The Trustee Board meets regularly throughout the year to review the operation, governance and financial position of the Group. Trustees and volunteers are supported through the training and safety requirements of The Scout Association, including safeguarding, safety and governance learning. The Group operates within the Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association and follows national procedures relating to safeguarding, safety, risk assessment and volunteer appointments.

The Group continues to work closely with South Ribble District Scouts and the wider Scout movement to support programme delivery, volunteer development and opportunities for young people.

The Trustee Board actively considers risks to the Group, including volunteer recruitment, financial sustainability, membership levels and the ongoing maintenance of Group property and equipment. During the year the Group continued to assess options relating to repairs and future investment following water damage to the Group building. Insurance claims relating to the damage were settled during the year, with funds retained whilst longer-term repair and renewal options are considered.

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

The Group has continued to provide a varied, challenging and high-quality Scouting programme to young people within Leyland and the surrounding area.

Membership within the Group remains strong and stable, with 158 young people and 32 adult volunteers recorded at the most recent census. The Group continues to deliver programmes across Squirrels, Beavers, Cubs and Scouts, providing opportunities for young people aged 4–14 to develop skills for life through adventure, teamwork, leadership and community engagement.

The Squirrel Drey has continued to establish itself successfully within the Group, delivering engaging early years Scouting activities focused on teamwork, communication, community awareness and basic life skills. Young people achieved a range of awards including Emergency Aid, YouShape and adventure-based badges.

Both Beaver Colonies delivered a particularly strong programme, awarding over 600 badges during the year. Activities included nights away experiences, water activities, emergency aid, hiking, navigation, air activities, disability awareness, camp craft and peer leadership. Young people were also supported in achieving challenge awards and Chief Scout awards.

The two Cub Packs also delivered a wide-ranging programme with more than 220 badges awarded during the year. Activities included pioneering, backwoods cooking, fire safety, emergency aid, swimming, digital skills, entertainment, leadership and physical recreation. Several young people achieved the Chief Scout's Silver Award and continued to progress through staged activity badges including Nights Away and Swimming. The Scout Troops delivered a balanced programme focused on leadership, outdoor skills and personal development, awarding almost 300 badges during the year. Young people participated in activities including hiking, water activities, fire safety, world faiths, emergency aid, entertainment, navigation and international activities. The Group also continued to develop youth leadership opportunities through the Patrol Leader structure and YouShape awards.

During the year one Scout Troop was transitioned into an Explorer Scout Unit in partnership with the District, helping to strengthen progression opportunities for older young people within the area whilst maintaining stability within the Group's remaining Scout provision.

Across all sections the Group awarded in excess of 1,100 badges during the year, demonstrating the breadth and quality of programme delivery provided by volunteers throughout the Group.

The Group held a successful Group Camp at Bowley Scout Camp during the year, providing young people with opportunities for outdoor adventure, teamwork and personal development.

The Group has maintained positive long-term growth over recent years and continues to be one of the larger Scout Groups within the local area. Membership has grown significantly over the longer term, increasing from 26 members in 2001 to approximately 190 members in 2026.

The Group continues to support the development of young leaders and adult volunteers, whilst maintaining safe and effective delivery of activities in line with the policies and procedures of The Scout Association.

The Trustees would like to place on record their thanks to all adult volunteers, young leaders, supporters and parents whose continued commitment enables the Group to provide Scouting opportunities to so many young people within the community.

The Trustee Board considers that holding reserves equivalent to approximately three months of operating income represents a prudent level of financial resilience for the Group. At the year end the Group held reserves of approximately £6,000.

The District Executive Committee considers that the Scout District should also hold a sum enabling timely payment of headquarters membership fees and fulfilment of liabilities to third parties in the event of Scout Group Closures within the District jurisdiction.

The Group held reserves of approximately £1200 against this at year end. The reserves increased more than usual due to limited activities as a result of Pandemic induced 'Social Distancing' although this will be offset by a temporary reduction in District membership fees introduced to help protect the finances of individual Scout Groups


