We take an offering to help with the expenses of the hall hire, etc.. At these services we worship the God of the Bible, teach the Bible, pray and fellowship. We also hold smaller home group meetings on a weekly basis meeting in homes.

Structure, Governance and Management:

Lichfield Christian Church is a CIO governed by its constitution and led by a board of trustees who are appointed by the church membership. Trustees meet at least quarterly to oversee the work and ensure compliance with Charity Commission guidance. The church is a member of the Fellowship of Independent Evangelical Churches (FIEC).

Objectives and Activities

Charitable Objects:

The primary objective of Lichfield Christian Church (LCC) is to advance the Christian faith in Lichfield and surrounding communities. This includes offering the message of the Christian gospel as of first priority through teaching, worship, fellowship and outreach. Through these efforts, we seek to foster a sense of community and provide both spiritual and practical support to individuals from all backgrounds.

Main Activities:

During the year the church held weekly Sunday worship services at Darwin Hall community hall. We also held two midweek Bible study meetings – one for women on Tuesday mornings and one on Thursday evenings. We also engaged in prayer gatherings and fellowship meals as well as provided pastoral support to members and visitors. The church also engaged in local outreach activities such as our annual Christmas Carol service and Easter service aimed at sharing the Christian message with the surrounding community.

Public Benefit

The trustees confirm that they have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The church's activities are open to the public and provide spiritual benefit through the teaching of the Bible, opportunities for worship, prayer, and fellowship. Community benefits are provided through pastoral care, open meetings, regular all-age services with a meal afterwards and support for individuals in need.

Achievements and Performance

During the year, average attendance at Sunday services was approximately 25 people. The midweek Bible studies (Tuesdays & Thursdays) each had an attendance on average of about 5-8 people. The church held two special outreach services at Easter and Christmas with the Carol service having nearly 85 people in attendance. We continued regular Bible teaching programmes and members were encouraged and supported in their personal faith and discipleship. Three adults were baptized this year and we welcomed four new members into the church.

Financial Review

Income for the year totalled £20,306, from voluntary donations and offerings. Expenditure amounted to £17,732, mainly relating to hall hire, training (especially our seminary trainee), and missions work.

Reserves Policy:

The trustees aim to hold reserves equivalent to approximately three months of operating costs to ensure financial stability. At the year end, reserves stood at £4500.

Plans for Future Periods

In the coming year, the church plans to strengthen its outreach activities including training for the leaders of the Summer Sports Camp. It will also develop teaching resources, and encourage greater involvement in prayer and midweek Bible study groups. Trustees will also review financial sustainability and pursue more precise budgeting along with regular checks against the budget during the year.

Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed. Safeguarding policies are in place for children and vulnerable adults. Financial controls include dual signatories on bank accounts and regular financial reporting.

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and Charity Commission guidance (CC16). They are also responsible for keeping proper accounting records and safeguarding the charity's assets.

Worship Services and Pastoral Care</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● We held regular worship services throughout the year, including Sunday services, mid-week home fellowship groups, and special services during Easter, Christmas (e.g. carols service), and other significant Christian festivals. Despite challenges presented by the dwindling number of regular church-goers generally in the UK, we've adapted to online and hybrid formats to ensure continuity of fellowship groups and home groups. ● Pastoral care remains central to our mission. Our pastoral team and volunteers provided emotional and spiritual support to members of our congregation, including home visits, hospital visits, and counselling. Our mid-week home fellowship groups of 6 – 10 persons provide a mechanism for pastoral care. <p>2. Community Engagement and Outreach</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● We initiated and supported various community

programmes, including the local food bank to address local needs, particularly assisting vulnerable individuals and families.

- We organized community-wide Christmas Carol service with refreshments (63 attended). This was open to all in our local area and was advertised publicly in our local area. One attendee said that they were "... really keen to sing Christmas carols this year" which shows a benefit to mental health.
- Our outreach activities included support for local charities (food enough for 76 meals provided to the local foodbank) to enhance service provision in Lichfield.

3. Youth and Educational Programs

- Our weekly Sunday School and periodic all-age services programmes continued to thrive, with weekly activities designed to engage young people in understanding the Christian faith and encouraging positive community participation.
- We ran a series of adult education programs, such as Bible study groups, to foster personal growth within our congregation and community.

4. Global Mission Support

- We continued to support missionaries and partner organizations abroad, providing financial aid and supplies to support global humanitarian efforts, such as disaster relief and education initiatives. We support Michael and Lisa Schmid in

		<p>their mission of establishing churches among the Tarahumara tribe in Mexico (SIM – www.sim.co.uk). We also support James and Danielle Gullet, missionary aviator and doula (respectively), in their mission among the aboriginal people in Arnhem Land, Australia (MAF – Mission Aviation Fellowship UK). They are helping with transporting supplies to remote areas and teen pregnancies.</p>

Financial Review

Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period	Para 1.21	Lichfield Christian Church has maintained careful stewardship of funds and resources. We became a CIO this year and the transfer of funds from our Trust to our CIO took place on 30 th November. Thus financial reporting covers 30/11/2023 – 5/4/2024. This year, as a CIO, our total income was £5633.80 while our total expenditure was £7303.62. Over the 12 month financial year however this deficit was much smaller (approximately £900) which is adequately covered by our HMRC Gift Aid subsequent to this tax period as well as by our healthy bank balance.

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

