Trustee's Report

For the year ended 31st March 2025

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31st March 2025.

Background Information

BANGLADESH CENTRE is a Bangladeshi community centre in the UK dedicated to cultural, educational and welfare services for the Bangladeshi community in London. All services are provided both in English and Bangla language. The organization serves Kensington, Chelsea and surrounding boroughs. No appointment is necessary for any advice. The organisation has an excellent local reputation for providing activities in culturally sensitive ways and has developed expertise in accessing and helping hard to reach people. It has also delivered educational courses to inspire, motivate and upskill members of the local disadvantaged communities to go forward in life.

Structure, Governance and Management

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the governing rule and applicable law.

Governing document

The charity was founded in 1983 and the trust was formed through a declaration of Trusts dated in the mid 1980s as well as being registered as a company limited by guarantee under registration number 01746353. The Memorandum of Association was amended by special resolutions passed in 1984, 1991 and 1996. The Articles of Association was amended by special resolution passed in 1991. It has been registered as charity with Charity Commission in 1985.

How the Trust was founded

BANGLADESH CENTRE was founded in 1983 by the Founder Members who have been associated with this directly and indirectly to this day.

Appointment of Trustees

The Council of Management has the power to appoint additional Trustees or remove Trustees as it considers fit to do so.

Appointment of Directors

The Council of Management has the power to appoint additional members or remove members as it considers fit to do so.

The Council of Management in office in the year are set out on page 3. The Trustees and Directors have no beneficial interest in the organisation other than as members.

Organisation

The Trustees / Directors meet regularly in order to manage the affairs of the charity. Day to day running of the charity is the responsibility of the manager who manages the staff and volunteers reports directly to the Board of Trustees.

All our permanent members give at least 6 hours per week of their time. They are there to support in various activities of the charity and to gain new skills and experience to enhance their employment prospects.

Public benefit Statement

The Trustees and Directors consider that they have complied with Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 with regards to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission.

Objectives and Activities

BANGLADESH CENTRE is a grass roots community organisation with the aims and objectives of

“To Provide an advisory and information service including casework dealing with welfare benefits, immigration and nationality, homelessness and housing, translation and interpretation, employment and training, legal and police matters, health care and general information etc”.

What the Charity offers to the community

The charity does its best to what it can offer to the local community. Despite some financial constraints the charity offers the following activities:

- To provide supplementary school program including holding classes for Bangla language as a mother tongue, Bangla language for non-Bengali people, English as second language. GCSE and ‘A’ level Bangla, English, Maths, Physics, Chemistry and Biology etc.
- To provide advice, guidance on health care by professional doctor(s).
- To provide ICT facilities to beneficiaries, especially from the Bangladeshi community.
- To organize cultural functions, festivals and to hold Bangladesh national events throughout the year, (e.g. Martyrs Day and International Mother Language Day, Independence and National Day, Bangla New Year, Bangladesh Victory Day, etc.). Exhibition of crafts, paintings, photographs, are a part and parcel of the cultural activities.
- To provide music school program to the interested groups including second generation Bangladeshis through providing facilities of learning Dance, Music and Drama.
- To organize get together parties every week for women and also to arrange sociocultural seminars and hold classes on painting, knitting, sewing, cooking, performing arts etc. under women’s awareness program.

- To provide indoor and outdoor games facilities including table tennis, snooker, chess, carom board, badminton, football, cricket and gym etc.
- To provide hostel facilities with TV/visitors lounge, game room, kitchen and dining room etc. to the boarders' expected to come from all over the world and in particular from Bangladesh.
- To provide library facilities containing educational books, children's books, books on Bengali literature with sufficient Up to date stock of newspapers and periodicals.
- To provide community development services and liaises with the local authorities, central government, voluntary sector organizations with the object of maintaining a good relationship between the indigenous population and the ethnic minority communities.

RENOVATION AND SUSPENSION OF ACTIVITIES

Bangladesh Centre is currently undergoing renovation in order to fulfil the requirements of the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea (RBKC) and in compliance with the standards they (RBKC) have set. Jackfruit London Enterprise drafted an agreement for 14 years with Bangladesh Centre to develop the governance and infrastructure. Jackfruit London Enterprise is also working closely with RBKC to undertake the renovation of Bangladesh Centre.

The primary goal was to carry out the renovation and so the Centre's activities were suspended for a brief moment in time. The office of the Centre has moved to an office in East London to carry out day to day affairs. Activities have been resumed in July 2020 in the new building.

CELEBRATORY EVENTS

With the support of all members, the Centre managed to celebrate events such as Victory Day (17/12/24), Martyr's Day and International Mother Language Day (20/02/25). On 31st March 2025 the Centre organised two events together.

In connection with our examination no matter has come to our attention:

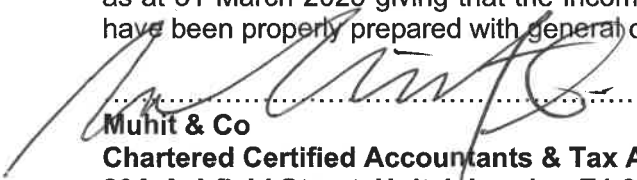
(1) Which gives us reasonable cause to believe that in any material respect the requirements:

1 Accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities. They have also been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act. 1993 and comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting by Charities' (issued on January 2015).

Capitalisation and depreciation of tangible fixed assets:

All assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised. The cost of tangible fixed assets is written off by equal instalments over the expected useful lives as follows:

Furniture, fittings and equipment, 5% reducing balance method

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds

Consists of general funds which the centre may use for its purpose at its discretion.

Restricted funds

Are those where the donor has imposed restrictions on the use of the funds which are legally binding.

Incoming Resources

Income only recognised where there is entitlement for the period.

7 Revaluation of Land & Building

During this financial year ended 31 March 2025, the charity carried out a revaluation of the building since the full refurbishment work has completed couple of years ago.

The valuation was undertaken by an independent professional valuer, who are a recognised and accredited valuation agent. Valuation was conducted using the current market value approach depending on the class of assets.

The valuation company suggested in October 2024 that the maximum value would expect a market price in the region of £22,000,000. We have taken this amount as fair value of land & building and reflected in the balance sheet as increase of assets and reserve.

8 Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis with the expectation that the company would be able to obtain sufficient grants to continue its activities in the future.
