Report of the Trustees for the year to 31 March 2025

(including the Directors' Report prepared in accordance with the Companies Acts)

The Foundation was constituted as a company limited by guarantee on 28 January 1955 and is governed by its Articles of Association.

The Trustees present their annual report and accounts for the Foundation together with the directors' report prepared in accordance with the Companies Acts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 10 and with the Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015)

As a company limited by guarantee, all the Trustees referred to in these financial statements also act as Directors.

Objects

The Mount Everest Foundation's objects are to encourage and support expeditions for the exploration and research in the mountain areas of the world. It pursues these objects mainly by making grants to appropriate expeditions. An independent Screening Committee considers all applications in the first instance and takes expert advice where appropriate. The Screening Committee's recommendations are then considered by the Management Committee of Trustees.

It is a condition of all grants that a detailed post-expedition report must be submitted. These are held in the libraries of the Alpine Club, the Royal Geographical Society, and the British Mountaineering Council, and they are summarised annually in the Alpine Journal. These reports are available online via the MEF website. Medical and scientific work is also written up in appropriate professional journals

Grants approved for the year totalled £62,950 to 23 expeditions. (2023-24 £112,800 to 27 expeditions) Expedition grants were made to expeditions to Greenland, Canada, Svalbard, Kyrgyzstan, India, Pakistan, Bhutan and Nepal and other academic research was undertaken.

At the Kendal Mountain Festival a promotional film on our activities was shown, and at a number of mountain festivals around the world. An MEF sponsored lecture at the Kendal Mountain Festival was a sellout with the proceeds donated to Nepalese Sherpa welfare.

A lecture at the RGS on Women with Altitude celebrated the life of Junko Tabei and was attended by over 20 British female summiteers of Everest. A fundraising lecture by Mick Fowler and Victor Saunders, sponsored by Berghaus, raised over £5,000 for our funds. The trustees supported a forthcoming film of the ascent of Kangchenjunga in 1955 commemorating the first grant made by the MEF.

10 out of 11 expeditions from 2023 engaged with the new environmental impact report process. This included the calculation of carbon offsets, arranging for the disposal of human waste, and a reduction of open fires/ use of solar power where possible. 11 out of 15 expeditions from 2024 engaged through carbon offset and carry out of waste, as well as wider social impacts such as visiting schools and working with tourism bodies to improve environmental practices.

The Trustees are delighted to confirm that His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester has agreed to be our Patron.

The Trustees, having regard to the Public Benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission, in accordance with Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011, consider that the purpose and activities of the charity satisfy the requirements of the public benefit test set out in Section 4 of the same Act.

Results

The financial statements are set out on pages 6 to 12.

In respect of the year, 23 expeditions were awarded grants of between £1,000 and £6,500 each. The Young Alpinists Group was also supported with a grant, along with identical sums from the Alpine Club and the BMC. These grants were made from investments and other income, arising from funds which are held for such purposes. Total grants awarded for the year amounted to £62,950 (2023-24 £112,800). The Trustees consider that all grants awarded in the year 2024-25 met the requirements of the Foundation's constitution.

Net outgoing resources for the year after grant awards amounted to £19k. Net investment profits were 24.0k. (2023-24 £192.4k)

The Foundation's cash resources at the balance sheet date were sufficient to meet the liabilities outstanding at the time. The Foundation's performance is dependent upon the level of income and gains arising from its investment portfolio, and from bequests and donations made.

Management Committee

The Foundation is managed by its Management Committee. This Committee normally consists of eight persons, appointed equally by the Alpine Club and the Royal Geographical Society, each of whom holds office for six years. Committee members are Trustees of the Foundation. They appoint, as officers, a Secretary and a Treasurer. Trustees are appointed according to suitability and knowledge of mountaineering and remote regions of the world.

The Foundation's powers of investment are set out in its Articles of Association and give the Trustees wide discretion. It has been authorized by the Charity Commissioners to delegate investment management appropriately. The Foundation's investment strategy is to maintain the real value of its funds while subject to this, generating the maximum income possible on a medium risk profile. This strategy does not affect the Trustees' discretion to spend capital, if they consider it appropriate.

Future ability to award grants is dependent upon the success achieved by the investment managers and from additional fund-raising events carried out from time to time.

Reserves policy

The Foundation's reserves policy is to maintain the real value of its fund while generating the maximum income on a medium risk basis.

Its general fund reserves as at 31 March 2025 were £2,228k (2024 £2,223k)

Risk Assessment

The Management Committee has reviewed the major risks to which it believes the foundation is exposed and has established procedures to mitigate them.

The principal risks are that grants may be made to expeditions which do not meet the objects of the Foundation. The Trustees take periodic legal advice to ensure compliance, and all grant applications are scrutinized by the Screening Committee and the Management Committee.

In addition, if the investments held by the Foundation were to fall in value substantially, or investment income to decline, the ability to award grants would be impaired. This risk is mitigated as far as possible by the appointment of professional investment managers and by regular reviews of their performance by a sub-committee of the trustees.

