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Report of the Trustees

In presenting this report the trustees would like to express their sincere thanks to all those whose vision, commitment and hard work have achieved so much in a short time.

Summary of the main purposes of the charity

New Chapters provides much-needed affordable drug and alcohol recovery for people in Coventry, Warwickshire and the surrounding area. The core aims of New Chapters are to:

- Empower clients in achieving and sustaining abstinence from drugs and/or alcohol
- Enable residents to build the foundations of independent living.
- Repair relationships and build stronger family bonds.
- Support vulnerable adults to return to work by developing their employability skills.

Additional benefits to the local community will be to:

- Reduce the number of clients on benefits.
- Reduce the rate of drug-related crime.
- Reduce the number of NHS A&E bed-days used by those with drug and alcohol-related trauma or illness.

Summary of main activities in pursuit of these objects

We aim to provide affordable, long-term residential support for recovery from drug and alcohol addiction. Our three-stage programme supports people to overcome addiction and build a fulfilling life.

Stage 1: becoming substance free

Residents focus on becoming drug and alcohol-free through a community detox overseen by external medical professionals. They live in our Stage 1 care facility, supported by trained staff. Through our daily, timetabled programme, residents explore their addiction and develop tools to guide them in recovery, from managing finances to forming healthy relationships, life skills and social skills. The property has on-site staff and/or volunteers 24 hours each day.

New Chapters adopts "The 12 Steps" internally through group work and externally by attending fellowship meetings in the community.

Stage 2: independence and maintenance

When residents are ready, they move into our Stage 2 property where they gain more responsibility for themselves and others. They continue to engage in part of the Stage 1 timetable, focusing on becoming more independent. As part of this, residents in the Stage 2 are encouraged to provide peer support for those in Stage 1.

Stage 3: aftercare and peer support

In Stage 3, residents will move into independent living. New Chapters will work with individuals who have completed Stages 1 and 2 to secure privately rented accommodation or social housing.

New Chapters will provide ongoing support to live in the community and move into training, volunteering and employment. We believe it is crucial for those in recovery to share their experience, and we will provide volunteering opportunities at New Chapters for those entering Stage 3.

As part of our Aftercare Programme, individuals will be invited to engage in a monthly therapeutic group to share their experiences, emotions and any struggles they face in recovery. We believe this connection is vital for their ongoing recovery.

Statement on public benefit

What is the need?

- Over 6,000 people are drug or alcohol dependent in Warwickshire
- The service receives over 2,000 referrals a year across Coventry and Warwickshire.
- Over 200 people in Leamington Spa alone are registered with Council commissioned drug and alcohol services.

Drug and alcohol Addiction destroys families, deprives children of parents and increases crime. One chaotic individual in addiction can cause huge harm in our towns.

Sadly, there is limited public budget for supporting people in addiction. Private beds often cost £ thousands per week for the individual, which is completely out-of-reach for those living in homelessness and poverty.

Our work saves the police, NHS and social services around £4 for every £1 spent (Public Health England, 2018)

Our work also helps rebuild families. We provide a safe space for individuals to get together with our trained counsellor to talk about the impact addiction has had on them and the family as a whole. We explore healthy boundaries and help them learn how to rebuild trust again.

Achievements and performance

Residential Program

New Chapters opened the first Stage 1 house on 8 July 2024, and then the first Stage 2 house on 25 November 2024. Since opening the first Recovery House in July, there have been 19 individuals who have started the program. The status and outcomes to 15th May 2025 are:

○ Residents in Stage 1	6 – all still in recovery
○ Residents in Stage 2	5 – all still in recovery
○ Completed Stages 1&2, returning to family/home	9
○ Self-discharged – did not complete program	<u>6</u>
○ Total	<u>26</u>

Six persons who started the program self-discharged and did not complete the program. Commercial rehab programs typically have a success rate of between 25% and 50%. The relative success of the New Chapters program is testament to the strong culture and peer-support which has been established within the charity.

The Recovery Hub

New Chapters also operates the Recovery Hub - a weekly drop-in for people with addiction. Not everyone who comes into the group wants to do residential treatment. That is ok, we work with anyone looking for recovery and support them in the community with each step they take and at what pace suits them. Since opening in November 2023 there have been more than 100 individuals who have benefited from this service. It is a service highly valued by the participants. Attendees to the program have also self-referred to become residents in the New Chapters Recovery House.

