TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charitable company's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published in October 2019.

Objectives and activities

To hold regular meetings of the Board to keep them abreast of activities and to ensure the legal responsibilities of the charity are upheld.

To hold regular meetings of the Strategic Oversight Committee (SOC) to maintain oversight of the trials portfolio in which the DIDACT Foundation has an interest.

To establish the DIDACT Foundation Academy and to run educational and mentorship events for the next generation of clinical trialists.

To provide support to clinical investigators in the development of trial proposals.

To develop capacity to offer Advisory Board services to pharmaceutical companies who have a need for scientific and UK specific advice, to help with development and commercialisation of their assets.

To further develop capacity to offer Patient and Public Involvement and Engagement services to both DIDACT sponsored and commercially sponsored clinical trials.

To assist the UK haemato-oncology community in the development of prospective registries with the first initiative being the establishment of a UK AML registry (MyeCare).

To hold meetings with the ACT Operational leadership team and senior haemato-oncologists including the TAP and IMPACT leadership teams to comply with the sponsorship oversight responsibilities and the sponsor of investigator-initiated trials. The TAP and IMPACT leadership teams also meet regularly with the operational team of ACT to review and prioritise all new trial proposals.

Public benefit

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charitable company should undertake.

Achievements and performance

Significant activities and achievements against objectives

Clinical Trials

Clinical trial ACT-AML-101 was terminated following the cessation of the development of the compound by Gilead.

No further DIDACT sponsored studies were initiated in 2024, although discussions with several companies have resulted in a number of clinical trial protocols being developed and funding agreed. It is anticipated that these trials will be opening in 2025 at UK TAP and IMPACT centres.

Education

The DIDACT Academy was established as a two year training course to provide haematologists in training, the knowledge and skills they will need to become clinical academic investigators as their careers develop. Training was held face-to-face (April) and on-line (November) and has been well received and well attended. The first cohort completed their two year training programme in April 2025, and plans are being made to deliver the course for a second cohort during 2025-26.

The DIDACT Foundation notes the generous funding of Leukaemia UK in this regard. Additional sources of funding have been secured for the 2025-26 programme in order to ensure the financial stability of the program.

Inaugural SOHO UK meeting

In October 2024 the DIDACT Foundation was approached about the possibility of hosting a UK version of the highly successful international SOHO haemato-oncology meeting. This has received strong support from the UK haemato-oncology community and will be delivered by Hartley Taylor in collaboration with the DIDACT Foundation on 2-3 March 2026. A prominent component of the meeting will be the creation of mentoring opportunities for junior haemato-oncologists in training. Unrestricted educational grants have already been secured in order to support the delivery of the meeting.

Advisory Boards

The first DIDACT advisory board was held for a global pharmaceutical company in 2024. Senior haemato-oncologists supported this meeting and the feedback from the pharmaceutical company and clinical advisors was very positive. Plans are advanced for the development of additional Advisory Boards with the aim of holding a number of Advisory Boards on March 1st 2026, the day before the SOHO UK meeting.

Separately, a small network of patients who have recovered from treatment for AML have been established and is providing valuable input into DIDACT-sponsored clinical trials. The possibility of opening this service to the biopharmaceutical sector through an appropriately robust regulatory structure is being explored.

MyeCare Registry

Work has continued on the development of a registry of patients with newly diagnosed Acute Myeloid Leukaemia (AML). ACT will be the operational partner and Dendrite Clinical Systems Ltd will manage data capture and the database. Following meetings at the European Haematology Association meeting in June, a number of charities and, to date, four pharmaceutical companies have committed financial support for delivery of the MyeCare Registry.

Finalising the data set and contracting with potential funders took place through the second half of the year. The DIDACT Foundation is grateful to Jazz Pharmaceuticals who provided 'pump priming' funding to get much of the preparatory work completed, to enable us to explore other sources of funding. Further funding was kindly provided from Hartley Taylor, Astellas Pharma, AbbVie Ltd and Servier Laboratories.

In addition, ongoing annual support is being received or is expected to be received from a number of commercial and philanthropic 'founding members':

- This registry has been sponsored through funding by Daiichi Sankyo Europe GmbH. Daiichi Sankyo Europe has had no involvement in any aspect.
- Jazz Pharmaceuticals has provided sponsorship and contributed funding to DF in support of MyeCare. Jazz Pharmaceuticals has no involvement in the governance or outputs from MyeCare.

Research Ethics Committee Approval and securing further funding will take place in the first half of 2025, with a 'Go Live' date planned for June/July 2025.

Financial review

Reserves policy

As the Charity is a dynamic and growing organisation in the early start up phase, it has opted to use a reserve fund during the period to enable growth, build long-term capacity, invest in infrastructure and operate effectively to best meet the charitable aims and objectives. The policy remains under review in light of the increased level of activity of the DIDACT Foundation and anticipated new financial streams.

