5. **Structure, Governance and Management.** RNRS Governing Document is its **Constitution** adopted on 10 April 1975.

6. **Objectives.** RNRS Objectives as per its Constitution are.

a. To Conserve and Protect for the benefit of the Public the Environment as a whole and its Animal and Plant Life and in particular to Conserve, Protect and Maintain Rowhill Copse in association with Rushmoor Borough Council.

b. To establish a Nature Area and a Centre to house Natural History specimens and to organise or conduct lectures with a view to advancing the education of the public (Including Pupils of Schools) in Natural History.

7. **Purposes.** The purposes of RNRS are to maintain Rowhill Nature Reserve, a 55-acre woodland owned by Rushmoor Borough Council. Rowhill Nature Reserve is unique as it straddles two Counties (Hampshire and Surrey) and two Local Authorities (Rushmoor Borough Council - Hampshire and Waverley Borough Council - Surrey). Rowhill Nature Reserve is also the source of the River Blackwater, which forms the County and Local Authority boundaries as it flows through the Reserve on its 23-mile journey to Swallowfield, near Reading. Fundraising and Woodland Management is undertaken by volunteers.

RNRS also promotes the education of the local community in Natural History by maintaining a Field Centre, owned by Rushmoor Borough Council. The Field Centre houses natural history items and a standalone computer, with over 4,000 archived documents relating to Rowhill Nature Reserve, available for the public to view on Sunday afternoons. Guest speakers are occasionally invited in to give talks on Natural History subjects. We also engage with local Schools to promote Rowhill Nature Reserve and educate in nature.

8. **Main Activities.** The Main Activities (fundraising) undertaken by RNRS to further its charitable purposes for the public benefit are detailed below.

a. **Field Centre opening.** The Field Centre is open on Sundays between 2 - 4.30pm (Summer time) and 2 - 4pm (Winter time) and manned by volunteers. Light refreshments and small gifts are available to purchase. Cream Tea Sundays are run in the Field Centre on the first Sunday of each month. RNRS also run a 'Cuppa Club' on the third Monday of each month for anyone to drop in and have a cuppa, cake and a chat.

b. **Field Centre Hire.** The Field Centre is available to hire via a Booking Form. Other Societies and a Local Scout Group hire the Field Centre on a regular basis.

c. **Major Fund-Raising Activities.** Throughout the year, RNRS holds the following activities, generating greater fund raising.

- Easter Egg Hunt.
- Plant Sale.
- Fungus Foray.
- Christmas Fayre and Starlight Walk.

d. **Membership.** RNRS has a healthy membership. Members pay an annual fee, which aligns with our Financial Year. Some members are generous, by adding a donation to their annual fee, which is accounted for as such.

9. **Achievements.** A summary of this is outlined in Para 9a-k below.

a. **Income.** RNRS income was £27,054.

b. **Field Centre Heating.** Thanks to Roy de la Haye and David Norris who have taken a far more proactive approach to the management of the Field Centre facilities, we have now managed to make the existing heating system far more effective, to the point where we think we can manage for the foreseeable future with the heating system we already have we have.

c. **Water flows.** All credit must go to Roy's Renegades for their sterling work in bringing back to life the area around what was Andrew's Pond. The pond had dried up partly due to streams becoming silted up, and Roy's group has now demolished the old concrete weir, changing that into a 1-metre-high waterfall, and significantly improved the water flows to create an area which we could use as a reflection zone.

d. **Members talks / presentations.** We've made a beginning on restarting the Members talks / presentations on the third Thursday of each month. So far, we've had Friends of Fleet Pond and Friends of Farnham Park give interesting and information presentations. We plan to continue to put effort behind finding other speakers who can add to our understanding of environmental and ecological issues both locally and more generally. As ever any suggestions from members on potential speakers or topics would be very much appreciated.

e. **Archiving of historic material.** Thanks to Andy Hawkins and to Jackie de la Haye, we have now completed the first stage of our archiving project. This grew from simply moving earlier records of minutes etc to a digital format, to a far more comprehensive archiving of what turned out to be a huge trove of historical material giving some rich insights into the development of Rowhill Copse over the past 150 years or so. The material is now available on a stand-alone computer in the Field Centre office, and members and other interested parties are welcome to book time on the system to explore a fascinating insight into the rich past of this important part of our local history and traditions.

