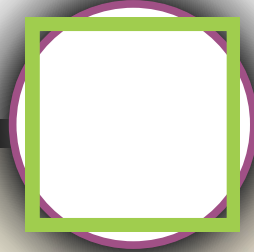

INTRODUCTION TO 15 SQUARE

The Trustees of the Council of 15 Square submit their annual report and financial statements for the year beginning on the 1st April 2024, to the 31st March 2025. 15 Square is a Charitably Incorporated Organisation founded by Dr John Warren in 1995, originally named NORM-UK.

It became a national UK charity in 1998. The objects of the charity are;

To advance the education of the public in all matters relating to circumcision, the foreskin and its function, by pursuing:

- a) the provision of accurate health information and support to both circumcised and intact men who have foreskin issues and to parents/carers and the wider public;
- b) the provision of information regarding conservative techniques to help avoid unnecessary circumcision and assistance to those affected by the issues associated;
- c) the promotion of research into the effects of circumcision and health policies and laws that reflect informed consent around circumcision, the useful results of which will be published for the public benefit.

We offer information on care and foreskin preserving treatments for disorders affecting the foreskin. We also offer help and advise to men and teenagers who have been damaged either physically or psychologically by circumcision.



VISION

At 15 Square we work towards better public and professional recognition of the consequences that can result from circumcision. This includes an appreciation of the long term psychological, physical, and sexual impacts that the procedure can cause as well as the functional value of the foreskin.

We want better services for those who have been affected, and to encourage informed consent and ethical appreciation for this practice. By raising public awareness, we hope that one day unnecessary interventions will be a thing of the past and that everyone who has been negatively affected will have access to support services.

MISSION STATEMENT

We provide information to service users regarding foreskin health conditions and how to resolve them without having to resort to unnecessary and unwanted surgery.

We aim to raise more awareness about the function and value of the foreskin through our website, social media, and awareness projects.

We acknowledge the following side effects that affect some men following circumcision:

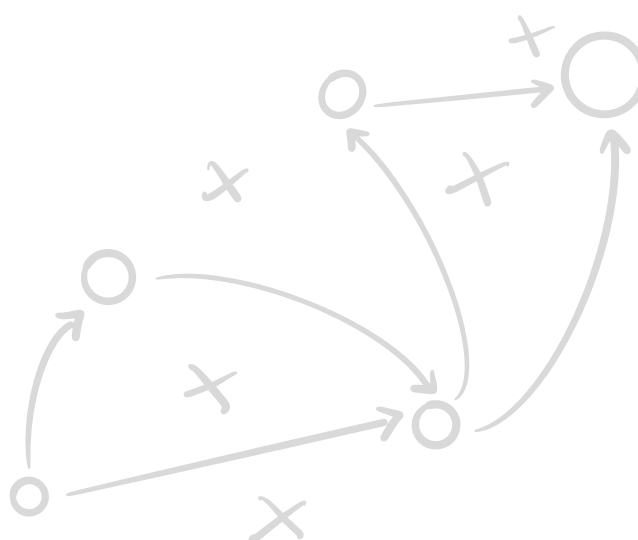
- Psychological damage
- Physical problems
- Issues of sexual function resulting from the above
- Personal dissatisfaction

We work to improve professional recognition of these issues whilst helping those affected to receive support for their conditions.

GOALS

OUR STRATEGY

- 1 To support men who have been affected physically, sexually, or psychologically following circumcision or male genital surgery, and to help intact men find non-invasive alternatives to circumcision in order to prevent unwanted and unnecessary operations.
- 2 Signpost service users and collaborate with professionals and advisers that can assist people who have encountered problems.
- 3 To gather evidence of these problems and the impacts of circumcision.
- 4 To use this evidence to inform health providers & professionals, and improve their understanding, appreciation and practices when interacting with people who have been affected, or when making decisions that will affect men.

