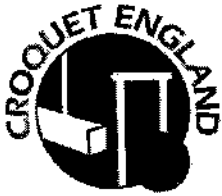

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Objectives and Activities

Summary of the purposes of the charity as set out in its governing document

The Croquet England CIO has two primary purposes set out in our constitution

- The promotion of community participation in healthy recreation in particular by the provision of facilities for the playing of Croquet.
- The advancement of the amateur sport of croquet for the public benefit by the provision of facilities for participation in the sport of Croquet.

Summary of the main activities in relation to those purposes for the public benefit, in particular, the activities, projects or services identified in the accounts.

Croquet England took over the operations of its predecessor organisation, the unincorporated Croquet Association, on 1 January 2024. It is the National Governing Body for the sport of croquet and as such, it:

- liaises with the World Croquet Federation on participation in international tournaments and organisation of those held in England; organises national tournaments; promotes regional and local tournaments and operates a tournament entry system for clubs to use;
- makes grants and loans to clubs to support the establishment of clubs and the development of club facilities (further details below), and to amateur players to support participation in competitive croquet in particular by young players;
- publishes a bi-monthly magazine, a monthly e-newsletter, regular website updates and press releases to promote awareness of and interest in croquet;
- accredits referees, coaches and handicappers to support the playing and development of the sport

In addition, Croquet England operates a shop supplying croquet equipment and related products such as clothing to clubs and individuals, both subscribers to Croquet England and the general public.

Grants awarded during 2024 supported improvements to facilities (Tisbury, Nottingham, Hove Beach, Cheney, Chichester and Fishbourne, Crag y Don, and Ben Rhydding clubs), sustainability (Watford and Cornwall clubs) and access (Nailsea club).

Statement confirming whether the trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit

The Charity Trustees use the material issued by the Charity Commission. As well as general advice and navigation to the Charity Commission's website and associated guidance, our Guide for Croquet England Trustees, which is issued to all new trustees and is available to those considering applying for a role, includes specific references to CC3a, CC4, PB2 and PB3.

Policy on grant making

Croquet England provides financial support to develop croquet in all its forms through gaining more members playing in improved facilities at more locations, while encouraging a more diverse and inclusive membership.

Financial support is available, through grants and loans, to Croquet England's Affiliated Clubs, including those with an educational affiliation, to help them develop croquet for the public benefit:

1. The provision of initial equipment and/or grants and a reduction in initial affiliation fees to help Croquet Clubs become established.
2. Grants to existing Clubs to finance the improvement of lawns and/or essential off-court facilities; to prevent the closure of an existing Club or to help the re-establishment of an existing Club after relocation.
3. Loans to new Clubs or existing Clubs

Grants, which are limited to 50% of the cost, are made for special projects and not ordinary running costs. Loans are interest-free.

Financial support is also available to individuals, through bursaries to potential international players, with preference given to applicants aged under 25, and through sponsorship to assist players under 25 to join more than one club.

Contribution made by volunteers

Croquet England is a primarily voluntary organisation, with over 100 volunteers serving as Trustees, members of the Executive, a member of a committee or in another volunteer role. Many hundreds of people volunteer in support of some of our affiliate clubs and in support of croquet events across the country.

The commitment and dedication of our volunteers, which is essential to the smooth running of Croquet England, is greatly valued and appreciated.

Achievements and Performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.

Croquet England was established as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation in 2023. During 2023 plans were set to transfer the operations of the predecessor organisation (the unincorporated Croquet Association) as previously approved by members of the that association. In parallel, work was undertaken to ensure that the new organisation established a robust foundation for the future.

The primary objectives set by the trustees for 2024 were:

- Successful migration of day-to-day operations from the Croquet Association to Croquet England.
- Conducting a review of governance against both Charity Commission and Sport England Code of Sports Governance and implementing improvements.
- Establishment of a Strategy for Croquet England.

Achievements against objectives set

- Operations were migrated from the Croquet Association to Croquet England with minimal disruption to day-to-day operations. The first major milestone in 2024 was the launch of the annual calendar of events on 1 February 2024. The second major milestone was the holding of our first General Meeting of Members on 16 March 2024. A further General Meeting was held on 12 October 2024; this will set the pattern for Annual General Meetings into the future.

- As expected for a new organisation a number of gaps in established governance processes were identified, and all priority issues were addressed. Significant steps in 2024 included the publication of rules relating to the conduct of AGMs, a Volunteers Charter and an updated practice book and standing orders. A risk review was conducted, review and use of which is now a regular part of operational activity.
- The Croquet England Strategy to inspire a new generation of players in a safe, inclusive and diverse community was published in August 2024. It sets out seven themes (play, volunteers, safety, inclusion, wellbeing, funding, and sustainability) to help meet a vision of more people, playing more croquet, in more places.

