



Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 December 2023

Statutory Guidance Statement

The Trustees hereby confirm that this report has been prepared in the light of "The Charities (Accounts & Reports) Regulations (NI) 2015" and agreed with full regard to the Commission's Public Benefit Requirement statutory guidance.

Structure, governance and management

SEC is an independent local church constituted by a Trust Deed executed on 22nd February 2015 and amended on 4th October 2018. The Trust Deed has been updated as required to reflect changes in the active trustees. Although the Trustees have legal responsibility for the affairs of SEC, the day-to-day spiritual care is carried out by the elders and the day-to-day practical matters are overseen by the deacons and a Premises Committee. The elders form the majority of the board of Trustees. The Trustees meet at least twice a year; the elders meet at least once a month and the deacons twice per year or in the interim as required. SEC registered with the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland on 8 May 2015 as required by the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008 (as amended) and comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in October 2019 and the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2015. SEC has appointed David McCracken FCA as honorary independent examiner of the financial statements. The Trustees would like to thank David for his willingness to fulfil this role and time it has taken him to examine the Assembly's records and form his report.

Risks

The Trustees consider that there are two main areas of risk facing SEC, as follows:

Financial – SEC almost entirely relies on the income received from freewill offerings, without which the Fellowship would not be able to achieve its charitable objectives. However, should there be a reduction in offerings the Trustees would commence a program of cost reduction to ensure the financial stability of the Fellowship. The Trustees would like to take this opportunity to thank the members for their continued giving to SEC, which is most generous, and we give praise to God for this.

Reputational – SEC normally carries on a wide range of ministries with children. In order to mitigate any risk in this regard it has comprehensive policies and procedures in place, which are managed by a designated person and routinely monitored by the Trustees.

Objectives and activities

We are an independent evangelical church set up to advance the gospel of Jesus Christ both in belief and faith and in the outworking of that faith in practical terms for the benefit of the world at large. The objectives of SEC, as stated in the Trust Deed and reflected in the purposes of the charity as declared to the Charities Commission are:

- 1 To advance the gospel of Jesus Christ among the general public, in accordance with biblical principles and practice both in the UK and abroad in a manner consistent with the statement of faith;
- 2 To prevent or relieve poverty among those in hardship;
- 3 To relieve those in need due to their adverse circumstances;
- 4 To advance education among those who are unable to avail of education due to their adverse circumstances.

These objects may be pursued in the United Kingdom or abroad at the discretion of the Trustees.

SEC organises a wide range of meetings and activities including (but not restricted to):

- Sunday Morning worship service
- Breaking of Bread Communion Service
- Prayer Meeting,
- Missionary Focus
- Youth Fellowship
- SEC Kids
- SEC Youth
- Sunday School
- Tree Tots (Parent and Toddlers group)
- Alpha Course
- Adult & Young Adult Bible study groups

During the year SEC has continued to support a number of local Christian workers and organisations.

Achievements and performance

The objects of SEC are spiritual and qualitative and therefore not easily measured in many respects. Nonetheless it has been a pleasure to see God's handiwork in seeing a number of people find Christ as Saviour, being baptized or joined the church fellowship. A high proportion of members continue to be engaged in serving the Lord in a variety of ways in SEC and a significant number of our young adults continue to serve the Lord within and outside the Fellowship.

Public Benefit arising from our Activities

For the purposes of this report each of the activities of the church has been assigned to one of the following objectives. It should be noted that many of the activities relate to more than one objective.

1. Advancing the gospel of Jesus Christ among the general public

Activities within the church

The elders are responsible for the spiritual direction of SEC and to that end they meet to discuss and pray over themed series which incorporate both a gospel challenge for those who have not yet come to faith as well as teaching from the Word of God to encourage and build up those at varying stages along their spiritual journey. Topics are given to speakers who are a mix of those within SEC as well as visiting guest speakers. The Fellowship does not employ any full-time paid teachers or preachers.

The Alpha Course took place over a period of 13 weeks during the Spring. It was well attended and as a result some came to faith in Jesus Christ and some were restored to faith and are now regularly attending services and activities within the fellowship.

We very much regard our Friday evening children and youth activities as advancing the Gospel. Most of those attending attend no other church and those activities present a mix of fun, games and recreation as well as a gospel epilogue. Some of the young people have attended other seasonal activities such as Easter and Christmas services and events.

