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**Chairman's Report
for the year ended 31 December 2022**

The death of her Majesty Queen Elizabeth in September brought to a close a reign of extraordinary service. The Queen enjoyed extensive gardens at Sandringham, which are an excellent example of a late Victorian landscape park, significantly improved in Edwardian and later times. Sandringham offered the Queen seclusion and she regarded it as one of her special places. We mourn her passing.

Earlier in 2022 we celebrated Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee. The undoubted highlight of our year was the Platinum Jubilee competition in which 5000 Norfolk primary school children painted or drew a posy for the Queen to celebrate the Jubilee. Following this the winner, Sila Hamed of North Denes Primary School in Great Yarmouth, was presented to the Princess Royal at the Norfolk Show in June. The competition was devised and arranged by committee member Hilary Talbot and the bulk of the credit was due to her.

The drought in the summer of 2022 brought many challenges to garden and park owners. It is a sign of what may be in store for us all as a consequence of climate change.

Over 40 members enjoyed a three day trip to the Cotswolds brilliantly organised as usual by Karen Moore. We saw Hidcote and Kiftsgate Court Gardens there and other gardens on route including one at Bledlow created by the late Lord Carington. The present Lord Carington was there to greet us.

Another outing was to Burghley House near Stamford. *'The garden of surprises'* there, designed by NGT Vice President George Carter, was a particular feature capturing our attention. It uses traditional ideas of fountains, shell grottoes, and a mirror maze, but in 21st century style.

During 2022 our members visited 5 gardens. These were at Elmham House, Bagthorpe Hall, Lexham Hall, Shropham Vicarage and Hunworth Hall. We were extremely grateful to all the garden owners. We truly appreciate all the time and trouble they take in bringing their gardens to a viewable state and hosting us on open days.

We also had three talks during the year. The first was an illustrated talk by Joe Whitehead, Head Gardener at Burghley House and was principally about the walled garden project at Burghley. John Knowles talked about Beverley Park at Timaru in New Zealand, Friar Park and Bagshot Park where his forebears had been head gardeners. Finally Andrew Sankey talked about 6 gardens at Kightshayes Court, Hestercombe House, Powis Castle, Hodnet Hall Dorothy Clive Garden and Chatsworth.

Our half yearly Magazine continues to receive high praise. It is a marvellous way to keep in touch with our large membership and full credit is due to its editors Clive Lloyd and Sue Roe.

Finally, I wish to give all our committee members my sincerest thanks for all their hard work. I believe Norfolk Gardens Trust is firing on all cylinders and this is only possible as a result of their individual industry.

Structure, governance and management

The unincorporated Trust was established by a Declaration of Trust dated 6 December 1988 and registered as a charity with the Charity Commission on 30 August 1989.

Appointment of Trustees

The Trust has a policy for the recruitment of Trustees. Nominations are considered from any source, but any potential Trustee would be expected to bring specific skills and/or experience to the Trust. In selecting new Trustees, the Trust follows the guidance laid down by the Charity Commission.

Induction and training of Trustees

New Trustees are briefed on their legal obligations under Charity Law, the content of the Declaration of Trust and recent financial information of the Trust. Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate the undertaking of their role.

Volunteers

A great contribution is made by volunteers (who are members) including Trustees who devote many hours organising events for the benefit of our members and guests.

Risk management

The Norfolk Gardens Trustees have assessed the major risks to which they believe the Trust is exposed and are satisfied that systems have been established to mitigate against them. The Trust has appropriate public liability insurance arranged through the National Association: The Gardens Trust.

Public benefit

The Trustees of The Norfolk Gardens Trust accept the need to have regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. They recognise that it is their responsibility to ensure that the benefits are realised in Norfolk and further afield by promoting all aspects of gardening both within the membership of the Trust and the wider community

Charitable objectives

- To promote the education of the public on matters connected with the arts and sciences of garden land.
- To preserve, enhance and re-create, for the education and enjoyment of the public, whatever garden land may exist or have existed in and around Norfolk.

Main activities, achievements and performance

Financial review

On 31 December 2022 the charity held bank and cash balances of £23,361.38. These unrestricted funds are held in order to maintain the activities of the charity. The charity still has an investment, started on 7 November 2014, when £45,000 was invested by purchasing units in the M&G Charifund income fund in order to generate additional funds. An additional £10,000 was invested in this fund on 1 July 2019. The value of this fund at 31 December 2022 is £55,837.25.

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Chairman's Report for the year ended 31 December 2021

Since our last year end I am sorry to report the death of our President The Lord Walpole. He had, in that capacity, been a great supporter. Indeed he often chaired our Annual General Meetings. We mourned his passing.

The Marquess of Cholmondeley has most graciously agreed to be our new President. He has also been a great supporter of the Trust in the past and we look forward to welcoming him to some of our events.

It would be remiss of me not to mention the death of Sir Timothy Colman KG. during the year. Sir Timothy had a marvellous arboretum near Norwich and our members were privileged to be allowed to see it in 2017.

Although covid has been an immensely tiresome issue throughout the year our members were delighted to visit no less than 7 gardens during the year. These were at Elmham House, Black Horse Cottage, Wretham Lodge, Swaffield Hall, Wolterton Hall, Fiddians Follies at Upwood Farm and Salle Hall. These openings were very well attended and we are hugely grateful for the opportunities to visit these very special places. We recognise all the huge trouble and time the garden owners went to bring their gardens into a viewable state and remain most grateful.

In the Autumn we had two live talks, one by Jim Paine of Walnut Tree Gardens Nursery at Attleborough entitled Botanical Gardens: A grand Tour and the other by Simon Harrap entitled Norfolk Wild Flowers. In addition we held the Tate Talk 2021 on zoom. This was delivered by Tim Richardson and his subject was Cambridge College Gardens. He had a book published in 2019 with that title.

Towards the year end the Trust published a book entitled Enticing Paths, a treasury of Norfolk Gardens and Gardening. In hardback with 480 pages and over 500 illustrations Enticing Paths, edited by Roger Last, presents a huge and fascinating range of Norfolk Gardens and garden related projects and is a worthy successor to our other three publications.

At the year end we were sorry that the former chairman Peter de Bunsen retired from the Committee. Anyone who has visited his and his wife's garden at Kirby Bedon will know what talented gardeners they both are. We are truly appreciative of all that Peter has done whilst serving on the Committee.

The finances of the Trust remain in good shape, in part, due to the large membership the Trust has. This is due, in large measure, to the talented and extensive work undertaken by members of the Committee to whom I pay my sincerest thanks'.