In November 2024, the following objectives were agreed for the coming year:

- Extending the detail of the strategy, to include measures of success and relative priorities
- Establishing Trustee elections as business-as-usual
- Succession planning, in particular for key roles such as the Chair and CEO
- Continuing progress towards Tier 3 of Sport England's Code for Sports Governance

Performance of fundraising activities against objectives set

Croquet England did not undertake any active fundraising within the scope of the Fundraising Regulator during 2024.

Our planned income arises through four primary sources:

- Player and Club subscriptions
- Shop income
- Tournament income
- Advertising and sponsorship

All have performed broadly in accordance with the budget.

Investment performance against objectives

Croquet England invests its reserves in low-risk accounts, with a mixture of variable and fixed interest rates.

Financial Review

Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period

The Charity recorded a surplus of £164,631 for the year on its general funds before gains on the revaluation of assets in its first operational year (2023: deficit of £318). However, this included £147,361 of donations from the charity's predecessor organisation, the Croquet Association. Excluding those transitional transactions, general fund income was £17,270 in excess of general fund expenditure.

Income across all funds, before recognised gains and losses, totalled £832,152 (2023: £120), and expenditure amounted to £485,068 (2023: £438). £337,401 of that income represented donations from the Croquet Association.

The Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) for the year shows a net surplus of £347,084 (2023: deficit of £318) before net gains and losses on the revaluation and sale of investments and the revaluation of fixed assets. Net gains on investments totalled £39,632 (2023: £0) and there was a new gain on revaluation of fixed assets of £180,906 (2023: £0). As a result, funds increased by £567,622 from £318 in deficit to £567,304 in surplus. However, this was almost entirely due to the transfer of assets from the Croquet Association and revaluation of assets and was therefore exceptional, for the first year of operation only. The greatest part of the revaluation was for the office premises, previously held by the Croquet Association at a depreciated cost £12,750, but valued in March 2024 at £175,000.

A broadly balanced budget has been set for 2025.

Statement explaining the policy for holding reserves stating why they are held

Reserves are unencumbered assets that an organisation maintains over and above those required for day-to-day operations. Reserves allow Croquet England to deal with unexpected events causing large items of expenditure or a fall in income.

Croquet England has a stable income stream from multiple sources including individual subscriptions, club subscriptions, tournament entry fees and its shop. It is in control of its routine expenditure and budgets effectively on an annual basis to operate on an underlying breakeven basis.

Given the current scale of its activities and stable operating model it has been determined that the appropriate level of reserves for the organisation is 20% of its gross annual income.

This sum is believed to be sufficient, together with our insurance, to ensure that the organisation is resilient to all but the most significant financial risks that it faces. It also recognises the fact that the organisation is very reliant on volunteer efforts and that it may on occasion need to be able to resource one-off projects or increase its professional base. This level of reserves should also provide the necessary support for any such changes in the short term, whilst income and expenditure are rebalanced for the longer term. These reserves should also provide confidence to the membership and other stakeholders that the organisation has a sound financial base.

Funds in excess of the reserves are managed by the Executive through the annual budgeting process, which is approved by the Board.

The Special Funds procedure outlines how some of the excess is allocated and managed.

Amount of reserves held

Croquet England holds reserves of £200,835 which represents 41% of our gross annual income excluding donations from the Croquet Association.

The charity has stable income streams from sources including individual subscriptions, club subscriptions and tournament entry fees and levies.

Other sources of income include shop sales, advertising, sponsorship, and donations (including legacies).

Investment policy and objectives including any social investment policy adopted

Croquet England invests its reserves in low-risk accounts, with a mixture of variable and fixed interest rates. Our Finance Policy determines that funds are distributed across institutions with no single account exceeding the limits of the Financial Services Compensation Scheme.

The application of this principle is set out in our Finance Policy, which includes our reserve policy.

A description of the principal risks facing the charity

The Trustees are responsible for the identification, mitigation and/or management of risks. To achieve this, a register of all the risks identified is maintained and, as part of the register, a management and mitigation strategy. This is subject to review by the Trustees on an annual basis, with responsibility for delivery of the mitigation strategies delegated to the Executive.

The register identifies risks in the areas of

- financial
- staff/volunteers
- organisational/governance
- environmental/physical
- technological
- clubs/federations
- membership
- competition.

