Objectives and Activities

Fairview Education was established as a charity in April 2022. The charity consists of four trustees who oversee the activities which are led by an Executive Director who works on a voluntary basis. One of the trustees acts as the safeguarding trustee and safeguarding lead. The same trustee is also involved in the delivery of the academic programmes.

The purposes of the charity are to advance the education of primary aged pupils in Gloucestershire (primarily but not exclusively amongst those from disadvantaged backgrounds, such as those in receipt of Free School Meals and Pupil Premium) by:

- Providing fully funded tuition in preparation for the 11+ Grammar school entrance examinations
- Providing fully funded general academic tuition for students struggling to access and progress within mainstream primary education
- Providing additional financial support to children and families so that they can access mainstream education

Applicants from Gloucestershire primary schools are assessed before being offered a Free Tuition Bursary based on their assessment results and the potential for them to meet the qualifying standard for the 11+ in Gloucestershire.

In 2024/25, a Free Tuition Bursary offered 30 hourly private tuition sessions, outside of school hours, together with all the teaching resources needed and two independent practice examinations in the summer term. The Charity pays for experienced local private tutors to deliver the tuition and an agency to deliver the practice examinations.

From its inception to the current day, 72% of the pupils receiving a Free Tuition Bursary have been successful in the 11+ examination and gained places at one of the seven Gloucestershire grammar schools.

Achievements and Performance 2024/2025

In line with our expansion plan outlined in the previous year's annual report, Fairview Education (FE) opened a new tutoring hub in Gloucester in the academic year 2024/25. Two new tutors were recruited to deliver the programme and we hired premises at St. Barnabus Church Hall. Our 12 successful applicants were split in the ratio 8:4 Cheltenham : Gloucester and FE provided 29 tuition sessions over 3 academic terms with the 30th in early September 2025, just before the 11+ itself. Attendance was generally excellent.

The tutees were provided with 2 practice examinations during the summer term (and holidays) which were outsourced to a local agency. Results from these gave a good indication of the progress made during the year and the likelihood of success in the 11+ examination.

11+ examination results for our third cohort became available in October 2025, and we are pleased to report that FE is averaging a 72% success rate each year, over the three years since its inception, for its tutees passing the 11+ and gaining a place at one of the 7 local grammar schools in Gloucestershire. This year, our first pupil was awarded a place at 'Pate's Grammar School' in Cheltenham, arguably one of the top schools in the country and the hardest school in the county to get into.

During the year, the charity has continued to develop partnerships with local schools so that our details can be passed on to future year groups and more families might become aware of our offering. We continued our work with primary schools in Gloucester which had proved difficult in the past. As planned, we started to offer '6 week taster courses' for Year 4 pupils who were working at 'exceeding expectations' level and who qualified for Free School Meals / Pupil Premium in some of our partner schools in Gloucester. We developed stronger relationships with the grammar schools themselves and, as hoped, we ran a 'summer school masterclass programme' for those enrolled in the 'shaping futures' programme at 'Sir Thomas Rich' school in Gloucester and at 'Marling' in Stroud. As a result, we had more applications from Gloucester based families for Free Tuition Bursaries in August 2025.

For the 2025/26 cohort, we have maintained the number of places available, offering 12 Free Tuition Bursaries, but switching our focus to Gloucester in the ratio 8:4 Gloucester to Cheltenham. The main reason for this is that: pupils who live in Cheltenham and only gain a place at a Gloucester grammar school (generally easier than to gain a place at Pate's) are not eligible for free transport to Gloucester and this becomes a barrier to them taking up their place. There are 4 grammar schools in Gloucester as opposed to one in Cheltenham.

While the consultation at Pate's grammar school in Cheltenham resulted in their decision to take in more pupils from the local area who qualify for Pupil Premium, we believe that the 'qualifying score' remains so high that this will have relatively little impact.

Our strategy going forwards will therefore be to concentrate our efforts further in Gloucester and to increase any potential partnership with the Gloucester and Stroud grammar schools by working with them during the summer holidays to deliver high quality masterclass sessions to their 'shaping futures' cohort to try to help them prepare for the upcoming 11+ examination in September.

