REPORT OF THE TRUSTEE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2024

The Trustee presents its Report together with the Financial Statements of The Thomas Howell's Education Fund for North Wales ("the Charity") for the year ended 31 July 2024. The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in Note 1 to the Financial Statements and comply with the Charities Act 2011, Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, and the documents governing the constitution of the Charity.

Reference and administrative information

The legal and administrative details set out in Appendices A to C and F form part of this Report.

Structure, governance and management

Origin

The Charity is governed by a Charity Commission Scheme dated 11 August 2000.

The Charity has its origins in the Will of Thomas Howell who died around 1539. The original bequest provided for orphan girls. Over the years this was extended to encompass the establishment, maintenance and benefit of girls' schools in Wales including Howell's School, Denbigh. In 1975, The Foundation of Howell's School, Denbigh, was established as a separate charity to govern the School. Following the sale of the School in 1997 to Howell's 2000 Limited, both the name and objects of the Charity were updated to their current form by the Scheme issued on 11 August 2000.

Following the closure of Howell's School, Denbigh in 2013, four restricted funds (Howell's School Prize Fund Trust, Howell's School Special Grants Fund, Mary Brearley Music Fund and Ranjit Singh Travelling Scholarship Fund) whose beneficiaries were pupils at the school were, with the approval of the Charity Commission, wound up and their assets transferred to be used for the charity's general purposes.

Governance and management

The Charity uses The Drapers' Company for the provision of administration services, which are provided on a shared basis with other charities under common trusteeship of the Company. Additional administrative services are provided to the grant-making panel by a part-time Administrator who is based in North Wales.

The Charity is a participant in The Drapers' Charities Pooling Scheme and receives income from Thomas Howell's Trust both of which are administered by The Drapers' Company.

The Drapers' Company is the Charity's Trustee and acts through its Court of Assistants ("the Court"), which meets at least six times a year, agrees overall strategy and takes all policy decisions. These policies are developed and refined by three Standing Committees which oversee grant allocation, finance and investments respectively, and once decisions have been taken and ratified they are implemented by the Company's Officers.

The operation of the Committees is reviewed annually by the Court for effectiveness against the overall aims and objectives of the Company and its Charities.

The Court takes decisions on the award of grants above £50,000. The Trustee delegates authority for the award of grants up to £50,000 and the implementation of the agreed grant-making policy to the Charities Committee. The Committee membership is drawn from the Court and other members of the Company. Composition of the Committee is reviewed and confirmed each year. The Committee, which meets five times a year, has clearly defined terms of reference.

Governance and management (continued)

Each year the Court normally elects at least one new member from the Company membership who is given specific training on trustee duties and obligations by the Company's Officers and external providers before taking up their position. In addition, all members of the Court receive regular and ongoing trustee training in relevant areas.

To enable effective and efficient grant-making in support of education in North Wales, the Trustee established a small Grant-Making Panel of local people with relevant expertise and experience, chaired by a member of the Court. The Panel meets three times a year to review and assess grant applications on behalf of the Trustee, reporting to the Charities Committee. The Panel may approve individual awards up to a maximum value of £20,000. Grants in excess of this sum are subject to the approval of the Charities Committee or the Court dependent upon the size of the grant.

Key management personnel remuneration

The Trustee considers the members of the Court as trustee and together with the members of the Charities Committee and Grant-Making Panel, who have limited and clearly defined terms of reference, comprise the key management personnel of the Charity in charge of directing and controlling the Charity and overseeing the running and operating of the Charity on a day-to-day basis. The members of the Court, in their capacity as Trustee, give their time freely and no trustee remuneration was paid in the year.

Trustees are required to disclose all relevant interests and register them with the Director of Philanthropy & Governance and in accordance with the Charity's policy withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises. Neither the Charity nor any of the members of the Court, as Trustee, have interests with beneficiary charities, but any such interests would be disclosed.

Risk management

The principal risks faced by the Charity concern the performance of its investments and the capacity of the Trust to make appropriate and effective grants.

