Directors' Report

The trustees are pleased to present their annual directors' report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 28 February 2025 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Governing Document

The charity is a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up on 12 February 2019 and registered as a charity on 23 March 2022. It is governed by a memorandum and articles of association.

Principal Activities and Objectives

The specific objectives for which the Company is established are:

- The advancement of education and prevention and relief of poverty within the Windrush Generation, their families and members of their communities, who have suffered disadvantage and discrimination, which has resulted in a lack of opportunity, leading in many cases to hardship and oppression.
- The advancement of citizenship and community within the Windrush Generation, their families and members of their communities who have suffered disadvantage and discrimination, which has resulted in a lack of opportunity, leading in many cases to deficit in the ability to grasp the necessary tools to benefit from citizenship and community.
- The advancement of community development within the Windrush Generation, their families and members of their communities who have suffered disadvantage and discrimination, which has resulted in many cases with fragmentation and disassociation of community.
- The advancement of culture within the Windrush Generation, their families and members of their communities who have suffered disadvantage and discrimination, which has resulted in a lack of opportunity to relate to and benefit from knowledge and relatable appreciation of the culture and norms of its generation and its ancestry.
- The advancement of human rights and the promotion of racial harmony and equality within the Windrush Generation, their families and members of their communities who have suffered disadvantage and discrimination, which has resulted in oppression resulting in deprivation of inalienable human rights and the promotion of racial disharmony and persecution.
- The relief from financial hardship and other disadvantage within the Windrush Generation, their families and members of their communities who have suffered disadvantage and discrimination, which has resulted in a lack of knowledge and opportunity for advancement and lack of employment opportunities.
- Such other charitable purposes as the Directors may from time-to-time think fit.

Results

The financial position of the charity at the end of the financial year is as detailed in the attached financial statements. Income for the year was £41,148.

Directors Selection Method

The Board of Trustees are the governing body of the company and are elected by members. Trustees for the charity are selected based on their skills that will help oversee the aims of the charity. The skills WGLA look for in potential trustees will be based on commercial experience, public sector experience or if they are able to utilise their professional experience such as qualified members of recognised accounting and legal bodies.

Choosing a new trustee is generally based on recommendation and an initial informal discussion which might involve a meeting with each candidate and then inviting those that are suitable and interested to observe a board meeting. This is an opportunity for them to see how the board works and to meet trustees. Members of WGLA will make the final decision to appoint.

Review of Activities:

The Windrush Generation Legacy Association (WGLA) continued to uphold its mission to honour the Windrush Generation and provide culturally rooted community services across Croydon and beyond. This reporting period reflects meaningful community engagement, cultural programming, and continued development of our operations to serve both elders and younger generations and thus embed future appreciation of the legacy.

Coffee Mornings and Lunch Club

During this reporting period, the Coffee Mornings and Lunch Club were adapted due to weather, logistical factors and member feedback.

Coffee Mornings were run regularly until the last three months of the period, when two had to be curtailed because of low temperatures in the unit. Since the end of the reporting period they have been reinstated on a monthly basis.

The Lunch Club continued in the unit until January 2025, and were then paused for reviewing options on both demand and ability to reinstate them effectively.

Heritage and Culture Events

Black History Month

A key activity during this period was WGLA's Black History Month programme, which included:

- A heritage-focused pop-up exhibition delivered in partnership with IHG Hotels Group, contributing to cultural education and public engagement.
- School pop-up exhibitions, an increasingly effective outreach model allowing entire schools to benefit from Windrush heritage learning despite budget constraints.

Carnival Collaborations and Cultural Engagement

Key successes of WGLA's involvement at Notting Hill Carnival, August 2024 included:

- Collaboration with London Transport, London Fire Brigade, and Masology Making Carnival Mas Band to support children's day activities.

- A partnership with CSEP – Croydon Supplementary Education Project, enabling 50+ children to participate in Children’s Day at Carnival.
- Supporting approximately 30 elders to attend and safely experience the event.

Strategic Partnerships and Collaborations

During March 2024 – February 2025, examples of WGLA’s collaborations included:

- Croydon BME Forum – across community support programmes
- Supermalt UK – through the “Design the Can” creative competition
- IHG Hotels Group – hosting Windrush heritage pop-up exhibitions

and partnerships included those with Croydon University Hospital NHS and London South Bank University amongst others. Leveraging the strengths of other organisations combined with our own allows to extend our reach.

- Community events
- Cultural programming

Directors' Responsibilities

The charity trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that year. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- State whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue to provide services.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Reserves Policy

At 28 February 2025, there was a deficit of £31,748 and the trustees are actively looking for opportunities to rectify this.

