Diocesan Vision: Building On Our Past

The Diocese of Brentwood was formally erected in 1917. Our first bishop, Bishop Ward had a great personal devotion to Our Lady's shrine at Lourdes and Brentwood was the first diocese in England & Wales to have Our Lady of Lourdes as its Principal Patron. His devotion to St Edmund of Abingdon (or Canterbury), led to the choice of that saint as a Secondary Patron of the new diocese (together with St Erconwald and subsequently St Cedd).

Our present Father in God is Bishop Alan Williams, a Marist Father and formerly Rector of the National Shrine of Our Lady at Walsingham. He has responsibility for a diocese of rich diversity: East End and suburbs, towns ancient and modern, seaside resorts, rural parishes comprising dozens of villages, as well as schools, religious houses, and chaplaincies in hospitals, prisons and universities.

It is our prayer that as we give thanks for the witness of past generations, we also pray for a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit that we may be evermore faithful to proclaiming the Gospel of Christ.



Diocesan Vision: Shaping Our Future

In January 2024 Bishop Alan relaunched our Parish Partnership Process, a vision of parishes throughout the Diocese working in partnership to evangelise and meet the challenges of the 21st Century.

Our Diocesan Vision

Working together to Proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ in Essex and East London

The Church in Essex and East London working better and differently together to evangelise our diocese: it is a vision of the people of God here and now collaborating to use our various Grace-given gifts to evangelise our diocese to the best of our combined ability with the help of God.

To maximise the opportunities for evangelisation

The Vicariate for Parish Renewal exists to enable communities to be renewed – to empower parishioners to see what the Lord is asking them to do and unleashing the gifts that they have.

To maximise sacramental provision

Working together with our schools, parish catechists and Partnership Youth Co-Ordinators with support from our Parish Renewal, Education, and Youth Ministry Vicariates.

To support our catechists, The Bishop's Certificate in catechesis and youth ministry continues to be delivered. This is designed to be an entry level qualification to help in the ongoing formation of adults involved in sacramental preparation or youth ministry in the Diocese of Brentwood. It includes both the development of practical skills and the deepening of theological knowledge.

To maximise the opportunities for putting faith into action through charitable works

Caritas Diocese of Brentwood supports and encourages the living out of Catholic Social Teaching within the Diocese, and celebrates the work of the volunteers who give thousands of hours to support the ill, poor and marginalised throughout Essex and East London – working with those of all faith and none.

Real Living Wage

The Bishops of England and Wales have made a commitment to the Real Living Wage. Bishop Alan announced our formal accreditation to the Living Wage Foundation on 18 November 2018, the World Day of the Poor and we continue to be committed as a Real Living Wage employer.

Our Parishes

The activities of the Diocese are largely undertaken through its parishes.

The work of the parishes takes the form of the celebration of religious services, and the provision, maintenance and upkeep of places of worship. This also involves the pastoral care of the Roman Catholic – as well as the broader – community of the area falling within the parish boundaries, and the promotion of a wide range of charitable purposes – not only within the parishes, but also nationally and internationally.

Within our parishes, each Sunday, an average of 35,696 people attend services (34,985 in the previous year), and during 2024, with the help and support of our parish priests and catechists, 2,018 people were either baptised or received into the Church- a slight decrease from the previous year figure of 2,069.

During the year, our parishes raised over £46,200 to support international causes, including natural disasters and overseas mission work.

The Diocese has been twinned with the Diocese of Dundee, Kwa-Zulu Natal, South Africa since 1985. Since then, 32 parishes and schools in both dioceses have twinned with each other, building practical relationships beyond friendship and spiritual support. Fr Gerry Gosling, a Diocese of Brentwood priest, regularly visits the Diocese of Dundee to help support the Twinning project. The project cares for many orphans and young children, aiming to lift them from poverty and give them access to a good quality education.

During the year, parishes raised over £5,500 for the project, down from £7,300 in the previous year.

We continue to energise and actively support this project.

Our parish volunteers give many hours of service to both help the local causes, supporting the homeless and the marginalised.

Parish Staff and Volunteers

Most of the parishes across the Diocese benefit from the service, dedication and commitment of many volunteers – whether as Ministers of the Eucharist, Ministers of the Word, Catechists, church cleaners, musicians, offertory counters, gardeners, Health & Safety Representatives, Safeguarding Representatives, Finance volunteers, Social Justice volunteers, youth officers, to name but a few. We thank our volunteers and parish workers for their service and commitment. We estimate that during the year the number of parish volunteers totalled over 4,000. We are extremely thankful for the commitment of our volunteers. Thank you.

Education

In a Catholic School, it is our aim that every child – whether they are Catholic, of another faith or none, will be respected, affirmed, supported and encouraged. Education is one of the most powerful weapons in combating poverty, and in helping children to reach their full potential as human beings. It is our aim to ensure that Catholic Education is maintained and enabled to grow and develop for future generations.

The Education Team aims to provide both the best possible training and support for all governors who serve within our Catholic schools, and the best possible support to all schools from both a governance and religious education perspective. As such, during the year the Education team deliver face to face training to school staff almost every week during term-time. Courses include targeted training for early career teachers, newly appointed head teachers and a wide range of courses on curriculum support and school management. Modules in the Catholic Certificate of Religious Studies are delivered on a regular basis. A wide variety of online courses are available on an ongoing basis.

Our Buildings Officer provides support to schools in respect of Schools estates including the provision of training on school buildings management.

The Academisation project has continued with more schools joining Multi-Academy Trusts (MATs) across the Diocese. The Diocesan Academies working group is reviewing the number of MATs with a view to ensure that the structure meets the needs of the Diocese in the developing educational landscape.

Catholic School Inspection (CSI) is a key area of our work. We continue to ensure that a diocesan officer attends the feedback meeting at the end of a CSI or OFSTED inspection.

We've established a regular communications link with schools and Advisers to ensure that all relevant information received from the Catholic Education Service and other sources is disseminated

on a timely basis. We now distribute relevant information on a weekly basis to schools, which includes prayer and Catholic life materials.

The prime focus for the work of Brentwood Diocese Education Service (BDES) is in securing, preserving and developing Catholic education into the future, as well as supporting schools when difficulties have arisen, where schools have experienced decline or turmoil and where schools have become more vulnerable. Our work is summed up in our Mission Statement;

“Supporting Catholic schools to provide excellent education where pupils flourish and Christ is made known to all.”

Safeguarding

As Catholics we believe that human life is sacred because from its beginning it involves the creative act of God and it remains forever in a special relationship with Him. Accordingly, we recognise that each human being, irrespective of age or circumstance, should be accorded the dignity and respect due to a child of God.

The Church as a community has a duty to follow the command to love by valuing and protecting the vulnerable. Children are the most vulnerable and have the greatest entitlement to protection.

In order to assist in this, our Safeguarding team provides support and training to both parish representatives and clergy to facilitate the implementation of policies and procedures, which create a safe environment for all involved in our Diocese, and ensure that the Diocese meets the requirements of the eight national safeguarding standards as set by the Catholic Safeguarding Standards Agency (CSSA)

Each parish has a responsibility to appoint a Safeguarding Representative – the link between each parish and the Safeguarding Coordinator. The Safeguarding Representative, by assisting the parish priest in the implementation of the diocesan safeguarding policies, has a responsibility to promote good and safe practices in all activities involving children, young people and adults, and to provide advice on child and adult safeguarding matters within the parish. The Safeguarding team provides training opportunities throughout the year as well as conferences and meetings at Deanery level to support each parish community.

The Vicar General’s Office

The Vicar General oversees the Bishop’s Office, and is responsible for Vocations, Clergy in-service training, retreats and Ministry to Priests.

Ecumenism and Interfaith initiatives are also in place. We believe that working together is not an optional extra, but at the heart of our Christian vocation.

The Vicar General’s office also includes the Music and Liturgy departments. The Liturgy Executive Committee is the statutory body set up by the Bishop to advise him on all matters of liturgy, and to assist him in the encouragement and implementation of sound liturgical practice, along with the stimulation of liturgical growth, development and awareness throughout the Diocese. The Diocesan Liturgy Committee and the specialist sub-committees advise on, and assist with, the appointment,

training and use of liturgical ministers; church music; art and architecture; and the development of pastoral liturgy.

The work of the Brentwood Cathedral Music Department continues to be both comprehensive and far-reaching. During 2024/25 the Department launched the Brentwood Schools Singing Programme in a number of schools. The programme is designed to use the existing infrastructure of Catholic state schools to deliver music sessions during the school day, with a view to support school and parish liturgies.

Youth Ministry

The Vicariate for Youth Ministry works with parishes and schools across the Diocese to provide support, formation and opportunities for young people and for those who journey with them, centred in deepening their relationship with Jesus Christ.

The Vicariate integrates and continues the work of the Brentwood Catholic Youth Service (BCYS) and Walsingham House at Abbotswick, our Diocesan retreat centre, which have together been a vibrant feature within our Diocese.

Formation is offered in a pastoral context, meaning that Sacramental Catechesis, a deep and rich prayer life, and opportunities for service and outreach to the poorest and those most in need, are all interwoven. The Vicariate works with parish catechists, school chaplains, university chaplains and young people from the point of First Holy Communion through to young adulthood; in the latter years opportunity of service through leadership is highlighted.

The Youth Vicariate helped launch the Parish Partnership Youth Co-Ordinator project, a project to help promote and support Youth Ministry at parish level. During the year two 'Parish Partnership Youth Co-Ordinators (PPYC) were in post. The purpose of the PPYC role is to build and develop a parish partnership youth leadership team, helping to deepen and strengthen the relationship of each young person with Jesus Christ and to deepen their lived experience of the Catholic faith.

Special projects which also fall within the Vicariate include Diocesan Pilgrimages, (primarily the Lourdes Pilgrimage), which are naturally places of formation in themselves, Youth Gather – a weekend of which is a mix of faith, fun and friendship, providing an opportunity to take part in outdoor activities while taking time to share in and celebrate the Catholic faith. The Vicariate also helps promote the Flame Congress, the largest Catholic Youth event in England in Wales, the purpose of which is to inspire young people in their faith with a mix of concert style music and prayer.

Caritas

The Mission of Caritas Diocese of Brentwood is to maximise the opportunities for putting faith into action through charitable works, fully conscious of Christ's commandment to love our neighbour, defined by His words 'Whatever you do to the least of my brothers and sisters, you do to me' We seek to serve the marginalised, the poor and the vulnerable by highlighting and developing a broad range of charitable projects in Parish Partnerships and schools across our Diocese and nationally.

The Vision of Caritas Diocese of Brentwood is defined by the truth that no-one is beyond the reach of the love of Christ. We aim to enable those in need of pastoral care to find that care and to better support those working on Social Justice projects in each part of the Diocese.

During the period, Caritas Diocese of Brentwood crystallised its work into three key strands.

- Environment (Laudato Si) The Caritas Director facilitated the Diocesan focus group on the Environment
- Refugees and Migrants- a Diocesan focus group has been set up. Several parishes have set up projects to support refugees.
- Homeless and the Cost of Living- several sponsored sleepouts have taken place across the Diocese to support provision for the homeless. A focus group has also been set up.

Administration

The Vicariate for Administration encompasses the Finance and Property Departments (incorporating Health & Safety). The departments work both to meet our reporting requirements but also to support the parishes in various aspects of finance, property and health and safety, on a day to day basis.

Finance training is available to parishes on a 1.1 basis and sessions were delivered in most weeks during the year. The Finance Office also delivered on site training which was available to all parishes. This training covered GDPR, Cyber Security, Finance and Gift Aid.

Health & Safety training is also provided on a regular basis, online tools and resources being available to parish representatives and clergy.

Property Team: The Property Sub-Committee has delegated responsibility for both advising and making recommendations to the Board of the Corporate Trustee on strategic property matters across the Diocese and, under devolved powers, approval of property related parish expenditure in line with financial policy.

The responsibility for managing the maintenance of parish buildings rests with the parishes under Canon Law although it is the responsibility of the Diocese as a registered charity to ensure that assets are kept in a reasonably good condition.

Chancery and Tribunal

The Chancellor prepares and transmits official legal documents on behalf of the Diocese, is the chief notary, and authenticates official documents. The Chancery also processes marriage papers for marriages taking place outside the Diocese. In 2024, 67 marriages took place abroad.

The Judicial Vicar and other judges, hear cases prepared by advocates and auditors. The majority of cases handled by the Tribunal each year comprise requests for the investigation of marriage for nullity.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust (the Charity) was constituted by Trust Deed in 1947. It is a registered charity, number 234092. Its objects are the advancement of the Roman Catholic religion in the Diocese by such means as the Bishop may think fit and proper for the service and support, whether in the Diocese or outside the Diocese, of charitable works and objects promoted by the Church. In addition, there are two separate funds which are registered as individual charities:

- The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund (BEEF) – the fund of the Diocese which meets the cost of educating and training seminarians – is a separately constituted charity under a Trust Deed, dated 11 July 1922, and registered under number 1067745. It is accounted for as a restricted fund within the Diocesan accounts.
- The investments of our Diocese are managed as a Pooled Fund, which is separately registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067742.

An order of the Charity Commissioners under S96(6) Charities Act 1993 permits the three charities, which have the same Trustee, to be treated as a single entity for accounting purposes.

Administration of the Charity is through the Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee (the Corporate Trustee). The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee, a company limited by guarantee, was set up in 1948 to act as custodian trustee in relation to the Charity and the ecclesiastical trusts of the Diocese. Its company number is 450897.

All parish property is in civil law held by the Corporate Trustee, subject to the Charity Trust Deed. The acquisition or disposal of parish property therefore must be sanctioned by the Directors of the Corporate Trustee, and all relevant documentation must be drawn up in the name of the Corporate Trustee.

Directors of the Corporate Trustee

In keeping with the Charity's objectives, it is a requirement that candidates for Directorship are committed Roman Catholics. The power to appoint Directors is vested in the Bishop of the Diocese.

Where additional Directors are required, the Bishop will consider the range of skills and experience required on the Board (such as finance, investments, strategic planning etc.), and will approach individuals in the Diocese who are likely to meet these requirements. Prospective Directors are provided with full information on the Charity's constitution, objects and finances. Training material is made available as necessary, and Directors are encouraged to complete online training modules which have been approved by the Charity Commission.

Governance of the Charity

The Charity is governed by the Board of Directors of the Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee (the "Corporate Trustee") which consists of the President of the Corporation (the Bishop of Brentwood) and up to fourteen other Directors.

The Board, in conjunction with the canonical bodies established by the Bishop to be his advisors and consultors, is responsible for the development and implementation of policies which ensure compliance with civil legislation and canon law. The key policies are safeguarding, health and safety, risk management, the production of financial budgets, the exercising of financial controls through regular financial reporting, the management of Diocesan properties, policies relating to employment and the compliance of the Charity with relevant company and charity legislation.

Authority for the management of the day-to-day business of the Diocese and compliance with civil legislation is delegated by the Board to the respective departmental Directors and parish priests in accordance with their directions.

In March 2014, the Finance Board (now known as the "Board") approved revised Articles of Association for the Corporate Trustee, establishing the Bishop of Brentwood as the sole Member of the Corporate Trustee; the Board cannot implement a decision with which the Bishop disagrees. In December 2020, following an internal governance review, the Articles of Association were further revised, inter alia removing references to the 'Finance Board' and replacing these with the "Board".

Sub-Committees of the Board

The Board has established several Sub-Committees delegating to them the consideration of specific areas of importance to the Diocese and authorising them to make some decisions and to submit recommendations to the main Board for approval:

- Education
- Finance and Administration (including Investments)
- Health & Safety
- Human Resources & Diversity (meets in conjunction with Finance & Administration)
- Property
- Safeguarding
- Youth Ministry
- Caritas (formerly part of the 'Youth Ministry and Pastoral Care Sub-Committee)

A separate committee (not a Sub-Committee of the Board) reviews the provision of support to sick and retired clergy and meets on a regular basis.

Key Management Personnel

The Trustee considers that the Directors of the Corporate Trustee, together with the Director of Finance, the Director of Education, the Diocesan Safeguarding Coordinator, the Director of Property and the Bishop's Delegate for Civil Administration comprise the key management personnel of the Charity, in charge of directing, controlling, running and operating the Charity on a day to day basis. In the previous year, the role of Director of Development was also considered key management personnel, the respective salary, pension and benefits being included in the comparative year disclosure on page 31 of this report. This role was not in place during the year ended 5th April 2025. Salaries are reviewed on an annual basis by the Human Resources Team and authorised by the Board.

All Directors of the Trustee gave of their time freely, and no Director received remuneration in respect of their services as Directors of the Corporate Trustee. Details of the Trustee Directors' expenses are disclosed in Note 18 of the accounts.

Financial Review

Investment policy The Diocese follows a total return investment policy, to achieve long term capital and income growth, to provide sufficient income to support today's beneficiaries whilst still seeking 'real' growth in capital over rolling 5 year periods to meet the future needs of the Charity. The 5 year annualised performance of the portfolio was 8.2 % as at 31 March 25 in comparison to the 5 year annualised CPI of 4.6%.

The Portfolio has continued to perform better when compared to the ARC Peer Group.

The Trustee is empowered within the Trust Deed to invest any monies as authorised by law for the investment of trust monies, in a manner which it thinks fits with the consent of the Bishop. The provisions of the Trustee Act 2000 apply.

Under section 26 of the Charities Act 1993, an Order was made by the Charity Commission on 5 December 1999 granting the Trustee power to appoint an investment manager, and to appoint a corporate body as the Trustee's nominee to hold the investments of the Charity. The General Power of Investment in the Trustee Act 2000 allows 'Trustees to invest trust funds in any kind of investment, excluding land [except under certain provisions], in which they could invest if they were the absolute owner of those funds'.

Diocesan Ethical Policy for investments: The Diocesan investment portfolio avoids investment in tobacco, arms, alcohol, gambling and pornography. Investment is also to be avoided in companies which support oppressive regimes, or trade in products which are produced by child labour or in forced labour camps, or companies which have been involved in the exploitation or unjust treatment of employees.

Our investment managers, Sarasin and Partners LLP, monitor any investments made by their Endowment Fund in companies which generate any revenue from the direct or indirect manufacture of pharmaceutical products, the use of which would contravene the Catholic Church's teaching on the sanctity of life. The fund manager also seeks to avoid investments in companies involved in predatory lending. Our investment managers take a pro-active approach in respect of voting on company resolutions, in order to promote responsible long-term stewardship. The Sarasin Endowment Fund will not invest in tobacco and will also avoid investment in companies that have more than 10% of their turnover from the following:

- Alcohol Manufacture
- Armaments
- Gambling
- Pornography

Sarasin & Partners has continued to actively engage with companies and regulators in order to uphold high standards relating to environmental, social and governance matters on behalf of the Trustee.

Risk Management: The Directors of the Corporate Trustee have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed and are satisfied that adequate systems are in place to mitigate exposure to these risks. Risks are recorded, by department, and a RAG status applied. Actions to mitigate the risks are identified and a timescale for completion assigned. The major risks are considered to be health and safety (ensuring that our buildings are maintained to an adequate standard, and policies adhered to), and pastoral (the falling number of priests in ministry). To mitigate the health and safety risks, a Health and Safety Sub-Committee meets on a regular basis to ensure that policies are being communicated and applied appropriately, risks are reviewed and action taken where appropriate. Health and Safety representatives are appointed at parish level. In respect of the falling number of priests in ministry, the Diocesan Vision addresses this issue and sets out plans in order to mitigate this risk going forward. Financial Risks are reviewed on an ongoing basis by the Finance & Administration Sub-Committee of the Board and action taken when required.

Financial Control Policy: Our Diocese has a series of financial controls and signing limits in place (in the parishes and at the Curia) in order to enable the Corporate Trustee to exercise its legal duties:

- To ensure we are carrying out our purposes for the public benefit
- To comply with our governing document and the law
- To act in the best interests of our Diocese
- To manage responsibly the resources of our Diocese
- To act with reasonable care and skill
- To ensure that we are accountable.

We continued to review the support provided to parishes during 2024-25, together with our associated controls and procedures continue to be reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Public Benefit: The Board Members confirm that they comply with the duty in S17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising

any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant. Details of the main activities undertaken to further the charity's purposes for the public benefit are noted earlier in this document.

Fundraising Policy: Our Diocese is registered with the Fundraising Regulator and is committed to the Fundraising Promise. We do not use any external fundraisers.

- We will commit to high standards, adhering to the Fundraising Code of Practice at all times, monitoring any person that raises funds on our behalf, and complying with the law as it applies to charities and fundraising.
- We will be clear, honest and open, in respect of what we will do with donations, how gifts can be made or amended, and the purpose of our Charity.
- We will be respectful of the rights and privacy of any donor.
- We will treat donors and the public fairly and reasonably, and not accept donations from those individuals who we believe may lack the capacity to make an informed decision
- We will hold ourselves accountable and responsible, ensuring that our resources are managed responsibly and that we have a complaints procedure in place. No complaints about fundraising activities were received during the year.

Reserves Policy: Unrestricted reserves as at 5/4/25 totalled £11.2m (2024: £11.5m). In addition, parochial funds totalled £40.7m (2024: £39.7m). Other restricted and endowment funds totalled £10.4m (2024: £10.8m).

Central Diocesan reserves are held to meet the future needs of the Diocese as a whole and absorb the impact of any material risk.

Parochial reserves are held to meet the cost of future repairs and maintenance or major building projects which cannot be met out of expected income. Historically the Diocese considered parochial funds to be 'designated' for use at parish level, for parish requirements. In 23/24 the Diocese reclassified parochial funds as being 'restricted', to be used for the benefit of parishes.

The policy of the Diocese is to maintain its reserves at a level that will provide the income necessary to assist it in implementing its future objectives, including but not limited to the increased cost of caring for the Sick and Retired Clergy of the Diocese. The Diocese aims to hold cash reserves of £10m. Cash reserves as at 5 April 25 stood at £11m. Due to the size of the Diocese and the number of parishes within the Diocese, the Directors feel that this is a reasonable amount to cover expenditure for the period of one year. Should cash reserves fall below this, depending on the projected cash flow, investments may be liquidated.

Funds invested, and how they will be applied

Restricted funds total £9.4m (2024:£9.8m). The largest restricted funds with investments are noted below:

- The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund (BEEF), a fund for the support and training of seminarians, was valued at £4.3m as at 5 April 2025 (2024: £4.3m). As at April 2025 there were three seminarians. When in seminary, each normally costing around £50,000 p.a. Investment income exceeded the seminary and associated costs by £31k. There was a small reduction in the value of the restricted fund due to losses on investment.
- The Sick and Retired Clergy Fund was valued at £1.96m (2024: £1.88m). The donations received from parishioners, together with specific parish contributions is currently covering the costs incurred by the fund. Due to the age profile of the clergy population, it is anticipated that expenditure will increase in the near future and so the Diocese is planning how best to finance the support of priests due to retire over the next 10-15 years.

Designated funds £2.7m (2024: £2.7m)

- The largest designated fund is the General Education Fund which stands at £2.3m (2024: £2.3m). With the development of a new diocesan vision and strategy for Education, the Trustee considers how best to utilise these funds.

Permanent Endowment funds £1m (2024: £1m)

- The largest endowment fund is the Crowhurst legacy which stands at £0.5m – these funds are to be used to buy a suitable property for sick or retired priests. These funds have been used to purchase properties in order to meet the housing requirements of sick and retired priests.

Unrestricted funds held by the centre £8.6m (2024: £8.9m)

- Non-parochial unrestricted funds are invested in the Sarasin Endowment Fund (formerly Alpha CIF for Endowments) in order to generate investment revenue which contributes to the work of the Curia. The fund value has decreased year on year.

Financial Performance: With reference to the statement of financial activities in the financial statements.

At the end of the financial year 2024-25 diocesan funds as a whole totalled £62.3m (2024: £62.2m). Income has decreased from £17.7m in the prior year to £17.2m. Donations remained fairly similar when compared to the previous year, there was an increase of £58k in legacy income, but the most significant drivers of the year on year change are noted below:

- A reduction in grant income of £502k. In the previous year there had been an increase in parish applications towards capital projects.
- An increase in rental income of £90k as parishes continue to seek ways to best utilise resources at parish level.
- Decrease in Other Income of £189k relating to a surplus on the sale of fixed assets at parish level in the previous year.

Expenditure has remained stable at £17.2m. There was an increase in VASCA expenditure of £180k which was offset by a business tax rebate of £194k. The business tax rebate led to a decrease in support costs, which can be observed under the heading 'rates, insurance & utilities' of the Analysis and allocation of support costs section in Note 5.

Parish Reserves As at 5 April 2025, parish fixed assets totalled £18.8m (2024: £18.4m) and free Parochial reserves £21.9m (2024: £21.4m). A large part of the increase in fixed asset value related to primarily to a project in one parish.

Plans for the Future

Our Diocesan Vision (referenced on page 3 of this document) details our plans for the future, the renewal process being relaunched in January 2024.

In preparing these financial statements, the Trustee is required to:

- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

Opinion

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2025

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with all statutory requirements and with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable to the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (Effective 1 January 2019) – (Charities SORP (FRS102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102). The particular accounting policies adopted are described below. The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified to include certain tangible fixed assets at a valuation and fixed asset investments at market value. Figures are presented in sterling and rounded to the nearest pound.