f. **Field Centre lighting.** We now have much improved lighting in the main hall of the Field Centre. This makes the whole place look far brighter and is of course to the latest environmental standards. Once again, all credit must go to Roy de la Haye and David Norris for organising the lighting upgrade.

g. **Hall flooring revarnishing.** The Field Centre Hall has been stripped and revarnished in recent months. Again, this all makes the hall look more attractive and we hope will attract future hirers of the facility.

h. **Tech and Marketing.**

- Found that charities can use Canva Pro for free - so now have more resources available for the quick production of posters, FB headers for events, and Instagram posts.
- Working closer with the HiJackers (Fundraising Group) to promote events and new initiatives (e.g. Cuppa Club, Travelling Twiggies). Check out our new Travelling Twiggie FB Group:

- Society now has a new printer and A3 laminator which means we are now able to print A3 posters.
- Fostering a good working relationship with BVCP rangers regarding the promotion of 3rd Sunday volunteering. Raf (BVCP ranger) often passes photos back from volunteering sessions to be used for FB posts.
- Been updating the website to improve Search Engine Optimisation (SEO). Most of the "heavy lifting" has been done as our website homepage is very much improved. Through this Amanda (copywriter by trade) and Frances have been

improving their Wordpress skills and gradually bringing Rowhill higher up on Internet searches.

- Gradually replacing images used on the website with our own. Including fully searchable descriptions to help with SEO.
- Been publishing regular monthly events to both FB and the website i.e. cream teas, 3rd sunday volunteering, Cuppa club.
- Developed house branding style for the posters/wesbsite etc. using only the colours from our new kingfisher logo and a house writing style. It was felt that though modern, the logo was not close enough to actual kingfisher colours.

i. **Education.**

- We welcome Chris Kennedy who has joined the committee and will be preparing an education pack and working on liaising with local schools to explain the advantages of using our Reserve to enhance the educational opportunities our Reserve has to offer.
- Alderwood, a local Secondary school used the Reserve in the summer with 18 pupils and support staff. Unfortunately they did not book their visit with us. William Cobbett sent three classes on the same day in late spring to study rivers. Although they booked and requested a guide they gave very short notice. Three classes in one day is exhausting but I feel also a very diluted experience as it becomes a quick walk with very little 'hands on' learning. Glad to report that this year they are coming on three separate days and have had a pre-visit to organize what we are covering.
- We have had several wreath making sessions, one last year and one this year for Easter and two last Christmas. This appears to be a popular event and the upside is the social interaction people have had. Jackie has worked out how to make the wreath base from willow whips which makes this sustainable using our own woodlands to provide the willow. In future we will ask for payment to be made in advance as on one of the Christmas sessions three people were unable to attend with only one person letting me know in advance. This meant a significant reduction in the amount raised but also we had a waiting list of people who would have liked to attend but were denied the opportunity.
- The local scout groups have started to book visits to support their badge work and these children have been enthusiastic and eager to complete their tasks. The 8th Aldershot Beaver, Cub, and Scout group continue to hire the Field Centre for their meetings but more importantly frequently help us at events as well. One of the older youths is working towards their King's award and was an enormous help with the Christmas Starlight walk.
- Two girls have completed their bronze Duke of Edinburgh award and proved to be invaluable helping in the kitchen when serving the cream teas. There has also been support by Raf from Blackwater Valley for youngsters working on these awards as well in the conservation sessions. He has overseen these teenagers alongside their parents.
- Farnham Council organized two walks through the Reserve as part of the walking Festival and our members were also informed and cordially invited to take part. The first walk saw no participants and the second one saw six of which we had one member attending.
- Early last Spring a student from Farnham Creative Art's College requested permission to use the Reserve for filming to support their university course. We were thanked and understand the film was a success. In March 2025 a group from Farnborough Tech also did a filming session.