Financial Review

New Chapters received total income for the year of £297,495 (£68,242 in 2023/24) and had expenses of £206,258 (£29,480 in 2023/24), resulting in an increase to reserves of £91,237 (£38,762 in 2023/24). Income sources were:

- New Chapters started receiving Enhanced Housing Benefit (EHB) in the year, for the period that individuals are resident. £143,259 was received (£Nil 2023/24).
- Other fundraising has been primarily through donations from individuals and through fund-raising events (£74,575 in 2024/25 compared to £67,216 in 2023/24).
- New Chapters had generally not been eligible for grants from most funding charities prior to the Supported Accommodation service being started. With positive outcomes now being demonstrated, New Chapters hopes to increase the amount of future fundraising from institutional grants. £35,600 was received (£Nil 2023/24).
- New Chapters also received an affordable service charge from residents primarily to cover food and to go towards other costs which are non-eligible for EHB. £41,321 was received (£Nil 2023/24).

Reserves Policy

Reserves are needed to:

1. Meet the working capital requirements of the charity in the event of not meeting fund-raising targets over a short- or medium-range period of time, and
2. In the event that the Trustees decide that the Charity needs to close, and therefore to enable the charity to close well and meet its commitments to employees, its vulnerable clients and to its creditors.

New Chapters has established a reserves policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the charity should ideally be at least 6 months of planned expenditure. Projected expenditure for 2025/26 is £450,000 and therefore reserves of £225,000 should be targeted. Current reserves (£226,965 at 31 March 2025) have reached this minimum level.

The Trustees will look to increase the level of reserves in the next financial year to enable the modest expansion of activities which are planned and to provide a stable and resilient base such that the primary focus can continue to be on providing the best support to service users.

Structure, Governance and Management

New Chapters is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO)

The charity is managed by its Trustees. As at 31st March 2025 there were seven trustees. The Trustees meet monthly, or more often if considered appropriate.

New trustees are recruited from people known by the existing trustees or those who have registered their interest and applied through contacting the charity. New trustees are referred to the Charity Commission guidance for their duties as a trustee.

There were 7 (part-time) employees during the year to 31st March 2025.

The charity is also reliant on a number of volunteers in various roles to support the charity in service and administrative roles.

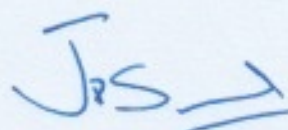

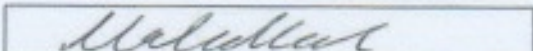

Notes to the accounts for the period ended 31st March 2025**1. Accounting policies****(a) Basis of preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, accounting and reporting by charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1st October 2019) (Charity SORP FRS 102) and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

New Chapters meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £1.

Last year's accounts were prepared on a cash basis, whereas this year's accounts are on an accruals basis.

(b) Preparation of accounts on a going concern basis

The Trustees consider that the principal uncertainty regarding going concern relates to the ability to raise funds. The Trustees monitor fund raising results and expenditure (actual and forecast) to mitigate that risk.

(c) Volunteers

The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

(d) Income

Income is included when receivable. Where income has conditions attached to it, that income is recognised when there is certainty of receipt, entitlement and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Income (including grants receivable) is deferred where conditions exist on entitlement such as a specified future time period.

(e) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised in the period in which it is incurred and includes attributable VAT which cannot be recovered. Expenditure is recognised when a legal or constructive obligation arises. Costs of raising funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income. Governance costs are those costs incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

(f) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life, which in all cases is estimated at 5 years.

(g) Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost (or deemed cost) or valuation less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes costs directly attributable to making the asset capable of operating as intended.

Our work will save the police, NHS and social services an estimated £5.22 for every £1 spent on addiction rehabilitation and recovery.

Our work will also help rebuild families. We will provide a safe space for individuals to get together with our trained counsellor to talk about the impact addiction has had on them and the family as a whole. We will explore healthy boundaries and help them learn how to rebuild trust again.

Achievements and performance

The year to 31 March 2024 has been primarily fund-raising to accumulate reserves and working capital to enable leasing a property, employing staff and starting to provide services later in 2024. To that extent New Chapters had, as at 31st March 2024 built up £135,728 of unrestricted and available reserves.

