Investment and Other Powers

The investment powers of the fund are those laid down in the Trustee Act 2000. The investment objectives are to achieve a realistic income target, and thereafter to maximise total return.

Trustees' Report

The Trustees are pleased to present their report for the year ended 30 June 2025.

Objectives and Policies

The objective of the fund is to provide grants, lectureship and prizes to Fellows of the Royal College of Surgeons of England who have graduated in medicine in the UK to study head and neck surgery and laryngology. Applications are invited via College publications and its website, and a committee reviews these and determines the best candidates to be awarded grants. The trustees have decided that the fund should aim to achieve excellence by attracting applications from high calibre ENT (Ears, Nose, & Throat) surgeons wishing to improve their knowledge or skills.

Public Benefit

The trustees confirm that they have had due regard to the guidance on public benefit issued by the Charity Commission. The activities of the charity are carried out for public benefit as the grants awarded support surgeons in the study of specialisms which promote better practice in patient care in these areas.

Review of Activities

During the year, grants totalling £120,000 were awarded to 5 individuals (detailed below):

- Deepak Chandrasekharan: £30,000 to undertake a Paediatric Otology Clinical Research Fellowship at The Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto
- Manish George: £30,000 to undertake a fellowship in Advanced Head & Neck Surgical Oncology at The Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre, Melbourne
- Shivun Khosla: £20,000 to undertake a fellowship in Otolaryngology, Head and Neck Surgery at Princess Alexandra Hospital, Brisbane, Australia
- Maia Walsh: £20,000 to undertake a Paediatric ENT Fellowship at The Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto
- John Rocke: £20,000 to undertake an ENT Rhinology Fellowship at Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital

Financial Review

The trust has reported an overall surplus for the year of £241k (2024: £200k). This is due primarily to the gain recorded on investments of £264k (2024: £221k).

Investment income decreased slightly to £129k (2024: £144k), and remains well above the income target of £77k. This year the trust awarded 5 grants totalling £120k. This compares to 8 grants totalling £130k in 2023-24. Net unrestricted expenditure for the year was £5k after accounting for administration fees and expenses, compared to net unrestricted expenditure in 2023-24 of 4k. Unrestricted funds now stand at £63k (2024: £68k) and endowed funds, after accounting for investment management fees, have increased by £246k to £3.1m.

Financial Outlook

The investment portfolio has continued to generate income well above the target level of £77k over several years and has allowed the number and value of grants awarded to increase over time. The trustees note the increase in value of the investment portfolio during 2024-25. The trustees will closely monitor the performance of the investment portfolio and consider whether the investment strategy remains appropriate in order to protect the value of the portfolio over the longer term as well as ensure that income remains sufficient to support the promotion of research in head and neck surgery and laryngology through its award of annual grants.

Reserves Policy

The policy is to maintain the unrestricted free reserves at no higher than £50k. These reserves currently stand at £63k (2024: £68k). The trustees will review the amount of grants awarded, subject to suitable applications being received, in order to maintain the level of unrestricted funds held. The trustees have reviewed the reserves of the charity and consider that the current level of reserves is sufficient to enable them to fund grants, investment management fees and support costs without eroding the longer term real value of the charity's investment capital.

The trustees also monitor liquidity to ensure this is sufficient to cover ongoing expenditure. The trustees have reviewed the financial position and future obligations of the charity and have concluded that it is reasonable to expect The Colledge Family Memorial Fellowship Trust to have adequate resources to continue in operation for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, the going concern basis of accounting continues to be adopted in preparing the financial statements.

Risk Management

The trustees annually review the risks the trust faces. To date these have mainly related to the appropriateness of grant requests, and investment management, which has been mitigated by a diversified portfolio.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards) and applicable law.

Under charity law the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its net incoming resources for that year. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue to operate.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent Auditor's Report to the Trustees of The Colledge Family Memorial Fellowship Trust

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Colledge Family Memorial Fellowship Trust ('the charity') for the year ended 30 June 2025 which comprise statement of financial activities, balance sheet, and notes to the financial statements, including significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charity's affairs as at 30 June 2025 and of income and expenditure, for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. We are independent of the charity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Conclusions relating to going concern

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the trustee's use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the charity's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from when the financial statements are authorised for issue.

Our responsibilities and the responsibilities of the trustees with respect to going concern are described in the relevant sections of this report.

Other information

The trustees are responsible for the other information contained within the annual report. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report, other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether this gives rise to a material misstatement in the financial statements themselves. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

Matters on which we are required to report by exception

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters in relation to which the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 requires us to report to you if, in our opinion:

- sufficient and proper accounting records have not been kept by the charity; or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns; or
- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit.

