Governance and management

The charity is operated under the rules of its constitution adopted 24/08/22.

In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees, the charity trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.

During the reporting period Becca Haskins and Roopa Tanna stepped down and we welcomed Andrew Man to the Board of Trustees in the role of Treasurer. The Project also employed a part-time caseworker.

In February 2025 the Board of Trustees decided that the best way to ensure the future of The Care Rights Project would be to merge with another, larger and more established organisation. Project 17 was approached and a draft merger proposal has now been agreed; Project 17 will gradually take over Care Act work during the course of 2026-2027 and The Care Rights Project will wind down during 2027.

Objectives and activities

For the public benefit, the prevention or relief of poverty, and the relief of those in need by reason of ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage, amongst adult migrants with care needs in the UK. In particular, although not exclusively:

- by providing information, advice and advocacy to migrants with no recourse to public funds regarding their rights to access social care under the Care Act 2014;
- by providing information, training and support to other organisations regarding the rights of migrants to access social care under the Care Act 2014;

- by raising awareness of problems with the implementation of the Care Act 2014 in relation to migrants with no recourse to public funds;
- by occasionally making small grants to individuals experiencing destitution.

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit

The provision of information, advice and advocacy to migrants with no recourse to public funds regarding their rights to access social care under the Care Act 2014.

The provision of specialist advice to other organisations regarding the rights of their clients who are migrants with no recourse to public funds to access social care under the Care Act 2014 in order to support their work.

Making referrals to other organisations where appropriate and necessary in order to benefit clients.

The provision of training to other organisations to raise awareness of problems with the implementation of the Care Act 2014 in relation to migrants with no recourse to public funds and strategies for overcoming these.

Making small grants to clients of The Care Rights Project experiencing destitution in accordance with our grant making policy.

Public benefit statement

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit, 'Charities and Public Benefit'.

Summary of the main achievements during the period

During this reporting period The Care Rights Project has worked directly with 40 clients (including 21 new clients) and taken enquiries from 6 clients who were seeking advice outside the scope of the Project.

Clients making enquiries that were out of scope were provided with appropriate information or signposted to other organisations to assist them.

All of the clients with whom we worked benefited from advice regarding their rights to access social care under the Care Act 2014 including the potential impact of their immigration status.

Where the need for immigration advice, or other advice beyond the scope of the Project, was identified clients were signposted or referred as appropriate.

18 out of 21 new clients were potentially eligible for support under the Care Act.

2 out of these 18 potentially eligible clients declined to be referred; one because he had income and was concerned about being asked to contribute to the cost of care and one because he already had accommodation and was being adequately cared for by friends.

1 client was already being accommodated under the Care Act 2014 and she was referred for a carers assessment which resulted in the provision of subsistence and ad hoc support.

As a result, one client had their care package increased and the other was moved to Local Authority accommodation following Judicial Review (TMX, R (On the Application Of) v London Borough of Croydon & Anor [2024] EWHC 129 (Admin) (26 January 2024)).

We have been informed that as a result of this judgement Home Office guidance to caseworkers on asylum seekers with care needs will be changed to better reflect the responsibilities of local authorities.

3 clients (a family consisting of an adult son and his parents) were immediately referred out to a community care solicitor due to the complexity of their case.

12 clients were referred to their local authorities for Care Act assessments and all the requested assessments were carried out (however, we are still awaiting the outcome of 3 assessments at the end of the reporting period).

10 clients requested accommodation, subsistence and a package of care. This has been provided by Local Authorities in 4 cases.

In 3 cases, care, support and accommodation were refused on the basis that the clients had no eligible needs. 2 of these clients were referred out to community care solicitors and the decisions are being challenged. In the third case, a challenge was not viable and accommodation was obtained through Schedule 10 immigration bail support. We are still awaiting the outcome of assessments in the final 3 cases where the need for accommodation is not urgent.

