Report of the Managing Trustees

For the year ending 31 December 2022

The Trustees and Management Committee has pleasure in submitting its Report to the Members, together with the Financial Statements of the Temple for the year ending 31 December 2022.

Introduction and Principal Activity

The Central Gurdwara London is a charity located in London and primarily serves the Sikh community. The Central Gurdwara London, also known as the Khalsa Jatha is a religious charity centred on the Sikh faith. All aspects of the Khalsa Jatha operations and management are premised on the foundations of Sikh teachings and principles.

Whilst our primary objective is to enable those of a Sikh heritage and Sikh commitment with a place of worship, sangat (congregation) and langar (communal kitchen and food), the Khalsa Jatha prides itself on being able to extend its building and its volunteers' time to all members of the local and wider community.

Aims and Objectives

In addition to our aims and objectives as defined in our constitution, the Khalsa Jatha set out its aims and objectives, as follows:

1. Practice of Sikhism: to provide facilities to enable followers of the Sikh religion to practise their faith in a convenient and conducive environment in accordance to Sikh Gurmat i.e., the principles and rules laid down by the Ten Gurus and Sri Guru Granth Sahib (the Holy Scriptures).
2. Celebration of Sikhism and Sikh Beliefs: to hold key events to highlight events on the Sikh calendar.
3. Focus on education: ensure the charity delivers education on both religious ideology and Punjabi language and providing opportunities for the distribution of non-faith information and education.
4. Community Focus and Public Benefit: focus on the community integration and diversity.
5. Improve the Khalsa Jatha facilities: increase the facilities and capacity of the Khalsa Jatha building.

A key measurement for the Management Committee as to their performance over the year is how closely we managed to deliver to our objectives and to the wishes of the Sangat (congregation).

Practice of Sikhism

The Gurdwara is open daily between 5.30 am to 9.00 pm. Daily morning and evening service are conducted inside the Gurdwara. Services and other practices according to the Sikh Rehit Maryada (Sikh Code of Conduct) are performed for weddings, birthdays, name-giving ceremonies, funerals or any other occasions according to the needs of worshippers throughout the year. Regular daily services/prayers are conducted at the following times:

6.00 am to 7.30 am (Nit-Nem)

6.00 pm to 7.30 pm. (Rehras, Evening rendering)

Guru-ka-Langar (free kitchen for all) was supported and kept running throughout the year as is required by Sikh code of conduct.

Celebration of Sikhism and Sikh Beliefs

The Khalsa Jatha celebrated all main events on the Sikh calendar. All the major Gurupurabs (special religious anniversaries) were celebrated these included:

(i) Avtaar Gurpurab Guru Gobind Singh Jee

(ii) Vaisakhi (Birthday of Khalsa)

(iii) Shaheedi Purab Guru Arjan Dev Jee

(iv) Diwali/Bandi Chhor Divas

(v) Avtaar Gurpurab Guru Nanak Dev Jee

(vi) Shaheedi Purab Guru Teg Bahadur Sahib Jee

(vii) Sahibzada Shaheedi Purab

(viii) Sangrand services were held at the start of each month

Focus on Education

The Khalsa Jatha holds Punjabi classes in the premises every Sunday. An average of 50 students attend and we have 6 teaching staff. Every teacher commands sufficient Punjabi language skills to be able to teach children up to GCSE level standard.

In addition to Punjabi language teaching, the Khalsa Jatha provides educational and learning classes for:

a. Kirtan classes, classical Sikh hymns recitals

b. Tabla and Harmonium classes, learning to play the Indian drums and harmonium

Coach trips are organised to various places for the benefit of those who wish to pay for visits to religious events and cultural activities.

Community Focus and Public Benefit

A variety of actions have been taken to promote community diversity, integration for the greater public benefit. These include: Increasing the knowledge of Sikhism and the functioning of the Gurdwara to the wider community through presentations and walkthroughs for local students. We have hosted Primary, Secondary Schools and Universities from across Europe, where students and teachers spend between one and half to two hours inside the Gurdwara. They are shown all the facilities provided to the Sangat and are made aware of all the practices and traditional routine of prayers in the Gurdwara. They are taken around the building, and shown the Langar Hall, where all the worshippers prepare and eat food together. The children show great interest in the Sikh way of worship and ask many questions to satisfy their curiosity. Refreshments are also provided to these visitors. Plans are being made to extend the Langar Hall and also to commemorate the history of Princess Sofia Duleep Singh with a Statue.

Conclusions By Trustees

We remain indebted to all those who continue to perform selfless service in the name of the Almighty. Our Ardas remains for their blessings.

We have audited the financial statements of **The Central Gurdwara (British Isles) London Khalsa Jatha** for the year ended 31 December 2022 comprise the Income and Expenditure Account, Balance Sheet and the related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out there in.


INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Statements of Recommended Practice on Accounting by Charities using the following accounting policies:

DEPRECIATION

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, net of anticipated disposal proceeds, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Fixtures and Fittings - 25 % Per annum reducing balance
Equipments-25% Per annum reducing balance

In accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (Effective January 2015), no depreciation is provided on the freehold property.

However, this policy is contrary to the UK Generally Accepted Accounting Principal (as amended) which specially requires that Tangible Assets should be depreciated.

The reason for this departure is that the useful economic life is infinite and together with maintenance and repairs, the residual value of the asset, at the end of its economic useful life to the entity, will be significantly greater than its carrying amount. On these grounds the depreciation charge and related accumulated depreciation balance are not material.

CASH FLOW STATEMENT

The Committee has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No. 1 from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small.

INCOME

The income shown in the Statement of Financial Activities represents grants, donations, and subscriptions received during the financial year.

VALUE ADDED TAX

VAT is not recoverable by the Gurdwara, and as such is included in the relevant costs.
