1st Broughton Scout Group Trustees' Annual Report Year ended 31 March 2025

The Group has in place systems of internal controls that are designed to provide reasonable assurance against material mismanagement or loss, these include two signatories for all payments and comprehensive insurance policies to ensure that insurable risks are covered.

Governance and internal controls

The Trustees meet on a regular basis and are provided with comprehensive financial information including budgets and prior year reports. Overall progress is monitored at these meetings and any concerns addressed.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the Group are as a unit of The Scout Association. The aim of The Scout Association is to promote the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities. The method of achieving the aims of the Association is by providing an enjoyable and attractive scheme of progressive training, based on The Scout Promise and Law and guided by adult leadership. The Charity is operated solely by volunteers ranging from Trustees, Beaver, Cub and Scout Leaders, Assistant Beaver, Cub and Scout Leaders and support staff. Total volunteer numbers are 44 (2024: 45).

Achievements and performance

Since the start of the year we have been busy across all sections. Wednesday beavers is still of concern due to lack of leaders, but we are working to resolve the problem. Numbers are healthy across all sections and our squirrels are doing very well.

Awards wise we are doing well with awards over all sections in particular Chief Scout Gold awards. All sections have managed to attend their respective county days and weekends and great fun has been had by all. Leaders are slowly getting to grips with the new membership system that was rolled out during the year.

The Explorer Room has been refurbished to a very high standard at no cost to the group, and the hut committee keeps doing its work around the hut with all those little jobs getting ticked off the list.

The lease for the field is nearly ready to sign, but building works at the adjacent primary school will impact us and the works will certainly have some impact on our activities including bonfire night. Discussions will be needed to mitigate the problems.

Overall we are in good health and the Trustees would once again like to take this opportunity to thank all the leaders, their supporters and volunteers for their hard work and dedication in making 1st Broughton such a successful Scout Group.

Financial review

The financial results show a surplus of £2,713 for the year. Income for the year amounted to £55,930 and expenditure was £53,217. Monthly subscriptions were £15 for the whole year compared to a part year in the previous year which resulted in an overall increase in donations and legacies. Activity continued in the year in relation to obtaining land for the site of a new hut and terms of agreement by way of a lease were drawn up with Blackburn Diocese at a cost to the Group of £8,340. As the new hut will be a longer term project monies were expended on hut repairs to the existing hut and there was also an increase in charges raised by District in relation to capitation fees.

The Group has cash at bank and in hand of £118,198 at 31 March 2025 and total net assets of £157,614. The Group maintains these reserves to fund large capital assets.

Reserves Policy

The Group's policy on reserves is to generate sufficient reserves to cover large capital projects and to hold sufficient resources to cover six months operating costs. Any additional reserves will be used to subsidise youth activities to use up excess reserves.

Investment Policy

The Group does not have sufficient funds to invest in longer term investments. The Group has therefore adopted a risk adverse strategy to the investment of its funds. All funds are held in cash using only mainstream banks or building societies.

Plans for future periods

We have been offered a 125 year lease for land on which the current scout hut sits together with the adjacent field by Blackburn Diocese and the group has covered the cost of preparing a draft lease. The lease has yet to be ratified due to outstanding matters which are being resolved by the Diocese and therefore we expect the lease to come in to force during the year to 31 March 2026.

Year ended 31 March 2025

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a registered charity in England and Wales and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is 19 Lotton Close, Fulwood, Preston PR2 8YS.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102. The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland, the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from January 2019.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably;
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established;
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

- Buildings 10% straight line
- Site infrastructure 10% straight line
- Fixtures and fittings 25% straight line

Assets begin to be depreciated in the first full month following the month of acquisition.

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

The Group's governing documents are those of The Scout Association. They consist of a Royal Charter, which in turn gives authority to the Bye Laws of the Association and The Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association. The Group is a trust established under its rules which are common to all Scouts. The Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association. The Group is managed by the Group Executive Committee, the members of which are the "Charity Trustees" of the Scout Group which is an educational charity. As Charity Trustees they are responsible for complying with legislation applicable to charities, and are provided with appropriate training. This includes the registration, keeping proper accounts and making returns to the Charity Commission as appropriate. The Committee consists of three independent representatives, Chair, Treasurer and Secretary together with the Group Scout Leaders, individual section leaders and parent's representation and meets every four months. This Group Executive Committee exists to support the Group Scout Leader in meeting the responsibilities of the appointments and is responsible for the maintenance of Group property, the raising of funds and the administration of Group finance, the insurance of persons, property and equipment, Group public occasions, assisting in the recruitment of leaders and other adults, appointing any sub committees that may be required, and appointing Group Administrators and Advisors having regards to appropriate qualification and experience, other than those who are elected. The trustees have given regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

Toby Barnett stood down as Group Scout Leader in July 2023 and we would like to thank him for all his hard work in leading the Group forward over the past number of years. We have been fortunate that Simon McGlen has agreed to take on the role and wish him well for the future.

