The Intercessors for Britain Trust is constituted by Deed of Trust, dated 9th November 1984. Registered Charity Number 290664.

Structure, governance and management

The leadership of the Trust is undertaken by the Co-Directors, who are responsible for the day-to-day management of the Trust. They are assisted by a part-time Administrator. Operational policies, strategic direction and planning are determined by the Directors together with the Trustees. The Trustees met three times during the year.

Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Trust Deed.

Objectives and Activities

The aim of Intercessors for Britain (IFB) is the advancement of the Christian Faith through inspiring and informing prayer for the nation, and the church within it. This is achieved particularly through teaching and encouragement of intercession, the production and distribution of Christian literature and other instructional material. In so doing, the Trust seeks to be a moral voice to the church and the nation.

The principal activities are regular communication of issues for prayer via social media and email, the publication of the bi-monthly Prayer Bulletin, the organisation of Prayer and Bible Conferences for Bible teaching and corporate prayer, organisation of in-person prayer days and online prayer sessions, the production of Christian literature and the dissemination of resource material for prayer and intercession.

Membership of IFB is free and open to all Bible-believing Christians, who will commit to praying regularly for the United Kingdom. Through Bible teaching and instruction, encouragement and facilitation in intercession, it resources Christians regardless of church affiliation. All its online prayer meetings, YouTube videos and printed publications and any other Bible teaching materials are provided free of charge or at nominal cost. IFB is concerned for the highest wellbeing of our nation and its institutions. The Trustees are satisfied that, in the activities and achievements during the year, they have complied with their duty under section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 in regard to public benefit.

Achievements and Performance

During the year IFB has held two Prayer & Bible conferences, one over the New Year and one family-friendly conference in August. There were three Prayer & Bible days, including one in Northern Ireland, and ten online prayer days using Zoom. There has been a prayer training day at a church near Glasgow, and guest speaking engagements at two other places.

In addition to seeking to create new IFB prayer groups and bolstering existing ones, contacts have been developed with other like-minded Christian organisations, with a view to encouraging and strengthening prayer networks across the country.

The bi-monthly Prayer Bulletin for signed-up members continues to be a valued resource for intercession on behalf of the nation. In response to daily news reports of concern for Christian witness and testimony, IFB regularly posts comments on its Facebook page highlighting key issues for prayer. These posts are also disseminated in weekly emails for those who have requested them.

The Bible teaching provided for in-person and online meetings is recorded and published on IFB's YouTube channel. Prayer inspiration is regularly shared on Instagram.

An open letter to the church was written and published. This letter was also included in a four-page pullout for the Heart newspaper.

Thanks to the open letter to the church, newly released videos on YouTube and, we believe, an increasing consciousness of the need for prayer for our nation, there was an increase in 'postal' membership and a marked increase (21%) in 'email' membership. There was an initiative to try and augment the depth of engagement of the 'email' members.

Online engagement has continued to increase, with new followers on Facebook and a very substantial increase in viewers and subscribers to IFB's YouTube channel.

Future Plans

In the coming year, the monthly Zoom prayer meetings will be continued, hopefully including an element of live teaching about prayer. The pattern of Prayer & Bible conferences, including one family-friendly one will continue. There will be an appeal for sponsorship funds so as to make the conferences more accessible especially for young families. The aim is also to hold four Prayer & Bible days in different parts of the country.

Building on the popularity of the YouTube videos, further short videos will be produced, and work will go into writing fresh publications to meet perceived need.

Relationships with other like-minded organisations will continue to be developed with the aim of finding ways to work together for the strengthening of each other's work and witness.

In all this, we seek to pursue all that God is calling us to do.

Financial Review

The accounts for the year ending 30th September 2024 have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Articles of Association and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities – Statement of Recommended Practice, applicable to all charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards.

The Trust's bank account during the year was with Barclays Bank and savings accounts with Redwood Bank and Hampshire Trust Bank

This year, donation income excluding legacies increased by 2%, however unlike the three previous years there were no substantial gifts from wills. Thus, total non-conference income dropped by £24,473. Recovered Gift Aid of £2,500 for the year arrived too late for inclusion in the accounts. Non-conference spending increased by £13,324, largely because this was the first full year of employing our administrator. Other smaller increases resulted from new or increased activities.

