



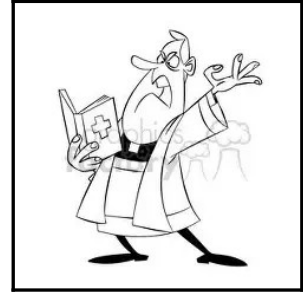

MINISTER'S REPORT

As this is my first full year reporting as minister of Clare Baptist Church, it feels important to begin with gratitude. I formally began in post in July last year, having had the privilege of moderating the church for the preceding year. Stepping into the role officially has only deepened my appreciation for this fellowship and for the faithfulness that has shaped it over many years.



I reflect on this year with both deep thankfulness and a growing sense of holy urgency.

Signs of Hope

There are many reasons to give thanks. Our Christmas services were a genuine encouragement. The building was packed, the singing strong, and the welcome tangible. More importantly, conversations flowed easily. People lingered longer. There was openness throughout. It reminded us that, even in a secular age, there remains spiritual curiosity and a willingness to engage when the invitation feels warm and genuine.

It has been especially encouraging to see individuals express their faith more openly and begin to explore baptism. When someone begins to ask serious questions about following Jesus — or takes steps toward publicly declaring faith — we are witnessing the quiet work of the Spirit. These moments are deeply significant. They remind us that the gospel is not simply heritage; it is present reality.

Allsorts toddler group continues to be a quiet but powerful expression of the kingdom of God. Week by week, relationships are forming. Trust is growing. Parents and carers are finding connection in what can often be an isolating season of life. What looks like simple play and conversation is, in truth, incarnational ministry.

Likewise, “**Together We Can**”, our Friday SEND group, has become a safe and compassionate space for families navigating additional needs and the complexities of school non-attendance. Here, church is not theory but presence. Not fixing but listening. Not programmes but compassion. This ministry reflects something deeply aligned with the heart of Christ.

Our Monday night **Bible Study** continues to be a particularly significant space. This group is intentionally shaped for those who are newer to faith or still exploring. In a culture where many have little biblical background, the simple act of opening Scripture together, asking honest questions, and learning without pressure is quietly radical. It is foundational discipleship.

Alongside this, we are grateful for the other **homegroups** of the church that meet regularly. These gatherings are essential to the health of our church — places where friendships deepen, Scripture is wrestled with, and prayer becomes personal. In a larger gathering we worship together; in smaller groups we grow together.

We are also thankful for the steady and compassionate ministry of the **Moving On Bereavement Group**, which continues to offer gentle support to those navigating grief.

In a society that often struggles to sit with loss, this group embodies patience, listening, and hope. It is a quiet but deeply significant ministry of presence.

Similarly, the **Ladies' Fellowship** remains an important thread in the fabric of our church life. For many, it provides friendship, faith, laughter, and mutual encouragement. Its faithfulness over many years is not something to be overlooked; it continues to nurture belonging and spiritual growth in ways that are both relational and enduring.

Even our church sales and clean-up days have been highlights. There is something deeply formative about working side by side — clearing, organising, serving tea, tidying corners that have been neglected. These moments build more than funds or order; they build shared ownership and shared joy. They remind us that church is not a performance to attend, but a community to belong to. These are faithful signs of life. And faithfulness matters.

Gratitude for Leadership and Service

I want to express particular thanks to our deacons — **Geoff, Rita, Colin, Tim, John, Cheryl, Vivienne and Gillian** — for their service and support over the past year. Their wisdom, prayerfulness, and willingness to shoulder responsibility quietly and consistently have been a gift to this church and to me personally. Leadership in a local church is rarely glamorous; it is often hidden, sacrificial, and steady. I am deeply grateful for the way they serve.

I am also thankful that **Tom Culpin has been appointed as our Church Administrator**. This is an important development in the life of Clare Baptist Church. In a context where governance, safeguarding, communication and organisation are increasingly complex, having dedicated administrative support strengthens both our compliance and our capacity for mission. It enables us not simply to maintain what we have, but to steward it well.

A Church Marked by Love

One of Clare Baptist Church's greatest strengths is its genuine love and care for one another. There is pastoral attentiveness here. Practical help is offered quietly. Prayer is natural. When someone is unwell or burdened, others notice. When someone rejoices, others celebrate. This church feels like family. In a fragmented and often lonely society, that is a precious gift. Many churches would long for this depth of warmth and belonging.