The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102 and was constituted by Trust Deed in 1947. The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Funds (BEEF) is separately constituted under Trust Deed dated 11 July 1922 and registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067745. The Brentwood Diocesan Investment Pooled Fund is separately registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067742. Under S26 (6) of the Charities Act 1993, these three charities which have the Same Trustee are permitted to be treated as a single entity for accounting purposes. The income, expenditure and net assets of these linked charities are shown within notes 8 and 13 of the financial statements. The value of the Brentwood Diocesan Investment Pooled fund was £18,732,813 as at 5/4/25 (2024: £19,057,643). The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective from 1 January 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

a) Preparation of accounts on a going concern basis

Having considered the cash reserves as at February 2026, future budgets and cash flows, the Trustee confirms that there are no material uncertainties about the entity's ability to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

The Directors of the Corporate Trustee have reviewed the cash reserves as February 2026 and the projected cash outflow over the next twelve months. In light of these considerations, the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing these financial statements.

b) Legacies, Donations and Grants

Legacies and donations are recognised when receivable or when the Diocese becomes legally entitled to them and receipt is probable, and they can reasonably be measured in financial terms. Receipts of property, investments or other gifts in kind are included at market value. Grants are recognised when the charity has entitlement and when the amount is measurable.

c) Investment Income

Investment income is accounted for as it accrues.

d) Expenditure

Costs of raising funds comprise those costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the management of the Charity's investments.

Costs of charitable activities consist of all expenditure directly relating to the objects of the Charity. Support costs which cannot be directly allocated are apportioned between charitable activities and governance costs on the basis of the Trustee's estimate of the time spent on the relevant functions.

Employment benefits, including holiday pay, are recognised in the period in which they are earned. Termination benefits are recognised in the period in which the decision is made and communicated to the relevant employee(s).

Governance costs include expenditure on management and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements together with an allocation of support costs.

Irrecoverable VAT is included with the category of expenses to which it relates.

e) **Tangible Fixed Assets**

Prior to 6 April 1996 the cost of fixed assets was written off in the year of acquisition and no comprehensive cost records were maintained. In order to arrive at a reasonable valuation of parish property, taking into account age, type, condition and life expectancy, the Trustee considered that insured values at 6 April 1997 should be discounted by 90% and in subsequent years be depreciated at 2% per annum. This valuation will not be updated in the future. Properties acquired after 6 April 1996 are capitalised at their actual cost of acquisition.

The school properties (land and buildings) are vested in the name of the Diocesan Trustee. The Diocesan Trustee cannot take a unilateral decision to dispose of these properties. Disposal can only occur if the school governors and the Secretary of State for Education decide that all or part of a school site is no longer required for education. In most circumstances, where a disposal occurs, the Secretary of State or the local authority may be entitled to recoup grant. Although no rights of ownership vest in the school governing body, most other rights and obligations, such as for the maintenance and repair of the school and its facilities, are passed to the governors. The Trustees therefore consider that, for the purposes of these financial statements, the nature of their ownership is that of a custodianship, however these properties have been purchased and written off in the Diocesan accounts for the amounts that the Diocese contributed in the past and the costs involved have not been separately identified and are not considered material in the overall context of the accounts.

The estimated cost of furniture, equipment and motor vehicles held at 6 April 1996 has been capitalised in the financial statements. Subsequent additions are capitalised at cost. Individual works of art, historical treasures and plate are not depreciated as they have extremely long lives and are considered to be worth preserving indefinitely.

Depreciation is calculated by the straight line method to write off the cost/value less anticipated residual value, over the expected useful lives of assets as follows:-

Freehold buildings additions since 6 April 1996	50 years
Fixtures and fittings	10 years
Furniture and equipment (> £5,000)	5 years

f) School Building Programme

The Diocese assists schools undertaking major projects by managing the VASCA grant monies received from the DfE. These grants are recognised as restricted income within the Statement of Financial Activity and the committed distributions to schools shown as expenditure within the same statement.

g) Financial Instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Fixed assets are recorded at depreciated historical cost or revaluation, investments are recorded at their fair value which is the market value as disclosed in note 11 and all other assets and liabilities are recorded at cost which is their fair value.

h) Investments

Pooled investments are valued at fair value on the balance sheet date. Investment properties are valued at fair value and stated at a Trustee's valuation. Unrealised gains/losses on investments are calculated as the difference between opening market value and closing market value after adjusting for additions and disposals during the year, less investment management and administration costs.

i) Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

j) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without notice of not more than 31 days. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

k) Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

I) Fund accounting

General funds

These comprise the accumulated surplus or deficit from the Statement of Financial Activities which is not restricted nor designated funds. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity

Designated Funds

These funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustee for particular purposes. Details of the funds designated by the Trustee are set out in note 12.

Restricted Funds

These funds are subject to restrictions imposed by the donor. Details of funds subject to legal restriction are set out in note 13.

Parochial Funds

Each parish within the Diocese of Brentwood is established and operates under the Code of Canon law, which means that each parish has separate canonical status. Therefore, parochial funds are treated as restricted funds in these accounts.

The use of the parochial funds is the responsibility of the Parish Priest, Board of Directors of the Corporate Trustee, and the Bishop.

m) Pensions

All eligible staff are members of an Aegon group personal pension scheme to which the Charity makes contributions. Employees may contribute an additional amount. As a defined contribution scheme, no liability falls upon the Charity, as employer, to make good a shortfall of funding other than contributions due.

Some staff employed in the educational work of the Diocese are members of the Teacher's Pension Scheme ("TPS") which is a defined benefits scheme. Diocesan contribution levels are determined by the TPS. The TPS is a multi-employer scheme, and, as there is insufficient information available to use defined benefit accounting, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

n) Significant judgements and estimation uncertainty

In preparing these financial statements the trustees have had to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts recognised in these financial statements. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Key areas subject to judgement and estimation are as follows:

Fixed asset depreciation. Judgement is applied when assigning anticipated average lives to the fixed assets of the charity.

Investment properties are included at a value determined by at a desktop valuation conducted by a property management company, or with reference to similar properties in the area of each respective property.

Walsingham House

This house is used for the provision of youth retreats.

Sick and Retired Clergy Fund

Income is used to help support fully retired, partially retired and sick priests. Transfers represent contributions to the fund from the Diocese.

Mensal Fund

This fund is used to support the Diocesan activities of the Bishop. Transfers represent contributions to the fund from the Diocese.

BEEF (Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund)

This fund meets the costs of training priests for the Diocese. Transfers represent contributions from collections on its behalf from the parishes.

Mass Fund

Income received from donors is paid to priests who celebrate masses for the donors. Transfers represent mass stipends paid over to parishes.

Parish Restricted Funds

These funds consist of donations and other contributions to parishes for specific purposes within the parish.

BRCDT Education Fund

These funds are used to finance the provision of education advisors to schools within the Diocese.

Caritas

This fund is used to promote and support Catholic Social Teaching. As such, the pre-existing Social Welfare Fund (previously reported within Other Restricted Funds) has been incorporated into the Caritas Fund.

Voluntary-Aided Schools Condition Allocation (VASCA)

This fund represents the uncommitted fund balance of the capital grant funding received by the Diocese from the DfE. The funding is allocated by the Trustee to Diocesan Voluntary Aided Schools to fund school capital projects.

Other Restricted Funds

Other restricted funds consist of donations for specific purposes.

Permanent Endowment Funds

Crowhurst Legacy

This fund consists of a property donated to the Diocese to be used as a home for Roman Catholic Priests suffering from sickness or who have retired by reason of old age. The property may be sold but the proceeds must be invested in another property to be used for the same purposes. The property was sold during 2005. The proceeds have been invested with Sarasins until a suitable replacement property has been found.

Sullivan Special Trust

This fund comprises an investment property the income of which is for the benefit of the parish priest at Southend parish.

The Charity is governed by the Board of Directors of the Corporate Trustee, The Brentwood Catholic Diocese Trustee (company number 450897).

18. TRANSACTIONS WITH DIRECTORS OF THE CORPORATE TRUSTEE

A majority of the Directors of the Corporate Trustee are also parish priests in the Diocese. As priests they receive income from their parishes together with living accommodation, living expenses and reimbursement of costs incurred on behalf of their parish on the same basis as other priests within the Diocese. They do not receive any remuneration or benefits from their trusteeship other than the purchase by the Diocese of trustees' indemnity insurance providing cover of up to £5,000,000 during the year (the premium is paid as part of public liability insurance). Travel costs totalling £659 (2024: £660) were reimbursed to one (2024: one) director and consultancy costs in respect of courses arranged by the Vicariate for Education in the amount of £1,200 (2024 £1,200) were reimbursed to one (2024: one) Director during the year. During the year, Directors of the Corporate Trustee donated £3,510 (2024 £3,820) in aggregate, to the Diocese.

21. THIRD PARTY COLLECTIONS

Parishes hold collections on behalf of third party charities. Because the Diocese is acting as agent for these charities, these collections have been excluded from these financial statements. During the year £804,678 (2024:£1,223,634) was collected on behalf of third party charities. At 5 April 2025 £254,798 (2024 £344,772) was held on behalf of third party charities.

22. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Related Party transactions with the Directors of the Corporate Trustee are disclosed in Note 18 of these Accounts. There were no other related party transactions during the year (2024, none).

23. PENSION COMMITMENTS

Some of charity's academic and related staff belong to the Teachers' pension Scheme England and Wales. This is a multi-employer defined benefit scheme. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2020. Total TPS payments made during the year were £21,463 (2024: £66,831) There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pensions Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for full time teachers. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary – these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teacher's Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to ensure scheme costs are recognised and managed appropriately and the review specifies the level of future contributions.

Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2020. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 27 October 2024, with the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, applying a notional investment return based on 1.7% above the rate of CPI. The key elements of the valuation outcome are:

- Employer contribution rates set at 28.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levy). This is an increase of 5% in employer contributions and the cost control result is such that no change in member benefits is needed.
- Total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £262,000 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £222,200 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £39,800 million

The result of this valuation was implemented from 1 April 2025. The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2028

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website. Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The Charity is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the plan. Accordingly, the Charity has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS 102 and has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme.

Diocesan Vision: Building On Our Past

The Diocese of Brentwood was formally erected in 1917. Our first bishop, Bishop Ward had a great personal devotion to Our Lady's shrine at Lourdes and Brentwood was the first diocese in England & Wales to have Our Lady of Lourdes as its Principal Patron. His devotion to St Edmund of Abingdon (or Canterbury), led to the choice of that saint as a Secondary Patron of the new diocese (together with St Erconwald and subsequently St Cedd).

Our present Father in God is Bishop Alan Williams, a Marist Father and formerly Rector of the National Shrine of Our Lady at Walsingham. He has responsibility for a diocese of rich diversity: East End and suburbs, towns ancient and modern, seaside resorts, rural parishes comprising dozens of villages, as well as schools, religious houses, and chaplaincies in hospitals, prisons and universities.

It is our prayer that as we give thanks for the witness of past generations, we also pray for a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit that we may be evermore faithful to proclaiming the Gospel of Christ.



Diocesan Vision: Shaping Our Future

The Stewards of the Gospel initiative has been a period of discernment for us as we seek the best response we can give to God's love for us in an ever-changing society. Following the publication of our Diocesan Vision: Shaping Our Future, parishes and parish partnerships took time to interpret it in their local context and submit their plans for Bishop Alan's consideration. After an initial delay due to the COVID-19 pandemic, plans had been put in place during 2021/22 in order to relaunch the process in 2022/23. Unfortunately, the relaunch was further delayed until January 2024 when all parishes received a pastoral letter from Bishop Alan Williams SM announcing the re-launch of the partnership process with combined parish partnership pastoral council meetings to be held across the Diocese as a matter of urgency.

Our objects as set out in our legal constitution are *“the advancement the Roman Catholic religion in the Diocese by such means as the Bishop may think fit and proper for the service and support whether in the Diocese or outside the Diocese of charitable works and objects promoted by the Church.”*

The Vision Document: Shaping Our Future represents a new way for us to work together for the advancement of the Roman Catholic religion in our Diocese. It commits us to focusing on restructuring ourselves and renewing ourselves, so that in turn we may best proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Restructuring

It is currently envisaged that our restructuring takes the form of placing 86 of our 87 parishes in 21 Parish Partnerships. These partnerships consist of people working together with the help of God to achieve a common goal. Thus, our Parish Partnerships are intended to actively work together to achieve renewal. The Cathedral parish stands alone to best allow it to be the mother church and a beacon for our whole Diocese.

The work of the parishes and the Parish Partnerships was supported during the year by the Director of Development, and all the other vicariates and their respective executive departments.

Renewal

Our work and our achievements are reported in the context of our Diocesan Vision Document: Shaping Our Future, so that for this year and moving forward we can report against the 12 Strands of Renewal. The relaunch of the Parish

Partnership process in January 2024 has also seen the appointment of Fr Dan Mason as the Episcopal Vicar for Parish Renewal.

Strand One: Charity, Justice and Social Action

CARITAS

“Social Justice demands that we fight against the causes of poverty: inequality and the lack of labour, land, and lodging; against those who deny social and labour rights; and against the culture that leads to taking away the dignity of others” Pope Francis Feb 2024

The Mission of Caritas Diocese of Brentwood is to maximise the opportunities for putting faith into action through charitable works, fully conscious of Christ’s commandment to love our neighbour, defined by His words ‘Whatever you do to the least of my brothers and sisters, you do to me’ We seek to serve the marginalised, the poor and the vulnerable by highlighting and developing a broad range of charitable projects in Parish Partnerships and schools across our Diocese and nationally.

The Vision of Caritas Diocese of Brentwood is defined by the truth that no-one is beyond the reach of the love of Christ. We aim to enable those in need of pastoral care to find that care and to better support those working on Social Justice projects in each part of the Diocese.

During the period, Caritas Diocese of Brentwood crystallised its work into three key strands.

- Environment (Laudato Si)
- Refugees and Migrants
- Homeless and the Cost of Living

We facilitate on-line meetings for each of these strands once every four months, complemented by an annual resourcing and networking day, bringing people together from across the Diocese.

Our 'intergenerational' approach to Caritas Diocese of Brentwood is also helping us to build young leaders for the present and the future, thus ensuring the longevity of our projects.



- The Diocese of Brentwood is a Real Living Wage employer.



- We continue to support the settlement of refugees in our communities via three Community Sponsorship schemes.

Strand Two: Christian Life and Worship

The celebration of the Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith, and so all other liturgies flow from and to the celebration of Mass

Our Diocese consists of 87 parishes. The number has reduced in recent years, and we anticipate that as Parish Partnerships evolve the number will further reduce.

The sacramental celebrations and other religious services, proclaiming the Gospel, exercise of the ministry of charity all take place in our parishes. Furthermore, engagement with society, the pastoral

care of, and service to, the Roman Catholic, and the broader community within our diocese, the provision, maintenance and upkeep of places of worship and, of course, prayer are largely undertaken by parishioners, priests and deacons in our parishes.

In most cases, parishes are in the pastoral care of diocesan priests and in several cases, the parishes are in the pastoral care of priests from Religious Orders or The Personal Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham. All our parishes are supported by an administration, referred to as the "Curia", which is organised into Vicariates supported in turn by an executive made up of paid lay people.



Each Sunday an average of 34,985 people (32,333 last year) attended services. Attendance has continued to recover from the impact of the COVID-19 restrictions in 2020/2021 but has still not recovered to pre-pandemic levels. The number of people who were either baptised or received into the church also decreased

slightly to 2,069 from 2,247 in the previous year.

With our Liturgy Office, our Chancery Office is involved with the administration of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults programme, and the reception of hundreds of people, from across the Diocese, who have followed the “Journey of Faith”, and wish to be received into the Catholic Church. On the first Sunday of Lent, more than 160 people hoping to be received into the Church at Easter, attended the ‘Rite of Election’ at Brentwood Cathedral.

During the year, our parishes raised over £99,000 (2023: £104,000) to support international causes, including natural disasters and overseas mission work, a slight decrease when compared to the previous year.

Parish volunteers contributed countless hours of work to good causes both within and beyond our diocese. Feedback from our parishes suggests that we have in excess of 6,000 volunteers helping to support our parishes.

Strand Three: Education

Supporting Catholic schools to provide excellent education where pupils flourish and Christ is made known to all.

Our training provision to schools generally continues to be delivered in a hybrid fashion with many face-to-face sessions and some by webinars. The detailed training schedule is extensive including ongoing modular courses for: Early Career Teachers (ECTs), the Catholic Certificate for Religious Studies (CCRS) induction for new Headteachers and Deputy Headteachers, termly update

meetings and training for Religious Education Leads, as well as a wealth of Governor training in the form of webinars. There has also been premises training, safeguarding training amongst the other sessions made available.

We request feedback from attendees to evaluate the training delivered in order to ensure that training remains relevant, and updates can be made where necessary. Feedback from attendees has been positive.

We continued to work closely with the Catholic Education Service (CES), Department for Education (DfE), Ofsted, Teaching Unions and the Regional Schools Commissioner (RSC) as well as relevant Local Authorities. As a religious authority, specific responsibilities remain in relation to the essential functions around Governance, Admissions, Reserved posts, RE and Collective Worship.

School leadership recruitment formed a significant part of our work during the period. Recruitment can be challenging and so our support to schools includes the provision of advice at the beginning of the recruitment process covering job descriptions, person specifications, shortlisting meetings as well as support during the interview process. All candidates – both successful and unsuccessful are offered the opportunity to receive detailed feedback.

Catholic School Inspection (CSI) is a key area of our work. We continue to ensure that a diocesan officer attends the feedback meeting at the end of a CSI or OFSTED inspection.

We’ve established a regular communications link with schools and Advisers to ensure that all relevant information received from the Catholic

Education Service and other sources is disseminated on a timely basis. We now distribute relevant information on a weekly basis to schools, which includes prayer and Catholic life materials.

The prime focus for the work of BDES is in securing, preserving and developing Catholic education into the future, as well as supporting schools when difficulties have arisen, where schools have experienced decline or turmoil and where schools have become more vulnerable. Our work is summed up in our Mission Statement; *“Supporting Catholic schools to provide excellent education where pupils flourish and Christ is made known to all.”*

Six Catholic Multi Academy Trusts (MATs) now exist in our Diocese. They operate under distinctly Catholic names (Rosary Trust, Assisi Catholic Trust, Christus Catholic Trust, Good Shepherd Catholic Trust, Our Lady of Grace Catholic Trust and Our Lady of Fatima Trust). This approach remains the preferred structure for Catholic schools within the Diocese of Brentwood. The majority of our schools have now been academised. We have seven independent schools.

To help schools in the procurement of supplies which are both ethical and good value, we facilitated a ‘Company’s Day’ in January 2024. The day was run in conjunction with Church Marketplace, and was a great success.

Our vision is that our schools will work together collaboratively in a formal structure which works for them, and benefits both pupils and staff.

SCHOOL GOVERNANCE

Governance is an area of key importance to our Diocese and continued to represent

an opportunity for lay people to take on leadership roles.

We ensure that training opportunities are increasingly accessible for governors via on-line provision in order to ensure Governors develop and maintain the required skillsets to both challenge and support the school leadership.

Strand Four: Family

Support for marriage and family is a crucial part of the Church’s ministry, and of great importance for society as a whole.

As a department of the Vicariate for Paish Renewal, our mission is to proclaim the good news of God’s love, revealed in a special way through the love of husband and wife, and the love for their children. Recognising that family life brings many challenges and is often undermined by the values of the contemporary world, the church has a special duty to accompany our families and offer whatever support is needed.

Where ongoing support is required, couples are introduced to other appropriate organisations such as Marriage Care or Retrouvaille, or their own parish.

Our Chancery Office processes marriage papers for marriages taking place inside and outside the Diocese, and supported another significant increase in the process of marriage papers when compared to the previous year:

- **56 (last year 81)** sets of marriage papers for marriages taking place outside the Diocese, mostly overseas.

- **43 (last year 59)** sets of marriage papers where one party belonged to another religion.
- **52 (last year 43)** sets of papers, where one party had not been baptized;
- **86 (last year 119)** sets of marriage papers for Catholics wishing to convalidate their civil marriage in the Catholic Church.

The year on year decrease was expected due to the impact of a catch up in the previous year due to marriages being postponed during the COVID pandemic.

In addition, the work of the Chancery enabled people to marry in Churches of other denominations, but with the necessary dispensations to allow the marriages to be recognised as valid by the Catholic Church.

Strand Five: Formation

Formation is a life-long process of listening to what the Holy Spirit is calling us to be and to do

In order to support our catechists, we continue to offer The Bishop's Certificate in Catechesis and Youth Ministry is a yearlong course of 12 modules, covering different aspects of faith and Church teaching, as well as practical skills in Youth Ministry. It is an entry-level qualification to help in the ongoing formation of adults who are involved in sacramental preparation or youth ministry in our Diocese. It includes development of practical skills and the deepening of theological knowledge.

The Vicariate for Parish Renewal aims to provide a variety of resources and support for those lay men and women who wish to develop a more mature understanding

of their Catholic Faith and to deepen their relationship with Christ through a life of prayer and service. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, it is hoped that lay men and women will find ways to grow in confidence as disciples and be better witness to the Church's mission of hope.

A dedicated website was launched in June 2021.

Strand Six: Integration

Make sure that every person of whatever background can find in you a welcoming heart.

In our Vision we seek to build on the rich diversity of people in our Diocese through a generous inclusivity. We look to work together with people of all faiths and none where the opportunity arises.

INTERNATIONAL TWINNING

Our Diocese is twinned with the Diocese of Dundee, Kwa-Zulu Natal, South Africa. Our solidarity with our fellow Catholics in Kwa-Zulu Natal is demonstrated by parishes and schools in both dioceses having twinned with each other. They build practical relationships beyond friendship and spiritual support.

Fr Gerry, a Brentwood Diocese priest, regularly travels to Dundee to help support the Twinning Project.

During the year parishes raised over £7,300 for the Twinning Project- falling slightly from the previous year, when the figure was over £10,000.

Strand Seven: Leaders

By right of baptism all are called to fulfil their vocation as the people of God.

During the year leaders continued to support our parishes and wider communities.

School Governorship is an important role for lay people who have appropriate skills to perform, and we continue to encourage people to come forward and train. We provide support governors and at the online governor conference in March 2024 provided an overview of the new diocesan guidance on admissions.

Also, in education leaders have been appointed to be Trustees of our Catholic Multi Academy Trusts. This is a key role for people to play in the future of our children and of catholic education.

The Diaconate is another key area where leadership can be exercised in our Diocese. During the period five people were in preparation for this ministry on the Southern Diaconate Formation Programme.

Strand Eight: Material Assets

As stewards of all that God has given to us, it is our responsibility to use those gifts as well as we can.

Parishes and Parish Partnerships have been looking at their material assets as a whole to see how they can be best used to fulfil our objectives and our Vision in their local context.

Central Finance Team: Our work focussed on increased support to the parishes,

recognising that most of the work of our Diocese occurs through the parishes and that many regulatory burdens fall on them. Finance and Administration guidelines are circulated on a regular basis to parish, to ensure that the most up to date guidance is available for Parish Priests, parish administrators, and volunteers.

We continued to offer a central payment facility for parishes as more suppliers request payment electronically. Alternative methods of giving continue to be considered across the Diocese as the banking network continues to shrink and the process of banking cash becomes more problematic.

The Finance Team provide online training on a regular basis for new volunteers and existing volunteers who are keen to learn new methods of working. Annual training is made available to all those involved the Finance and Gift Aid process, covering GDPR, Cyber Security, as well as General Finance and Gift Aid. Approximately 70% of our parish representatives are volunteers and we offer our thanks to them for their time and commitment.

Property Team: The Property Sub-Committee has delegated responsibility for both advising and making recommendations to the Board of the Corporate Trustee on strategic property matters across the Diocese and, under devolved powers, approval of property related parish expenditure in line with financial policy.

The responsibility for managing the maintenance of parish buildings rests with the parishes under Canon Law although it is the responsibility of our diocese as a

registered charity to ensure that assets are kept in a reasonably good condition. To complement the condition survey programme, funding towards the costs of energy surveys has been made available to parishes in order to help form a sustainability strategy to support the Diocesan Laudato Si commitments.

Health & Safety

The Health and Safety Sub-Committee assists and advises the Board of the Corporate Trustee in the discharge of its health and safety responsibilities. The Diocese appoints external consultants, SafetyToolbox Ltd, as the diocesan health and safety consultant and competent person to provide competent advice and support on the management and implementation of health and safety, fire safety and other related matters across the Diocese. During the year a series of online health and safety training modules were delivered for all clergy, parish staff and health and safety volunteers. The diocese recognises that fire has a unique capacity to threaten life, damage property, harm the environment and compromise our mission. Accordingly, the diocese is committed to taking reasonable and necessary measures to prevent fire and protect life safety in the event of fire in the context of the activities of the Diocese. The Board of the Corporate Trustee as well as those in control of our premises have legal obligations under the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005 (the FSO) and other relevant legislation. The updated Fire Safety Policy provides detail of a strengthened fire risk assessment programme which follows a five year cycle beginning with the delivery

of fire risk assessment completed by an authorised diocesan fire risk assessor.

Strand Nine: Prayer and Spirituality

Our relationship with God in Jesus Christ will only continue to develop and grow if we pay attention to it.

Prayers of intercession are made continuously throughout the year and during the year.

Strand Ten: Priests and People

We will explore new ways to recognise each other's gifts and to collaborate to bring our vision to reality.

We are thankful for the priests serving our Diocese and . During the year, as congregations returned to our churches, many clergy continued to utilise the new ways that had been found to keep in contact with our parish communities during the pandemic. More masses continued to be live streamed, and where possible, social media and online facilities helped maintain contact and provide support for the local parish communities.