Conference income increased by £1,539; but conference expenditure rose by £14,404 largely because one of the 2024/25 conference venues required a high pre-payment which fell within this year, and an unexpectedly high number of sponsored families attending the summer conference.

Despite the substantial deficit for the year, the Charity's reserves remain sufficient, but expenditure will need to be closely monitored and we will be praying for additional income.

The Trustees continued their established practice of making modest gifts to other Christian organisations; this year four organisations received such gifts.

No Trustees have received any remuneration.

Reserves Policy

The charity's reserves policy is to retain sufficient reserves to cover at least six months of expenditure. The current level of reserves is therefore satisfactory.

Political Donations

Intercessors for Britain has no party-political affiliations and does not make political donations.

General Data Protection Regulations

Intercessors for Britain seeks to ensure that it complies with the regulations, having considered them along with advice from the Information Commissioner's Office.

Structure, governance and management

The leadership of the Trust is undertaken by the Co-Directors, who are responsible for the day-to-day management of the Trust. Operational policies, strategic direction and planning are determined by the Directors together with the Trustees. The Trustees met three times during the year. A new Administrator, Mrs Hannah Harris, was recruited and commenced employment in June 2023.

Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Trust Deed.

Objectives and Activities

The aim of Intercessors for Britain (IFB) is the advancement of the Christian Faith through inspiring and informing prayer for the nation, and the church within it. This is achieved particularly through teaching and encouragement of intercession, the production and distribution of Christian literature and other instructional material. In so doing, the Trust seeks to be a moral voice to the church and the nation.

The principal activities are regular communication of issues for prayer via social media and email, the publication of the bi-monthly Prayer Bulletin, the organisation of Prayer and Bible Conferences for Bible teaching and corporate prayer, the production of Christian literature and the dissemination of resource material for prayer and intercession.

Membership of IFB is free and open to all Bible-believing Christians, who will commit to praying regularly for the United Kingdom. Through Bible teaching and instruction, encouragement and facilitation in intercession, it resources Christians regardless of church affiliation. All its online conferences, YouTube videos and printed publications and any other Bible teaching materials are provided free of charge or at nominal cost. The Trustees are satisfied that, in the activities and achievements during the year, they have complied with their duty under section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 in regard to public benefit.

Achievements and Performance

During the year IFB has held two Prayer & Bible conferences, one of which was the first family-friendly conference held for many years. There were four Prayer & Bible days, and four online prayer days using Zoom. The Prayer Day in April was an experimental hybrid meeting – in-person and online. There have been several speaking engagements at churches and other groups.

The bi-monthly Prayer Bulletin for signed-up members continues to be a valued resource for intercession on behalf of the nation. In response to daily news reports of concern for Christian witness and testimony, IFB regularly posts comments on its Facebook page highlighting key issues for prayer. These posts are also disseminated in weekly emails for those who have requested them.

The Bible teaching provided for in-person and online meetings is recorded and published on IFB's YouTube channel. Prayer inspiration is regularly shared on Instagram.

A short promotional video introducing IFB and the need for intercession, was created, and an advertisement was designed and placed in the Heart newspaper.

As older members pass-on, or have to drop out, we have seen a further decline in the membership which receive the Prayer Bulletin by post. This was partially offset by some new 'postal' members, and an increase in members receiving the Bulletin by email.

Online engagement has continued to increase, with new followers on Facebook and new subscribers to IFB's YouTube channel.

Future Plans

The pattern of Prayer & Bible conferences, one of which will be family-friendly and supported with sponsorship funds, will continue. Likewise, there will continue to be Prayer & Bible days interspersed with online prayer meetings, though the timings of the latter will be changing.

Being very much aware of the increasing turbulence and uncertainty within the nation and internationally, the Co-Directors will be reassessing our priorities and plans going forward. These will include consulting with leaders of other similar Christian organisations to see if our concerns are shared and if there may be opportunities for the joint expression of such concerns to the church and the nation.

In an endeavour to understand the level of engagement of 'email' members, a one-off postal mailing was sent to all members in January 2024. The geographical distribution of the membership will be studied with the aim of encouraging and facilitating the gathering of members for prayer in their localities. It is hoped that the developing contacts with other like-minded organisations might help to augment and strengthen such local prayer groups.