The balance sheet sets out an analysis of the assets attributable to the various funds. These assets are sufficient to meet the charity's obligations on a fund-by-fund basis.

During the year ended 31 December 2024 the total net income and flow of funds in DIDACT Foundation was - £102,464 (2023 -£48,749). Total funds as of 31 December 2024 amounted to -£227,422 (2023 -£124,958), of which all are unrestricted.

The cause for the deficits generated in the current and prior period is due to the charity being in the initial start-up phase. It is anticipated that the financial position will steadily improve as additional income streams are generated to fund the operational costs of the company.

Plans for future periods

Clinical Trials

Three collaborative investigator initiated trials are now at a late stage of development after extensive discussions with partner pharmaceutical companies who have committed funding in principle. It is anticipated that these proposals will receive regulatory approval and open in late 2025 or early 2026. At the same time the DIDACT Foundation will continue to support the academic and nursing community and operational partners to facilitate the development and delivery of blood cancer trials in the UK.

Education

The final DIDACT Academy meeting for the first cohort was held in April 2025, after the British Haematology Society Meeting. The DIDACT Foundation has secured funding from Servier Ltd and Leukemia UK, as well as a one-off grant from Pfizer in order to ensure financial sustainability of this important and innovate educational resource for UK blood cancer clinicians. The DIDACT Foundation will therefore be advertising for and selecting a second cohort of trainees, with the first face to face meeting planned for November 2025

Advisory Boards

DIDACT Foundation will continue to run initiatives such as advisory boards, with plans to run successive and wider initiative events of this nature. Of note, significant opportunity exists early in 2026 with the first SOHO UK congress, which will be attended by International and UK haematology leaders, under the DIDACT Foundation banner. A full day of advisory boards on 1 March, the day before the SOHO UK meeting, are being planned.

MyeCare Registry

This will start to recruit patients in mid-2025. Advisory Boards with founding philanthropic and pharmaceutical company founders will be held 6 monthly after its launch. A MyeCare Steering Committee has been established in order to provide oversight of the Registry. It is anticipated that once established the Registry will attract additional funding streams.

Structure, governance and management

The charitable company is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated 10th December 2021 and registered as a charity on 16th May 2023.

The employed CEO, Cecelia Adetola, left her post in May 2024. The position of Interim CEO is currently filled by Dr Paul Robinson on a consultancy basis.

Day to Day management is provided by the CEO, with support from the TAP and IMPACT leadership teams and an Educational Lead. The DIDACT Foundation Strategic Oversight Committee meets regularly every 6 months in order to review activity and identify future opportunities.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

Trustees are recruited on the basis that they have a significant interest in promoting improvements in outcomes and care for people with blood cancers. Notably, by supporting the implementation of clinical trials and other clinical research, by delivering training programmes for healthcare professionals specialising in blood cancers and involving patients and patient advocates in the development of these activities. The current board of trustees includes a former patient, representatives of blood cancer charities, academic haematologists, a businessman who has raised money for a blood cancer charity and a representative of NHSBT.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

None of the Trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the Trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.

Auditor

Sumer Auditco Limited were appointed as auditor to the company and a decision as to whether they be re-appointed will be made at a General Meeting.

Going concern and subsequent events

The trustees have considered the deficit and continue to support the Charity in identifying new funding opportunities, being instrumental in arranging fundraising activities and mitigating risk.

The Trustees are confident that the Charity can continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from the date of approval of these financial statements.

Disclosure of information to auditors

Each of the Trustees has confirmed that there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditor is aware of such information.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of DIDACT Foundation (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31 December 2024 which comprise the statement of financial activities, the balance sheet and notes to the financial statements, including significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 *The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland* (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

DIDACT Foundation is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is 48 Chancery Lane, London, England, WC2A 1JF.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charitable company's governing document, the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)". The charitable company is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charitable company has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a statement of cash flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charitable company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charitable company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charitable company is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditures are accounted for on the accruals basis. In particular, the costs of charitable activities represents all costs of the charity excluding those appointed to governance costs. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

1.6 Intangible fixed assets other than goodwill

Intangible assets acquired separately from a business are recognised at cost and are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

Intangible assets acquired on business combinations are recognised separately from goodwill at the acquisition date where it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to the asset will flow to the entity and the fair value of the asset can be measured reliably; the intangible asset arises from contractual or other legal rights; and the intangible asset is separable from the entity.

Amortisation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives, once the intangible asset becomes revenue generating, on the following bases:

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1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charitable company reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.9 Financial instruments

The charitable company has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charitable company's balance sheet when the charitable company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charitable company's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charitable company is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Foreign exchange

Transactions in currencies other than pounds sterling are recorded at the rates of exchange prevailing at the dates of the transactions. At each reporting end date, monetary assets and liabilities that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the reporting end date. Gains and losses arising on translation in the period are included in profit or loss.
