Report of the Trustees

The trustees, who are also the directors for the purposes of company law, present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2025.

Structure, Governance & Management

Governing Document

The organisation is a private company limited by guarantee, incorporated in on 27th January 2004 and registered as a charity on 27th January 2004, charity number XT18194. The company was established by a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association.

Recruitment and Appointment of Management Committee

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Management Committee. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the members of the Management Committee are elected to serve for a period of one year after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting.

Risk Management

The Management Committee has conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. A risk register has been established and is updated at least annually. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces. Significant external risks to funding have led to the development of a strategic plan which will allow for the diversification of funding and activities. Internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

Organisational Structures

North Belfast Alternatives has a Management Committee who meet 6 times per year and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the Committee has ten members from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity. The secretary also sits on the Committee but has no voting rights. North Belfast Alternatives falls under the umbrella of Northern Ireland Alternatives Ltd.

Objectives and Activities

The company's objectives and principle activities are to promote a non-violent restorative community response to justice issues in North Belfast. North Belfast Alternatives will identify needs, often in partnership with local communities and other voluntary and statutory bodies, relating to safety and conflict within communities, and will attempt to heal relationships in a restorative way. At the same time, it hopes to raise community awareness on the issues affecting young people and adults who are deemed at risk.

The main objectives and activities of the company are:

To organise within the community non-violent alternatives to issues of community justice. To help and work with young people in order to resolve the problems affecting their lives. To direct young people away from destructive and dangerous practices and towards healthy and constructive activities. To enable young people to personally reflect on the potentially damaging consequences of risky behaviour. To address areas of weakness and failure within the formal criminal justice system. To heal relationships within the community and to promote better relationships between the statutory agencies. To work towards a sustainable model of delivery for as much of the company's services as possible

Report of the Trustees (continued)

Achievements and Performance

Our achievements and performance over the past year have included 5 community bonding projects 131 people participating whilst 654 young people involved in youth intervention and prevention programmes such as STRIVE, alongside 1-2-1 support and family support and this was assisted by £500 from Unite The Union, Detached Youth Work and Drop in £2400 from EA. NBA provided training and support to 81 volunteers/social connectors who participated in organised events such as Detached Youth Work in Ballysillan Park, Cavehill Country Park, Fun Days and Lantern Parade. NBA provided 220 people with crime prevention and community safety information sessions and heat packs, mediations and furnished 231 people with safety items such as alarms, night lights and safety cans. NBA continued to build, partnerships and share learning with 44 groups, 20 across North Belfast and continued to support and deliver 1-2-1 support and mentoring and Introduction to Restorative Practices in schools such as Boys Model, Girls Model, Hazelwood, Glengormley Integrated, Loughshore, Ballysillan Primary School.

Financial Review

NBA successfully applied for small grants to run programmes and deliver essential packs to 80 families under extreme pressure due to cost of living, organised Summer Interventions which included a Summer Scheme with assistance from Belfast City Council £2,571.28 and engaged young people locally. Delivery and design of other programmes such as Ballysillan Lantern Parade supported by NI Alternatives £3203.50 and NIHE £3,183.51 and was widely attended by local communities across Ballysillan and surrounding areas. North Belfast Partnership which is made up of 4 Neighbourhood Renewal Projects across have been working together since last October 2024 until present have donated £6,300 for the different meetings and consultations attended and this enables us to fund the programmes we do not receive grants for.

Services

North Belfast Alternatives delivers a wide range of services for the public benefit, but all of them are underpinned by the principles of restorative practice. In essence this involves the healing, repair of broken relationships to the individual, family and community relationships that lead to crime, anti-social behaviour and community conflict. Services available include: Intensive Youth Support (for individuals), Family Support, Victim Support, Counselling, Prevention/Intervention work with Young People, Mediation and Community Support on behalf of the Housing Executive and PSNI, Detached Youth Work, Schools Work across North Belfast both primary and secondary schools, delivering training in restorative practices to a wide school and community base. NBA works in partnership with 4 Neighbourhood Renewal Partnerships alongside statutory agencies, two Family Support Hubs in North Belfast and TEO Urban Villages.

Directors' Responsibilities

Directors meet 6 times per year and Northern Ireland Alternatives meet with them on a quarterly basis to oversee all requirements are being met.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1 COMPANY INFORMATION

North Belfast Alternatives Limited is an incorporated charity registered in Northern Ireland, with its offices located at, 254-256 Ballysillan Road, Belfast, BT19 1SH 6RA.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102), and the Companies Act 2006.

b) Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

Due to the level of reserves in place the trustees assess that the charity is a going concern.

c) Fund Accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes.

