Group Overview – 2025 Annual Report

The 12th Chichester Scout Group continues to be one of the most active and successful Scout Groups in the Chichester area. This past year, we've seen our young people thrive thanks to the ongoing support of our dedicated leadership team, hardworking volunteers, committed Trustees, and the broader local community.

Under strong and forward-looking leadership, the Group has delivered another year of thoughtful and engaging programmes designed to help young people build confidence, resilience, and essential life skills. Our volunteers continue to play a central role in creating safe, inclusive, and inspiring experiences for all our members.

As Chichester continues to grow—particularly with the rise in new housing developments—we recognise both the opportunities and the challenges this presents. Alongside this, we remain focused on improving our headquarters to better serve our members now and into the future. These efforts require ongoing planning, resources, and determination, all of which we are committed to.

Throughout the year, we've stayed true to the core values of Scouting: growth, inclusivity, and community impact. This report reflects the progress we've made and outlines the goals we're working toward in the year ahead.

We extend our sincere thanks to everyone who has supported the Group over the past year. Your time, effort, and encouragement have been key to our continued success—and we look forward to building on that foundation in the coming year.

Group Lead Volunteer Report

The Scout Group has grown in the last year, mainly due to the inclusion of the new Squirrel Section. At the time of the census, we had 81 members being supported by 32 adults – not all of whom are leaders.

Helen and Jenny have continued their termly fundraising events, with a Whodunnit and a Bingo evening in 2024 and the second Quiz Night this year, each time earning approx. £400 for the group on each occasion.

At the beginning of the year, we were saddened to hear of the passing of Margaret Barrett, closely followed by her husband, Malcolm Barrett who has played a big part in the management of the group over the years. His enthusiasm and doughnuts at the Jumble Sale will be missed.

Following several “behind the scenes” meetings with the HQ Development Team and surveys, a very detailed Feasibility Report was produced with lots of colourful diagrams and plans to show how we could develop the site. At the beginning of this year, we held a HQ Development Workshop where Katie was able to talk us through the thoughts behind the report and to get feedback. The output from the workshop has been taken by Katie and will be presented back to us as amendments to the feasibility plan, at which point we should have a clearer direction on what we want to do next. It is hoped that we will have the output and more detailed plans ready for the Annual General Meeting in July.

2025 is the Groups 70th Anniversary in September so the group are opening a Badge Competition to all its members to create a badge that can be worn on the uniform for a defined period as an occasional badge. There was discussion about holding the AGM on a different day to make it more of a celebration, however, plans and thoughts on what this could include have yet to be discussed any further. GDPR does make this difficult in not being able to hold records of past members.

Stedham Campsite has been booked for a Family Camp in September and bookings are being taken. With a 3-year gap since the last Family Camp, we hope to welcome a lot of new members and their parents to the camp.

Squirrel Section

It was very exciting to open a new section in November 2024 after 6 months' work with the District and County Teams to set this up. Thanks to a District Volunteer Event in March 24, we already had 4 new leaders lined up to take on the role, including 2 parents of existing members. This has really helped us rather than having to further spread the current leadership team.

The Squirrel Section is for 4 – 6-year-olds and we started the first term with 10 members, meeting on a Saturday morning between 10:00 and 11:00. This number was increased to 12 for this year.

All the leaders are very enthusiastic and even in the first half term, all the Squirrels had attained several Activity Badges and are working towards their Acorn Award.

Beaver Section

The Beaver group is running with 15 beavers, and at the end of this year we have finally started to welcome the first squirrels moving up. We have welcomed 3 new squirrels to the last few Beaver meetings, to give them the opportunity to acclimatise and get used to the leaders. Overall, the Squirrels seemed to have settled in quite well, signing up for as many ahead adventures as they can. The Beaver Leader team has included Zoe Tunnell and Kirsty Shewan as joint Team Leaders and George Rossiter, as Team Member, but we are desperate for at least another adult to join us. We have continued to have the consistency of the same dedicated young leaders, supporting the Beaver colony. There has also been significant parent interest and support for Beaver evenings that are based out and about, and in the community.

The Beavers have all enjoyed a varied and diverse programme, which has seen them partake in many excursions and walks out into the community as well as many creative and challenging meetings within the scout hut. The Beavers have continued to strive forwards with earning their badges and showing kindness and welcomeness to every Beaver who enters the meeting space. 10 Beavers have been able to achieve the Chief Scout Bronze award before moving up to Cubs. Some other badges which the Beavers have been working towards has included the cooking badge and making many scrumptious treats, showing off their competitive side in striving for their sports badge. The Beavers have also been out and about, helping the community in multiple litter picks, earning their exploring badge, as well as going on multiple hikes, where they have received various levels of their hikes away staged badges. Beavers have also done a variety of science experiments and junk modelling- making machines and egg protecting vessels, which has earned them their science badge and Experiment Badge.