The Trustee mitigates the investment risk through the regular review of investment strategy and portfolio performance by the Investment Committee and professional advisors. The Common Investment Fund (The Drapers' Charities Pooling Scheme) in which the Charity's assets are invested also assists in spreading the risk. The capacity of the Charity to make appropriate and effective grants is enhanced by the Grant-Making Panel which includes members directly involved in primary, secondary and higher education provision in the area of benefit. In addition, the skills and experience of the Charities Committee, to whom the Grant-Making Panel reports, and the Court together with well-defined terms of reference reduces the risk of ineffective grant-making.

Statement of trustee responsibilities

The Trustee is responsible for preparing the Trustee's Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Statement of trustee responsibilities (continued)

The law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the Trustee to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the Charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustee is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP (FRS 102)
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in business.

The Trustee is responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. The Trustee is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In the opinion of the Trustee the Charity is adequately resourced to continue to benefit those in need of assistance, in accordance with its objects. The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Objectives and activities for the public benefit

The object of The Thomas Howell's Education Fund for North Wales is to promote the education of young people under the age of 25 who are resident in or undergoing education in the area of benefit in such ways as the Trustee decides. The area of benefit is North Wales which the Trustee defines as being formed by the six Districts of Anglesey, Conwy, Denbighshire, Flintshire, Gwynedd and Wrexham.

The Charity aims to support a broad range of educational initiatives within the area of benefit by the award of grants to institutions and organisations. It strives to increase student inclusiveness across primary, secondary, further and higher education, particularly in areas of high deprivation.

The objectives for the year are shaped by these aims with a view to distributing available income in an efficient and effective way in order to maximise the educational benefit to young people.

The Trustee has complied with the Charities Act 2011, having due regard for the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives, setting the grant-making policy and in awarding grants.

Grant-making policy

The Thomas Howell's Education Fund for North Wales invites applications for funding from institutions in the most marginalised areas of North Wales by using the knowledge and expertise of Panel members to target those most in need. It welcomes unsolicited appeals from organisations and institutions whose projects or initiatives meet the policy guidelines. Grants awarded are either one-off payments or recurring grants for up to three years subject to specific performance conditions. Further appeals from organisations will not normally be considered for three years from the date of the final grant award. Regular contact is maintained with recipients of grants, including an annual evaluation report, for monitoring purposes. Details of the policy guidelines and the application procedure are available on the Company's website.

Grant-making policy (continued)

The following policy guidelines are set by the Trustee for the award of grants:

- 1 Grants will normally be made to schools, institutions and organisations, not to individuals.
- 2 Grants will usually be directed towards the public sector of education, although particularly deserving cases within the private sector may also be supported.
- 3 Small capital projects that enhance education or enrich the learning experience of pupils and students are supported.
- 4 Funding will be provide for projects that make the most of the outstanding North Wales countryside, build leadership and personal qualities and raise environmental awareness.
- 5 Grants can be used to fill gaps in educational provision or resources that are not eligible for funding by the Local Education Authority or other public body.
- 6 Grants can be used to enrich the learning experience of pupils who need encouragement.
- 7 Grants can be used to support initiatives that broaden perspective on subjects taught at secondary school.
- 8 Grants are provided to improve literacy and numeracy at primary school.
- 9 Grants can be used to broaden the horizons of young people within their local communities.
- 10 Initiatives to improve school governance may be supported.

Achievements and performance

Grants totalling £320,437 were distributed from unrestricted funds to 52 organisations and institutions during the year from The Thomas Howell's Education Fund for North Wales.

Of the 52 grants awarded, 36 grants totalling £203,367 were to primary, secondary or special schools to support pupils in disadvantaged communities. These awards included 19 grants totalling £106,612, mainly to primary schools, to create or develop existing outdoor learning areas, to enhance facilities for outdoor learning opportunities, to provide a range of outdoor play equipment or for the development of forest school provision, nature gardens or other green areas within school grounds.

Grants were also provided towards small capital projects and to support curriculum extension programmes and other education initiatives which presented pupils with opportunities to take part in activities which would normally be beyond the means of the school and contributed to the personal development of pupils or enriched their learning experience. These included grants to three secondary schools in Denbighshire, Conwy and Gwynedd to create an achievement centre for disengaged pupils, a wellbeing room, and towards the provision of science and technology equipment. Grants were also provided to eight primary schools to provide LEGO Spike kits and other resources to develop pupils' programming skills. Two grants to primary schools supported the purchase of books and other resources to improve the literacy of pupils. A grant of £10,000 was provided to the Brilliant Club towards its Scholars Programme in North Wales state schools to inspire and support students to access the most competitive universities. Dangerpoint, which teaches children to spot danger inside and outside the home, received the final of three annual grants of £10,000 to deliver safety education visits to local children. Grants were also provided towards woodworking equipment to develop pupils' practical skills, to support a bilingual storytelling project at primary schools across North Wales and to promote the learning of STEM subjects.