- Escape to the Country series 25 episode 36 also saw some filming near Stickleback Pond.
- At the beginning of 2025 we received a phone call that at first thought was some sort of hoax or scam call because the caller said she needed to train some people to do fly testing. As the conversation developed it turned out a local group concerned about water quality throughout the River Blackwater wished to train up a group of volunteers to look for evidence of the quality of the water in streams and one of the markers was evidence of life in the streams. They came early one Sunday morning and worked near the bog area. They were very pleased to report back that they found plenty of evidence of life in the part of the stream they tested. A week later they had a meeting at the Field Centre to find out about the work that Josh Bowe does for South East Rivers and some of our Thursday and Monday volunteers attended. We look forward to hearing from them in the near future.

j. **Fundraising.** In terms of fundraising, we have regular Cream teas at very reasonable rates but attendance is up and down dependent upon weather and sporting fixtures we think. One of the most successful ways of getting the public across the threshold is to have someone in the car park telling people we are open and what we are doing. Francis Osang does a sterling job of keeping people informed on facebook, Anne Stewardson informs people on next door neighbour and Roy De La Haye sends regular emails to members. The area that needs to be covered is instagram. so if there is anyone out there that feels they could fill this slot we would welcome you with open arms. The last few years have seen walking groups ending their walk with soup and cake at lunchtime in the Field Centre. This has been not only enjoyable meeting people but the Hijackers have been able to make it a profitable venture too! A local caravan club have hired the hall and held their AGM for many years and they too are ending their session with afternoon tea! The event that sees most footfall tends to be the Plant Sale held in May. So much work goes into this event in terms of organization and growing! Thank you to all the growers and people who support this event.

k. **Conservation and Woodland Management.**

- **2 task groups.** Another busy year for the Conservation Volunteers. Seasonal work is the basis of our Sunday tasks. Having the leadership of Raf Wane from BVCP on the third Sunday of the month, has allowed us to use a core of experienced Volunteers to make progress in coppice cant 6. Raf can devote his time to the D of E students and new Volunteers with more craft and maintenance-based work. We are near to completion on the wood store project. In the summer we done a temporary fix on the store. This springtime has seen us create a permanent structure fit to house our seasoned wood. Raf's ambition to have a charcoal burn is coming into focus. The burn area has been cleared of vegetation and sand collected for reuse. The kiln itself has been cleaned and inspected for all it's component parts. He plans to get somebody in for advice on running the first burn.
- **Electric Chainsaws.** This coppice season has given us the opportunity to use electric chainsaws for the first time, courtesy of BVCP. Our operators felt that it wasn't an outright replacement for fuel saws but would complement working on the majority of trees we cut. They are a quieter alternative. Bearing in mind the coppicing season in woodland management will generate an amount of noise

but this isn't sustained throughout the year. Thanks go to Oli Mousley for a great job in leading the core group of Conservation Volunteers. Oli is the definition of multi-tasking. He organises the task, the equipment, the tool maintenance, liaises with BVCP and tops up the biscuit tin!