We had our annual Holiday Bible Club in August which saw the largest number of children attend since we moved to Silverbirch in 2001. Many parents sat in with the children as the young adults from SEC presented the Bible lessons using a Lego theme which went down a treat with the children. The week culminated in a Fun Night (one of a number during the year) which again saw huge numbers support the event in spite of the inclement weather for the time of year.

While the Sunday School numbers in SEC remain small and are almost entirely made up of children of parents from within the Fellowship, the kids enjoy the time upstairs during the main service and it is evident the lessons taught are being taken in and retained by the children.

Tree Tots provides a relaxed environment for parent of babies and toddlers to meet, make new friends, get away from the house and enjoy a safe space to share a cup of coffee while the children enjoy the range of toys and activities. It has a craft table, singalong, visit from Santa at Christmas and is highly regarded by health visitors in the Bangor area who often refer new Mums to the church Tree Tots on a Monday morning.

Families who attend Tree Tots send their children to our other activities (SEC Kids and Holiday Bible Club) when their children out-grow the parent and toddlers group. Monday mornings regularly saw 60 parents (each with at least one child) during the year.

In addition to its in-person ministries, the church uses its presence on social media platforms as a ministry to those of the congregation who are unable to attend for various reasons. The main church YouTube channel, which has been available since we were forced to go exclusively on-line during the 2020 pandemic, has been viewed in other countries (we are aware as far away as Australia), including some hard-to-reach nations.

The SEC website carries all its Sunday morning services and viewing figures remain encouraging. The focus of evangelism includes both corporate gatherings and individuals sharing their faith within their circle of influence

SEC church members supporting the advancement of God's Word outside SEC

SEC, has many members who are involved in Christian organisations outside the church. SEC provides financial gifts, use of premises and prayer support for these activities

We maintain a close relationship with our neighbouring 2 churches, Ballycrochan Baptist Church and Ballycrochan Presbyterian and at least 4 times each year we meet for a joint praise service hosted by each church on a rota basis. We also have a joint children's gospel activity club known as CSSM (Children's Special Service Mission) and one of this Fellowship's young adults, Luke Sherwin, is co-leader of that.

There is also a CSSM in the centre of Bangor – the largest in Northern Ireland. So many children subscribe to attend that event it has to extend over a two-week period. Another of our members, Aaron McAlease, is co-leader of that.

Two of our members, Luke Sherwin and Olivia Anderson are both employed by Christian Unions Ireland (CUI). Both are full time although they must partially support themselves while CUI provides the rest of the required support. They work among the students on the Belfast Campuses and are heavily involved in encouraging the team of CUI workers who reach out to students with innovative programmes and events. Olivia writes, "I play a small part in helping students to understand the opportunity they have to reach people with the Gospel at university. I am also excited to learn from them as they show Christ's love on campus!"

Scripture Union NI also employs several workers around the province as part of its E3 programme. Local churches are affiliated with schools within their locality to assist the E3 workers in delivering programmes to the children within the schools with the Head Teacher's permission. This Fellowship is affiliated with Ballymagee Primary School and one of our members, Alison Kyle, is the person who represents Silverbirch Evangelical Church.

Supporting the advancement of God's Word abroad

SEC Missionaries – Peter and Debbie Turtle

SEC supports the work of missionaries Peter and Debbie Turtle in Moldova as well as their two children. These missionaries work in the rural villages of the northeast region of Moldova, bordering Transistria. In 2023 and into 2024 they have been involved with a local regional church, established a children's work, Bible study and the opening of a small church hall in a remote village.

Their work in the local communities includes visitation, delivering aid (in the form of food parcels and essentials) to the sick, poor and underprivileged people of the area. They are also involved in preaching and teaching while Debbie is involved in after-school and recreation activities with the children and local ladies. Due to the very poor condition of housing stock in this area and lack of rental properties, SEC was able, with the assistance of another charitable trust, to support Peter and Debbie with an interest free loan to enable the purchase and remedial work to a small property to be used as a base for the work in the region.

2/3. Preventing and relieving poverty among those in financial hardship or disadvantaged due to other adverse circumstances

Shades of Hope

SEC regularly supports Shades of Hope. This is a charity (NIC 103169) set up and managed by two members of SEC, Samuel and Zara Ssenyonga to provide support to children and families in Uganda. Shades of Hope has 4 key programmes.

