2. Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 24 January 2025

The Trustees, who also serve as directors of Rally Round Rupert (hereafter referred to as "the Charity") for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, are pleased to present their Annual Report and Unaudited Financial Statements for the year ended 24 January 2025.

a. Charitable Purpose Statement:

The objectives and aims of the Charity are to relieve the need and protect the health of children and their families affected by Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA) throughout England & Wales for the public benefit by:

- Working to improve the understanding and knowledge of Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA) among the public.
- Providing financial support to further advance clinical research into Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA).

b. Fundraising Activities and Performance in the Year

The Trustees are pleased to report on the Charity's activities and financial performance for the year ended 24 January 2025.

The Charity's primary objective is to generate income in support of its charitable purpose. This is typically achieved through a flagship annual fundraising event, supplemented by smaller, standalone activities throughout the year. These efforts are supported by an ongoing strategy to raise awareness of SMA via the Charity's website and social media platforms.

In June 2024, the Charity hosted its major fundraising event — '100 WALK 100' — a 100-mile charity walk along the Cotswold Way. The event, held over three days, attracted more than 100 participants and was a resounding success both in terms of fundraising and engagement.

The event proved to be a tremendous success, generating over £110,000 in direct donations for the Charity. Beyond these essential funds, the event significantly raised public awareness of the condition, garnering widespread media coverage across local radio and newspapers.

During the year, the Charity also launched a new website, serving as a central hub for media content and providing regular updates on how donated funds are being utilised - Rallyroundrupert.org.uk

The charity also continues to raise awareness through its Instagram page, which now has over 29,000 followers.

c. Charitable Activities – Clinical Research

During the year, the charity pledged £107,000 of funds to Great Ormond Street Hospital and partners, to conduct a 2-year Nutritional study. This study has successfully commenced, and results are expected to be published in 2026/27.



Funding of £100,000 has been awarded to the University of Oxford to fund a clinical trial into physiotherapy for children with SMA.



d. Future outlook

Following a successful year of fundraising, the Charity is planning to support an additional clinical research initiative in 2025. Ongoing discussions with Sheffield Children's Hospital are focused on a proposed study entitled 'SMA Spinal Management Study'. Further details, including the overall cost of the project, are expected to become clearer as these discussions progress later in the year.

The Board of Trustees remains firmly committed to deepening the understanding of Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA) and advancing clinical research in this vital area.

On behalf of the Trustees, we would like to say a sincere thank you to all our supporters and volunteers, individuals who have given their time and money so generously and wholeheartedly. We would not be where we are without your help, and we very much appreciate it.

3. Financial Review and Governance

a) Financial Review

The Charity raises funds to meet its objectives while maintaining financial stability. In its second year since registering as a charity, Rally Round Rupert had net expenditure of £39,582 (2024 - net income £183,074). This arose from £132,187 of income from fundraising events (2024 - £188,798), partially offset by the costs of raising funds of £9,752 (2024 - 5,724) and supported by interest income £3,379 (2024 - nil). The charity undertook charitable activities in the year totalling £165,396 (2024 - nil) which was constituted of supporting clinical research projects with major internationally recognised research organisations.

As at 24 January 2024, the Charity had total net assets of £143,492 (2024 - £183,074) of which £41,604 is designated for the ongoing support of the SMA4Nutrition project. All of the income for the year is unrestricted. The Charity has adequate reserves to continue in operation and support its ongoing obligations as they fall due.

b) Governance

The charity is controlled by its governing document and a deed of trust and operates as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). There is an annual review of trustees in line with the governing documents of the Charity.

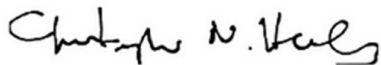
Following a review of capability and capacity of the existing structure during the year, the charity recruited three additional trustees. This was to diversify the trustees' skill set, add resource, and to enable to the charity to continue to develop and deliver its objectives.

Accounting Policies

1 Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2022. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that economic benefits will flow to the charity and if the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Expenditure is the amount of the charity's resources that have been spent or otherwise used up in carrying out its activities. Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities given all income is used for charitable purposes.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees for either general use or designated for a particular use.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand is held to meet short term cash commitments as they fall due and includes all cash equivalents held in the form of short term highly liquid investments. A cash equivalent will have a maximum maturity date of three months from the date of acquisition.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees have adopted the following reserves policy to ensure the ongoing operational stability of the charity and its ability to meet its strategic objectives.

The Trustees aim to hold a minimum operational reserve of £10,000 in cash. This is to provide a cushion against unexpected drops in income or unforeseen costs.

Beyond this operational reserve, the charity's model is to accumulate general unrestricted funds ahead of awarding research grants. The Trustees will identify and plan for future expenditures, and this will inform the overall level of funds held. The Trustees acknowledge that following a significant disbursement on charitable activities, reserves may fall but commitments will not be made that take the position below the minimum operational reserve level.