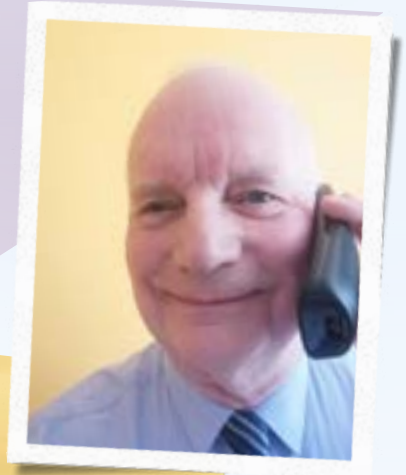


CHAIR'S REPORT

This report covers the period from April 2024 to 31st March 2025.

This year has been one of connection, growth, and increasing influence for 15 Square. Our work has reached further into professional settings, legislative conversations, public spaces, and most importantly, the lives of the men and families we support.

One of our most meaningful contributions came through consultation with an NHS psychotherapist seeking to better understand circumcision trauma experienced by her client. The positive feedback from both practitioner and patient affirmed the value of our expertise, and it has strengthened our commitment to developing training programmes for clinicians across the country. Internally, we strengthened our team with a co-opted trustee, new volunteers and advisors.

Dan Strandjord and Leif Thompson have taken over our peer-support meetings (now a cornerstone of our community). We also welcomed psychology graduate Michael Drash, whose research into circumcision trauma enriches the charity's professional insight. Our online events continued to thrive. This year we hosted several powerful guest speakers, including Ron Lowe and Andrew Little, whose courageous legal challenge against the hospital that circumcised him sparked profound discussion. Their contributions highlight the systemic barriers facing those seeking justice and the urgent need for change.

Education remains central to our mission, and we were proud to welcome another cohort of students from Keele Medical School. Each year, these placements help shape the understanding of future doctors. (An investment that will ripple forward into clinical practice for decades). Internationally, our presence at the Worldwide Day of Genital Autonomy grew stronger, with nine attendees representing 15 Square in Germany.

CHAIR'S REPORT

Our collaboration with allies such as the Darbon Institute continues to open doors for global cooperation and shared advocacy. We also engaged with NHS institutions, including Alder Hey Children's Trust, reviewing their circumcision information resources. While ongoing dialogue proved challenging, we remain encouraged by the research they are undertaking and will continue to promote high-quality, evidence-based healthcare information nationwide.

Our voice was heard in political circles as well. Following the publication of the Board of Deputies' manifesto, we encouraged our community to share diverse perspectives with MPs. We invited our own constituency MP and a local councillor to our offices to discuss oversight, patient experiences, and the need for reform. These conversations have laid important foundations for future policy work.



We further strengthened connections with Healthwatch Manchester, exploring innovative tools to help patients communicate their needs during GP appointments (an initiative we plan to adapt for our own work).

Finally, we were delighted to support A Man and His Circumstance, a new theatre production shining a light on men's intimate health and the lived experiences surrounding circumcision. The play sparked conversations that are long overdue, and we were proud to contribute to its development. In all of these activities, one theme stands out: people are listening. Clinicians, policymakers, students, researchers, and members of the public are increasingly aware of circumcision harm and the need for better support and better information. Our members' courage in sharing their stories continues to guide everything we do.

Thank you to everyone who has contributed this year. Your commitment has moved 15 Square forward in meaningful, lasting ways. Together, we will carry this momentum into the year ahead.

This year, 15 Square has taken meaningful strides to reinforce the expertise of our trustee board. Everything from data protection, safeguarding, signposting, legal or medical advice, stakeholder wellbeing, strategy, and public relations are considerations that 15 Square must be diligently aware of.