Achievements and performance (contd)

A block grant of £30,000 was awarded to Wrexham University which was used to make small grants to individual students in their first year of study mainly for course equipment and travel costs. This proved to be the most efficient and effective means of providing financial assistance to a large number of students experiencing financial hardship.

Opportunities for young people, particularly those from disadvantaged backgrounds, to develop their musical or artistic education and talent were supported by a number of grants. Sistema Codi'r To was awarded £10,000 to support music lessons and resident musicians for pupils at two primary schools in Caernarfon and Bangor. The Aloud Charity received a grant of £10,000 towards the Only Boys Aloud choirs across North Wales. The Benedetti Foundation received £5,000 towards a five-day music residency with young people from Flintshire to inspire young musicians. OPRA Cyrmu Cyf, a Welsh medium opera company, was awarded £5,150 towards its workshops with local schools. Ty Pawb, a community resource in Wrexham which provides a creative space for emerging and established artists from all backgrounds, received £7,320 for its project to enable local young people to create an original work of art with a world leading artist.

Grants were also provided to charities delivering youth work, particularly to local young people who are not in education, employment or training or to organisations or which build leadership and personal qualities of young people through outdoor education activities.

Two grants totalling £3,295 were returned during the year as the conditions under which the grants were awarded could no longer be met.

Financial Review

Total incoming resources increased slightly from £346,226 to £351,714. Governance costs were £6,713 (2022/23: £5,924). Expenditure on charitable activities decreased from £397,272 to £342,689 reflecting a reduction in the level of grants awarded from unrestricted funds from £374,347 to £317,142. Net incoming resources from unrestricted funds of £9,025 resulted in a year end balance on unrestricted funds increasing to £291,403.

Investment Policy and Performance

There are no restrictions on the Charity's power to invest. The investment objective of the Trustee is to combine income and capital growth in a conservative manner. In keeping with this aim, the Trustee regularly reviews the allocation of investment assets of those charities for which it has responsibility. The Charity's investments at 31 July 2024 consist of holdings in The Drapers' Charities Pooling Scheme (Registered Charity Number 1061675). The Trustee does not take any specific social, environmental or ethical considerations when carrying out the investment objective.

Reserves

The Trustee reviews the reserves policy on an annual basis. Trustee has considered the level of general free reserves which are appropriate for the Charity and will hold the minimum unrestricted reserve necessary to fund working capital requirements. This is not expected to exceed 10% of the Charity's unrestricted income. Unrestricted reserves at the year end were £291,403 and therefore in excess of this policy. This Charity will expend surplus unrestricted reserves over the medium term until the minimum level is reached.

Plans for future periods

The grant-making policy remains as set out in this Report. The Trustee, through the Grant-Making Panel, will continue to carefully monitor and evaluate grants awarded to ensure effective support for a wide range of educational institutions and organisations in the area of benefit.

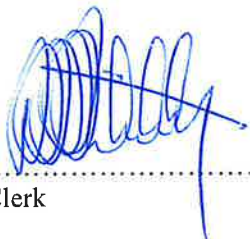

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE TRUSTEE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2024

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Thomas Howell's Education Fund for North Wales for the year ended 31 July 2024 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, and the notes to the financial statements, including significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charity's affairs as at 31 July 2024 and of its incoming resources and application of resources for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the charity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Conclusions relating to going concern

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the trustee's use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the charity's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from when the financial statements are authorised for issue.

Our responsibilities and the responsibilities of the trustee with respect to going concern are described in the relevant sections of this report.

Other information

The trustee is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report, other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the course of the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether this gives rise to a material misstatement in the financial statements themselves. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information; we are required to report that fact.