In cases where accommodation has been provided this has resulted in the avoidance of street homelessness; two clients were in hospital with no address to be discharged to, one was being asked to leave by hosts who were moving away and the fourth was living in extremely unsuitable conditions with her young children.

In cases where subsistence payments have been provided this has allowed clients with no other form of financial support to buy essentials such as food and toiletries.

The provision of accommodation and subsistence has also relieved the burden on families/friends of clients who had supported them historically (sometimes for decades) but more recently could not afford to, in these extremely difficult times.

In 2 cases the clients were satisfied with their accommodation and therefore only a care package/aids and adaptations were requested. This was provided and in one case the client was offered a place in supported accommodation as an alternative to at-home care.

In cases where a care package has been put in place this has helped to meet clients' needs for personal care, help with preparing food, ensuring that their environment is clean and safe and that they can access their local community.

The 19 clients that we have continued to work with since the previous reporting period have all received advice and advocacy taking into account any changes in their circumstances or issues in the provision of support, help to access immigration advice, food vouchers, assistance with claiming help with health costs, occasional hardship payments and external grant applications.

We also assisted 2 of these clients to challenge the suitability of their accommodation, obtained an increased package of care for 1 client and assisted 1 client to move from Home Office accommodation and S95 support to Local Authority accommodation and support following *TMX, R (On the Application Of) v London Borough of Croydon & Anor* [2024] EWHC 129 (Admin).

During the course of the reporting period, 5 new clients and 9 existing clients received positive immigration decisions (either a grant of leave with recourse or a change of conditions) and we were able to provide assistance in moving from Care Act support into mainstream welfare benefits and housing.

The Care Rights Project provided specialist advice on 61 occasions to workers/volunteers at 41 different organisations via phone and email, normally including a written confirmation of advice and template letters or additional resources when required.

The Care Rights Project has delivered in-house training to Praxis, We Belong and the Guys and St. Thomas' Hospital Homeless Health Team. We have run two open training sessions - one joint with Project 17 and one independently. Feedback from all these sessions was very positive.

The Care Rights Project has been working with a number of other organisations including Migrants Organise to try to improve Home Office guidance to caseworkers on asylum seekers with care needs.

Financial Review and policy on reserves


During the reporting period The Care Rights Project secured £72,218 in grants and received £100 in donations from the public.

This includes 3-6 months' reserves, in line with our reserves policy, which the Trustees feel will support our resilience against key financial risks.

At the end of the period The Care Rights Project was in credit at £65,984.

Several of the grants obtained during this reporting period are multi-year, including Trust for London (two years), ABC Trust (three years), Baring Foundation (three years).

As the trustees of the charity you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011 ('the Act').



Making small grants to clients of The Care Rights Project experiencing destitution in accordance with our grant making policy.

The trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public Benefit.

Achievements

During this reporting period The Care Rights Project has worked directly with 32 clients (including 20 new clients).

All of whom benefited from advice regarding their rights to access social care under the Care Act 2014 including the potential impact of their immigration status.

Where the need for immigration advice, or other advice beyond the scope of the Project, was identified clients were signposted or referred as appropriate.

16 out of 20 new clients were potentially eligible for support under the Care Act.

4 out of these 16 potentially eligible clients declined to be referred for a number of reasons including; the risks of detention/removal, they already had an income and were unlikely to be eligible for subsistence payments, they were the partner/carer of someone with recourse and therefore would be unlikely to be eligible for subsistence payments.

2 out of these 16 clients were already receiving some support under the Care Act 2014. Both of these clients were asylum seekers in Home Office accommodation and both were referred for a review of their needs. As a result one client had their care package increased and the other was moved to Local Authority accommodation following Judicial Review (TMX, R (On the Application Of) v London Borough of Croydon & Anor [2024] EWHC 129 (Admin) (26 January 2024)).

We have been informed that as a result of this judgement Home Office guidance to caseworkers on asylum seekers with care needs will be changed to better reflect the responsibilities of local authorities.