- **Invasive Non-Native Species (INNS) Week and Midland Hawthorn.** We are grateful to Raf and BVCP for running mid-week Conservation tasks at Rowhill. In May the national Invasive Non-Native Species week highlighted the need to remove non-natives of flora and fauna as well as animal species from the wrong environments. Blackwater Valley Volunteers tackled invasive garden species such as variegated yellow archangel and montbretia. Their session helped to protect the Reserve's ancient woodland indicators. Visitors to Rowhill couldn't fail to notice that contractors have been dealing with our biggest invasive culprit – Rhododendron. After delays due to poor weather, the clearance finally got underway. A species that we are actively protecting is the Midland Hawthorn we have growing in cant 6. Steve Bailey (BVCP) was the first to identify this species for us. It is rarer than (surprise, surprise!) Common Hawthorn. Midland has softer, rounder edges than the deeper cut leaves of the Common variety. It is growing along the boardwalk side of cant 6, near the Luke road entrance. You should be able to see it as it establishes itself.
- **Heathland and Bat Walk.** Summertime meant working up on the heath clearing bracken, gorse and saplings to encourage the heather. We pulled the bracken, aiming to get as much root out as possible as you would with weeding at home. This task was a low point in Volunteer numbers; only two Volunteers and the Ranger! (It was a scorching hot day during the summer holidays). There was a guided bat walk in August organised by BVCP that sold out quickly. Visitors had success using the bat detectors supplied.
- **Fungus Foray.** The popular annual Fungus Foray on Sunday 27 October was attended by the President of RNRS, Dr Brian Spooner. The route chosen was up from the back of the Field Centre, down to the Spine Path to follow a circular route past Stickleback Pond and return to the Field Centre. A list of 30 species was recorded. Three new additions were noted. The two listed above (*Chromelosporium terrestre* and *Fuscolachnum misellum*) and plus one with the user-friendly name of Upright Coral! (*Ramaria stricta*) Thanks to Dr Spooner's continuing support and his sharp eyes for discovering more Rowhill gems.
- **The Tornado and Storm Research Organisation (TORRO).** The Reserve experienced high winds in October. As a result, an oak fell across the path near to the Luke Road entrance. A routine job for Emma and Declan to clear it during the morning session. During lunchtime a woman from TORRO appeared and asked us about the recent Aldershot tornado. She was tracking the route of the tornado – it was a weak one – and had a map of the assessed damage. She said it glanced off the Reserve and thinks the oak limb on the path that morning was likely damaged by the tornado.
- **Final thanks.** That gives an idea of what's been happening over the past year. The best way to enjoy Rowhill is to visit during every season. Thank you to the Society Members and Committee Members who support us in promoting Conservation, with path and building maintenance, along with enthusiasm and

encouragement. Staff at Rushmoor Borough Council and numerous individuals who recognise Rowhill's beauty and value.

10. **Financial Review.** RNRS Reserve Policy is set to £10K maximum. This has been set in place for the following reasons.

- The risk of an unforeseen emergency or other unexpected need for funds, eg an unexpected large bill or finding 'seed-funding' for an urgent project
- Rushmoor Borough Council (RBC) not reimbursing RNRS the following on an annual basis,
 - The Suitable Alternative Natural Greenspace (SANG) fund
 - Insurance Fees
- RBC not waiving Council Tax Payments for the Field Centre.



Retiring Chairman report

Due to the pandemic the activities of the society have been significantly reduced this year. The objectives of the Society remain as stated within the constitution dated April 2009.

The constitution requires the Society to:

1. Conserve and protect for the benefit of the public the environment as a whole and its animal and plant life and in particular to conserve, protect and maintain Rowhill Copse.
2. Maintain the Rowhill Nature Reserve and Field Centre so as to promote to children (including pupils of schools) and the public the understanding and importance of Nature Conservation.

Policies and procedures

The committee ensures compliance with legislation and the requirements of our insurers and the landlord of our buildings and owner of the site, Rushmoor Borough Council. We liaise regularly with the Blackwater Valley Countryside Partnership, the appointed agents of Rushmoor. We liaise regularly with Debbie Salmon Ecology Officer for Rushmoor in implementing the Management Plan and contributing to the financial rules and requirements of Rowhill Nature Reserve as a SANG (Suitable Alternative Natural Greenspace).

In order to satisfy our obligations this year:

3. **Covid.** In respect of the Covid pandemic we have carefully followed the government guidance and liaised with Rushmoor the landowner to comply with all requirements of both bodies when determining what activities can proceed.
4. **Training.** Volunteers have been trained in chain saw operation and first aid.
5. **DBS.** Volunteers have undergone DBS checks.
6. **Equipment and tools.** New equipment has been purchased and new storage space initiated. This will be referenced in later reports.
7. **Events.** Although reduced in scope there has been some events this year including the Fungus Foray again led by our President Dr Brian Spooner. Other events have taken place and this will be referenced in later reports.
8. **Charity commission.** The committee has completed the annual return to the charity commission
9. **Fire Safety.** Compliance with fire safety legislation. This year we updated our fire risk assessments and procured electrical works to provide a safety certificate of the entire installation in the Field Centre and renew emergency lighting. Continuation of the contract with Chubb in relation to the fire extinguishers which are inspected annually.

