#### **Crabs Alive Project**

The Crabs Alive Project continues to make headway, reducing reliance on wild crab populations, and enabling communities to benefit from sustainable aquaculture practices. Six aquaponic nurseries now exist, and a freshwater well has been installed and is operational.

#### **Eco-Lodge Project**

Tofauti, in partnership with Tsavo Trust, supported the creation of Kamungi Banda Eco-Tourism Lodge to address these challenges. The eco-lodge offers sustainable income for the local WaKamba community (2,450 people) while promoting conservation. We have now had over 180 guests and over \$10 000 in revenue to date.

Built with eco-friendly materials and staffed locally, it provides jobs, skills training, and cultural exchange opportunities. Six Kamungi members are directly employed, and lodge revenue funds for community development. The project aims to reduce conflict, protect key wildlife species, and support Kamungi's path to economic independence through conservation-led tourism.

#### **Tofauti Tractor Deployment**

The Tofauti Tractor continues to be instrumental in supporting a wide range of initiatives for Tsavo Trust. Following the successful completion of the fence, the tractor continued to support a range of Tsavo Trust projects, including: Kamungi Eco-Tourism Lodge build, Nthunguni Dispensary upgrade, Tsavo Trust Airstrip Hangar upgrade, and the Kamungi Permaculture site uplift.

#### **African Grey Parrot & Vulture Rehabilitation Projects**

**Updates:**

**10% Fence Plan – Kamungi Conservancy & Shirango Community Conservancy**

The 10% Fence Plan has been recognized as *“the most innovative co-existence implementation opportunity in marginal rainfall areas to date”* and is rapidly becoming Tofauti's flagship project, attracting collaboration enquiries from Namibia, Zimbabwe, and even Costa Rica.

This initiative addresses the critical link between local communities and wildlife. By protecting crops and livestock from raids, the fences significantly reduce human-wildlife conflict, fostering more positive attitudes towards surrounding wildlife. Communities are educated on the importance of local wildlife, and in return for the protection provided by the fences, they are encouraged to nurture and coexist with these species.

The project is continually refined alongside participating communities. The security and benefits afforded by the fences have created strong local demand, and interest in additional installations remains high. As such, this initiative is expected to continue expanding beyond the 18 fences currently installed.

**Roan Project – Ruma National Park**

The Roan Project focuses on safeguarding Kenya's critically threatened Roan Antelope population and rebuilding it to viable levels through a combination of in-situ and ex-situ interventions. Tofauti has supported the installation of water infrastructure, including procurement of pipes and accessories, digging trenches and laying over 400 meters of piping, and installing six drinking troughs.

Kenya's Roan population has declined over the past four decades due to habitat loss, fragmentation, poaching, and other human activities. By 2018, the Ruma National Park population was estimated at just 19 individuals. Tofauti partners strategically with Back to Africa and Kenya Wildlife Service to provide a safety enclosure, offering water and secure habitat to reduce predation, particularly of juveniles by hyenas.

Ongoing monitoring and management of the enclosure are required, along with plans to introduce additional individuals to address the genetic bottleneck. Provisions for these

		<p>introductions are being sought from neighbouring African countries. The project represents a critical effort to preserve Kenya's mammalian biodiversity and protect a biological treasure.</p> <p><b>Sand Dam Construction – Naibunga Conservancy</b>  The sand dam at Naibung'a Conservancy, part of the Northern Rangelands Trust, was constructed to improve water access for both the community and local wildlife. Tofauti has provided ongoing monitoring, including project updates and site visits by field staff.</p> <p>The dam, constructed at Nkiloriti, is maturing on schedule, with minimal leakage reported.</p>