General funds may be transferred to designated funds where Trustees wish to use these funds for a specific purpose. Such funds may be transferred back to general funds once the criteria for the designation have been met or are no longer applicable.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of restricted funds is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Restricted funds may only be transferred to general or designated funds once the criteria for restriction have been discharged or no longer apply.

d) Income Recognition Policies

Items of income are recognised and included in the accounts when all of the following criteria are met:

- The charity has entitlement to the funds;
- any performance conditions attached to the item of income has been met or are fully within the control of the charity.
- there is sufficient certainty that receipt of the income is considered probable; and
- the amount can be measured reliably.

e) Donated services and facilities

In accordance with the Charities SORP 2015 (FRS 102), the general volunteer time of supporters is not recognised.

f) Interest Receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

Notes to the Financial Statements (continued)

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

g) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the promotion and development of music and activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

h) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening the deposit or similar account.

i) Allocation of support costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include back office costs, finance, personnel, payroll and governance costs which support the charity's programmes and activities. These costs have been allocated to expenditure on charitable activities.

j) Tangible Fixed Assets

Individual fixed assets are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on a straight line basis as follows:

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed for impairment when events or circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

k) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid after taking account of any trade discount due.

l) Creditors and Provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

m) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at the carrying value plus accrued interest less repayments. The financing charge to expenditure is at a constant rate calculated using the effective interest method.

n) Taxation

The company is a registered charity and the charitable tax exemptions are therefore being claimed to the extent that income and/or gains are applicable and applied to charitable purposes only. These exemptions will remain in place as long as income and expenditure is applied to charitable purposes only.

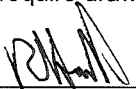

Notes to the Financial Statements

1 COMPANY INFORMATION

North Belfast Alternatives Limited is an incorporated charity registered in Northern Ireland, with its offices located at, 254-256 Ballysillan Road, Belfast, BT19 1SH 6RA.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102), and the Companies Act 2006.

b) Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

Due to the level of reserves in place the trustees assess that the charity is a going concern.

c) Fund Accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes.

General funds may be transferred to designated funds where Trustees wish to use these funds for a specific purpose. Such funds may be transferred back to general funds once the criteria for the designation have been met or are no longer applicable.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of restricted funds is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Restricted funds may only be transferred to general or designated funds once the criteria for restriction have been discharged or no longer apply.

d) Income Recognition Policies

Items of income are recognised and included in the accounts when all of the following criteria are met:

- The charity has entitlement to the funds;
- any performance conditions attached to the item of income has been met or are fully within the control of the charity.
- there is sufficient certainty that receipt of the income is considered probable; and
- the amount can be measured reliably.

e) Donated services and facilities

In accordance with the Charities SORP 2015 (FRS 102), the general volunteer time of supporters is not recognised.

f) Interest Receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

Notes to the Financial Statements (continued)

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

g) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the promotion and development of music and activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

h) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening the deposit or similar account.

i) Allocation of support costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include back office costs, finance, personnel, payroll and governance costs which support the charity's programmes and activities. These costs have been allocated to expenditure on charitable activities.

j) Tangible Fixed Assets

Individual fixed assets are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on a straight line basis as follows:

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed for impairment when events or circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

k) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid after taking account of any trade discount due.

l) Creditors and Provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

m) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at the carrying value plus accrued interest less repayments. The financing charge to expenditure is at a constant rate calculated using the effective interest method.

n) Taxation

The company is a registered charity and the charitable tax exemptions are therefore being claimed to the extent that income and/or gains are applicable and applied to charitable purposes only. These exemptions will remain in place as long as income and expenditure is applied to charitable purposes only.

Report of the Trustees

The trustees, who are also the directors for the purposes of company law, present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2024.

Structure, Governance & Management

Governing Document

The organisation is a private company limited by guarantee, incorporated in on 27th January 2004 and registered as a charity on 27th January 2004, charity number XT18194. The company was established by a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association.

Recruitment and Appointment of Management Committee

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Management Committee. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the members of the Management Committee are elected to serve for a period of one year after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting.

Risk Management

The Management Committee has conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. A risk register has been established and is updated at least annually. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces. Significant external risks to funding have led to the development of a strategic plan which will allow for the diversification of funding and activities. Internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

Organisational Structures

North Belfast Alternatives has a Management Committee who meet 6 times per year and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the Committee has ten members from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity. The secretary also sits on the Committee but has no voting rights. North Belfast Alternatives falls under the umbrella of Northern Ireland Alternatives Ltd.

Objectives and Activities

The company's objectives and principle activities are to promote a non-violent restorative community response to justice issues in North Belfast. North Belfast Alternatives will identify needs, often in partnership with local communities and other voluntary and statutory bodies, relating to safety and conflict within communities, and will attempt to heal relationships in a restorative way. At the same time, it hopes to raise community awareness on the issues affecting young people and adults who are deemed at risk.

