Para 1.17 and 1.19	<p>All Animal Rescue is based in Hampshire and is dedicated to helping animals of all types – domestic pets, farm animals and occasionally wildlife. We take in animals from members of the public who, for whatever reason, find they are no longer able to care for their animals and abandoned animals which are often in poor health.</p> <p>The rescue works closely with local social services, the police and other organisations who come across situations where an animal or their owners need support. If the situation warrants it, we will work with owners to overcome short term issues and offer advice that can result in them keeping their pets rather than needing them to be rehomed.</p> <p>All animals taken into our care are assessed in terms of their health and behaviour and with the help of a group of volunteer foster carers who take the animals into their homes along with health checks and any veterinary treatment needed ensure they are in a good condition at which point we seek to find them permanent adoption homes. No animals are rehomed without being spayed or neutered (unless veterinary advice is that this would compromise their health) and the adopters having home checks to confirm their suitability and commitment to the animal for the rest of their life.</p>

		<p>We also work with other rescue organisations in the UK and sometimes take in animals they have had the initial contact in but are unable to continue to care for them or have been unable to find homes for them in their area.</p> <p>We aim to raise awareness of animal welfare and responsible animal ownership issues in the local area through our website and by attendance at local events.</p> <p>If adoption proves unsuitable for an animal, the rescue does offer long term fostering arrangements to support these animals longer term.</p>

<p>Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.</p>	<p>Para 1.20</p>	<p>The charity in its current format as a CIO has existed from 22/12/22 but the CIO continues the work of a non-profit organisation that had been run by two of the trustees for many years previously and so took over the responsibility to care for animals in the Rescue at that date, both those seeking rehoming and those to which a long term commitment had been made.</p> <p>This year has been an incredibly challenging one for the rescue. The vast majority of animals coming into our care now require extensive medical and/or behavioural treatment before they can be considered for rehoming—if rehoming is possible at all.</p> <p>At the same time, the cost of veterinary care has risen significantly over the past few years. With many families facing financial pressures of their own, we understand that people must carefully consider what they are able to donate. Unfortunately, the combination of rising costs and increasingly complex cases has had a significant impact on the number of animals we are able to help.</p> <p>Over the past few years, the pace of change in rescue has been relentless. Animals are increasingly treated like fast fashion—bred and sold rapidly, with little regard for health or temperament. They are often placed with people who lack the experience, knowledge, or facilities to care for them properly. Just as we begin educating the public about one harmful trend, another emerges, and the cycle starts again.</p> <p>Rescue looks very different from when we first began. Sarah and Ross often worry that we are not helping as many animals as we once did. In previous years, animals generally needed neutering, vaccinations, and microchipping before being ready for rehoming. Now, many arrive with complex medical and behavioural issues that can take months—sometimes longer—to address.</p>

		<p>We ask our supporters to understand that modern rescue is far more complex than it once was. Every animal we take in represents a significant commitment of time, care, expertise, and resources—but each one is given everything we possibly can.</p> <p>Alongside these challenges, we have also carried out significant updates to the rescue facilities this year. Ensuring that all animals are cared for in line with the latest animal welfare guidelines is vitally important to us. Education is at the heart of what we do, and we strongly believe in leading by example. More updates are planned for 2026 as we adapt to changing UK weather conditions and welcome improvements in animal welfare standards. We are committed to being at the forefront of these changes.</p> <p>We are though, pleased to report that during the period of this report, the Rescue has successfully rehomed 7 cats, 6 dogs, 3 goats, 7 guinea pigs, 2 cockerels and rehomed a tawny owl for release.</p> <p>Currently the Rescue has 1 dog, 2 cats, 1 rabbit, 2 guinea pigs and 1 bearded dragon that are in the process of being rehomed or seeking their new homes.</p> <p>Long term residents are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Queenie, a miniature cob pony needing ongoing medical treatment for Cushings,• Balthazar, a Welsh hill pony whose temperament prevents rehoming,• Grace, a miniature Shetland pony with a physical condition that needs careful management,• Mary, Florence & Diana, Shetland sheep who are pretty feral and very hard to catch but do a great job of weed control in the field!• Dec, Flora & Oreo, goats who for various reasons age, health or behaviour related are unsuitable for rehoming.• Mr Pig, a guinea pig who objects very noisily to any human contact but is happy to live with guinea pigs in for rehoming.
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	<p>Sadly, this year we said goodbye to some of our permanent residents:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Ant, one of the goats, passed away after gaining access to an area he should not have been in and ingesting a small amount of rhododendron. Despite our best efforts, we were unable to reverse the effects of the poisoning.• Poppy, our disabled bunny, had been bravely battling severe arthritis for some time. She was already on the maximum pain relief available, and following veterinary advice, we made the heartbreaking but kind decision to let our little soldier go.• Candy, a small dog, reached the grand age of 17. While her mind remained as sharp as a one-year-old's, her spine sadly gave up on her and she was no longer able to stand unaided. The decision was made to let her pass peacefully at home, with her best friend Sox by her side.• Our lovely Bow, a sheep, arrived at the rescue with severe issues affecting his feet. For years we worked tirelessly to keep him comfortable and sound, and we were finally making real progress. Tragically, he became spooked in the field and fatally injured himself. Bow was a huge loss to the team—he was invaluable in teaching rescue dogs how to behave around sheep and was a cherished member of the rescue. Anyone who works with sheep will understand that even the most settled animals can sometimes be startled by the smallest, most unexpected things. <p>This year, we had to make the devastating decision to put to sleep two animals who had come into the rescue for adoption.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Storm, a large dog, arrived with significant injuries. Following an MRI scan, we were heartbroken to learn that he had cancer. He spent his remaining time in the loving care
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		<p>of Sarah and Ross at their home. When the cancer progressed to his spine, veterinary advice confirmed that euthanasia was the kindest option.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Scout, a large dog, came into the rescue as a stray with complex behavioural issues around humans. Over six months, we worked intensively with him and initially saw encouraging improvements. Sadly, his behaviour began to deteriorate, and his aggression towards people escalated, resulting in a serious bite incident. After assessments from three independent professional trainers, we made the extremely difficult decision to have Scout put to sleep. This is never a decision we take lightly. We must balance the safety of our team and the public alongside the welfare of the animal itself. Scout was loved, cared for, and given every possible chance while he was with us.