The Beavers are continuously challenging themselves within meetings to achieve elements of their challenge badges, sometimes having structured targets to achieve, such as being a team leader, teaching other skills or information that they seem to be experts in. We had 9 Beavers attend this year's district beaver camp, to varying degrees, and all had a very fun and exhausting time! We also had 6 Beavers attend the Remembrance parade, after having sent up a large group of Beavers to Cubs, where we were briefly reunited.

Cub Section

There were 25 cubs in the pack at the end of March. Cubs have generally moved on to scouts. The leaders have been Michael Merritt Team Leader assisted by Team Members George Barrett, Suzanne Barrett, Rob Liesicke and Josh Vaughan. Anita Hockin stepped down during the year. Young leaders have been Digby and Thomas.

So what have we done? In the summer term on our normal meeting nights activities included learning about BP, recycling, a Youth shaped evening, indoor climbing at the Arena, visit to a farm, visit to Chichester Marina to learn about a trans-Atlantic challenge and orienteering, and district events - badge day, box kart time trials which we won, district City Gates Challenge which we tied for first place, district cub camp at Lyons Copse with an Olympics theme and sculptures on the beach,

In the autumn term we entered two teams in the Supreme Box kart championships at Goodwood racecourse with one team coming 3rd out of 38 teams competing after scrapping through to the knockout stages. Again, a sleepover was offered in November prior to Remembrance Day Parade with the cubs cooking their own dinner. We took part in the district orienteering competition at Slindon Wood in November and won and came 2nd and 3rd! We held our Christmas entertainments evening having made gifts of tree decorations made from decorated lolly sticks for parents and supporters. Our regular meetings included digital citizen staged activity badge, trading post, wide games, penny game and litter pick, celebrating Diwali, and an indoor pothole.

In the spring term we organised a chip shop run, had an evening hike from West Dean, visited Southdowns Planetarium with two other cub packs, made pancakes, learnt about how cubs have their root in the Jungle Book story, solved problems and covered disability awareness and home safety. We also attended the district badge day and fun rugby.

After the year end, we concluded our spring term with Ten Pin Bowling. This coming summer term we plan to attend the District Cub Camp (Circus theme) and take part in district activities – Box karts, city gates challenge, sandcastle building and a visit to the Ford Materials Recycling Facility during half term with two other packs as well as our regular weekly meetings.

6 cubs achieved their Chief Scout's Silver Award, 41 challenge badges were presented and many other activity badges (169) were achieved such as disability awareness, entertainer, money skills, international, home safety, space, collector, athletics, athletics plus and hobbies and staged activity badges (41) including nights away, emergency aid, digital citizen and hikes.

Scout Section

This year Scouts have enjoyed a programme of activities run by 4 Leaders: Michael Legge, Robert Pope, Mark Mills and Isaac Slade.

For our Summer Camp, we used the facilities of the cottage in Wales on the border of the Brecon Beacons. The "camp" was attended by 14 members. The Scouts had a great time, white water rafting at an activities centre in Cardiff, gorge walking, and a hike to one of several local waterfalls.

September brought a new start of the Scout Competition Year; the first being Junior Downsman. The Scouts entered 2 Novice Teams this year and took a solid 4th place in the Junior Competition

The Scout Section has 26 members but only 3 regular leaders. There is 1 new leader potentially starting with us on 4th June, but still really looking for regular support from a Female Volunteer for camps/ events due to our high ratio of girls to boys, to which we are quite proud of due to the diversity of the movement this promotes.

In the autumn term we attended a couple of District events. 4 teams took part in the orienteering competition that was run in Slindon Woods where 2 of our teams achieved 2nd in the Under 12s category & 3rd in the Under 14½. We also attended a shooting competition in which our team of 4 came 4th. At the end of term there was a District Christmas party held at Go Outdoors a local climbing, bowling & laser tag venue that 19 of our members attended

During the spring term the Scouts had a good programme which gave them plenty of opportunity to plan their own, activities & games for the following term. We visited a local farm with 6 members to see what it's like to work on a farm & planted our own hedge. We also attended St Georges day parade with 10 members. We also had our district camp which wraps up the yearly competition with lots of smaller competitions which add to the final score which included Cooking a Pizza in an open fire oven got 1st place, Sedan Chair Racing placed 6th & in the most coveted competition the Cyclo-Cross we got 2nd. All this added up to a busy camp for leaders involved but much loved by all.

Other events in our calendar that have already been booked include our annual outing at Dragon Boat Racing on the canal in July and for our summer camp we are attending West Sussex Jamboree Camp in Ardingly with 14 members.

Accounts



The accounts have been drawn up on the receipts and payments basis, which is consistent with the previous year.

