The Trust actively supports the charitable work of Scientists for Global Responsibility (SGR), a membership organisation promoting responsible science and technology. Examples of this type of work are research, education and advocacy centred around the military and other major corporate influences on science, design and technology in education and universities, information for young people on ethical career choices, providing briefings about security and disarmament, climate change and energy, science and technology policy, emerging technologies and conferences and other educational events and publications covering these areas of work.

Section D Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Grants totalling £55,851 were made to SGR.

SGR's key achievements over the reporting period:

- In collaboration with the New Weather Institute (NWI), SGR published two reports on the carbon footprint of football - '[Dirty Tackle](#)' (February 2025) and '[Playing With the Planet](#)' (May 2025), with further publications to come. Our research highlights the key role that the world's most popular sport plays in encouraging high carbon lifestyles, especially through sponsorship from oil and gas companies and airlines.
- SGR has also secured funding from NWI to research the carbon footprint of the winter sports sector. Several reports will be published later this year.
- Stuart Parkinson is working on a two-year project (until June 2026) funded by Marmot Charitable Trust and the MRT, researching examples and trends in greenwashing in military-industrial sectors.
- SGR has been awarded a grant of £20,000 by the Network for Social Change, for a new project challenging the military influence on universities and schools, planned to begin in September 2025.
- SGR's previous research on military carbon emissions continues to be very influential. Most notably, it was quoted in the State of Palestine's submission to the International Court of Justice climate hearing.
- Nico Edwards was appointed to SGR's Board of Directors in January 2025, replacing Simon Reed. Nico has published several recent articles on military and climate issues, and helping to organise the Global Week of Action for Peace and Climate Justice in September 2024.
- Stuart Parkinson analysed the major rises in UK military spending in both the Autumn and Spring budget statements, for the British branch of the Global Campaign on Military Spending.
- Phil Webber and Stuart Parkinson spoke at several events organised by the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament.
- Andrew Simms spoke at numerous events about overconsumption and the harmful activities of the fossil fuel industry.
- SGR is a part of a new network of organisations called the [SUV Alliance](#), which was launched in March 2025 to campaign against the ever bigger, more dangerous and polluting Sports Utility Vehicles cluttering our streets.
- Jan Maskell has continued to contribute to a 5-year project (until early 2027), funded by the National Lottery, to develop a sustainable food system in North Lancashire.
- 85 people attended SGR's online [conference](#) in October 2024 on 'Defusing carbon bombs: how do we stop remaining dangerous fossil fuels from being burned?'
- SGR's website has continued to be a valuable resource for campaigners, academics, journalists and students, with around 115,000 page views in the year ending in February 2025.
- The 7th edition of SGR's annual [Responsible Science journal](#) was published in May 2025.

Brief statement of the charity's policy on reserves

The Trust has a policy of keeping reserves to a minimum, but to retain sufficient to cover recurring administrative expenses such as the independent examination of the accounts and operating costs. Funds are available in the General Unrestricted Fund to cover these. The Trustees have agreed that it is prudent to retain enough to cover the equivalent of 3 years costs, as it is difficult to raise funds for these purposes, but they are essential to ensure that the Trust can continue its work and comply with statutory obligations. This is estimated to be £4,000. At the end of this financial year the Trust set aside £5000 in this fund to cover future admin costs.





Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Grants totalling £30966 were made to SGR.