Responsibilities of trustees

As explained more fully in the trustees' responsibilities statement set out on page 4, the trustees are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the trustees determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are responsible for assessing the charity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the trustees either intend to liquidate the charity or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

We have been appointed as auditor under section 152 of the Charities Act 2011, and report in accordance with the Acts and relevant regulations made or having effect thereunder.

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Details of the extent to which the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud and non-compliance with laws and regulations are set out below.

Extent to which the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We identified and assessed the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements from irregularities, whether due to fraud or error, and discussed these between our audit team members. We then designed and performed audit procedures responsive to those risks, including obtaining audit evidence sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

We obtained an understanding of the legal and regulatory frameworks within which the charity operates, focusing on those laws and regulations that have a direct effect on the determination of material amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The laws and regulations we considered in this context were the Charities Act 2011, together with the Charities SORP (FRS 102). We assessed the required compliance with these laws and regulations as part of our audit procedures on the related financial statement items.

In addition, we considered provisions of other laws and regulations that do not have a direct effect on the financial statements but compliance with which might be fundamental to the charity's ability to operate or to avoid a material penalty. We also considered the opportunities and incentives that may exist within the charity for fraud. The laws and regulations we considered in this context for the UK operations was UK Tax legislation.

Auditing standards limit the required audit procedures to identify non-compliance with these laws and regulations to enquiry of the Trustees and other management and inspection of regulatory and legal correspondence, if any.

We identified the greatest risk of material impact on the financial statements from irregularities, including fraud, to be within override of controls by management. Our audit procedures to respond to these risks included enquiries of management and trustees about their own identification and assessment of the risks of irregularities, sample testing on the posting of journals, analytical review and detailed testing of investment income, vouching a sample of investment holdings at year end to third party data, reviewing accounting estimates for biases, reviewing regulatory correspondence with the Charity Commission, and reading minutes of meetings of those charged with governance.

Owing to the inherent limitations of an audit, there is an unavoidable risk that we may not have detected some material misstatements in the financial statements, even though we have properly planned and performed our audit in accordance with auditing standards. For example, the further removed non-compliance with laws and regulations (irregularities) is from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, the less likely the inherently limited procedures required by auditing standards would identify it. In addition, as with any audit, there remained a higher risk of non-detection of irregularities, as these may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal controls. We are not responsible for preventing non-compliance and cannot be expected to detect non-compliance with all laws and regulations.

Use of our report

This report is made solely to the charity's trustees, as a body, in accordance with Part 4 of the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charity's trustees those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charity and the charity's trustees as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2025

1. Accounting policies

- (a) The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland and the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102. Under the Small Charities exemption, a cash flow has not been disclosed.

- (b) The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees consider that the Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.
- (c) Investment income is included in the financial statements as it becomes receivable. Legacy income is recognised when the criteria of entitlement, measurement and probability are met.
- (d) Grants payable are charged to the financial statements in the year that they are awarded.
- (e) Financial assets including cash and debtors are measured at amortised cost.
- (f) Investments are included at market value. Gains or losses on investments, whether realised or not, are disclosed in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they arise.
- (g) Permanent endowed funds arise where the donor has specified that the capital of the gift cannot be expended and that only the income arising from the capital may be used for the named purpose. Unrestricted funds can be used for activities in support of the objects of the charity.
- (h) Support costs consist of administration, other costs in support of the charity's activities, audit fees and other costs of statutory compliance.
- (i) The Trust is a Registered Charity and as such is exempt from taxation on its income and gains to the extent that they are applied to its charitable purposes.

- Daniel Scholfield: £20,000 to undertake an Advanced Head and Neck Oncologic and Microvascular Reconstructive Surgery Clinical Fellowship at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York City, USA
- Elinor Warner: £20,000 to undertake an International fellowship in lateral skull base surgery, advanced otology and auditory implant surgery at Auckland City and Starship Children's Hospitals, Auckland, New Zealand.
- Anthony Bashyam: £15,000 to undertake a fellowship in Head and Neck Surgery at The Princess Alexandra Hospital, Brisbane, Australia.

Financial Review

The trust has reported an overall surplus for the year of £200k (2023: loss of £81k). This is due primarily to the gain recorded on investments of £221k compared to a loss of £102k in the previous year.

Investment income rose slightly to £144k (2023: £134k), and remains well above the income target of £77k. This year the trust awarded 8 grants totalling £130k. This compares to 9 grants totalling £112k in 2022-23. Net unrestricted expenditure for the year was £4k after accounting for administration fees and expenses, compared to net unrestricted income in 2022-23 of £38k. Unrestricted funds now stand at £68k (2023: £73k) and endowed funds, after accounting for investment management fees, have increased by £200k to £2.8m.

Financial Outlook

The investment portfolio has continued to generate income well above the target level of £77k over several years and has allowed the number and value of grants awarded to increase over time. The trustees note the increase in value of the investment portfolio during 2023-24. The trustees will closely monitor the performance of the investment portfolio and consider whether the investment strategy remains appropriate in order to protect the value of the portfolio over the longer term as well as ensure that income remains sufficient to support the promotion of research in head and neck surgery and laryngology through its award of annual grants.