Key developments included:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. <b>In-house nursery at Crabs Alive Ltd headquarters</b> – Set up to provide a reliable source of crablets, consistently reared from egg to 5 grams, ensuring a steady supply for our expanding community projects.</li> <li>2. <b>Specialized nursery facilities</b> – Installation of tanks, nets, and safe havens to support crabs through gestation, hatching, and early rearing stages, securing higher survival rates and healthier stock.</li> <li>3. <b>Freshwater and saline water systems</b> – Development of freshwater storage units and blending processes with saline water to create optimal conditions for crablets to grow and thrive.</li> </ol> <p>Together, these activities strengthen the foundation for scaling the project, reducing reliance on wild crab populations, and enabling communities to benefit from sustainable aquaculture practices.</p> <p><b>Eco-Lodge Project</b></p> <p>During the year, progress was made on the construction of a self-help community eco-tourism facility in Kamungi Conservancy, located along the northern boundary of Tsavo West National Park. This eco-lodge is designed to serve as a sustainable source of tourism revenue directly for the Kamungi community. By combining conservation with community development, the project aims to create employment opportunities, foster wildlife-friendly zones, and provide visitors with an immersive experience that supports both local livelihoods and the preservation of natural habitats.</p> <p>The eco-lodge provides the Kamungi community with direct economic benefits through employment and revenue from tourism. It strengthens local capacity by involving community members in the operation and management of the facility, while promoting environmental stewardship. Additionally, the project helps to cultivate a sense of pride and ownership among</p>
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community members, ensuring that conservation and development efforts are sustainable in the long term.

### **Tofauti Tractor Deployment**

In remote locations, access to reliable assets can make a significant difference to project outcomes. The Tofauti Tractor has been instrumental in supporting a wide range of initiatives for Tsavo Trust. Its contributions include the installation and maintenance of Human–Elephant Conflict (HEC) electric fences, construction of the community eco-lodge, provision of health and sanitation infrastructure, and support for permaculture projects. By enabling the efficient transport of materials and resources, the tractor has enhanced operational capacity across these projects, ensuring timely implementation and greater impact for local communities and conservation efforts.

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### **Ongoing:**

#### **Together For Water**

Through the Together For Water initiative, Tofauti identified two potential projects for funding; however, both opportunities were ultimately not feasible. The team is actively working to identify a new water project that meets both community needs and donor expectations.

Last year, we explored the possibility of installing a borehole in Taita Taveta, but a misalignment between community expectations and the support Tofauti could provide meant the project was not pursued further. Subsequently, desalination options at Ngului were investigated as an alternative after reports from the dispensary highlighted health issues caused by high sodium content in local water, including multiple stomach ulcers. Unfortunately, the cost of implementing a desalination system for the number of dependents far exceeded available funds. Tofauti continues to explore partnerships and solutions to ensure that water provision remains a priority for the coming year.

## **African Grey Parrot & Vulture Rehabilitation Projects**

Tofauti continues to engage in strategic partnerships to support two key wildlife conservation initiatives:

1. African Grey Parrot Release – The project aims to reintroduce endangered African Grey Parrots into their natural habitat, potentially on Rubondo Island, Tanzania, or an alternative suitable site. Support may include providing food for the parrots during adaptation, infrastructure, or monitoring of their progress in the wild. Current efforts are focused on navigating the legislative process, with decisions expected from government authorities by mid-2025.
2. Vulture Rehabilitation – Plans are underway to establish a vulture rehabilitation center in Nairobi, Kenya. Vulture populations have declined by approximately 70% over the past decade due to poisoning from pesticides such as Furadan. These raptors play a critical ecological role by removing carcasses and preventing the spread of disease. Tofauti is awaiting licensing approval and is committed to supporting the recovery of these species through infrastructure, care, and monitoring programs.

Both initiatives are at an advanced planning stage, with ongoing discussions and regulatory processes shaping their eventual implementation. They represent Tofauti's commitment to biodiversity conservation and the protection of endangered species in East Africa.



1. Promote coexistence between wildlife and community members of Shirango Community Conservancy – construction of 6 x 10% Fence Plan plots. Members of the Shirango are receiving benefits that have derived directly from conservation efforts; through this plan Tsavo Trust hopes to improve their perception towards wildlife and create a “culture of conservation” 2. Promote food security and improve livelihoods in Shirango – smart agriculture training for at least 12 members / families. This phase will follow the completion of the 10% fences.