8 out of 16 clients were referred to their local authorities for Care Act assessments and all received the requested assessments were completed (2 clients are yet to be referred at the end of the reporting period).

In 5 out of 8 cases clients requested accommodation, subsistence and a package of care. This has been provided by local authorities in 3 out of 5 cases. In 1 case, that of a pregnant woman with no 'care needs', the local authority refused support. The client was referred to a solicitor but it was felt that her case was not strong enough to challenge. We found a place for this client in a hostel and obtained grant funding to help support her until she is eligible for assistance under S17 of the Children Act 1989. We are still awaiting the outcome of the final case where the client has temporary accommodation but it is unsuitable due to his care needs.

In cases where accommodation has been provided this has resulted in the avoidance of street homelessness; two clients were in hospital with no address to be discharged to and the third had been abused by the person accommodating her and then threatened with further violence if she didn't leave.

In cases where subsistence payments have been provided this has allowed clients with no other form of financial support to buy essentials such as food and toiletries

The provision of accommodation and subsistence has also relieved the burden on families/friends of clients who had supported them historically (sometimes for decades) but more recently could not afford to, in these extremely difficult times.

In 3 out of 8 cases the clients were asylum seekers in Home Office accommodation receiving Section 95 subsistence. They were satisfied with their accommodation and therefore only a care package/aids and adaptations were requested. This was provided in all cases.

In cases where a care package has been put in place this has helped to meet clients' needs for personal care, help with preparing food, ensuring that their environment is clean and safe and that they can access their local community.

For the 12 clients that we have continued to work with since the previous reporting period we have requested and achieved an increased rate of subsistence for 4 clients, obtained an increased package of care for 1 client, successfully applied for S17 Children Act support for 2 clients and are still working to secure more suitable accommodation for 3 clients. All clients continued to receive support in the form of advice, help to access immigration advice, food vouchers, assistance with claiming help with health costs and occasional hardship payments.

The Care Rights Project has made grants totalling £1867.74 to 16 clients in accordance with our grant making policy. We also obtained external grant funding for one client, £300 of which was paid to us in order to purchase items for her.

During the reporting period one client was granted Humanitarian Protection, one was granted Refugee Status and one was successful in obtaining a change of conditions. As far as possible we assisted these clients in moving over to mainstream welfare benefits by either helping them to make homeless applications and benefit claims or referring them to local organisations who were able to provide advice. One client very sadly died within weeks of being granted leave to remain on Human Rights grounds.

The Care Rights Project

The Care Rights Project has indirectly assisted 25 individuals by providing specialist advice to workers/volunteers at 17 different organisations via phone and email. We have also delivered a short online training session to Refugee Action and were also invited to a meeting with the Unity Project to talk about the application of the Care Act with respect to their clients. We have further training planned for next year.

In partnership with Project 17 we have developed a number of 'how to' guides and template letters to help caseworkers to assist migrants with care needs, including those who are also receiving Section 17 support or who are pregnant without any other dependent children. These are available on our website.

Financial Review

During the reporting period The Care Rights Project secured £57,705 in grants and received £75 in donations from the public.

This was slightly more than our budget and includes reserves of £5,000 which will allow The Care Rights Project to run for approximately three months which the Trustees feel will support our resilience against key financial risks.

At the end of the period The Care Rights Project was in credit at £40,225. This includes £15,000 from the Blue Thread Foundation which was received towards the very end of the reporting period and is intended to fund the next financial year. We have identified further funding sources for the period April 24-March 25 and will be making applications in due course.

A grant of £15,000 has been agreed in principle by the Blue Thread Foundation for the period April 25 - March 26.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Care Rights Project is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, governed by its Constitution.

In selecting individuals for appointment as charity trustees, the charity trustees must have regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective administration of the CIO.

During the reporting period we welcomed Becca Haskins to the Board of Trustees in the role of Treasurer.





