The method of achieving the Aim of The Association is by providing an enjoyable and attractive scheme of progressive training, based upon The Scout Promise and The Scout Law and guided by trained adult leadership. The Scout Group provides activities for 6- to 14-year-old children and aims to support the provision of activities for 14- 25-year-olds through the district-managed Explorer Scout and Network Scout provisions

We are once again extremely grateful to many volunteers we have that help out with a number of events that we hold during the year. Many of these do not even have children in the Scouts movement anymore, but they still contribute, which is always well received. Without their help and that of the parents whose children are active Scouts, we wouldn't be able to do as much as we do in terms of outbound events. We are also reliant on the continued support of parents helping out with weekly meetings so that we can maintain a healthy number of scouts in each section and ensure we meet the guidelines set regarding the ratio of parents to the number of scouts.

Our aim is to continue to seek grant funding from third parties to help us refurbish the Scout Hu to make it an even better facility for all those that use it.

Section D

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

The past year has seen a continued strong membership in the circumstances. We remain the largest of the 7 groups in Walton & Weybridge Scout District.

Notable highlights are:

Beavers

At the beginning of a new term we welcome new beavers into the scouting network, reflecting on the values and history of scouting, incorporating fun games to learn the meaning of their new or continued journey. We had 52% HQ based activities and 48% of external activities across 2024.

Spring term saw 89% of attendance
 Summer Term saw 89% attendance
 Autumn term saw 88% attendance

Operating at full capacity of 24 beavers.
 3x Young leaders. 5 x leadership team
 Extensive waitlist in operation- currently at 131 members.

A selection of activities at HQ consisted of; Police Visit, Digital Maker/Citizen, Mental Health Awareness, Self-defence class, Money Skills and Dance, amongst other badge work.

A selection of External activities consisted of: Grass sledging & zip lining, Nightline, Pond dipping, Bat walk, and orienteering.

Events across 2024: Remembrance parade, St George's parade, Walton Firs Sleepover indoor sleepover, Walton Firs Canvas sleepover, District Sleepover Rock up!, sledging & ringos and Beaver Bakes.

615 badges were awarded in 2024, including 12 Bronze Awards.

Cubs

In 2024, 62% of our activities took place at HQ and 38% externally. Next year, we aim for a better balance.

In September, Zak Greenaway took over as Akela from Glenn Evans. We were also pleased to welcome Richard Semmens as a Section Assistant and Jo Hurford as a regular helper. Totalling 4 leaders and 2 regular helpers.

We ran two sold-out camps: a summer camp at Walton Firs (High Ropes, Caving, Archery) and a survival-themed camp at Polyapes (fire lighting, backwoods cooking, shelter building).

We ended the year with 33 Cubs—five more than last year—including two joiners from the waiting list.

Rock Up, Jambowlree, Sandown Skiing, Jump In, Wide Games

- **Key Events:**

Remembrance Parade, St George's Day Parade, Rugby Match, Summer Camp, District Water Day, Survival Camp

Five Cubs earned their Chief Scout's Silver Award, alongside many other challenge and activity badges.

Scouts

Across 2024, highlights of Scouts weekly meetings included shadow puppets, wide games, a casino night, cooking, stop-motion animation, ice skating and laserquest as well as the filming of our own music video.

We enjoyed an Expedition Challenge weekend in South Wales where scouts stayed in a converted castle! Easter Camp saw us in the Peak District for 3 nights, with hiking, gorge walking and climbing & abseiling all on the agenda, and in June we joined 6000 Scouts and Guides at Surrey Scoutabout in Ardingly.

For Summer Camp 2024, we headed to Cornwall, with an exciting week of air, land, and sea adventures enjoyed by all. Our final weekend activity of the year was a survival camp on Box Hill in the autumn term. We have also started the build-up to our summer adventure to Austria in summer 2025.

At the end of 2024, we had 37 scouts in the Troop and two Young Leaders.

The Group Executive Committee considers that the group should hold a sum equivalent to 2 year's primary running costs, circa £20,000



Subscriptions are charged within the group for membership, to cover the immediate running costs of the Group and a yearly administrative charge by Walton & Weybridge District, Surrey County Scout Council and The Scout Association which are reviewed on an annual basis. These subscriptions do not unduly restrict membership and it is the Group's principle that no one should be excluded from scouting, because of their inability to pay membership subscriptions or camp fees. Expenditure is carefully monitored by each section leader with subscriptions supporting normal meeting activities, however, further funds for meetings offsite e.g paint-balling are paid by parents/carers to subsidise the activity. This fiscal year has been particularly challenging with Covid rules stifling the opportunity to hold meetings under the Scouts rules and regulations. As such we have had to reduce subscriptions across all sections so that at least we can keep up maintenance and costs for the Scout hut whilst we wait to return to normal Scouting.

