Para 1.20	Bracknell Community Church has made significant strides in supporting individuals and enriching the wider community through a broad range of initiatives. Below is a summary of the main achievements across various programs and activities: 1. Sunday Services The church's regular Sunday services have provided a place for worship, reflection, and spiritual nourishment. These services are open to everyone, fostering a sense of community and belonging. They serve as a spiritual anchor for many individuals and families, offering guidance, support, and the opportunity to explore and deepen their faith. Impact: • Strengthening spiritual life and faith of attendees. • Offering a space for personal reflection and connection to God. • Providing emotional and psychological support, especially during times of crisis. 2. CommuniTea - Coffee Mornings - The church's coffee mornings have created a welcoming, informal environment where individuals of all ages, backgrounds, and walks of life from the community can come together for fellowship and conversation. These gatherings provide an opportunity for people to build relationships, share life experiences, and receive social support.

		Impact: • Combatting social isolation, particularly for older adults or those new to the community. • Encouraging social inclusion and cross-generational interaction. • Offering a space for individuals to discuss personal challenges in a non-judgmental setting. 3. Bible Courses & Alpha Courses The church runs Bible courses to provide deeper theological understanding and personal application of scripture. The Alpha course, in particular, offers a welcoming environment for people to explore the basics of Christianity in a conversational setting. These courses have led many individuals to a deeper relationship with God and a stronger understanding of their faith. Impact: • Facilitating spiritual growth and a deeper understanding of Christian teachings. • Helping seekers explore the Christian faith in an open and non-pressured environment. • Providing a pathway for personal transformation and conversion. 4. Youth Groups The youth groups serve as a vital support network for young people, helping them navigate the challenges of adolescence with a Christian foundation. These groups foster strong bonds among young individuals and equip them with the tools to make positive choices in their lives. Impact: • Supporting young people in their spiritual, emotional, and social development. • Providing mentorship, role models, and a safe space for personal expression. • Encouraging positive behavior and moral decision-making among youth.
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5. Children's Sunday Kids Work

The children's Sunday school program provides age-appropriate teaching on the Bible and Christian values, instilling the foundations of faith at an early age. Through fun, engaging activities, children learn about God's love and how to live according to Christian principles.

Impact:

- Nurturing the spiritual and moral development of children.
- Instilling core values such as kindness, honesty, and respect for others.

6. Life Groups

Life groups (small groups) provide an intimate setting for Bible study, prayer, and mutual support. 9. Mission Partners

We support other charitable organisations in the UK and overseas with the same purpose, involved in community uplift, helping the poor, education.

No comparatives are provided as this was the first year of Bracknell Community Church operating as a CIO. Total costs paid were £71,138 resulting in a net surplus of £4,908. Opening funds of £3,847 were also contributed resulting in a net cash position of £8,755 as at 31 March 2025. Claims from Gift Aid declarations relevant to the year totalled £12,398, which were submitted and received after the year-end date.

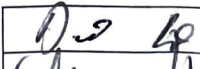