Financial Review

The accounts for the year ending 30th September 2023 have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Articles of Association and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities – Statement of Recommended Practice, applicable to all charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards.

The Trust's bank account during the year was with Barclays Bank and savings accounts with Redwood Bank.

For the year ended 30th September 2023, the charity's accounts were restructured to assist with financial management and planning. This year, donation income was lower by 10% which was almost offset by an increase in gifts from wills. Total payments of unrestricted funds were marginally lower than last year. The introduction of payroll, as reported in last year's report, is evident from the increase in payroll expenditure and decrease in fees and honoraria expenditure.

The Trustees continued their established practice of making modest gifts to other Christian organisations; this year six organisations received such gifts.

No Trustees have received any remuneration.

Reserves Policy

The charity's reserves policy is to retain sufficient reserves to cover at least six months of expenditure. The current level of reserves is therefore satisfactory.

Political Donations

Intercessors for Britain has no party-political affiliations and does not make political donations.

Administration is undertaken by the Co-Directors, assisted by Mrs Val Borlase. New Trustees are appointed by agreement between the existing Trustees.

With the passing-on of Mr Raymond Borlase in August 2022, the Trust has sadly lost its longest Director (1984-2007) and a faithful Trustee (2010-2022)

Objectives and activities

The Object of the Trust is the advancement of Christianity, particularly through teaching and encouragement of intercession, the production and distribution of Christian literature and other instructional material. In so doing, the Trust seeks to be a moral voice to the church and the nation.

The principal activities are the publication of the bi-monthly Prayer Bulletin, the organisation of Prayer and Bible Conferences for Bible teaching and corporate prayer, the production of Christian literature and the dissemination of resource material for prayer.

IFB is open to all Bible-believing Christians, who will commit to praying regularly for the United Kingdom. Through Bible teaching and instruction, encouragement and facilitation in intercession, it resources Christians regardless of church affiliation. All its online conferences, YouTube videos and printed publications and any other Bible

teaching materials are provided free of charge or at nominal cost. IFB is concerned for the highest wellbeing of our nation and its institutions. The Trustees are satisfied that, in the activities and achievements during the year, they have complied with their duty under section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 in regard to public benefit.

Achievements and Performance

During the year IFB has held two Prayer & Bible conferences, four Prayer & Bible days, and four online prayer days using Zoom, the last being particularly well attended. The Co-Directors have also undertaken several speaking engagements at churches and other groups.

The bi-monthly Prayer Bulletin for signed-up members continues to be a valued resource for intercession on behalf of the nation. In response to daily news reports of concern for Christian witness and testimony, IFB regularly posts comments on its Facebook page highlighting key issues for prayer. These posts are also disseminated via Twitter and in weekly emails for those who don't follow Facebook or Twitter.

The Bible teaching provided for in-person and online meetings is recorded and published on IFB's YouTube channel, which is attracting an increasing number of subscribers.

A new booklet 'Introduction to Intercession' was published and distributed. In connection with this, 10 videos on prayer were scripted, edited and published on the IFB website and YouTube channel.

While we see a continuing decline in members who receive the Prayer Bulletin by post, email membership has grown slightly though with this group there are questions over the level of commitment to pray. However, it has been encouraging to note continued growth of engagement through the social media platforms and YouTube.

With the passing of Mr Raymond Borlase, the 4-monthly publication of 'The Watchman' booklet ceased in May 2022 after more than 12 years.

For the coming year, two Prayer & Bible conferences are planned, one of which will be family-friendly (a) by making provision for the children during conference sessions and (b) by promoting sponsorship whereby the personal expense of attending may be mitigated for those who could not otherwise afford to come. In addition to the conferences, Prayer & Bible days will be organized in various parts of the country, together with intervening online prayer days.

There are plans to produce a booklet examining the Union of the United Kingdom, and possibly one looking into the impact on the nation of global issues which have emerged during the COVID pandemic.

Endeavours to increase membership and social media reach, with particular focus on younger generations, will continue. It remains an objective to start regular Zoom prayer evenings for the 20s–30s age bracket when resources permit.