The main objectives and activities of the company are:

To organise within the community non-violent alternatives to issues of community justice. To help and work with young people in order to resolve the problems affecting their lives. To direct young people away from destructive and dangerous practices and towards healthy and constructive activities. To enable young people to personally reflect on the potentially damaging consequences of risky behaviour. To address areas of weakness and failure within the formal criminal justice system. To heal relationships within the community and to promote better relationships between the statutory agencies. To work towards a sustainable model of delivery for as much of the company's services as possible

Report of the Trustees (continued)

Achievements and Performance

Our achievements and performance over the past year have included 18 community relations programme with 124 people participating whilst 563 young people involved in youth intervention and prevention programmes alongside 1-2-1 support alongside family support, Detached Youth Work. NBA provided training and support to 93 volunteers/social connectors who participated in organised events such as Detached Youth Work in Ballysillan Park, Cavehill Country Park, Fun Days and Lantern Parade. NBA provided 148 people with crime prevention and community safety information sessions, mediations and furnished 243 people with safety items such as alarms, night lights and safety cans. 63 people accessed accredited training ranging from CSR Cards, OCN Level I Grass Roots Football. NBA continued to build, partnerships and share learning with 52 groups, 18 across North Belfast and continued to support and deliver 1-2-1 support and mentoring and Introduction to Restorative Practices in schools such as Boys Model, Girls Model, Hazelwood, Glengormley Integrated, Loughshore, Ballysillan Primary School.

Financial Review

NBA successfully applied for small grants to run programmes and deliver essential packs to 80 families under extreme pressure due to cost of living, organised Summer Interventions which included a Summer Scheme with assistance from Belfast City Council £2,500 and engaged young people locally. Delivery and design of other programmes such as Ballysillan Lantern Parade supported by Belfast City Council £2,800 and was widely attended by local communities across Ballysillan and surrounding areas.

Services

North Belfast Alternatives delivers a wide range of services for the public benefit, but all of them are underpinned by the principles of restorative practice. In essence this involves the healing, repair of broken relationships to the individual, family and community relationships that lead to crime, anti-social behaviour and community conflict. Services available include: Intensive Youth Support (for individuals), Family Support, Victim Support, Counselling, Prevention/Intervention work with Young People, Mediation and Community Support on behalf of the Housing Executive and PSNI, Detached Youth Work, Schools Work across North Belfast both primary and secondary schools, delivering training in restorative practices to a wide school and community base.. NBA works in partnership with 4 Neighbourhood Renewal Partnerships alongside statutory agencies, two Family Support Hubs in North Belfast and TEO Urban Villages.

Achievements and Performance

Our achievements and performance over the past year have included 16 community relations programme with 108 people participating whilst 586 young people involved in youth intervention and prevention programmes alongside 1-2-1 support alongside family support, Detached Youth Work. NBA provided training and support to 106 volunteers who participated in organised events such as Detached Youth Work in Ballysillan Park, Cavehill Country Park, Bonfire Schemes and Fun Days. NBA provided 198 people with crime prevention and community safety information sessions, mediations and furnished 260 people with safety items such as alarms, night lights and safety cans. 63 people accessed accredited training ranging from CSR Cards, Bonfire Safety to, OCN Level 1 Mountain Biking, OCN Level 1 Grass Roots Football. Delivery of other programmes such as KICK START where supported by LCAP, Unite the Union and Urban Villages.

Services

In essence this involves the healing, repair of broken relationships to the individual, family and community relationships that lead to crime, anti-social behaviour and community conflict. Services available include: Intensive Youth Support (for individuals), Family Support, Victim Support, Counselling, Prevention/Intervention work with Young People, Mediation and Community Support on behalf of the Housing Executive and PSNI, Detached Youth Work, Schools Work across North Belfast both primary and secondary schools, delivering training in restorative practices to a wide client base. NBA works in partnership with 4 Neighbourhood Renewal Partnerships alongside statutory agencies, two Family Support Hubs in North Belfast and TEO Urban Villages. We also played a very active role during Covid and worked in partnership with groups across North Belfast.

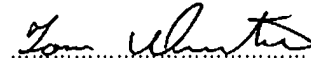

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a) Basis of preparation

The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

We have examined your charity accounts as required under section 65 of the Charities Act and our examination was carried out in accordance with the general Directions given by the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland under section 65(9)(b) of the Charities Act. The examination included a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also included consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as charity trustees concerning any such matters.

Our role is to state whether any material matters have come to our attention giving us cause to believe:

1. That accounting records were not kept in accordance with section 386 of the Companies Act 2006;
2. That the accounts do not accord with those accounting records;
3. That the accounts do not comply with the accounting requirements of section 396 of the Companies Act 2006 and with the methods and principles of the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland;
4. That there is further information needed for a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.