Compulsory Safeguarding training now takes place for all clergy, as well as regular health and safety training.

Days of Recollection during Advent and Lent are also offered to our clergy.

Strand Eleven: Vocations to the Priesthood

We have continued to recognise that our first duty to encourage vocations as Catholics is to pray for priests and those considering priesthood.

The vocations website includes interesting and inspirational vocation stories told, by our diocesan priests and some of our seminarians. These powerful witnesses were recorded live as part of the holy hours to pray for vocations held throughout our diocese

We continue to pray for our seminarians and that many more will listen and respond to the call of Jesus to share in his priesthood.

Strand Twelve: Young People

You too, dear young people, can be joyful witnesses of his love, courageous witnesses of his Gospel, carrying to the world a ray of his light.

Our Vicariate for Youth Ministry can function only because of the great dedication of volunteers- young adult volunteers aged 18-23 who typically work with our staff at our Walsingham House retreat centre, for a year. During the COVID pandemic retreats and pilgrimages were cancelled- the effects were felt acutely by young people. The greatest challenge to faith and to the work of the Vicariate were the limitations of in-person gatherings.

In 2023, although we began to feel that things were starting to get back 'on track', with successful pilgrimages to Lourdes (travelling as a group of 112 representing 39 parishes and 9 secondary schools) and also World Youth Day in Lisbon, due to the lack of volunteers we were unable to offer a full programme of retreats. Instead we made our retreat centre available to schools and parishes to run their own retreats and training days.

Walsingham House holds the LOtc Quality Badge (Learning Outside the Classroom), a national award which assesses both risk management and educational provision.

In September 2023 we ran two retreats for Year 13s- in order to promote the opportunity to volunteer at Walsingham House and to ensure that a full retreat programme could be rolled out for the academic year 2024-25.

Young people are the future of our church

Structure, Governance and Management

The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust (the Charity) was constituted by Trust Deed in 1947. It is a registered charity, number 234092. Its objects are the advancement of the Roman Catholic religion in the Diocese by such means as the Bishop may think fit and proper for the service and support, whether in the Diocese or outside the Diocese, of charitable works and objects promoted by the Church. In addition, there are two separate funds which are registered as individual charities:

- The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund (BEEF) – the fund of the Diocese which meets the cost of educating and training seminarians – is a separately constituted charity under a Trust Deed, dated 11 July 1922, and registered under number 1067745. It is accounted for as a restricted fund within the Diocesan accounts.
- The investments of our Diocese are managed as a Pooled Fund, which is separately registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067742.

An order of the Charity Commissioners under S96(6) Charities Act 1993 permits the three charities, which have the same Trustee, to be treated as a single entity for accounting purposes.

Administration of the Charity is through the Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee (the Corporate Trustee). The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee, a company limited by guarantee, was set up in 1948 to act as custodian trustee in relation to the Charity and the ecclesiastical trusts of the Diocese. Its company number is 450897.

All parish property is in civil law held by the Corporate Trustee, subject to the Charity Trust Deed. The acquisition or disposal of parish property therefore must be sanctioned by the Directors of the Corporate Trustee, and all relevant documentation must be drawn up in the name of the Corporate Trustee.

Directors of the Corporate Trustee

In keeping with the Charity's objectives, it is a requirement that candidates for Directorship are committed Roman Catholics. The power to appoint Directors is vested in the Bishop of the Diocese.

Where additional Directors are required, the Bishop will consider the range of skills and experience required on the Board (such as finance, investments, strategic planning etc.), and will approach individuals in the Diocese who are likely to meet these requirements. Prospective Directors are provided with full information on the Charity's constitution, objects and finances. Training material is made available as necessary, and Directors are encouraged to complete online training modules which have been approved by the Charity Commission.

Governance of the Charity

The Charity is governed by the Board of Directors of the Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee (the "Corporate Trustee") which consists of the President of the Corporation (the Bishop of Brentwood) and up to fourteen other Directors.

The Board, in conjunction with the canonical bodies established by the Bishop to be his advisors and consultors, is responsible for the development and implementation of policies which ensure compliance with civil legislation and canon law. The key policies are safeguarding, health and safety, risk management, the production of financial budgets, the exercising of financial controls through regular financial reporting, the management of Diocesan properties, policies relating to employment and the compliance of the Charity with relevant company and charity legislation.

Authority for the management of the day-to-day business of the Diocese and compliance with civil legislation is delegated by the Board to the respective departmental Directors and parish priests in accordance with their directions.

In March 2014, the Finance Board (now known as the “Board”) approved revised Articles of Association for the Corporate Trustee, establishing the Bishop of Brentwood as the sole Member of the Corporate Trustee; the Board cannot implement a decision with which the Bishop disagrees. In December 2020, following an internal governance review, the Articles of Association were further revised, inter alia removing references to the ‘Finance Board’ and replacing these with the “Board”.

Sub-Committees of the Board

The Board has established several Sub-Committees delegating to them the consideration of specific areas of importance to the Diocese and authorising them to make some decisions and to submit recommendations to the main Board for approval:

- Parish Renewal
- Education
- Finance and Administration (including Investments)
- Health & Safety
- Human Resources & Diversity
- Property
- Safeguarding
- Youth Ministry and Pastoral Care

A separate committee (not a Sub-Committee of the Board) reviews the provision of support to sick and retired clergy and meets on a regular basis.

Key Management Personnel

The Trustee considers that the Directors of the Corporate Trustee, together with the Director of Finance, the Director of Education, the Diocesan Safeguarding Coordinator, the Diocesan Director of Development, the Director of Property and the Bishop’s Delegate for Civil Administration comprise the key management personnel of the Charity, in charge of directing, controlling, running and operating the Charity on a day to day basis. Salaries are reviewed on an annual basis by the Human Resources Team and authorised by the Board.

All Directors of the Trustee gave of their time freely, and no Director received remuneration in respect of their services as Directors of the Corporate Trustee. Details of the Trustee Directors’ expenses are disclosed in Note 18 of the accounts.

Financial Review

Investment policy The Diocese follows a total return investment policy, to achieve long term capital and income growth, to provide sufficient income to support today’s beneficiaries whilst still seeking ‘real’ growth in capital over rolling 5 year periods to meet the future needs of the Charity. The 5 year annualised performance of the portfolio was 7.1% as at 31 March 24 in comparison to the 5 year annualised CPI of 4.4%.

The Portfolio has performed better when compared to the ARC Peer Groups.

The Trustee is empowered within the Trust Deed to invest any monies as authorised by law for the investment of trust monies, in a manner which it thinks fits with the consent of the Bishop. The provisions of the Trustee Act 2000 apply.

Under section 26 of the Charities Act 1993, an Order was made by the Charity Commission on 5 December 1999 granting the Trustee power to appoint an investment manager, and to appoint a corporate body as the Trustee's nominee to hold the investments of the Charity. The General Power of Investment in the Trustee Act 2000 allows 'Trustees to invest trust funds in any kind of investment, excluding land [except under certain provisions], in which they could invest if they were the absolute owner of those funds'.

Diocesan Ethical Policy for investments: The Diocesan investment portfolio avoids investment in tobacco, arms, alcohol, gambling and pornography. Investment is also to be avoided in companies which support oppressive regimes, or trade in products which are produced by child labour or in forced labour camps, or companies which have been involved in the exploitation or unjust treatment of employees.

Our investment managers, Sarasin and Partners LLP, monitor any investments made by their Endowment Fund in companies which generate any revenue from the direct or indirect manufacture of pharmaceutical products, the use of which would contravene the Catholic Church's teaching on the sanctity of life. The fund manager also seeks to avoid investments in companies involved in predatory lending. Our investment managers take a pro-active approach in respect of voting on company resolutions, in order to promote responsible long-term stewardship. The Sarasins Endowment Fund will not invest in tobacco and will also avoid investment in companies that have more than 10% of their turnover from the following:

- Alcohol Manufacture
- Armaments
- Gambling
- Pornography

Sarasin & Partners has continued to actively engage with companies and regulators in order to uphold high standards relating to environmental, social and governance matters on behalf of the Trustee.

Risk Management: The Directors of the Corporate Trustee have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed and are satisfied that adequate systems are in place to mitigate exposure to these risks. Risks are recorded, by department, and a RAG status applied. Actions to mitigate the risks are identified and a timescale for completion assigned. The major risks are considered to be health and safety (ensuring that our buildings are maintained to an adequate standard, and policies adhered to), and pastoral (the falling number of priests in ministry). To mitigate the health and safety risks, a Health and Safety Committee meets on a regular basis to ensure that policies are being communicated and applied appropriately, risks are reviewed and action taken where appropriate. Health and Safety representatives are appointed at parish level. In respect of the falling number of priests in ministry, the Diocesan Vision addresses this issue and sets out plans in order to mitigate this risk going forward.

Financial Control Policy: Our Diocese has a series of financial controls and signing limits in place (in the parishes and at the Curia) in order to enable the Corporate Trustee to exercise its legal duties:

- To ensure we are carrying out our purposes for the public benefit
- To comply with our governing document and the law
- To act in the best interests of our Diocese
- To manage responsibly the resources of our Diocese
- To act with reasonable care and skill
- To ensure that we are accountable.

We continued to review the support provided to parishes during 2023-24, together with our associated controls and procedures continue to be reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Public Benefit: The Board Members confirm that they comply with the duty in S17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant. Details of the main activities undertaken to further the charity's purposes for the public benefit are noted earlier in this document.

Fundraising Policy: Our Diocese is registered with the Fundraising Regulator and is committed to the Fundraising Promise. We do not use any external fundraisers.

- We will commit to high standards, adhering to the Fundraising Code of Practice at all times, monitoring any person that raises funds on our behalf, and complying with the law as it applies to charities and fundraising.
- We will be clear, honest and open, in respect of what we will do with donations, how gifts can be made or amended, and the purpose of our Charity.
- We will be respectful of the rights and privacy of any donor.
- We will treat donors and the public fairly and reasonably, and not accept donations from those individuals who we believe may lack the capacity to make an informed decision
- We will hold ourselves accountable and responsible, ensuring that our resources are managed responsibly and that we have a complaints procedure in place. No complaints about fundraising activities were received during the year.

Reserves Policy: Unrestricted reserves, including parochial funds, totalled £51.4m. Restricted and endowment funds totalled £9.2m.

Central Diocesan reserves are held to meet the future needs of the Diocese as a whole and absorb the impact of any material risk.

Parochial reserves are held to meet the cost of future repairs and maintenance or major building projects which cannot be met out of expected income. The Diocese considers parish funds to be designated at parish level, for parish requirements.

The policy of the Diocese is to maintain its reserves at a level that will provide the income necessary to assist it in implementing its future objectives, including but not limited to the increased cost of caring for the Sick and Retired Clergy of the Diocese. The Diocese aims to hold cash reserves of £10m. Cash reserves as at 5 April 24 stood at £11.2m. Due to the size of the Diocese and the number of parishes within the Diocese, the Directors feel that this is a reasonable amount to cover expenditure for the period of one year. Should cash reserves fall below this, depending on the projected cash flow, investments may be liquidated.

Funds invested, and how they will be applied

Restricted funds £8.3m The two largest funds are as follows:

- The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund (BEEF), a fund for the support and training of seminarians, was valued at £4.4m as at 5 April 2024. As at April 2024 there were five seminarians. When in seminary, each normally costing just under £50,000 p.a. During 2023/24, a legacy of £270,000 was recognised which together with gains in investments led to a surplus for the period.
- The second largest restricted fund is the Sick and Retired Clergy Fund standing at £1.89m. The Diocese is planning how best to finance the support of priests due to retire over the next 10-15 years.

Designated funds £2.7m

- The largest designated fund is the General Education Fund which stands at £2.3m. With the development of a new diocesan vision and strategy for Education, the Trustee considers how best to utilise these funds.

Permanent Endowment funds £1m

- The largest endowment fund is the Crowhurst legacy which stands at £0.5m – these funds are to be used to buy a suitable property for sick or retired priests. These funds have been used to purchase properties in order to meet the housing requirements of sick and retired priests.

Unrestricted funds held by the centre £8.9m

- Non-parochial unrestricted funds are invested in the Sarasin Endowment Fund (formerly Alpha CIF for Endowments) in order to generate investment revenue which contributes to the work of the Curia. The fund value has decreased year on year.

Financial Performance: With reference to the statement of financial activities in the financial statements.

At the end of the financial year 2023-24 diocesan funds as a whole totalled £62.2m (2023: £60.3m). Income has increased from £16.7m in the prior year to £17.7m. A continued gradual recovery in donations income and other income streams such as hall rental continues and one parishes have applied and received grant income in order to help finance projects. Other income of £189k was generated primarily from the sale of one parish site (2023: £5k).

As part of the Diocesan Renewal process, we are reviewing our material assets in order to decide how best to use them for the future.

Expenditure increased from £16.7m in the previous year to £17.2m, the most significant driver being an increase in costs incurred for liturgical and catechetical purposes.

Parish Reserves As at 5 April 2024, parish fixed assets totalled £18.4m (2023: £16.6m) and free Parochial reserves £21.4m (2023: £22.5m). A large part of the increase in fixed asset value related to primarily to a project in one parish.

Plans for the Future

Our Diocesan Vision (on pages 3-12) details our plans for the future, the renewal process was relaunched in January 2024.

Disclosure of information to auditors

The Members of the Board of the Trustee who held office at the date of approval of this report confirm that, so far as they are each aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the charity's auditors are unaware; and:

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEE'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustee is responsible for preparing the Trustee's Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the Trustee has elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under charity law the Trustee must not approve the financial statements unless satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charity for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the Trustee is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP 2019 (FRS 102);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustee is responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charities (Accounts and Report Regulations) 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. It is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust (the 'charity') for the year ended 5 April 2024 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cashflows and notes to the financial statements, including significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charity's affairs as at 5 April 2024, and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the charity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

The other information comprises the information included in the trustees' annual report, other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The trustees are responsible for the other information contained within the annual report. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the course of the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether this gives rise to a material misstatement in the financial statements themselves. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

This risk increases the more that compliance with a law or regulation is removed from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, as we will be less likely to become aware of the instances of non-compliance. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2024

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with all statutory requirements and with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable to the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (Effective 1 January 2019) – (Charities SORP (FRS102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102). The particular accounting policies adopted are described below. The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified to include certain tangible fixed assets at a valuation and fixed asset investments at market value. Figures are presented in sterling and rounded to the nearest pound.

The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102 and was constituted by Trust Deed in 1947. The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Funds (BEEF) is separately constituted under Trust Deed dated 11 July 1922 and registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067745. The Brentwood Diocesan Investment Pooled Fund is separately registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067742. Under S26 (6) of the Charities Act 1993, these three charities which have the Same Trustee are permitted to be treated as a single entity for accounting purposes. The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective from 1 January 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

a) Preparation of accounts on a going concern basis

Having considered the cash reserves as at February 2025, future budgets and cash flows, the Trustee confirms that there are no material uncertainties about the entity's ability to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

The Directors of the Corporate Trustee have reviewed the cash reserves as February 2025 and the projected cash outflow over the next twelve months. In light of these considerations, the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing these financial statements.

b) Legacies, Donations and Grants

Legacies and donations are recognised when receivable or when the Diocese becomes legally entitled to them and receipt is probable, and they can reasonably be measured in financial terms. Receipts of property, investments or other gifts in kind are included at market value. Grants are recognised when the charity has entitlement and when the amount is measurable.

c) Investment Income

Investment income is accounted for as it accrues.

d) Expenditure

Costs of raising funds comprise those costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the management of the Charity's investments.

Costs of charitable activities consist of all expenditure directly relating to the objects of the Charity. Support costs which cannot be directly allocated are apportioned between charitable activities and governance costs on the basis of the Trustee's estimate of the time spent on the relevant functions.

Employment benefits, including holiday pay, are recognised in the period in which they are earned. Termination benefits are recognised in the period in which the decision is made and communicated to the relevant employee(s).

Governance costs include expenditure on management and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements together with an allocation of support costs.

Irrecoverable VAT is included with the category of expenses to which it relates.

e) Tangible Fixed Assets

Prior to 6 April 1996 the cost of fixed assets was written off in the year of acquisition and no comprehensive cost records were maintained. In order to arrive at a reasonable valuation of parish property, taking into account age, type, condition and life expectancy, the Trustee considered that insured values at 6 April 1997 should be discounted by 90% and in subsequent years be depreciated at 2% per annum. This valuation will not be updated in the future. Properties acquired after 6 April 1996 are capitalised at their actual cost of acquisition.

The school properties (land and buildings) are vested in the name of the Diocesan Trustee. The Diocesan Trustee cannot take a unilateral decision to dispose of these properties. Disposal can only occur if the school governors and the Secretary of State for Education decide that all or part of a school site is no longer required for education. In most circumstances, where a disposal occurs, the Secretary of State or the local authority may be entitled to recoup grant. Although no rights of ownership vest in the school governing body, most other rights and obligations, such as for the maintenance and repair of the school and its facilities, are passed to the governors. The Trustees therefore consider that, for the purposes of these financial statements, the nature of their ownership is that of a custodianship, however these properties have been purchased and written off in the Diocesan accounts for the amounts that the Diocese contributed in the past and the costs involved have not been separately identified and are not considered material in the overall context of the accounts.

The estimated cost of furniture, equipment and motor vehicles held at 6 April 1996 has been capitalised in the financial statements. Subsequent additions are capitalised at cost. Individual works of art, historical treasures and plate are not depreciated as they have extremely long lives and are considered to be worth preserving indefinitely.

Depreciation is calculated by the straight line method to write off the cost/value less anticipated residual value, over the expected useful lives of assets as follows:-

Freehold buildings additions since 6 April 1996	50 years
Fixtures and fittings	10 years
Furniture and equipment (> £5,000)	5 years
Motor vehicles	4 years

The residual values of buildings held at 6 April 1996 are considered to be significantly higher than their carrying value in the accounts resulting in a nil value for depreciation charge.

f) School Building Programme

The Diocese assists schools undertaking major projects by meeting the costs and claiming grants on behalf of the schools. These grants are netted off against the cost and only the net costs to the Diocese are included in the financial statements

g) Financial Instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Fixed assets are recorded at depreciated historical cost or revaluation, investments are recorded at their fair value which is the market value as disclosed in note 11 and all other assets and liabilities are recorded at cost which is their fair value.

h) Investments

Pooled investments are valued at fair value on the balance sheet date. Investment properties are valued at fair value and stated at a Trustee's valuation. Unrealised gains/losses on investments are calculated as the difference between opening market value and closing market value after adjusting for additions and disposals during the year, less investment management and administration costs.

i) Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

j) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

k) Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

I) Fund accounting

General funds

These comprise the accumulated surplus or deficit from the Statement of Financial Activities which is not restricted nor designated funds. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity

Designated Funds

These funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustee for particular purposes. Details of the funds designated by the Trustee are set out in note 12.

Restricted Funds

These funds are subject to restrictions imposed by the donor. Details of funds subject to legal restriction are set out in note 13.

Parochial Funds

Each parish within the Diocese of Brentwood is established and operates under the Code of Canon law, which means that each parish has separate canonical status. Therefore, parochial funds are treated as restricted funds in these accounts.

The use of the parochial funds is the responsibility of the Parish Priest, Board of Directors of the Corporate Trustee, and the Bishop.

m) Pensions

All eligible staff are members of an Aegon group personal pension scheme to which the Charity makes contributions. Employees may contribute an additional amount. As a defined contribution scheme, no liability falls upon the Charity, as employer, to make good a shortfall of funding other than contributions due.

Some staff employed in the educational work of the Diocese are members of the Teacher's Pension Scheme ("TPS") which is a defined benefits scheme. Diocesan contribution levels are determined by the TPS. The TPS is a multi-employer scheme, and, as there is insufficient information available to use defined benefit accounting, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

n) Significant judgements and estimation uncertainty

In preparing these financial statements the trustees have had to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts recognised in these financial statements. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Key areas subject to judgement and estimation are as follows:

Fixed asset depreciation. Judgement is applied when assigning anticipated average lives to the fixed assets of the charity.

Investment properties are included at a value determined by at a desktop valuation conducted by a property management company, or with reference to similar properties in the area of each respective property.

Walsingham House

This house is used for the provision of youth retreats.

Sick and Retired Clergy Fund

Income is used to help support fully retired, partially retired and sick priests. Transfers represent contributions to the fund from the Diocese.

Mensal Fund

This fund is used to support the Diocesan activities of the Bishop. Transfers represent contributions to the fund from the Diocese.

BEEF (Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund)

This fund meets the costs of training priests for the Diocese. Transfers represent contributions from collections on its behalf from the parishes.

Mass Fund

Income received from donors is paid to priests who celebrate masses for the donors. Transfers represent mass stipends paid over to parishes.

Parish Restricted Funds

These funds consist of donations and other contributions to parishes for specific purposes within the parish.

BRCDT Education Fund

These funds are used to finance the provision of education advisors to schools within the Diocese.

Caritas

This fund is used to promote and support Catholic Social Teaching. As such, the pre-existing Social Welfare Fund (previously reported within Other Restricted Funds) has been incorporated into the Caritas Fund.

Voluntary-Aided Schools Condition Allocation (VASCA)

This fund represents the capital grant funding received by the Diocese from the DfE. The funding is allocated by the Trustee to schools to fund school capital projects.

The property may be sold but the proceeds must be invested in another property to be used for the same purposes. The property was sold during 2005. The proceeds have been invested with Sarasins until a suitable replacement property has been found.

Sullivan Special Trust

This fund comprises an investment property the income of which is for the benefit of the parish priest at Southend parish.

The Charity is governed by the Board of Directors of the Corporate Trustee, The Brentwood Catholic Diocese Trustee (company number 450897).

18. TRANSACTIONS WITH DIRECTORS OF THE CORPORATE TRUSTEE

A majority of the Directors of the Corporate Trustee are also parish priests in the Diocese. As priests they receive income from their parishes together with living accommodation, living expenses and reimbursement of costs incurred on behalf of their parish on the same basis as other priests within the Diocese. They do not receive any remuneration or benefits from their trusteeship other than the purchase by the Diocese of trustees' indemnity insurance providing cover of up to £5,000,000 during the year (the premium is paid as part of public liability insurance). Travel costs totalling £NIL (2023: £NIL) and consultancy costs in respect of courses arranged by the Vicariate for Education in the amount of £1,200 (2023 £1,200) were reimbursed to one (2023: one) Director during the year. During the year, Directors of the Corporate Trustee donated £3,340 (2023 £3,375) in aggregate, to the Diocese.

20. THIRD PARTY COLLECTIONS

Parishes hold collections on behalf of third party charities. Because the Diocese is acting as agent for these charities, these collections have been excluded from these financial statements. During the year £1,223,634 (2023:£1,029,571) was collected on behalf of third party charities. At 5 April 2024 £344,772 (2023 £183,070) was held on behalf of third party charities.

21. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Related Party transactions with the Directors of the Corporate Trustee are disclosed in Note 18 of these Accounts. There were no other related party transactions during the year (2023, none).

22. PENSION COMMITMENTS

The charity's academic and related staff belong to the Teachers' pension Scheme England and Wales. This is a multi-employer defined benefit scheme. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2020. There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, unfunded, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pensions Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary – these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teacher's Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to ensure scheme costs are recognised and managed appropriately and the review specifies the level of future contributions.

Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2020. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 27 October 2023, with the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, applying a notional investment return based on 1.7% above the rate of CPI. The key elements of the valuation outcome are:

- Employer contribution rates set at 28.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levy). This is an increase of 5% in employer contributions and the cost control result is such that no change in member benefits is needed.
- Total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £262,000 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £222,200 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £39,800 million

The result of this valuation will be implemented from 1 April 2024. The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2028

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website. Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The Charity is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the plan. Accordingly, the Charity has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS 102 and has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme.

Diocesan Vision: Building On Our Past

The Diocese of Brentwood was formally erected in 1917. Our first bishop, Bishop Ward had a great personal devotion to Our Lady's shrine at Lourdes and Brentwood was the first diocese in England & Wales to have Our Lady of Lourdes as its Principal Patron. His devotion to St Edmund of Abingdon (or Canterbury), led to the choice of that saint as a Secondary Patron of the new diocese (together with St Erconwald and subsequently St Cedd).

Our present Father in God is Bishop Alan Williams, a Marist Father and formerly Rector of the National Shrine of Our Lady at Walsingham. He has responsibility for a diocese of rich diversity: East End and suburbs, towns ancient and modern, seaside resorts, rural parishes comprising dozens of villages, as well as schools, religious houses, and chaplaincies in hospitals, prisons and universities.

It is our prayer that as we give thanks for the witness of past generations, we also pray for a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit that we may be evermore faithful to proclaiming the Gospel of Christ.



Diocesan Vision: Shaping Our Future

The Stewards of the Gospel initiative has been a period of discernment for us as we seek the best response we can give to God's love for us in an ever-changing society. Following the publication of our Diocesan Vision: Shaping Our Future, parishes and parish partnerships took time to interpret it in their local context and submit their plans for Bishop Alan's consideration. After an initial delay due to the COVID-19 pandemic, plans had been put in place during 2021/22 in order to relaunch the process in 2022/23. Unfortunately the relaunch was further delayed until January 2024 when all parishes received a pastoral letter from Bishop Alan Williams SM announcing the re-launch of the partnership process with combined parish partnership pastoral council meetings to be held across the Diocese as a matter of urgency.