10. **Security.** We hold a contract with KBO to service the alarms to the Field Centre and the volunteer hut. We hold a contract to service the shutters in the Field Centre.
11. **Food preparation.** We ensure that cleaning and hygiene standards are maintained in the kitchen area. We have been awarded a 5 star hygiene rating by Rushmoor and we maintain the standards required for this.
12. **Utilities.** We manage the utilities – gas and electric to both buildings
13. **Insurance.** We maintain an insurance policy covering the volunteers and third parties. We cover content and Rushmoor cover the buildings. Rushmoor generously reimburse us our insurance costs.
14. **Building maintenance.** The society cleans maintains and cares for the various buildings utilised by the Society.

With thanks to all. Many people contribute to the success of the society. I don't want to name too many individuals but broadly to thank you the members, the committee retiring and continuing, co-opted members during the year, Rushmoor, Black Water Valley Partnership, Dr Spooner, Volunteers in the Field Centre and volunteers in the Reserve.

Treasurer's report

Due to the size of our turnover the charity commission does not require us to submit accounts or to appoint an independent examiner of the accounts. The HMRC do not require a tax return. We have confirmed that the receipt of the SANG money does not affect our position with the HMRC.

Our constitution does require an independent examiner. In order to economise on fees in this respect we have examined the government guidance on the definition of an independent adviser and consequently this year our independent examiner has been Stephen Drinkwater. Steve is a qualified accountant as well as one of our volunteers.

The accounts this year

A difficult year with our fund raising activities curtailed by the Covid pandemic. Some fund raising has continued predominantly due to the efforts of Jackie De La Haye.

We benefited from the government grant of £10,000 as we are classified as a Leisure business.

Our major expenditure this year was the purchase of a tracked barrow for the moving of brash around the copse to increase productivity during coppicing.

All in all we have broadly broken even this year.

The accounts will be placed in the Field Centre. If you would like to inspect them you are welcome to do so. If you would like to meet me to view the accounts I am happy to do so. If you would like more detail or have any specific questions please let me know.

Attached are the Society's Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account.

Membership - Ray Rasmussen

We have had a total of 135 households as members (this includes 23 Volunteers who are not required to pay a membership fee in lieu of labour) during the Membership Year 2020-2021. This equates to 211 individuals. Just over half of them reside within the Rushmoor Borough Council area.

The 135 households include 25 new households, but the same number of households have not renewed either by indicating they will not renew or will be deleted as members for not replying to multiple reminder requests.

We also have 5 life memberships.

Sadly we have been told of the demise of a few of our members and we sincerely express our condolences to those families concerned.

The new membership form includes a request for volunteers, asks for donations, asks if possible to pay by Bank Transfer or set up an annual Standing Order and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) notice and also asks how we may contact you.

We, as an organization, do not 'process' any of your information other than some very simple statistics for our own use, which do not reference any individual and no personal information is passed to any outside organization, this may change if we go down the road of Membership renewal via our website. Your contact details are held on a card file system and for ease of access, on an external hard drive attached to my computer (as well as two memory sticks as backups). None of these electronic devices is connected to the Internet while I access or update them.

I am stepping down from the Committee but hope to carry on as a Conservation Volunteer. I will continue dealing with Membership renewal and the Rowhill Newsletter while we are still in lockdown and then pass these duties on to interested parties once we can meet and work together.

Rowhill Nature Reserve Society – Reserve Manager’s Report for AGM April 2021

Introduction

The past year has undoubtedly been one of the most challenging in the Society’s history. We have dealt with the presence of Covid19 throughout not just our personal lives but also its influence on conservation activities throughout Rowhill. Conservation volunteer activities were suspended at the start of the first lockdown period, not restarting until the “Rule of 6 appeared”. This not only limited the ability of the volunteers to carry out essential maintenance work on paths but also prevented the processing of firewood, which is sold to generate an income for the Society and to benefit the reserve in general. All in all a very testing time.

However, despite the difficult circumstances faced under Covid19 restrictions there has been a tremendous energy, fantastic success and consistent diligence in managing the reserve. A great deal has been achieved, even with the additional pressure the reserve has been placed under with additional footfall rising from the lockdown. Additional footfall, although making the paths muddier and the reserve busier than “usual”, has further demonstrated our usefulness as both a Suitable Alternative Natural Green Space (SANG) and greatly increasing our presence as a Local Nature Reserve. This has all contributed towards our ever increasing standing as a flagship conservation group within RBC and helps make Rowhill the unique place that it is.

