TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 AUGUST 2025

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the Period ended 31 August 2025.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the Charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)".

Objectives and activities

During 2024–25 Stratford Youth Collective continued to strengthen and expand its offer to young people across Stratford-upon-Avon, building on the foundations established during our first full operating year. With the Hub now firmly established as a safe, youth-centred environment, this period focused on service consolidation, growth in participation, facility development, deeper, sustained partnership working, and amplifying young people's voices across all aspects of our work.

Universal Youth Provision

The Hub remained a central point of access for open-access youth work, providing regular, consistent, high-quality support throughout the year. This included Junior and Senior sessions, The Quiet group, Targeted, thematic group-work, Alternative provision support and holiday activities through the Holiday Activity Fund (HAF).

Key outcomes included:

- 168 sessions delivered
 - Open Access (113), Targeted (41), HAF (14)
- 6,985 hours of youth engagement
 - Open Access (5,489), Targeted (334), HAF (1,162)
- 195 individual young people accessing universal services at least once
 - (Open Access (164), Targeted (35), HAF (86)
- 2,385 attendances.
 - Open Access (1,976), Targeted (182), HAF (227)
- an average of 36 hours of direct youth work support per young person

Of 112 new registrations this year, 79 live within Stratford Town District and 33 within the wider Stratford District. On the 31st of August 2025 there was a total of 234 young people registered on our database.

Growth was seen throughout the year with new young people accessing support, partnerships developing and opportunities for participation. Highlights included: a first residential break in partnership with YHA Edale and supported by Stratford Rotary; an offsite outdoor learning program with The Heart of England Forest providing monthly outdoor learning and experience workshops in local forests; representing young people and supporting the development of Stratford upon Avon Arts & Culture Strategy, facilitating co-created diversionary, engaging interventions and supporting the Serious Crime Strategy, Contextual Safeguarding and Safer Neighbourhoods; continuing to support small group alternative provision with young people not able to access mainstream education.

Public benefit

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Charity should undertake.

Targeted and Specialist Programmes

Lifespace

Community mentoring supported 10 young people over 134 sessions, each lasting 1 hour. Non-attendances, not shown in these statistics, were at a higher level than seen in school settings. This is for reasons including, transport need, very complex emotional wellbeing, hyper anxiety and not-in-education. Typically, within schools young people receive an average of 10 hours support; in community, this is 1/3 higher.

Lifespace evaluates impact using an in-house tool based on robust evidence-based frameworks. This sets and monitors the journey travelled of mentees through self-reflection. From a sample group across multiple settings, 79% reported an overall improvement following Lifespace Mentoring in 24/25. The average increase was 12.6% rising to 17.9% for those recording an overall improvement.

Measuring Impact: Our Three Pillars

- Reduce Distress - 76% saw a positive improvement
- Build Resilience 81% saw a positive improvement
- Achieve More 77% saw a positive improvement

Note. 100% is not expected as the nature of early interventions is to support young people as the wheels start to wobble rather than when the wheels are falling off. Typically young people identify a need for support in 1-2 key areas.

New Meaning:

New Meaning Learning continued making use of a Lifespace mentor, providing 93 hours of support through 31 held weekly with students accessing their alternative education provision. The mentor builds relationship and trust using mentoring skills to support 15 individuals through one-to-one and facilitated group discussions.

The Lifespace mentor is embedded in the pastoral team with New Meaning. New Meaning now additionally buy-in Lifespace to support more young people; a great example of the partnership.

ILEAP

Over the period, ILEAP has grown and diversified provision, with a strong focus on inclusive, community-based activities that promote confidence, independence and social connection. They have delivered a varied weekly programme including: cookery sessions, healthy living clubs, stay & play sessions, meals at local pubs, drama sessions, adult discos, swim sessions and 121 support; including at the Youth Hub.

