POLICIES & PROCEDURES & ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The charity Trustees are a group of individuals with a wide range of skill sets and backgrounds from the Third Sector, Health Sector, Legal Sector and patient Advocates. Consequently, the organisational structure of the charity has the personnel who possess the relevant knowledge, background and experience required to inform the charity activities and provide advice regarding development.

Angor has policies and procedures in place which have been developed over the last few years. These are reviewed and updated on a regular basis.

RELATIONSHIP WITH WIDER NETWORKS

Angor engages with other organisations across all sectors throughout Carmarthenshire. Angor continues to work and engage with other Third Sector and community groups to support individuals and their loved ones following a diagnosis of cancer or life limiting illness, signposting to them and accepting referrals from other organisations. We have built up an excellent relationship with the Carmarthen Living Well Centre, the local Farming community and national and local charities.

The Trustees review all activities that are undertaken and reflect on the benefits, effectiveness and value for money.

The Trustees see the consideration of risks as a priority. The risk register is now a regular item on the agenda, and the risk rating is changed according to developments within the Charity.

The Trustees are committed to ensuring that all relevant policies are regularly updated, and the organisation's procedures are robust and are fit for purpose to ensure that review of the policies reflects the organisation's evolution.

Objectives and activities

Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document

A free support and signposting service throughout Carmarthenshire for people and their loved ones and carers following a cancer or life-limiting illness diagnosis.

Objectives:

1. To advance the health and wellbeing and relieve the physical and emotional impacts for individuals and their loved ones, following a life limiting or cancer diagnosis through offering bespoke user-led activities and services offering advice and providing learning opportunities in safe non-clinical settings in Carmarthenshire.
2. To provide relief from hardship brought on by a health crisis through offering free legal with signposting and financial advice and assistance to individuals who would otherwise be unable to access such services.

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit)

<p>Angor has an operational base in The Cabin, Parc House, Kidwelly, Carmarthenshire SA17 5AB. At the end of 2024, Angor was awarded a Grant from the National Farmers Union to support the costs of the Cabin.</p> <p>Angor has been offering daily drop-in sessions of signposting and support throughout Carmarthenshire since our inception. Angor offers free Wellness activities which are mostly held in our operational base, The Cabin, Parc House, Kidwelly. However, in addition, there have been pop-ups throughout Carmarthenshire in the HWB's with Carmarthenshire County Council and Connecting Carmarthenshire. We have a regular pop-up in the Living Well Centre in Carmarthen. We offer Tai Chi and Musiic Wellness activities in the Living Well Centre. There have been discussions with other Third Sector organisations to commence regular sessions in the Black Mountain Brynamman and Croeso Cynnes in Laugharne. The sessions offered to date have included legal/probate advice, Stoma and colostomy awareness, Breast Cancer Awareness, hair and makeup advice following treatment, Yoga and Tai Chi and relaxation and breathwork sessions with Bydd Iach, Sing N Strum Along music sessions and Mindfulness. Angor is signed up to NACRO and has attended events through Carmarthenshire including Llandysul in February 2024.</p> <p>Following on from 2024, one of our Freelance workers continued her engagement with Angor. The freelance worker has been instrumental in helping the charity progress with activities and support. The freelance worker has been visiting third sectors and voluntary groups, engaging and signing up and orientating volunteers. There were 20 volunteers signed up by 31/03/2025. The Freelance worker continues to work with local communities throughout Carmarthenshire, fostering relationships with other Third Sector organisations.</p> <p>Working relationships have been developed with CAVS and Planed, Croeso Cynnes, cancer Specialist Nurses in Hywel Dda NHS University Health Board. Ongoing relationships with Macmillan, Tenovus and Breast Cancer Now. The operational base has been used by nurse led support groups including Colorectal Cancer Group, Breast Cancer support and Neuroendocrine Tumour support groups.</p> <p>Angor's presence on social media sites such as Facebook and Instagram continues to progress. Activities are posted weekly both online and, on our website, and updated on a regular basis. Online mapping information is being developed to formulate an accessible template online.</p>

Additional details of objectives and activities (Optional information)

Another important element of Angor's work is the provision of a "Signposting" service which is being continually developed with other partner organisations. This increases collaboration with other agencies and encourages referral pathways within these organisations and groups.

During 2024, following a successful one-year grant application from the Shared Prosperity Fund and Targeted Finance Fund administered by Carmarthenshire Count Council, the Charity was able to appoint Freelance Staff to recruit and retain a strong Volunteer base to provide supportive and inclusive spaces throughout Carmarthenshire. A successful application was also made to the Community Lottery Fund and Postcode Lottery which provided support to host a Networking Conference, rental fees for accommodation etc. Funding enabled us to offer a wide range of activities which included:

- Mindfulness
- Breast Awareness
- Cancer Massage
- Tai-chi
- Reflexology
- Homeopathy
- Chair Yoga
- Art Therapy
- Relaxation Classes
- Wig and Hair Advice
- Legal Advice

These Wellness Activities are being developed further as the need arises and following audit and discussions with participants, and volunteers.