Since the financial year end, the charity has leased a property to use as the supported accommodation (stage 1 – the **New Chapters Recovery House**). The property is now being prepared to enable the charity to start accepting its first residents in June 2024.

Whilst finding and preparing a property for the supported accommodation service, the charity also launched the **New Chapters Recovery Hub** in November 2023. The Recovery Hub is a safe and non-judgemental space, offering support to individuals who are interested in becoming drug and/or alcohol free and want to start the journey in finding recovery. Since its launch (as at 29 April 2024) 36 individuals have attended sessions, of whom 14 are now regular attenders. There have also been 2 self-referrals from attendees to become residents in the New Chapters Recovery House.

Financial Review

New Chapters received donations in the year of £67,216 (£97,912 in 2022/23) and had charity expenses of £29,480 (£947 in 2022/23), resulting in net £135,728 (£96,966 in 2022/23) of unrestricted and available reserves. Fund-raising to date has been primarily through donations from individuals and through fund-raising events. New Chapters had generally not been eligible for grants from most funding charities during the year to 31 March 2024 as the Supported Accommodation service had not yet been started.

Reserves Policy

Reserves are needed to:

1. Meet the working capital requirements of the charity in the event of not meeting fund-raising targets over a short- or medium-range period of time, and
2. In the event that the Trustees decide that the Charity needs to close, and therefore to enable the charity to close well and meet its commitments to employees, its vulnerable clients and to its creditors.

New Chapters has established a reserves policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the charity should ideally be 6 months of the expenditure. Budgeted expenditure for the first full year of operation is £250,000 and therefore reserves of £125,000 should be targeted. Current reserves (£135,728 at 31 March 2024) slightly exceed this level, but are projected to fall to about 3 months-equivalent of expenditure during the first four months of operation of the Recovery House. This is due to initial start-up costs and also the anticipated Housing Benefit income being paid in arrears by the local authority. The Trustees will look to increase the level of reserves in the next financial year, once residential care services are being provided and as they start to raise funds from grant-making charities.

The charity is managed by its Trustees. As at 31st March 2024 there were six trustees. The Trustees meet monthly, or more often if considered appropriate.

New trustees are recruited from people known by the existing trustees or those who have registered their interest and applied through contacting the charity. New trustees are referred to the Charity Commission guidance for their duties as a trustee.

There was one employee during the year to 31st March 2024.

The charity has started to recruit a number of volunteers in various roles to support the charity as it prepares to open its residential care support services.

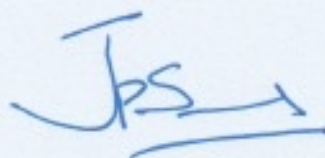

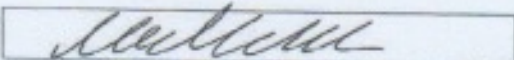

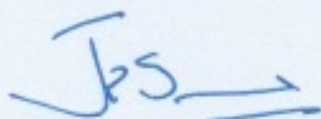

Notes to the accounts for the period ended 31st March 2024**1. Accounting policies****(a) Basis of preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, accounting and reporting by charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1st October 2019) (Charity SORP FRS 102) and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

New Chapters meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £1.

Last year's accounts were prepared on a cash basis, whereas this years are on an accruals basis.

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Report of the Trustees

In presenting this report the trustees would like to express their sincere thanks to all those whose vision, commitment and hard work have achieved so much in a short time.

Summary of the main purposes of the charity

New Chapters will provide much-needed affordable drug and alcohol recovery for people in Coventry, Warwickshire and the surrounding area.

The core aims of New Chapters are to:

- Empower clients in achieving and sustaining abstinence from drugs and/or alcohol
- Enable residents to build the foundations of independent living.
- Repair relationships and build stronger family bonds.
- Support vulnerable adults to return to work by developing their employability skills.
- Reduce the number of clients on benefits.
- Reduce the rate of drug-related crime.

Summary of main activities in pursuit of these objects

We aim to provide affordable, long-term residential drug and alcohol rehabilitation. Our three stage programme will support people to overcome addiction and build a fulfilling life.