1. Child Sponsorship. Children are sponsored by individuals or organisations through school and on to further education or vocational school. Sponsors support the children by providing uniforms, equipment, school meals and schoolbooks.
2. Street / Slum Outreach project. This programme brings boys off the streets of Kampala to a safe and secure environment (a halfway house) to care for them, feed them, school them and, where it is practical and appropriate to do so, find a next of kin to rehome them with family. A Social Worker works on the Ugandan side to carry out the necessary background checks and administration on the children and family.
3. Gift for Life/ Entrepreneurship provides finance to individuals to start their own small business and to become self-sufficient. The people of Uganda are a proud people and rather than accept charity, prefer to be given the tools and equipment to start their own businesses. This programme also provides training including

money management to ensure small business get off to a good start. Businesses already successful include pig farming and a sewing business.

4. Youth camps and workshops. In previous years we have been running young people's camps and workshops so we can continue to inspire the young people both socially and spiritually. In August 2021 we ran a young people's camp/workshop for 3 days and the themes were:

- Business start-ups and sustainability
- Social change and character building
- General discussions and questions about the Bible.

Special Offerings

At least once a year SEC also takes a 'Special Offering' where an area of the world facing a particular plight is the focus. In 2023 the Moroccan Earthquake and the Libyan flood were the focus where information was presented to the church and a lunch of soup and rolls was provided for the congregation, who were asked to contribute the price of their usual Sunday to the disasters. As usual, the fellowship gave much more than expected. Monies were passed through Samaritan's Purse to distribute by their workers in the affected areas.

We also have special offerings where a specific need of a struggling fellowship is brought to our attention such as Patrizio & Jennifer Zucchetto serving in Naples, Italy who were interviewed as part of one of our Sunday Services in September 2023 and an offering was taken to help them in the work of their relatively new church which, as part of their mission, reaches out to those in need in that locality.

SEC is also affiliated, along with other local churches, with 'Foodbank Bangor' which is part of a nationwide network of foodbanks, supported by The Trussell Trust, working to combat poverty and hunger across the UK. We have a shopping trolley available in the church foyer to collect items which members contribute by adding one food item to their weekly shopping for donation to the Foodbank. These are then delivered to the local Foodbank depot.

Missionary Focus

Approximately once a month SEC has a meeting known as our Missionary Focus where representatives from organisations serving the Lord across the globe come to report on the activities of their mission. Hearing from organisations devoted to spreading the gospel among hard-to-reach peoples (such as Mizpah Outreach working in Greece and eastern Europe who were with us in the Autumn 2023) keeps us informed while also helping SEC members pray more intelligently about areas of need. Often literature and options to subscribe to organisations' communications including newsletters are

available. Those who attend have the opportunity to give financially to the work of the organisation.

4. To advance education among those who are unable to avail of education due to adverse circumstances.

We invite and financially contribute to organisations focussed on education such as 'Hamsayeh International' which works in a schooling capacity among the Farsi-speaking people in London) to educate them in UK culture and customs and to teach English to these folk who have little or no local language abilities. In 2023 we also supported the charity 'Kidz4school', a charity dedicated to bringing education to the children of Tanzania using finance raised from supporters such as SEC. All of this is, of course, supplemental to SEC's own charity, Shades of Hope which is currently supporting some 54 children through primary and secondary education and on to further education thus equipping these children for well paid jobs to support themselves, their families and ultimately the local communities.

Other important activities that enable SEC to function

The activities above are only part of those that go on by members who see it as their calling, ministry and responsibility to serve the Lord. A lot of other work goes on, often unseen, that enables SEC to function as a fellowship of God's people.

We have a dedicated team on the AV desk which not only ensures the services are heard and seen but is also responsible for uploading the services to our YouTube channel.

We have a catering committee which provides hospitality when required, at events, fundays and providing refreshments at funerals for families and friends.

The cleaning and maintenance of the premises is meticulously carried out on a weekly basis and the grounds and lawn around the church building are cared for by some of our members. A Premises Committee ensures fire and safety equipment is maintained and carries out regular assessments, calling in professionals when required.

And, of course, regular visitation goes on by many members and seasonal food hampers delivered at Christmas to those who are elderly and appreciate the ongoing contact with the fellowship.

Basis of independent examiner's report





Constitution & Governance

Silverbirch Evangelical Church or SEC is an independent local church dating back to the late 19th century when it was known as Holborn Hall. The church is currently constituted by a Trust Deed dated 04 October 2018 which replaced the previous governing documents of 22 February 2015 and 15 October 2012.

The Trustees have legal responsibility for the church and meet at least twice a year. Day-to-day oversight of its affairs, with agreed terms of reference, is delegated to three committees, one of elders, one of deacons and the Premises Committee. Each of these committees may delegate responsibilities further in any way that is conducive to the administration of the charity.

