TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2025.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011, and the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (FRS 102), effective 1 January 2019.

Objectives and activities

The objective of the charity is to:

- advance education for the public benefit in relation to the definition, history, causes, effects and prevention of antisemitism; and
- promote racial harmony for the public benefit between Jewish people wherever in the world and other members of society by the elimination of antisemitism, including raising awareness of the occurrence of antisemitism and providing advocacy, assistance, care and relief in relation to those affected by antisemitism.

The charity's aims are to:

- challenge the intellectual underpinnings of antisemitism in public life;
- understand contemporary antisemitism;
- identify and critique antisemitism in contemporary scholarship;
- inspire, equip and enable universities, academics and students to confront hostile environments at universities;
- arm the wider opposition to antisemitism with facts, ideas and arguments;
- enhance understanding of antisemitism through interdisciplinary research;
- map and describe antisemitism, even when denied by mainstream academia;
- challenge antisemitic thinking and promote rational, democratic perspectives;
- disrupt antisemitic discourses in various social and political spaces;
- serve as a centre of expertise for various sectors, including government and media; and
- offer expertise and leadership to Jewish community institutions in Britain.

Public benefit:

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Activities include:

- securing research funding and supporting academic work on antisemitism;
- publishing scholarly works and collaborating with the Journal of Contemporary Antisemitism;
- hosting conferences and seminars, and making significant steps towards formalising a global network of antisemitism scholarship;
- nurturing new generations of antisemitism scholarship;
- addressing hostile environments at universities and providing support against antisemitic campaigns;
- providing expert reports to institutions, courts, trade unions, and individuals; and
- creating content to broaden the impact of scholarly work.

Achievements and performance

The London Centre for the Study of Contemporary Antisemitism (LCSCA) is a registered charity devoted to challenging antisemitism in public life.

During the year, the charity received donations to support its charitable objectives, received royalties from published work and generated income from an event hosted in partnership with Westminster University.

The results for the year are set out in the statement of financial activities on page 6.

Key activities during the year were as follows:

- Delivered a wide-ranging programme of educational and institutional activities aligned with the charity's objectives. This included convening a major international conference at JW3, at which responsibility for the 2026 conference was formally passed to the University of Haifa, and delivering three terms of online seminar series to maintain engagement with a broad academic and public audience.
- Hosted the annual Robert Fine Memorial Lecture at the University of Westminster, alongside organising four book launches and a national series of talks accompanying the publication of a three-volume response to the events of 7 October, contributing to public discourse and academic exchange.
- Strengthened organisational capacity through the recruitment of two new staff members: a permanent fundraising lead to establish the fundraising office, and a Head of Volunteering to support community engagement and programme delivery.
- Secured continued funding from the charity's major funders, ensuring stability for core activities and future development.
- Advanced academic partnerships, including the initial stages of collaboration with two additional academic institutions, while the CEO represented the charity at multiple international academic conferences to enhance its profile and networks.
- Continued the professionalisation of the Board of Trustees, supporting improved governance and strategic oversight.

Financial review

The donations received in the year increased to £192,538 (2024: £189,797) while income from charitable activities, which include event ticket sales and payments from organisations for stalls and panels at the conference and events, have increased significantly to £116,734 (2024: £7,810). The increase this year is due to a large international conference that was organised by the charity.

The increase in overall income has increased the level of unrestricted funds available to £230,467 (2024: £165,788), of which no funds relate to restricted funds.

Overall, the charity has a strong financial position, given the increase in cash at bank year on year to £237,417 (2024: £171,788), which is anticipated to support its charitable activities into the subsequent financial year.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

The London Centre for the Study of Contemporary Antisemitism was constituted on 23 June 2022 as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) Foundation and is registered with the Charity Commission under charity number 1199428 and with Companies House under CIO number CE029528. The registered office is Unit 136, 116 Ballards Lane, London, N3 2DN.

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

1.5 Expenditure

Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting and administering voluntary income.

Expenditure on charitable activities include both direct costs and those costs incurred in support of the charitable expenditure.

Other expenditure includes the costs of any legal advice to the trustees on governance or constitutional matters, external accountancy and audit costs.

The charity is not registered for VAT therefore all expenses shown in the Statement of Financial Activities and notes to the accounts are shown as gross (i.e. inclusive of VAT).

1 Accounting policies (Continued)

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Computer equipment	33% reducing balance
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The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.9 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.10 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2024.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and 2022 and the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), effective 1 January 2019.