Our Administrator, Mrs Val Borlase, will be retiring in the Spring of 2023, so a search for her replacement will be necessary.

Financial Review

The Trust's bank accounts during the year were with Barclays Bank and Santander, and savings accounts with Redwood Bank. The Santander account was closed in October 2022.

Donation income increased by 14% and the Trust received further gifts from Wills of £24,245 as a result of which total assets at 30th September 2022 rose to £127,747. We give thanks to God for this generous provision.

During the year, a payroll system has been established, and with effect from July 2022 the Co-Directors and Mrs Val Borlase were brought onto payroll. Prior to this they were paid fees as self-employed workers and Mrs Borlase received an honorarium in recognition of her contribution to the administration of the Trust. Each year the Trustees may decide to make modest gifts to other Christian organisations; this year seven organisations received such gifts.

Other than the payment of expenses, no Trustees have received any remuneration.

There are no Restricted Funds, and the Trustees' policy is to retain sufficient reserves to cover at least six months of expenditure.



Objectives and activities

The Object of the Trust is the advancement of Christianity, particularly through teaching and encouragement of intercession, the production and distribution of Christian literature and other instructional material. In so doing, the Trust seeks to be a moral voice to the nation and the church.

The principal activities are the publication of the bi-monthly Prayer Bulletin, the organisation of Prayer and Bible Conferences for Bible teaching and corporate prayer, the production of Christian literature and the dissemination of resource material for prayer.

IFB is open to all Bible-believing Christians, who will commit to praying regularly for the United Kingdom. Through Bible teaching and instruction, encouragement and facilitation in intercession, it resources Christians regardless of church affiliation. All its online conferences, YouTube videos and printed publications other than Bible teaching CDs which are sold at cost price, are provided free of charge. IFB is

concerned for the highest wellbeing of our nation and its institutions. The Trustees are satisfied that, in the activities and achievements during the year, they have complied with their duty under section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 in regard to public benefit.

Achievements and Performance

The new Co-Directors have taken time to assess IFB systems and operations, and implement improvements, including modernising the logo and the website design. There has been a survey of members, and a tidying of the membership database, so as to remove redundant or non-responsive contacts.

They have developed news posts on Facebook which also feed newly introduced weekly emails to those members who have signed-up for them.

Work has started on a series of introductory videos about how/why we should intercede for the nation.

150 new members signed-up to IFB during the year, mainly for 'email' membership. Many had been connected with IFB in the past and wished to reconnect, others were entirely new. Despite this overall membership numbers have decreased by 8%. This was partly as a result of the purging of the membership database, and partly because some members had not renewed membership when their local group stopped meeting because of the pandemic.

Growing online engagement has been achieved with increases in followers on Facebook, YouTube subscribers, and followers on Twitter and Instagram, the last being a new initiative aimed at reaching a younger audience.

Physical Prayer and Bible events have been restricted by the pandemic. The New Year (2020/21) conference was organised over Zoom, and subsequently six national half-day Zoom meetings were held. The numbers attending online were consistently larger than those attending physical events. The annual Great Day of Prayer in London, scheduled for June, had to be postponed until September because of lockdowns regulations.

The bi-monthly Prayer Bulletin, which is sent only to signed-up members and is much appreciated as an aid to intercession on behalf of the nation, has been augmented by weekly emails highlighting key issues for prayer. The weekly emails have echoed the regular postings on the IFB Facebook page. At the end of the year it was decided that "The Watchman" magazine will be run independently and separate from IFB.

For the coming year, a New Year Prayer and Bible conference has been arranged at the Christian conference centre used in previous years. It is planned to hold a further 3-day conference in the summer together with occasional Prayer and Bible days and regular, bimonthly, national half-days of prayer over Zoom.

Other plans for the coming year include: initiating regular online prayer meetings for younger people (20's and 30's); updating certain past IFB leaflets that would be helpful for a new audience; publishing explanatory information about how and why we pray about particular issues; identifying, training and supporting potential leaders

of local prayer groups and prayer days; exploring and developing partnerships with churches and other leaders.

Financial Review

The Trust's bank accounts during the year were with Barclays Bank and Santander, and savings accounts were opened with Redwood Bank.