The principal areas where the risk of either failure to act or the impact of events is considered 'high' and the associated mitigation strategies are:

- Shortage of volunteers at a national level, risking the ability of the organisation to carry out its business given the level of dependency on volunteers. Croquet England has a goal of achieving external funding in future to enable more staff to be recruited and reduce the dependence on volunteers, but meanwhile attention is being paid to succession planning and developing pathways for volunteers.
- Loss of key personnel, including trustees and officers, Executive Directors, committee chairs, office staff and individuals with key skills. Vacancies are filled through advertising supported by headhunting within playing networks. Continuity planning is underway, with a focus on ensuring multiple people have the access and training needed to support critical functions, and increasing levels of documentation of details of processes and procedures.
- Aging demographic, which impacts not only on players but also on administration, linking to the risk of shortage of volunteers. Recruitment is a constant focus, and a Next Generation scheme aims to introduce croquet to younger players.

Clause 13 (a) of the Constitution provides that the elected trustees shall be elected by the voting members of the charity in accordance with Clause 13(d). The Board has decided that there should be 6 elected trustees. Clause 13(d) provides that each elected charity trustee shall be an individual member of the charity, elected to represent the members in his or her regional constituency.

Clause 13(b) provides that the elected charity trustees may appoint further charity trustees to ensure that the Board of Trustees has a diversity of background and experience. Clause 13(i) provides that the members or the charity trustees may at any time decide to appoint a new charity trustee, whether in place of a charity trustee who has retired

or been removed in accordance with clause 15 (Retirement and removal of charity trustees), or as an additional charity trustee, provided that the limit specified in clause 12(3) on the number of charity trustees would not as a result be exceeded.

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of trustees

A guide for Croquet England Trustees has been produced. This is intended to act as a guide to people thinking about becoming a trustee, and as an induction guide for new trustees. It includes an induction checklist which identifies key Croquet England and Charity Commission documents with which Trustees should be familiar.

The charity's organisational structure and any wider network with which the charity works

The Board of Trustees is the ultimate decision-making body. It is accountable to the Charity Commission, as well as to the croquet playing community. For efficient running it has adopted a set of Standing Orders. In practice, the Trustees limit themselves to deciding on, and reviewing, strategy and general policy, using their powers of delegation to appoint the Executive.

The Executive deals with the day to day running of the organisation, assisted by a range of committees to which it further delegates business. The members of the Executive are appointed by the Trustees. This includes a Chief Executive Officer, a Treasurer and a Secretary. One of the Trustees (usually the Chair) is also a member of the Executive. The Executive has adopted a Practice Book that defines the roles and responsibilities of the various committees, panels and individuals appointed by it.

Croquet England also works with nine regional croquet federations and 224 affiliated clubs to achieve its objectives. During 2024 we were pleased to welcome Gransden Bowls and Croquet, Brighton College, The Old Brentwoods and West Mersea Tennis and Croquet.

Internationally, Croquet England is a member of the World Croquet Federation whose vision is to make croquet a well-known, well-understood, well-respected and well-supported sport in countries throughout the world.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

1 BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE ACCOUNTS

1.1 Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with:

- the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014,
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102),
- and with the Charities Act 2011.

The Charity was formed on 22 March 2023. The Charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 INCOME

Recognition of income

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:

- the Charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS 102 SORP or FRS 102.

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS102 SORP).

Government grants

The Charity has not received government grants in the year.

CROQUET ENGLAND NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

2.1... Shop income and expenses

The shop is used predominantly by the charity for charitable purposes, so shop income and expenses fall within charitable activities, not trading activities.

Donated goods

Donated goods for resale are measured at fair value on initial recognition, which is the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale, and recognised in 'Income from charitable activities' with the corresponding stock recognised in the balance sheet. On its sale the value of stock is charged against 'Income from charitable activities' and the proceeds from sale are also recognised as 'Income from charitable activities'.

Goods donated for on-going use by the charity are recognised as tangible fixed assets and included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

Volunteer help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

Income from interest, royalties and dividends

This is included in the accounts when receipt is probable and the amount receivable can be measured reliably.

Income from membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions which gives a member the right to buy services or other benefits are recognised as income earned from the provision of goods and services.

Investment gains

This includes any realised or unrealised gains or losses on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year. FRS 102 provides that investments should be shown as fixed assets at their market value.

2.2 EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Creditors

The Charity has creditors which are measured at settlement amounts less any trade discounts.

Basic financial instruments

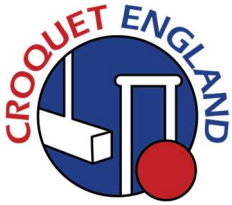

Summary of the purposes of the charity as set out in its governing document

The Croquet England CIO has two primary purposes set out in our constitution

- The promotion of community participation in healthy recreation in particular by the provision of facilities for the playing of Croquet.
- The advancement of the amateur sport of croquet for the public benefit by the provision of facilities for participation in the sport of Croquet.