Diocesan Vision: Our Legal Objects

Our objects as set out in our legal constitution are *“the advancement the Roman Catholic religion in the Diocese by such means as the Bishop may think fit and proper for the service and support whether in the Diocese or outside the Diocese of charitable works and objects promoted by the Church.”*

The Vision Document: Shaping Our Future represents a new way for us to work together for the advancement of the Roman Catholic religion in our Diocese. It commits us to focusing on restructuring ourselves and renewing ourselves, so that in turn we may best proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Restructuring

It is currently envisaged that our restructuring takes the form of placing 86 of our 87 parishes in 21 Parish Partnerships. These partnerships consist of people working together with the help of God to achieve a common goal. Thus, our Parish Partnerships are intended to actively work together to achieve renewal. The Cathedral parish stands alone to best allow it to be the mother church and a beacon for our whole Diocese.

The work of the parishes and the parish partnerships has been supported during the year by the Director of Development, and all the other vicariates and their respective executive departments.

Renewal

Our work and our achievements are reported in the context of our Diocesan Vision Document: Shaping Our Future, so that for this year and moving forward we can report against the 12 Strands of Renewal. The relaunch of the Parish

Partnership process in January 2024 has also seen the appointment of Fr Dan Mason as the Episcopal Vicar for Parish Renewal.

Strand One: Charity, Justice and Social Action

CARITAS

“Social Justice demands that we fight against the causes of poverty: inequality and the lack of labour, land, and lodging; against those who deny social and labour rights; and against the culture that leads to taking away the dignity of others” Pope Francis Feb 2023

Caritas Diocese of Brentwood was launched on “World Day of the Poor” in November 2018, and a full time Diocesan Caritas Co-Ordinator was in post by April 21.

Our now Director of Caritas Diocese of Brentwood has championed our response to Pope Francis’ call to care for our common home, working alongside other Dioceses in the Environmental Leads Group.

After launching our ‘Laudato Si’ invitations, Commitments and Actions document in October 2022, we engaged with 21 parishes and many schools in order to establish an ever growing Laudato Si network.

Communication is key and we maintain our strong social and digital media presence to publicise the many Social Action projects we support. Our Director of Caritas was interviewed by BBC Essex, where they were able to raise awareness about what is done to help the homeless, support foodbanks and provide support to refugees across the Diocese.

- We continued to champion the Real Living Wage, ensuring that this is the minimum paid (since 2018) to every employee in the Diocese.



- We now have three Community Sponsorship projects in Essex supporting the settlement of refugees in our communities.

Strand Two: Christian Life and Worship

The celebration of the Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith, and so all other liturgies flow from and to the celebration of Mass

Our Diocese consists of 87 parishes. The number has reduced in recent years, and we anticipate that as Parish Partnerships evolve the number will further reduce.

The sacramental celebrations and other religious services, proclaiming the Gospel, exercise of the ministry of charity all take place in our parishes. Furthermore, engagement with society, the pastoral care of, and service to, the Roman Catholic, and the broader community within our diocese, the provision, maintenance and upkeep of places of worship and, of course, prayer are largely undertaken by parishioners, priests and deacons in our parishes.

In most cases, parishes are in the pastoral care of diocesan priests and in several cases, the parishes are in the pastoral care of priests from Religious Orders or The Personal Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham. All our parishes are supported by an administration, referred to as the "Curia", which is organised into Vicariates supported in turn by an executive made up of paid lay people.



Each Sunday an average of 32,333 people (26,117 last year), attended services. Attendance has continued to recover from the impact of the COVID-19 restrictions in 2020/2021 but has still not recovered to pre-pandemic levels- a decline of over 20%. Similarly the number of people who were either baptised or received into the church also increased to 2,247 from 1,894 in the previous year.

With our Liturgy Office, our Chancery Office is involved with the administration side of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults programme, the reception of hundreds of people, from across the Diocese, who have followed the "Journey

of Faith”, and wish to be received into the Catholic Church.

During the year, our parishes raised over £104,000 (2022: £78,000) to support international causes, including natural disasters and overseas mission work, a significant increase when compared to the previous year.

Parish volunteers contributed countless hours of work to good causes both within and beyond our diocese.

Strand Three: Education

Supporting Catholic schools to provide excellent education where pupils flourish and Christ is made known to all.

Our online training programme is now well established and during the year we were once again able to deliver more face to face training. Our training opportunities are diverse, ranging from more practical themes such as premises and site maintenance and health and safety, to Governance and Safeguarding. Training is also available from a Catholic context- including music from a Catholic perspective.

Our newly Racial Justice Working Group for schools continued to meet.

Our school visits are now back to pre-pandemic levels.

We continued to work closely with the Catholic Education Service (CES), Department for Education (DfE), Ofsted, Teaching Unions and the Regional Schools Commissioner (RSC) as well as relevant Local Authorities. As a religious authority, specific responsibilities remain in relation to the essential functions around

Governance, Admissions, Reserved posts, RE and Collective Worship.

Appointments to reserved posts formed a significant part of our work during the period with at least 14 appointments being made.

We’ve established a regular communications link with schools and Advisers to ensure that all relevant information received from the CES and other sources is disseminated on a timely basis. We now distribute relevant information on a weekly basis to schools, which includes prayer and Catholic life materials.

The prime focus for the work of BDES is in securing, preserving and developing Catholic education into the future, as well as supporting schools when difficulties have arisen, where schools have experienced decline or turmoil and where schools have become more vulnerable. Our work is summed up in our Mission Statement; *“Supporting Catholic schools to provide excellent education where pupils flourish and Christ is made known to all.”*

Six Catholic Multi Academy Trusts (MATs) now exist in our Diocese. They operate under distinctly Catholic names (Rosary Trust, Assisi Catholic Trust, Christus Catholic Trust, Good Shepherd Catholic Trust, Our Lady of Grace Catholic Trust and Our Lady of Fatima Trust). This approach remains the preferred structure for Catholic schools within the Diocese of Brentwood, and we hope to establish a seventh MAT in the near future. The majority of our schools have now been academized. We have seven independent schools.

Our vision is that our schools will work together collaboratively in a formal structure which works for them, and benefits both pupils and staff.

SCHOOL GOVERNANCE

Governance is an area of key importance to our Diocese and continued to represent an opportunity for lay people to take on leadership roles.

We ensure that training opportunities are increasingly accessible for governors via on-line provision in order to ensure Governors develop and maintain the required skillsets to both challenge and support the school leadership.

Strand Four: Family

Support for marriage and family is a crucial part of the Church's ministry, and of great importance for society as a whole.

As a department of the Vicariate for Adult Formation, our mission is to proclaim the good news of God's love, revealed in a special way through the love of husband and wife, and the love for their children. Recognising that family life brings many challenges and is often undermined by the values of the contemporary world, the church has a special duty to accompany our families and offer whatever support is needed.

Where ongoing support is required, couples are introduced to other appropriate organisations such as Marriage Care or Retrouvaille, or their own parish.

Our Chancery Office processes marriage papers for marriages taking place inside and outside the Diocese, and supported another significant increase in the process of marriage papers when compared to the previous year:

- **81 (last year 45)** sets of marriage papers for marriages taking place outside the Diocese, mostly overseas.
- **59 (last year 66)** sets of marriage papers where one party belonged to another religion.
- **43 (last year 56)** sets of papers, where one party had not been baptized;
- **119 (last year 95)** sets of marriage papers for Catholics wishing to convalidate their civil marriage in the Catholic Church.

The increase in activity was anticipated due to the number of postponements in 2020 and 2021.

In addition, the work of the Chancery enabled people to marry in Churches of other denominations, but with the necessary dispensations to allow the marriages to be recognised as valid by the Catholic Church.

Strand Five: Formation

Formation is a life-long process of listening to what the Holy Spirit is calling us to be and to do

In order to support our catechists, we continue to offer The Bishop's Certificate in Catechesis and Youth Ministry is a yearlong course of 12 modules, covering different aspects of faith and Church teaching, as well as practical skills in Youth Ministry. It is an entry-level qualification to help in the ongoing formation of adults who are involved in sacramental

preparation or youth ministry in our Diocese. It includes development of practical skills and the deepening of theological knowledge

The Vicariate for Adult Formation aims to provide a variety of resources and support for those lay men and women who wish to develop a more mature understanding of their Catholic Faith and to deepen their relationship with Christ through a life of prayer and service. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, it is hoped that lay men and women will find ways to grow in confidence as disciples and be better witness to the Church's mission of hope.

A dedicated website was launched in June 21.

Strand Six: Integration

Make sure that every person of whatever background can find in you a welcoming heart.

In our Vision we seek to build on the rich diversity of people in our Diocese through a generous inclusivity. We look to work together with people of all faiths and none where the opportunity arises.

INTERNATIONAL TWINNING

Our Diocese is twinned with the Diocese of Dundee, Kwa-Zulu Natal, South Africa. Our solidarity with our fellow Catholics in Kwa-Zulu Natal is demonstrated by parishes and schools in both dioceses having twinned with each other. They build practical relationships beyond friendship and spiritual support.

Fr Gerry, a Brentwood Diocese priest returned to the UK during the year after many years of distinguished service in Dundee, and continues to help support the Twinning Project.

During the year parishes raised over £10,000 for the Twinning Project- an increase of over 100% on the previous year.

Strand Seven: Leaders

By right of baptism all are called to fulfil their vocation as the people of God.

During the year leaders continued to support our parishes and wider communities.

School Governorship is an important role for lay people who have appropriate skills to perform, and we continue to encourage people to come forward and train. Our education team continued to support our Governors remotely during the period.

Also, in education leaders have been appointed to be Trustees of our Catholic Multi Academy Trusts. This is a key role for people to play in the future of our children and of catholic education.

The Diaconate is another key area where leadership can be exercised in our Diocese. During the period five people were in preparation for this ministry on the Southern Diaconate Formation Programme.

Strand Eight: Material Assets

As stewards of all that God has given to us, it is our responsibility to use those gifts as well as we can.

Parishes and Parish Partnerships have been looking at their material assets as a whole to see how they can be best used

to fulfil our objectives and our Vision in their local context.

Central Finance Team: Our work focussed on increased support to the parishes, recognising that most of the work of our Diocese occurs through the parishes and that many regulatory burdens fall on them. Finance and Administration guidelines are circulated on a regular basis to parish, to ensure that the most up to date guidance is available for Parish Priests, parish administrators, and volunteers.

We continued to offer a central payment facility for parishes as more suppliers request payment electronically. Alternative methods of giving continue to be considered across the Diocese as the banking network continues to shrink and the process of banking cash becomes more problematic.

Following the easing of restrictions, the Finance Team were able to visit parish offices and deliver 1.1 training to new employees when required. The Team also provide online training on a regular basis. In March 23 we held our first central training session since March 20 for Finance and Gift Aid parish representatives. Training covered GDPR, Cyber Security, as well as General Finance and Gift Aid.

Approximately 70% of our parish representatives are volunteers and we offer our thanks to them for their time and commitment.

The Finance and Property Teams worked together to manage a project to revalue all investment properties included in the Annual Accounts.

Property Team: The Property Sub-Committee has delegated responsibility

for both advising and making recommendations to the Board of the Corporate Trustee on strategic property matters across the Diocese and, under devolved powers, approval of property related parish expenditure in line with financial policy.

The responsibility for managing the maintenance of parish buildings rests with the parishes under Canon Law although it is the responsibility of our diocese as a registered charity to ensure that assets are kept in a reasonably good condition. To support parishes, the Property Office has developed a Condition Survey programme which has been trialled in a number of parishes and will be made available across the Diocese during subsequent years.

Health & Safety

The Health and Safety Sub-Committee assists and advises the Board of the Corporate Trustee in the discharge of its health and safety responsibilities. The Diocese appoints external consultants, SafetyToolbox Ltd, as the diocesan health and safety consultant and competent person to provide competent advice and support on the management and implementation of health and safety, fire safety and other related matters across the Diocese. During the year a series of online health and safety training modules were delivered for all clergy, parish staff and health and safety volunteers. The diocese recognises that fire has a unique capacity to threaten life, damage property, harm the environment and compromise our mission. Accordingly, the diocese is committed to taking reasonable and necessary measures to prevent fire

and protect life safety in the event of fire in the context of the activities of the Diocese. The Board of the Corporate Trustee as well as those in control of our premises have legal obligations under the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005 (the FSO) and other relevant legislation. The updated Fire Safety Policy provides detail of a strengthened fire risk assessment programme which follows a five year cycle beginning with the delivery of fire risk assessment completed by an authorised diocesan fire risk assessor.

Strand Nine: Prayer and Spirituality

Our relationship with God in Jesus Christ will only continue to develop and grow if we pay attention to it.

Prayers of intercession are made continuously throughout the year and during the year.

Strand Ten: Priests and People

We will explore new ways to recognise each other's gifts and to collaborate to bring our vision to reality.

We are thankful for the priests serving our Diocese. During the year, as congregations returned to our churches, many clergy continued to utilise the new ways that had been found to keep in contact with our parish communities during the pandemic. More masses continued to be live streamed, and where possible, social media and online facilities helped maintain contact and provide support for the local parish communities.

Compulsory Safeguarding training now takes place for all clergy.

Days of Recollection during Advent and Lent are also offered to our clergy.

Strand Eleven: Vocations to the Priesthood

We have continued to recognise that our first duty to encourage vocations as Catholics is to pray for priests and those considering priesthood.

The vocations website includes interesting and inspirational vocation stories told, by our diocesan priests and some of our seminarians. These powerful witnesses were recorded live as part of the holy hours to pray for vocations held throughout our diocese www.brentwoodvocations.co.uk/vocations-stories/.

The stories are also available via @BrentwoodVocs

During the year, we held vocation days in schools in order to raise awareness of vocations.

We continue to pray for our seminarians and that many more will listen and respond to the call of Jesus to share in his priesthood.

Strand Twelve: Young People

You too, dear young people, can be joyful witnesses of his love, courageous witnesses of his Gospel, carrying to the world a ray of his light.

The Brentwood Catholic Youth Service (BCYS) had a strong programme of events from June 22, with retreats for schools and parishes at Walsingham House (our retreat centre) and Outreach being fully

booked in the summer. In June, Walsingham House hosted over 500 Year 6 students for 'Primary Schools Festivals' whereby schools belonging to the same MAT attended together.

Just over 2000 young people from 4 parishes and 30 schools (including the Primary School Festivals group) were welcomed by the Walsingham House team.

Confirmation retreat days were run for several parishes.

We were pleased that Walsingham House was awarded the LOTc Quality Badge (Learning Outside the Classroom), a national award which assesses both risk management and educational provision.

In March 2023 over 1000 young people from the Diocese of Brentwood gathered at Wembley Arena for the Flame Congress, the largest Catholic Youth Conference attended by over 8000 young people for a day of prayer, worship, music, the opportunity to listen to inspirational speakers and learn about faith.

Young people are the future of our church and we are committed to ensure that where possible we provide help and support wherever we can.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust (the Charity) was constituted by Trust Deed in 1947. It is a registered charity, number 234092. Its objects are the advancement of the Roman Catholic religion in the Diocese by such means as the Bishop may think fit and proper for the service and support, whether in the Diocese or outside the Diocese, of charitable works and objects promoted by the Church. In addition, there are two separate funds which are registered as individual charities:

- The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund (BEEF) – the fund of the Diocese which meets the cost of educating and training seminarians – is a separately constituted charity under a Trust Deed, dated 11 July 1922, and registered under number 1067745. It is accounted for as a restricted fund within the Diocesan accounts.
- The investments of our Diocese are managed as a Pooled Fund, which is separately registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067742.

An order of the Charity Commissioners under S96(6) Charities Act 1993 permits the three charities, which have the same Trustee, to be treated as a single entity for accounting purposes.

Administration of the Charity is through the Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee (the Corporate Trustee). The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee, a company limited by guarantee, was set up in 1948 to act as custodian trustee in relation to the Charity and the ecclesiastical trusts of the Diocese. Its company number is 450897.

All parish property is in civil law held by the Corporate Trustee, subject to the Charity Trust Deed. The acquisition or disposal of parish property therefore has to be sanctioned by the Directors of the Corporate Trustee, and all relevant documentation must be drawn up in the name of the Corporate Trustee.

Directors of the Corporate Trustee

In keeping with the Charity's objectives, it is a requirement that candidates for Directorship are committed Roman Catholics. The power to appoint Directors is vested in the Bishop of the Diocese.

Where additional Directors are required, the Bishop will consider the range of skills and experience required on the Board (such as finance, investments, strategic planning etc.), and will approach individuals in the Diocese who are likely to meet these requirements. Prospective Directors are provided with full information on the Charity's constitution, objects and finances. Training material is made available as necessary, and Directors are encouraged to complete online training modules which have been approved by the Charity Commission.

Governance of the Charity

The Charity is governed by the Board of Directors of the Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee (the "Corporate Trustee") which consists of the President of the Corporation (the Bishop of Brentwood) and up to fourteen other Directors.

The Board, in conjunction with the canonical bodies established by the Bishop to be his advisors and consultors, is responsible for the development and implementation of policies which ensure compliance with civil legislation and canon law. The key policies are safeguarding, health and safety, risk management, the production of financial budgets, the exercising of financial controls through regular financial reporting, the management of Diocesan properties, policies relating to employment and the compliance of the Charity with relevant company and charity legislation.

Authority for the management of the day-to-day business of the Diocese and compliance with civil legislation is delegated by the Board to the respective departmental Directors and parish priests in accordance with their directions.

In March 2014, the Finance Board (now known as the "Board") approved revised Articles of Association for the Corporate Trustee, establishing the Bishop of Brentwood as the sole Member of the Corporate Trustee; the Board cannot implement a decision with which the Bishop disagrees. In December 2020, following an internal governance review, the Articles of Association were further revised, inter alia removing references to the 'Finance Board' and replacing these with the "Board".

Sub-Committees of the Board

The Board has established a number of Sub-Committees delegating to them the consideration of specific areas of importance to the Diocese and authorising them to make some decisions and to submit recommendations to the main Board for approval:

- Adult Formation
- Education
- Finance and Administration (including Investments)
- Health & Safety
- Human Resources & Diversity
- Property
- Safeguarding
- Youth Ministry and Pastoral Care

A separate committee (not a Sub-Committee of the Board) reviews the provision of support to sick and retired clergy and meets on a regular basis.

Key Management Personnel

The Trustee considers that the Directors of the Corporate Trustee, together with the Director of Finance, the Director of Education, the Diocesan Safeguarding Coordinator, the Diocesan Director of Development, the Director of Property and the Bishop's Delegate for Civil Administration comprise the key management personnel of the Charity, in charge of directing, controlling, running and operating the Charity on a day to day basis. Salaries are reviewed on an annual basis by the Human Resources Team and authorised by the Board.

All Directors of the Trustee gave of their time freely, and no Director received remuneration in respect of their services as Directors of the Corporate Trustee. Details of the Trustee Directors' expenses are disclosed in Note 18 of the accounts.

Financial Review

Investment policy The Diocese follows a total return investment policy, to achieve long term capital and income growth, to provide sufficient income to support today's beneficiaries whilst still seeking 'real' growth in capital over rolling 5 year periods to meet the future needs of the Charity.

The 5 year annualised performance of the portfolio was 6.2% as at 31 March 23 in comparison to the 5 year annualised CPI of 4%.

The Portfolio has performed better when compared to the ARC Peer Groups.

The Trustee is empowered within the Trust Deed to invest any monies as authorised by law for the investment of trust monies, in a manner which it thinks fits with the consent of the Bishop. The provisions of the Trustee Act 2000 apply.

Under section 26 of the Charities Act 1993, an Order was made by the Charity Commission on 5 December 1999 granting the Trustee power to appoint an investment manager, and to appoint a

corporate body as the Trustee's nominee to hold the investments of the Charity. The General Power of Investment in the Trustee Act 2000 allows 'Trustees to invest trust funds in any kind of investment, excluding land [except under certain provisions], in which they could invest if they were the absolute owner of those funds'.

Diocesan Ethical Policy for investments: The Diocesan investment portfolio avoids investment in tobacco, arms, alcohol, gambling and pornography. Investment is also to be avoided in companies which support oppressive regimes, or trade in products which are produced by child labour or in forced labour camps, or companies which have been involved in the exploitation or unjust treatment of employees.

Our investment managers, Sarasin and Partners LLP, monitor any investments made by their Endowment Fund in companies which generate any revenue from the direct or indirect manufacture of pharmaceutical products, the use of which would contravene the Catholic Church's teaching on the sanctity of life. The fund manager also seeks to avoid investments in companies involved in predatory lending. Our investment managers take a pro-active approach in respect of voting on company resolutions, in order to promote responsible long-term stewardship. The Sarasins Endowment Fund will not invest in tobacco and will also avoid investment in companies that have more than 10% of their turnover from the following:

- Alcohol Manufacture
- Armaments
- Gambling
- Pornography

Sarasin & Partners has continued to actively engage with companies and regulators in order to uphold high standards relating to environmental, social and governance matters on behalf of the Trustee.

Risk Management: The Directors of the Corporate Trustee have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed and are satisfied that adequate systems are in place to mitigate exposure to these risks. Risks are recorded, by department, and a RAG status applied. Actions to mitigate the risks are identified and a timescale for completion assigned. The major risks are considered to be health and safety (ensuring that our buildings are maintained to an adequate standard, and policies adhered to), and pastoral (the falling number of priests in ministry). To mitigate the health and safety risks, a Health and Safety Committee meets on a regular basis to ensure that policies are being communicated and applied appropriately, risks are reviewed and action taken where appropriate. Health and Safety representatives are appointed at parish level. In respect of the falling number of priests in ministry, the Diocesan Vision addresses this issue and sets out plans in order to mitigate this risk going forward.

Financial Control Policy: Our Diocese has a series of financial controls and signing limits in place (in the parishes and at the Curia) in order to enable the Corporate Trustee to exercise its legal duties:

- To ensure we are carrying out our purposes for the public benefit
- To comply with our governing document and the law
- To act in the best interests of our Diocese
- To manage responsibly the resources of our Diocese
- To act with reasonable care and skill
- To ensure that we are accountable.

During 2022/23, we reviewed the support we provide to parishes, and our associated controls and procedures continue to be reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Public Benefit: The Board Members confirm that they comply with the duty in S 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant. Details of the main activities undertaken to further the charity's purposes for the public benefit are noted earlier in this document.

Fundraising Policy: Our Diocese is registered with the Fundraising Regulator and is committed to the Fundraising Promise. We do not use any external fundraisers.

- We will commit to high standards, adhering to the Fundraising Code of Practice at all times, monitoring any person that raises funds on our behalf, and complying with the law as it applies to charities and fundraising.
- We will be clear, honest and open, in respect of what we will do with donations, how gifts can be made or amended, and the purpose of our Charity.
- We will be respectful of the rights and privacy of any donor.
- We will treat donors and the public fairly and reasonably, and not accept donations from those individuals who we believe may lack the capacity to make an informed decision
- We will hold ourselves accountable and responsible, ensuring that our resources are managed responsibly and that we have a complaints procedure in place. No complaints about fundraising activities were received during the year.

Reserves Policy: Unrestricted reserves, including parochial funds, totalled £50m. Restricted and endowment funds totalled £8.5m.

Central Diocesan reserves are held to meet the future needs of the Diocese as a whole and absorb the impact of any material risk.

Parochial reserves are held to meet the cost of future repairs and maintenance or major building projects which cannot be met out of expected income. The Diocese considers parish funds to be designated at parish level, for parish requirements.

The policy of the Diocese is to maintain its reserves at a level that will provide the income necessary to assist it in implementing its future objectives, including but not limited to the increased cost of caring for the Sick and Retired Clergy of the Diocese. The Diocese aims to hold cash reserves of £10m. Cash reserves as at 5/4/23 stood at £11.6m. Due to the size of the Diocese and the number of parishes within the Diocese, the Directors feel that this is a reasonable amount to cover expenditure for the period of one year. Should cash reserves fall below this, depending on the projected cash flow, investments may be liquidated.

Funds invested, and how they will be applied

Restricted funds £7.5m The two largest funds are as follows:

- The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund (BEEF), a fund for the support and training of seminarians, was valued at £3.8m as at 5 April 2023. As at April 2023 there were six seminarians, each normally costing just under £50,000 p.a. During 2022-2023, losses in investments led to a deficit for the period.
- The second largest restricted fund is the Sick and Retired Clergy Fund standing at £1.75m. The Diocese is planning how best to finance the support of priests due to retire over the next 10-15 years.

Designated funds £2.5m

- The largest designated fund is the General Education Fund which stands at £2.18m. With the development of a new diocesan vision and strategy for Education, the Trustee will be considering how best to utilise these funds.

Permanent Endowment funds £1m

- The largest endowment fund is the Crowhurst legacy which stands at £0.5m – these funds are to be used to buy a suitable property for sick or retired priests. These funds have been used to purchase properties in order to meet the housing requirements of sick and retired priests.

Unrestricted funds held by the centre £8.4m

- Non-parochial unrestricted funds are invested in the Sarasin Endowment Fund (formerly Alpha CIF for Endowments) in order to generate investment revenue which contributes to the work of the Curia. The fund value has decreased year on year.

Financial Performance: With reference to the statement of financial activities in the financial statements.

At the end of the financial year 2022-23 diocesan funds as a whole totalled £58.5m (2022: £58.9m). Income has decreased from £13m in the prior year to £12.5m. A continued gradual recovery in donations income and other income streams such as hall rental has been more than offset by a decrease in legacy and the value of asset sales.

As part of the Diocesan Renewal process, we are reviewing our material assets in order to decide how best to use them for the future.

