Council's report for the year ended 31st December 2022

The Council presents its annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2022.

Reference and Administrative Details of the Charity, its Trustees and Advisers

The charity was registered with the Charity Commissioners on 24th August 1978, registered number 507834.

Reference and administrative details, and details of the Trustees of the charity, are shown on page 1.

Structure, Governance and Management

The operation of the charity is governed by a definitive constitution which was last amended on 11th April 2001. The charity is an unincorporated association.

The power to appoint officers is vested in the association. Any new officers would be appointed by the existing officers and trained accordingly.

The Council consists of 11 members, of whom 10 are elected and 1 is appointed by the Museum management to represent the Museum staff. Members are elected for 2 years and can stand for re-election at the end of the 2 years.

At the Annual General Meeting in May 2022, Pauline Mountain, Richard Hassall and were unanimously re-elected to serve until 2024.

Mary Durose, Ian Lawley, Janet White, Peter Wilson and Keith Bloor are standing for re-election. There remain 3 vacancies for new trustees.

Objectives and activities

The object of the association is the education of the public by promotion, support, assistance and improvement of the Potteries Museums and Art Gallery, Stoke-on-Trent through the activity of a group of friends.

As at 31 December 2022, the group consists of 306 members, including 8 members of the Council, 74 life members, 2 honorary members and 15 patrons. The officers of the charity are detailed on page 1. 5 Council meetings were held during the year to discuss planned activities. The Friends' group's activities are communicated to members via the four-monthly newsletters, Museums' website, Facebook page and twitter and an email circulation list.

Chair's report for the year ended 31st December 2022

In January 2022 the Friends were notified by Stoke-on-Trent City Council of proposals to reduce the annual revenue budget of the museums service by almost one third with effect from 1 April 2022. To achieve this, the City Council intended to close PMAG on two days each week, close Gladstone from November to April each year, combine the staff of PMAG and Gladstone, and reduce the number of staff by some 40%. Among the staffing measures proposed was the deletion of the posts of Senior and Assistant Curators of Ceramics. Other measures proposed included a reduction in the level of financial support provided for the Etruria Industrial Museum and Ford Green Hall.

The Friends Council took the view that all the proposals were inappropriate, and prepared detailed submissions to the City Council opposing the proposals, within the City Council's consultation period. Many other organisations and individuals (including members of the Friends) also submitted objections, with particular reference to the removal of the ceramics posts. The proposals, and the strength of opposition, received a great deal of media coverage locally and nationally, and the Friends were given the opportunity to express their views on a number of occasions. Our views were also made known through our website and social media, and our members were kept informed by email and the newsletter.

In February we were informed that the City Council intended to continue with their proposals, save that the position of the Ceramics Curators was to be further reviewed; so far we have not been notified of the outcome of that review. Accordingly, from 1 April PMAG has been closed to visitors on Mondays and Tuesdays (apart on Tuesdays from school party visits), and on 1 November Gladstone was closed (apart from a number of special events) until 1 April 2023. The proposed staff reductions also took place on or soon after 1 April.

During the consultation period we had meetings with members and senior officers of the City Council to discuss our concerns. One positive outcome of the situation is that regular meetings between representatives of the Friends' Council and senior officers of the City Council have continued on a quarterly basis.

Late in 2022 representatives of the Friends were invited, with other interested organisations to take part in discussions about the City Council's future proposals for PMAG, as set out in a "Development Prospectus & Vision" document.

The proposals include transfer of the City Archives from the Central Library to PMAG, scheduled to take place in 2023. The Friends Council have expressed broad support for this proposal, so long as it can be achieved without any detriment to the museums service. We have not yet been given any further details of this proposal.

Further proposals include an extension and reconfiguration of the ground floor, reinterpretation of the galleries, and in the longer term a further gallery extension. These proposals will largely depend upon the availability of external capital funding, and again we await further details.

October 2022 saw the opening of the "Majolica Mania" exhibition, with financial support from the Friends, and several other organisations. The exhibition was originated, with support and expertise from the PMAG ceramics curatorial team, by the Bard Graduate Centre Museum, New York, and has only been seen in New York and Baltimore, before coming to PMAG for its final showing.