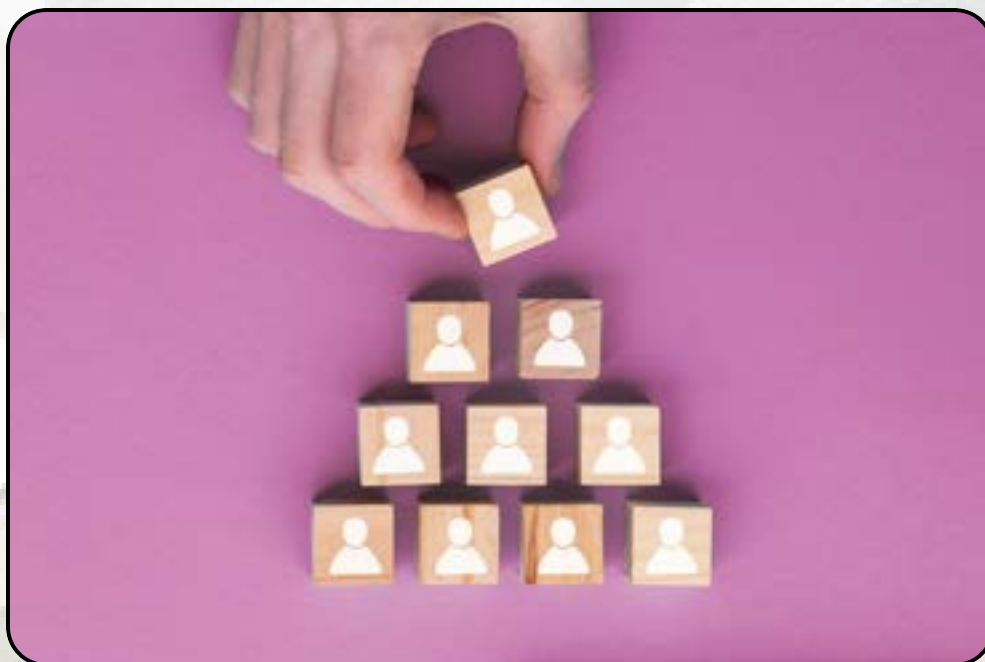
GOVERNANCE REPORT

Whilst we have reason to reflect on successes throughout 2024-25 for the charity, national headlines over the past year have reminded us of the importance of our work and the serious inadequacies in oversight and regulation when it comes to the issue of circumcision. We believe that this has been exacerbated by a lack of historic appetite in pursuing crimes and negligence surrounding circumcision. As society starts to notice these continued failings, we will stand firm in our past convictions; that a free pass for circumcision related negligence or offences is of no benefit to anyone. It unnecessarily endangers the public, and recent case studies in the news demonstrate this.

It is good to see that the recent cases have been given a closer lens of scrutiny than they have historically. We advocate fair application of existing law and standards, appropriate regulation, and better clarity of expectations for practitioners. If these were improved, some of these cases would not have happened.

These cases expose the lack of appropriate oversight with regards to circumcision, as well as criminal negligence as practitioners seek to perform the procedure without giving due attention to the legal requirements. The lax attitude has led to a string of victims. Below are some of the major cases that have been in the headlines during this year;

A Second Offence for Dr. Balvinder Mehat - No Consent Circumcision

"Doctor circumcised second boy without parent's consent" - BBC News

In Nottingham, Dr. Balvinder Mehat performed a circumcision on a seven-year-old boy without obtaining consent from both parents, as required by British Medical Association (BMA) guidelines. The boy's mother had taken him for the procedure without informing his father, who discovered the circumcision only after his son experienced severe complications and required emergency surgery.

This incident highlighted serious consent issues and led to renewed scrutiny of Dr. Mehat's practices, emphasising the critical need for proper consent and safeguarding in medical procedures. Frustratingly, 15 Square have written about Dr Mehat in his previous non-consent circumcision. If his first case had been appropriately addressed by the General Medical Council, this second case will not have happened. At the time, the GMC claimed that they were confident that Dr. Mehat had learned his lesson and taken appropriate measures to not repeat his lax approach to consent. Nevertheless, in this recent case he not only failed to obtain consent, but had the wherewithal to try and obtain a signature from the mother indicating that she was a single parent - thus shifting the liability from himself to the mother. When this signature was presented, the GMC dismissed the case. They failed to address his behaviour once more.