The paid Freelance Contracts reinforced our knowledge and understanding of the scale and the need for this service with participants growing monthly and all welcoming the potential and the opportunities provide by Angor. Whilst Angor's main administrative office is currently in The Cabin, Parc House, Kidwelly, it is committed to continue spreading its reach to work in communities at grass roots levels within community hubs across Carmarthenshire so that transport and access difficulties are minimized. Our Volunteers are key to the success of reaching our rural communities.

While deprivation is more easily measured in urban centres, rural communities across Carmarthenshire also experience poverty that is less visible and harder to quantify. Issues such as transport barriers, digital exclusion and limited-service provision mean many rural residents face unmet needs despite not appearing in headline statistics. Angor is committed to integration, connection and participation and will do everything possible to work with and include underrepresented groups. Angor is fully committed to promoting the Welsh Language.

Providing local services also reinforces Angor's commitment to a comprehensive environmental approach for reducing our carbon footprint, conserving resources and protecting the natural environment. We have developed an Environmental Policy that will not only reduce our own impact but also inspire others to act for a greener, fairer future in relation to Travel, Waste, Energy Use, Water Use, what we buy, Natural Spaces and Greener Financing.

Angor is extremely grateful to all the volunteers that have signed up to support and help the charity in its aims and objectives.

Many of our volunteers have themselves experienced a cancer diagnosis and/or live with a life limiting diagnosis. This 'lived experience' helps to build relationships and develops connection and trust with our users.

We are grateful to our volunteer base for their dedication and commitment.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Angor has been evolving and developing since the charity gained registration in May 2022. The charity continues to offer regular sessions for support and advice. In addition, regular and varied Wellness activities have been offered and the feedback from user groups has been very positive. People, their loved ones and carers have all stated the benefit of attending the sessions.

Angor continues to work with and liaise with other agencies and third sector organisations. The aim is to avoid replication of services. Our mission is to complement existing services and to help people navigate the system through signposting, support physically in our pop-ups, or via telephone support, or by our social media posts or through our website.

Our volunteer base continues to expand. We have been fortunate in acquiring volunteers from a wide range of backgrounds. We are grateful to them all for the dedication and hard work.

Angor works in an environment that is welcoming, informal and non-institutional, enabling participants to connect with others if appropriate, to form new support networks. Safe spaces are offered for people and their families in non-medical settings to discuss their current situation, identify their main needs and concerns, so that they become pro-active in their future wellbeing.

Angor is a charity that is led by the needs of its users. It is their voice that drives the Charity forward. This knowledge provides the organisation with information about the various innovative and non-medical interventions that can support the wellbeing needs of individuals and their families to move on with their lives. It is this information that develops the future direction of travel, so that the organisation is in tune and in touch with the issues that a life altering diagnosis brings. People often refer to the void that exists between their diagnosis and treatment and the lack of support available. Many feel overwhelmed and lose confidence in their own ability to heal. Current models of care are undergoing significant changes given the political climate within the NHS and other social institutions. Users are also keen to move away from the clinical settings back into the communities. By accessing self-help strategies, they are encouraged to play an instrumental part in their future wellbeing journey. This is often as empowering as Treatment Plans, and most people welcome this shift in emphasis as it gives them back a degree of control. Angor offers a "Wellness Pathway" from a clinical setting back into the community to encourage individuals to live as fulfilling a life as possible whatever their previous or current health issues.

Hand in hand together, Angor is there offering a chat over a cup of tea with one of our experienced volunteers, a chat on the phone, or an email of support. Our aim is to be the anchor that helps support and empower individuals and their loved ones who have experienced a diagnosis of cancer or a life-limiting illness so that they are empowered to move forward in life.

In summary, Angor is committed to establishing an informed, non-clinical and holistic service which builds hope, develops resilience and empowers individuals to take back control of their wellbeing.

The principal source of funding in respect of the activities undertaken in the 2024-2025 financial year has been provided by Carmarthenshire County Council.

Angor received funding for its operational activities through two successful grant funding bids offered by Carmarthenshire County Council. Both the Shared Prosperity Fund and Targeted Finance Fund has enabled the charity to progress with outreach work in many of the county's rural communities. Emphasis has also been placed supporting the various wards in Llanelli, one of the county's towns with the largest population which also has one of the most deprived wards in Wales.

The Charity has also benefitted from several large donations from fundraising organisations within Carmarthenshire, having been chosen as their 'Charity of the Year'. These include choirs, 'Rotary Groups', "Merched Y Wawr" groups with generous private donations from residents and individuals throughout Carmarthenshire.

The Charity does not currently have an investment policy.