At 24 January 2025, the charity's reserves of £143,492 are above the target minimum operational reserve. The Trustees consider this level adequate to continue in operation, support ongoing obligations, and begin accumulating funds for the next cycle of research projects.

Investment Policy

The trustees will only place cash with banks with a Moody's rating of AA3 or better. The trustees will place cash in an interest bearing deposit account to the extent that it is not required in the short term to optimise investment income.

2 Other trading activities

Other trading activities comprises entirely of income from fundraising events.

3 Investment Income

Investment income relates to bank interest received during the year.

The General Fund represents the free reserves of the charity available for its general charitable purposes.

The Designated Fund of £110,000 brought forward from 2024 was designated for research into the nutritional needs of children with SMA. £65,396 was utilised for this purpose leaving further amounts committed of £41,604 that will be paid during 2025. The remaining £3,000 was transferred to general funds during the year ended 24 January 2025.

Amounts from the General Fund (£100,000) and Designated Fund (£65,396) totalling £165,396 were applied to fund the Expenditure on Charitable Activities (see Note 7).

The "Incoming resources" of £125,814 allocated to the General Fund in the detailed movement note above, plus the £9,752 expenditure on raising funds, and the £3,379 interest income, combined with the charitable expenditure allocation make up the overall financial activity reflected in the SOFA.

2. A personal message from the Chairperson

It's been over a year since we launched Rally Round Rupert and it's incredible to reflect on how far we have come in such a short space of time. I can speak on behalf of all the Trustees when I say how proud we are of the charity's progress. Specifically, how much awareness of the condition we have managed to raise, while also generating over £183,000, vital funds which will now directly support clinical research.

Our charity walk in June 2023, '**100 WALK 100 - The Cleveland Way**', was the main feature of the year, a resounding success that brought together a huge community of committed and engaged volunteers, as well over 100 participants. The event also attracted a huge amount of local media attention and the support of several high-profile [celebrities](#), further helping to promote the condition and the charity itself. I would like to thank everyone that helped to make the three days such a success, in particular the dedicated team of volunteers who made possible all the logistics, catering, and marshalling. Without your help we would not have been able to safely guide and support over 100 people, over 100 miles, a sincere thank you to you all.

Following the event, the funds we have generated can now be put toward much needed clinical research, providing immediate liquidity to projects awaiting funding or in the mobilisation phase.

In the first instance, Rally Round Rupert has been working closely with three institutions; Great Ormond Street Hospital (GOSH), Sapre-Uonpia (Italy) and the International Centre for the Assessment of Nutritional Studies (ICANS) at the University of Milan. In July 2024, we intend to fully fund a 2-year piece of clinical research, which aims to investigate the nutritional status, body composition, energy expenditure and dietary habits of infants and children with SMA types I and II, who have been treated with the available therapeutic options. The research's secondary aim is to evaluate the role of body composition and energy metabolism of fat free mass (kcal/kg), as biomarkers to predict responses of patients receiving disease-modifying treatments. This essential research will help better inform clinicians around SMA and nutrition, thus improving long term patient wellbeing.

Rally Round Rupert also intends to part fund a piece of clinical research, led by Oxford University, which aims to review optimised rehabilitation programmes for treated patients with SMA, comparing these to the current rehabilitation programmes in the United Kingdom. Again, this is a much-anticipated piece of research that will add to the existing body of knowledge, while also helping to consolidate thinking amongst clinicians, leading to more effective and consistent care plans for patients.

These two pieces of clinical research are extremely important to the SMA community and would not have been possible without funding from the charitable sector. The intention is that they will not only lead to better levels of clinical care, but also sponsor a broader level of clinical coordination and leadership, themes that our charity holds dear.

Within the year, Rally Round Rupert has also launched a new [website](#), which will serve as a central point of reference and contact, allowing the charity to host its latest information. Going forward, we will be signposting volunteers and potential donors to this page, helping to ensure that there is consistency of messaging and a single location where we can explain about the clinical research we are supporting. Secondly, next year we are also looking to expand the number of Trustees within the charity, ensuring we can benefit from further diversity of thought and a more rounded expertise, not to mention energy. Thirdly, we will be looking to build on the initial momentum we have created in our first year, by running another event in June 2024,

3. Our Mission

Charitable Purpose Statement:

To relieve the need and protect the health of children and their families affected by Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA) throughout England & Wales for the public benefit by:

- a. Working to improve the understanding and knowledge of Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA) among the public.
- b. Providing financial support to further advance clinical research into Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA).

