Although DCT works closely with St. Elizabeth's Church Dundonald, there is no formal connection. Other than this, DCT operates independently from any other organisation and does not have any formal relationship with other bodies or parties.

The Trustees recognise that the Trust could experience a variety and range of risks and that these must be assessed, monitored and managed. For example, the risk of an increase in grant applications during a period of economic uncertainty alongside a decrease in income to the Trust. Other risks could be a change in legal requirements; or a failure in structural organisation.

Section C Objectives and activities

Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document

To further the religious and charitable work of St Elizabeth's Church in the Parish of Dundonald Co. Down.

To advance the Christian religion in any part of the world as expressed in the Holy Bible and the 39 Articles of the Church of Ireland.

To advance religious education with the doctrines and principles of the Anglican faith by means of bible classes and otherwise.

Public benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trust's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy for the year.

Each application is assessed to see if it meets the Objectives of the Trust and Public Benefit as identified in the Trust's Public Benefit Statement.

The main activities of the Trust over the last year have been the awarding of grants for a variety of purposes.

- To Christianity Explored-an organisation which provides resources for churches/individuals exploring the Christian Faith. The public benefit includes the spiritual and moral development of both young and older people.
- To fund the theological training of those selected for Christian ministry. The public benefit includes the teaching of the Bible and Anglican faith by students who complete their training for the moral and spiritual instruction and pastoral care of congregations.
- To Logos Ministries, an organisation with a Bible Teaching Ministry in different contexts. The Public benefit includes the training of people to explain the Christian Faith which will not only lead to the spiritual and moral improvement which comes from that, but also to those they teach.
- To fund the training of young people who undertake apprenticeship training in a variety of Christian ministry contexts. The public benefit includes the training of young people for future Christian ministry and the moral and spiritual improvement that comes from the teaching of the Bible and the Anglican faith.

DCT awards grants to applicants who meet the criteria as described in the objects of the Trust. Grants are approved by a majority decision of the Trustees.

Other criteria include the requirement that an applicant provides all the information requested by the Application Pro forma, including two references.

The Trust does not have any financial investments.

Each Trustee is a volunteer and receives no remuneration for their contribution to the Trust.

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Trustees have met once during the last year. The number of grants increased from last year. Grants were awarded by the Trustees to 6 applicants, a variety of personal applications and Organisations. The total sum awarded was £9,500.00. The amount of unrestricted funds available for grants was slightly more than last year.

6 grants were made during the last year. Here is a selection: £2,000.00 grant to All Saints Church/St Nicholas Church Belfast towards two ministry apprenticeships, £1,000 to a worker for Christian Unions Ireland, £2,000 to Christianity Explored, an organization which provides education and resources for people/churches teaching and exploring the Christian Faith, £2,000 to a person training for Christian Ministry at a Theological training college in England.

These grants have enabled the advancing of the Christian religion through training, education, bible teaching, and apprenticeships.

Brief statement of the charity's policy on reserves

The reserves policy of the Trust arises from the following criteria.

- Regular planned financial commitments – monthly standing orders and an annual payment to the accountant and to MCC computers for the web hosting service.
- Other financial commitments are grants awarded to applicants throughout the year
- A small contingency fund is required to meet unforeseen operational costs.
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The number of reserves held should therefore be sufficient to meet these expenditures. The amount of reserve at this year-end is £60,800.00. It should be noted that most of the funds are restricted and that income received from donations during this tax year has again been small.