It was only after the father pointed out that the consent form and signature had been acquired after the boy had been circumcised that the GMC were forced to readdress Mehat's actions;

In 2019, 15 Square warned of the consequences of a lax attitude towards Dr. Mehat's actions during his initial hearing with the General Medical Council.

We highlighted several requirements expected of doctors;

- Work in partnership with patients.
- Respect patients' right to reach decisions with you about their treatment and care.
- Give patients the information they want or need in a way they can understand.
- Support patients in caring for themselves to improve and maintain their health.
- Never abuse your patients' trust in you or the public's trust in the profession.

At the time, 15 Square commented:

"These requirements make it all the more insulting when they (the GMC) completely undermine their own standards and regulations. With circumcision they have knowingly been doing this for years, and as expected, their weak stance on it has led to a recent scandal. They recently gave a paltry 1 month suspension to a doctor who had circumcised a 3 month old baby without consent from the baby's mother. This seriously undermines the trust in the GMC to treat these cases with fairness and proportion. Nottinghamshire Police force and the Crown Prosecution Service dropped their charges against the Doctor presumably due to the perceived "lack of public interest" in prosecuting a circumcision with no consent.

The act contravened all of the above requirements and guidelines for practicing doctors. It was left to the General Medical Council to ensure a proportionate consequence. 1 month of suspension does not add up, seriously damaging the reputation of this institution." - 15 Square, 2019: **No Consent Circumcision: An Institutional Failure.**

We hope that the GMC have learned from yet another oversight, though they have cultivated a poor track record in previous years.

Unauthorised "Circumcision Clinic"

This incident underscores the risks associated with unregulated medical practices and the importance of adhering to legal and safety standards to protect patients:

Southend home used as 'circumcision clinic' facing enforcement action

In Southend, the owners of a home used as an unauthorised "circumcision clinic" are facing enforcement action from Southend Council. The property, set up to serve primarily the Jewish community, operated without planning permission, with medical equipment and a waiting area installed in a residential home. Despite warnings and opportunities to comply with regulations, the clinic continued operations, prompting the council to authorise enforcement action.

We applaud Southend Council for holding the unauthorised "clinic" accountable - (it was in fact two laminated signs, a lounge filled with surgical devices and medical equipment). The council gave fair treatment by providing clear and unmistakable warnings prior to action. There are numerous cases of individuals taking advantage of the permissive governance direction surrounding circumcision, but it is rare and brazen to see an entire unregistered premises operating in a residential area. The fact that the council were ignored is concerning, as it demonstrates that the operators were cutting corners in order to continue their business. This venue also provided non-therapeutic practices for the Nigerian and Muslim community.

The Labour Councillor for the ward in question said; *"It is fair to everyone if people do things in the correct process."*

Double Amputation From 'Experienced' Doctor in Australia

"Top circumcision doctor is banned from performing the operations after amputating two little boys' penises, tribunal hears"

In Melbourne, a leading circumcision doctor, Dr. Hershel Goldman, has been banned from performing the procedure after mistakenly amputating the penises of two young boys. The Medical Board of Australia restricted his licence following these incidents, where one child required a blood transfusion and the other faced potential lifelong disfigurement. Despite performing over 20,000 circumcisions in his career, these serious errors led to his ban, which he is currently appealing. This case highlights the severe consequences that can arise from circumcision and underscores the need for stringent medical oversight and the protection of bodily autonomy

The above case shows that even "trusted and highly experienced" practitioners are at risk of making major life threatening and life changing mistakes. We reiterate that every circumcision holds risks, meaning that informed consent is a must. Many parents are completely unaware of the pain, trauma, or general dissatisfaction caused to an unknown number of individuals who are circumcised, causing untold physical, psychological, and sexual impacts.