Stage 1: becoming substance free

Residents will focus on becoming drug and alcohol-free through a community detox overseen by external medical professionals. They will live in our primary care facility, supported by trained staff. Through our daily, timetabled programme, residents will explore their addiction and develop tools to guide them in recovery, from managing finances to forming healthy relationships, life skills and social skills. The property will have on-site staff and/or volunteers 24hours each day.

New Chapters will introduce “The 12 Steps” internally through group work and externally by attending fellowship meetings in the community.

Stage 2: independence and maintenance

When residents are ready they will move into our Stage 2 property where they will gain more responsibility for themselves and others. They will continue to engage in part of the Stage 1 timetable, focusing on becoming more independent. As part of this, residents in the Stage 2 will be encouraged to provide peer support for those in Stage 1.

Stage 3: aftercare and peer support

In Stage 3, residents will move into independent living. New Chapters will work with individuals who have completed Stages 1 and 2 to secure privately rented accommodation or social housing.

New Chapters will provide ongoing support to live in the community and move into training, volunteering and employment. We believe it is crucial for those in recovery to share their experience, and we will provide volunteering opportunities at New Chapters for those entering Stage 3.

As part of our Aftercare Programme, individuals will be invited to engage in a monthly therapeutic group to share their experiences, emotions and any struggles they face in recovery. We believe this connection is vital for their ongoing recovery.

Statement on public benefit

What is the need?

- Over 6,000 people are drug or alcohol dependent in Warwickshire
- The service receives over 2,000 referrals a year across Coventry and Warwickshire.
- Over 200 people in Leamington Spa alone are registered with Council commissioned drug and alcohol services.

Drug and alcohol Addiction destroys families, deprives children of parents and increases crime. One chaotic individual in addiction can cause huge harm in our towns.

Sadly, there is limited public budget for in patient detox and rehabilitation. Individuals normally have to travel out of area for a short detox period lasting only a few weeks. Private beds often cost £ thousands per week for the individual, which is completely out-of-reach for those living in homelessness and poverty. We will charge £50 per week as a service charge, with all bills already paid.

Our work will save the police, NHS and social services an estimated £5.22 for every £1 spent on addiction rehabilitation and recovery.

Our work will also help rebuild families. We will provide a safe space for individuals to get together with our trained counsellor to talk about the impact addiction has had on them and the family as a whole. We will explore healthy boundaries and help them learn how to rebuild trust again.

Achievements and performance

The year to 31 March 2023 has been primarily fund-raising to accumulate reserves and working capital to enable leasing a property, employing staff and starting to provide services later in 2023. To that extent New Chapters had, as at 31st March 2023:

- Built up £96,965 of unrestricted and available reserves
- Started identifying potential properties for use as residential drug and alcohol rehabilitation

Financial Review

New Chapters received donations in the year £97,058 (£854 in 2022) and had charity expenses of £817 (£130 in 2022), resulting in net £96,965 of unrestricted and available reserves. Fund-raising to date has been primarily through donations from individuals and through fund-raising events. New Chapters has generally not yet been eligible for grants from funding charities as charitable activities have not yet been started.

Reserves Policy

Reserves are needed to:

1. Meet the working capital requirements of the charity in the event of not meeting fund-raising targets over a short- or medium-range period of time, and
2. In the event that the Trustees decide that the Charity needs to close, and therefore to enable the charity to close well and meet its commitments to employees, its vulnerable clients and to its creditors.

New Chapters has established a reserves policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the charity should ideally be 6 months of the expenditure. Budgeted expenditure for the first full year of operation is £245,000 and therefore reserves of £123,000 should be targeted. The Trustees will look to increase actual reserves in the next year, and hope to start raising funds from grant-making charities, once residential care services have started to be provided.

Structure, Governance and Management

New Chapters is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO)

The charity is managed by its Trustees. As at 31st March 2023 there were six trustees. The Trustees meet monthly, or more often if considered appropriate.

New trustees are recruited from people known by the existing trustees or those who have registered their interest and applied through contacting the charity. New trustees are referred to the Charity Commission guidance for their duties as a trustee.

There were no employees during the year to 31st March 2023.

The charity has started to recruit a number of volunteers in various roles to support the charity as it prepares to open its residential care support services.

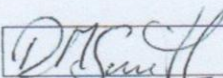

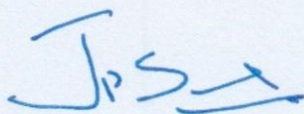