Matters on which we are required to report by exception

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters in relation to which the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 require us to report to you if, in our opinion:

- the information given in the Report of the Trustee is inconsistent in any material respect with the financial statements; or
- the charity has not kept sufficient accounting records; or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns; or
- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit.

Responsibilities of trustees

As explained more fully in the Trustee's Responsibilities Statement set out on pages 2-3, the trustee is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the trustee determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the trustee is responsible for assessing the charity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the trustee either intends to liquidate the charity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditors' responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

We have been appointed as auditors under the Charities Act 2011 and report in accordance with regulations made under that Act.

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. The specific procedures for this engagement and the extent to which these are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud are detailed below.

Identifying and assessing risks related to irregularities:

We assessed the susceptibility of the charity's financial statements to material misstatement and how fraud might occur, including through discussions with representatives of the trustee, discussions within our audit team planning meeting, updating our record of internal controls and ensuring these controls operated as intended. We evaluated possible incentives and opportunities for fraudulent manipulation of the financial statements. We identified laws and regulations that are of significance in the context of the charity by discussions with representatives of the trustee and updating our understanding of the sector in which the charity operates.

Laws and regulations of direct significance in the context of the charity include the Charities Act 2011, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and guidance issued by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

Audit response to risks identified:

We considered the extent of compliance with these laws and regulations as part of our audit procedures on the related financial statement items including a review of financial statement disclosures. We reviewed the charity's records of breaches of laws and regulations, minutes of meetings and correspondence with relevant authorities to identify potential material misstatements arising. We discussed the charity's policies and procedures for compliance with laws and regulations with members of management responsible for compliance.

During the planning meeting with the audit team, the engagement partner drew attention to the key areas which might involve non-compliance with laws and regulations or fraud. We enquired of management whether they were aware of any instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations or knowledge of any actual, suspected or alleged fraud. We addressed the risk of fraud through management override of controls by testing the appropriateness of journal entries and identifying any significant transactions that were unusual or outside the normal course of business. We assessed whether judgements made in making accounting estimates gave rise to a possible indication of management bias. At the completion stage of the audit, the engagement partner's review included ensuring that the team had approached their work with appropriate professional scepticism and thus the capacity to identify non-compliance with laws and regulations and fraud.

There are inherent limitations in the audit procedures described above and the further removed non-compliance with laws and regulations is from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, the less likely we would become aware of it. Also, the risk of not detecting a material misstatement due to fraud is higher than the risk of not detecting one resulting from error, as fraud may involve deliberate concealment by, for example, forgery or intentional misrepresentations, or through collusion.

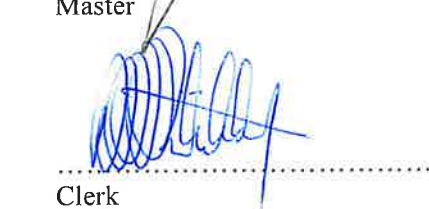

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2024

1 Accounting Policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed asset investments, and applicable accounting standards in the United Kingdom. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Second edition of the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The Charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair' view. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective 1 January 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has now been withdrawn.

1.2 Going concern

The Trustee considers that there are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The most significant areas of adjustment and key assumptions that affect items in the accounts are to do with estimating the final quarter's dividend income from the Charity's equity holdings in The Drapers' Charities Pooling Scheme. With respect to the next reporting period, 2024-25, the most significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying value of assets held by the Charity are the level of investment return and the performance of investment markets (see the investment policy and performance and risk management sections of the Trustee's annual report for more information).

1.3 Income

All income is recognised once the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Voluntary income

Donations are recognised when the Charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance before the Charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the Charity and it is probable that those conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Investment income

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the Charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank. Dividends are recognised once the dividend has been declared and notification has been received of the dividend due. This is normally upon notification by our investment advisor of the dividend yield of the investment portfolio.

1.4 Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure (continued)

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated or apportioned to the applicable headings.

The provision for a multi-year grant is recognised at its present value where settlement is due over more than one year from the date of the award, there are no unfulfilled performance conditions under the control of the Charity that would permit the Charity to avoid making the future payment(s), settlement is probable and the effect of discounting is material. The discount rate used is the average rate of investment yield in the year in which grant award is made. This discount rate is regarded by the Trustee as providing the most current available estimate of the opportunity cost of money reflecting the time value of money to the Charity.