In November, Miranda Goodby, Senior Curator of Ceramics, kindly gave a talk for members of the Friends about the exhibition, and about the development and manufacture of majolica ware in the Potteries and in the USA.

Following our 2022 AGM in May, we received a talk from local artist, designer and potter, Louise Adams, formerly Design Director for Royal Crown Derby, about her own creative life, and those of other members of her family.

In October, in partnership with staff of PMAG, including Mel Firman and Ben Miller, we applied for a grant under the City Council's Cultural Anchor Grants scheme, for funding of £11,600 for a project, to be based at Gladstone, intended to raise awareness of local residents about the history of pottery manufacture in the particular area where they now live.

As detailed on page 11, we have awarded funding towards a number of acquisitions and/or projects.

During 2022 there were five formal meetings of the Friends' Council, and several informal consultations between members between meetings. Keith Bloor, who retired in 2020 as Museums Manager, became a member of the Friends Council, and later in the year was appointed Vice-Chair. Keith's expertise and experience have already been of great benefit. I thank all of the members of the Friends' Council for their work and commitment to the museums during the year.

There were three issues of the Friends' Newsletter during 2022, and we much appreciate Glenn Roadley's editorship of the newsletter, and thank all who have contributed. The newsletter is particularly valued for the information and insights provided by members of the curatorial team related to their particular areas of responsibility, and for information about forthcoming events and activities.

In accordance with the requirements of the Charities Commission, the Secretary of the Charity has duly completed and submitted the charity's annual return.

Financial review

There was a deficit of receipts over payments for the year of £1,988 (2021: deficit £7,624).

During the year the Friends paid grants of £600 Cast silver zoomorphic object, £1,100 Iron Age Coin Hoard, £414 Etruria Industrial Museum towards coal, £34,800 towards the costs of the Majolica Mania Exhibition..

The charity's reserves are split between restricted and unrestricted funds as appropriate.

The Friends Council consider that the level of unrestricted funds carried over to reserves is sufficient to facilitate all donations in the foreseeable future. The charity relies solely on voluntary help for the administration of its activities.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31st December 2022

1. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost accounting rules and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities".

The accounts have been prepared on a receipts and payments basis.

Income recognition

Income is recognised when received.

Income received from events for use in specific areas:

- To help finance the cost of restoration of the Museum's Spitfire.
- To help finance the cost of ongoing research into the Staffordshire Hoard.
- To be used only for the benefit of the Gladstone Museum.
- To be used for "coal" for Etruria Industrial Museum.
- To be used for the new display of Josiah Wedgwood's First Day Vase.
- To be used for the purchase and display of the Leekfrith Torcs.

is designated as restricted funds.

Expenditure

Expenditure is charged when paid, inclusive of irrecoverable value added tax.

Direct charitable expenditure comprises those costs directly incurred in the pursuance of the group's charitable activities.

2. Subscriptions

As stated in the accounting policies subscriptions are accounted for on a cash basis and are included in income when they are received.

3. Grants payable

During 2021 the Friends approved and paid (unless otherwise stated) the following grants:

- £ 9,000 towards the renovation of the Spitfire Gallery
- £ 1,100 for the acquisition of a Post-medieval Gold Finger Ring
- £ 210 for a proposed Wild Flower Area
- £ 200 to Ford Green Hall towards Fruit Trees
- £ 2,300 towards the acquisition of Detmold prints, as yet unpaid
- £ 1,000 towards a proposed Majolica Mania exhibition, paid in 2022
- £ 420 to Gladstone Museum for the acquisition of a blind, no longer required
- £ 90 remaining balance for Wild Flower Area, no longer required

During 2022 the Friends approved and paid (unless otherwise stated) the following grants:

- £ 2,300 towards the acquisition of Detmold prints, as yet unpaid
- £ 600 Cast silver zoomorphic object
- £ 1,100 Iron Age Coin Hoard
- £ 414 Etruria Industrial Museum towards coal
- £34,800 towards the cost of the Majolica Mania Exhibition, £4,500 was funded from the Alan Jones Memorial Fund
- £ 820 Pierced early-medieval silver penny, as yet unpaid

4. Funds held as intermediary body

The Friends have from time to time applied for grants on behalf of certain projects. The Friends do not release the funds until they have received confirmation of authorised expenditure. At 31st December 2022 no funds were held as an intermediary body.