Objectives and activities

The objective of the charity is to:

- advance education for the public benefit in relation to the definition, history, causes, effects and prevention of antisemitism; and
- promote racial harmony for the public benefit between Jewish people wherever in the world and other members of society by the elimination of antisemitism, including raising awareness of the occurrence of antisemitism and providing advocacy, assistance, care and relief in relation to those affected by antisemitism.

The charity's aims are to:

- challenge the intellectual underpinnings of antisemitism in public life;
- understand contemporary antisemitism;
- identify and critique antisemitism in contemporary scholarship;
- inspire, equip and enable universities, academics and students to confront hostile environments at universities;
- arm the wider opposition to antisemitism with facts, ideas and arguments;
- enhance understanding of antisemitism through interdisciplinary research;
- map and describe antisemitism, even when denied by mainstream academia;
- challenge antisemitic thinking and promote rational, democratic perspectives;
- disrupt antisemitic discourses in various social and political spaces;
- serve as a centre of expertise for various sectors, including government and media; and
- offer expertise and leadership to Jewish community institutions in Britain.

Public benefit:

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Activities include:

- securing research funding and supporting academic work on antisemitism;
- publishing scholarly works and collaborating with the Journal of Contemporary Antisemitism;
- hosting conferences and seminars, and making significant steps towards formalising a global network of antisemitism scholarship;
- nurturing new generations of antisemitism scholarship;
- addressing hostile environments at universities and providing support against antisemitic campaigns;
- providing expert reports to institutions, courts, trade unions, and individuals; and
- creating content to broaden the impact of scholarly work.

Achievements and performance

The London Centre for the Study of Contemporary Antisemitism (LCSCA) is a registered charity devoted to challenging antisemitism in public life.

During the year, the charity received donations to support its charitable objectives, received royalties from published work and generated income from an event hosted in partnership with University of Westminster.

The results for the year are set out in the statement of financial activities on page 6.

Key activities during the year were as follows.

- Hosting an event for Matthias Kuntzel, a German political scientist and historian who was an external research associate at the Vidal Sassoon Centre for the Study of Antisemitism at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem from 2004 to 2015.
- The Annual Robert Fine Memorial Lecture at the University of Westminster. Robert Fine was a Professor of Sociology at the University of Warwick for many years and wrote on Marxism, the anti-apartheid movement, Hegel, Marx and Arendt, social theory, and cosmopolitanism; and, in collaboration with Philip Spencer, on antisemitism. He was a key mentor to others and an inspiration to the LCSCA.
- University of Westminster book launch at Robert Fine Memorial Lecture event.

Furthermore, the charity has continued to raise awareness of antisemitism and has issued awards to persons who have made admirable contributions to this issue in society, as outlined below.

Annual Robert Fine Memorial Lecturer:

- 2023 Howard Jacobson

Winner of the £1000 LCSCA Book Prize for the best book on contemporary antisemitism:

- 2023 Camila Bassi: Outcast: How Jews were banished from the anti-racist imagination

Winner of the Pete Newbon Award for the greatest contribution to the public understanding of antisemitism:

- 2023 Tracy-Ann Oberman

Financial review

The donations received in the year increased significantly to £189,797 (2023: £68,035) while income from charitable activities, which include royalties from publications and event ticket sales, have decreased to £7,810 (2023: £24,450). The reason for the decrease this year is that the charity organised a large international conference in the previous year. The next conference is occurring in 2025.

The increase in overall income has improved the level of unrestricted funds available, which increased to £165,788 (2023: £21,635), of which no funds relate to restricted funds.

Overall, the charity has a strong financial position, given the increase in cash at bank year on year to £171,788 (2023: £20,487), which is anticipated to support its charitable activities into the subsequent financial year.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

The London Centre for the Study of Contemporary Antisemitism was constituted on 23 June 2022 as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) Foundation and is registered with the Charity Commission under charity number 1199428 and with Companies House under CIO number CE029528. The registered office is Unit 136, 116 Ballards Lane, London, N3 2DN.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

1.5 Expenditure

Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting and administering voluntary income.

Expenditure on charitable activities include both direct costs and those costs incurred in support of the charitable expenditure.

Other expenditure includes the costs of any legal advice to the trustees on governance or constitutional matters, external accountancy and audit costs.

The charity is not registered for VAT therefore all expenses shown in the Statement of Financial Activities and notes to the accounts are shown as gross (i.e. inclusive of VAT).

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.