Unqualified Mohel Arrested in Ireland

A 47-year-old London rabbi, Jonathan Abraham, has been arrested in Dublin and charged with performing an illegal circumcision on a baby boy. Irish law requires a registered medical practitioner, rather than a religious practitioner from a different country. Abraham is a member of the Initiation Society, which has authority in the UK to govern circumcision practices and complaints completely internally, without oversight or regulation from the state. Whilst this allows religious practitioners to perform circumcisions in the UK, Ireland is known for having greater oversight and regulation of this surgical practice. The Initiation Societies training and certification do not carry any legal weight in Ireland.

A similar scenario would be using a driving license from another country that has lax driving standards, and presuming that it qualifies the driver to operate a car world wide.

Under Ireland's Medical Practitioners Act 2007, any surgical procedure (including circumcision) must be carried out by someone who is registered as a medical practitioner in Ireland. As an oddity in the UK, those that are not medically qualified are under no obligation to follow the requirements of the Care Quality Commission or follow medical ethics and take the Hippocratic oath.

We hope that prosecution and pursuit of this case sends a clear message: practitioners must comply with the law of the land in which they are in. The court explicitly noted that Abraham's UK credentials do not exempt him from Irish law and regulation. When Abraham applied for bail, his defence emphasised his deep roots in the UK's religious community. Despite being vouched for by Ireland's Chief Rabbi and his reputation and financial support of his congregation, the law applies to all. The judge eventually granted him €60,000 bail, allowing him to return to London. Whilst improved clarity and training in the UK may prevent future cases of over-reaching by circumcision practitioners, we would also advocate for improved regulation of circumcision by the state or medical institutions rather than relying on the Initiation Society to self-police this practice within religious communities. There are currently no statistics on the complication rate that have been published by the Initiation Society, and all complaints from within communities are effectively sent into a black box.

This is a clear and explicit reminder that religious practices and secular laws are treated differently in each country, and practitioners should ensure that they comply with regional laws and requirements.

YEAR IN REVIEW

1. NHS Psychotherapist Consultation

For several months we were assisting an NHS based psychotherapist. She reached out to us at the request of one of her long-term clients with complex issues, who had recently indicated to her that he had been significantly impacted by circumcision trauma. Whilst we are required to respect confidentiality and specifics, we were familiar with many of the challenges that he faced and we felt confident to consult with the psychotherapist to assist her in better understanding this issue. Verbal feedback from both the psychotherapist and client indicated that they had benefited from our contributions, and upon request of the client, we were also introduced to his mother in order to communicate some of the issues that he presented to us. She was grateful and understanding.

This consultation gave us confidence that as an organisation we can produce educational training programmes and future consultations to support psychotherapists and other professionals that would benefit from training on the impacts of circumcision.

2. New Volunteers for Successful Projects

In the financial year 2024-25 we were glad to welcome Dan Strandjord and Leif Thompson to take over the peer support meetings that are hosted on the 15 Square Discord server. We are grateful to Adrian for starting these meetings which have become a cornerstone of the charity's offerings, and we continue to attract new members who feel that they would benefit from the supportive environment that is cultivated by our members and contributors.

We also welcomed Michael Drash as an advisor to 15 Square. Michael has a Bachelors Degree in Psychology, and his dissertation explored trauma caused by circumcision. Furthermore, Michael has had an insight into this issue for several years, and we welcome his expertise to compliment our current team.

3. Guest Speakers and Online Presentations

One of the most common requests made by members of our online meetings is to invite guest speakers from our wider community of individuals working to raise awareness of circumcision harm. We have hosted several guest speakers this year including Ron Low of [TLCTugger.com](https://www.tlctugger.com) to discuss practical restoration advice, and Andrew Little, plaintiff against the Canadian healthcare institution responsible for his circumcision. We were glad to hear that our friends at GALDEF (Genital Autonomy Legal Defence and Education Fund) had raised support for Andrew Little, a student of medicine from Canada (currently studying in the UK). Andrew is in the difficult position of taking the hospital that circumcised him to court. Earlier this year we invited Andrew to discuss the details of his case and his battle to fight for recognition of the harm that he feels was caused by a lack of information to legitimately give informed consent.