Reserves Policy

The policy is to maintain the unrestricted free reserves at no higher than £50k. These reserves currently stand at £68k (2023: £73k). The trustees will review the amount of grants awarded, subject to suitable applications being received, in order to maintain the level of unrestricted funds held. The trustees have reviewed the reserves of the charity and consider that the current level of reserves is sufficient to enable them to fund grants, investment management fees and support costs without eroding the longer term real value of the charity's investment capital.

The trustees also monitor liquidity to ensure this is sufficient to cover ongoing expenditure. The trustees have reviewed the financial position and future obligations of the charity and have concluded that it is reasonable to expect The Colledge Family Memorial Fellowship Trust to have adequate resources to continue in operation for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, the going concern basis of accounting continues to be adopted in preparing the financial statements.

Risk Management

The trustees annually review the risks the trust faces. To date these have mainly related to the appropriateness of grant requests, and investment management, which has been mitigated by a diversified portfolio.

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Under charity law the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its net incoming resources for that year. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue to operate.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2023

1. Accounting policies

- (a) The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland and the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

Investment and Other Powers

The investment powers of the fund are those laid down in the Trustee Act 2000. The investment objectives are to achieve a realistic income target, and thereafter to maximise total return.

Trustees' Report

The Trustees are pleased to present their report for the year ended 30 June 2022.

Objectives and Policies

The objective of the fund is to provide grants, lectureship and prizes to Fellows of the Royal College of Surgeons of England who have graduated in medicine in the UK to study head and neck surgery and laryngology. Applications are invited via College publications and its website, and a committee reviews these and determines the best candidates to be awarded grants. The trustees have decided that the fund should aim to achieve excellence by attracting applications from high calibre ENT (Ears, Nose, & Throat) surgeons wishing to improve their knowledge or skills.

Public Benefit

The trustees confirm that they have had due regard to the guidance on public benefit issued by the Charity Commission. The activities of the charity are carried out for public benefit as the grants awarded support surgeons in the study of specialisms which promote better practice in patient care in these areas.

Review of Activities

During the year, grants totalling £100,000 were awarded to 7 individuals (detailed below):

- Mark Wilkie: £15,000 undertaking a fellowship in Advanced Head & Neck and Robotic Surgical Oncology at the department of Head & Neck Surgery, The Royal Adelaide Hospital, Adelaide, Australia.
- Jason Powell: £15,000 undertaking a clinical fellowship in Paediatric Otolaryngology at the University of British Columbia Children's Hospital, Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada.
- Arunjit Takhar: £10,000 undertaking a Robotic Head and Neck Surgery fellowship at The Royal Adelaide Hospital, Central Adelaide Local Health Network, Port Road, Adelaide, South Australia.
- Peter Kullar: £15,000 undertaking a fellowship in Neurotology and Skull Base Surgery at the Department of Otolaryngology - Head and Neck Surgery, Stanford University Medical School, California, USA.
- David Allin: £15,000 undertaking an Advanced Head and Neck Surgical Oncology fellowship at the Université de Montréal, Canada.
- Adal Mirza: £15,000 undertaking an Advanced Head and Neck Oncologic Surgery and Reconstruction fellowship at the University of Dalhousie, Halifax, Canada.
- Daniel Scholfield: £15,000 undertaking a fellowship in Molecular and Clinical Predictors of Well and Poorly Differentiated Thyroid Cancer at the Head and Neck Department, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York City, USA.

Financial Review

The trust has reported an overall surplus for the year of £63k (2021: 393k). This is due primarily to the gain recorded on investments of £73k compared to a gain of £451k in the previous year.

Investment income rose slightly to £114k (2021: £99k), and remains well above the income target of £77k. This year the trust awarded 7 grants totalling £100k. This compares to 9 grants totalling £132k in 2020-21. Net unrestricted income for the year was £6k after accounting for administration fees and expenses, compared to net unrestricted expenditure in 2021-22 of £42k. Unrestricted funds now stand at £34k (2021: £28k) and endowed funds, after accounting for investment management fees, have increased by £56k to £2.8m.

Financial Outlook

The investment portfolio has continued to generate income well above the target level of £77k over several years and has allowed the number and value of grants awarded to increase over time. The trustees note the increase in value of the investment portfolio during 2021-22. The trustees will closely monitor the performance of the investment portfolio and consider whether the investment strategy remains appropriate in order to protect the value of the portfolio over the longer term as well as ensure that income remains sufficient to support the promotion of research in head and neck surgery and laryngology through its award of annual grants.