Expenditure increased from £11.2m in the previous year to £12.4m, the most significant driver being an increase in utility costs and premises maintenance.

Parish Reserves As at 5 April 2023, parish fixed assets totalled £16.6m (2022: £16.6m) and free Parochial reserves £22.5m (2022: £21.2m).

Plans for the Future

Our Diocesan Vision (on pages 3-12) details our plans for the future, the renewal process being relaunched in January 2024.

Disclosure of information to auditors

The Members of the Board of the Trustee who held office at the date of approval of this report confirm that, so far as they are each aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the charity's auditors are unaware; and:

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEE'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustee is responsible for preparing the Trustee's Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the Trustee has elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under charity law the Trustee must not approve the financial statements unless satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charity for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the Trustee is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP 2019 (FRS 102);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustee is responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charities (Accounts and Report Regulations) 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. It is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust (the 'charity') for the year ended 5 April 2023 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cashflows and notes to the financial statements, including significant accounting policies. 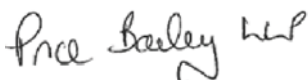

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2023

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with all statutory requirements and with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable to the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (Effective 1 January 2019) – (Charities SORP (FRS102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102). The particular accounting policies adopted are described below. The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified to include certain tangible fixed assets at a valuation and fixed asset investments at market value. Figures are presented in sterling and rounded to the nearest pound.

The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102 and was constituted by Trust Deed in 1947. The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Funds (BEEF) is separately constituted under Trust Deed dated 11 July 1922 and registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067745. The Brentwood Diocesan Investment Pooled Fund is separately registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067742. Under S26 (6) of the Charities Act 1993, these three charities which have the Same Trustee are permitted to be treated as a single entity for accounting purposes. The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective from 1 January 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

a) Preparation of accounts on a going concern basis

Having considered the cash reserves as at February 2024, future budgets and cash flows, the Trustee confirms that there are no material uncertainties about the entity's ability to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

The Directors of the Corporate Trustee have reviewed the cash reserves as February 2024 and the projected cash outflow over the next twelve months. In light of these considerations, the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing these financial statements.

b) Legacies, Donations and Grants

Legacies and donations are recognised when receivable or when the Diocese becomes legally entitled to them and receipt is probable, and they can reasonably be measured in financial terms. Receipts of property, investments or other gifts in kind are included at market value. Grants are recognised when the charity has entitlement and when the amount is measurable.

c) Investment Income

Investment income is accounted for as it accrues.

d) Expenditure

Costs of raising funds comprise those costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the management of the Charity's investments.

Costs of charitable activities consist of all expenditure directly relating to the objects of the Charity. Support costs which cannot be directly allocated are apportioned between charitable activities and governance costs on the basis of the Trustee's estimate of the time spent on the relevant functions.

Employment benefits, including holiday pay, are recognised in the period in which they are earned. Termination benefits are recognised in the period in which the decision is made and communicated to the relevant employee(s).

Governance costs include expenditure on management and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements together with an allocation of support costs.

Irrecoverable VAT is included with the category of expenses to which it relates.

e) **Tangible Fixed Assets**

Prior to 6 April 1996 the cost of fixed assets was written off in the year of acquisition and no comprehensive cost records were maintained. In order to arrive at a reasonable valuation of parish property, taking into account age, type, condition and life expectancy, the Trustee considered that insured values at 6 April 1997 should be discounted by 90% and in subsequent years be depreciated at 2% per annum. This valuation will not be updated in the future. Properties acquired after 6 April 1996 are capitalised at their actual cost of acquisition.

The school properties (land and buildings) are vested in the name of the Diocesan Trustee. The Diocesan Trustee cannot take a unilateral decision to dispose of these properties. Disposal can only occur if the school governors and the Secretary of State for Education decide that all or part of a school site is no longer required for education. In most circumstances, where a disposal occurs, the Secretary of State or the local authority may be entitled to recoup grant. Although no rights of ownership vest in the school governing body, most other rights and obligations, such as for the maintenance and repair of the school and its facilities, are passed to the governors. The Trustees therefore consider that, for the purposes of these financial statements, the nature of their ownership is that of a custodianship, however these properties have been purchased and written off in the Diocesan accounts for the amounts that the Diocese contributed in the past and the costs involved have not been separately identified and are not considered material in the overall context of the accounts.

The estimated cost of furniture, equipment and motor vehicles held at 6 April 1996 has been capitalised in the financial statements. Subsequent additions are capitalised at cost. Individual works of art, historical treasures and plate are not depreciated as they have extremely long lives and are considered to be worth preserving indefinitely.

Depreciation is calculated by the straight line method to write off the cost/value less anticipated residual value, over the expected useful lives of assets as follows:-

Freehold buildings additions since 6 April 1996	50 years
Fixtures and fittings	10 years
Furniture and equipment (> £5,000)	5 years
Motor vehicles	4 years

The residual values of buildings held at 6 April 1996 are considered to be significantly higher than their carrying value in the accounts resulting in a nil value for depreciation charge.

f) School Building Programme

The Diocese assists schools undertaking major projects by meeting the costs and claiming grants on behalf of the schools. These grants are netted off against the cost and only the net costs to the Diocese are included in the financial statements

g) Financial Instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Fixed assets are recorded at depreciated historical cost or revaluation, investments are recorded at their fair value which is the market value as disclosed in note 11 and all other assets and liabilities are recorded at cost which is their fair value.

Investments

Pooled investments are valued at fair value on the balance sheet date. Investment properties are valued at fair value and stated at a Trustee's valuation. Unrealised gains/losses on investments are calculated as the difference between opening market value and closing market value after adjusting for additions and disposals during the year, less investment management and administration costs.

Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

h) Fund accounting

General funds

These comprise the accumulated surplus or deficit from the Statement of Financial Activities which is not restricted nor designated funds. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity

Designated Funds

These funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustee for particular purposes. Details of the funds designated by the Trustee are set out in note 12.

Restricted Funds

These funds are subject to restrictions imposed by the donor. Details of funds subject to legal restriction are set out in note 13.

Parochial Funds

For the purposes of the civil administration of the charity, parishes are not distinct legal entities, but branches forming part of the administrative machinery of the main Diocesan charity, albeit that they have a degree of independence. Parish funds and assets, unless held on distinct and express special trusts clearly evidenced in law, will be held as part of the Diocesan charity and will be the responsibility of the diocesan charity trustee (who, under normal legal principles, may of course appropriately delegate its management to parish priests with limited authority). Such funds will be designated funds. Unless there are distinct and express special trusts declared under the law of England and Wales, they will not be restricted funds. Parochial funds are therefore shown as unrestricted but designated funds.

In Canon Law, however, the parish is firmly set within the context of the diocese C.515(1) and the parish priest exercises his ministry under the authority of the bishop C.519. A parish which has been erected in accordance with the law, possesses public juridical personality by the law itself C.515(3). In Canon Law, therefore, it has the right to acquire, retain, administer and alienate temporal goods C.1255 which, as ecclesiastical goods, are subject to the norms of Canon Law C.1257(1).

i) Pensions

All eligible staff are members of an Aegon group personal pension scheme to which the Charity makes contributions. Employees may contribute an additional amount. As a defined contribution scheme, no liability falls upon the Charity, as employer, to make good a shortfall of funding other than contributions due.

Some staff employed in the educational work of the Diocese are members of the Teacher's Pension Scheme ("TPS") which is a defined benefits scheme. Diocesan contribution levels are determined by the TPS. The TPS is a multi-employer scheme, and, as there is insufficient information available to use defined benefit accounting, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

j) Significant judgements and estimation uncertainty

In preparing these financial statements the trustees have had to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts recognised in these financial statements. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Key areas subject to judgement and estimation are as follows:

Fixed asset depreciation. Judgement is applied when assigning anticipated average lives to the fixed assets of the charity.

Investment properties are included at a value determined by at a desktop valuation conducted by a property management company, or with reference to similar properties in the area of each respective property.

Walsingham House

This house is used for the provision of youth retreats.

Sick and Retired Clergy Fund

Income is used to help support fully retired, partially retired and sick priests. Transfers represent contributions to the fund from the Diocese.

Mensal Fund

This fund is used to support the Diocesan activities of the Bishop. Transfers represent contributions to the fund from the Diocese.

BEEF (Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund)

This fund meets the costs of training priests for the Diocese. Transfers represent contributions from collections on its behalf from the parishes.

Mass Fund

Income received from donors is paid to priests who celebrate masses for the donors. Transfers represent mass stipends paid over to parishes.

Parish Restricted Funds

These funds consist of donations and other contributions to parishes for specific purposes within the parish.

BRCDT Education Fund

These funds are used to finance the provision of education advisors to schools within the Diocese.

Caritas

This fund is used to promote and support Catholic Social Teaching. As such, the pre-existing Social Welfare Fund (previously reported within Other Restricted Funds) has been incorporated into the Caritas Fund.

Permanent Endowment Funds

Crowhurst Legacy

This fund consists of a property donated to the Diocese to be used as a home for Roman Catholic Priests suffering from sickness or who have retired by reason of old age. The property may be sold but the proceeds must be invested in another property to be used for the same purposes. The property was sold during 2005. The proceeds have been invested with Sarasins until a suitable replacement property has been found.

Sullivan Special Trust

This fund comprises an investment property the income of which is for the benefit of the parish priest at Southend parish.

The Charity is governed by the Board of Directors of the Corporate Trustee, The Brentwood Catholic Diocese Trustee (company number 450897).

18. TRANSACTIONS WITH DIRECTORS OF THE CORPORATE TRUSTEE

A majority of the Directors of the Corporate Trustee are also parish priests in the Diocese. As priests they receive income from their parishes together with living accommodation, living expenses and reimbursement of costs incurred on behalf of their parish on the same basis as other priests within the Diocese. They do not receive any remuneration or benefits from their trusteeship other than the purchase by the Diocese of trustees' indemnity insurance providing cover of up to £5,000,000 during the year (the premium is paid as part of public liability insurance). Travel costs totalling £NIL (2022: £NIL) and consultancy costs in respect of courses arranged by the Vicariate for Education in the amount of £1,200 (2022 £1,200) were reimbursed to one (2022: one) Director during the year. During the year, Directors of the Corporate Trustee donated £3,375 (2022 £5,130) in aggregate, to the Diocese.

20. THIRD PARTY COLLECTIONS

Parishes hold collections on behalf of third party charities. Because the Diocese is acting as agent for these charities, these collections have been excluded from these financial statements. During the year £1,029,571 (2022:£763,867) was collected on behalf of third party charities. At 5 April 2023 £183,070 (2022 £167,841) was held on behalf of third party charities.

21. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Related Party transactions with the Directors of the Corporate Trustee are disclosed in Note 18 of these Accounts. There were no other related party transactions during the year (2022, none).

22. PENSION COMMITMENTS

The charity's academic and related staff belong to the Teachers' pension Scheme England and Wales. This is a multi-employer defined benefit scheme. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the

period ended 31 August 2019. There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS or scheme) is a statutory, unfunded, defined benefit occupational scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pensions Regulations 2010 (as amended), and the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014 (as amended). These regulations apply to teachers in schools and other educational establishments, including academies, in England and Wales that are maintained by local authorities. In addition, teachers in many independent and voluntary-aided schools and teachers and lecturers in some establishments of further and higher education may be eligible for membership.

Membership is automatic for full-time teachers and lecturers and, from 1 January 2007, automatic too for teachers and lecturers in part-time employment following appointment or a change of contract. Teachers and lecturers are able to opt out of the TPS.

The Teachers' Pension Budgeting and Valuation Account

Although members may be employed by various bodies, their retirement and other pension benefits are set out in regulations made under the Superannuation Act (1972) and Public Service Pensions Act (2013) and are paid by public funds provided by Parliament. The TPS is an unfunded scheme and members contribute on a 'pay as you go' basis – contributions from members, along with those made by employers, are credited to the Exchequer under arrangements governed by the above Acts.

The Teachers' Pensions Regulations 2010 require an annual account, the Teachers' Pension Budgeting and Valuation Account, to be kept of receipts and expenditure (including the cost of pension increases).

From 1 April 2001, the Account has been credited with a real rate of return, which is equivalent to assuming that the balance in the Account is invested in notional investments that produce that real rate of return.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

As a result of the latest scheme valuation employer contributions were increased in September 2019 from a rate of 16.4% to 23.6%. Employers also pay a charge equivalent to 0.08% of pensionable salary costs to cover administration expenses.

The next valuation is expected to take effect in 2023.

Scheme Changes

In December 2018, the Court of Appeal held that transitional protection provisions contained in the reformed judicial and firefighter pension schemes, introduced as part of public service pension reforms in 2015, gave rise to direct age discrimination and were therefore unlawful. The Supreme Court, in a decision made in June 2019, rejected the Government's application for permission to appeal the Court of Appeal's ruling and subsequently referred the case to an Employment Tribunal to determine a remedy which will need to be offered to those members of the two schemes who were subject of the age discrimination.

Since then, claims have also been lodged against the main public service schemes including the TPS. The Department has conceded those in line with the rest of the government. In July 2020 HM Treasury launched a 12-week public consultation which will provide evidence to support the delivery of an appropriate remedy for the affected schemes, including TPS.

A final remedy will be determined once the results of the consultation are established.

In December 2019, a further legal challenge was made against the TPS relating to an identified equalities issue whereby male survivors of opposite-sex marriages and civil partnerships are treated less favourably than survivors in same-sex marriages and civil partnerships. The Secretary of State for Education agreed not to defend the case. In June 2020, the Employment Tribunal recorded its findings in respect of the claimant. DfE is currently working to establish what changes are necessary to address this discrimination.

Any impact of these events will be taken into account when the next scheme valuation is implemented. This is scheduled to be implemented in April 2023, based on April 2020 data.

The Diocese of Brentwood was formally erected in 1917. Our first bishop, Bishop Ward had a great personal devotion to Our Lady's shrine at Lourdes and Brentwood was the first diocese in England & Wales to have Our Lady of Lourdes as its Principal Patron. His devotion to St Edmund of Abingdon (or Canterbury), led to the choice of that saint as a Secondary Patron of the new diocese (together with St Erconwald and subsequently St Cedd).

Our present Father in God is Bishop Alan Williams, a Marist Father and formerly Rector of the National Shrine of Our Lady at Walsingham. He has responsibility for a diocese of rich diversity: East End and suburbs, towns ancient and modern, seaside resorts, rural parishes comprising dozens of villages, as well as schools, religious houses, and chaplaincies in hospitals, prisons and universities.

It is our prayer that as we give thanks for the witness of past generations, we also pray for a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit that we may be evermore faithful to proclaiming the Gospel of Christ.



Diocesan Vision: Shaping Our Future

The Stewards of the Gospel initiative has been a period of discernment for us as we seek the best response we can give to God's love for us in an ever-changing society. Following the publication of our Diocesan Vision: Shaping Our Future, parishes and parish partnerships took time to interpret it in their local context and submit their plans for Bishop Alan's consideration. After an initial delay due to the COVID-19 pandemic, plans were put in place during 2021/22 in order to relaunch the process in 2022/23.

Our objects as set out in our legal constitution are *“the advancement the Roman Catholic religion in the Diocese by such means as the Bishop may think fit and proper for the service and support whether in the Diocese or outside the Diocese of charitable works and objects promoted by the Church.”*

The Vision Document: Shaping Our Future represents a new way for us to work together for the advancement of the Roman Catholic religion in our Diocese. It commits us to focusing on restructuring ourselves and renewing ourselves, so that in turn we may best proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Restructuring

Our restructuring takes the form of placing 86 of our 87 parishes in 21 Parish Partnerships. These partnerships consist of people working together with the help of God to achieve a common goal. Thus, our Parish Partnerships are intended to actively work together to achieve renewal. The Cathedral parish stands alone to best allow it to be the mother church and a beacon for our whole Diocese.

The work of the parishes and the parish partnerships has been supported during the year by the Director of Development, and all the other vicariates and their respective executive departments. Redesigned Internal structures which better align with the vision, were formally put in place in 2020/21.

Renewal

Our work and our achievements are reported in the context of our Diocesan Vision Document: Shaping Our Future, so that for this year and moving forward we

can report against the 12 Strands of Renewal.

Strand One: Charity, Justice and Social Action

CARITAS

“God’s answer to the poor is always a saving act that heals wounds of body and soul, restores justice and helps to live life anew in dignity. God’s answer is also a summons to those who believe in him to do likewise, within the limits of what is humanly possible.”

Since launching on the “World Day of the Poor”, November 2018, Caritas Diocese of Brentwood has become established within the Diocese.

A full time Diocesan Caritas Co-Ordinator was in post by April 21, the costs being met by legacy funding.

The initial priority was communication, developing a strong social and digital media presence, and regularly communicating with parishes in order to enable the publicity and support of the many Social Action projects happening across the Diocese and beyond.



- In October 2021 we launched ‘Laudato Si’ Invitations, Commitments and Actions’, our response to the heartfelt plea from Pope Francis to ‘Listen to the Cry of the Earth, the Cry of the Poor’. This included the development of a

Laudato Si' Network- representatives from over 20 parishes gathering to provide updates on recent events, be sustained by others and share good practise. We also joined the Southern Dioceses Environment Network which meets monthly, to discuss ways we can work towards the long term task of stabilising our climate and protecting our common home.

- We continued to champion the Real Living Wage, ensuring that this is the minimum paid (since 2018) to every employee in the Diocese.



- We launched further Community Sponsorship projects in Essex in order to support the settlement of refugees in our communities.
- We continue work with our Charities within the Diocese of Brentwood

Strand Two: Christian Life and Worship

The celebration of the Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith, and so all other liturgies flow from and to the celebration of Mass

Our Diocese consists of 87 parishes. The number has reduced in recent years, and we anticipate that as Parish Partnerships evolve the number will further reduce.

The sacramental celebrations and other religious services, proclaiming the Gospel,

exercise of the ministry of charity all take place in our parishes. Furthermore, engagement with society, the pastoral care of, and service to, the Roman Catholic, and the broader community within our diocese, the provision, maintenance and upkeep of places of worship and, of course, prayer are largely undertaken by parishioners, priests and deacons in our parishes.

In most cases, parishes are in the pastoral care of diocesan priests and in several cases, the parishes are in the pastoral care of priests from Religious Orders or The Personal Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham. All our parishes are supported by an administration, referred to as the "Curia", which is organised into Vicariates supported in turn by an executive made up of paid lay people.



Each Sunday an average of 26,117 people (15,284 last year), attended services. Attendance had started to recover from the previous year, which was severely impacted by the COVID restrictions in place, but has not recovered to pre-

pandemic levels. During 2021, with the help and support of our parish priests and catechists, 1894 people (748 in the previous year) were either baptised or received into the Church- back almost to pre-pandemic levels.

With our Liturgy Office, our Chancery Office is involved with the administration side of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults programme, the reception of hundreds of people, from across the Diocese, who have followed the "Journey of Faith", and wish to be received into the Catholic Church.

During the year, our parishes raised over £78,000 to support international causes, including natural disasters and overseas mission work, a significant increase when compared to the previous year.

Parish volunteers contributed countless hours of work to good causes both within and beyond our diocese.

Strand Three: Education

Supporting Catholic schools to provide excellent education where pupils flourish and Christ is made known to all.

During the year we further developed our online training program , and at the same time increased our face to face training offerings. We have also worked collaboratively with other Dioceses to deliver online training resources. We continued to develop resources for schools, making those resources accessible via the website. Our Racial Justice Conference was attended by over 100 participants, and a Racial Justice Working Group was established.

By the end of the year school visits and face to face meetings were approaching pre-COVID levels, and the type of support provided to schools has become more bespoke in nature as we respond to specific needs and evolving circumstances. School inspections restarted after February 22 half term.

Mentor support has continued to be provided for each new headteacher under the newly established Headteacher programme.

We continued to work closely with the Catholic Education Service (CES), Department for Education (DfE), Ofsted, Teaching Unions and the Regional Schools Commissioner (RSC) as well as relevant Local Authorities. As a religious authority, specific responsibilities remain in relation to the essential functions around Governance, Admissions, Reserved posts, RE and Collective Worship.

We've established a regular communications link with schools and Advisers to ensure that all relevant information received from the CES and other sources is disseminated on a timely basis. This has been greatly appreciated by school leaders.

The prime focus for the work of BDES is in securing, preserving and developing Catholic education into the future, as well as supporting schools when difficulties have arisen, where schools have experienced decline or turmoil and where schools have become more vulnerable. Our work is summed up in our Mission Statement; *"Supporting Catholic schools to provide excellent education where pupils flourish and Christ is made known to all."*

Six Catholic Multi Academy Trusts (MATs) now exist in our Diocese. They operate under distinctly Catholic names (Rosary Trust, Assisi Catholic Trust, Christus Catholic Trust, Good Shepherd Catholic Trust, Our Lady of Grace Catholic Trust and Our Lady of Fatima Trust). This approach remains the preferred structure for Catholic schools within the Diocese of Brentwood. Currently there are fifty-three Academies out of a total of eighty-two state maintained primary and secondary schools, with the balance being Voluntary Aided Catholic schools. There are eight independent schools.

Catholic Social Teaching and our commitment to it underpins our commitment to employee rights, school standards and partnership with various local authorities.

ADMISSIONS

Admissions remained an area of on-going work. We continued to support our schools through group training sessions and individual advice and guidance.

SCHOOL GOVERNANCE

Governance is an area of key importance to our Diocese and continued to represent an opportunity for lay people to take on leadership roles.

Training opportunities became increasingly accessible for governors via on-line provision including our GIFT-ED App.

Strand Four: Family

Support for marriage and family is a crucial part of the Church's ministry, and of great importance for society as a whole.

As a department of the Vicariate for Adult Formation, our mission is to proclaim the good news of God's love, revealed in a special way through the love of husband and wife, and the love for their children. Recognising that family life brings many challenges and is often undermined by the values of the contemporary world, the church has a special duty to accompany our families and offer whatever support is needed.

Anna McCormick, our part time project worker works alongside Fr Matthew Bemand-Qureshi is the Diocesan Director and Chaplain, provide guidance and support in this area.

Where ongoing support is required, couples are introduced to other appropriate organisations such as Marriage Care or Retrouvaille, or their own parish.

During the period our online and social media presence was further developed, which was of increased importance due to the pandemic. This provided a means of sharing resources and ideas, not only for parishes but for couples and families themselves.

On a very practical level, our Chancery Office processes marriage papers for marriages taking place inside and outside the Diocese, and supported a significant increase in the process of marriage papers when compared to the previous year:

- **45 (last year 26)** sets of marriage papers for marriages taking place outside the Diocese, mostly overseas.
- **66 (last year 13)** sets of marriage papers where one party belonged to another religion.

- **56 (last year 3)** sets of papers, where one party had not been baptized;
- **95 (last year 26)** sets of marriage papers for Catholics wishing to convalidate their civil marriage in the Catholic Church.

Although the number of marriages has increased from the previous year, we expect a further increase in the future due to the number of postponements in 2020 and 2021.

In addition, the work of the Chancery enabled people to marry in Churches of other denominations, but with the necessary dispensations to allow the marriages to be recognised as valid by the Catholic Church.

Strand Five: Formation

Formation is a life-long process of listening to what the Holy Spirit is calling us to be and to do

To support our catechists, The Bishop's Certificate in Catechesis and Youth Ministry is a yearlong course of 12 modules, covering different aspects of faith and Church teaching, as well as practical skills in Youth Ministry. It is an entry-level qualification to help in the ongoing formation of adults who are involved in sacramental preparation or youth ministry in our Diocese. It includes development of practical skills and the deepening of theological knowledge. A cohort of 19 catechists from 15 parishes embarked on the course during the year. The development of the course was a three year project, and has already been purchased by other Dioceses. We see the course as ideal preparation and training for the recently instituted 'Ministry of Catechist'

During our discernment process leading up to our vision, we committed to making the process of faith formation for catechists and youth leaders more accessible than ever before by harnessing the power of digital media. Therefore, this course is taught through short, engaging videos with expert interviews on a custom-built website, complete with online questionnaires and journaling for assessment purposes.

The Vicariate for Adult Formation is led by Fr Martin Boland. The Vicariate aims to provide a variety of resources and support for those lay men and women who wish to develop a more mature understanding of their Catholic Faith and to deepen their relationship with Christ through a life of prayer and service. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, it is hoped that lay men and women will find ways to grow in confidence as disciples and be better witness to the Church's mission of hope.

A dedicated website was launched in June 21.

Strand Six: Integration

Make sure that every person of whatever background can find in you a welcoming heart.

In our Vision we seek to build on the rich diversity of people in our Diocese through a generous inclusivity. We look to work together with people of all faiths and none where the opportunity arises.

INTERNATIONAL TWINNING

Our Diocese is twinned with the Diocese of Dundee, Kwa-Zulu Natal, South Africa. Our solidarity with our fellow Catholics in Kwa-Zulu Natal is demonstrated by parishes and schools in both dioceses having twinned with each other. They

build practical relationships beyond friendship and spiritual support.

Fr Gerry, a Brentwood Diocese priest returned to the UK during the year after many years of distinguished service in Dundee, and continues to help support the Twinning Project.

During the year parishes raised over £4,000 for the Twinning Project.

Strand Seven: Leaders

By right of baptism all are called to fulfil their vocation as the people of God.

During the year leaders continued to support our parishes and wider communities.

School Governorship is an important role for lay people who have appropriate skills to perform, and we continue to encourage people to come forward and train. Our education team continued to support our Governors remotely during the period.