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




Independent Examiner's Statement

<p>Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.</p>	<p>Para 1.20</p>	<p>The charity in its current format as a CIO has existed from 22/12/22 but the CIO continues the work of a non-profit organisation that had been run by two of the trustees for many years previously and so took over the responsibility to care for animals in the Rescue at that date, both those seeking rehoming and those to which a long term commitment had been made.</p> <p>The number and type of animals we are able to take in from a, sadly, very long waiting list is dependent on the right one of our limited fostering spaces being available for them, the trustees believing they have a good chance of being fit to rehome and also the Rescue having sufficient funds to add to the number of animals being cared for.</p> <p>During the period of this report, the Rescue has rehomed 9 cats, 6 dogs, 2 rabbits, 4 guinea pigs and 4 rats.</p> <p>Currently the Rescue has 3 dogs, 2 cats, 2 goats, 1 rabbit and 3 guinea pigs that are in the process of being rehomed or seeking their new homes.</p> <p>Long term residents are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Queenie, a miniature cob pony needing ongoing medical treatment for Cushings, • Balthazar, a Welsh hill pony whose temperament prevents rehoming, • Grace, a miniature Shetland pony with a physical condition that needs careful management, • Bow, a Wilshire long horn sheep who has a foot condition that requires careful management • Mary, Florence & Diana, Shetland sheep who are pretty feral and very hard to catch but do a great job of weed control in the field! • Pi, a barn owl who is not able to live wild and who is extremely nervous but comfortable with his foster carer. If a suitable place at a zoo was available he would be transferred. • Mr Pig, a guinea pig who objects very noisily to any human contact but is happy to live with guinea pigs in for rehoming.

		<p>In 2024 we sadly lost Barbara, one of our eldest sheep to arthritis and we had to have 1 guinea pig, 2 rabbits and a rat euthanised as they were sadly too poorly to save.</p> <p>Additionally, advice and support has been given to some people in the local community who come to our attention (for example through social services) about having to rehome their beloved pet due to financial concerns and in some cases short term help has been given to certain cases eg provision of flea and working treatment that enables the home environment to be improved and the family to move forward and improve their situation.</p> <p>This year has been one of the hardest for the Rescue, the number of animals needing to come into the Rescue has more than doubled. However, due to the on going cost of living crisis most of our foster carers have had to return to work which has dramatically decreased the number of animals we are able to take in at a time when we really need to be taking in more. The nation's financial situation is showing that even the most stable of families are seeking support for the care of their animals. Additionally this has had a huge impact on the donations we receive as people don't have the spare funds to help. As we go into 2025 we are just focussing on helping as many animals as we can within our current capacity and capability.</p>

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





Independent Examination

Dear Sir

We have undertaken a review of the books and records of All Animal Rescue, a registered charity, for the Period Ending 31st December 2023; this review has been performed in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011 and other regulations and guidelines and is made to the Trustees of the Charity.

During this review we assessed and reviewed approximately 80% of the transactions and reconciled such to the data within the financial system and records.

Full access to the third-party financial management software utilised – QuickBooks Online – was provided to us, together with copy records of bank statements and reconciliations, Gift Aid claim submissions, donations and, Trustee Minutes.

The accounts reflect the position of a CIO established in December 2022 as a replacement formal body to the previous non-profit organisation; balances held by that organisation form the opening balances for the newly established CIO. The accounts have been prepared under the Cash Accounting basis; the charity currently holds no Fixed Assets.

The period in review showed donations from external and unrelated persons and organisations; All Animal Rescue has confirmed that the source of these funds had been verified, formal receipts issued and, that the funds were recorded as either Reserved or Unreserved funds, subject to the terms of the original donation. The Trustees are fully cognisant of the Charity Commission guidance relating to “know your donor” and have measures and controls in place.

It is noted that the no Reserved Funding was received within the period under review and no previous balance Reserved Funding was extant. Gift Aid reclaim for the year has been submitted for processing with HMRC in January 2024 and is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activity as “Other Monetary Asset” for the value submitted of £1,415.