Summary of the main activities in relation to those purposes for the public benefit, in particular, the activities, projects or services identified in the accounts.

In July 2022, members of the Croquet Association voted at a Special General Meeting to approve the submission of an application to form the Croquet England CIO. The Charity Commission approved this on 22 March 2023.

On that date, the predecessor organisation, the unincorporated Croquet Association, had just launched the 2023 season, and the Trustees decided that it would be too disruptive to seek to transfer activities during the playing season. Therefore, plans were set by the Trustees for work by the Trustees, Executive and various committees to prepare Croquet England to take over all day to-day activities from the Croquet Association ready for the 2024 calendar year and playing season.

Statement confirming whether the Trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit

The Charity Trustees regularly use the guidance issued by the Charity Commission during their activities. This has included the specific guidance documents (CC3a, CC4, PB2 and PB3) identified by the Charity Commission during evaluation of our application.

The guidance for Trustees, which is issued to all new Trustees and is available to those considering applying for a role, contains links to this guidance.

Policy on grant making

Croquet England provides financial support to develop croquet in all its forms through gaining more members playing in improved facilities at more locations, while encouraging a more diverse and inclusive membership.

Financial support is available, through grants and loans, to Croquet England's Affiliated Clubs, including those with an educational affiliation, to help them develop croquet for the public benefit:

- The provision of initial equipment and/or grants and a reduction in initial affiliation fees to help Clubs become established.
- Grants to existing Clubs to finance the improvement of lawns and/or essential off-court facilities; to prevent the closure of an existing Club or to help the re-establishment of an existing Club after relocation.
- Loans to new Clubs or existing Clubs.

Grants, which are limited to 50% of the cost and to a maximum of £5000, are made for special projects and not ordinary running costs. Loans are interest-free.

Financial support is also available to individuals, through bursaries to potential international players, with preference given to applicants aged under 25, and through sponsorship to assist players under 25 to join more than one club.

Contribution made by volunteers

Croquet England is a primarily voluntary organisation, with over 70 volunteers serving as Trustees, members of the Executive, a member of a committee or in another volunteer role. Many hundreds of people volunteer in support of some of our affiliate clubs and in support of croquet events across the country.

The commitment and dedication of our volunteers, which is essential to the smooth running of Croquet England, is greatly valued and appreciated.

Achievements and Performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.

The primary milestones set by the Charity Trustees were in relation to mobilising the CIO:

1. Clubs and Federations joining as affiliates of Croquet England from November 2023.
2. Launch of the Tournament Entry System on 1 February 2024.
3. Acceptance of voting members, enabling the first General Meeting of Members in March 2024.

All three were met.

Financial Review

Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period

The charity had relatively few transactions in the period, other than collecting subscriptions for 2024. At the end of the period, we had a small net deficit of £318.

Statement explaining the policy for holding reserves stating why they are held

The charity had no reserves at the end of 2023.

Amount of reserves held

None.

Reasons for holding zero reserves

Croquet England was incorporated on 22 March 2023. The Trustees decided that it would be too disruptive to seek to transfer activities during that season. Therefore, plans were set by the Trustees for work by the Trustees, Executive and various committees to prepare Croquet England to take over all day to-day activities from the Croquet Association ready for the 2024 calendar year and playing season. There was therefore no need for Croquet England to hold any reserves in 2023.

All the assets of the Croquet Association barring a small contingency fund were donated to Croquet England during 2024.

The charity's principal sources of funds (including any fundraising)

From the beginning of 2024, the charity has stable income streams from sources including individual subscriptions, club subscriptions, tournament entry fees and levies and its shop.

A description of the principal risks facing the charity

The Trustees are responsible for the identification, mitigation and/or management of risks. To achieve this, a register of all the risks identified is maintained and, as part of the register, a management and mitigation strategy. This is subject to review by the Trustees on an annual basis, with responsibility for delivery of the mitigation strategies delegated to the Executive.

The register identifies risks in the areas of

- financial
- staff/volunteers
- organisational/governance
- environmental/physical
- technological
- clubs/federations
- membership
- competition.