Also, in education leaders have been appointed to be Trustees of our Catholic Multi Academy Trusts. This is a key role for people to play in the future of our children and of catholic education and anyone who is interested in either of these opportunities is encouraged to contact Debbie Botham.

The Diaconate is a key area where leadership can be exercised in our Diocese. During the period four men were in preparation for this ministry on the Southern Diaconate Formation Programme.

Strand Eight: Material Assets

As stewards of all that God has given to us, it is our responsibility to use those gifts as well as we can.

Parishes and Parish Partnerships have been looking at their material assets as a whole to see how they can be best used to fulfil our objectives and our Vision in their local context.

Central Finance Team: Our work focussed on increased support to the parishes, recognising that most of the work of our Diocese occurs through the parishes and that many regulatory burdens fall on them. Finance and Administration guidelines are circulated on a regular basis to parish, to ensure that the most up to date guidance is available for Parish Priests, parish administrators, and volunteers.

During the year we offered a central payment facility for parishes as more suppliers request payment electronically. Alternative methods of giving continue to be considered across the Diocese as the banking network continues to shrink and the process of banking cash becomes more problematic.

Following the easing of restrictions, the Finance Team were able to visit parish offices and deliver 1.1 training to new employees when required. The Team also provide online training on a regular basis.

The Finance and Property Teams worked together to manage a project to revalue all investment properties included in the Annual Accounts.

Property Team: The Property Sub-Committee has delegated responsibility for both advising and making

recommendations to the Board on all property matters taking account of both the civil law of England and Wales and Canon Law.

The Property Sub-Committee met on a monthly basis throughout the year, considering a number of projects including urgent repairs, and more long term development projects. Our Director of Property and members of the Sub-Committee visit parishes on a regular basis to provide support and advice in respect of property issues.

The Diocesan Curia offices, which were developed in the 1980s, had been identified as being in need of essential refurbishment and repair. Following the successful completion of a boiler replacement project, further planned refurbishment has been deferred.

Health & Safety

The Health and Safety Sub-Committee continued to advise the Board on matters of significance relating to the Diocesan Health and Safety Policy and Management Plan.

The statutory inspection process was relaunched during the year and the external Health and Safety consultants worked closely with the Director of Property to provide regular updates and guidance to parishes and staff. The online Health & Safety management system enables the Diocese to provide an essential resource for parishes to access immediate health and safety support and guidance.

The Property Office continued to roll out the new online Diocesan Health & Safety Management system and promote engagement across parishes. Health and Safety Training for Clergy and Parish

Representatives has been planned for 22/23.

Strand Nine: Prayer and Spirituality

Our relationship with God in Jesus Christ will only continue to develop and grow if we pay attention to it.

Prayers of intercession are made continuously throughout the year and during the year.

Strand Ten: Priests and People

We will explore new ways to recognise each other's gifts and to collaborate to bring our vision to reality.

We are thankful for the priests serving our Diocese. During the year, our clergy found new ways of keeping in contact with our parish communities. More masses were live streamed, and where possible, social media and online facilities were utilised in order to maintain contact and provide support for the local parish communities.

Compulsory Safeguarding training now takes place for all clergy. Planned face to face sessions had to be cancelled due to COVID-19, but a non-mandatory online training event was arranged at short notice in November 21. This was attended by 39 clergy members.

Strand Eleven: Vocations to the Priesthood

We have continued to recognise that our first duty to encourage vocations as Catholics is to pray for priests and those considering priesthood.

During the Summer of 2021 the Diocesan Presbyterate welcomed two new priests: After completing his priestly formation in Oscott, Fr Michael Barwick was ordained priest at Brentwood Cathedral on 10th July 2021 and then appointed assistant priest at Our Lady and St. George's, Walthamstow.

Fr Tony Grant completed four years of study at the Pontifical College in Rome and was ordained on 23rd July 2021 at St. Antony's Forest Gate and was appointed assistant priest at St. Margaret's Canning Town.

The vocations website includes interesting and inspirational vocation stories told, by our diocesan priests and some of our seminarians. These powerful witnesses were recorded live as part of the holy hours to pray for vocations held throughout our diocese

During the year, our Vocations Promotor, Fr Mark Swires held regular online enquirers meetings via 'Zoom' for those interested in learning more about the priesthood the process of discernment.

We continue to pray for our seminarians and that many more will listen and respond to the call of Jesus to share in his priesthood.

Strand Twelve: Young People

You too, dear young people, can be joyful witnesses of his love, courageous witnesses of his Gospel, carrying to the world a ray of his light.

Following a period of limited activity due to the COVID-19 restrictions, the volunteer team returned to Walsingham House in April 21. Up until that point, the team had delivered virtual assemblies to Primary and Secondary schools, providing support to school staff through what had been an incredibly challenging time.

Following two weeks of training and formation, the team started to once again run retreats at the beginning of May, and by the end of July had worked with 21 Year 6 classes as well as Years 7 and 8 Form groups from

Retreats for schools and parishes both at Walsingham House and out-reach were fully booked in the Summer of 2021.

Unfortunately, due to the ongoing risk of the COVID-19 pandemic, the annual Lourdes Pilgrimage did not take place. In its place we ran 'Lourdes at your local' with masses being celebrated in five locations around the Diocese with over 800 people attending and more accessing the Masses and Morning Prayers online. The masses were attended by Bishop Alan and included the Anointing of the Sick.

A sponsored sleepout was held with groups from Colchester, Lexden, Shoeburyness, Romford, Basildon and Wanstead taking part. The amount raised exceeded £4,000, some of the proceeds being distributed to Caritas homelessness charities across the Diocese.

In November 2021 the annual Training and Resources day was held for First Holy Communion and Confirmation Catechists, with approximately 70 Catechists attending.

Young people are the future of our church and we are committed to ensure that where possible we provide help and support wherever we can.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust (the Charity) was constituted by Trust Deed in 1947. It is a registered charity, number 234092. Its objects are the advancement of the Roman Catholic religion in the Diocese by such means as the Bishop may think fit and proper for the service and support, whether in the Diocese or outside the Diocese, of charitable works and objects promoted by the Church. In addition, there are two separate funds which are registered as individual charities:

- The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund (BEEF) – the fund of the Diocese which meets the cost of educating and training seminarians – is a separately constituted charity under a Trust Deed, dated 11 July 1922, and registered under number 1067745. It is accounted for as a restricted fund within the Diocesan accounts.
- The investments of our Diocese are managed as a Pooled Fund, which is separately registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067742.

An order of the Charity Commissioners under S96(6) Charities Act 1993 permits the three charities, which have the same Trustee, to be treated as a single entity for accounting purposes.

Administration of the Charity is through the Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee (the Corporate Trustee). The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee, a company limited by guarantee, was set up in 1948 to act as custodian trustee in relation to the Charity and the ecclesiastical trusts of the Diocese. Its company number is 450897.

All parish property is in civil law held by the Corporate Trustee, subject to the Charity Trust Deed. The acquisition or disposal of parish property therefore has to be sanctioned by the Directors of the Corporate Trustee, and all relevant documentation must be drawn up in the name of the Corporate Trustee.

Directors of the Corporate Trustee

In keeping with the Charity's objectives, it is a requirement that candidates for Directorship are committed Roman Catholics. The power to appoint Directors is vested in the Bishop of the Diocese.

Where additional Directors are required, the Bishop will consider the range of skills and experience required on the Board (such as finance, investments, strategic planning etc.), and will approach individuals in the Diocese who are likely to meet these requirements. Prospective Directors are provided with full information on the Charity's constitution, objects and finances. Training material is made available as necessary, and Directors are encouraged to complete online training modules which have been approved by the Charity Commission.

Governance of the Charity

The Charity is governed by the Board of Directors of the Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee (the "Corporate Trustee") which consists of the President of the Corporation (the Bishop of Brentwood) and up to fourteen other Directors.

The Board, in conjunction with the canonical bodies established by the Bishop to be his advisors and consultors, is responsible for the development and implementation of policies which ensure compliance with civil legislation and canon law. The key policies are safeguarding, health and safety, risk management, the production of financial budgets, the exercising of financial controls through regular financial reporting, the management of Diocesan properties, policies relating to employment and the compliance of the Charity with relevant company and charity legislation.

Authority for the management of the day-to-day business of the Diocese and compliance with civil legislation is delegated by the Board to the respective departmental Directors and parish priests in accordance with their directions.

In March 2014, the Finance Board (now known as the "Board") approved revised Articles of Association for the Corporate Trustee, establishing the Bishop of Brentwood as the sole Member of the Corporate Trustee; the Board cannot implement a decision with which the Bishop disagrees. In December 2020, following an internal governance review, the Articles of Association were further revised, inter alia removing references to the 'Finance Board' and replacing these with the "Board".

Sub-Committees of the Board

The Board has established a number of Sub-Committees delegating to them the consideration of specific areas of importance to the Diocese and authorising them to make some decisions and to submit recommendations to the main Board for approval:

- Adult Formation
- Education
- Finance and Administration (including Investments)
- Health & Safety
- Human Resources & Diversity
- Property
- Safeguarding
- Youth Ministry and Pastoral Care

A separate committee (not a Sub-Committee of the Board) reviews the provision of support to sick and retired clergy and meets on a regular basis.

Key Management Personnel

The Trustee considers that the Directors of the Corporate Trustee, together with the Director of Finance, the Director of Education, the Diocesan Safeguarding Coordinator, the Diocesan Director of Development and the Director of Property, comprise the key management personnel of the Charity, in charge of directing, controlling, running and operating the Charity on a day to day basis. Salaries are reviewed on an annual basis by the Human Resources Team and authorised by the Board.

All Directors of the Trustee gave of their time freely, and no Director received remuneration in respect of their services as Directors of the Corporate Trustee. Details of the Trustee Directors' expenses are disclosed in Note 18 of the accounts.

Financial Review

Investment policy The Diocese follows a total return investment policy, to achieve long term capital and income growth, to provide sufficient income to support today's beneficiaries whilst still seeking 'real' growth in capital to meet the future needs of the Charity.

The Trustee is empowered within the Trust Deed to invest any monies as authorised by law for the investment of trust monies, in a manner which it thinks fits with the consent of the Bishop. The provisions of the Trustee Act 2000 apply.

Under section 26 of the Charities Act 1993, an Order was made by the Charity Commission on 5 December 1999 granting the Trustee power to appoint an investment manager, and to appoint a corporate body as the Trustee's nominee to hold the investments of the Charity. The General Power of Investment in the Trustee Act 2000 allows 'Trustees to invest trust funds in any kind of investment, excluding land [except under certain provisions], in which they could invest if they were the absolute owner of those funds'.

Diocesan Ethical Policy for investments: The Diocesan investment portfolio avoids investment in tobacco, arms, alcohol, gambling and pornography. Investment is also to be avoided in companies which support oppressive regimes, or trade in products which are produced by child labour or in forced labour camps, or companies which have been involved in the exploitation or unjust treatment of employees.

Our investment managers, Sarasin and Partners LLP, monitor any investments made by their Endowment Fund in companies which generate any revenue from the direct or indirect manufacture of pharmaceutical products, the use of which would contravene the Catholic Church's teaching on the sanctity of life. Our investment managers take a pro-active approach in respect of voting on company resolutions, in order to promote responsible long-term stewardship. The Sarasin Endowment Fund will not invest in tobacco and will also avoid investment in companies that have more than 10% of their turnover from the following:

- Alcohol Manufacture
- Armaments
- Gambling
- Pornography

The Portfolio has performed better when compared to the ARC Peer Groups.

Risk Management: The Directors of the Corporate Trustee have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed and are satisfied that adequate systems are in place to mitigate exposure to these risks. Risks are recorded, by department, and a RAG status applied. Actions to mitigate the risks are identified and a timescale for completion assigned. The major risks are considered to be health and safety (ensuring that our buildings are maintained to an adequate standard, and policies adhered to), and pastoral (the falling number of priests in ministry). To mitigate the health and safety risks, a Health and Safety Committee meets on a regular basis to ensure that policies are being communicated and applied appropriately, risks are reviewed and action taken where appropriate. Health and Safety representatives are appointed at parish level. In respect of the falling number of priests in ministry, the Diocesan Vision addresses this issue and sets out plans in order to mitigate this risk going forward.

Covid-19 Pandemic

The global Coronavirus pandemic continued to present a number of risks to the Diocese during the period, specifically those of adverse health and safety, operational and financial impacts.

The safety of our clergy, employees, volunteers and parishioners has continued to be a priority during the pandemic.

The government restrictions put in place in order to mitigate the impact of the pandemic led to the closure of churches for communal worship in the previous year. The resultant fall in the number of parishioners attending our churches has in turn led to a significant fall in cash collections, which historically has represented 36% of our revenues. Although some recovery is evident during the period, the donation income continues to be adversely affected. Demand for the use of our parish halls during the period had not recovered to pre-pandemic levels.

Risk Mitigations

A COVID-19 working group was formed early in the pandemic in order to issue guidance and co-ordinate the response to the risks presented by the pandemic. The working group included representatives from the Clergy, Health and Safety, Finance and Safeguarding teams. Throughout the pandemic the Bishops' Conference has continued to issue specific guidelines in respect of how to implement the latest government guidance, and, when churches have been allowed to open, has provided specific guidance to help Parish Priests facilitate collective worship safely.

The working group continued to meet during 2021/22 and ensured that Parishes, Clergy and staff throughout the Diocese received regular communications during the pandemic from both the Covid-19 working group and the Bishop's office, in order to disseminate the most up to date information on an ongoing basis.

In parishes where online services had been introduced during periods of lockdown, many parishes continued these after churches were allowed to open, allowing those parishioners who were not able to attend mass, to feel connected to those services and the community.

The use of social media has continued to allow our clergy to maintain contact with parishioners, providing much needed communication and a positive impact on well-being.

A central online donation platform has been made available on the Diocesan website, allowing parishioners who would normally make cash donations, to make donations electronically. This, together with the promotion of donations by standing order, has helped to reduce the potential shortfall in donation income. During the period individual parish donation platforms were made available to parishes wishing to have an individual platform in place.

The Diocese utilised the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme. Where staff were not been able to attend work due to social distancing restrictions, and home working was not feasible, or where work was not available, employees were furloughed. Approximately 40% of the workforce was furloughed at some time during the pandemic.

Financial Control Policy: Our Diocese has a series of financial controls and signing limits in place (in the parishes and at the Curia) in order to enable the Corporate Trustee to exercise its legal duties:

- To ensure we are carrying out our purposes for the public benefit
- To comply with our governing document and the law
- To act in the best interests of our Diocese
- To manage responsibly the resources of our Diocese
- To act with reasonable care and skill
- To ensure that we are accountable.

During 2021/22, we reviewed the support we provide to parishes, and our associated controls and procedures continue to be reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Public Benefit: The Board Members confirm that they comply with the duty in S 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant. Details of the main activities undertaken to further the charity's purposes for the public benefit are noted earlier in this document.

Fundraising Policy: Our Diocese is registered with the Fundraising Regulator and is committed to the Fundraising Promise. We do not use any external fundraisers.

- We will commit to high standards, adhering to the Fundraising Code of Practice at all times, monitoring any person that raises funds on our behalf, and complying with the law as it applies to charities and fundraising.
- We will be clear, honest and open, in respect of what we will do with donations, how gifts can be made or amended, and the purpose of our Charity.
- We will be respectful of the rights and privacy of any donor.
- We will treat donors and the public fairly and reasonably, and not accept donations from those individuals who we believe may lack the capacity to make an informed decision

- We will hold ourselves accountable and responsible, ensuring that our resources are managed responsibly and that we have a complaints procedure in place. No complaints about fundraising activities were received during the year.

Reserves Policy: Unrestricted reserves, including parochial funds, totalled £50m. Restricted and endowment funds totalled £8.9m.

Central Diocesan reserves are held to meet the future needs of the Diocese as a whole and absorb the impact of any material risk.

Parochial reserves are held to meet the cost of future repairs and maintenance or major building projects which cannot be met out of expected income. The Diocese considers parish funds to be designated at parish level, for parish requirements.

The policy of the Diocese is to maintain its reserves at a level that will provide the income necessary to assist it in implementing its future objectives, including but not limited to the increased cost of caring for the Sick and Retired Clergy of the Diocese. The Diocese aims to hold cash reserves of £10m. Cash reserves as at 5/4/22 stood at £10.6m. Due to the size of the Diocese and the number of parishes within the Diocese, the Directors feel that this is a reasonable amount to cover expenditure for the period of one year. Should cash reserves fall below this, depending on the projected cash flow, investments may be liquidated.

Funds invested, and how they will be applied

Restricted funds £7.9m The two largest funds are as follows:

- The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund (BEEF), a fund for the support and training of seminarians, was valued at £4.1m as at 5 April 2022. As at April 2022 there were six seminarians, each normally costing just under £50,000 p.a. During 2021-2022, total gains in investments were in excess of the costs incurred by the fund.
- The second largest restricted fund is the Sick and Retired Clergy Fund standing at £1.88m. The Diocese is planning how best to finance the support of priests due to retire over the next 10-15 years.

Designated funds £2.6m

- The largest designated fund is the General Education Fund which stands at £2.3m. With the development of a new diocesan vision and strategy for Education, the Trustee will be considering how best to utilise these funds.

Permanent Endowment funds £1m

- The largest endowment fund is the Crowhurst legacy which stands at £0.5m – these funds are to be used to buy a suitable property for sick or retired priests. These funds have been used to purchase properties in order to meet the housing requirements of sick and retired priests.

Unrestricted funds held by the centre £9.6m

- Non-parochial unrestricted funds are invested in the Sarasin Endowment Fund (formerly Alpha CIF for Endowments) in order to generate investment revenue which contributes to the work of the Curia. The fund value has increased year on year.

Financial Performance: With reference to the statement of financial activities in the financial statements.

At the end of the financial year 2021-22 diocesan funds as a whole totalled £58.9m. Income has increased to £13m from £8.9m in the prior year. Donation income has started to recover from the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. There was also a £1m gain on a land disposal.

As part of the Diocesan Renewal process, we are reviewing our material assets in order to decide how best to use them for the future.

Expenditure increased to £11.2m from £10.5m in the previous year. The majority of this increase related to the reopening of places of worship following the COVID-19 pandemic.

Parish Reserves As at 5 April 2022, parish fixed assets totalled £16.6m and free Parochial reserves £21.2m.

Plans for the Future

Our Diocesan Vision (on pages 3-12) details our plans for the future.

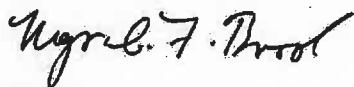

Opinion

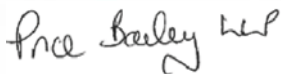

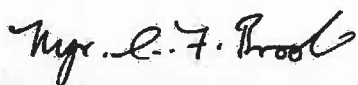

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2022

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with all statutory requirements and with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable to the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (Effective 1 January 2019) – (Charities SORP (FRS102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102). The particular accounting policies adopted are described below. The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified to include certain tangible fixed assets at a valuation and fixed asset investments at market value. Figures are presented in sterling and rounded to the nearest pound.

The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102 and was constituted by Trust Deed in 1947. The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Funds (BEEF) is separately constituted under Trust Deed dated 11 July 1922 and registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067745. The Brentwood Diocesan Investment Pooled Fund is separately registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067742. Under S26 (6) of the Charities Act 1993, these three charities which have the Same Trustee are permitted to be treated as a single entity for accounting purposes. The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective from 1 January 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

a) Preparation of accounts on a going concern basis

Having considered the cash reserves as at June 2023, future budgets and cash flows, the Trustee confirms that there are no material uncertainties about the entity's ability to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

The Directors of the Corporate Trustee have reviewed the cash reserves as June 2023 and the projected cash outflow over the next twelve months. Despite continued uncertainty in respect of future income, due to the level of investments held, the Directors are confident that the Charity continues to be a going concern.

b) Legacies, Donations and Grants

Legacies and donations are recognised when receivable or when the Diocese becomes legally entitled to them and receipt is probable, and they can reasonably be measured in financial terms. Receipts of property, investments or other gifts in kind are included at market value. Grants are recognised when the charity has entitlement and when the amount is measurable.

c) Investment Income

Investment income is accounted for as it accrues.

d) Expenditure

Costs of raising funds comprise those costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the management of the Charity's investments.

Costs of charitable activities consist of all expenditure directly relating to the objects of the Charity. Support costs which cannot be directly allocated are apportioned between charitable activities and governance costs on the basis of the Trustee's estimate of the time spent on the relevant functions.

Employment benefits, including holiday pay, are recognised in the period in which they are earned. Termination benefits are recognised in the period in which the decision is made and communicated to the relevant employee(s).

Governance costs include expenditure on management and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements together with an allocation of support costs.

Irrecoverable VAT is included with the category of expenses to which it relates.

d) Expenditure (continued)

Redundancy and termination costs are recognised as an expense in the Statement of Financial Activities and a liability on the Balance Sheet immediately at the point the charity is demonstrably committed to either:

- Terminate the employment of an employee or group of employees before normal retirement date; or
- Provide termination benefits as a result of an offer made in order to encourage voluntary redundancy.

The charity is considered to be demonstrably committed only when it has a detailed formal plan for the termination and is without realistic possibility of withdrawal from the plan.

e) Tangible Fixed Assets

Prior to 6 April 1996 the cost of fixed assets was written off in the year of acquisition and no comprehensive cost records were maintained. In order to arrive at a reasonable valuation of parish property, taking into account age, type, condition and life expectancy, the Trustee considered that insured values at 6 April 1997 should be discounted by 90% and in subsequent years be depreciated at 2% per annum. This valuation will not be updated in the future. Properties acquired after 6 April 1996 are capitalised at their actual cost of acquisition.

The school properties (land and buildings) are vested in the name of the Diocesan Trustee. The Diocesan Trustee cannot take a unilateral decision to dispose of these properties. Disposal can only occur if the school governors and the Secretary of State for Education decide that all or part of a school site is no longer required for education. In most circumstances, where a disposal occurs, the Secretary of State or the local authority may be entitled to recoup grant. Although no rights of ownership vest in the school governing body, most other rights and obligations, such as for the maintenance and repair of the school and its facilities, are passed to the governors. The Trustees therefore consider that, for the purposes of these financial statements, the nature of their ownership is that of a custodianship, however these properties have been purchased and written off in the Diocesan accounts for the amounts that the Diocese contributed in the past and the costs involved have not been separately identified and are not considered material in the overall context of the accounts.

The estimated cost of furniture, equipment and motor vehicles held at 6 April 1996 has been capitalised in the financial statements. Subsequent additions are capitalised at cost. Individual works of art, historical treasures and plate are not depreciated as they have extremely long lives and are considered to be worth preserving indefinitely.

Depreciation is calculated by the straight line method to write off the cost/value less anticipated residual value, over the expected useful lives of assets as follows:-

Freehold buildings additions since 6 April 1996	50 years
Fixtures and fittings	10 years
Furniture and equipment (> £5,000)	5 years
Motor vehicles	4 years

The residual values of buildings held at 6 April 1996 are considered to be significantly higher than their carrying value in the accounts resulting in a nil value for depreciation charge.

f) School Building Programme

The Diocese assists schools undertaking major projects by meeting the costs and claiming grants on behalf of the schools. These grants are netted off against the cost and only the net costs to the Diocese are included in the financial statements

g) Financial Instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Fixed assets are recorded at depreciated historical cost or revaluation, investments are recorded at their fair value which is the market value as disclosed in note 11 and all other assets and liabilities are recorded at cost which is their fair value.

Investments

Pooled investments are valued at fair value on the balance sheet date. Investment properties are valued at fair value and stated at a Trustee's valuation. Unrealised gains/losses on investments are calculated as the difference between opening market value and closing market value after adjusting for additions and disposals during the year, less investment management and administration costs.

Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

h) Fund accounting

General funds

These comprise the accumulated surplus or deficit from the Statement of Financial Activities which is not restricted nor designated funds. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity

Designated Funds

These funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustee for particular purposes. Details of the funds designated by the Trustee are set out in note 12.

Restricted Funds

These funds are subject to restrictions imposed by the donor. Details of funds subject to legal restriction are set out in note 13.

Parochial Funds

For the purposes of the civil administration of the charity, parishes are not distinct legal entities, but branches forming part of the administrative machinery of the main Diocesan charity, albeit that they have a degree of independence. Parish funds and assets, unless held on distinct and express special trusts clearly evidenced in law, will be held as part of the Diocesan charity and will be the responsibility of the diocesan charity trustee (who, under normal legal principles, may of course appropriately delegate its management to parish priests with limited authority). Such funds will be designated funds. Unless there are distinct and express special trusts declared under the law of England and Wales, they will not be restricted funds. Parochial funds are therefore shown as unrestricted but designated funds.

In Canon Law, however, the parish is firmly set within the context of the diocese C.515(1) and the parish priest exercises his ministry under the authority of the bishop C.519. A parish which has been erected in accordance with the law, possesses public juridical personality by the law itself C.515(3). In Canon Law, therefore, it has the right to acquire, retain, administer and alienate temporal goods C.1255 which, as ecclesiastical goods, are subject to the norms of Canon Law C.1257(1).

i) Pensions

All eligible staff are members of an Aegon group personal pension scheme to which the Charity makes contributions. Employees may contribute an additional amount. As a defined contribution scheme, no liability falls upon the Charity, as employer, to make good a shortfall of funding other than contributions due.