Purposes of the Charity

The church was set up to advance the gospel of Jesus Christ, both in belief and faith and in the outworking of that faith in practical terms for the benefit of the world at large. This is reflected in its Vision Statement:

“To be a growing and maturing community of believers united by devotion to Jesus Christ as Lord, love to one another and knowing, obeying and proclaiming the Word of God while seeking to reach out to our neighbourhood with all the resources God has given us.”

It applies its income and energies to the following objects:

- a. To advance the gospel of Jesus Christ among the general public, in accordance with biblical principles and practice both in the UK and abroad in a manner consistent with the church’s statement of faith;
- b. To prevent or relieve poverty among those in hardship;
- c. To relieve those in need due to their adverse circumstances; and
- d. To advance education among those who are unable to avail of education due to their adverse circumstances.

Statutory Guidance Statement

The Trustees hereby confirm that this report has been prepared in the light of “The Charities (Accounts & Reports) Regulations (NI) 2015” and agreed with full regard to the Commission’s Public Benefit Requirement statutory guidance.

Fulfilment of Purposes

Purpose a) While it is difficult to assess achievements when the purpose is spiritual and qualitative in nature, it is clear that the members of the church are a vibrant community who seek to share their faith both individually and collectively through activities within and outside of the church. People have come to faith for the first time and members have been reinforced in their faith through Bible teaching and associated activities. Two members have continued to serve with Christian organisations in Northern Ireland, in supporting students.

During the period SEC has continued to support some Christian workers whose sphere of service is outside Northern Ireland. Our missionary family is fully active in

Moldova and under the auspices of their local church are engaged in sharing the gospel and meeting the needs of an impoverished local people.

The Trustees gain personally from the teaching of the church in fulfilling this purpose but only in the same way as any member of the church, or indeed of the public.

Purpose b) & c) Members of the congregation give generously to fulfil these purposes and their donations have allowed us to respond to needs, as they have arisen, where people find themselves in hardship for whatever reason. Any potential harm by causing individuals to rely on the support has been mitigated by its temporary nature. Supply is criteria-driven and controlled, and so only issued in the case of genuine emergencies. The church continues to support a local foodbank with donations of foodstuff on a regular basis.

The work of our missionaries in Moldova and of our members responsible for Shades of Hope has also contributed significantly to these purposes.

Purpose d) In keeping with its policy of providing opportunity for the congregation to support at least one Third World charity, the church again provided regular financial support to Shades of Hope, an organisation set up to promote the welfare of children in Uganda by removing them from the dangers of living on the streets and providing activities for their development. Shades of Hope envisions a Ugandan community where all people irrespective of their wealth and background, have access to the fundamental needs of life, including education and donates funds for school fees, uniforms, meals and school supplies.

Activities and Achievements

2022 was a year that saw a recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic in that most activities returned to normal and attendance at Sunday services was restored. Some new activities commenced.

Each year the leadership of every activity in the church report to the Trustees and Elders who in turn collate these responses in a full report to the congregation as a whole on the activities carried out during the year. The following summarised reports are based on that Annual Report and are offered here to give a fuller understanding of how the church purposes and objectives are addressed.

The reports show that people are being added to the church, members are stepping up to give sacrificially of their time and effort to see the Christian message proclaimed and people encouraged, God's word is being taught and our young people are growing in their knowledge and love of the Lord.

Please note that the reporting period for the Charity Commission coincides with the financial year for the church, but that the reporting period for most of the activities of the church runs from September to April, but it is to be hoped that despite this disconnect the reports will give an insight into the regular activity of the church.

Tree Tots

Tree Tots had a busy, but fun-filled year with 50+ children and 40 adults on a weekly basis for crafts, play, snack and singing. Through weekly interaction we have built up relationships with the children and their parents or carers. It has been wonderful to watch all the children grow through the year and gain confidence in socialising with others and watching their personalities develop. Parents have expressed their gratefulness in having somewhere to come and have a chance to speak to other adults, get a cup of tea and coffee made for them as well as enjoying the scones, which always go down well! We had a couple of special events throughout the year; Santa visiting the children at our Christmas party and an end-of-year party complete with bouncy castle and inflatable play area.

Missionary Focus

Our missionary focus comprises many different ways of providing the church opportunities to learn more about and support missionary work overseas both practically and through informed prayer. The Ladies Missionary Group had just one visiting speaker, Marilyn Campbell of Zambia currently involved in organising and overseeing a building project.