MAJOR ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS IN THE YEAR

The 12th Chichester Scout Group remains a very busy and successful Scout Group within the Chichester area. The Group is fortunate to continue to receive excellent support from our supporters, leadership team, volunteers, and Trustees.

Under the guidance of a dedicated and forward-thinking leadership team, our group continues to thrive with an unwavering commitment to our mission, very focussed on equipping young people with essential life skills. This commitment is exemplified through the thoughtful and engaging activities and programs crafted by our volunteer leaders.

We acknowledge the evolving landscape of our neighbourhood, marked by rapid development and new housing, together with the accompanying challenges. In addition, the task of enhancing our headquarters building presents its own set of challenges. We approach these challenges with resilience and determination.

As part of the Scouting movement, we remain steadfast in our pursuit of growth, inclusivity, and community impact. This report serves as a testament to our ongoing efforts and accomplishments, as well as a roadmap for navigating the opportunities and challenges that lie ahead. We express our gratitude to all who contribute to the success of the 12th Chichester Scout Group and look forward to sharing the journey ahead.

At the time of the annual census at the end of January 2024, the Group Membership remained stable at 75 members with several new members joining that have not yet been invested.

Following the severe lack of support at the Jumble Sale in March 2023, a new process was put in place to get more volunteers from our membership. This was hugely successful and in each of the Jumble Sales since, we have had a good level of support. The changes in the tip process, however, have made it more complicated to dispose of the leftover waste, despite having a skip. We don't want to have a bigger skip as this eats into our profits. The last Jumble Sale made a profit of approx. £2100, helped partly by the increase in the entrance fee. Other fundraising events during the year included running Crockery Smash at the Chichester Gala and the supply of 25 volunteers for the Fishbourne Flat 5, where we were able to take most of the entrance fees. In February, Helen W and Jenny G organised the first annual Quiz Night, and plans are already in place for another Whodunnit event in June.

Helen W and Jenny G now create a termly newsletter that goes out to all members and supporters in two formats (email and paper) at the beginning of each term to provide them with news about the group and to advertise future fundraising events. This will be important going forward when we start fundraising for the new Scout Centre.

A defibrillator has been installed at the entrance of the HQ thanks to grants from the Chichester Lions and Chichester City Council. This was "unveiled" at last years AGM in July with members of both present. The HQ continues to be used by UK Harvest which seems to be coming even more popular with the local community.

Suzanne Barrett was "promoted" to Assistant Section Leader for the Cub Section. Congratulations to Zoë Tunnell, Michael Legge and Rob Pope who have achieved their Woods Badge – this is in recognition of them completing all their Leader training. And a big congratulations and thank you to Alan Pope who has been awarded the Medal of Merit for his commitment to the Scout Group over the years as parent, secretary, and supporters secretary. Finally, Ethan Tunnell completed the requirements and has been awarded his King's Scout Award. This is the highest award a young person (considered up to 25yrs) can achieve in Scouting and is a mammoth achievement. He is looking forward to celebrating the award at a presentation dinner and attendance at St. George's Day parade at Windsor Castle in April.

The Scout HQ development has started to take pace and the necessary surveys have now almost been completed which will allow us to proceed to Step 3, which will be design sketches of the new building. This is an exciting development as we will soon be able to see what we COULD have as a replacement Scout Centre. My thanks to all the hard work put in by the HQ Working Party – Chris B, Alan P, Jenny G and Sean H. The Scout Group received a bonus donation of £10,080 thanks to a Legacy Donation from the estate of the late Anne Burnett in July. Also, thanks to Chris B and

Alan P, we will soon have a dedicated wheelchair friendly pedestrian pathway from the pavement through a separate gate in the hedge to separate pedestrians from vehicles entering the HQ grounds.

MAJOR ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS IN THE YEAR

I have held termly All Leaders Meetings to ensure all leaders are kept informed of the ongoing changes in the Scout Association. My understanding is that the new system which was supposed to go live in April 2024 has now been delayed several months, probably until the end of 2024. It was decided not to have a Family Camp in 2024 and defer until 2025. After a very successful Open Day run by Chichester District, we have two prospective leaders to start a Squirrels Dray (4-6yr olds) probably starting in September. This will be the second Dray in Chichester District, however we still need a Team Leader.

We are dependent on the time given freely by the leaders, young leaders, supporters, and parents to enable the group to thrive. I cannot thank them all enough for the effort they have contributed to keep the Group moving forward.

The Beaver Section currently has 14 Beavers, all who attend regularly and participate readily in activities that have been planned. The leader team consists of Zoe Tunnell, Kirsty Shewan and George Rossiter. We have also had the participation of two young leaders who have taken an active part in assisting and leading the Beavers. The Beaver colony has multiple DBS checked parents who are happy to participate in evenings and camps where needed. We also often see a lot of other parental support when out and about in the community, who enjoy seeing their Beavers participating in activities.