Appendix 1

Main Activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects

Centre's Mission and Global Role

The LCSCA was established in response to a growing need for an academic space dedicated to studying contemporary antisemitism, particularly given the lack of institutional support within academia. The Centre aims to build a global network of scholars and institutionalize antisemitism research. It also strives to challenge intellectual trends that threaten Jews and undermine democratic values.

Conference and Launch (September 2022)

The London Centre for the Study of Contemporary Antisemitism (LCSCA) organized a three-day academic conference on 21st Century Antisemitism. The event was scheduled to begin with a public launch on Sunday, 11 September, but this was postponed due to the death of Queen Elizabeth II. Despite this, the academic conference proceeded on 12 and 13 September as planned.

Launch Event Plans: The planned launch was intended to be a landmark event, bridging academia with wider communities including politics, the arts, public life, and Jewish institutions. Renowned scholars, public figures, and anti-antisemitism activists were set to participate. The event was also to feature a keynote lecture by Matthias Küntzel on "9/11 and the Globalization of Antisemitism," along with various performances and addresses from prominent individuals. Despite the cancellation, the Centre received significant public support, including well-wishes from figures such as Keir Starmer and the Chief Rabbi. This public launch event was postponed to a later date.

Academic Conference: The two-day academic conference successfully took place with approximately 180 participants, predominantly academics and graduate students, alongside representatives from NGOs and government. The event featured 86 presentations across three parallel streams. Some of the conference's presentations and panel discussions were later published and shared on the Centre's YouTube channel. The conference provided a platform for scholars to engage in serious, undisturbed discussions, highlighting the need for the LCSCA as a space for critical antisemitism studies, free from marginalization commonly experienced within traditional academic circles.

Key Initiatives and Publications

- **Journal of Contemporary Antisemitism:** Edited by Lesley Klaff; the Centre is supportive of this peer-reviewed journal which has produced seven high-quality issues, forming a vital part of the intellectual infrastructure for antisemitism studies.
- **LCSCA-Routledge Book Series:** This ongoing series includes books on contemporary antisemitism, with a focus on accessibility and translations. During this financial year we were laying the foundations for the series, and now to date (Aug 2024), eight books have been published.

- **International Network of Antisemitism Scholarship:** Discussions are ongoing to develop this network, including potential collaboration between institutions and a membership structure for scholars.
- **Seminar Series and Online Presence:** LCSCA launched a seminar series, now available on YouTube, featuring around 100 videos by the end of the first year. These seminars, led by academics, attracted mixed audiences of 30-100 attendees and continue to engage the public online.
- **Home Office Collaboration:** During the year, LCSCA contributed to the Home Office's Prevent programme, providing research and writing for the section on antisemitism.
- **Fundraising:** We have built a network of donors, both big and small, regular and occasional.

Conclusion

LCSCA's successful conference and ongoing initiatives demonstrate its capacity to lead global scholarship on contemporary antisemitism. The next steps involve fundraising and building a sustainable institution to support its mission of fostering rigorous academic research and its wider societal impact.

Appendix 2

Financial Review

Launch and Conference Funding

The launch and conference of the London Centre for the Study of Contemporary Antisemitism (LCSCA) were generously supported by significant donations from various individuals and organizations.

In addition to these major donations, LCSCA also received numerous smaller, one-off contributions specifically aimed at supporting the launch and conference. Regular donations were facilitated through CAF Donate and Patreon.

Sponsorship and Ticket Sales:

LCSCA secured targeted organisational sponsorship from the Anti-Defamation League and through Arzenu, which covered various expenditure of the launch and conference. Ticket sales for the launch and conference generated over £10,000 in revenue.

Ongoing Donations and Operational Support

Following the conference, the Centre received further substantial donations from individuals and foundations. These contributions, along with regular monthly donations, enabled LCSCA to establish essential administrative infrastructure.

Research and Community Engagement

The Centre co-funded a groundbreaking research project published in Nature, a collaboration between our CEO, David Hirsh, and Daniel Allington from King's College. LCSCA covered half of the fee for open access publication. We also funded some open access publication or research on antisemitism in the Journal (Seymour, Hirsh, Allington).

We completed a £9k project creating teaching materials for the Home Office pursuant to our core aims.

To maintain visibility within the community, LCSCA participated in key events such as the Jewish Labour Movement conference and Jewish Book Week. Although there were costs associated with stalls at these events, they were essential for keeping the Centre at the forefront of public awareness.