Containers are still being sent out to Africa, so SEC has been able to send parcels to Zambia as in the past. These contained clothing and gifts which could be used as Sunday School prizes. Others held baby layettes, each one made up with knitted or crocheted items as well as nappies and baby toiletries to be given to new mothers in the Maternity Hospital.

As in previous years we also provided packages for the Seamen's Christmas parcels, distributed in Belfast port.

As well as missionary focus for ladies, there have been a number of other opportunities to support and learn of mission work by the wider fellowship. At a coffee event we learnt about Meninadanca which is a charity which works with trafficked and vulnerable young girls in Brazil. The group who came included young women who had been rescued through the programme and they told their own very moving stories. There was a strong sense that what is being done is an outworking of God's love in desperate situations.

At another coffee morning we heard from a student how she was just about to leave for her Gap year aboard Operation Mobilization's Logos Hope. Living on a ship with many different nationalities has specific challenges; there are practical issues, there is adjustment to different cultures, there is working in confined spaces, there are storms and seasickness, all with the aim of opening up the ship to large numbers of visitors in each port. The ship had an amazing reception in Iraq, the first opening into the Arab world.

Other reports included news from missionaries who are now back in Greece and able to stay for longer visits now that travel restrictions have eased. They are still heavily involved with refugees, and are finally able to work on completing the camp centre which should be in use soon.

In the autumn we heard the moving and inspiring story of a man who turned to Christ from a Muslim background. He continues to work on translations to provide literature for reaching out to Muslims.

The emphasis on teaching and producing literature was also one of the aspects highlighted when we had the report from Mission Africa (MA). Working in Burkina Faso, Chad, Nigeria and Kenya within the different contexts of extreme poverty and wealth, the usefulness of literature and the need for teaching is a definite focus for the Mission.

Renewed contact was made when 'Kids4school' came along to update us on the ongoing projects in Tanzania. It was 5 years since we last heard from the organisation and it was so encouraging to hear of the child sponsorship programmes, the water purification equipment that has been installed, the building projects and the new administration block that is now well under way in that part of the world.

Home Group

Our home group meets each Thursday evening from September to June each year. The group numbers 14 with usually at least 10-12 in attendance each week. After tea and coffee and a short time of prayer we then have a Bible study. This year we have been working our way through 1 Corinthians. We always seek to give time to discuss each passage in line with the level of contribution made by the group members. Accordingly, we can sometimes spend an entire week on a single question while at other times we can cover several in one evening. As we have discovered over the parallel ministry on 1 Corinthians on Sundays there have been many practical and challenging issues to address. It has proved to be a real blessing for the group as a whole and we look forward to whatever will follow when our new season begins in the autumn.

SEC on Sunday

Our regular worship and teaching service was back to normal in 2022 but technology that proved essential through the pandemic is still used to extend the reach and impact of our teaching programme.

DVDs and audio CDs are also produced and distributed to those without Internet access who are unable to be present.

Additional teaching was achieved by links to online audio teaching being emailed out each Saturday evening.

SEC Children's Church

Numbers this past year have varied considerably, with occasional visitors adding to the total which remains small due to a lack of children of the appropriate age. We endeavour to provide age-appropriate and engaging follow-up activities and discussion to reinforce the lessons and the younger children in particular enjoy the practical activities. This year we have used a variety of resources (books and DVDs)

We had a 2022 summertime Bible craft, when a Bible verse or story was illustrated by fun craft activities and in autumn we followed the church plan, exploring the story of Joseph and his family on their many adventures. For our Nativity, the children told the Christmas story in their own words as a pre-recorded voice-over to go with their videoed actions.

In the New Year, the children looked at some of the amazing miracles of Jesus and discovered that He has authority over nature, disease and death and has power to provide and to save because he is the Son of God. This led into the story of Easter and an opportunity to give the children two Easter Story Puzzle pamphlets from the Good Book Company.

After Easter, we remembered how Peter met Jesus, how he learned from Jesus, how he betrayed Jesus and how he was forgiven and given a job to do. We are now exploring some of the exciting things that Peter and his friends in the early church did.

Schools Work

Scripture Union E3 Schools Workers have the amazing opportunity of leading school assemblies, supporting SU groups and taking a variety of lessons in schools all over NI. SEC takes the opportunity to support this work both financially and through volunteering.