But we must also be honest: family warmth, while precious, is not the same as missional fruitfulness. A church can feel deeply caring internally and yet slowly shrink externally. Love must not only circulate within; it must overflow outward.

A Changed and Changing World

We are no longer living in a culture where church attendance is assumed, where Christian literacy is widespread, or where faith holds social privilege.

Clare is not immune to the wider shifts taking place across the country:

- Younger generations do not carry inherited habits of Sunday worship.
- Institutional trust continues to decline.
- Time is fragmented and pressured.
- Digital life reshapes belonging.
- Moral and spiritual assumptions are shifting.

The world in which many of us first came to faith no longer exists.

We cannot simply preserve what once worked and assume it will bear the same fruit.

Nor can we rely on heritage or familiarity to sustain us. The gospel does not change, but the context always does.

The question before us is not whether we are faithful to our past, but whether we are faithful to Christ in the present.

A Necessary Examination

There are questions we must be willing as a church family to ask:

- Are we structured for a world that has gone?
- Are we equating faithfulness with familiarity?
- Have we confused comfort with obedience?
- Are we prepared to try new things, even if not all of them succeed?

At times in church life, certain idols can subtly shape us — control, predictability, numbers, technique, nostalgia. These are not evil in themselves, but they can quietly become ultimate. The Spirit exposes these not to condemn us, but to free us.

Repentance in this context does not mean despair. It means reorientation. It means loosening our grip on what feels secure so that we can hold more tightly to Christ.

The Call to Faithful Imagination

The signs of hope already present among us — people exploring baptism, families finding support, Scripture being opened with honesty, genuine community life — suggest that the Spirit is not finished with Clare Baptist Church.

But hope requires response.

If we are to flourish in this season, it will likely require:

- Experimenting with new rhythms of gathering and engagement.
- Equipping more people to serve and lead.
- Deepening discipleship beyond Sunday worship.
- Strengthening pathways for those exploring faith.
- Being prepared to release activities that no longer serve our calling.

Change is rarely comfortable. Yet the New Testament church was marked by movement, adaptation, and Spirit-led courage. We are not being asked to abandon who we are. We are being asked to discern who we are becoming.

Confidence for the Future

My confidence does not rest in strategy or innovation. It rests in Christ. Jesus continues to call people. He continues to form disciples. He continues to build his church.

We are not starting from decline; we are starting from grace.

There is real love here.

There is authentic faith.

There are tangible signs of kingdom life.

But love must widen.

Faith must deepen.

Courage must grow.

The invitation before us is not to anxiety, but to attentiveness. Not to frantic reinvention, but to Spirit-led obedience.

If we remain rooted in Christ, open to change, and willing to be shaped, I believe we will not simply preserve what has been — we will become a more faithful, outward-looking, and courageous expression of the body of Christ in Clare and the surrounding communities.

The future will not be secured by nostalgia. It will be shaped by prayer, repentance where needed, imagination, and shared resolve.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Writing an annual report—my fourth one this year—always brings the same challenge, deciding what to include and when to stop. I hope that this overview of the year, from January through to December, reflects God's faithfulness to us and our desire to follow Him where that may lead.



We began the year with the completion of the Church Profile, prepared by Simon and the Deacons, ready for church discussion at the February Q&A shared lunch. Shortly afterwards, the Deacons met with David Mayne to explore Simon's sense of calling to serve as Minister at Clare.

This led to a special church meeting in March, where members voted unanimously to call Simon as our Minister. Simon gave notice to his then-current role, and we agreed that his Induction would take place on 26th July. A day filled with praising God, joy, laughter, excitement and, of course, food. Our prayers and thoughts were with Simon and Kristy as they prepared for significant changes in their daily lives and for us as a fellowship as we continue to follow God's leading.

The year also saw the completion of the Quinquennial Report, which remained a regular item on both Deacons' and Church Meeting agendas. Alongside this, we continued to address a range of practical matters—electrical, technological, and structural—ensuring our buildings and systems remain safe, functional, and fit for purpose.

Under Simon's guidance, we held two excellent Prayer Weekends as we sought God's will for CBC and our wider community. We also shared a very different but deeply moving Maundy Thursday Communion service.