SGR's key achievements over the reporting period:

- Our work on military carbon emissions continued to have widespread influence in the UK and internationally. Our findings were quoted repeatedly in a report by the House of Commons Defence Committee, with some of our technical recommendations on emissions reporting and target-setting being echoed by the committee. Our work critiquing the concept of 'green militarism' also gained a lot of interest.
- We worked with the Conflict & Environment Observatory to jointly submit technical evidence to an Environmental Audit Committee inquiry on climate security.
- We published evidence on the historic scale of the bombing campaign by the Israeli military on Gaza – and highlighted the role of AI in increasing the speed and scale of destruction.
- Our rebranded 'Fair Lifestyle Targets' helped scientists and others to exemplify 1.5°C-compatible living – and gained a great deal of interest via social media.
- We produced two new teaching resources aimed at schools on ethical and scientific issues related to nuclear weapons. These were launched to coincide with the new Hollywood movie 'Oppenheimer' to maximise interest.
- We gave talks on topics including fossil fuel sponsorship in sport, climate and security, and the military influence on universities, at a variety of conferences, festivals, webinars and podcasts.
- As part of a project on sustainable food, we delivered 'Carbon Conversation' workshops and gave advice on curriculum-based education activities.
- Through our annual conference and presentations at numerous events – both in the UK and internationally – we provided valuable information on issues including the climate crisis, nuclear risks, the militarisation of science and technology, emerging technologies, and environmental behaviour change.
- Our website gained a record number of visitors. It received 94,000 page-views during the reporting period, with two journal articles – one on the need for urgent climate action and the other on risks to the Zaporizhzhia nuclear power plant due to the Ukraine war – gaining a particularly large readership.





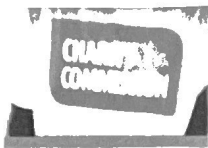

The Trust pursues its aims chiefly through support of the organisational development, and education and advocacy activities, of Scientists for Global Responsibility (SGR) (SGR General Purpose Fund).

The Trust envisages that further applications for funding will be made to meet its general objects and specifically it will support organisations such as SGR and the Nuclear Information Service which are committed to the Trust's aims. The Trust actively supports the charitable work of Scientists for Global Responsibility (SGR), a membership organisation promoting responsible science and technology. Examples of this type of work are research, education and advocacy centred around the military and other major corporate influences on science, design and technology in education and universities, information for young people on ethical career choices, providing briefings about security and disarmament, climate change and energy, science and technology policy, emerging technologies and conferences and other educational events and publications covering these areas of work.

Section D

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

The Trust has also facilitated funding for SGR's charitable work on avoiding nuclear conflict (no first use and global zero); wider impacts of militarism with the Conflict and Environment Observatory (CEOBS) and the UNGA First Committee; a wide range of work in support of the Conference of the Parties (COP26) climate negotiations in Glasgow; opposition to expansion of fossil fuel extraction in the UK.

1. Science Oath for the Climate

The Science Oath for the Climate, launched in November 2020, now has more than 500 signatories from around the globe, 155 of them in the UK,¹ building support for climate scientists and academics to speak out more publicly on climate change. SGR staff and signatories have been publicising the oath via email, public events, and social media. The oath pages of the SGR website have yielded over 5,000 page-views since its launch. Events and activities which have publicised the oath include the following:

- A 1.5-hour webinar on "Science and activism: acting with the face of evidence" at the COP26 People's Summit for Climate Justice (November 2021). Organized by SGR, the webinar included speakers from Scientists for XR and Scientists Warning, as well as SGR's Liz Kalaugher. This event had a live audience of nearly 100 and many more viewed the video afterwards on YouTube.
- The latest edition of SGR's *Responsible Science* journal (April 2022), which included a series of articles on 'science activism' and how the oath is a key element of this. This has also achieved a good reach, being sent to SGR's 700 members and individual articles being published on SGR's website and promoted via social media.
- SGR's assistant director Andrew Simms has promoted the oath at numerous high-profile events, including demonstrations by Extinction Rebellion (XR), an NGO event at the intergovernmental summit 'Stockholm+50', a speaker session at the Glastonbury Music Festival, the launch of a related campaign initiative Faculty for a Future, a webinar organized by the influential Prospect magazine, and numerous seminars for the Rapid Transition Alliance. Simms will also be promoting the oath at the British Science Festival in September.