We have also had a change in the Group Chairman with Andrew Acklam taking on the role. Andrew is very experienced, having held the role as District Chairman for quite a number of years and we are very grateful that he has agreed to take on the role.

The Trustees would once again like to take this opportunity to thank all the leaders, their supporters and volunteers for their hard work and dedication in making 1st Broughton such a successful Scout Group.

Financial review

The financial results show a surplus of £5,496 for the year. Income for the year amounted to £48,161 and expenditure was £42,665. During the year monthly subscriptions were increased from £10 to £15 which resulted in an overall increase in donations and legacies, and increases in interest rates resulted in investment income increasing from £1,990 to £4,100. Work was undertaken on the hut including repairs with capitalised expenditure of £5,138 for flooring and heaters. There was also an increase in charges raised by District in relation to capitation fees.

The Group has cash at bank and in hand of £105,432 at 31 March 2024 and total net assets of £154,901. The Group maintains these reserves to fund large capital assets.

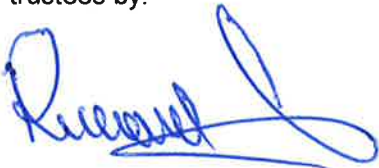

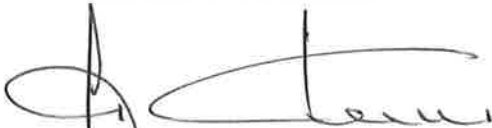

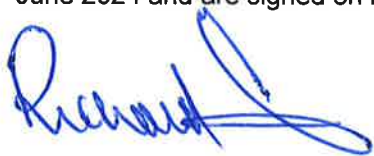

Total volunteer numbers are 48 (2022: 47).

Achievements and performance

This year has been another successful year for the Group. In 2021 Scout HQ introduced a new section for groups called Squirrels for young people between the ages of four and six. In June 2022 we started our own Squirrel section and it is proving to be very successful with 24 members complemented by four leaders. There is also a long waiting list of young people wanting to join the Squirrel section.

We have continued to recover from all the restrictions imposed by Covid 19 and all sections have been taking part in many District and County events. We have also seen a rise in the number of young people who have gained their Chief Scout's Award, the highest award in Scouting.

The Trustees would once again like to take this opportunity to thank all the leaders, their supporters and volunteers for their hard work and dedication in making 1st Broughton such a successful Scout Group.

Financial review

The financial results show a surplus of £810 for the year. Income for the year amounted to £42,221 and expenditure was £41,411. Equipment was purchased in the year including tents and paddleboards and this generated an additional depreciation charge. In addition costs were incurred in maintaining the boiler and heating system which contributed to the reduction in the surplus from the previous year of £9,366.

The Group has cash at bank and in hand of £101,197 at 31 March 2023 and total net assets of £149,405. The Group maintains these reserves to fund large capital assets.

Reserves Policy

The Group's policy on reserves is to generate sufficient reserves to cover large capital projects and to hold sufficient resources to cover six months operating costs. Any additional reserves will be used to subsidise youth activities to use up excess reserves.

They consist of a Royal Charter, which in turn gives authority to the Bye Laws of the Association and The Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association. Objectives and activities

The objectives of the Group are as a unit of The Scout Association. The aim of The Scout Association is to promote the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities. The method of achieving the aims of the Association is by providing an enjoyable and attractive scheme of progressive training, based on The Scout Promise and Law and guided by adult leadership. The Charity is operated solely by volunteers ranging from Trustees, Beaver, Cub and Scout Leaders, Assistant Beaver, Cub and Scout Leaders and support staff. Total volunteer numbers are 48 (2022: 47).

Achievements and performance

This year has been another successful year for the Group. In 2021 Scout HQ introduced a new section for groups called Squirrels for young people between the ages of four and six. In June 2022 we started our own Squirrel section and it is proving to be very successful with 24 members complemented by four leaders. There is also a long waiting list of young people wanting to join to join the Squirrel section.