For example Ballymagee Primary held three “Amazing Jesus” lessons with two P5 classes. These fun, interactive lessons include activities such as quizzes, challenges and drama and present three miracles of Jesus – Feeding 5000, Calming the Storm and Healing of Blind Bartimaeus. Other lessons were designed to help P7 children to prepare for the changes, choices and challenges as they move to post primary school. The ‘It’s Your Move’ book which each child received, is described as ‘your secondary school survival guide’ and is full of practical tips to help the first days and weeks go smoothly. These books are funded by SEC. The lessons encourage the children to look forward to an exciting stage in their lives while the stories of Daniel and Joshua help them to see how they might cope with the challenges ahead.

“The Amazing Journey” is run by Baptist Youth and returned to schools following Covid. The children were taken on a journey through the Bible as they moved around a large central display. At various stages the children met and heard Bible Characters telling their stories. Children had an opportunity to dress up in Bible time costumes and taste Bible time food. Each child received an Amazing Journey pack including follow-up activities and a copy of Luke’s gospel plus invitations to our Holiday Bible Club, to SEC Kids or for P7s, SEC Youth.

SEC Youth

Each Friday night we meet with around 15-20 young people. Although this is a small group, only around 5 or 6 have any church connections and the rest are friends that people have invited or people that we have got to know over the years. Some of these young people are learning about Jesus for the first time or have maybe only heard stories as young children or in school. This is a really exciting opportunity to be able to share both what it means to be a Christian and also to share who Jesus is and why that impacts our lives. We start each Friday night by having time to talk to the young people and have a tuck shop which has been a real success this year. This is a great time to hear how their week has been and it has been so encouraging to see them feeling comfortable to share with us and each other.

After this, one of the SEC Youth leaders gives a short talk. Throughout the year we have looked at various themes of how God makes a difference in our lives when it comes to change, worry, forgiveness etc. We have also looked at what it means to love one another by going through 1 Corinthians 13:4-7. Since Easter we have then been looking at the seven “I am” statements of Jesus to try and show the young people who Jesus really is and why this should impact our lives. This has been a real highlight with many of them saying “I am the Good Shepherd” as one that has really stood out to them.

There have been many encouraging conversations and questions with the young people feeling more open to share. Some have been saying how they have been seeing God working in their lives throughout this year.

Games included rounders, dodgeball, messy games and trips to mini golf or for ice cream. We are so blessed with a group of young people who care for and love one another and who welcome new people in so well!

Youth Fellowship meets two Sunday nights a month. Although there are only around 5 or 6 young people who attend, this is a great opportunity to go deeper into Bible studies and prayer. We seek to approach this in a way that serves the young people in our church well and allows them to deepen their faith to be lifelong disciples.

Young Adults Bible Study

This is organised for young people in the church who seek to grow in their knowledge of God and understanding of the Scriptures. We started this year with bi-weekly Bible studies in the book of Acts and averaged 6-8 people attending each time. We also introduced ‘Study Triangles/Squares’. These are small groups of 3-5 people who meet regularly. We have strategically placed experienced people in each group to help lead and disciple others in a peer discipleship format. We have three male and three female groups currently with 24 people engaged. It has been encouraging to hear what this smaller group format has meant to those for whom a larger group was intimidating. The groups meet at times which suit their members which means almost all are committed to attend. We have started with all

groups studying the book of James and we have been blessed talking through this very practical book of the Bible.

In-Reach

The in-reach team recognise that we all long to belong, we were created to live in community, and we thrive when we are connected with fellow believers in godly community. Community is where we form relationships and friendships with other believers, support each other, build social currency, have fun together and enjoy the family of God. The in-reach team's goal is to encourage an atmosphere of community within the church.

In 2022 we hosted Shinefest and enjoyed an evening interacting with family and friends from the church and the local community. This was an opportunity for us to host and welcome people into the church for a fun alternative to Halloween. For men we had a Pizza and World Cup football night, and for the women in the run up to Christmas we enjoyed a wreath making workshop.

Christmas saw the return of Carols in the Car-park alongside a variety of other Christmas events in church. We have hosted two board-game nights, celebrated Mother's Day and Father's Day, hosted an end of year party, had a Saturday morning walk and coffee at Crawfordsburn and started a visitation team. This visitation team started before Christmas with the delivery of Christmas baskets to those who may find getting out more challenging and continued in the run up to Easter with treat basket deliveries. Additionally, outside of these times we have had people visiting others more regularly. These times spent together often with a cup of tea are a delight, hearing stories, talking about what people have been reading in God's Word and at times praying together has been really encouraging.

We are excited for the work God has been doing and continues to do in building community within our church as we reach into our congregation and out into our wider community.