Throughout the year, Simon introduced a number of teaching themes on Sunday mornings, including Pressure Points, Jonah, and the Alpha Course. The Alpha Away Day at Clare Priory was a particular highlight, giving us space to reflect on the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in the life of the church.

Two new initiatives joined the church's weekly activities: Cook & Connect, our partnership with H.Y.F.C., and Together We Can, an offshoot of Allsorts.

We also enjoyed shared lunches, held a Spring and Christmas Sale, supported Ride & Stride, Link to Hope, and hosted a morning collection for TWAM and ReCycle. None of these would have been possible without the generosity, willingness, and hard work of so many people across the fellowship.

In fact, each one of you has contributed in one way or another to ensure our church building is not only "fit for use", but it shines out the Love of God in all it does.

During the year, we gave thanks for the lives of Howard Marshall and Jenny Watt—two faithful servants of God who contributed to the life of the church in very different but deeply valued ways.

As one year closes and another begins, we are reminded that we serve a faithful God—one who delights in our praise and worship and continues to lead, equip, and shape us into His people as we move into 2026.

During the year, we said “Goodbye” to several Mums/Carers as their children started Primary school. Several of these Mums had joined during the Covid restrictions. We also said “Goodbye” to Julie and Sarah, who decided it was time to move on as their children became older. We welcomed Meghan to the team, who came filled with ideas and offers of help. We also welcomed Simon, who quickly settled in, whether sitting on the floor playing with the children or chatting with parents/carers. Following Simon’s suggestions, we introduced a weekly craft activity in September, loosely based on the themes from the toddler book Tiddlywinks. Both children and parent/carers join in with sticking and colouring. These pieces of art are on our new News Board in the back hall.

One of the Mums suggested introducing a clothes swap, which we have planned for 2026.

Each week brings countless conversations with parents and carers—conversations that often end with the offer of prayer. The Prayer Team, led by Jenny, continues to pray faithfully for the needs shared from these conversations as well as the ongoing challenges we face week by week. Alongside the prayer team, there is a wonderful team of volunteers who willingly adjust to a continually “moving fest” with no two weeks being the same.

Our ongoing prayer and aim is that Allsorts will be seen as more than just a baby and toddler group, but through our welcome, conversations, prayer and simple acts of love, all who attend may sense something of God’s kingdom at work.

Monday Young Mums Bible Study Group

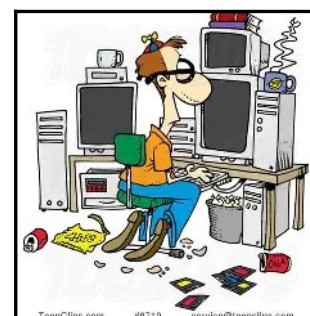

Tech Desk Report 2025

The operation of the Tech Desk through 2025 continued run smoothly, and once again, my thanks go out to Tim Hayes and Cheryl Trundle for their support in operating the Tech Desk during the Sunday morning services throughout the year.

There was, however, a major technical issue that became apparent throughout 2025 with respect to 2 display monitors in the church – the large front-left main monitor mounted to the left of the cross and the smaller monitor on the right side of the church – intermittently going blank. This led to the unexpected cost of replacing faulty interface plates, not for the first time. Both monitors have been fine ever since.

In August, we had a “health check” visit from Clarity Sound and Vision, an organisation that specialises in the installation of sound, lighting and audio-visual systems for schools and churches. They spent a morning with me in the church checking over our audio and video installation and did make adjustments that did improve the quality of sound and video quality we now have. They also provided a report, detailing recommendations that we could make to further improve our installation. Some of these recommendations have now been put in place.

A new “touchscreen” monitor was purchase for the Tech Desk back in October to allow the digital audio mixing console sliders to be operated by finger touch and so work independently from the computer mouse.

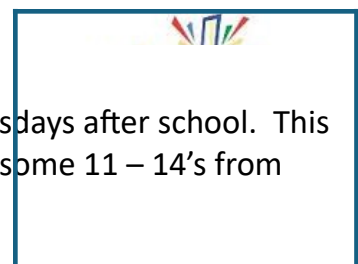
To improve the quality of the audio that the music group hear while playing in the service, a new foldback speaker system was installed back in December. These new speakers, which have individual volume and tone controls, are designed to project audio directly towards the musicians and singers, allowing them to hear themselves and their music group colleagues more clearly.