Audit exemption and Special Provisions

This report is prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice in Auditing and Reporting by Charities (SORP FRS102 – effective 1 January 2019) and the provisions applicable to companies subject to the small companies' regime in Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006.

The Trustees have taken advantage of the exemption from audit conferred by section 477 of the Companies Act 2006 and the accounts for the year are unaudited following a change in the company's Articles of Association.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE MOUNT EVEREST FOUNDATION

I report to the Trustees on my examination of the accounts of the Company for the year ended 31 March 2025.

Responsibilities and basis of report

As the charity the Trustees of the Company (and also its directors for the purposes of company law) you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 ('the 2006 Act'). You are satisfied that an audit is not required for this year under charity or company law and that an independent examination is needed.

Having satisfied myself that the accounts of the Company are not required to be audited under Part 16 of the 2006 Act and are eligible for independent examination, I report in respect of my examination of your charity's accounts as carried out under section 145 of the Charities Act 2011 ('the 2011 Act'). 
Independent examiner's statement

Accounting Policies and Notes to the Financial Statements
Year ended 31 March 2025

Basis of Accounting

These financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of investments, and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and applicable accounting standards, including:

- The Statement of Recommended Practice (revised 2015) — Accounting and Reporting by Charities
- The Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland.
- Quoted Investments

Investments are stated at Stock Exchange market values at Balance Sheet dates, less any provision for impairment.

Income and Expenditure

Investment income is recorded, inclusive of tax deducted at source, on an accrual's basis, including dividends declared, but not yet paid. Capital payments for accrued income are deducted from income as received. Expenditure is included on an accruals basis. The Foundation has no unrecognized gains or losses which are not reflected in these accounts. All amounts relate to continuing operations.

Bequests and legacies

These are recognized when it is reasonably certain that monies will be received, and the amount is known. Where there is uncertainty as to amounts, a deferred asset is established. Where there is greater uncertainty, bequests are not recognized in that financial period.

Grants Payable

Grants authorised at the year-end are included under creditors.

Cash Flow

The financial statements do not include a cash flow statement because the Foundation, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under Financial Reporting Standard 102.

Total funds

All funds are held without restriction.

- 1) The Foundation is limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of the members in the event of winding up is limited to £1 per member.

2) Investment Management

The investment managers are remunerated by a management charge. The management charge net of dealing costs was estimated at £10,480 (2024 £13,706). During the year the trustees changed investment managers from Quilter Cheviot to Sarasin. All stocks bar two property funds were sold and proceeds reinvested in their climate active endowment fund, which is a charitable authorised investment fund. The value of the fund has reduced since acquisition by £129,567.

3) Investments

The revaluation reserve on 31 March 2025 was a loss of £137,528. All previous investments have been disposed of and reinvested. The original cost of investments was:

These are held in the libraries of the Alpine Club, the Royal Geographical Society, and the British Mountaineering Council, and they are summarised annually in the Alpine Journal. Medical and scientific work is also written up in appropriate professional journals

Grants approved for the year totalled £112,800 to 27 expeditions. (2022-23 £84,500 to 23 expeditions) Expedition grants were made to expeditions to Alaska, Borneo, Greenland, Chile, Svalbard, Peru, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, India, Pakistan, Bhutan and Nepal and other academic research was undertaken.

The 70th Anniversary of the Ascent of Everest was celebrated in London last June with a joint lecture at the RGS organised largely by the Himalayan Trust but run jointly with the MEF. A promotional film on our activities was produced, which was shown at the event. A fundraising lecture at the RGS was given by Brian Hall last October. This raised money for the Nepal Mountaineering Assn Welfare Fund to whom we gave a donation of £1200. A seminar at Plas y Brenin on Women's Expeditions was supported by the MEF. An MEF sponsored lecture at the

Kendal Mountain Festival was a sellout. One expedition in 2023 to Jugal Spire, supported by the MEF was given a Piolet d'Or for an outstanding achievement last year. The trustees agreed in December 2023 to extend the grants which are made to include Nepalese nationals in future grants. One expedition from Nepalese mountaineers has already been made a grant for a climbing expedition to the west of Nepal during 2024.

The Trustees, having regard to the Public Benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission, in accordance with Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011, consider that the purpose and activities of the charity satisfy the requirements of the public benefit test set out in Section 4 of the same Act.

Results

The financial statements are set out on pages 7 to 13.

In respect of the year, 27 expeditions were awarded grants of between £1350 and £6,500 each. These grants were made from investments and other income, arising from funds which are held for such purposes. Total grants awarded for the year amounted to £112,800 (2022-23 £ 84,500) . The Trustees consider that all grants awarded in the year 2023-24 met the requirements of the Foundation's constitution.

Net outgoing resources for the year after grant awards amounted to £65,600 (2022-23 £31,700). Net investment profits were £192,400 (2022-23 £26,800). The net increase in funds for the year was £124,000 (2022-23 decrease £246,000).

The Foundation's cash resources at the balance sheet date were sufficient to meet the liabilities outstanding at the time. Its activities are expected to increase following the lifting of current travel restrictions. The Foundation's performance is dependent upon the level of income and gains arising from its investment portfolio, and from bequests and donations made.