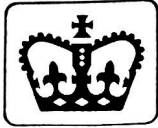

Objectives

For the public benefit, the prevention or relief of poverty, and the relief of those in need by reason of ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage, amongst adult migrants with care needs in the UK.

Activities

The provision of information, advice and advocacy to migrants with no recourse to public funds regarding their rights to access social care under the Care Act 2014.

The provision of specialist advice to other organisations regarding the rights of their clients who are migrants with no recourse to public funds to access social care under the Care Act 2014 in order to support their work.

Making referrals to other organisations where appropriate and necessary in order to benefit clients.

The provision of training to other organisations to raise awareness of problems with the implementation of the Care Act 2014 in relation to migrants with no recourse to public funds and strategies for overcoming these.

Making small grants to clients of The Care Rights Project experiencing destitution in accordance with our grant making policy.

The trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public Benefit.

Achievements

The Care Rights Project was converted from a Community Interest Project to a Charitable Incorporated Organisation on the 24th August 2022 and this has resulted in a relatively short reporting period.

During this reporting period The Care Rights Project has worked directly with 20 clients (including 13 new clients).

All of whom benefited from advice regarding their rights to access social care under the Care Act 2014 including the potential impact of their immigration status.

Where the need for immigration advice, or other advice beyond the scope of the Project, was identified clients were signposted or referred as appropriate.

16 out of 20 clients were potentially eligible for support under the Care Act.

3 out of these 16 clients declined to be referred and decided to use the advice they were given to take action on their own.

1 out of these 16 clients was also eligible for support under Section 117 of the Mental Health Act 1983 and decided to pursue this instead.

1 out of these 16 clients was already receiving some support under the Care Act 2014.

The remaining 11 clients were referred to their local authorities for Care Act assessments or reviews and all received the requested assessments or reviews.

In 7 out of 11 cases clients requested accommodation, subsistence and a package of care. This has been provided by the clients' local authority in 5 out of 7 cases. In 1 case the local authority have provided accommodation and subsistence but not a package of care (this is case was therefore referred out to a community care solicitor). We are still awaiting for the outcome of the final case.

In 2 out of 11 cases the clients were asylum seekers in Home Office accommodation receiving Section 95 subsistence. Therefore only a care package/aids and adaptations were requested. This was provided in both cases.

In 2 out of 11 cases the clients were already being accommodated by their Local Authority and an increase to subsistence and care was requested. This was provided in both cases.

In cases where accommodation has been provided this has resulted in the avoidance of street homelessness or the need for clients to live in very unsuitable circumstances. For instance, several clients reported having to share a bed with a relative or sleep in common areas with no privacy. One client had been physically abused by his landlord.

The provision of accommodation has also relieved the burden on families/friends of clients who could no longer support them in extremely difficult times.

In cases where subsistence payments have been provided this has allowed clients with no other form of financial support to buy essentials such as food and toiletries.

In cases where a care package has been put in place this has helped to meet clients' needs for personal care, help with preparing food, ensuring that their environment is clean and safe and that they can access their local community.

Similarly, the provision of subsistence and care by Local Authorities has relieved the burden on clients' communities - most clients had friends and acquaintances that were struggling to support and care for them, but due to their own financial or social difficulties found this unsustainable.

The Care Rights Project has made grants totalling £683.5 to 14 clients in accordance with our grant making policy.

The Care Rights Project has indirectly assisted 11 individuals by providing specialist advice to workers/volunteers at 7 different organisations via phone and email. We have also delivered a short online training session to organisations involved in adult safeguarding.

The Care Rights Project secured £3700 in grants and received £225 in donations from the public. This was in line with our budget.

Financial Review

At the end of the period The Care Rights Project was in credit at £9,318. A grant of £10,000 had been awarded but not yet paid and further funding to cover the costs of the next financial period had been applied for.

Funding for the following period is intended to include the build up of reserves to £5,000. This amount will be sufficient to allow The Care Rights Project to run for approximately three months and the Trustees feel that this will support our resilience against key financial risks.