1.5 Investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument representing shares in The Drapers' Charities Pooling Scheme and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet using the proportionate amount of net asset value of the Scheme pool as at 31 July 2024. The statement of financial activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluation and disposals throughout the year.

The Charity does not acquire put options, derivatives or other complex financial instruments.

The main form of financial risk faced by the Charity is that of volatility in equity markets and investment markets due to wider economic conditions, the attitude of investors to investment risk, and changes in sentiment concerning equities and within particular sectors or sub-sectors.

1.6 Funds

The Charity maintains two types of fund:

Permanent Endowment Fund - where the capital is held in perpetuity to generate income for furtherance of the Charity's objects. This income and its application are accounted for in the Charity's unrestricted fund as there are no restriction on its use.

Unrestricted Fund - where the fund is not restricted as to use, within the Charity's objects.

1.7 Contingent liabilities

A contingent liability is identified and disclosed for those grants resulting from:

- a possible obligation which will only be confirmed by the occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the Trustee's control; or
- a present obligation following a grant offer where settlement is either not considered probable; or
- the amount has not been communicated in the grant offer and that amount cannot be estimated reliably

1.8 Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

GOVERNANCE

- 1 The Drapers' Company is the Trustee and acts through its Court of Assistants ("the Court"), which meets at least six times a year and takes all policy decisions. Three Standing Committees oversee grant allocation, finance, and investments respectively while the running of the Almshouses is overseen by the Court of Wardens. Further details are given below. Appendix B lists Members of the Court and the Standing Committees.
 - 2 The Court acts as the main Board of Trustees, setting policy guidelines, approving Financial Statements, budgets and major investment decisions. Detailed work is handled by the Company's Standing Committees and the Court of Wardens.
 - 3 The Investments Committee, the Court of Wardens and the Finance and General Purposes Committee usually meet between five and ten times a year, according to need, whilst the Charities Committee, which is responsible for the allocation of grants, meets five times a year.
 - 4 Once decisions have been taken and, if necessary, amended or ratified by the Court, they are implemented by the Company's Officers
 - 5 The operation of the Committees is reviewed annually by the Court for effectiveness against the overall aims and objectives of the Company and its Charities.
 - 6 Each year the Court elects at least one new member from the Company membership and they are given specific training on trustee duties and obligations by the Company's Officers and external providers before taking up their position. In addition, all members of the Court receive regular and ongoing trustee training in relevant areas.

Court of Wardens

- 1 To oversee the day to day management of the almshouse Charities other than any financial or strategic aspects relating to the almshouses dealt with by the Finance and General Purposes Committee.

Investments Committee

- 2 To determine investment strategy for the Charities and to monitor and oversee the management of investments including property, equities, bonds, cash and other classes of investment.
- 3 To make recommendations to the Court as to the allocation of assets among different classes of investments having regard to risk diversification and where applicable best practice for charities.
- 4 To keep the performance of the Charities' investment advisors under review and to make recommendations to the Court on their appointment, terms of reference and fees, without detracting from the responsibilities delegated to the Clerk.
- 5 To examine the performance of the Charities' investments at intervals of not more than three months and to report to the Court.
- 6 To approve all lettings, purchases and sales of investment property, rent reviews and other property transactions and to make recommendations to the Court for approval of all substantial investment property transactions.
- 7 To keep the condition of the Charities' investment properties under review.
- 8 To ensure that the Charities' investment properties are properly and adequately insured.

Finance and General Purposes Committee

- 9 To be the supervisory body for the financial strategy and financial control and keep the financial arrangements of the Company under review, including the preparation and presentation of accounts and budgetary control.
 - 10 To present to the Court not later than their December meeting in each year the final audited Financial Statements and Accounts in respect of Charities for the previous year ended the 31 July duly reviewed by the Charities' Auditors.
 - 11 To review and advise on the Charities' compliance with all legal, audit and regulatory requirements and best practice.
 - 12 To ensure that risk assessments for the Charities are duly carried out and that recommendations are implemented.
 - 13 To set the Charities' grant-making budgets in each Company Year, subject to the approval of the Court and generally to review and advise on all matters relating to the financial strategy and financial arrangements of the Charities.