As we move into 2026, we are looking to upgrade the Tech infrastructure once again by purchasing a high definition PTZ camera so as to improve the video quality that is presented over Zoom and to the in-church monitors.

SUNDAY CLUB

Sunday Club continues to meet every Sunday (except for the 1st Sunday of the month, which is communion.)

There is currently only one child within Sunday Club (occasionally augmented by visitors), and the team of leaders are working hard to ensure that he has an interactive session and learns more about the stories in the bible which assist us in how to live.



You will see changes during the year as we showcase the stories we are looking at on the board in the hall. You will have seen our Harvest themes work that included stories from the bible that included food and harvest such as Ruth, wedding in Cana and the parable of the mustard seed. We have moved on to cover Joseph, Joshua and Caleb prior to looking at the Easter story.

We continue to utilise 'Superbook' resources, which is a CBN production, which comes with memory verses, bible videos and activities to support the learning for 5–11-year-old children with pre-prepared 3 sessions per overall topic. We adapt the activities to support the number of children who are present, but the resources provide some great resources for children.

Thank you to the team for their effort and commitment to assisting L's spiritual growth over the year, and we look forward to where this next year takes us.

The beginning of the year did not start too well as both the January speakers had to cancel. Fortunately, from February onwards we welcomed speakers who broadened our understanding of the Christian faith:

Rev. Moses (Haverhill Methodist Church) shared his remarkable journey from India to Cliff College and into Methodist ministry, offering an insight into his calling. Jeanie Bloomfield (Bury St Edmunds Restore) spoke movingly about her life story and the transformative work of Restore in supporting those facing hardship. Rev. Mark Woodrow and Rev. Dr. Karen Smith reflected on their sabbaticals, giving us a glimpse into the learning, rest, and renewal that shape their ongoing ministry.

We learnt about local charities that care and seek to conserve our natural world and responsible living. Foxearth Meadows introduced us to their conservation work, especially their efforts to protect and encourage a wide variety of dragonfly species. Hundon Hedgehogs and the Suffolk Owl Sanctuary helped us appreciate the importance of local wildlife care and the dedication required to protect vulnerable species. West Suffolk Waste Services explained what happens to the rubbish collected from our dustbins, helping us understand the journey of our waste and the importance of responsible disposal. Daniel from Pear & Co shared his passion for reducing plastic use and outlined the aims and objectives of the High Street shop. We explored the fascinating world of antique dolls, discovering their history and craftsmanship.

Our chosen charities for the year were T.W.A.M and C.H.E.S.S. (who provides support to homeless persons). These received £125 each; we also gave £50.00

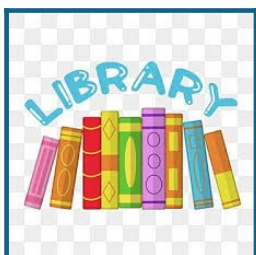

Mainly because we were without a minister for the first six months of 2025, we ended the year in a reassuringly comfortable position financially – not only with a General Fund balance in hand of £21,473, but also with a newly created Property Fund balance of £15,500.



The Property Fund was created in light of the Quinquennial Report, alongside our recognition that our ageing (and Listed) building is always likely to be in need of costly repairs and maintenance.

We now look forward to 2026, when we shall have a full year's costs but set off by the rental income from the manse – and by your generosity. Gift Aid continues to make a substantial contribution to income – our last quarter's claim amounted to £3,225.

3. Reserves Policy The deacons recognise that the church needs reserves to maintain its commitments for a given period of time should an unexpected eventuality reduce its income or increase its expenditure.		
A reserve, designated "Contingency Fund" and shown separately in the annual accounts is therefore maintained at £20,000 for this purpose.		
A second reserve, designated "Property Fund" has been created this year, following a Quinquennial Report and in recognition of the building's age. This currently stands at £15,500.

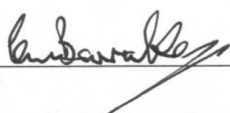

Basis of independent examiner's report

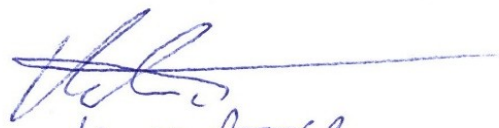