2. Professional science and engineering organisation financial ties

The project wrote reports on the financial ties to the fossil fuel and arms industries of the Institute of Materials, Minerals and Mining (IOM3), Institute of Physics (IOP), Royal Meteorological Society, Geological Society, Royal Society, Energy Institute, and Institution of Mechanical Engineers. As the war in Ukraine complicated the situation regarding international arms transfers, additional reports on the Institution of Engineering and Technology, and Royal Academy of Engineering focused only on fossil fuels. These reports on each organisation were updates of the appendices produced as part of the original 'Irresponsible Science?' report. We then wrote letters to each of the organisations calling on them to take further action. All letters, reports and any responses are publicly available to download at the bottom of the web-page under the heading '2021 updates on progress' at

Initially, the project examined progress since the first Irresponsible Science report in October 2019. At that time, only two professional engineering or science organisations (PESOs) had investment policies. Now a further five of the 15 investment-holding professional organisations first contacted have investment policies, of varying stringency, bringing the total proportion of organisations with investment policies to almost half. Following approaches from SGR, the Royal Meteorological Society, Geological Society, and Institution of Materials, Minerals and Mining all either implemented ethical investment policies including exclusions of some or all fossil fuel and arms companies or divested from at least some fossil fuel and arms companies in practice. The Energy Institute, Institution of Engineering and Technology, and Royal Academy of Engineering instigated investment policies without such exclusions.

The IOP told us that it has “made good progress with our investment advisors looking at a revision to our ethical investment policy”. The IOP Council has decided to consult the membership on “some of the thoughts and definitions that would sit at the heart of any policy”. As a result of this insight into the IOP’s plans, SGR organized two letters to the editor of *Physics World* magazine, one about investments in fossil fuels and one about investments in arms, signed by IOP members who are oath signatories or SGR members with the aim of promoting support by other members to include these two categories in IOP’s investment policy.

The IOP also told us it is working with “several of the larger learned society and professional bodies across science and engineering to set our more clearly our EDI [equality, diversity and inclusion], ethics and sustainability commitments, and the connection between them”. The IOP feels that “a clear statement through something like a charter clarifying our commitments as organisations and as a sector would be helpful”. The group of organisations is hoping to release more information later this year. As a result of the reports, SGR was invited to hold a meeting with the new CEO of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers, who was interested in how the institution ranked against its peers. SGR will use this insight in applications for follow-on funding.

The Royal Society told us it was waiting for updated investment guidance from the Charity Commission before deciding on further action in this area. Once the Sainsbury Family Charitable Trusts won their case against the Commission and gained permission to make their investments compatible with the 1.5 degree Paris goal, we followed up with the Royal Society, which we believe may have as much as £14 m invested in fossil fuels. The Society told us it is awaiting the Charity Commission’s response to the tribunal. We’ve also requested that trustees of the charities involved in the case write to trustees of the Royal Society regarding its investments, to apply some “peer pressure” and we are investigating whether we can encourage some science activists to demonstrate outside Royal Society premises.

An article summarising the findings of the reports on the professional bodies was published in SGR’s *Responsible Science* journal in April.

3. Behaviour change project

Following extensive research work and consultation, a menu of behaviours compatible with the 1.5°C climate target, for scientists and the public to commit to, has been finalized. Work is now ongoing to make the menu live on the SGR website, with launch expected over the summer.

Future plans

At the time of writing, work in all three project areas is continuing, funded internally by SGR for a short period. We believe we have built a strong basis for applying for further grants to extend our successes, and these are now actively being pursued.

The Trust has a policy of keeping reserves to a minimum, but to retain sufficient to cover recurring administrative expenses such as the independent examination of the accounts and operating costs. Funds are available in the General Unrestricted Fund to cover these. The Trustees have agreed that it is prudent to retain enough to cover the equivalent of 3 years costs, as it is difficult to raise funds for these purposes, but they are essential to ensure that the Trust can continue its work and comply with statutory obligations. This is estimated to be £4,000. At the end of this financial year the Trust set aside £5000 in this fund to cover future admin costs.