**Latest Update:** To build on the success in Kamungi Community Conservancy Tofauti and Tsavo Trust are targeting Shirango Community Conservancy (the other side of Tsavo East National Park).

Phase 1 – Shirango Community Conservancy part 1: Construction of 10% fences (6 fences for community members – benefitting 181 community members). 30% deposit for purchase of materials was made on 25th October 2022. 6 plots were selected from the Shirango Conservancy with the support of the Shirango Board.

The fences started construction in November 2022. Phase 1 – Part 2: Shirango Community Conservancy Permaculture/smart farming techniques training. Tsavo Trust will identify 6 additional members to benefit from the training; we expect this phase to be completed in Quarter 3 2023.

**Eco-Lodge in partnership with Biopalma for community ownership and additional revenue stream generation.**

Project Objective: Construction of a self-help community eco-tourism facility in the Kamungi Conservancy, bordering onto the northern boundary of Tsavo West National Park. This facility will be the start of revenue generation to the Kamungi Community.

**Latest Update:**

The main aim of this project is to actively involve the local Kamungi community in conservation efforts, through the creation of buffers to the National Parks, giving them

control over the conservation which directly affects them, whilst also incorporating livelihood improvements such as job opportunities and long term and sustainable revenue streams to enhance community ownership and self-reliance.

The Kamungi Eco-Tourism banda's are under construction. This facility will be the start of revenue generation back to the community and will allow members, through the Board, to make decisions on what projects to invest in. The Two-bedroom blocks are now at the roofing stages, water is piped to site and building works are ongoing.

### **Tofauti Tractor deployment for Elephant Fence**

To construct a 23km Human Elephant Conflict (HEC) 3-strand electric fence to run from Mito Andei to the Athi River for over 8 years - an area which has historically had huge reports of conflict issues.

#### **Latest Update:**

Without any meaningful barrier to stop crop-raiding wildlife, especially elephants, from entering the community's marginal crops there are all too often cases of HEC and loss of human life. As a result, a negative perception towards wildlife has gathered momentum although this has slowly changed in a positive way since Kamungi Conservancy.

This important and pressing project would not only reduce HEC and increase food security for the 1,500 members of Kamungi, but also for the 7,000 people that live around this area and along the park boundary.

The Tofauti Tractor is an invaluable addition to the project in helping to transport fencing equipment, sand, laborers etc. to the construction sites.

**African Grey Parrot Project & Vulture rehabilitation project**

Project Purpose: Strategic partner to support the endangered African Grey Parrot release to Rubondo Island, Tanzania.

**Latest Update:**

For both projects below the legislation process is taking longer than anticipated and is currently having decisions made by government authorities, it is our hope that this concludes by mid 2024.

Exploring opportunities for a partnership in the release of 20 African Grey Parrots into their wild habitat on Rubondo Island in Tanzania. This may be in the form of food supplies while they adapt, infrastructure, or monitoring of their progress in the wild.

Vulture rehabilitation enclosures to save the species which has been in 70% decline over the recent decade. Due to the lacing of carcasses, there was a huge decline, and these raptors are fundamental for the clean-up job in the wild.

Awaiting further licensing and looking to support in the recovery of this species in Kenya.

**TogetherForWater With Tsavo Trust**

Project Purpose: Currently assessing water salinity in the current bore hole in Ngiluni village and looking to explore if there is a cost effective solution for desalination for consumption/crops and livestock.

**Latest Update:**

We explored extensively the addition of putting a borehole in Taita Taveta, however there was a disconnection between what the intent was against beneficiaries and this was deemed obstructive for our project to be pursued.

The Tofauti team began exploring desalination options as an alternative when it was apparent from the dispensary that people were getting hugely affected from the sodium content in the water resulting in multiple stomach ulcers. The search for a cost effective implementation partner is ongoing.