Small group work and 121 support, allows individuals not yet ready to access larger group activities and creates a pathway to wider participation. The Project Co-ordinator has had a significant impact on delivery, strengthening day-to-day organisation, improving communication, planning sessions and being responsive to need.

Additional capacity has enabled ILEAP to focus on strategic development and income generation to expand provision, quality and the range of activities available in Stratford. Young people previously isolated have built friendships, tried new activities and developed confidence in community settings through a mix of structured sessions and real-world experiences.

One young person joined ILEAP feeling very anxious about leaving the house and engaging with others. Through a combination of 1:1 support at the Hub and gradual introduction into small group activities, they are now attending cookery sessions and meals out with peers. They've built friendships, increased their independence and their confidence has grown noticeably both within sessions and at home.

Warwickshire Pride

Positive, inclusive engagement continued with LGBTQ+ young people supported throughout our programmes, and young people regularly accessing inclusive, open access sessions. New opportunities for improving access to support continue to be reviewed through consultation with young people and partners

Escape Arts

Escape Arts launched Young Creatives in September 2024, emerging from consultation with young people and partners following the creation of the Stratford Youth Collective.

Young Creatives is an Escape Arts programme for young people aged 12-18 working towards an arts award. We support all levels and stages of Arts Award from Discover to Gold, offering opportunities for young people to take part in creative activities from visual arts to music, which they can include in their arts award portfolios - young people can also use creative activities and experiences outside the group to include in portfolios.

Throughout this first year Young Creatives grew and evolved from an initial group of 5 young people to 27 young people registered at the end of the summer term 2025. Young people participated in 40 sessions. 2 young people successfully completing and being awarded their Bronze Arts Award.

Throughout 2024-25 Young Creatives took part in a range of creative activities including working with artists Ants Greentree on a Portraits project and decorating lampshades with Julia Snowden. 2025 also saw the launch of our ongoing musical partnership with Top of the Rock Tulton.

Achievements and performance

Building Development and Hub Improvements

Thanks to Community Infrastructure Levy funding and ongoing support from Stratford District Council, SYC delivered a programme of building improvements aligned with youth-led feedback. Achievements included:

- Continuing phase 2 developments, including plans for renewable, sustainable energy installations, accessibility upgrades and enhanced outdoor space for young people.
- Installation of new kitchen facilities, media equipment, enhanced lighting, and partition walls to create flexible, multi-use spaces.
- Garden design and landscaping in partnership with New Meaning students who supported with design and installation works.

These developments have significantly increased the Hub's capacity, functionality, and sustainability.

Youth Voice and Governance

Young people continued to shape the direction of SYC at every level. The Youth Voice forum met regularly throughout the year with active participation from young people. Young trustees played a central role on the Board, contributing insight, challenge, and leadership. Youth-led consultations informed building developments, session scheduling, safeguarding practices and priority-setting.

Financial review

The Statement of Financial Activities for the charity's period ended 31 August 2025 shows incoming resources of £137,598 and resources expended of £188,334 generating net expenditure of resources of £50,736.

As a result, the net assets of the charity at 31 August 2025 are £97,231.

The Trustees consider the financial performance by the charity during the period to have been satisfactory.

Reserves policy

Our reserves policy aims to maintain a level of unrestricted reserves which covers between 3 to 6 months of core operational expenditure, as recommended by the Charity Commission. The trustees recognise the need to build our reserves to this level and a fundraising strategy is in place, in line with our strategic aims and objectives, to achieve this.

Structure, governance and management

Stratford Youth Collective CIO will be governed by its Articles of Association and Charity Commission.

Stratford Youth Collective CIO will be sole leaseholders of Stratford Youth Hub, where members delivering 'SYC Youth related - and SYC funded programs' will have use of the building. The Hub will also be available to hire during non-delivery periods to deliver a commercial return.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

In establishing SYC, the founding members agreed to create a new CIO, under the name Stratford Youth Collective. SYC will be the mechanism for collaboration and create opportunities for direct funding, with an Independent board of Trustees, made up of at least 50% young people aged 16 - 24.