Public benefit

1. **Societal awareness** - By promoting societal awareness of 'Spinal Muscular Atrophy' (SMA), through our social media page ([Rally Round Rupert](#)) and our annual fundraising events, those affected by SMA and their families, now and in the future, will advance their understanding of this serious health condition - the leading genetic cause of infant death. This is particularly important, as earlier diagnosis of the condition and thereafter medical intervention, can significantly abate the impacts of SMA and drastically improve quality of life for those affected.
2. **Funding clinical research** - By raising much needed funds in support of clinical research, we will be able to advance the general body of knowledge associated with the condition. This is particularly important as there is no current cure for SMA. In addition, a range of healthcare professionals may be involved in the care of those with SMA, including specialist doctors, physiotherapists, occupational therapists and speech and language therapists, with current [treatments](#) including:
 - Exercise and equipment to help with movement and breathing
 - Feeding tubes and dietary advice
 - Braces or surgery to treat problems with the spine or joints
 - Medicines that target the faulty genes that cause the condition

Specifically, the trustees intend to focus on clinical research that will advance the understanding of healthcare professionals and medical practitioners (SMA specialist and non-specialist), caregivers of those with the condition, parents of children with the condition and those with SMA themselves, so that they are better able to manage and mitigate the [effects of the condition](#). Finally, this research will help ensure that those affected by the condition and their families, enjoy the best quality of life possible, wherever they may be in the world.

The beneficiaries

Delivering upon our purpose statement will benefit the public generally, as well, individuals suffering with SMA, healthcare and medical practitioners (SMA specialist and non-specialist), caregivers to those with SMA and parents / guardians of children with SMA.

We do not believe that any members of the public, including people in poverty, will be unreasonably restricted from accessing the awareness and research, by geography or other restrictions. We will ensure that the research in all instances, will be published (a prerequisite for funding) and made formally available to the global SMA community and the public generally.

4. Operational

Structure, Governance and Management

The charity is controlled by its governing document and a deed of trust and operates as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). The Charity was registered on 25 January 2023.

- The Charity is run by the Trustees, who are elected members of the charity.
- There is a minimum of three, but a maximum of twelve Trustees.
- There are four formal Trustee meetings each year, but all Trustees participate in the informal communications in the interim periods.
- None of the Trustees received any remuneration for their services.
- The charity has no direct employees.

Trustee appointment

Additional Trustees may be appointed by the existing Trustees, either to replace a retiring Trustee or where it is felt that the Charity would benefit from additional skill sets and expertise. Following a selection process (skill set assessment), new Trustees will be taken through an induction programme covering the ethos, mission, governance, and financial background of the charity. They are also briefed on the role of a Trustee and Charitable law.

The Trustees are pleased to present this report, outlining the charitable activities and objectives for the year ended 24 January 2024 and an overview of the financial performance and position for the year then ended.

The financial position of the Charity is strong, having raised **£188,798** in the year, and with **£183,074** of reserves as at 24 January 2024. The Charity held **£183,074** of cash at bank and in hand at the year end.

Future outlook

Following a successful year of fundraising for the Charity, it intends to commit to one or more clinical research projects in 2024, including £110,000 designated for a study into the nutritional needs of children with SMA. Further, given the huge success of the 100 WALK 100 event in June 2023, the Charity will be organising a similar event in June 2024.

The Board of Trustees remain committed to improving the understanding of SMA, while helping to advance clinical research.

Financial position

The Charity raises funds to meet its objectives, while maintaining financial stability. In its first year since registering as a charity, Rally Round Rupert generated **net income of £183,074**, with **£188,798 of trading activity income** from fundraising events, partially offset by charitable **activity costs of £5,411** and **costs of raising funds of £312**.

As at 24 January 2024, the Charity had **total net assets (equity) of £183,074**, which is all represented by cash at bank and in hand. All the income for the year is unrestricted.

The Charity has adequate reserves to continue in operation and support its ongoing obligations as they fall due.

As the charity trustees of the Trust you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011 ('the Act').

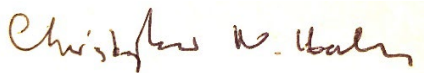

Notes to the financial statements For the year ended 24 January 2024

Accounting Policies

1 Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2022. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that economic benefits will flow to the charity and if the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Expenditure is the amount of the charity's resources that have been spent or otherwise used up in carrying out its activities. Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities given all income is used for charitable purposes.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees for either general use or designated for a particular use.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand is held to meet short term cash commitments as they fall due and includes all cash equivalents held in the form of short term highly liquid investments. A cash equivalent will have a maximum maturity date of three months from the date of acquisition.

2 Other trading activities

Other trading activities consist entirely of income from fundraising events.

3 Trustees' remuneration and benefits

There were no trustees' remuneration or other benefits for the year end 24 January 2024.