SEC Kids

This academic year we started up a new kid's club for all children in primary school – 'SEC Kids'. We met every Friday night from November to the end of June. Each night we start with games such as relay races, obstacle courses and parachute games. These games would include all the children, with some 1 to 1 games, like Connect-4, for those who preferred to sit out. We have a Bible story, quiz, songs and occasionally craftwork.

We used a book called "I AM – 40 Reasons to Trust God" for our weekly story. Each night we had a quiz and/or a craft to help recap the story. The leaders had lots of creative quiz ideas and challenges for the children once they had answered a question, which they really enjoyed. Craft time was also a great opportunity to chat to the children and build relationships with them.

We had a few theme/party nights throughout the year; we made soda bread pizzas, a sign using the children's painted handprints; we had a nativity themed pass-the-parcel and a visit from Santa at our Christmas Party; for Valentine's Day and Pancake Tuesday we made heart shaped waffles and pancakes and for St. Patrick's Day and Mother's Day we decorated biscuits.

We were also able to welcome parents in for tea, coffee and treats whilst club was on.

Holiday Bible Week

There were over 100 children through the church doors for a week in July for our Holiday Bible Club week.

Our club theme was Lego and the title 'Kingdom Builders' and through the week we looked at 4 Bible stories with the children:

- The Master Builder: The Creation Story;
- The Boat Builder: The Story of Noah;
- The House Builders: The Wise and Foolish Builders;
- The Mansion Builder: Based on John 14:2-6.

The Family Fun Night was well supported by friends and relatives of the children, and there was a short talk for the children and their parents. There was also a programme of stories, quizzes, craft, memory verses and much more.

Alpha

Alpha at SEC, now in its second year, met weekly over a 13 week period. Each week around 25 people attended, 5 of whom were new to the church. We were pleased to welcome others from SEC who contributed to the discussions and conversations around topics covered by the Alpha course. Some of our own young people attended leading to a renewed commitment. Some of our guests expressed interest in a follow up and some have continued to engage with us either through Sunday services, our church ministries or coffee catch ups.

The Turtle family – Moldova

The full-scale invasion of Ukraine by Russia brought fear and uncertainty to Moldova. As the refugees poured into Moldova, the local churches and OM mobilised to help these desperate people. As heart breaking as it was to hear their stories and see families displaced and separated by war, it was wonderful to see Christians working together and demonstrating God's love practically. Many opportunities arose to share our faith and we know that some of the Ukrainian refugees came to faith in Jesus.

Our time in Criuleni came to an end and the move to Șoldănești has proved to be a good one. We have a new church family, the girls have friends and the Pastor has a heart and vision for church planting. We were able to start a new children's program and outreach meeting in Cotiujenii. When we started there were four believers in the village but now there are seven. At the children's program we have 10-12 kids each Friday and Saturday. Thanks to our generous supporters we are also able to give the children a simple meal at each meeting. Other activities include summer children's camps, summer outreach and evangelism.

Shades of Hope

A trip to Uganda provided the opportunity to catch up with the on-going work in Shades of Hope and the workers. We are so thankful for their dedication to the work and, more especially, to the children. Like every charity, Shades of Hope has been adversely affected by escalating costs of materials as well as fuel prices. The workers must travel to and from Kampala and to the homes of the boys to monitor progress and to keep a close watch on the various programmes and we recompense their costs. School materials, cost of meals and medical bills are all increasing but we are prioritising the support and welfare of the children above all else.

We have 100+ young people being supported through our Child Sponsorship programme. Some 13 boys now occupy our 'Halfway House' and have been placed in a partnering school receiving an education while awaiting resettlement if deemed appropriate. We have supported 3 business start-ups over the year giving people the means and the dignity of supporting themselves and their families by providing materials to begin small businesses.

We are ever thankful to those who pray for us, for those who sponsor children and for the support of the SEC fellowship, without which Shades of Hope would not be possible.

Foodbank Bangor

SEC continues its affiliation with Bangor Foodbank and has continued to provide food donations.

Risk Management

1) Financial

The Trustees are content with the financial results for the year. The church relies almost exclusively on income received from the freewill offerings of the congregation, given as the outworking of their faith, to maintain the church activities and to express their love and concern for others. As such, generating income is not a primary objective of the church.

Both income and expenditure were up in comparison to the previous year, and once again expenditure outpaced income. Trustees are aware that this trend will need to be managed prudently and some attention given to encourage greater regular income. Although the current balance is low, financial projections show that they will be able to meet all on-going commitments in the year ahead. Appropriate measures are in place regarding the handling of cash and the use of the church accounts.