What’s been going on this year?

We’ve had a number of achievements this year, carried on with essential maintenance, the odd setback that we’ve worked hard to overcome and all whilst juggling Covid19 restrictions. Really a testament to the Conservation Volunteers, landowners Rushmoor Borough Council and our hardworking opposite numbers Blackwater Valley Countryside Partnership. Below is a brief overview of what we’ve accomplished in the past year:

- Began eradication of invasive non-native yellow archangel in various spots in the reserve (our first conservation session back post lockdown).
- Installed a brand new recycled plastic boardwalk to replace the previous rather tired original with grateful help from Stu B of BVCP.
- Re-surfaced and re-established a number of wet and muddy spots along the paths throughout the reserve (yes there are still more muddy patches to combat but we have had a lot of increased footfall, it’s been very wet and the site is just natural very damp!)
- Installed a new footbridge crossing the stream that leads down from Stickleback Pond.
- Had a White Egret hanging around the reserve for a number of weeks.
- Purchased a new Tracked Dumper creating a fleet of vehicle to help us in our efforts around the reserve.
- Installed a purpose made woodworking area, allowing us to process firewood safely away from the public.

- Had a number of volunteers attend training courses, including Chainsaw operation/Tree felling and First Aid courses.
- Planted a number of wildflowers in our meadow area with help from Steve B from BVCP.
- Dealt with numerous fallen, windblown and dangerous trees with help from Jenny, Bobbi, Matt and Stu from BVCP
- Kept an eye on our collection of Roe deer who live in the reserve (thought to number 3 or so at the moment)
- Continuing to keep the badger sets on the reserve protected with plans to implement further protection.
- Established a 10 year management plan for the reserve including updated signage, removal of invasive non-natives and works for increased biodiversity directed by the ever hard working Debbie S at RBC.
- Had further dangerous tree or safety related issues rectified by Andy F from RBC.
- Bought a new grab attachment for the Tractor enabling quick and easy moving of piles of brash.
- Granted planning permission to erect a new shed for our log sales.
- Began coppicing a sizeable area with plenty of scope to be a flagship area (currently on hold due to lockdown).
- Encouraged a wealth of new conservation volunteers to join the group, including D of E volunteers, training them on tools, vehicles and developing their conservation skills.

All in all a very successful year all things considered. Challenges overcome and new ventures started with help from the conservation volunteers, BVCP and RBC.

Looking to the future

There's a lot going on behind the scenes at Rowhill, not just the conservation volunteers planning their years tasks but also the ongoing steps in the 10 year Rowhill Nature Reserve management plan. This plan is in conjunction with land owners RBC, BVCP and contractors. Summarised briefly below is some point that are likely to occur in the next year.

- RNRS volunteers completion of coppicing area to provide a different habitat, greater biodiversity and generating timber for the society's aims to recoup funds through log sales.
- RNRS volunteers upgrading a number of paths that have become heavily waterlogged over the winter.
- Consultation plans at Rowhill Steering group meeting for removal of invasive Rhododendron Poncetium undertaken by contractors.
- RNRS volunteers processing construction of a base and installing of a shed for Rowhill logs to be sold from securely.
- RNRS volunteers processing firewood for log sale production.
- The RNRS summer fete!
- RNRS volunteers ongoing tackling of invasive species throughout the reserve.
- Steering Group plans to install improved signage throughout the reserve.
- RNRS volunteers charcoal burns to produce locally sourced, sustainable and chemical free charcoal.

- RNRS volunteers Coppicing our next area in rotation in the autumn/winter.
- RNRS volunteers ongoing training and skill development for volunteers.

The future is bright for Rowhill with lots of plans to increase both biodiversity, improve access and develop the reserve as both a Local Nature Reserve, SANG and welcoming place for all who visit.

Just on a small note to end I will be stepping down as the Volunteer Reserve Manager from October 2021. I'm looking to recruit a team who can divide some of the responsibilities of Reserve Manager throughout the conservation volunteers. If anyone thinks they'd like to be a part of this please let me know.