Risk Review

The major external risk to which the organisation is exposed is lack of funding. The trustees are constantly reviewing this area to ensure the continuity of the organisation. Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation/approval of all transactions.

I report to the trustees (who are also Directors for the purpose of company law) on my examination of the financial statements of The Windrush Generation Legacy Association ('the charitable company') for the year ended 28 February 2025 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and related notes.

This report is made solely to the charity's trustees, as a body, in accordance with section 145 of the Charities Act 2011. My work has been undertaken so that I might state to the charity's trustees those matters I am required to state to them in this report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, I do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charity and the charity's trustees as a body, for my work, for this report, or for the opinions I have formed.

Responsibilities and basis of report

As the trustees of charitable company you are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 ('the 2006 Act').

Having satisfied myself that the financial statements of the charitable company are not required to be audited under Part 16 of the Act and are eligible for independent examination, I report in respect of my examination of the charitable company's financial statements carried out under section 145 of the Charities Act 2011 ('the 2011 Act') and in carrying out my examination I have followed all the applicable Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act.

An independent examination does not involve gathering all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently does not cover all the matters that an auditor considers in giving their opinion on the financial statements. The planning and conduct of an audit goes beyond the limited assurance that an independent examination can provide. Consequently I express no opinion as to whether the financial statements present a 'true and fair' view and my report is limited to those specific matters set out in the independent examiner's statement.

Independent examiner's statement

If the charitable company's gross income exceeds £250,000 your examiner must be a member of a body listed in section 145 of the 2011 Act. The income for the year was below this threshold. I confirm that I am qualified to undertake the examination because I am a member of ACCA, which is one of the listed bodies.

I have completed my examination. I confirm that no material matters have come to my attention in connection with the examination giving me cause to believe that in any material respect:

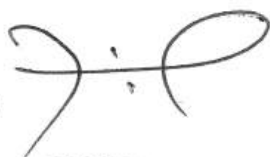

1. Accounting Policies

1.1 Accounting Convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Incoming Resources

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donations and other incoming resources are the actual amounts received in the year.

1.3 Depreciation

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation, less estimated residual value of each asset over the expected useful life as follows:

Furniture and Fittings	-20% on straight line
Office Equipment	-20% on straight line

Items of expenditure are capitalised when purchase price exceeds £300.

1.4 Restricted Funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets this criteria is charged to the fund.

1.5 Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purposes and are available as general funds.

1.6 Designated Funds

Designated funds are set aside by the directors to meet contingencies not likely to be funded by anticipated income.

The financial position of the charity at the end of the financial year is as detailed in the attached financial statements. Income for the year was £37,675

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Review of Activities:

The Windrush Generation Legacy Association (WGLA), celebrates members of the Windrush Generation, their descendants, and achievements. We highlight African and Caribbean contributions to both world wars, public services, commerce and other areas of socio-economic and cultural life in Britain and the British Commonwealth.

During the course of the year, we have delivered local community based projects, providing learning and participation activities for diverse audiences. These projects have included talks, intergenerational groups, music, arts, culture, literary and other events that feature intercultural histories.

WGLA exhibitions, seminars and wider activities have assisted the community and attendees to get a better understanding of culture, community and heritage. They have also offered opportunities for the elders and first generation Windrush community members to share, enlighten and engage with younger and companion generations. We have enjoyed a wide audience from schools, community groups, corporations and the wider community, both online, via social media, television, radio and in person. The virtual aspect to our activities and multiplicity of forums has allowed WGLA to become much more inclusive and accessible to the community we serve.

Some of the activities we have undertaken include:

Our Coffee Morning Club, which is hosted at our centre in the Whitgift Centre Croydon twice a month. We also have a free arts and crafts club, called Art Flow. These events have proved popular and have encouraged a significant number of regular members and visitors.

We also have a monthly Lunch Club which is usually filled to capacity. This offers a comfortable space for members and guests to share quality food and good company, whilst being entertained by a variety of artists, speakers, DJ's and performers. Quality freshly cooked Caribbean meals are provided, and attendees often take additional meals home to enjoy later.

Easter and Christmas Markets, these presented great opportunities for small and medium size businesses to offer their products and services to our membership and a much wider patronage.

In August we were able to establish links and offer a Food Bank at a time when many of those with young families traditionally struggle to manage.

Black History Month Celebrations, which included a Pop-Up Caribbean Kitchen. Notable amongst our activities was the honour of being nominated as the Rumfest 2022 Charity of the Year. This gave us the opportunity to have a Pop-Up Living Room in a prime position for the 2 days of the event. We also benefited from Donations established through raffles, and a sizable £3500.00 donation raised through the Rumfest Annual Auction.