The principal areas where the risk of either failure to act or the impact of events is considered 'high' and the associated mitigation strategies are:

- Shortage of volunteers at a national level, risking the ability of the organisation to carry out its business given the level of dependency on volunteers. Croquet England has a goal of achieving external funding in future to enable more staff to be recruited and reduce the dependence on volunteers, but meanwhile attention is being paid to succession planning and developing pathways for volunteers.
- Loss of key personnel, including Trustees and Officers, Executive Directors, committee chairs, office staff and individuals with key skills. Vacancies are filled through advertising supported by headhunting within playing networks. Continuity planning is underway, with a focus on ensuring multiple people have the access and training needed to support critical functions, and increasing levels of documentation of details of processes and procedures.
- Aging demographic, which impacts not only on players but also on administration, linking to the risk of shortage of volunteers. Recruitment is a constant focus, and a Next Generation scheme aims to introduce croquet to younger players.

Clause 13 (a) of the Constitution provides that the elected trustees shall be elected by the voting members of the charity in accordance with Clause 13(d). The Board has decided that there should be 6 elected trustees. Clause 13(d) provides that each elected Charity Trustee shall be an individual member of the charity, elected to represent the members in his or her regional constituency.

Clause 13(b) provides that the elected Charity Trustees may appoint further Charity Trustees to ensure that the Board of Trustees has a diversity of background and experience. Clause 13(i) provides that the members or the Charity Trustees may at any time decide to appoint a new Charity Trustee, whether in place of a Charity Trustee who has retired or been removed in accordance with clause 15 (Retirement and removal of Charity Trustees), or as an additional Charity Trustee, provided that the limit specified in clause 12(3) on the number of Charity Trustees would not as a result be exceeded.

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of trustees

A guide for Croquet England Trustees has been produced. This is intended to act as a guide to people thinking about becoming a trustee, and as an induction guide for new trustees. It includes an induction checklist which identifies key Croquet England and Charity Commission documents with which Trustees should be familiar.

The charity's organisational structure and any wider network with which the charity works

The Board of Trustees is the ultimate decision-making body. It is accountable to the Charity Commission, as well as to the croquet playing community. For efficient running it has adopted a set of Standing Orders. In practice, the Trustees limit themselves to deciding on, and reviewing, strategy and general policy, using their powers of delegation to appoint the Executive.

The Executive deals with the day to day running of the organisation, assisted by a range of committees to which it further delegates business. The members of the Executive are appointed by the Trustees. This includes a Chief Executive Officer, a Treasurer and a Secretary. One of the Trustees (usually the Chair) is also a member of the Executive. The Executive has adopted a Practice Book that defines the roles and responsibilities of the various committees, panels and individuals appointed by it.

1 BASIS OF PREPARATION OF THE ACCOUNTS

1.1 Basis of accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with:

- the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014,
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102),
- and with the Charities Act 2011.

The Charity was formed on 22 March 2024 and these are the first accounts of the Charity. The Charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

1.2 Going concern

The Charity was formed to take over from the Croquet Association as the governing body of croquet in England from the start of 2024. The Croquet Association has been in existence since 1897 and the trustees' expect the Charity will be governing croquet a long way into the future. During 2024 the Croquet Association will be donating the majority of its assets, with a book value over £300,000, to the charity.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 INCOME

Recognition of income

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:

- the Charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities, or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by the FRS 102 SORP or FRS 102.

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the general income recognition criteria are met (5.10 to 5.12 FRS102 SORP).

Government grants

The Charity has not received government grants in the reporting period

2.1... **Support costs**

Deferred income

No material item of deferred income has been included in the accounts.

The Charity has creditors which are measured at settlement amounts less any trade discounts

Basic financial instruments

The Charity accounts for basic financial instruments on initial recognition as per paragraph 11.7 FRS102 SORP. Subsequent measurement is as per paragraphs 11.17 to 11.19, FRS102 SORP.

2.3 **ASSETS**

Intangible fixed assets

The Charity has intangible fixed assets, that is, non-monetary assets that do not have physical substance but are identifiable and are controlled by the Charity through custody or legal rights. The amortisation rates and methods used are disclosed in note 6.2

11 EVENTS AFTER THE END OF THE REPORTING PERIOD

The Charity was formed to take over from the Croquet Association as the governing body of Croquet in England from the start of 2024.

As planned the vast majority of activity transferred on 1st January 2024. The Croquet Association's 3 office staff members were TUPE transferred to the Charity. Merchandise and other stock valued at £65,000 were donated to the Charity, as were trophies valued at £49,455, and other assets totalling £52,000.

On 25 March 2024 the Croquet Association donated the leasehold of the organisation's offices to Croquet England. The leasehold had a net book value of £12,750. The leasehold was valued at £175,000 on 27 February 2024.

On 4 June 2024 the Croquet Association donated treasury stock with a book value of £28,863. The market value of the stock at that date was £69,364.
