Description of the Charity's Trusts

The Dame Alice Leigh's Almshouses, in the village of Stoneleigh in Warwickshire was originally established by deed poll on 1 March 1579 by the will of Sir Thomas Leigh and his wife Dame Alice 'for the dwelling and habitation of five poor men and women from the oldest and most infirm of the parish of Stoneleigh'. There are still ten residences in the original 16th century building but the qualifications for occupancy have been amended. The Charity's governing document now requires that almspeople be poor persons of a good character. Originally administered by two wardens of the parish church, the charity is now under the care of eight volunteer Trustees and a Clerk.

The current governing document is a scheme of the Charity Commissioners of 22 December 1954 and a Confirmation Act of 28 March 1956 as amended by schemes of 11 January 1972 and 2 December 1977.

Organisation Structure

The eight Trustees consist of:-

- a) Three Ex-officio Trustees:
 - Baron Leigh (if of full age)
 - The Vicar of Stoneleigh
 - The People's Churchwarden of Stoneleigh
- b) Two Representative Trustees:
 - Appointed by the Parish Council for a term of four years.
- c) Three Co-optative Trustees (Persons residing in the Ancient Parish of Stoneleigh or in the County of Warwickshire)
 - Appointed by a resolution of the Trustees for a term of five years.

There is no defined internal training scheme for Trustees.

While the Clerk to the Trustees maintains the financial records and deals with secretarial matters on a day to day basis, the Trustees meet quarterly to consider policies for maintenance and repair of the Almshouses, the welfare of the occupants and the monitoring of income and expenditure. None of the Trustees hold any interest in the property of the Charity neither do they receive any remuneration or expenses.

Charity's Objects and Application of Income

The ongoing provision, maintenance and repair of the Dame Alice Leigh's Almshouse for poor persons of good character.

The Trustees shall meet the cost of repairs and all associated administration, management and running costs from yearly income.

The Trustees shall pay a yearly sum to the Vicar of Stoneleigh for preaching a sermon to the Almspeople of the Charity each year.

The Trustees may establish a cyclical repair fund for the purpose of providing for those items of ordinary maintenance and repairs that recur at infrequent intervals.

The Trustees shall establish and maintain an extraordinary reserve repair fund to be used for the extraordinary repair, improvement and rebuilding of the Almshouses belonging to the Charity.

Any residual yearly income shall be used for the benefit of the Almspeople as the Trustees shall think fit and any other surplus income for the relief in need of persons resident in the area of the Ancient Parish of Stoneleigh

How our activities deliver public benefit

The Charity carries out a range of activities in pursuance of its charitable aims. The Trustees consider that the activities summarised below, provide benefit to the inhabitants of Stoneleigh and neighbouring areas.

Activities during the year

During 2022 the Charity continued to provide accommodation for residents in the ancient parish of Stoneleigh and whilst six of the Almshouse properties remained fully occupied throughout the year, we had one vacant property during 2022.

No 2 Almshouse was vacant from 31st December 2021 to the end of March 2022

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021

Trustees have continued with day-to-day repairs as well as remedial and modernisation work to the Almshouses, as best they could, whilst still under COVID-19 restrictions and government lockdowns at the beginning of 2022. The minor indoor repairs continue to be carried out as and when required, albeit with a slight delay due to illness in the Handyman's family.

The ongoing issues with damp are being closely monitored at properties No2 and No7. It is now thought to possibly be rising damp or water retention from the outside, via the sandstones and/or mortar which is causing the water ingress to several of the properties, this is being kept under constant surveillance by the Clerk, Martin Smith (Trustee and Architect) and Brad Steele (Stonemason) and further investigation will continue throughout the year.

Brad Steele, a Master Stonemason, carried out repairs to the stonework on the Almshouse outbuildings, as highlighted in the last QQR Report of 2020. This included repairs and repointing to the brickwork and guttering of the outbuildings, along with the removal of foliage and moss from around both the outbuildings and main Almshouse building. The typical annual repair includes damage caused from bees making nest/bee holes in the stonework and to the lime mortar.

Electrical maintenance was carried out as and when required, along with the annual PAT testing of all resident's and charity owned electrical appliances and again for all new residents own personal appliances shortly after they moved in.

Only essential plumbing repairs were carried out at the beginning of the year under strict COVID19 rules whilst lockdown was still in place. However, once lockdown was lifted, the Plumbers were able to carry out the refurbishment of all five of the remaining shower rooms which were carried over from last year. The showers and shower trays were replaced, and new water heaters installed to replace outdated immersion tanks. Redecoration was also carried out on all five shower rooms along with essential redecoration to the other five properties.

Garden maintenance has included regular lawn mowing, hedge trimming and the pruning of several trees, in addition to moss and weed spraying.

The Trust also made charitable donations to support needy people living in the Ancient Parish of Stoneleigh through the Together for Change initiative and the Coventry Children's Boot Fund.

Together for Change (TFC) is a joint venture charity between the Diocese of Coventry and the Church of Urban Fund. Together for Change is working with churches and other public & private sector groups to transform the communities of Coventry and Warwickshire and tackle systematic poverty. In the five years since the inception of this project, the Churches in Tile Hill have set up and grown a range of projects supporting needy people in the community. The Job Club and Make Lunch project are among notable successes. The previous project that the Trust donations have helped support has been the recruitment of a Youth Worker at St Andrews Church who provides youth activities in the community. Although no donations were made to Together for Change during 2021, the Trust requested proposals be put forward for future funding, and in January 2022, the Trust donated £5,000 to the Good Neighbours project and a further £5,000 in April 2022 to the Musical Memories/Dementia Café project both run by Together for Change.

The Coventry Children's Boot Fund started in 1893 with the object of providing boots to children in poverty so that they could attend school. The fund has served Coventry's poorest children through two world wars, the depression of the 30's and the ups and downs of the 20th century. Even today, many children attend school wearing worn out leaking shoes in winter, because their parents cannot afford to replace them, which makes you realise that the Boot Fund is as relevant today as it was over a hundred years ago. The Coventry Children's Boot Fund received a donation from the Dame Alice Leigh's charity of £2,500 in April 2022 and further £4,000 in August 2022, and asked if it would be possible to use some of the money for Ukrainian refugees, some of whom had come to live within our area of the Ancient Parish of Stoneleigh. The Trustees agreed unanimously, for some of the donation to be used for the Ukrainian refugees.

1. Basis of Preparation

- 1.1 The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are shown on pages 2 to 7.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 (as updated through Update Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The charity has applied Update Bulletin 1 as published on 2 February 2016 and does not include a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is applying FRS 102 Section 1A.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

2. Accounting Policies

Incoming Resources

- 2.1 Recognition of Incoming Resources
These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:
- the Charity becomes entitled to the resources;
 - the Trustees are virtually certain they will receive the resources; and
 - the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability
- 2.2 Grants and Donations
Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the Charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.
- 2.3 Volunteer Help
The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Trustees' annual report.
- 2.4 Investment Income
This is included in the accounts when receivable.
- 2.5 Investment Gains and Losses
This includes any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

Expenditure and Liabilities

- 2.6 Liability Recognition
Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to pay out resources.
- 2.7 Service Costs
Includes costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of Trustee meetings and the costs of any legal advice to Trustees on governance or constitutional matters.
- 2.8 Grants Payable
These are only recognised in the accounts when a commitment has been made and there are no conditions to be met relating to the grant which remain in the control of the Charity.