In June 2022, WGLA celebrated the 74th Anniversary of the HMS Windrush's arrival at the Tilbury Docks, with feted members of the Windrush Generation. It was fitting that we were able to host a full program of events, with a centre piece exhibition launch of, a selection, from Pal Hansen's *Windrush – Leave to Remain series*. These consisted of portraits of Windrush Generation Members, who had fallen victim to the 'hostile environment' policy. This day was an exciting time in which the contribution of the Windrush Legacy was fully acknowledged. We also took this opportunity to thank our many volunteers and show them some much warranted appreciation.

In July we were honoured by a visit from, social-documentary photographer, Jim Grover. Unbeknownst to him, his 2018 exhibition and accompanying book, *Windrush: Portrait of a Generation*, was the spark for the idea to create WGLA. Jim has become a firm friend of WGLA, and he gifted us a valuable donation. He has also followed up with generous gifts of his time and expertise, documenting some of our vibrant events and people in photographs.

WGLA hosted an Afternoon Tea for the Fire Brigade Service to engage with our members and visitors during Black History month. The centre was full to capacity and it proved a valuable forum for exchange.

January 2023 saw the launch of the Lovers Rock Exhibition, which was accompanied by numerous events throughout the period to April 2023. This fantastic collaboration with CeeBee Multimedia had our centre filled with visitors who enjoyed the musical performances by artistes, seminars, topical discussions and accompanied by food, sing-alongs and at times dancing.

Our revenue has largely been generated by donations. We have also been the beneficiary of generous support from Hammerson plc, who have provided our charity with a home, in the Whitgift Centre Croydon, the value of which equates to a donation in the region of £30,000 a year. Another generous corporate benefactor is, CO-OP Group Food Retail Croydon.

Members and visitors to our centre and outreach events have made donations approximating £900.00 a month. This leaves an approximate £300.00 monthly shortfall, in order to merely breakeven.

Future Plans

Looking to the future WGLA has plans to continue our effective work with exhibitions which celebrate the Windrush legacy and Black history. We will host seminars and events around the exhibitions in order to build knowledge, educate, raise awareness, support self-esteem and confidence. We will develop our initiatives in supporting community cohesion through supporting seminars and events.

The focus of our activities aligns with our stated purpose, to highlight Windrush heritage, black history and the contribution to UK society. WGLA believe that Windrush legacy and Black history is a topic which should be seamlessly threaded through the British Culture to enhance and enlighten the understanding of history and self.

We will collate the findings from our seminars and exhibitions and use this information to hone in on areas where we will identify additional understanding and learnings which will assist the users to make further sense of heritage, culture and self. We plan to have a bigger presence at Notting Hill Carnival and to produce a number of medium and larger scale events during Windrush 75 celebrations.

It is important to have a charity such as WGLA, as it aids understanding and community cohesion. Listening to people and taking the opportunity to explore, discuss, challenge and understand each other's experiences and thinking. WGLA supports individuals and communities to have a sense of belonging and self-worth and in turn assists individuals in meeting their full potential.

Since WGLA opened in August 2021, we have had over 7,000 people through our doors, it is an amazing achievement and the feedback we have had from our visitors and members is further proof of what is required and wanted. We encourage feedback and this is regularly sought during our coffee morning twice a month. Our board is made up of a diverse group of individuals who reflect the community we serve, and our service is for all members of the community. We have many volunteers who also provide feedback and input into our ideas and the running of our charity.

WGLA plans to seek and gain funding that will secure our infrastructure and our position in the community. We intend to significantly broaden our offering and be in a position to expand our operations so as to serve and engage more effectively.

How our activities deliver public benefit

Our main activities and who we try to help are as described in objectives and activities. All our charitable activities focus on these objectives to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit.

The major external risk to which the organisation is exposed is lack of funding. The trustees are constantly reviewing this area to ensure the continuity of the organisation. Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation/approval of all transactions.

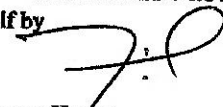

1. Accounting Policies

1.1 Accounting Convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Incoming Resources

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

1.3 Depreciation

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation, less estimated residual value of each asset over the expected useful life as follows:

Furniture and Fittings	-20% on straight line
Office Equipment	-20% on straight line

Items of expenditure are capitalised when purchase price exceeds £300.

1.4 Restricted Funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets this criteria is charged to the fund.

1.5 Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purposes and are available as general funds.

1.6 Designated Funds

Designated funds are set aside by the directors to meet contingencies not likely to be funded by anticipated income.