Conservation Report - Carol Roberts

It has certainly been a year of contrasts. Looking back, we were disappointed not to be taking part in the Family Summer Event and the Christmas Walk in the Dark. However, there have been more positives than negatives to focus on. In between COVID-19 restrictions being lifted, the Conservation Volunteers have made valuable biodiversity contributions towards the Rowhill Management Plan. The boardwalk was finally installed in Summer 2020. The project saw us working collaboratively with the Rangers from BVCP to lay boards made out of recycled plastic. It has proved to be a valuable asset for visitors accessing the Reserve for their daily exercise.

The Volunteers have worked on a number of projects to aid safety and maintenance. A new gate marks our woodworking area and we addressed the mending of the bridge below bog. Periodically we have resurfaced paths and dealt with many windblown, dangerous trees. Summer 2020 saw the long awaited bin store installed outside the Field Centre. The split hazel woven panels demonstrate the use and skill of traditional woodland crafts. We remain vigilant to curb any invasive species such as variegated yellow archangel and direct our efforts towards keeping vigorous rhododendron growth in check.

The ten year Management Plan has influenced new working processes for coppiced areas. Brash material is now burnt instead of made into a dead hedge. The Society has invested in equipment, a tracked dumper and a log grab attachment. These machines speed up the clearance in coppiced areas but also prove their worth dealing with other site tasks. We are preparing to improve wood sales next year by installing a storage shed for logs and wood now that planning permission has been granted. We have purchased some excellent two-way walkie-talkies that can be relied upon rather than patchy mobile phone signals.

The Society recognises the importance of retaining and encouraging the personal development of Conservation Volunteers. This year has seen us gain two new qualified chainsaw operators and increase our number of First Aiders. These are vital roles for future-proofing the Conservation team. The role of our Team Leaders will be essential in the coming months as we transition into a period potentially without a Volunteer Conservation Leader/Reserve Manager.

Despite the continuity of our Sunday tasks being disrupted, we have seen steady interest from new Conservation Volunteers. Many Duke of Edinburgh students choose Rowhill for their award. A second year illustration student at UCA Farnham was inspired to use Reserve as basis for her project researching wildlife protection and conservation in the UK. Our Marketing and Technology Team are doing a great job of reaching a wider and younger audience by developing a fresh, relevant website and giving us a presence on social media.

The Fungus Foray went ahead in a reduced capacity. We are grateful for Dr Brian Spooner's continued support of the Society. Overall there was a low count on the day but three new species were recorded for the Reserve. Our ponds have been attracting a Little White Egret and the Tawny Owl has been using the nesting box in Chestnut Glade. We will monitor the progress of the Bird's Foot Trefoil and the Knapweed seedlings planted in the Field. We will also evaluate the introduction of 54 slow worms.

On behalf of the Conservation Volunteers I would like to pay thanks to Christian Goacher for his guidance and knowledge, to Rowhill Nature Reserve Society Committee Members,

Debbie Salmon, Rushmoor Borough Council and Blackwater Valley Countryside Partnership for their help and experience. I would like to thank everyone that has ever attended a Sunday Conservation Task, you're the foundations of Rowhill's future.

Jackie De Lay Haye – Events/Fundraising/Hall

As our members can imagine we have not been able to host school educational visits. However, between lockdowns Wellington School were able to fit in one Visit of two classes looking at rivers and interesting features of the Reserve' It was a Shame that it was such a wet day, however the children were amazing and not one child complained about getting wet. 61 children 6 adults and two Volunteers leading the groups are to be commended, Several teenagers have volunteered to do conservation work with the Conservation Volunteers. Moves are afoot post pandemic for 8th. Aldershot Scout group to hold their meeting in the Field Centre and take advantage of access to the outside more easily.

Fund Raising/Hall

Jackie and Roy De La Haye have managed to have two car boot sales at Mytchet and open the Field Centre twice displaying 'treasures' for sale. Once restrictions are lifted we intend to continue with these events

The Tinnitus Group, 8th. Aldershot Scout Group, a yoga teacher and music quartet have shown interest in ha= hire post pandemic. Rushmoor Borough Council hired the hall for the local elections.

The fund raising events that were planned hopefully will eventually take place but a few months later than advertised.