2) REPUTATIONAL


The members of the church fellowship are committed to the nurturing, protecting and safekeeping of the children and young people entrusted to its care. The safety of children and young people in SEC is paramount. Volunteers take time to build appropriate relationships with attendees.

All volunteers involved in children's work and/or working with young people are required to be 'cleared' by AccessNI. Likewise, trustees, elders and deacons require Enhanced Disclosure certification.

SEC leaders and volunteers continue to be vigilant regarding the safety of the children and young people in their care. There have been no safeguarding reports made in the past year. In 2022 forty-one volunteers had completed, or were in the process of completing, their Enhanced Disclosure. Today this number stands at 51, including those from outside SEC, volunteering with this year's summer scheme.

It is planned that more advanced and bespoke training, building on that undertaken in March 2022, will be completed by end of 2024. Tailored training will provide scenarios for group discussion to support volunteers in their identification and management of safeguarding situations.

Appendix

SILVERBIRCH EVANGELICAL CHURCH (SEC) STATEMENT OF FAITH

THE BIBLE:

The Bible, as originally given, is inspired by God. Through it God speaks to us and every word is infallible. It is our only authority for what we believe and practice.

GOD:

There is only one God revealed as three persons: the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. These three are one God, co-eternal and co-equal.

THE LORD JESUS CHRIST:

The Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, became man being conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He is both eternal God and a perfect, sinless man. Through His death on Calvary's cross He has provided the way by which sinful people can be reconciled to a Holy God and brought into a right relationship with Him. His death is the only sacrifice for sin and through it there is freedom from both the guilt and penalty of sin. On the third day after His crucifixion the Lord Jesus Christ was raised bodily from the dead and, in His risen glorified body, He ascended into heaven to the right hand of God the Father from where He will return in person for those who have believed in Him, both living and dead, and together they will be with Him forever.

MAN:

Man, created by God in His image and likeness, sinned. As a result, all men are sinful and guilty before God and subject to His righteous wrath and condemnation.

SALVATION:

Salvation cannot be earned nor is it deserved but is God's free gift given when a person repents and trusts Jesus Christ, acknowledging Him as both Saviour and Lord. As a

consequence they receive complete forgiveness of sins, become a child of God and receive eternal life which they can never lose. Those who remain unrepentant will not be saved but will suffer eternal punishment in a place prepared by God following a final judgement.

THE HOLY SPIRIT:

The Holy Spirit indwells every believer from the moment of conversion. His major task is to glorify the Lord Jesus Christ in the life of the believer by increasing Christ-likeness in character and behaviour. It is the Holy Spirit who gives the power to fight sin and to witness to the world. He also gives gifts to build up the church.

THE CHURCH:

There is one universal Church into which all believers are brought at the moment of conversion. Its Head is the Lord Jesus Christ. There are also local churches within the Church universal, of which we are one. The local church is made up of believers and has a threefold purpose:

To praise and worship God which directs its focus upwards (this involves prayer and communion).

To build itself up in love which directs its focus inwards (this involves among other things the development and application of spiritual gifting).

To witness to the world which directs its focus outwards (this involves both sharing the gospel of God's grace and doing acts of kindness in His name to those in need).

It should keep all three of these purposes in balance and seek to express each of them through effective ministry. Membership of the local church brings with it certain responsibilities, central to which is obedience to the Lord's command to love one another as He Himself has loved. This involves praying for one another, encouraging one another, sharing one another's burdens, showing hospitality and actively caring for each member of the church. Responsibilities also include supporting the activities of the church and engaging

in regular financial giving. The local church is self-governing under God, submitted to His Word, the Lordship of Christ and the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

ORDINANCES:

We observe two ordinances i.e. Baptism and the Lord's Supper. We believe that every person who comes to personal faith in the Lord Jesus Christ is commanded to be baptised.

Baptism expresses in symbolic form the individual's identification with Christ in His death, burial and resurrection. It marks obedience to Jesus Christ as Lord as the basis of a new life. It is the privilege of every believer to take bread and wine in remembrance of their Lord, thus proclaiming His death until He returns. To this meeting we welcome all who have come to personal faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and who want to obey Him.

LEADERSHIP:

The local church has a number of elders. The Holy Spirit calls and qualifies such men to be examples, teachers, pastors and overseers who are to care for the members of the church and maintain discipline in accordance with the Word of God. It is the responsibility of each member to support their elders in all matters of church life.

Basis of independent examiner's report