Reserves Policy

The policy is to maintain the unrestricted free reserves at no higher than £50k. These reserves currently stand at £34k (2021: £28k). The trustees will review the amount of grants awarded, subject to suitable applications being received, in order to maintain the level of unrestricted funds held. The trustees have reviewed the reserves of the charity and consider that the current level of reserves is sufficient to enable them to fund grants, investment management fees and support costs without eroding the longer term real value of the charity's investment capital.

The trustees also monitor liquidity to ensure this is sufficient to cover ongoing expenditure. The trustees have reviewed the financial position and future obligations of the charity and have concluded that it is reasonable to expect The Colledge Family Memorial Fellowship Trust to have adequate resources to continue in operation for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, the going concern basis of accounting continues to be adopted in preparing the financial statements.

Risk Management

The trustees annually review the risks the trust faces. To date these have mainly related to the appropriateness of grant requests, and investment management, which has been mitigated by a diversified portfolio.

Financial Review

The trust has reported an overall surplus for the year of £393k (2020: deficit of £564k). This is due primarily to the gain recorded on investments of £451k in 2020-21 compared to a loss of £518k in the previous year. Investment performance in the previous year was impacted by turmoil throughout the year in UK stock markets as a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic.

In contrast, however, investment income fell slightly to £99k (2020: £126k), but remains well above the income target of £77k. This year the trust awarded 9 grants totalling £132k. This compares to 8 grants totalling £152k in 2019-20. Net unrestricted expenditure for the year was £42k after accounting for administration fees and expenses (2020: £31k). Unrestricted funds now stand at £28k (2020: £70k) and endowed funds, after accounting for investment management fees, have increased by £436k to £2.7m.

Financial Outlook

The investment portfolio has continued to generate income well above the target level of £77k over several years and has allowed the number and value of grants awarded to increase over time. The trustees note the increase in value of the investment portfolio during 2020-21 and that this has reflected a rebound following the political and economic uncertainties in the UK in the prior year. The trustees will closely monitor the performance of the investment portfolio and consider whether the investment strategy remains appropriate in order to protect the value of the portfolio over the longer term as well as ensure that income remains sufficient to support the promotion of research in head and neck surgery and laryngology through its award of annual grants.

Reserves Policy

The policy is to maintain the unrestricted free reserves at no higher than £50k. These reserves currently stand at £28k (2020: £70k). The trustees will review the amount of grants awarded, subject to suitable applications being received, in order to maintain the level of unrestricted funds held. The trustees have reviewed the reserves of the charity and consider that the current level of reserves is sufficient to enable them to fund grants, investment management fees and support costs without eroding the longer term real value of the charity's investment capital.

The trustees also monitor liquidity to ensure this is sufficient to cover ongoing expenditure. The trustees have reviewed the financial position and future obligations of the charity and have concluded that it is reasonable to expect The Colledge Family Memorial Fellowship Trust to have adequate resources to continue in operation for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, the going concern basis of accounting continues to be adopted in preparing the financial statements.

Risk Management

The trustees annually review the risks the trust faces. To date these have mainly related to the appropriateness of grant requests, and investment management, which has been mitigated by a diversified portfolio.

The laws and regulations we considered in this context for the UK operations were General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) and Tax legislation.

Auditing standards limit the required audit procedures to identify non-compliance with these laws and regulations to enquiry of the Trustees and other management and inspection of regulatory and legal correspondence, if any.

We identified the greatest risk of material impact on the financial statements from irregularities, including fraud, to be within the timing of recognition of investment income, valuation of investments and the override of controls by management. Our audit procedures to respond to these risks included enquiries of management and trustees about their own identification and assessment of the risks of irregularities, sample testing on the posting of journals, analytical review and detailed testing of investment income, vouching a sample of investment holdings at year end to third party data, reviewing accounting estimates for biases, reviewing regulatory correspondence with the Charity Commission, and reading minutes of meetings of those charged with governance.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

1. Accounting policies

- (a) The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland and the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102. Under the Small Charities exemption, a cash flow has not been disclosed.

- (b) The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees consider that the Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.
- (c) Investment income is included in the financial statements as it becomes receivable. Legacy income is recognised when the criteria of entitlement, measurement and probability are met.
- (d) Grants payable are charged to the financial statements in the year that they are awarded.
- (e) Financial assets including cash and debtors are measured at amortised cost.
- (f) Investments are included at market value. Gains or losses on investments, whether realised or not, are disclosed in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they arise.
- (g) Permanent endowed funds arise where the donor has specified that the capital of the gift cannot be expended and that only the income arising from the capital may be used for the named purpose. Unrestricted funds can be used for activities in support of the objects of the charity.
- (h) Support costs consist of administration, other costs in support of the charity's activities, audit fees and other costs of statutory compliance.
- (i) The Trust is a Registered Charity and as such is exempt from taxation on its income and gains to the extent that they are applied to its charitable purposes.