Andrew talked about how the hospital had responded to the court case by reflexively suing Andrew's mother in response. This tic for tac behaviour shows the injustice prevalent in the healthcare system, whereby larger organisations can economically bully many people out of making a legal stance. We admire Andrew's tenacity and conviction, and his recognition that the institutions have historically pushed circumcision upon parents without informed consent and that they should be held accountable.

His talk discussed the barriers between those seeking legal restitution and achieving a successful outcome, including; statute of limitations periods, finding and funding legal representation, imbalance in counsel, risk, the psychological stress of legal battles, the need for parental participation, the lack of case law, and the lack of public awareness surrounding circumcision harm.

The format has been received well and successfully drove engagement to our online meetings, whilst stimulating discussion afterwards. We look forward to hosting talks by LEEANNE MORRIS, NEIL WALBRAN, and ERIC CLOPPER in the forthcoming year ahead.

4. Keele Students

Each year we are proud to host students from Keele Medical School for their second year placements. Last year we hosted 6 in total, however we were asked to host a further 5 first year students for a shorter introduction to 15 Square's work. The induction syllabus that we use has been instrumental in encouraging students to identify their own areas for further research within the medical aspects of circumcision. We continued to use this format this year and welcomed another 3 students. Topics explored include patient information, early interventions, pathologies, patient decision making, anaesthesia, skin treatments, and exploratory case studies.

5. Worldwide Day of Genital Autonomy

In May 2024 nine members and supporters of 15 Square attended this year's Worldwide Day of Genital Autonomy. We were joined by ally and Executive Officer of the Darbon Institute, Tim Arkell. Tim is a human rights lawyer in Australia, and a fervent supporter of our cause, and a member of 15 Square. In addition to the demonstration event, there were outdoor presentations and two networking evenings in which attendees learned of the work from other organisations. We were glad to present, and we have agreed to consider ways in which we can assist the team in Germany (MOGIS E.V) with next years event. The Darbon Institute are well aligned with our organisation, and we continue to have regular meetings and contribute to each other's work, including an awareness campaign, and best practice when working in our sector.

6. Alder Hey

Two of our volunteers have taken on a project to improve online information for patients, parents, and professionals. To do this, they have assessed the information provided by Alder Hey Children's Trust. We chose Alder Hey as we believe that they are the leading organisation in the NHS when it comes to accurate information surrounding circumcision and alternative interventions to issues affecting the foreskin. We believed they would be receptive to our input, and we aimed to raise the bar as high as we can in order to use their information as a professional citation for our own publications. One of our members met with professionals on site in Liverpool. Whilst the conversation was cordial, in the end the trust was not receptive to amending their information before their next review. We had also hoped to establish frequent dialogue, however, we believe that they kept us at arms length in order to ensure that their research is unbiased by association as they are currently conducting research into foreskin alternatives.

Regardless of our challenges in this area, we are grateful that the doctors and academics at the trust are taking this issue seriously and asking the right questions. We will still use their circumcision information resource to cite our own similar conclusions, and hopefully raise the bar across other NHS healthcare trusts that do not have high quality information available to the public and in-house professionals.

7. World Association of Sexual Health Congress

For the 2024 WAS Conference, Tim Hammond from the USA coordinated a recorded presentation between himself, David, and Alphonso (another US contributor). The presentation was targeted towards the clinicians at the World Association for Sexual Health to help enable them to thoroughly understand foreskin restoration based on Tim Hammond's recent research. This was followed by a live session later on. David presented the lived experiences of men and continued to represent our members qualitative stories that we hear through the services that we provide. We intend to continue presenting at these conferences as the attendees tend to be working professionals and academics who would be in key positions to act on their improved understanding and influence other professionals.

