REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2025

The trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102: The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the income and expenditure of the charity for that period. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Observe the methods and principles in the applicable Charities SORP;
- Make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

All of the Trustees are members of the trust and guarantee to pay up to £10 each in the event of a winding up.

The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights.

The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity

Newcastle West End Children's Community is a Charitable Incorporated Association whose only voting members are its charity trustees ('Foundation' model constitution) and was incorporated on 17 January 2023 and commenced trading on the same date.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Mission Statement and activities

To act as a resource for young people up to the age of 25 living in the West End of Newcastle by providing advice and assistance and organising programmes of activities as a means of:

- (a) advancing in life and helping young people by developing their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals;
- (b) advancing education;
- (c) working in partnership to provide recreational and leisure time activity in the interests of social welfare for people living in the area of benefit who have need by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, poverty or social and economic circumstances with a view to improving the conditions of life of such persons.

Vision

To tackle the effects of poverty for children, young people and families by bringing a range of organisations together in a co-ordinated way that is locally driven. The collaboration takes a generational approach to stimulating change from 'cradle to career' across all of the contexts in which children live and learn.

Key aims and objectives

The priorities for collaborative action are outlined as:

- 1. A stronger community.** A vision of a West End where everyone works together, building a cohesive, supportive environment.
- 2. Reducing inequality.** Challenging poverty to ensure everyone can achieve and be healthy, and ensuring people are accepted for who they are.
- 3. Starting early and supporting transition.** Getting things right from before birth, ensuring healthy child development and supporting children through key transitions in their lives.
- 4. Realising aspirations.** Aiming high for young people and providing more opportunities for success.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

We have regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. We are proud of the work we have done to benefit our community and have fulfilled our charitable objectives.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Capacity

We have strengthened our capacity with the addition of a Partnership Officer and Administration Support Assistant. They are both a welcome addition, enabling us to reach out wider into the community to form partnerships, to have representation at external conferences and community meetings, maintain connections, assist in fundraising, support our initiatives and events and keep the momentum going around key issues. Their appointments have also enabled us to have a better social media presence therefore raising our profile.

Our advisory group continues to support the Trustees in deciding priorities and developing our strategy and we are grateful for their insight and enthusiasm.

Community connections

Our working group meetings remain a prominent focus. They have continued to evolve and have been rebranded as "focus on" groups, addressing key themes identified by our community such as childhood transitions and employability. These groups remain well attended, with representatives from a range of local charities, educational settings, cultural venues, statutory services and local residents. As a result of these groups, and the staff support around encouraging attendance and follow up we have been able to make more connections.

We have continued to facilitate networking opportunities to stimulate the sharing of information and partnership building and this will remain an annual commitment. The networking opportunities we have created have resulted in several initiatives and opportunities unlocking shared resources by partners including access to cultural venues, the provision of after school clubs for children and support for parents.

Building community leadership

Our community organising work in partnership with Tyne and Wear Citizens has continued with noticeable successes around positive changes to provisions in a local park, safety measures around schools and cleaning up residential areas. We commissioned two embedded community organisers who have been supporting community leaders to develop their skills and take action.

Action groups have been established exploring the main themes identified by the community (including children): Safety around schools; Rubbish; and, Anti-social behaviour. These groups have become self-sufficient with emerging leaders taking forward these key concerns. We now support action groups around further emerging themes, notably support for Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) and key childhood transitions.

Impacts on children and families

There have been multiple and varied impacts on children and families in the West End of Newcastle over our last financial year as a result of collaborative working. Some examples include:

- Over 400 children in Year 6 of their studies taking part in a dedicated STEM education programme. Such programmes have proven impact on educational attainment.
- Over 400 children in year 6 of their studies taking part in a week of health and wellbeing education activities (Health and Wellbeing week) to aid their transition to greater independence. Such projects have proven impact in supporting transition, improving mental health, increasing school attendance and subsequent attainment.
- A collaboration with Elswick Pool, RISE and schools has resulted in the provision of free breakfast swimming clubs (with food) for 100+ primary aged children, resulting in positive impacts on their physical and mental health and education.
- 100+ children have taken part in cultural, creative and sporting activities such as free after-school clubs, theatre visits and theatre training scholarships. These have involved organisations such as Theatre Royal and Newcastle United Foundation. Positive impacts on children's confidence, education and skills have been reported. Involvement in cultural activities such as this have been proven to enhance attainment, socio-emotional development and behaviour.
- A collaboration with Newcastle University Dental school and Brush Up team with the aim of improving dental hygiene in children. Approximately 4000 days of school are missed every year by Newcastle children due to dental decay meaning this project can help to prevent children missing school.
- Support from Newcastle College providing outreach work with children around climate change and with parents/carers around skills and training.