We have continued to recover from all the restrictions imposed by Covid 19 and all sections have been taking part in many District and County events. We have also seen a rise in the number of young people who have gained their Chief Scout's Award, the highest award in Scouting.

The Trustees would once again like to take this opportunity to thank all the leaders, their supporters and volunteers for their hard work and dedication in making 1st Broughton such a successful Scout Group.

Financial review

The financial results show a surplus of £810 for the year. Income for the year amounted to £42,221 and expenditure was £41,411. Equipment was purchased in the year including tents and paddleboards and this generated an additional depreciation charge. In addition costs were incurred in maintaining the boiler and heating system which contributed to the reduction in the surplus from the previous year of £9,366.

The Group has cash at bank and in hand of £101,197 at 31 March 2023 and total net assets of £149,405. The Group maintains these reserves to fund large capital assets.

Reserves Policy

The Group's policy on reserves is to generate sufficient reserves to cover large capital projects and to hold sufficient resources to cover six months operating costs. Any additional reserves will be used to subsidise youth activities to use up excess reserves.

This Group Executive Committee exists to support the Group Scout Leader in meeting the responsibilities of the appointments and is responsible for the maintenance of Group property, the raising of funds and the administration of Group finance, the insurance of persons, property and equipment, Group public occasions, assisting in the recruitment of leaders and other adults, appointing any sub committees that may be required, and appointing Group Administrators and Advisors other than those who are elected. The trustees have given regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

The Group has in place systems of internal controls that are designed to provide reasonable assurance against material mismanagement or loss, these include two signatories for all payments and comprehensive insurance policies to ensure that insurable risks are covered.

Governance and internal controls

The Trustees meet on a regular basis and are provided with comprehensive financial information including budgets and prior year reports. Overall progress is monitored at these meetings and any concerns addressed.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the Group are as a unit of The Scout Association. The aim of The Scout Association is to promote the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities. The method of achieving the aims of the Association is by providing an enjoyable and attractive scheme of progressive training, based on The Scout Promise and Law and guided by adult leadership. The Charity is operated solely by volunteers ranging from Trustees, Beaver, Cub and Scout Leaders, Assistant Beaver, Cub and Scout Leaders and support staff. Total volunteer numbers are 47 (2020: 51).

Achievements and performance

This year has been heavily impacted as a result of Covid 19 lockdowns and the restrictions on the numbers who were able to meet up in outside spaces.

To support ongoing engagement with the sections within the group, we have run virtual meetings which have been well supported by the young people in the sections. Detailed plans and risk assessments have been developed to support the return of face to face activities.

The Trustees would once again like to take this opportunity to thank all the leaders, their supporters and volunteers for their hard work and dedication in making 1st Broughton such a successful Scout Group.

Financial review

The financial results show a surplus of £25,768 for the year. This surplus has resulted from the support provided to the Group by the Government through Covid 19 grants which amounted to £22,638. Both income and expenditure decreased during the year due to the absence of any camps and limited activities.

The Group has cash at bank and in hand of £115,924 at 31 March 2021 and total net assets of £139,229. The Group maintains these reserves to fund large capital assets.

During the year the Group took the opportunity to modernise the existing Scout hut through new kitchen and toilet facilities. At the end of the financial year these works were unfinished and no interim bills had been provided by the contractor. Due to the uncertainty over the value of works provided at the balance sheet date, there has been no recognition in these accounts of the ongoing works.

Reserves Policy

The Group's policy on reserves is to generate sufficient reserves to cover large capital projects and to hold sufficient resources to cover six months operating costs. Any additional reserves will be used to subsidise youth activities to use up excess reserves.

Investment Policy

The Group does not have sufficient funds to invest in longer term investments. The Group has therefore adopted a risk adverse strategy to the investment of its funds. All funds are held in cash using only mainstream banks or building societies.

Plans for future periods

We continue to be engaged with Blackburn Diocese to obtain land to the side of Broughton Church for the use as a site for a new Scout Hut. These negotiations have been impacted by the resignation of the vicar of Broughton Church and organisational changes within Blackburn Diocese. We hope to conclude the negotiations during 2021 following which detailed plans for fundraising and development will be drawn up.

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a registered charity in England and Wales and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is 16 Marina Drive, Fulwood, Preston, PR2 9SB.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011. The accounts (financial statements) have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

3. Accounting policies *(continued)*

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Buildings	-	10% straight line
Site Infrastructure	-	10% straight line
Fixtures and fittings	-	25% straight line

Assets begin to be depreciated in the first full month following the month of acquisition.

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.