The Beavers have been doing a lot of badge work over this last year, achieving activity, staged and challenge badges. The majority of Beavers who have moved up to cubs have been able to achieve their Chief Scout Bronze award and have been very proud of this achievement. There has been a lot of focus at the beginning of the year around learning about the community that they live in as well as how to stay safe. The Beavers have focused on the planet, participating in a litter pick, growing plants and bug houses. The Beavers have also learnt about different faiths and different abilities, have participated in indoor potholing- which during the Log chew, Beavers named as being a favourite, alongside going camping!

Throughout the year the Beavers have done many trips out and visits, including to the local fire station and having a tour around, attending a fencing lesson put on by the high school club- where Beavers got to put on the full outfit and enjoy participating in a few matches. The Beavers have also gone on multiple walks and learning a lot of new and interesting facts whilst ambling along. We had some Beavers participating in the Fishbourne Flat 5 event, as well as attending the Remembrance Day parade and service.

This year we had a high number of Beavers attending the District Beaver camp, many of them experiencing their first nights away and really enjoying all the activities and the camping experience. All voicing looking forward to the next one. Later on in the year, many Beavers were able to attend a Beaver sleep over. MAJOR ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS IN THE YEAR

In the autumn term we entered two teams in the Supreme Box kart championships at Goodwood racecourse with one team coming 3rd out of 30+ teams competing. A sleepover was offered in November prior to Remembrance Day Parade with the cubs cooking their own dinner. We took part in the district orienteering competition at Slindon Wood in November and won. We held our Christmas entertainments evening having made gifts of decorated flower pots with sweets for parents and supporters. Our regular meetings included orienteering at Havenstoke Park, an evening hike to the top of Kingley Vale for investitures and emergency aid. We also took a group of cubs to see Jungle Book at the Festival Theatre.

In the spring term we visited Chichester Foodbank and also the Council House where we were entertained by the Mayor. Peter Evans, district chair of Trustees came in to talk about his time as Mayor, fire lighting and camp fire, made pancakes, an Irish themed meeting and fitness and healthy eating evening. We also attended the district 'Space' camp (sleepover) at the Winchester Science Centre.

This coming summer term we hope to attend the District Cub Camp (Olympics theme) and take part in district activities – Box karts, city gates challenge and badge day as well as our regular weekly meetings.

5 cubs achieved their Chief Scout's Silver Award, 27 challenge badges were presented and many other activity badges (87) were achieved such as backwoods cooking, disability awareness, entertainer, local knowledge, international and scientist and also staged activity badges including navigator, nights away, emergency aid, time on the water and hikes (85).

The Scouts have enjoyed a full programme of activities run by 4 Leaders; Michael Legge, Robert Pope, Mark Mills and Isaac Slade.

In the summer term, a 5 day camp at Lyons Copse, Wickham, Hampshire was arranged attended by 18 members. The Scouts had a great time, building rafts and trying to race them on a very smelly pond. The rafts mainly ended up being submarines with the Scouts on top! They also went on a hike and had a day visit to Marwell Zoo.

September brought a new start of the Scout Competition Year; the first being Junior Downsmen. The Scouts entered a Junior Team and a Novice Team this year and were successful in winning the Junior Competition; the first time in 10 years. The scoring was so tight that at the end of the weekend, two teams had scored the same number of points – 161.5, so the decision went down to the walking time where the 12th Team had a 26 minute advantage.

The Scout Section has 26 members but only 3 regular leaders. Ideally, we need to recruit at least one extra leader, preferably two.

In the autumn term we attended a couple of District events. 2 teams took part in the orienteering competition that was run in Slindon Woods where our best scoring team came 3rd. We also attended a shooting competition that was hosted by 1st Westbourne in which our team of 4 came 6th. One of our members came 3rd in the highest individual score category. At the end of term there was a District Christmas party held at Butlins swimming pool that 20 of our members attended

During the spring term the Scouts had a good programme including a trip to Chichester Planetarium and an evening dedicated to making bird feeders and seed balls for the RSBP Big Garden Birdwatch that takes place at the end of January. Also in January, the Scouts hosted a District Ready Steady Cook competition, as well as a trip to the Mendip Hills in Somerset for a caving weekend, shared with Southbourne Sea Scouts. This was the first opportunity to do this since Covid.

Other events in our calendar that have already been booked include; spring District Camp in May, dragon boating on the canal in July and our summer camp will be held in Wales using the facilities of the cottage on the border of the

Brecon Beacons with activities including white water rafting at an activities centre in Cardiff, gorge walking, and a hike to one of several local waterfalls.