The issue regarding the low intake of Pupil Premium children into grammar schools (4% vs 22% nationally) remains a contentious issue in the media and within the grammar schools themselves. This is compounded by the intake of pupils from outside of Gloucestershire which further disadvantages our target cohort. Safeguarding

The charity continues to implement a robust safeguarding policy and all tutors complete a safeguarding log at the end of each session. Safeguarding standards have been brought up to date: all tutors and trustees have enhanced DBS, new tutors were recruited using 'safer recruitment' procedures and the safeguarding lead and deputy DSL have completed extra training to make sure that they are up to date with the latest policies and are able to advise both tutors and trustees appropriately. A large amount of administration time has been taken up with upholding our safeguarding standards. No significant safeguarding issues have been reported

Finance

Income in 2024/5 was a lot lower than 2023/4 (-48%), largely due to some generous corporate donations in 2023/4, but in line with the budget. Total expenditure increased by +14% reflecting the extra tuition costs involved in taking on more students in Gloucester.

Largely due to a very successful fundraising event by two supporters of the charity, raising over £10K, FE achieved a breakeven budget and maintained a healthy surplus allowing us to offer at least 12 Free Tuition Bursaries for the academic year 2025/26.

It was noted that: maintaining a surplus of roughly twice our annual expenditure makes it significantly harder to raise additional funds and, as a result, FE will aim to reduce its surplus in 2025/6 but maintain enough to offer at least 12 bursaries for the following academic year.

During 2024/5, the charity hired the contract services of 5 experienced 11+ tutors in Cheltenham and Gloucester to provide the weekly lessons and oversee the progress of the cohort.

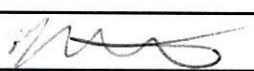
One of these tutors is a trustee of the charity who has provided services to the charity this year including: weekly tutoring; safeguarding management and safeguarding training; oversight and direction of the tutoring course. His experience and qualifications make him highly suitable for these services and it represents exceptional value for money to the charity. The charity articles allow for this provision by a trustee (as long as they are in a minority) and approval was granted at the trustees meeting of 12.7.24 in accordance with the charity policies on payments to trustees and conflict of interest among trustees. This is indicated in the accounts.

The charity contracted a local tutoring agency to provide the practice examinations which are provided as part of the Free Tuition Bursary. Payments for services provided have been consistent with the local market rate for such provision and the trustees are confident that they have received good value for money.

The purposes of the charity are to advance the education of primary aged pupils in Gloucestershire (primarily but not exclusively amongst those from disadvantaged backgrounds, such as those in receipt of Free School Meals and Pupil Premium) by:

- Providing fully funded tuition in preparation for the 11+ Grammar school entrance examinations
- Providing fully funded general academic tuition for students struggling to access and progress within mainstream primary education
- Providing additional financial support to children and families so that they can access mainstream education

Applicants from Gloucestershire primary schools are assessed before being offered a Free Tuition Bursary based on their assessment results and the potential for them to meet the qualifying standard for the 11+ in Gloucestershire.

In 2023/24, a Free Tuition Bursary offered 34 hourly private tuition sessions, outside of school hours, together with all the teaching resources needed and two independent practice examinations in the summer term. The Charity pays for experienced local private tutors to deliver the tuition and an agency to deliver the practice examinations.

In the academic year 2022/23 (the first year of operation for the charity) 70% of the pupils receiving a Free Tuition Bursary were successful in the 11+ examination and gained places at one of the seven Gloucestershire grammar schools.

Achievements and Performance 2023/2024

Tuition for 8 successful applicants began in September 2023 and Fairview Education provided 33 tuition sessions over 3 academic terms with the 34th in early September 2024, just before the 11+ itself. Attendance was generally excellent.

The tutees were provided with 2 practice examinations during the summer term (and holidays) which were outsourced to a local agency. Results from these gave a good indication of the progress made during the year and the likelihood of success in the 11+ examination.

