The charity organises a variety of events for the benefit of the whole parish which aim to be enjoyable, interesting and informative. These include regular coffee mornings, talks on subjects such as local history, events to commemorate national dates of importance such as coronation parties, VE day commemorations and so on. Other social events include quiz nights, ceilidhs, summer barbecues and our annual vintage car rally.

The hall is available for hire by private individuals and other organisations at a very modest charge and is widely used by other village organisations to hold their regular meetings or fund raising events such as the Cropton Women's Institute and St Gregory's Church.

Opportunities for physical and mental wellbeing include weekly yoga classes and bowls nights.

The charity has a scheme for the donation of books and other reading material which are made available for purchase at the hall at a minimal charge.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Following the previous year's upgrade to the outdoor space at the Village Hall we have continued to improve the physical condition of the building with the installation of new windows around the hall. Decoration of the main hall has been carried out and new a laptop and projector screen provided for presentations.

Kitchen facilities have been improved with the installation of a new range cooker and a range of new cooking equipment which has greatly eased the catering work for longstanding regular events and allowed an expansion of the catering options which can be accommodated for social gatherings.

The number and range of events this year has been expanded and these have been very well attended, allowing the opportunity for parishioners to have much more social interaction and community engagement in a parish which is very rural and might otherwise be very isolating, particularly in the winter months.

Towards the end of the year the village came together to purchase a small piece of derelict land on the outskirts of the village. The money was raised by donation and this income is reflected in the 2024 accounts. The purchase has subsequently been completed early in 2025 and volunteers have been carrying out repairs and improvements with a view to this area becoming a peaceful, communal outdoor space for all to enjoy.



Analytical Review

Income

Income overall has increased by £31,432 (348%) from the prior year mainly driven by one off Donations income of £27,890 raised for the purchase of a small piece of land on the outskirts of the village and partly driven by an increase in Events income of £2,804 (48%) due to an increase in the number and range of events being held.

Expenditure

Overall Costs increased by £747 (5%) driven by higher Event costs of £1,631 (76%) following the increase in Events mentioned above, and an increase in Repair & Renewals of £1,242 (17%) due to window repairs in 2024. Utilities costs are down this year by £-1,421 (-47%) from 2023 due to better deals gained, and Miscellaneous expenses are also down this year by £-1,083 (100%).

The accounts show that cash assets are £46,728 on 31/12/24.

I feel the accounts and record keeping of the financial information of The Cropton Reading Room are fair and accurate.