We appreciate the organisations who have supported us in facilitating activities with meeting rooms and refreshments.

Feedback from children and local organisations has been extremely positive, and moving into the future we intend to continue to work closely with local families and encourage local residents and children to get involved in stimulating change.

Financial review

In financial terms, 2025 was a successful third year with an unrestricted surplus in the general reserve of £4,934 (2024: £5,359).

Total income for the year was £35,350 (2024: £57,000) and expenditure was £35,545 (2024: £18,125) with funds received from various grant sources.

Our reserves policy is to maintain free reserves at a level no less than £2,000.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES

For the year ended 31 August 2025

I report on the financial statements of Newcastle West End Children's Community for the year ended 31 August 2025, which are set out on pages 8 to 15.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2022 ("the Charities Act") and that an independent examination is needed.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under company law and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

Basis of independent examiner's statement

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

2 Basis of accounting

2.1 Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) – Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2022.

Newcastle West End Children's Community meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

2.2 Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The charity reported total unrestricted funds at the year end of £4,934 and has already secured a significant amount of funding for the current year. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 to 18 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. In making their assessment the trustees have reviewed and considered relevant information, including their annual budget and future cash flows. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

3 Income

3.1 Recognition of income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the resources, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is more likely than not that the resources will be received and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

3.2 Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by FRS102 SORP or FRS102.

3.3 Grants and donations

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance of the provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria of income recognition are met.

3.4 Volunteer help

The value of volunteer help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

3.5 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

4 Expenditure and liabilities

4.1 Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised when it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

4.2 Charitable activities

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of to act as a resource for young people up to the age of 25, in the west end of Newcastle and other activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

4.3 Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance cost and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

4.4 Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

4.5 Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

- 1. A stronger community.** A vision of a West End where everyone works together, building a cohesive, supportive environment.
- 2. Reducing inequality.** Challenging poverty to ensure everyone can achieve and be healthy, and ensuring people are accepted for who they are.
- 3. Starting early and supporting transition.** Getting things right from before birth, ensuring healthy child development and supporting children through key transitions in their lives.
- 4. Realising aspirations.** Aiming high for young people and providing more opportunities for success.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

We have regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. We are proud of the work we have done to benefit our community and have fulfilled our charitable objectives.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Our working groups have gone from strength to strength identifying community needs, gaps in provision and creating an environment for co-creation of an action plan for future activity. These groups have been well attended, involving over 60 organisations with representatives from a range of local charities, educational settings, cultural venues, statutory services and local residents.

In addition to working groups we held a large networking opportunity to stimulate the sharing of information and partnership building. We intend to replicate networking events regularly.

The networking opportunities we have created have resulted in a number of initiatives and opportunities unlocking shared resources by partners including access to cultural venues, the provision of after school clubs for children and support for parents.

Over the last 12 months we have also strengthened our community organising work working in partnership with Tyne and Wear Citizens. We have facilitated community organizing and listening training. Further, we have undertaken listening sessions with individuals and groups, and collated their views and concerns, including vision boards from children and a film of children's poems about their home.

We set up issues workshop for community organisations and members in May 2024. We focused on the main themes: Health and Dentistry; Housing; School Attendance; Provision for young people; Travel; Rubbish; Jobs; Safety.

We developed an issues workshop in September 2024 which resulted in the creation of three action groups led by community members and professional community enablers. These action groups focused on: Safety around schools; Rubbish; and, Anti-social behavior. We will support the development of these action groups over the coming year.

There have been multiple and varied impacts on children and families in the West End of Newcastle over our last financial year as a result of collaborative working. Some examples include:

- A dedicated STEM education programme reaching over 400 children in year 6 of their studies (STEMtastic).
- A week of health and wellbeing education activities involving over 400 children in year 6 of their studies (Health and Wellbeing week) to aid their transition to greater independence.
- A collaboration with Elswick Pool, RISE and schools has resulted in the provision of free breakfast swimming clubs (with food) for 100+ primary aged children, resulting in positive impacts on their physical and mental health and education.
- A collaboration with schools and Newcastle College has resulted in the provision of free adult education classes at local schools, impacting positively on parenting, education and skills.

- 100+ children have taken part in cultural and creative activities such as free after-school theatre clubs, theatre visits, theatre training scholarships, and working with artists to create a public exhibition. These have involved organisations such as Theatre Royal and the John Marley Centre and positive impacts on children's confidence, education and skills have been reported.
- A collaboration is being developed with Newcastle University Dental school with the aim of improving dental hygiene in children.
- We have supported local primary schools in piloting the Healthier Together (HT) Website and Mobile app which is an innovative digital resource supporting parents to access the appropriate NHS service when their child is unwell and promoting self-care when it is safe to do so. This work won an award in April 2024 from HSJ Digital Awards.