11+ examination results for our second cohort became available in October 2024, whereby 4 of the 6 (66%) who took the 11+) were offered a grammar school place. Two families failed to register their children before the cut off date and must attempt the examination in February 2025 as a result. Our learning from this is that the charity needs to provide extra support and advice during the application window in May-June 2025 so that this is not repeated in future.

During the year, the charity has continued to develop partnerships with local schools so that our details can be passed on to future year groups and more families might become aware of our offering. We began to form partnerships with primary schools in Gloucester which had proved difficult last year. As planned, we started to offer '6 week taster courses' for Year 4 pupils who were working at 'exceeding expectations' level and who qualified for Free School Meals / Pupil Premium in some of our partner schools in Cheltenham. We then extended this to Gloucester. We also spoke to Head Teacher conferences, in both Cheltenham and Stroud, to introduce the charity. We developed stronger relationships with the grammar schools themselves and began to explore the potential to run a 'summer school masterclass programme' for those enrolled in the 'shaping futures' programme at Sir Thomas Rich school in Gloucester. As a result, applications for Free Tuition Bursaries in August 2024 came from a range of different schools across Gloucestershire including an applicant from Stroud.

For the 2024/25 cohort, we have increased the number of places available, offering 12 Free Tuition Bursaries, opening a new hub in Gloucester and recruiting two additional tutors to deliver the programme.

The issue regarding the low intake of Pupil Premium children into grammar schools (4% vs 22% nationally) remains a contentious issue in the media and within the grammar schools themselves. The seven grammar schools in Gloucestershire are acutely aware of this and are very supportive of the effort we are making to address this. <https://www.bbc.co.uk/news/education-64714201>

In Cheltenham, Pate's Grammar School is now in a consultation period over a plan to increase the number of pupil places for Pupil Premium qualifying students in the local area. The new proposal will see a set number of places - about 10% - reserved for children in the local area who are eligible for Pupil Premium, as well as those who live in the 30% most deprived neighbourhoods in the immediate vicinity of Pate's Grammar School.

Safeguarding

The charity has implemented a robust safeguarding policy and all tutors complete a safeguarding log at the end of each session. Safeguarding standards have been brought up to date: all tutors and trustees have enhanced DBS, new tutors were recruited using 'safer recruitment' procedures and the safeguarding lead has completed extra training to make sure that he is up to date with the latest policies and is able to advise both tutors and trustees appropriately. A large amount of administration time has been taken up with upholding our safeguarding standards. No significant safeguarding issues have been reported.

Finance

Income this year was similar to 2022/3 (-2%), largely due to some generous corporate donations, allowing us to extend our offering to include some after school clubs in local primary schools. Expenditure increased by +18% to reflect the extra tuition costs involved.

The charity employed the contract services of 3 experienced 11+ tutors in Cheltenham and Gloucester to provide the weekly lessons and oversee the progress of the cohort.

One of these tutors is a trustee of the charity who has provided services to the charity this year including: weekly tutoring; safeguarding management and safeguarding training; oversight and direction of the tutoring course. His experience and qualifications make him highly suitable for these services and it represents exceptional value for money to the charity. The charity articles allow for this provision by a trustee (as long as they are in a minority) and approval was granted at the trustees meeting of 26.7.23 in accordance with the charity policies on payments to trustees and conflict of interest among trustees. This is indicated in the accounts.

The charity contracted a local tutoring agency to provide the practice examinations which are provided as part of the Free Tuition Bursary. Payments for services provided have been consistent with the local market rate for such provision and the trustees are confident that they have received good value for money.

Further donations, both corporate and private, were received throughout the year allowing for a surplus in the accounts at the end of the year to be held over for the provision of further Free Tuition Bursaries in the academic year 2024-2025. This surplus allows us to be confident in offering a further 12 Free Tuition Bursaries and a range of after school clubs with the potential for a summer school in the summer holidays 2025.

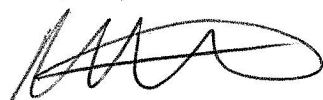

In May 2022, two corporate donations were made to the Charity to provide seed funding in order to offer 'Free Tuition Bursaries' to pupils qualifying for 'Free School Meals' in order to help them gain a place at one of the seven local grammar schools in Gloucestershire.