Many of these do not even have children in the Scouts movement anymore but they still contribute which is always well received. Without their help and those of the parents whose children are active Scouts we wouldn't be able to do as much as we do in terms of outbound events. We are also reliant on the continued support of parents helping out with weekly meetings so that we can maintain a healthy number of scouts in each section and ensure we meet the guideline set regarding the ratio of parents to number of scouts.

Our aim is to seek grant funding from third parties to help us build a much-needed new roof for the Scout Hut.

The past year has seen a continued strong membership in the circumstances. We remain the largest of the 7 groups in Walton & Weybridge Scout District.

Notable highlights are

Beavers

At the beginning of a new term, we welcome new beavers into the scouting network, reflecting on the values and history of scouting, incorporating fun games to learn the meaning of their new or continued journey.

We had 50% HQ based activities and 50% of external activities across 2022.

Spring term saw 85% of attendance

Summer Term saw 79% attendance

Autumn term saw 84% attendance

Operating at full capacity of 24 beavers.

3x Young leaders.

Spring term started with 3 leaders but increased to 6 leaders by end of 2022.

Extensive waitlist in operation.

A selection of activities at HQ consisted of; Gardening badge, creating bird houses, global issues, Lazer Lions, Community Impact, space badge, cooking badge, Experiment badge, Water games and emergency aid.

A selection of External activities consisted of; Capture the flag, Pioneering, Brooklands museum, trampolining, rugby, Litter picking, Hershams Hunt, Adventure course, nightline, Zip line & grass sledging,

Events across 2022: Remembrance parade, St George's parade, Tuf of War, Walton Firs Sleepover, Bazzaz, Thames Mariners and Brookland museum.

470 badges were awarded in 2022.

Cubs

2023 was a great year for cub scouting activities. We ran our varied program throughout the year, focussed on ensuring all cubs have the opportunity to complete their Silver Award during their time with us. We moved our annual autumn camp from a hut-based camp at Walton Firs to fully under canvas! This was very well received and will become the standard in future (in fact we've already repeated this in 2024).

In 2023 we had 3 warranted leaders with a further 2 regular adult helpers, 1 DoE helper and a consistent supply of parent helpers to allow us to run a successful and enjoyable programme.

Membership increased to 30, and we accepted members off the waiting list for the first time in many years. With the numbers coming through beavers and the projected number of cubs, we expect to steadily move back towards a full pack of 36 cubs in 2024/25.

Scouts

In 2023, Scouts had been meeting face-to-face for 2 years and enjoyed putting the restrictions of COVID lockdowns firmly in the rear-view mirror. Highlights of our weekly meetings included cooking, theatre workshops, outdoor wide games, craft evenings, the Scientist badge, campfires and our own assault course - plus the return of our Christmas Party!

We enjoyed a night hike on Box Hill, a survival camp at Polyapes, the District Water Activity Day in Shepperton, and the highlight of the year was our week-long Summer Camp based near Cardiff in South Wales. A lack of adult volunteer availability continued to limit our ability to run further weekend events during the year, and this is something we aim to find ways to improve in 2024.

Our three existing Young Leaders turned 18 during the year and have remained with us as adult helpers; we hope they will be able to undertake the necessary training to become leaders during the next year, subject to university commitments.

At the end of 2023 we had 33 scouts in the Troop, and we were also joined by two new Young Leaders.

The Group's policy on reserves is to hold sufficient resources to continue the Charitable Activities of the Group, should income and fundraising activities fall short. The Group Executive Committee considers that the group should hold a sum equivalent to 2 year's primary running costs, circa £20,000


Expenditure is carefully monitored by each section leader with subscriptions supporting normal meeting activities, however, further funds for meetings offsite e.g paint-balling are paid by parents/carers to subsidise the activity. This fiscal year has been particularly challenging with Covid rules stifling the opportunity to hold meetings under the Scouts rules and regulations. As such we have had to reduce subscriptions across all sections so that at least we can keep up maintenance and costs for the Scout hut whilst we wait to return to normal Scouting.

Scouts

Started the year in our usual active fashion with a weekend trip to London in January, a coding workshop with Apple in Kingston and expeditions

along the Purbeck coast in Dorset in early March, alongside our regular Thursday meetings.

COVID lockdowns caused us to suspend all face-to-face activities in mid-March and within 2 weeks we were up and running on Zoom. This was a real unknown for the whole team but leaders and scouts alike really stepped up as we pushed the boundaries of what we previously thought possible.

By the end of 2020 we had delivered 38 remote scouting activities, with an average attendance rate in excess of 85%, with topics ranging from talent shows and quiz nights to cookalongs, comedy workshops and scavenger hunts.





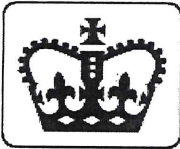