Donation income declined by 9%, but the Trust received gifts from Wills of £102,134 as a result of which total assets at 30th September 2021 rose to £117,036. We give thanks to God for this generous provision.

The Director and Co-Directors received fees for their work managing and developing the operations of the Trust, and as principal speakers. Mr Raymond Borlase received an honorarium as a speaker, and for the preparation of The Watchman. Mrs Val Borlase received an honorarium in recognition of the help she gives in the administration of the Trust. Guest speakers at Prayer & Bible events receive expenses and a per diem honorarium. Each year the Trustees may decide to make modest gifts to other Christian organisations; this year eight organisations received such gifts.

Other than the honorarium to Mr Raymond Borlase, and the payment of expenses, no other Trustees have received any remuneration.

There are no Restricted Funds, and the Trustees endeavour to retain sufficient reserves to cover at least six months of expenditure.

All its online conferences, YouTube videos and printed publications other than Bible teaching CDs which are sold at cost price, are provided free of charge. IFB is concerned for the highest wellbeing of our nation and its institutions. The Trustees are satisfied that, in the activities and achievements during the year, they have

complied with their duty under section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 in regard to public benefit.

Achievements and Performance

Membership numbers have increased by 22 overall compared with last year. There was a marked increase in the number receiving the bi-monthly bulletin by email, which was partially offset by fewer receiving it by post. We continued to utilize social media in order to engage more effectively with the younger generation. To this end, followers on Facebook increased by 257, and subscribers to the IFB Youtube channel increased by 127. It was particularly gratifying that IFB Bible teaching videos had been viewed 21,738 times during the year, an increase of 4,065 over last year.

During the year, there were 4 Prayer and Bible Days in different parts of the country, and the usual Prayer and Bible Weekend at the New Year. As a result of the COVID-19 restrictions, face-to-face events were no longer possible after March; so 4 half-days of prayer and one Prayer and Bible Weekend were held over Zoom. It was notable and encouraging that these Zoom meetings attracted over 100 log-ins, which represented a participation of up to 150 people.

The trustees granted the Director three months sabbatical from January to April 2020.

Sharing news for prayer has been gradually moved from the website to Facebook as the latter achieved higher viewings. Many more Bible teaching videos were posted on Youtube. This represents a trend from distributing the messages on CD.

The bi-monthly Bulletin is sent only to signed-up members and is much appreciated as an aid to intercession on behalf of the nation. IFB embraces "The Watchman" magazine; this continued to be published three times in the year as a further resource for Christians to understand God's ways and purposes in today's world. This publication is available to members and non-members.

We have been able to join with other like-minded Christian groups in sharing our concerns for the nation and the world. The Director has spoken at a Bible College, has contributed to another organisation's conference, and a number of online meetings with other Christian leaders. He has had articles published in a Christian newspaper.

For the coming year, a New Year Prayer and Bible Week had been arranged at the Christian conference centre used in previous years, but this has had to be cancelled, and arrangements made for the Prayer and Bible Week to be held on Zoom.

Towards the end of the year, the Director notified the trustees that he would be responding to a call to pastoral ministry in a church; and would be looking to relinquish his IFB position during the course of 2021. The trustees will therefore be engaged in identifying new leadership for the ministry.

Financial Review

The Trust's bank accounts during the year were with Barclays Bank and Santander.

Unsurprisingly, given the fewer events during this year, donation income dropped by 12%. We were pleased to have been able to slightly increase our level of giving in fees and gifts to individuals, who have contributed to the work of the charity, and to other organisations from whom we have benefitted. Savings in other areas of expenditure enabled us to reduce overall expenditure by 7%.

The Director receives fees for his work managing and developing the operations of the Trust, and as the principal speaker. Mr Raymond Borlase is granted an honorarium as a speaker, and for the preparation of The Watchman. Mrs Val Borlase receives an honorarium in recognition of the help she gives in the administration of the Trust. Other speakers at Prayer & Bible events receive expenses and a per diem honorarium. Each year the Trustees may decide to make modest gifts to other organisations; this year four organisations received such gifts.

Other than the honorarium to Mr Raymond Borlase, and the payment of expenses, no other Trustees have received any remuneration.

There are no Restricted Funds, and the Trustees endeavour to retain sufficient reserves to cover at least six months of expenditure.