Applicants from Cheltenham primary schools were assessed before being offered a Free Tuition Bursary based on their assessment results and the potential for them to meet the qualifying standard for the 11+ in Gloucestershire.

A Free Tuition Bursary offers 34 hourly private tuition sessions, outside of school hours, together with all the teaching resources needed and practice examinations in the summer term. The Charity pays for experienced local private tutors to deliver the tuition.

Achievements and Performance

Tuition for 8 successful applicants began in September 2022 and Fairview Education provided 33 tuition sessions over 3 academic terms with the 34th scheduled for early September 2023, just before the 11+ itself. Attendance was generally excellent. A further (9th) applicant was taken on in August 2023 and provided with a holiday tuition programme.

The tutees were provided with 2 practice examinations during the summer term (and holidays) which were outsourced to a local agency. Results from these gave a good indication of the progress made during the year and the likelihood of success in the 11+ examination.

11+ examination results for the first cohort became available in October 2023, whereby 5 out of 7 pupils (70%) were offered a grammar school place. Success criteria is not only based on this exceptional result in our first year of operation but also on the general academic improvement and support that has been offered to these pupils from low income families. Further evidence will be available from their SATs results in 2024.

During the year the charity has developed more partnerships with local schools so that our details might be passed on to the next year group and more families might become aware of our offering. In Cheltenham, Fairview Education now has good relationships with 8 partner schools and the 2023/24 applicants have come from 6 different schools. Those Cheltenham schools we have developed partnerships with are extremely positive about what we have to offer. Rowanfield and Hesters Way primary schools (among the lowest socio economic schools in the county) have asked us to consider providing an after school club in order to raise the profile of the 11+ with children and families from lower income households. We are considering running an 11+ club after school on Wednesdays in Rowanfield for selected Y4 pupils in October 2023.

The main grammar school in Cheltenham, Pate's, is delighted that we are trying to address the issue they have (of very few FSM pupils being admitted) and have added us as a partner organisation to their own programme: Pate's Shaping Futures. Our Logo and website link have been added to their website. We also mention their programme on our website.

Contact with primary schools in Gloucester has been very disappointing. We have had little response to our emails and approaches. This is an area we plan to work much harder on in 2023/24.

Similarly, we will also attempt to develop links with the 4 grammar schools in Gloucester in the same way as we have in Cheltenham. This may broaden our visibility with potential families in Gloucester.

The issue we are aiming to address was covered by a BBC article on 21st February 2023.

A large amount of administration time has been taken up with upholding our safeguarding standards. No significant safeguarding issues have been reported.

Marketing & Fundraising

A very considerable amount of administration and management time has been taken up with fundraising activities. Aside from the initial seed funding, further funding has been raised from corporate and individual sources this year. Our first successful grant application (from Westhill) will be paid to us in September 2023.

Finance

Income this year was higher than anticipated and the charity benefited from some generous corporate donations to seed fund the initial tutoring and enable us to offer 8 Free Tuition Bursaries at the start of September 2023.

The charity employed the contract services of 2 experienced 11+ tutors and a one stand-in tutor in Cheltenham to provide the weekly lessons and oversee the progress of the cohort.

One of these tutors is a trustee of the charity who has provided services to the charity this year including: weekly tutoring; safeguarding management and safeguarding training; oversight and direction of the tutoring course. His experience and qualifications make him highly suitable for these services and it represents exceptional value for money to the charity. The charity articles allow for this provision by a trustee (as long as they are in a minority) and approval was granted at the trustees meeting of 8.8.22 in accordance with the charity policies on payments to trustees and conflict of interest among trustees. This is indicated in the accounts.

The charity employed a local tutoring agency to provide the practice examinations which are provided as part of the Free Tuition Bursary. Payments for services provided have been consistent with the local market rate for such provision and the trustees are confident that they have received good value for money.

Further donations, both corporate and private, were received throughout the year allowing for a surplus in the accounts at the end of the year to be held over for the provision of further Free Tuition Bursaries in the academic year 2023-2024. This surplus allows us to be confident in offering a further 8 Free Tuition Bursaries.