Some staff employed in the educational work of the Diocese are members of the Teacher's Pension Scheme ("TPS") which is a defined benefits scheme. Diocesan contribution levels are determined by the TPS. The TPS is a multi-employer scheme, and, as there is insufficient information available to use defined benefit accounting, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

j) Significant judgements and estimation uncertainty

In preparing these financial statements the trustees have had to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts recognised in these financial statements. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Key areas subject to judgement and estimation are as follows:

Fixed asset depreciation. Judgement is applied when assigning anticipated average lives to the fixed assets of the charity.

Investment properties are included at a value determined by at a desktop valuation conducted by a property management company, or with reference to similar properties in the area of each respective property.

Walsingham House

This house is used for the provision of youth retreats.

Sick and Retired Clergy Fund

Income is used to help support fully retired, partially retired and sick priests. Transfers represent contributions to the fund from the Diocese.

Mensal Fund

This fund is used to support the Diocesan activities of the Bishop. Transfers represent contributions to the fund from the Diocese.

BEEF (Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund)

This fund meets the costs of training priests for the Diocese. Transfers represent contributions from collections on its behalf from the parishes.

Mass Fund

Income received from donors is paid to priests who celebrate masses for the donors. Transfers represent mass stipends paid over to parishes.

Parish Restricted Funds

These funds consist of donations and other contributions to parishes for specific purposes within the parish.

BRCDT Education Fund

These funds are used to finance the provision of education advisors to schools within the Diocese.

Caritas

This fund is used to promote and support Catholic Social Teaching. As such, the pre-existing Social Welfare Fund (previously reported within Other Restricted Funds) has been incorporated into the Caritas Fund.

Other Restricted Funds

Other restricted funds consist of donations for specific purposes.

Permanent Endowment Funds

Crowhurst Legacy

This fund consists of a property donated to the Diocese to be used as a home for Roman Catholic Priests suffering from sickness or who have retired by reason of old age. The property may be sold but the proceeds must be invested in another property to be used for the same purposes. The property was sold during 2005. The proceeds have been invested with Sarasins until a suitable replacement property has been found.

Sullivan Special Trust

This fund comprises an investment property the income of which is for the benefit of the parish priest at Southend parish.

The Charity is governed by the Board of Directors of the Corporate Trustee, The Brentwood Catholic Diocese Trustee (company number 450897).

18. TRANSACTIONS WITH DIRECTORS OF THE CORPORATE TRUSTEE

A majority of the Directors of the Corporate Trustee are also parish priests in the Diocese. As priests they receive income from their parishes together with living accommodation, living expenses and reimbursement of costs incurred on behalf of their parish on the same basis as other priests within the Diocese. They do not receive any remuneration or benefits from their trusteeship other than the purchase by the Diocese of trustees' indemnity insurance providing cover of up to £5,000,000 during the year (the premium is paid as part of public liability insurance). Travel costs totalling £NIL (2021: £NIL) and consultancy costs in respect of courses arranged by the Vicariate for Education in the amount of £1,200 (2021 £1,200) were reimbursed to one (2021: one) Director during the year. During the year, Directors of the Corporate Trustee donated £5,130 (2021 £5,015) in aggregate, to the Diocese.

20. THIRD PARTY COLLECTIONS

Parishes hold collections on behalf of third party charities. Because the Diocese is acting as agent for these charities, these collections have been excluded from these financial statements. During the year £763,867 (2021:£105,082) was collected on behalf of third party charities. At 5 April 2022 £167,841 (2021 £126,673) was held on behalf of third party charities.

21. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Related Party transactions with the Directors of the Corporate Trustee are disclosed in Note 18 of these Accounts. There were no other related party transactions during the year (2021, none).

22. PENSION COMMITMENTS

The charity's academic and related staff belong to the Teachers' pension Scheme England and Wales. This is a multi-employer defined benefit scheme. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the

period ended 31 August 2019. There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS or scheme) is a statutory, unfunded, defined benefit occupational scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pensions Regulations 2010 (as amended), and the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014 (as amended). These regulations apply to teachers in schools and other educational establishments, including academies, in England and Wales that are maintained by local authorities. In addition, teachers in many independent and voluntary-aided schools and teachers and lecturers in some establishments of further and higher education may be eligible for membership.

Membership is automatic for full-time teachers and lecturers and, from 1 January 2007, automatic too for teachers and lecturers in part-time employment following appointment or a change of contract. Teachers and lecturers are able to opt out of the TPS.

The Teachers' Pension Budgeting and Valuation Account

Although members may be employed by various bodies, their retirement and other pension benefits are set out in regulations made under the Superannuation Act (1972) and Public Service Pensions Act (2013) and are paid by public funds provided by Parliament. The TPS is an unfunded scheme and members contribute on a 'pay as you go' basis – contributions from members, along with those made by employers, are credited to the Exchequer under arrangements governed by the above Acts.

The Teachers' Pensions Regulations 2010 require an annual account, the Teachers' Pension Budgeting and Valuation Account, to be kept of receipts and expenditure (including the cost of pension increases).

From 1 April 2001, the Account has been credited with a real rate of return, which is equivalent to assuming that the balance in the Account is invested in notional investments that produce that real rate of return.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

As a result of the latest scheme valuation employer contributions were increased in September 2019 from a rate of 16.4% to 23.6%. Employers also pay a charge equivalent to 0.08% of pensionable salary costs to cover administration expenses.

The next valuation is expected to take effect in 2023.

Scheme Changes

In December 2018, the Court of Appeal held that transitional protection provisions contained in the reformed judicial and firefighter pension schemes, introduced as part of public service pension reforms in 2015, gave rise to direct age discrimination and were therefore unlawful. The Supreme Court, in a decision made in June 2019, rejected the Government's application for permission to appeal the Court of Appeal's ruling and subsequently referred the case to an Employment Tribunal to determine a remedy which will need to be offered to those members of the two schemes who were subject of the age discrimination.

Since then, claims have also been lodged against the main public service schemes including the TPS. The Department has conceded those in line with the rest of the government. In July 2020 HM Treasury launched a 12-week public consultation which will provide evidence to support the delivery of an appropriate remedy for the affected schemes, including TPS.

A final remedy will be determined once the results of the consultation are established.

In December 2019, a further legal challenge was made against the TPS relating to an identified equalities issue whereby male survivors of opposite-sex marriages and civil partnerships are treated less favourably than survivors in same-sex marriages and civil partnerships. The Secretary of State for Education agreed not to defend the case. In June 2020, the Employment Tribunal recorded its findings in respect of the claimant. DfE is currently working to establish what changes are necessary to address this discrimination.

Any impact of these events will be taken into account when the next scheme valuation is implemented. This is scheduled to be implemented in April 2023, based on April 2020 data.

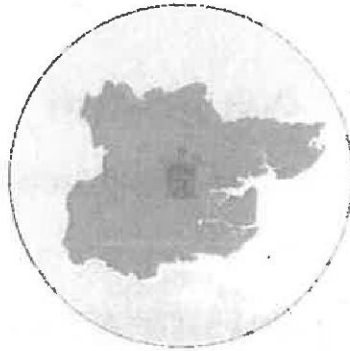


Diocesan Vision: Building On Our Past

The Diocese of Brentwood was formally erected in 1917. Our first bishop, Bishop Ward had a great personal devotion to Our Lady's shrine at Lourdes and Brentwood was the first diocese in England & Wales to have Our Lady of Lourdes as its Principal Patron. His devotion to St Edmund of Abingdon (or Canterbury), led to the choice of that saint as a Secondary Patron of the new diocese (together with St Erconwald and subsequently St Cedd).

Our present Father in God is Bishop Alan Williams, a Marist Father and formerly Rector of the National Shrine of Our Lady at Walsingham. He has responsibility for a diocese of rich diversity: East End and suburbs, towns ancient and modern, seaside resorts, rural parishes comprising dozens of villages, as well as schools, religious houses, and chaplaincies in hospitals, prisons and universities.

It is our prayer that as we give thanks for the witness of past generations, we also pray for a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit that we may be evermore faithful to proclaiming the Gospel of Christ.



Diocesan Vision: Shaping Our Future

The Stewards of the Gospel initiative has been a period of discernment for us as we seek the best response we can give to God's love for us in an ever-changing society. Last year that process of discernment led to the publication of our Diocesan Vision: Shaping Our Future. This year that vision was taken back into parishes and parish partnerships for people to interpret it in their local context. By the end of the year parish partnerships had submitted their plans for Bishop Alan's consideration. Following that consideration responses were prepared for each partnership in readiness for a period of implementation in 2020/21 but early 2020 saw us in the grip of the Covid pandemic and the implementation process was put on hold until we could operate in a more normal way.

Our objects as set out in our legal constitution are *“the advancement the Roman Catholic religion in the Diocese by such means as the Bishop may think fit and proper for the service and support whether in the Diocese or outside the Diocese of charitable works and objects promoted by the Church.”*

The Vision Document: Shaping Our Future represents a new way for us to work together for the advancement of the Roman Catholic religion in our Diocese. It commits us to focusing on restructuring ourselves and renewing ourselves, so that in turn we may best proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Restructuring

Our restructuring takes the form of placing 86 of our 87 parishes in 21 Parish Partnerships. These partnerships consist of people working together with the help of God to achieve a common goal. Thus, our Parish Partnerships are intended to actively work together to achieve renewal. The Cathedral parish stands alone to best allow it to be the mother church and a beacon for our whole Diocese.

The work of the parishes and the parish partnerships has been supported during the year by the Director of Development, the Vicariate for Evangelisation and all the other vicariates and their respective executive departments. Redesigned internal structures which better align with the vision, were formally put in place in 2020/21.

Renewal

Our work and our achievements are reported in the context of our Diocesan Vision Document: Shaping Our Future, so

that for this year and moving forward we can report against the 12 Strands of Renewal.

Strand One: Charity, Justice and Social Action

CARITAS

“God’s answer to the poor is always a saving act that heals wounds of body and soul, restores justice and helps to live life anew in dignity. God’s answer is also a summons to those who believe in him to do likewise, within the limits of what is humanly possible.”

Since launching on the “World Day of the Poor”, November 2018, Caritas Diocese of Brentwood has become established within the Diocese.

During 2019 a finalised Job Description for a full time Diocesan Caritas Co-Ordinator was produced jointly by the Episcopal Vicar for Youth Ministry and Pastoral Care, and the Director of Development. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, recruitment was postponed, and a full time appointment was made in April 21, the costs being met by legacy funding.

During the pandemic we continued to support Social Action projects.



- We continued to champion the Real Living Wage, ensuring that this is the minimum paid (since 2018) to every employee in the Diocese.



- We were the Lead Sponsor for a Community Sponsorship Group in Chelmsford, and working in partnership with the Home Office became the first group of their type in Essex to bring a family from a refugee camp to resettle here.
- During Lockdown, our Southend parishes worked with the local council to provide food to the homeless of the area.
- Walsingham House at Abbotswick partnered with Basildon Council to provide a COVID safe environment for those fleeing domestic abuse.
- In March 2021, young people, leaders, catechists, priests and families from all over the Diocese took part in the second BCYS Sponsored Sleepout, to raise funds for the Brentwood Catholic Youth Service (BCYS) as well as local homeless charities. Over £7,000 was raised.

Strand Two: Christian Life and Worship

The celebration of the Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith, and so all other liturgies flow from and to the celebration of Mass

Our Diocese consists of 87 parishes. The number has reduced in recent years, and

we anticipate that as Parish Partnerships evolve the number will further reduce.

The sacramental celebrations and other religious services, proclaiming the Gospel, exercise of the ministry of charity all take place in our parishes. Furthermore, engagement with society, the pastoral care of, and service to, the Roman Catholic, and the broader community within our diocese, the provision, maintenance and upkeep of places of worship and, of course, prayer are largely undertaken by parishioners, priests and deacons in our parishes.

In most cases, parishes are in the pastoral care of diocesan priests and in several cases, the parishes are in the pastoral care of priests from Religious Orders or The Personal Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham. All our parishes are supported by an administration, referred to as the "Curia", which is organised into Vicariates supported in turn by an executive made up of paid lay people.



Each Sunday an average of 15,284 people (42,911 last year), attended services.

Attendance was severely impacted by the COVID restrictions in place. During 2020, with the help and support of our parish priests and catechists, 748 people (2,371 in the previous year) were either baptised or received into the Church.

With our Liturgy Office, our Chancery Office is involved with the administration side of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults programme, the reception of hundreds of people, from across the Diocese, who have followed the "Journey of Faith", and wish to be received into the Catholic Church.

During the year, our parishes raised over £50,000 to support international causes, including natural disasters and overseas mission work. The amount raised was adversely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Parish volunteers contributed countless hours of work to good causes both within and beyond our diocese.

Strand Three: Education

Supporting Catholic schools to provide excellent education where pupils flourish and Christ is made known to all.

During the year we engaged with schools, and despite the pandemic we visited nearly two hundred schools between September 2020 and January 2021, providing mid-term reviews, support meetings and school training sessions.

Via a new Headteacher programme we provided Mentor support for each new headteacher.

We continued to work closely with the Catholic Education Service (CES),

Department for Education (DfE), Ofsted, Teaching Unions and the Regional Schools Commissioner (RSC) as well as relevant Local Authorities. As a religious authority, specific responsibilities remain in relation to the essential functions around Governance, Admissions, Reserved posts, RE and Collective Worship.

The prime focus for the work of BDES is in securing, preserving and developing Catholic education into the future, as well as supporting schools when difficulties have arisen, where schools have experienced decline or turmoil and where schools have become more vulnerable. Our work is summed up in our Mission Statement; *"Supporting Catholic schools to provide excellent education where pupils flourish and Christ is made known to all."*

Six Catholic Multi Academy Trusts (MATs) now exist in our Diocese. They operate under distinctly Catholic names (Rosary Trust, Assisi Catholic Trust, Christus Catholic Trust, Good Shepherd Catholic Trust, Our Lady of Grace Catholic Trust and Our Lady of Fatima Trust). This approach remains the preferred structure for Catholic schools within the Diocese of Brentwood. Currently there are fifty-three Academies out of a total of eighty-two state maintained primary and secondary schools, with the balance being Voluntary Aided Catholic schools. There are eight independent schools.

Catholic Social Teaching and our commitment to it underpins our commitment to employee rights, school standards and partnership with various local authorities.

During the year as we moved to on-line training and support via Zoom for schools.

Feedback was very positive and as a result numbers participating in the training sessions increased when compared to the prior period.

ADMISSIONS

Admissions remained an area of on-going work. We continued to support our schools through group training sessions and individual advice and guidance.

SCHOOL GOVERNANCE

Governance is an area of key importance to our Diocese and continued to represent an opportunity for lay people to take on leadership roles.

Training opportunities became increasingly accessible for governors via on-line provision including our GIFT-ED App. and by the end of the period several hundred Governors were signed up and accessing the on-line training available.

Strand Four: Family

Support for marriage and family is a crucial part of the Church's ministry, and of great importance for society as a whole.

As a department of the Vicariate for Adult Formation, our mission is to proclaim the good news of God's love, revealed in a special way through the love of husband and wife, and the love for their children. Recognising that family life brings many challenges and is often undermined by the values of the contemporary world, the church has a special duty to accompany our families and offer whatever support is needed.

Anna McCormick, our part time project working works alongside Fr Matthew

Bemand-Qureshi is the Diocesan Director and Chaplain, provide guidance and support in this area.

Where ongoing support is required, couples are introduced to other appropriate organisations such as Marriage Care or Retrouvaille, or their own parish.

During the period our online and social media presence was further developed, which was of increased importance due to the pandemic. This provided a means of sharing resources and ideas, not only for parishes but for couples and families themselves.

On a very practical level, our Chancery Office processes marriage papers for marriages taking place inside and outside the Diocese, and despite the COVID restrictions being in place, in 2020 processed:

- **26 (last year 221)** sets of marriage papers for marriages taking place outside the Diocese, mostly overseas.
- **13 (last year 93)** sets of marriage papers where one party belonged to another religion.
- **3 (last year 93)** sets of papers, where one party had not been baptized;
- **26 (last year 47)** sets of marriage papers for Catholics wishing to convalidate their civil marriage in the Catholic Church.

In addition, the work of the Chancery enabled people to marry in Churches of other denominations, but with the necessary dispensations to allow the marriages to be recognised as valid by the Catholic Church.

Strand Five: Formation

Formation is a life-long process of listening to what the Holy Spirit is calling us to be and to do

To support our catechists, The Bishop's Certificate in Catechesis and Youth Ministry is a yearlong course of 12 modules, covering different aspects of faith and Church teaching, as well as practical skills in Youth Ministry. It is an entry-level qualification to help in the ongoing formation of adults who are involved in sacramental preparation or youth ministry in our Diocese. It includes development of practical skills and the deepening of theological knowledge.

During our discernment process leading up to our vision, we committed to making the process of faith formation for catechists and youth leaders more accessible than ever before by harnessing the power of digital media. Therefore, this course is taught through short, engaging videos with expert interviews on a custom-built website, complete with online questionnaires and journaling for assessment purposes.

Our Annual Training and Resources day was held in November 2020.

The Vicariate for Adult Formation is led by Fr Martin Boland. The Vicariate aims to provide a variety of resources and support for those lay men and women who wish to develop a more mature understanding of their Catholic Faith and to deepen their relationship with Christ through a life of prayer and service. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, it is hoped that lay men and women will find ways to grow in confidence as disciples and be better witness to the Church's mission of hope.

During the period, the content for social media platforms including a new website were put in to development. The website was launched in June 21.

Strand Six: Integration

Make sure that every person of whatever background can find in you a welcoming heart.

In our Vision we seek to build on the rich diversity of people in our Diocese through a generous inclusivity. We look to work together with people of all faiths and none where the opportunity arises.

INTERNATIONAL TWINNING

Our Diocese is twinned with the Diocese of Dundee, Kwa-Zulu Natal, South Africa. Our solidarity with our fellow Catholics in Kwa-Zulu Natal is demonstrated by parishes and schools in both dioceses having twinned with each other. They build practical relationships beyond friendship and spiritual support. A Brentwood priest operates in the Diocese of Dundee as Fidei Donum priest.

As Fr Gerry came to the end of his distinguished service in Dundee and made plans to return to Brentwood this provides an opportunity to have a fresh look at the Twinning and see how it may be strengthened and given new life in the future.

Strand Seven: Leaders

By right of baptism all are called to fulfil their vocation as the people of God.

During the year leaders continued to support our parishes and wider communities, despite the restrictions in place during lockdown.

School Governorship is an important role for lay people who have appropriate skills to perform, and we continue to encourage people to come forward and train. Our education team continued to support our Governors remotely during the period.

Also, in education leaders have been appointed to be Trustees of our Catholic Multi Academy Trusts. This is a key role for people to play in the future of our children and of catholic education and anyone who is interested in either of these opportunities is encouraged to contact Debbie Botham.

The Diaconate is a key area where leadership can be exercised in our Diocese. During the period two men were in preparation for this ministry on the Southern Diaconate Formation Programme.

Strand Eight: Material Assets

As stewards of all that God has given to us, it is our responsibility to use those gifts as well as we can.

In the previous year our Board reviewed the way it operates in order to create internal structures which were better aligned with the overall vision and were also better placed to support the ongoing changes which we will need to implement

over the coming years. The formal approval of the new structures came in 2020/21.

Parishes and Parish Partnerships have been looking at their material assets as a whole to see how they can be best used to fulfil our objectives and our vision in their local context.

Central Finance Team: Our work focussed on increased support to the parishes, recognising that most of the work of our Diocese occurs through the parishes and that many regulatory burdens fall on them.

In the previous couple of years we had moved to an increased use of web-based finance applications, enabling more 'real-time' support of the many parish employees and volunteers. During Lockdown this enabled the Finance team to support the many volunteers and parish administrators remotely. The Finance Department remained open on every working day of the pandemic in order to provide support where needed.

The design of online donation portal was expedited and made available to all parishes by the beginning of April 2020. This portal, administered by the Finance Team, provided an alternative method of giving for all parishes, whilst churches remained closed.

When churches were able to start re-opening, the Finance Team provided further support and information to parishes in respect of the sourcing of COVID supplies to help facilitate the safe re-opening of churches.

Property Team: As the structure of the Board and its sub-committees began to change, the Property Sub-Committee and

the Health and Safety Sub-Committee now operate independently and have different membership. The Property Sub-Committee has delegated responsibility for both advising and making recommendations to the Board on all property matters taking account of both the civil law of England and Wales and Canon Law. The Health and Safety Sub-Committee continued to advise the Board on matters of significance relating to the Diocesan Health and Safety Policy and Management Plan.
Curia Buildings

The Diocesan Curia offices, which were developed in the 1980s, had been identified as being in need of essential refurbishment and repair. Following the successful completion of a boiler replacement project during the previous year, a continuing programme of planned refurbishment had been planned, but this was deferred due to the COVID pandemic.

Health & Safety

During the early part of 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic began. The external Health and Safety consultants worked closely with the COVID-19 working group and the recently appointed Health and Safety Co-Ordinator to provide regular updates and guidance to parishes and staff. The online Health & Safety management system provided an essential resource, which Diocesan Health and Safety Policy and Management Plan, the Diocese was well placed to provide immediate health and safety support and guidance.

The Property Office continued to roll out the new online Diocesan Health & Safety Management system.

Strand Nine: Prayer and Spirituality

Our relationship with God in Jesus Christ will only continue to develop and grow if we pay attention to it.

Prayers of intercession are made continuously throughout the year and during the year.

Strand Ten: Priests and People

We will explore new ways to recognise each other's gifts and to collaborate to bring our vision to reality.

We are thankful for the priests serving our Diocese. During the year, our clergy found new ways of keeping in contact with our parish communities. More masses were live streamed, and where possible, social media and online facilities were utilised in order to maintain contact and provide support for the local parish communities.

Compulsory Safeguarding training took part during the year for all clergy. Due to COVID restrictions, this training took place via online Deanery meetings.

Strand Eleven: Vocations to the Priesthood

We have continued to recognise that our first duty to encourage vocations as Catholics is to pray for priests and those considering priesthood.

During the Summer of 2020 the Diocesan Presbyterate welcomed two new priests: After completing four years of priestly formation in Rome, Fr Adrian Lowe was ordained priest at St. James the Less and

St. Helen in Colchester on 11 July 2020 and then appointed assistant priest at Our Lady of Lourdes, Wanstead.

Fr Paschal Uche, was ordained on 1st August 2020 at the Cathedral and was appointed assistant priest at St. James the Less and St. Helen Colchester.

The vocations website includes interesting and inspirational vocation stories told, by our diocesan priests and some of our seminarians. These powerful witnesses were recorded live as part of the holy hours to pray for vocations held throughout our diocese

www.brentwoodvocations.co.uk/vocations-stories/.

During the year, our Vocations Promotor, Fr Mark Swires held regular online enquirers meetings via 'Zoom' for those interested in learning more about the priesthood the process of discernment.

We continue to pray for our seminarians and that many more will listen and respond to the call of Jesus to share in his priesthood.

Strand Twelve: Young People

You too, dear young people, can be joyful witnesses of his love, courageous witnesses of his Gospel, carrying to the world a ray of his light.

For the Vicariate for Youth Ministry and Pastoral Care, based at Walsingham House, the year began with a rapid and successful transition from "in-person" to "on-line" ministry.

During the first 10 weeks of the first lockdown, online masses were streamed via Instagram daily. In the subsequent lockdowns masses were streamed weekly.

Our young people had planned to serve the adult Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes in the Summer of 2020. Due to COVID restrictions this could not happen. Instead, we launched 'Lourdes in your Living Room', a blend of YouTube and Instagram presentations including daily mass, morning and evening prayer, Stations of the Cross and Rosary, as well as the Torchlight Procession and reflections. The online pilgrimage received great praise, and some parts of the programme were received by as many as 1000 people, with a steady 400-500 participants throughout. The participants included housebound, ill and elderly parishioners, as well as young people and families.

In Summer 2020 the Walsingham House Team held the '18 hour challenge', 18 hours being the length of the coach journey from Brentwood to Lourdes. Young people raised over £7,000, which was split between the CAFOD "Summer of Hope" appeal and BCYS, by walking the distance between Brentwood and Lourdes (44 people each walking 18km), making 18 curries, baking 18 sets of cupcakes, and much else that was both inventive and creative!

In November 2020 the annual Training and Resources day was held for First Holy Communion and Confirmation Catechists. This year the theme was 'Accompaniment'.

Young people are the future of our church and we are committed to ensure that where possible we provide help and support wherever we can. The COVID pandemic had a far reaching affect on mental health. We have been able to help young people find resources to help support mental wellbeing by developing a section of our website in collaboration with BCCS.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust (the Charity) was constituted by Trust Deed in 1947. It is a registered charity, number 234092. Its objects are the advancement of the Roman Catholic religion in the Diocese by such means as the Bishop may think fit and proper for the service and support, whether in the Diocese or outside the Diocese, of charitable works and objects promoted by the Church. In addition, there are two separate funds which are registered as individual charities:

- The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund (BEEF) – the fund of the Diocese which meets the cost of educating and training seminarians – is a separately constituted charity under a Trust Deed, dated 11 July 1922, and registered under number 1067745. It is accounted for as a restricted fund within the Diocesan accounts.
- The investments of our Diocese are managed as a Pooled Fund, which is separately registered with the Charity Commission under number 1067742.

An order of the Charity Commissioners under S96(6) Charities Act 1993 permits the three charities, which have the same Trustee, to be treated as a single entity for accounting purposes.

Administration of the Charity is through the Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee (the Corporate Trustee). The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee, a company limited by guarantee, was set up in 1948 to act as custodian trustee in relation to the Charity and the ecclesiastical trusts of the Diocese. Its company number is 450897.