We appreciate the organisations who have supported us in facilitating activities with meeting rooms and refreshments.

Our advisory group continues to support the Trustees in deciding priorities and developing our strategy and we are grateful for their insight and enthusiasm.

Feedback from children and local organisations has been extremely positive, and moving into the future we intend to continue to work closely with local families and encourage local residents and children to get involved in stimulating change.

Financial review

In financial terms, 2024 was a successful second year with an unrestricted surplus in the general reserve of £5,359.

Total income for the year was £57,000 with funds received from various grant sources at Newcastle University and from the North of Tyne Combined Authority.

Our reserves policy is to maintain free reserves at a level no less than £2,000.

1 Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

2 Basis of accounting

2.1 Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) – Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2022.

Newcastle West End Children's Community meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

2.2 Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The charity reported total unrestricted funds at the year end of £5,359 and has already secured a significant amount of funding for the current year. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 to 18 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. In making their assessment the trustees have reviewed and considered relevant information, including their annual budget and future cash flows. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

3 Income

3.1 Recognition of income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the resources, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is more likely than not that the resources will be received and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

Income received in advance of the provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria of income recognition are met.

3.4 Volunteer help

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

4 Expenditure and liabilities

4.1 Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised when it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

4.2 Charitable activities

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of to act as a resource for young people up to the age of 25, in the west end of Newcastle and other activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

4.3 Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance cost and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

4.4 Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

4.5 Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

The first year of operation has been a productive and successful one. The Charity was launched at an event held on 1st March 2023 at NUCastle, which is the community hub owned by NU Foundation, and was attended by approximately 50 local practitioners and residents. There was a real buzz in the room, and much excitement about what the WECC might achieve. Since the launch, working groups have been established to identify community needs, gaps in provision and to co-create an action plan for future activity. The working groups have been well attended, involving representatives from a range of local charities, educational settings, cultural venues and statutory services. The networking from these groups have resulted in a number of initiatives unlocking shared resources by partners including access to cultural venues, the provision of after school clubs for children and support for parents. Our advisory group met twice during this period and has supported the Trustees in deciding priorities.

We have supported key projects including a Health and Wellbeing initiative in June 2023 with young people leaving primary school and starting secondary school. Over 300 children took part, with over 20 local organisations providing workshops and resources aimed at ensuring children are well prepared for the transition to more independence. The week included tailored activities, based on what parents, children and school staff have told us are their concerns. These activities were based around exploring healthy friendships, learning emergency first aid, team building exercises, strategies for keeping calm, hearing letters written by year 7 pupils about their experience of moving to secondary school, as well as travelling independently and digital safety.

As this was our first year our expenses were limited to administration costs and an independent examiner's fees for reporting on the accounts amounting to £1,614.

We are grateful to the organisations who have supported us in facilitating activities with meeting rooms and refreshments namely St John's Primary School, Bridgewater Primary School, Children North East, Newcastle University and NU Foundation.

Feedback from children and local organisations has been extremely positive, and moving into the future we intend to work closely with local families to identify their priorities for children and encourage local residents and children to get involved in stimulating change.

Financial review

In financial terms, 2023 was a successful first year with an unrestricted surplus in the general reserve of **£5,731**.

Total income for the year was **£49,940** with funds received from various grant sources at Newcastle University

Our reserves policy is to maintain free reserves at a level no less than £2,000.

1 Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

2 Basis of accounting

2.1 Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) – Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Newcastle West End Children's Community meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

2.2 Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The charity reported total unrestricted funds at the year end of £5,731 and has already secured a significant amount of funding for the current year. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 to 18 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. In making their assessment the trustees have reviewed and considered relevant information, including their annual budget and future cash flows. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the trustees have revised their forecasts to take into account measures that they can take with the current resources available to mitigate the impact of the current adverse conditions. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

3 Income

3.1 Recognition of income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the resources, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is more likely than not that the resources will be received and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

3.2 Offsetting

The Statement of Financial Activities includes all gains and losses recognised in the year. All income and expenditure derive from continuing activities.

3.3 Grants and donations

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance of the provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria of income recognition are met.

3.4 Volunteer help

The value of volunteer help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

Interest receivable

3.5 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

4 Expenditure and liabilities

4.1 Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised when it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

4.2 Charitable activities

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of to act as a resource for young people up to the age of 25, in the west end of Newcastle and other activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

4.3 Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance cost and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

4.4 Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

4.5 Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

5 Assets

5.1 Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity

Individual fixed assets costing £500 or more are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on a straight line basis, the charity does not currently have any tangible fixed assets:
