STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

Foyle Women's Information Network is an unincorporated organisation and accepted as charitable under reference NIC103218. The charity was established under a constitution which sets out the objects and powers.

Recruitment and appointment of the Executive Committee

All members of the Committee shall retire annually but shall be eligible for election or appointment again. Nominations from members of the organisation for membership of the Committee must be in writing and must be in the hands of the designated officer at least seven days before the AGM.

Organisation Structure

The Committee consists of eleven members. The Executive Committee are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the organisation. Committee members are from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity. The Committee as a whole was approved by the AGM and continues to monitor its membership.

Our main objective is to increase the capacity, visibility, and voice of women throughout the North-West. EVAWG Ending violence against women and girls Project

The Format: Weekly 2-hour sessions over 6 weeks.

● Topics by Week:

○ Week One: Welcome and an introduction to Ending Violence Against Women and Girls (EVAWG)

○ Week Two: Coercive Control - What it is, spotting the signs, where to get help.

○ Week Three: Types of violence and abuse that affect women and girls - spotting the signs, where to get help.

○ Week Four: Abuse within the home and how it impacts children - Digital abuse, signs of child abuse, effects on children, how you can support children and young people.

○ Week Five: PSNI Community Impact Team Guest Speakers - We hear from Constable Josie Crawford who shares her personal experience that led her to join the PSNI. The team also talks through understanding the justice system's role in prevention and protection, how to report abuse yourself or on behalf of someone else, and what happens next, Q&A.

○ Week Six: What you can do to support victims, Q&A, and conclusion.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total incoming resources for the year were £118,000 (2024: £104,248), of which approximately 96% (2024: 97%) was generated from grants and contracts and 4% (2024: 3%) from donations and fundraising activities. Total resources expended by the charity were £103,224. (2024: £105,458). Approximately 98% (2024: 99%) of this was expended on direct charitable activities and 2% (2024: 1%) on governance costs.

RESERVES POLICY

The Executive Committee consider it prudent to hold monies in reserve in the event that unforeseen circumstances should lead to financial difficulties which might put the future of its employment capacity, users' well-being and general charitable work in jeopardy.

A formal policy on reserves has been agreed by the Committee members which stipulates that free reserves be maintained at a level which ensures that the charity's core activity could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty. Free reserves are defined by the Committee as those funds freely available for use as the charity so determines and thereby excludes any restricted or designated funds.

The Committees' policy is that the number of free reserves should reflect six months expenditure plus any additional core costs. Based on 2024/25 expenditure of £103,224 that amount would be £51,612. Free reserves on 31st March 2025 are currently holding at 3 months. Committee continues to strive to build a general level of reserves that has six months of expenditure in reserve so that they will be able to continue the current activities of the charity. In the short term, the Committee have also considered the extent to which existing activities and expenditure should be curtailed, should circumstances arise.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

1. STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going Concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the directors for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable, and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable, and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES *(continued)*

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable, and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

FWIN was established in 1994 by Derry City Council who recognized that women were working away in their local communities however there was no cross over or engagement between or across the divide and thus the network was established to bring women together to build relationships and begin the road to reconciliation.

The focus of the charity's work is to provide a supportive place for women and women's groups to meet from all the different neighbourhoods and venues over Derry/Londonderry. Such gatherings have provided opportunities for women to discuss health issues, educational matters, and politics. Women are also given the platform to try new ideas, make new contacts and friends and to offer and exchange information.

Human Library x 2 events were held, where instead of reading a book, you take a human person who has a story to tell and you engage in hearing and understanding their stories.

FWIN also delivered a program aimed at reducing the strain for older women who were finding it hard to heat or to eat as the cost-of-living crisis started to have an impact and costs were increasing. FWIN formed a G & T group who met twice weekly on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. Different types of activities were planned and tea, coffee and fresh buns were in constant supply. This helped address the issues faced by the rise in the cost of living.

FWIN held an Easter Networking event, a September Networking event and a Christmas Networking event where over 80 women at each event come together and undertake taster sessions, they hear about services which are available to women from a variety of groups and organisations based throughout the council area.

FWIN held two inspirational women's event in this year and undertook 4 study trips with over 400 women taking part in trips to North Antrim Coast, Antrim Castle Gardens, Belfast City Hall and Belfast Christmas Markets.

RISP -Consortium for regional support for women in areas of disadvantage and rural areas.

FWIN are one of the 7 partners involved in the consortium which engages with a range of key decision makers and funders on behalf of the women's sector, provides support to groups and distributes information and provide bespoke training, carry out research and have better evidence of issues which impact women.

Information, communication and engagement is a big part of FWIN's networking. FWIN send out weekly information bulletins every Friday to over 900 women online. FWIN post out monthly news sheets to 150 women in hardcopy and 900 online via Mailchimp equalling 1050 women per month. Our reach is wide and we also have a Facebook page, Twitter, Instagram account and an up-to-date webpage.

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FWIN supported over 250 children this year in our campaign and we would like to thank those involved for their support and generosity during these most difficult times. We partnered with our members, local businesses, and Downtown Radio's Cash for Kids Christmas Mission.

FWIN have a management board, they work together to make decisions in the best interests of FWIN and its members. They have diverse opinions, skills, experience, interests and are often volunteers. Giving Direction to the Organisation, managing staff, being accountable, adhering to the Constitution and financial management.

The committee have developed a new strategy document for the organisation and have undertaken a lot of good governance training.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total incoming resources for the year were £107,677 (2023: £134,786), of which approximately 97% (2023:96%) was generated from grants and contracts and 3% (2022: 4%) from donations and fundraising activities. Total resources expended by the charity were £108,887. (2023: £127,317). Approximately 98% (2023: 99%) of this was expended on direct charitable activities and 2% (2023: 1%) on governance costs.

RESERVES POLICY

The Executive Committee consider it prudent to hold monies in reserve in the event that unforeseen circumstances should lead to financial difficulties which might put the future of its employment capacity, users' well-being and general charitable work in jeopardy.

A formal policy on reserves has been agreed by the Committee members which stipulates that free reserves be maintained at a level which ensures that the charity's core activity could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty. Free reserves are defined by the Committee as those funds freely available for use as the charity so determines and thereby excludes any restricted or designated funds.

The Committees' policy is that the amount of free reserves should reflect six months expenditure plus any additional core costs. Based on 2023/24 expenditure (excluding depreciation) of £108,580 that amount would be £54,290. Free reserves at 31st March 2024 are £61,596 (94% of the target level). The Committee continues to strive to build a general level of reserves that has six months of expenditure in reserve so that they will be able to continue the current activities of the charity. In the short term, the Committee have also considered the extent to which existing activities and expenditure should be curtailed, should circumstances arise.

1. STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going Concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the directors for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable, and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable, and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable, and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

I'm delighted to present FWIN's 30th AGM Report. As you are all aware, FWIN celebrated their 30th birthday in March with an amazing conference attended by over 200 women in the Guildhall.

FWIN is growing from strength to strength in numbers, we have over 1000 online members as well as 150 postal members.

One of the most challenging aspects is funding and FWIN are finding it extremely difficult to attract funding for those Connect programmes, for example, the Summer Splash Programme and this is one that women miss the most. We will endeavour to try and secure funding to continue this in the future.

FWIN also has some new and exciting programmes scheduled to begin in September, which will be advertised in the forthcoming months.

FWIN would like to thank all our members for their support throughout the year but I'm sure you will agree with my appreciation with the hard work that the staff and board continue to carry out in order to support and deliver programmes and projects for local women in the north west area.

RISP Report

FWIN has engaged with local women through many different forms of communication. In our social media, our network continues to grow support from women in the community.

Our Facebook page had 4.4k Followers with 3,434 page likes. This is our biggest social media page out of all. Our Instagram Page has 313 followers and our Twitter Page 380 followers.

We engage with our network through our weekly Bulletins that go out on MailChimp to 782 members and our bi-monthly newsletter help us to keep our 144 postal members informed.

We have also worked with different organisations to facilitate events for women. These groups include the Feminist Communities for Climate Justice, British Heart Foundation, Epilogues Course and the Ulster University for the Legacy Act.

We will continue to do focus groups for consultations as and when they arise, such as:

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total incoming resources for the year were £134,786 (2022: £161,281), of which approximately 96% (2022:99%) was generated from grants and contracts and 4% (2022: 1%) from donations and fundraising activities. Total resources expended by the charity were £127,317. (2022: £155,042). Approximately 99% (2022: 99%) of this was expended on direct charitable activities and 1% (2022: 1%) on governance costs.

RESERVES POLICY

The Executive Committee consider it prudent to hold monies in reserve in the event that unforeseen circumstances should lead to financial difficulties which might put the future of its employment capacity, users' well-being and general charitable work in jeopardy.

A formal policy on reserves has been agreed by the Committee members which stipulates that free reserves be maintained at a level which ensures that the charity's core activity could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty. Free reserves are defined by the Committee as those funds freely available for use as the charity so determines and thereby excludes any restricted or designated funds.

The Committees' policy is that the amount of free reserves should reflect six months expenditure plus any additional core costs. Based on 2022/23 expenditure (excluding depreciation) of £127,011 that amount would be £63,505. Free reserves at 31st March 2023 are £59,692 (94% of the target level). The Committee continues to strive to build a general level of reserves that has six months of expenditure in reserve so that they will be able to continue the current activities of the charity. In the short term, the Committee have also considered the extent to which existing activities and expenditure should be curtailed, should circumstances arise.





NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

1. STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going Concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the directors for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable, and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable, and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable, and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Inspirational Women's Events

Women Involved in Community Transformation Programme:

This programme is funded by Department for Communities via the Fresh Start Programme B5 and it aims to increase the participation and influence of women in community development / community leadership and in tackling community issues. The executive programme for women in community development designed to enable women's organisations to continue to carry out transformative community development work in our communities but also to ensure that women are equipped with the necessary skills and knowledge to take on more leadership roles in public decision-making. This program of work is being delivered in 26 areas across Northern Ireland with our partners TWN, INTERCOMM and Cooperation Ireland.

One area of focus in the North West has been developing women in the justice system partnerships with local women's groups and organisations within the justice system for example the Prisons, Courts, probations service etc.

FWIN are one of the 7 partners involved in the consortium which engages with a range of key decision makers and funders on behalf of the women's sector, provides support to groups and distributes information and provide bespoke training, carry out research and have better evidence of issues which impact women. RISP Conference via zoom was held with great input from the Pink Ladies in the North West talking about the role and strength of campaigning.

Information, communication and engagement is a big part of this programme

FWIN send out weekly information bulletins every Friday to over 900 women online.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total incoming resources for the year were £161,281 (2021: £159,751), of which approximately 99% (2021:99%) was generated from grants and contracts and 1% (2021: 1%) from donations and fundraising activities. Total resources expended by the charity were £155,042. (2021: £158,402). Approximately 99% (2021: 99%) of this was expended on direct charitable activities and 1% (2021: 1%) on governance costs.

RESERVES POLICY

The Executive Committee consider it prudent to hold monies in reserve in the event that unforeseen circumstances should lead to financial difficulties which might put the future of its employment capacity, users' well-being and general charitable work in jeopardy.

A formal policy on reserves has been agreed by the Committee members which stipulates that free reserves be maintained at a level which ensures that the charity's core activity could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty. Free reserves are defined by the Committee as those funds freely available for use as the charity so determines and thereby excludes any restricted or designated funds.

The Committees' policy is that the amount of free reserves should reflect six months expenditure plus any additional core costs. Based on 2021/22 expenditure (excluding depreciation) of £154,660 that amount would be £77,330. Free reserves at 31st March 2022 are £55,883 (72% of the target level). The Committee continues to strive to build a general level of reserves that has six months of expenditure in reserve so that they will be able to continue the current activities of the charity. In the short term, the Committee have also considered the extent to which existing activities and expenditure should be curtailed, should circumstances arise.


