaned out 9 times over 2 months, and 52 species of moth recorded. All have enjoyed the activities, particularly children, and improved their awareness of just what is flying around us.

**Butterflies and Bumblebees** – Routes have been established for regular population surveys in parts of the village, part of national monitoring and recording schemes. Plans to expand



for 2024 and invite volunteers to get involved.

**Wildflowers** – Continuing to improve the bus station roundabout wildflower area, with plans for 2024 to start to establish other wildflower areas in public spaces around the village,

created and maintained by volunteers from the community. Benefits to community involvement, environment and mental health/wellbeing.

**Community Tree Nursery** – Local trees for local places. 3 mini sites have been established, 1 more is in progress and possibly 1 or 2 more next year. Currently we have 550 seedlings growing for eventual planting out. We hope to double this number over the next year, in conjunction with villagers collecting and germinating seeds for us.

## **Community Action Projects**

**Himalayan Balsam.** Volunteer working parties this year have made some progress, but the scale of the overall task is also now clear! We have much bigger plans for next year and beyond, to tackle infestations at source in a more systematic way, using larger numbers of volunteer-led teams over spring and summer.



**Pond restoration in Bluebell Wood.** Planning to carry out work over the autumn/winter to restore it. Will require volunteers.

**Tree planting.** Assisting with projects for large-scale planting of trees and hedges within the parish. Will require volunteers.

### **Food Group**

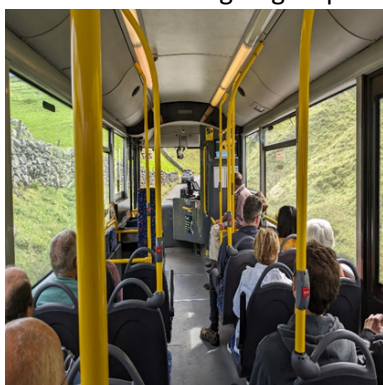
The food group, which has been well established for several years, continued to tend to the community garden based at the library, offering all in the local community the opportunity to enjoy locally grown fruit and vegetables, as well as participate in / learn about their cultivation and get involved in socially inclusive community gardening days. Central to their activities, the group also ran their popular annual seed and seedling swap from the library, encouraging gardeners throughout the community to reduce the waste often associated with small scale crop generation. They also operated a food bulk buying scheme for group members to reduce food waste and packaging.



### **Transport Group**

The transport group was newly re-formed during the year on the back of a local campaign to save the 358 bus service. Its focus has been to encourage local residents to reconnect with bus travel and #takethebus on journeys where they had previously either not travelled or taken the car.

The group organised a number of evening bus trips to a local music venue and cinema as well as some weekend day trips on the bus. Most trips were well attended, though the weekend journeys were impacted by the unreliability of the service. In all cases however, those travelling remarked on how much they enjoyed the social aspect of the trip, with the aim that this encourages groups to arrange their own independent bus journeys together in future.



Next year, in addition to the organised trips, the group plans to create a booklet of #takethebus and #walkbacktohayfield trips to encourage local residents to travel sustainably, remain active and enjoy the social aspect of bus travel throughout the year. We also plan to work with the council to seek to secure longer term sustainable bus services, and to join up with neighbouring sustainable travel groups to explore a wider regional approach to sustainable travel.

### **Reduce, Reuse, Recycle Group (3 R's)**

Supporting the energy group in their efforts to help households reduce their energy bills and carbon footprint, the 3R's group called on their significant pool of sewing volunteers to produce over 80 draught excluders, many from recycled fabric and material, that were distributed to local residents and specifically to those in fuel poverty via the Zinc project.



## **Apple Day**

We were delighted to hold our annual apple day again last October, providing the village with their first post covid public event for 2 years. This event, which typically sees 800 – 1000 attendees during the afternoon, not only hosts the juicing of a large number of the community orchard's apples but is our shop window, through which we update on our activities, provide information to the public on environmental and sustainability matters and recruit volunteers for the following years activities. We also



invite a wide number of local / regional groups and small businesses to attend, all with a sustainable or environmental ethos, making the event an environmentally educational and social hub for the local community each year. Based at the local school, there is a particular focus on children's activities and environmental learning.

## **Communications, Local Council Engagements & Lobbying**

Sustainable Hayfield has a well established quarterly newsletter that goes to all members and followers, providing relevant and current information about the environment and climate change at local, regional and national level. Feedback to the letter remains extremely positive, with many local residents benefiting from the knowledge and expertise of the editor and group content providers.



In addition to the newsletter, we have a facebook page and website through which we publicise all current activities and selective local and national promotions. The website also houses high level content for each group, our newsletters and governance documents, and is planned to be upgraded and refreshed in the coming year.

Responding to the growing sense of urgency around climate change and environmental issues, and a seeming disconnect between the action required at national level and its delivery, the group has also started to take on a growing role in lobbying our local MP and councils, and the Department for the environment, food and rural affairs on a number of issues including local water pollution, the Global Methane Challenge and DCC draft Minerals Local Plan. We plan to expand this activity next year, whilst remaining non-partisan from a party-political perspective.

The group has also actively participated in a number of local planning consultations / council activities including contributing to the HPBC emergent Climate Change Action Plan, HPBC draft local plan, HPBC Biodiversity Strategy and makes up half of the membership of the Parish Council Climate Emergency group, where we have succeeded in supporting delivery of a "green" procurement policy for the Council.

### **3) Financial and Members Review**

Our financial statements have been prepared by our Treasurer and reviewed by an independent observer and can be found on our website at [www.Sustainablehayfield.com](http://www.Sustainablehayfield.com). As per these statements, we have £ 2,970 in the bank at the time of reporting, an increase of £73 during the period, which is comfortably in excess of our agreed minimum reserve of £1.5k.

As in previous years, our main source of funds in the year were apple day proceeds of £825 and grant funding of £4,100 with £1259 received from HP CVS and £1500 from the winding up of the Country Show. In total, grants of £2,900 were received to support the energy project and £800 for the Biodiversity Group.

We continued not to charge a membership fee this year, to ensure maximum inclusivity, although we may receive a small amount of funding through member donations.

Membership has grown to 77 during the year, from 5 on incorporation at the start of the period, which represents approximately 20% of our distribution list / followers. Next year we hope to double this, whilst greatly expanding our active volunteer network from 30 to > 70 to enable the group to broaden its activities, particularly within the Biodiversity group, and also transport and political lobbying.

The trustees are confident that the group is financially sustainable, though we are actively seeking to strengthen its Trustee, Volunteer and Membership base to ensure it is adequately resourced to fulfil its plans for next year and secure its long term sustainability.