8. Board of Deputies - Open Letter to Government

In June 2024, The National Secular Society published an article discussing a manifesto written by the Board of Deputies of British Jews. Within contained the demand for the defence of infant circumcision. Titled 'The Jewish Manifesto 2024', this heavily prescriptive document aimed to act as a united voice of British Jews in order to lobby the political parties of Britain. Whilst we recognise the importance of advocacy, the NSS highlighted the deeply concerning inclusions within their manifesto which affect the work of 15 Square, and continue to imply that all members of the Jewish faith and heritage are in support of infant circumcision. This undermines the efforts of those that critique circumcision and raise ethical and health concerns, both within the Jewish community and outside it.

The manifesto itself encourages British Jews to lobby in favour of protecting ritual circumcision from progressive reform. Many of 15 Square's members come from cultures practising circumcision, so in July of 2024 we encouraged our audience to reach out to their MP's and to give their perspective, to ensure that all voices are accounted for when considering legislation that pertains to circumcision.

In accordance with our own messaging, we invited our constituency MP to our offices in Stone, Staffordshire, to learn about the charity and raise our concerns regarding oversight, record keeping, and the qualitative experiences of the men who feel let down by the status quo. We were grateful that he heard our representations, and we will be relying on his role in future projects when it comes to making improvements to health policy. We also made it clear that the topic of circumcision was *not* an easy way to gain favour with religious communities and that there is a significant cohort of the public that feel strongly about this issue - from within the faith communities, and without. We also welcomed Alec Sandiford, one of our Borough Council representatives who joined us in the office after taking the time to visit us during last year's AGM.

9. Manchester Healthwatch

15 Square have taken an interest in the Healthwatch organisations around the UK. Regional Healthwatch organisations have statutory powers to investigate NHS premises and report on healthcare policy and practices from a watchdog and patient advocacy perspective. Last financial year, Neil Walbran, from Healthwatch Manchester interviewed David for a conversation on healthcare reticence in men and to ask about our work.

This year, David went along to one of their meetings in Manchester to learn more about their work. We took interest in one of Healthwatch's trial schemes launched in Essex. Patients were presented with cards to take into their GP appointments. These cards had information for healthcare providers to inform them about barriers and bespoke conditions affecting them, and the best way to support them whilst taking into account their individual challenges. The QR codes allowed patients and healthcare providers to access simple resources. We would like to adapt this successful scheme for future projects, as it was well received by patients and healthcare providers. Furthermore, it adds legitimacy to the patient's challenges and dispels any assumptions that their complaints are isolated or unique incidents - an issue that we hear of all too often.

10. Awareness and Information Campaign: "A Man and his Circumstance"

"My housemate told me that she and her female friend had a conversation about the health of their female body parts. This stemmed from one of them worrying about themselves but was reassured after having a conversation with their close friend... When my housemate asked if lads have the same sort of conversations I laughed at the possible idea of it."

YEAR IN REVIEW

Since that conversation, Tom decided to write a play that lifted the taboo around intimate men's health issues, and the production heavily featured circumcision. Dealing with issues of recovery, aesthetics, relationship pressure, mockery from friends, coping mechanisms, addiction, and other areas of sexual health, the production aimed to normalise these kinds of discussions and encourage men to seek help when needed. The 15 Square team produced information leaflets and QR codes to access online resources for attendees and went along to support Tom's efforts along with some of the members of the charity. Tom even included an additional scene in the play after hearing from 15 Square about the alternatives available to men, and the psychological impacts of the procedure.

"With seven larger than life characters multi-rolled by three actors this new play looks upon an important message on men's physical health, encouraging men to look out for the signs on their 'down-below', in an attempt to dispel the taboo subject on men's genital health issues. Don't worry there is no nudity in this show!"