All parish property is in civil law held by the Corporate Trustee, subject to the Charity Trust Deed. The acquisition or disposal of parish property therefore has to be sanctioned by the Directors of the Corporate Trustee, and all relevant documentation must be drawn up in the name of the Corporate Trustee.

Directors of the Corporate Trustee

In keeping with the Charity's objectives, it is a requirement that candidates for Directorship are committed Roman Catholics. The power to appoint Directors is vested in the Bishop of the Diocese.

Where additional Directors are required, the Bishop will consider the range of skills and experience required on the Board (such as finance, investments, strategic planning etc.), and will approach individuals in the Diocese who are likely to meet these requirements. Prospective Directors are provided with full information on the Charity's constitution, objects and finances. Training material is made available as necessary, and Directors are encouraged to complete online training modules which have been approved by the Charity Commission.

Governance of the Charity

The Charity is governed by the Board of Directors of the Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee (the "Corporate Trustee") which consists of the President of the Corporation (the Bishop of Brentwood) and up to fourteen other Directors.

The Board, in conjunction with the canonical bodies established by the Bishop to be his advisors and consultors, is responsible for the development and implementation of policies which ensure compliance with civil legislation and canon law. The key policies are safeguarding, health and safety, risk management, the production of financial budgets, the exercising of financial controls through regular financial reporting, the management of Diocesan properties, policies relating to employment and the compliance of the Charity with relevant company and charity legislation.

Authority for the management of the day-to-day business of the Diocese and compliance with civil legislation is delegated by the Board to the respective departmental Directors and parish priests in accordance with their directions.

In March 2014, the Finance Board (now known as the "Board") approved revised Articles of Association for the Corporate Trustee, establishing the Bishop of Brentwood as the sole Member of the Corporate Trustee; the Board cannot implement a decision with which the Bishop disagrees. In December 2020, following an internal governance review, the Articles of Association were further revised, inter alia removing references to the 'Finance Board' and replacing these with the "Board".

Sub-Committees of the Board

The Board has established a number of Sub-Committees delegating to them the consideration of specific areas of importance to the Diocese and authorising them to make some decisions and to submit recommendations to the main Board for approval"

- Adult Formation
- Education
- Finance and Administration (including Investments)
- Health & Safety
- Human Resources & Diversity
- Property
- Safeguarding
- Youth Ministry and Pastoral Care

A separate committee (not a Sub-Committee of the Board) reviews the provision of support to sick and retired clergy and meets on a regular basis.

Key Management Personnel

The Trustee considers that the Directors of the Corporate Trustee, together with the Director of Finance, the Director of Education, the Diocesan Safeguarding Coordinator, the Diocesan Director of Development and the Director of Property, comprise the key management personnel of the Charity, in charge of directing, controlling, running and operating the Charity on a day to day basis. Salaries are reviewed on an annual basis.

All Directors of the Trustee gave of their time freely, and no Director received remuneration in respect of their services as Directors of the Corporate Trustee. Details of the Trustee Directors' expenses are disclosed in Note 19 of the accounts.

Financial Review

Investment policy The Diocese follows a total return investment policy, to achieve long term capital and income growth, to provide sufficient income to support today's beneficiaries whilst still seeking 'real' growth in capital to meet the future needs of the Charity.

The Trustee is empowered within the Trust Deed to invest any monies as authorised by law for the investment of trust monies, in a manner which it thinks fits with the consent of the Bishop. The provisions of the Trustee Act 2000 apply.

Under section 26 of the Charities Act 1993, an Order was made by the Charity Commission on 5 December 1999 granting the Trustee power to appoint an investment manager, and to appoint a corporate body as the Trustee's nominee to hold the investments of the Charity. The General Power of Investment in the Trustee Act 2000 allows 'Trustees to invest trust funds in any kind of investment, excluding land [except under certain provisions], in which they could invest if they were the absolute owner of those funds'.

Diocesan Ethical Policy for investments: The Diocesan investment portfolio avoids investment in tobacco, arms, alcohol, gambling and pornography. Investment is also to be avoided in companies which support oppressive regimes, or trade in products which are produced by child labour or in forced labour camps, or companies which have been involved in the exploitation or unjust treatment of employees.

Our investment managers, Sarasin and Partners LLP, monitor any investments made by their Endowment Fund in companies which generate any revenue from the direct or indirect manufacture of pharmaceutical products, the use of which would contravene the Catholic Church's teaching on the sanctity of life. Our investment managers take a pro-active approach in respect of voting on company resolutions, in order to promote responsible long-term stewardship. The Sarasin Endowment Fund will not invest in tobacco and will also avoid investment in companies that have more than 10% of their turnover from the following:

- Alcohol Manufacture
- Armaments
- Gambling
- Pornography

The Portfolio has performed better when compared to the ARC Peer Groups.

Risk Management: The Directors of the Corporate Trustee have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed and are satisfied that adequate systems are in place to mitigate exposure to these risks. The Board has delegated the risk management responsibility to the Human Resources sub-committee. Reviews are carried out on a quarterly basis. Risks are recorded, by department, and a RAG status applied. Actions to mitigate the risks are identified and a timescale for completion assigned. The major risks are considered to be health and safety (ensuring that our buildings are maintained to an adequate standard, and policies adhered to), and pastoral (the falling number of priests in ministry). To mitigate the health and safety risks, a Health and Safety Committee meets on a regular basis to ensure that policies are being communicated and applied appropriately, risks are reviewed and action taken where appropriate. Health and Safety representatives are appointed at parish level. In respect of the falling number of priests in ministry, the Diocesan Vision addresses this issue and sets out plans in order to mitigate this risk going forward. During 2019/20 the Directors of the Corporate Trustee began to review risk management and in expect to implement a new way of approaching risk assessment and control in the near future.

Covid-19 Pandemic

The global Coronavirus pandemic presents a number of risks to the Diocese, specifically those of adverse health and safety, operational and financial impacts.

The safety of our clergy, employees, volunteers and parishioners has continued to be a priority during the pandemic.

The government restrictions put in place in order to mitigate the impact of the pandemic led to the closure of churches for communal worship. The resultant fall in the number of parishioners attending our churches has in turn led to a significant fall in cash collections, which historically has represented

36% of our revenues. Demand for the use of our parish halls has also reduced due to the government restrictions on activities allowed to take place in community buildings.

Risk Mitigations

The charity formed a COVID-19 working group early in the pandemic in order to issue guidance and co-ordinate the response to the risks presented by the pandemic. The working group included representatives from the Clergy, Health and Safety, Finance and Safeguarding teams. Throughout the pandemic the Bishops' Conference has continued to issue specific guidelines in respect of how to implement the latest government guidance, and, when churches have been allowed to open, has provided specific guidance to help Parish Priests facilitate collective worship safely.

The Parishes, Clergy and staff throughout the Diocese have received regular communications during the pandemic from both the Covid-19 working group and the Bishop's office, in order to disseminate the most up to date information on an ongoing basis.

In order to continue to remain in contact with parishioners, even when churches were closed, some parishes ensured that services were available to view on-line. When churches were allowed to open, where restrictions on the number of parishioners allowed to attend were in place, services continued to be made available to view on-line.

The use of social media has allowed our clergy to maintain contact with parishioners, providing much needed communication and a positive impact on well-being.

A central online donation platform has been made available on the Diocesan website, allowing parishioners who would normally make cash donations, to make donations electronically. This, together with the promotion of donations by standing order, has helped to reduce the potential shortfall in donation income.

The Diocese utilised the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme. Where staff were not been able to attend work due to social distancing restrictions, and home working was not feasible, or where work was not available, employees were furloughed. Approximately 40% of the workforce was furloughed at some time during the pandemic.

Financial Control Policy: Our Diocese has a series of financial controls and signing limits in place (in the parishes and at the Curia) in order to enable the Corporate Trustee to exercise its legal duties:

- To ensure we are carrying out our purposes for the public benefit
- To comply with our governing document and the law
- To act in the best interests of our Diocese
- To manage responsibly the resources of our Diocese
- To act with reasonable care and skill
- To ensure that we are accountable.

During 2020/21, we reviewed the support we provide to parishes, and our associated controls and procedures continue to be reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Public Benefit: The Board Members confirm that they comply with the duty in S 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant. Details of the main activities undertaken to further the charity's purposes for the public benefit are noted earlier in this document.

Fundraising Policy: Our Diocese is registered with the Fundraising Regulator and is committed to the Fundraising Promise. We do not use any external fundraisers.

- We will commit to high standards, adhering to the Fundraising Code of Practice at all times, monitoring any person that raises funds on our behalf, and complying with the law as it applies to charities and fundraising.
- We will be clear, honest and open, in respect of what we will do with donations, how gifts can be made or amended, and the purpose of our Charity.
- We will be respectful of the rights and privacy of any donor.
- We will treat donors and the public fairly and reasonably, and not accept donations from those individuals who we believe may lack the capacity to make an informed decision
- We will hold ourselves accountable and responsible, ensuring that our resources are managed responsibly and that we have a complaints procedure in place. No complaints about fundraising activities were received during the year.

Reserves Policy: Unrestricted reserves, including parochial funds, totalled £40m. Restricted and endowment funds totalled £8.5m.

Central Diocesan reserves are held to meet the future needs of the Diocese as a whole and absorb the impact of any material risk.

Parochial reserves are held to meet the cost of future repairs and maintenance or major building projects which cannot be met out of expected income. The Diocese considers parish funds to be designated at parish level, for parish requirements.

The policy of the Diocese is to maintain its reserves at a level that will provide the income necessary to assist it in implementing its future objectives, including but not limited to the increased cost of caring for the Sick and Retired Clergy of the Diocese. The Diocese aims to hold cash reserves of £10m. Due to the size of the Diocese and the number of parishes within the Diocese, the Directors feel that this is a reasonable amount to cover expenditure for the period of one year. Should cash reserves fall below this, depending on the projected cash flow, investments may be liquidated

Funds invested, and how they will be applied

Restricted funds £8.1m The two largest funds are as follows:

- The Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund (BEEF), a fund for the support and training of seminarians, was valued at £4.0m as at 5 April 2021. As at April 2021 there were nine seminarians, each normally costing just under £50,000 p.a. Fees were reduced during the period due to the COVID-19 pandemic. During 2020-2021, total gains in investments were in excess of the costs incurred by the fund.
- The second largest restricted fund is the Sick and Retired Clergy Fund standing at £2.06m. The Diocese is planning how best to finance the support of priests due to retire over the next 10-15 years.

Designated funds £2.5m

- The largest designated fund is the General Education Fund which stands at £2.2m. With the development of a new diocesan vision and strategy for Education, the Trustee will be considering how best to utilise these funds.

Permanent Endowment funds £1.1m

- The largest endowment fund is the Crowhurst legacy which stands at £0.62m – these funds are to be used to buy a suitable property for sick or retired priests. These funds have been used to purchase properties in order to meet the housing requirements of sick and retired priests.

Unrestricted funds held by the centre £7.3m

- Non-parochial unrestricted funds are invested in the Sarasin Endowment Fund (formerly Alpha CIF for Endowments) in order to generate investment revenue which contributes to the work of the Curia. The fund value has increased year on year.

Financial Performance: With reference to the statement of financial activities in the financial statements.

At the end of the financial year 2020-21 diocesan funds as a whole totalled £53.5m. Income has decreased to £8.9m from £13.7 in the prior year. The closure of places of worship during the COVID-19 pandemic led to a decrease in both donation and rental income. In the previous year £1.2m gains on disposal of fixed assets were recognised.

As part of the Diocesan Renewal process, we are reviewing our material assets in order to decide how best to use them for the future.

Expenditure has decreased to £10.5m from £12.8m in the previous year. The closure of places of worship during the COVID-19 pandemic led to a general reduction in costs.

Parish Reserves As at 5 April 2021, Parish fixed assets totalled £16.4m and free Parochial reserves £18m.

Plans for the Future

Our Diocesan Vision (on pages 3-12) details our plans for the future. The COVID-19 pandemic has had an impact on these plans, but we remain confident and the plans have moved forward in 2021/22.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEE'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustee is responsible for preparing the Trustee's Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the Trustee to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the Trustee is are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP 2019 (FRS 102);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustee is responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011 and the provisions of the trust deed. It is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Opinion

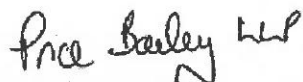

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with all statutory requirements and with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable to the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (Effective 1 January 2019) – (Charities SORP (FRS102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102). The particular accounting policies adopted are described below. The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified to include certain tangible fixed assets at a valuation and fixed asset investments at market value. Figures are presented in sterling and rounded to the nearest pound.

The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocesan Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective from 1 January 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

a) Preparation of accounts on a going concern basis

Having considered the cash reserves as at January 2023, future budgets and cash flows, the Trustee confirms that there are no material uncertainties about the entity's ability to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

The Directors of the Corporate Trustee have reviewed the cash reserves as at January 2023 and the projected cash outflow over the next twelve months. Despite continued uncertainty in respect of future income, due to the level of investments held, the Directors are confident that the Charity continues to be a going concern.

b) Legacies, Donations and Grants

Legacies and donations are recognised when receivable or when the Diocese becomes legally entitled to them and receipt is probable, and they can reasonably be measured in financial terms. Receipts of property, investments or other gifts in kind are included at market value. Grants are recognised when the charity has entitlement and when the amount is measurable.

c) Investment Income

Investment Income is accounted for as it accrues.

d) Expenditure

Costs of raising funds comprise those costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the management of the Charity's investments.

Costs of charitable activities consist of all expenditure directly relating to the objects of the Charity. Support costs which cannot be directly allocated are apportioned between charitable activities and governance costs on the basis of the Trustee's estimate of the time spent on the relevant functions.

Employment benefits, including holiday pay, are recognised in the period in which they are earned. Termination benefits are recognised in the period in which the decision is made and communicated to the relevant employee(s).

Governance costs include expenditure on management and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements together with an allocation of support costs.

Irrecoverable VAT is included with the category of expenses to which it relates.

d) Expenditure (continued)

Redundancy and termination costs are recognised as an expense in the Statement of Financial Activities and a liability on the Balance Sheet immediately at the point the charity is demonstrably committed to either:

- Terminate the employment of an employee or group of employees before normal retirement date; or
- Provide termination benefits as a result of an offer made in order to encourage voluntary redundancy.

The charity is considered to be demonstrably committed only when it has a detailed formal plan for the termination and is without realistic possibility of withdrawal from the plan.

e) Tangible Fixed Assets

Prior to 6 April 1996 the cost of fixed assets was written off in the year of acquisition and no comprehensive cost records were maintained. In order to arrive at a reasonable valuation of parish property, taking into account age, type, condition and life expectancy, the Trustee considered that insured values at 6 April 1997 should be discounted by 90% and in subsequent years be depreciated at 2% per annum. This valuation will not be updated in the future. Properties acquired after 6 April 1996 are capitalised at their actual cost of acquisition.

The school properties (land and buildings) are vested in the name of the Diocesan Trustee. The Diocesan Trustee cannot take a unilateral decision to dispose of these properties. Disposal can only occur if the school governors and the Secretary of State for Education decide that all or part of a school site is no longer required for education. In most circumstances, where a disposal occurs, the Secretary of State or the local authority may be entitled to recoup grant. Although no rights of ownership vest in the school governing body, most other rights and obligations, such as for the maintenance and repair of the school and its facilities, are passed to the governors. The Trustees therefore consider that, for the purposes of these financial statements, the nature of their ownership is that of a custodianship, however these properties have been purchased and written off in the Diocesan accounts for the amounts that the Diocese contributed in the past and the costs involved have not been separately identified and are not considered material in the overall context of the accounts.

The estimated cost of furniture, equipment and motor vehicles held at 6 April 1996 has been capitalised in the financial statements. Subsequent additions are capitalised at cost. Individual works of art, historical treasures and plate are not depreciated as they have extremely long lives and are considered to be worth preserving indefinitely.

Depreciation is calculated by the straight line method to write off the cost/value less anticipated residual value, over the expected useful lives of assets as follows:-

Freehold buildings additions since 6 April 1996	50 years
Fixtures and fittings	10 years
Furniture and equipment	5 years
Motor vehicles	4 years

The residual values of buildings held at 6 April 1996 are considered to be significantly higher than their carrying value in the accounts resulting in a nil value for depreciation charge.

f) School Building Programme

The Diocese assists schools undertaking major projects by meeting the costs and claiming grants on behalf of the schools. These grants are netted off against the cost and only the net costs to the Diocese are included in the financial statements

g) Financial Instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Fixed assets are recorded at depreciated historical cost or revaluation, investments are recorded at their fair value which is the market value as disclosed in note 11 and all other assets and liabilities are recorded at cost which is their fair value.

Investments

Pooled investments are valued at fair value on the balance sheet date. Investment properties are valued at fair value and stated at a Trustee's valuation. Unrealised gains/losses on investments are calculated as the difference between opening market value and closing market value after adjusting for additions and disposals during the year, less investment management and administration costs.

Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

h) Fund accounting

General funds

These comprise the accumulated surplus or deficit from the Statement of Financial Activities which is not restricted nor designated funds. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity

Designated Funds

These funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustee for particular purposes. Details of the funds designated by the Trustee are set out in note 12.

Restricted Funds

These funds are subject to restrictions imposed by the donor. Details of funds subject to legal restriction are set out in note 13.

Parochial Funds

For the purposes of the civil administration of the charity, parishes are not distinct legal entities, but branches forming part of the administrative machinery of the main Diocesan charity, albeit that they have a degree of independence. Parish funds and assets, unless held on distinct and express special trusts clearly evidenced in law, will be held as part of the Diocesan charity and will be the responsibility of the diocesan charity trustee (who, under normal legal principles, may of course appropriately delegate its management to parish priests with limited authority). Such funds will be designated funds. Unless there are distinct and express special trusts declared under the law of England and Wales, they will not be restricted funds. Parochial funds are therefore shown as unrestricted but designated funds.

In Canon Law, however, the parish is firmly set within the context of the diocese C.515(1) and the parish priest exercises his ministry under the authority of the bishop C.519. A parish which has been erected in accordance with the law, possesses public juridical personality by the law itself C.515(3). In Canon Law, therefore, it has the right to acquire, retain, administer and alienate temporal goods C.1255 which, as ecclesiastical goods, are subject to the norms of Canon Law C.1257(1).

i) Pensions

All eligible staff are members of an Aegon group personal pension scheme to which the Charity makes contributions. Employees may contribute an additional amount. As a defined contribution scheme, no liability falls upon the Charity, as employer, to make good a shortfall of funding other than contributions due.

Some staff employed in the educational work of the Diocese are members of the Teacher's Pension Scheme ("TPS") which is a defined benefits scheme. Diocesan contribution levels are determined by the TPS. The TPS is a multi-employer scheme, and, as there is insufficient information available to use defined benefit accounting, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

j) Significant judgements and estimation uncertainty

In preparing these financial statements the trustees have had to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts recognised in these financial statements. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Key areas subject to judgement and estimation are as follows:

Fixed asset depreciation. Judgement is applied when assigning anticipated average lives to the fixed assets of the charity.

Walsingham House

This house is used for the provision of youth retreats.

Sick and Retired Clergy Fund

Income is used to help support fully retired, partially retired and sick priests. Transfers represent contributions to the fund from the Diocese.

Mensal Fund

This fund is used to support the Diocesan activities of the Bishop. Transfers represent contributions to the fund from the Diocese.

BEEF (Brentwood Ecclesiastical Education Fund)

This fund meets the costs of training priests for the Diocese. Transfers represent contributions from collections on its behalf from the parishes.

Mass Fund

Income received from donors is paid to priests who celebrate masses for the donors. Transfers represent mass stipends paid over to parishes.

Parish Restricted Funds

These funds consist of donations and other contributions to parishes for specific purposes within the parish.

Legion of Mary Fund

These funds were restricted for the purpose of all forms of Evangelisation and pastoral care.

BRCDT Education Fund

These funds are used to finance the provision of education advisors to schools within the Diocese.

Caritas

This fund is used to promote and support Catholic Social Teaching. As such, the pre-existing Social Welfare Fund (previously reported within Other Restricted Funds) has been incorporated into the Caritas Fund.

Other Restricted Funds

Other restricted funds consist of donations for specific purposes.

Permanent Endowment Funds

Crowhurst Legacy

This fund consists of a property donated to the Diocese to be used as a home for Roman Catholic Priests suffering from sickness or who have retired by reason of old age. The property may be sold but the proceeds must be invested in another property to be used for the same purposes. The property was sold during 2005. The proceeds have been invested with Sarasins until a suitable replacement property has been found.

Sullivan Special Trust

This fund comprises an investment property the income of which is for the benefit of the parish priest at Southend parish.

14. PRIOR YEAR ADJUSTMENT

The charity has made one prior year adjustment as follows.

A sale of parish land to a third party was completed on 22nd May 2019. Deferred consideration of £978,975 was not recognised in the accounts for the period ending 5th April 2020. As a result a debtor of £978,975 has now been recognised, increasing Parish funds as at 5th April 2020 from £33,821,726 to £34,800,701.

The Charity is governed by the Board of Directors of the Corporate Trustee, The Brentwood Catholic Diocese Trustee (company number 450897).

19. TRANSACTIONS WITH DIRECTORS OF THE CORPORATE TRUSTEE

A majority of the Directors of the Corporate Trustee are also parish priests in the Diocese. As priests they receive income from their parishes together with living accommodation, living expenses and reimbursement of costs incurred on behalf of their parish on the same basis as other priests within the Diocese. They do not receive any remuneration or benefits from their trusteeship other than the purchase by the Diocese of trustees' indemnity insurance providing cover of up to £5,000,000 during the year (the premium is paid as part of public liability insurance). Travel costs totalling £NIL (2020: £402) and consultancy costs in respect of courses arranged by the Vicariate for Education in the amount of £1,200 (2020 £1,500) were reimbursed to one (2020: one) Director during the year. During the year, Directors of the Corporate Trustee donated £5,015 (2020 £6,876) in aggregate, to the Diocese.

21. THIRD PARTY COLLECTIONS

Parishes hold collections on behalf of third party charities. Because the Diocese is acting as agent for these charities, these collections have been excluded from these financial statements. During the year £105,082 (2020:£393,631) was collected on behalf of third party charities. At 5 April 2021 £126,673 (2020 £150,803) was held on behalf of third party charities.

22. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Related Party transactions with the Directors of the Corporate Trustee are disclosed in Note 19 of these Accounts. There were no other related party transactions during the year (2020, none).

23. PENSION COMMITMENTS

The charity's academic and related staff belong to the Teachers' pension Scheme England and Wales. This is a multi-employer defined benefit scheme. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the

period ended 31 August 2019. There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS or scheme) is a statutory, unfunded, defined benefit occupational scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pensions Regulations 2010 (as amended), and the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014 (as amended). These regulations apply to teachers in schools and other educational establishments, including academies, in England and Wales that are maintained by local authorities. In addition, teachers in many independent and voluntary-aided schools and teachers and lecturers in some establishments of further and higher education may be eligible for membership.

Membership is automatic for full-time teachers and lecturers and, from 1 January 2007, automatic too for teachers and lecturers in part-time employment following appointment or a change of contract. Teachers and lecturers are able to opt out of the TPS.

The Teachers' Pension Budgeting and Valuation Account

Although members may be employed by various bodies, their retirement and other pension benefits are set out in regulations made under the Superannuation Act (1972) and Public Service Pensions Act (2013) and are paid by public funds provided by Parliament. The TPS is an unfunded scheme and members contribute on a 'pay as you go' basis – contributions from members, along with those made by employers, are credited to the Exchequer under arrangements governed by the above Acts. The Teachers' Pensions Regulations 2010 require an annual account, the Teachers' Pension Budgeting and Valuation Account, to be kept of receipts and expenditure (including the cost of pension increases).

From 1 April 2001, the Account has been credited with a real rate of return, which is equivalent to assuming that the balance in the Account is invested in notional investments that produce that real rate of return.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

As a result of the latest scheme valuation employer contributions were increased in September 2019 from a rate of 16.4% to 23.6%. Employers also pay a charge equivalent to 0.08% of pensionable salary costs to cover administration expenses.

The next valuation is expected to take effect in 2023.

Scheme Changes

In December 2018, the Court of Appeal held that transitional protection provisions contained in the reformed judicial and firefighter pension schemes, introduced as part of public service pension reforms in 2015, gave rise to direct age discrimination and were therefore unlawful. The Supreme Court, in a decision made in June 2019, rejected the Government's application for permission to appeal the Court of Appeal's ruling and subsequently referred the case to an Employment Tribunal to determine a remedy which will need to be offered to those members of the two schemes who were subject of the age discrimination.

Since then, claims have also been lodged against the main public service schemes including the TPS. The Department has conceded those in line with the rest of the government. In July 2020 HM Treasury launched a 12-week public consultation which will provide evidence to support the delivery of an appropriate remedy for the affected schemes, including TPS.

A final remedy will be determined once the results of the consultation are established.

In December 2019, a further legal challenge was made against the TPS relating to an identified equalities issue whereby male survivors of opposite-sex marriages and civil partnerships are treated less favourably than survivors in same-sex marriages and civil partnerships. The Secretary of State for Education agreed not to defend the case. In June 2020, the Employment Tribunal recorded its findings in respect of the claimant. DfE is currently working to establish what changes are necessary to address this discrimination.

Any impact of these events will be taken into account when the next scheme valuation is implemented. This is scheduled to be implemented in April 2023, based on April 2020 data