The Trustees present their annual report and accounts for the Foundation together with the directors' report prepared in accordance with the Companies Acts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 10 and with the Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015)

As a company limited by guarantee, all of the Trustees referred to in these financial statements also act as Directors.

On 23 November 2023 the company amended its Articles of Association so as to no longer require an annual audit by default.

Objects

The Mount Everest Foundation's objects are to encourage and support expeditions for the exploration and research in the mountain areas of the world. It pursues these objects mainly by making grants to appropriate expeditions. An independent Screening Committee considers all applications in the first instance, and takes expert advice where appropriate. The Screening Committee's recommendations are then considered by the Management Committee of Trustees.

It is a condition of all grants that a detailed post-expedition report must be submitted. These are held in the libraries of the Alpine Club, the Royal Geographical Society, and the British Mountaineering Council, and they are summarised annually in the Alpine Journal. Medical and scientific work is also written up in appropriate professional journals

Grants approved for the year totalled £84,500 to 23 expeditions. (2022 £144,000 to 34 expeditions Expedition grants were made to Alaska, Greenland, Chile, Iceland, Norway, Ecuador, Peru, Tajikistan, India, Pakistan, and Nepal and other academic research undertaken.

The Trustees, having regard to the Public Benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission, in accordance with Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011, consider that the purpose and activities of the charity satisfy the requirements of the public benefit test set out in Section 4 of the same Act.

Results

The financial statements are set out on pages 8 to 12.

In respect of the year, 34 expeditions were awarded grants of between £2000 and £12,000 each. These grants were made from investments and other income, arising from funds which are held for such purposes. Total grants awarded for the year amounted to £84,500 (2021-22 £ 147,450) . The Trustees consider that all grants awarded in the year 2022-23 met the requirements of the Foundation's constitution.

Net outgoing resources for the year after grant awards amounted to £31,700 (2021-22 £52,300). Net investment profits were £26,800 (2021-22 £92,600). The net decrease in funds for the year was £246,000 (2021-22 increase £40,300).

The Foundation's cash resources at the balance sheet date were sufficient to meet the liabilities outstanding at the time. Its activities are expected to increase following the lifting of current travel restrictions. The Foundation's performance is dependent upon the level of income and gains arising from its investment portfolio, and from bequests and donations made.



Objects

The Mount Everest Foundation's objects are to encourage and support expeditions for the exploration and research in the mountain areas of the world. It pursues these objects mainly by making grants to appropriate expeditions. An independent Screening Committee considers all applications in the first instance, and takes expert advice where appropriate. The Screening Committee's recommendations are then considered by the Management Committee of Trustees.

It is a condition of all grants that a detailed post-expedition report must be submitted. These are held in the libraries of the Alpine Club, the Royal Geographical Society, and the British Mountaineering Council, and they are summarised annually in the Alpine Journal. Medical and scientific work is also written up in appropriate professional journals

Grants approved earlier were withdrawn in March 2020 due to Covid 19 spreading throughout the world at that time. Grant approval was reinstated during the year. The Trustees have issued guidelines as to travel and grant policy in the light of Covid 19, but payment of grants approved remained subject to international travel restrictions

in accordance with the advice of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office for travel to individual countries. 7 expeditions were supported during the year with expeditions to Antarctica, Croatia, India, Iceland, Kyrgyzstan, and Nepal and other academic research undertaken. Grants for 34 expeditions and research projects have been approved for the forthcoming season.

Results

The financial statements are set out on pages 8 to 12.





Accounting Policies and Notes to the Financial Statements
Year ended 31 March 2021.

Basis of Accounting

These financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of investments, and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and applicable accounting standards, including:

- The Statement of Recommended Practice (revised 2015) – Accounting and Reporting by Charities
- The Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland.
- **Quoted investments**

Investments are stated at Stock Exchange market values at Balance Sheet dates, less any provision for impairment.

Income and Expenditure

Investment income is recorded, inclusive of tax deducted at source, on an accruals basis, including dividends declared, but not yet paid. Capital payments for accrued income are deducted from income as received. Expenditure is included on an accruals basis. The Foundation has no unrecognized gains or losses which are not reflected in these accounts. All Amounts relate to continuing operations.

Bequests and legacies

These are recognized when it is reasonably certain that monies will be received and the amount is known. Where there is uncertainty as to amounts, a deferred asset is established. Where there is greater uncertainty, bequests are not recognized in that financial period.

Grants Payable

Grants authorised at the year-end are included under creditors.

Cash Flow

The financial statements do not include a cash flow statement because the Foundation, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under Financial Reporting Standard 102.

Total funds

All funds are held without restriction.

NOTES

1) The Foundation is limited by guarantee, and has no share capital. The liability of the members in the event of winding up is limited to £1 per member.

2) Investment Management

The investment managers are remunerated by a management charge. The management charge net of dealing costs was estimated at £6,804 (2019-20 £5,670).

3) Investments

The revaluation reserve at 31 March 2021 was £686,510 (2020 £310,570). The cost of investments was:
