Activities

Purposes: To promote the benefit of the male and female inhabitants aged between 14-25 (inclusive) but specifically those aged 18 – 25 (inclusive) of Craigavon Armagh, Banbridge, and their environs (which are hereby defined as the core areas) and regionally throughout Northern Ireland, in the Republic of Ireland and in Great Britain (for strategic and project work) without distinction, of political, religious or other opinion by associating with the Statutory Authorities, Voluntary Organisations and inhabitants in a common effort to advance education and to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for the protection of health and for recreation with the object of improving the conditions of life of the said inhabitants. “To foster, social and community development by providing facilities and services for the benefit of the 18 to 25 year old inhabitants* of Craigavon and Banbridge without distinction of sex, race or political or religious opinion, sexual orientation, marital status, disability, ex prisoner, or belonging to any minority or marginalised group.” To develop strategically targeted interventions for young people that contribute to addressing and managing sectarianism, racism, reasons for disadvantage and marginalisation to deliver training and education to them and those working with them.

TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

for the financial year ended 31 December 2024

The trustees present their Trustees' Annual Report, combining the Directors' Report and Trustees' Report, and the unaudited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2024.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Trustees' Report contains the information required to be provided in the Trustees' Annual Report under the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) guidelines. The trustees of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's constitution are known as members of the board of trustees.

In this report the trustees of The 1825 Project Limited present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements and finances for the financial year 31 December 2024.

The charity is a registered charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice (Charities SORP effective January 2015), the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

Principal Activity

The 1825 Project Ltd was established in 1998 and is a community-based training organisation that designs and delivers strategically targeted projects, programmes and interventions for young people which contributes to community development. It further delivers cross-border programmes and projects in partnership, generally as a lead agency, and trains other individuals and organisations to work with and for young people.

Mission, Objectives and Strategy

Objectives

The 1825 Project Limited was established in 1998 and is a community-based training organisation that designs and delivers strategically targeted projects, programmes and interventions for young people which contributes to community development. It further delivers cross-border programmes and projects in partnership, generally as a lead agency, and trains other individuals and organisations to work with and for young people.

Structure, Governance and Management

Structure

The 1825 Project Limited is a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is also recognised as a charity by the Charity Commission of Northern Ireland.

The day to day activities of the charity are administered by the manager who then reports back to the Trustees on a regular basis.

Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance

The project continued to deliver the Power to Empower Project which is funded under the National Lottery Community Fund with additional activities and resources provided for by monies from the Irish Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade Reconciliation Fund.

We worked with a group of young people from the Portadown area delivering OCN Level 2 in Uniting Communities Through Leadership.

A second group of young people from the Brownlow area of Craigavon on partnership with Lismore College also completed the same OCN Course.

WE developed a second OCN option in 2024 which will be offered as a level 2 qualification in Community Development which will be offered to young people in 2025 and 2026.

The Staff and Committee explored options under the Peace Plus Changemakers programme and will make an application to run a pilot project involving a cross-border intergenerational group of individuals from Craigavon and Cavan Town.

The aim is to produce a book and podcast which examines the catastrophic impact to local communities because of partition and how that contributed to poor social development and high levels of emigration by young people.

Various short programmes were carried out through Community Foundation for NI funding and Community Relations Council Funding addressing poor physical, mental and sexual health amongst young people.

The project completed its Power to Empower plus short programme which was delivered through funding provided by the Halifax Foundation.

The project continued to explore possibilities for further training and education in community development for staff and volunteers and the development of its own courses in reconciliation, community development and leadership.

Financial Review

The results for the financial year are set out on page 9 and additional notes are provided showing income and expenditure in greater detail.

Financial Results

At the end of the financial year the charity has assets of £26,946 (2023 - £24,187) and liabilities of £1,754 (2023 - £1,839). The net assets of the charity have increased by £2,844.

Reserves Position and Policy

The charity's policy is to achieve a level of resources which matches the needs of the organisation both at the current time and in the foreseeable future. The free reserves required should be sufficient to cover at least three months' running costs. The trustees feel that these levels of reserves are essential to enable the charity to continue to provide its activities for the foreseeable future. The reserves policy is an integral part of the charity's planning, budget and forecasts.

Public Benefit

The Directors believe that the 1825 Project conforms readily to the new public benefit requirements of the Charity Commission. The reasons for this belief are:

1) 1825 Project has charitable objectives (as noted above) that quite clearly demonstrate public benefit in promoting social development and opportunity through education and training.

2) The project monitors and collates the activities of all of its participants and keeps a record of the training and educational achievement of them by means of providing a personal record of achievement portfolio and using the figures to present to all interested parties the benefits of those achievements.

- 3) The organisation produces monthly, quarterly and annual reports which highlights the achievements of the participants and the benefits those achievements bring to them personally and to their local communities.
- 4) The organization bars no one on the basis of ability and provides education and training at a level which will be attainable for those young people participating and which takes into account any or no disability they may have.
- 5) There is no private benefit or harm as a result of the organisation's activities.

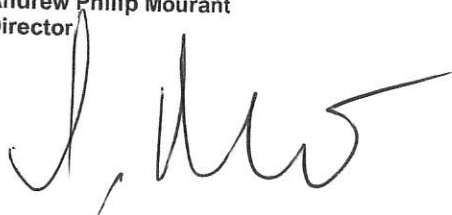

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

for the financial year ended 31 December 2024

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The 1825 Project Limited is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in Northern Ireland. The registered office of the charity is 501 Drumbeg, Tullygally, Craigavon, Armagh, BT65 5AH, United Kingdom which is also the principal place of business of the charity. The financial statements have been presented in Pound (£) which is also the functional currency of the charity.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102", applying Section 1A of that Standard.

As permitted by the Companies Act 2006, the charity has varied the standard formats in that act for the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance Sheet. Departures from the standard formats are to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP and are in compliance with section 4.7, 10.6 and 15.2 of that SORP.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the charity for the financial year ended 31 December 2024 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102", applying Section 1A of that Standard.

Incoming Resources

Voluntary income or capital is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to it, its financial value can be quantified with reasonable certainty and there is reasonable certainty of its ultimate receipt. Entitlement to legacies is considered established when the charity has been notified of a distribution to be made by the executors. Income received in advance of due performance under a contract is accounted for as deferred income until earned. Grants for activities are recognised as income when the related conditions for legal entitlement have been met. All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Resources Expended

All resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis. Charitable activities include costs of services and grants, support costs and depreciation on related assets. Costs of generating funds similarly include fundraising activities. Non-staff costs not attributed to one category of activity are allocated or apportioned pro-rata to the staffing of the relevant service. Finance, HR, IT and administrative staff costs are directly attributable to individual activities by objective. Governance costs are those associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months' notice of withdrawal.

Taxation

No current or deferred taxation arises as the charity has been granted charitable exemption. Irrecoverable valued added tax is expensed as incurred.

All income received by the charity is used for charitable purposes and is therefore exempt from taxation.

Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance

Throughout 2023 the 1825 project continued to deliver its National Lottery Community Fund Power to Empower Project. It engaged three groups of twelve young people aged 17 – 22 years from across the Craigavon Borough.

The young people completed an OCN Level two qualification in Uniting Communities Through Leadership as well as participating in educational field trips and social teambuilding activities.

The 1825 Project worked in partnership with Lismore College, Craigavon, St Peters GAA, Clan Éireann GAA, South Shore Health and Wellbeing, Drumbeg Residents Association, Craigavon Volunteer Bureau and the Fitzzone Foundation in the delivery of its Power to Empower Programme.

The project personnel also worked closely with the Fitzzone Foundation in the delivery of training in and education of Community Development as part of its commitment to enhancing the community sector in Craigavon Borough.

We participated in the consultations regarding the development of area plans with regards to the Peace IV Programme which was led by ABC Council in mid to late 2023.

We received funding from the Community relations Council, Halifax Foundation and CFNI which was directed towards more focused training in the areas of community development, peacebuilding and outreach which was open to past, existing and new participants. The take up was very high and many of the participants are now active in community engagement at different levels using the training they received.

An application was made in March 2023 to the Department of Health, led by the 1825 Project in partnership with the Fitzzone Foundation and Craigavon Volunteer Bureau. It was a strong application which made several proposals to address mental health issues in the Craigavon area. However, the process was pulled by the Department and no funding was awarded to any group.

Financial Review

The financial results for the year are fully detailed from pages 8 onwards and show the overall surplus of £1,083 for the year. This has arisen mainly to do with the timing of funding received and not spent at the year end. The trustees consider the financial results to be satisfactory.

Financial Results

At the end of the financial year the charity has assets of £24,187 (2022 - £22,582) and liabilities of £1,839 (2022 - £1,317). The net assets of the charity have increased by £1,083.

Reserves Position and Policy

The charity's policy is to achieve a level of resources which matches the needs of the organisation both at the current time and in the foreseeable future. The free reserves required should be sufficient to cover at least three months running costs. The trustees feel that these levels of reserves are essential to enable the charity to continue to provide its activities for the foreseeable future. The reserves policy is an integral part of the charity's planning, budget and forecasts.

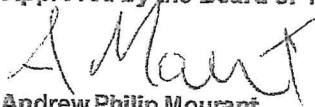

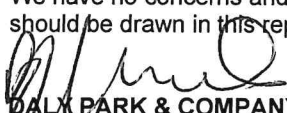

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The 1825 Project Limited is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in Northern Ireland. The registered office of the company is 501 Drumbeg, Tullygally, Craigavon, Craigavon, Armagh, BT65 5AH, United Kingdom which is also the principal place of business of the company. The financial statements have been presented in Pound (£) which is also the functional currency of the company.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102", applying Section 1A of that Standard.

As permitted by the Companies Act 2006, the charity has varied the standard formats in that act for the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance Sheet. Departures from the standard formats are to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP and are in compliance with section 4.7, 10.6 and 15.2 of that SORP.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the charity for the financial year ended 31 December 2017 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102", applying Section 1A of that Standard.

Incoming Resources

Voluntary income or capital is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to it, its financial value can be quantified with reasonable certainty and there is reasonable certainty of its ultimate receipt. Entitlement to legacies is considered established when the charity has been notified of a distribution to be made by the executors. Income received in advance of due performance under a contract is accounted for as deferred income until earned. Grants for activities are recognised as income when the related conditions for legal entitlement have been met. All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Resources Expended

All resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis. Charitable activities include costs of services and grants, support costs and depreciation on related assets. Costs of generating funds similarly include fundraising activities. Non-staff costs not attributed to one category of activity are allocated or apportioned pro-rata to the staffing of the relevant service. Finance, HR, IT and administrative staff costs are directly attributable to individual activities by objective. Governance costs are those associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance

The 1825 Project received a £386,624.00 grant from the National Lottery Community Fund to provide a five-year project, the Power to Empower Project under the Lottery's Empowering Young People Programme. This programme commenced in November 2021 and will engage 24 young people per year over a nine-month period where they will undergo accredited and non-accredited training addressing social and community issues.

A small grant of circa £8,000 from the Irish Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade's Reconciliation Fund was awarded to address community relations in the Craigavon area.

Phase one of the delivery of the Power to Empower Project which involved contact and engagement with twelve young people began in April 2022 and the second phase which involved collaboration with Lismore Comprehensive School commenced in October 2022. Over thirty young people were initially engaged in the project. This has now reduced to twenty-five which is one above the annual target number for precipitation.

The project has also established a partnership with the Fitzone Foundation and Craigavon volunteer Bureau and will act as the lead agency if funding applications to the department of health for through CFNI to create a programme for the support of carers in the community across all age groups. The application will be made in March 2023

Financial Review

The financial results for the year are fully detailed from pages 8 onwards and show the overall surplus of £16,428 for the year, this is to do with the timing of funding received and not spent at the year end. The trustees consider the financial results to be satisfactory.

Public Benefit Statement:

The 1825 Project operates under a Statement of Purpose contained in its Constitution dated 12 December 2001. It is an organisation set up to include the regulations for appointment of trustees. The objects of the Project are the advancement of education (including social and citizenship) of young people aged 14 - 25 years regardless of sex, race, religion, orientation or ability. The charity aims to develop strategically targeted interventions for young people that contribute to addressing and managing sectarianism, racism, reasons for disadvantage and marginalisation through the delivery of training and education to them and those working with them. The charity further aims to contribute in addressing the gap in education and training to those young people aged 14 - 25 years of age disadvantaged in the mainstream through learning disability and difficulty and those with Autistic Spectrum Disorder and co-occurring conditions. We seek to provide a structured educational and training environment that develops its participant's capabilities, competences and skills. We also seek to provide an environment where each participant can develop and fulfil his or her potential, building their self-confidence and inculcating a desire to contribute to the wider community. In so doing, we seek to prepare our participants for the opportunities, responsibilities and experience of transitions in their challenging lives. The Directors believe that the 1825 Project conforms readily to the new public benefit requirements of the Charity Commission. The reasons for this belief are: 1) 1825 Project has charitable objectives (as noted above) that quite clearly demonstrate public benefit in promoting social development and opportunity through education and training. 2) The project monitors and collates the activities of all of its participants and keeps a record of the training and educational achievement of them by means of providing a personal record of achievement portfolio and using the figures to present to all interested parties the benefits of those achievements. 3) The organisation produces monthly, quarterly and annual reports which highlights the achievements of the participants and the benefits those achievements bring to them personally and to their local communities. 4) The organization bars no one on the basis of ability and provides education and training at a level which will be attainable for those young people participating and which takes into account any or no disability they may have. 5) There is no private benefit or harm as a result of the organisation's activities.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The 1825 Project Limited is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in Northern Ireland. The registered office of the company is Moylinn House, 21 Legahory Centre, Legahory, Craigavon, Co. Armagh, BT65 5BE, Northern Ireland which is also the principal place of business of the company. The financial statements have been presented in Pound Sterling (£) which is also the functional currency of the company.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102", applying Section 1A of that Standard.

Statement of compliance

Incoming Resources

Voluntary income or capital is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the company is legally entitled to it, its financial value can be quantified with reasonable certainty and there is reasonable certainty of its ultimate receipt. Entitlement to legacies is considered established when the company has been notified of a distribution to be made by the executors. Income received in advance of due performance under a contract is accounted for as deferred income until earned. Grants for activities are recognised as income when the related conditions for legal entitlement have been met. All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

The trustee presents their Trustee's Annual Report, combining the Director's Report and Trustee's Report, and the unaudited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2022.

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The Trustee's Report contains the information required to be provided in the Trustee's Annual Report under the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) guidelines. The trustee of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's constitution are known as members of the board of trustees.

In this report the trustee of The 1825 Project Limited present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements and finances for the financial year 31 December 2022.

The company is a registered charity and hence the report and results are presented in a form which complies with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 and, although not obliged to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice (Charities SORP effective January 2015), the organisation has implemented its recommendations where relevant in these financial statements.

Review of Activities, Achievements and Performance

The 1825 Project received a £386,624.00 grant from the National Lottery Community Fund to provide a five-year project, the Power to Empower Project under the Lottery's Empowering Young People Programme. This programme commenced in November 2021 and will engage 24 young people per year over a nine-month period where they will undergo accredited and non-accredited training addressing social and community issues.

A small grant of circa £8,000 from the Irish Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade's Reconciliation Fund was awarded to address community relations in the Craigavon area.

Phase one of the delivery of the Power to Empower Project which involved contact and engagement with twelve young people began in April 2022 and the second phase which involved collaboration with Lismore Comprehensive School commenced in October 2022. Over thirty young people were initially engaged in the project. This has now reduced to twenty-five which is one above the annual target number for participation.

The project has also established a partnership with the Fitzone Foundation and Craigavon volunteer Bureau and will act as the lead agency if funding applications to the department of health for through CFNI to create a programme for the support of carers in the community across all age groups. The application will be made in March 2023