We have actively recruited to the board 10 trustees, including 4 young trustees representing our 5 member organisations. Trustees bring a variety of personal and professional experiences from across the sector and further afield including, community and voluntary sector leadership, financial, Further Education, Marketing, Safeguarding, Business leadership, Operational and Building management.

Stratford Youth Collectives believes that good quality governance of the organisation can best be delivered by recruiting and training the most able and qualified trustees. Well-qualified, experienced and motivated trustees perform a very valuable contribution to the work of Stratford Youth Collective and effective recruitment and selection are important to the success of the organisation. We are committed to working towards equality and diversity principles.

Trustees are volunteers and are recruited by a range of formal and informal networks. It may be necessary at times to use advertising to attract people with specific skills and Stratford Youth Collective's recruitment policy will inform the process.

Prospective trustees may have been approached by Stratford Youth Collective, approached Stratford Youth Collective themselves, or responded to advertisements. They will be invited to visit and meet with at least two people drawn from staff and trustees where an informal interview will take place, and roles and responsibilities of Trustees discussed. Applicants will be given time to consider joining the Board of Trustees, while existing Trustees will consider the suitability of the applicant. A decision is made by the Chair of Trustees whether to offer the applicant an informal place on the Board of Trustees until the date of the next planned Annual General Meeting. Trustees are only formally confirmed in their role once they have been elected at the Annual General Meeting. The Chair of the Trustees is responsible for ensuring an induction process is completed, and training will be arranged where required.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 AUGUST 2025

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Stratford Youth Collective is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO), registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales. It is governed by a trust deed, dated 14th August 2023, and adopted by its members. The charity's address is Stratford Youth Hub, 2 Birmingham Road, Stratford, CV37 0BH

1.1 Reporting period

The comparative period covers the period from 14 August 2023 to 31 August 2024. This period is longer than 12 months and therefore the comparative figures are not directly comparable with those for the year ended 31 August 2025.

1.2 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)". The Charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a statement of cash flows.

The financial statements have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.3 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.4 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors or grantors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the Charity.

1.5 Income

Income is recognised when the Charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the Charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the Charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Grants without conditions are recognised in the SoFA as the charity is entitled to the income when receivable, including grants given to provide a fixed asset.

1.6 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

1.7 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Leasehold improvements	15 year straight line
Fixtures and fittings	25% Reducing Balance
Computers	25% Reducing Balance

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.8 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the Charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.10 Financial Instruments

The Charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the Charity's balance sheet when the Charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the Charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.11 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the Charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.12 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the Charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

The Police & Crime Commissioners Office grant provided for the delivery of Alternative Provision activities, covering staff time and activity delivery costs.

Works relating to the Community Infrastructure Levy grant from Stratford-upon-Avon District Council have enabled us to improve facilities, access and usage of our space, The Youth Hub. Works have taken place throughout the period improving our kitchen facilities, making the lighting more efficient and appropriate for use and creating additional spaces through the erection of partition walls and development of the garden. Work is ongoing and further improvements into the next period.

The Holiday Activity Fund covers staff time and activity costs that take place during the school holiday time.

BBC Children in Need, Warwickshire County Council Grant and Heart of England Community Fund have contributed towards staff time and delivery costs associated with our varied programme of group-based activities held throughout the year.

A research project for monitoring and evaluation tools used for young people's services was completed with and supported by YMCA George Williams College.

Rotary Club of Stratford provided for additional time and transport costs associated with a Youth Hostel Association funded summer residential break.

29th May 1961 grant covered core costs and overheads.

Lifeways Trust and Municipal Charities grants contribute to the Alternative Provision project work and supports associated staff time and activity delivery costs.

Stratford Town Trust are our primary funder who provide funding that covers our core costs and enables us to provide our varied programme of support together with our collective members and partners.
