### Inchmarlo

In the spring, the Beavers undertook the Community Impact Staged Activity Badge by learning about homelessness and how local charity Habitat for Humanity Ireland helps people at home and abroad to gain a safe place to call home. The boys visited the Habitat Restore in Lisburn and donated £100 to the charity's valuable work. The Cub team of Rocco Axon, Harry Forrester, Henry Fullerton, Oscar McClean, and Arthur Pollock were runners-up in the Northern Ireland Quiz held in Magherafelt in February, winning the Belfast Shield as the best placed team from Belfast County. The Cub Pack visited Colin Glen to take the exciting zip line down the 250 metre course over the forest from a height of 50 feet! March saw the Cub team of Patrick Agnew, Henry Brown, Declan McMaster, Tom Oliphant, and Sebastian Simpson win the Northern Ireland Unihoc Competition held at the Antrim Forum. The boys competed against 15 teams from across the province. Our Beavers celebrated Saint Patrick's Day by making tasty sweet potato bread over stoves.



The summer term saw the Beavers create a lovely flower bed near the summer house as part of their Our World Challenge Award. They also visited Cadogan Fire Station to find out how the Fire Service helps our local community. Our Beavers enjoyed working with tents, building a fire, and toasting more marshmallows to make smores as part of their Campcraft Activity Badge before wishing our leader and Queen's University student Miss Eleanor Gray every best wish as she moved on with her studies. The Beaver Colony visited the Northern Ireland Dam Jam event at Crawfordsburn Scout Centre in May where they enjoyed grass sledging, the Beaver Trail, and the inflatables. At the end of year event, Headteacher Mrs Morwood presented the Colony's first ever Chief Scout's Bronze Top Awards to Charlie Forrester, Wilf Harington, John Maitland, Charlie Meenan and Nicky Rendo – congratulations to the boys! The Cub Pack finished the year in style too with strong performances at the Northern Ireland Football Finals in Cookstown. The A team finished in third place in the Northern Ireland Shield group, winning the cup for the most goals scored overall in the competition.





Beavers and Cubs joined the Scouts and Explorers for a canoeing session on the River Lagan from Shaw's Bridge to start to the new Scouting year. At the annual Parents' Evening, Headteacher Mrs Morwood presented Rocco Axon and Oscar McClean with the Inspection Shield while Declan McMaster received the Six Shield. In the Beaver Colony, Charlie Forrester achieved the Inspection Shield while Fred and Tom Osborne shared the Beaver Shield. 14 new members of the Colony were invested in November. 15 Beavers attended Lagan District's Elfnavally Christmas event in December and enjoyed watching an outdoor movie, making a penguin tree decoration and toasting marshmallows.

In the spring, our Beavers were busy planning, designing and building to earn their Builder Activity Badge. The boys cooked pancakes for Shrove Tuesday. They built dens outside in the wild garden area in March. In February, our Cubs attended Lagan District's Scientist Activity Badge event at the W5 Centre. The boys enjoyed learning about all the Sciences and carrying out numerous experiments. The boys completed their Our World Challenge Award in March by considering Hinduism and its Holi Colour Run.

The Cub Pack is thankful for the committed and skilful leadership of Mrs Agnew who, along with a team of helpful parents, provided an excellent programme for the year. Mr Robinson took over the leadership of the Beaver Section with help from Ms Cassidy. They have overseen a superb programme for many eager Beavers! Many thanks to our parents – your support is very much appreciated! The Scout Group is indebted to Headteacher Mrs Morwood, the supportive school

staff and Inchmarlo Preparatory School for helping the Beaver Colony and Cub Pack to feel so much part of the school community as a club at the school.

### **RBAI**

Our Scouts were invited to try out the Games Locker space in Dundonald in April. To fundraise for the Essex Summer Camp, a successful Table Quiz and Raffle took place in the Dining Hall with quizmaster Mr Gary Heggarty providing an entertaining evening. New Scout Honours were awarded to Luke Acheson, William Brooks, Robbie Henderson, and Noah Stafford. Yago Azuara-Lois, Cameron Colgan, James Garrett, Matthew Jamison, Jay Jayaprakash, Samuel Jordan, and Oliver Mercer were reawarded Honours.

32 Scouts successfully completed their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Award Qualifying Expeditions in ideal conditions in the Mourne in May. Many thanks to their assessor Mr Ashley Parks for his time, effort, and expertise. In June after some very challenging flooding in the Mourne, 25 Explorers demonstrated incredible effort, resilience, and skill in successfully completing their Silver Duke of Edinburgh's Award Qualifying Expeditions. Leaders Mrs Rogers and Mr Roy were awarded a Commendation Award from District Lead Volunteer Mr Norman McKee for their outstanding leadership during the Silver Award Qualifying Expeditions. 15 Explorers showed great effort, determination, and skill in completing their Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award Qualifying Expeditions in The Lake District. Their first day involved hiking over four peaks, namely Haystacks, High Crag, High Stile, and Red Pike, and completing 20km before three more days in unfamiliar and challenging terrain. Congratulations to the Explorers Youssef Abdelfattah, Luke Acheson, Yago Azuara-Lois, Ollie Bates, William Brooks, Cameron Colgan, James Garrett, Fraser Gilchrist, Callum Grant, Robbie Henderson, Matthew Jamison, Jay Jayaprakash, Samuel Jordan, Oliver Mercer, and Noah Stafford. Many thanks to our assessor Mrs Sandra Gillespie and her husband Frank for all their effort, skill, and care.



16 Scouts and Explorers attended the Scout Group's Summer Camp at the Essex International Jamboree from July 28th to August 3rd. They joined over 4,500 Scouts and Guides from 76 countries from all over the world! The weather was excellent for the entire week as the boys enjoyed activities in nine programme zones ranging from rifle shooting, axe throwing, high ropes and kayaking to It's a Knockout, broadcasting, backwoods fire-making and cooking. As well as programme activities during the day, there were activities in the evening where everyone could meet to compete in sports or dance the night away to music at the main stage as well as relax at the different social areas in the jamboree village. We camped at the Shinano Sub-Camp, one of 11 Sub-Camps, which we shared with 30 other Scouts Groups including Groups from Australia and The Netherlands. Some highlights of the trip were meeting so many Scouts from all over the world; the top-quality food cooked by camp chef Mr Ben McKeown; and the closing ceremony with its party atmosphere and impressive fireworks! Thanks must go to the leaders who organised and supervised the trip so well - Mr Ben McKeown, Mr Roy, and Mr Scott.

The year began with a canoeing expedition on the River Lagan from Shaw's Bridge where 27 Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers practiced their skills and had much fun. 7 Duke of Edinburgh's Awards were presented at assembly in September. The Scout Troop visited BAC again for climbing, abseiling and the jump of faith as part of their Adventure Challenge Award. Some Explorers enjoyed Christmas dinner and a quiz at the Lagan District Christmas event. 10 Explorers received their Duke of Edinburgh's Awards at assembly in December. After raising £1,368 at charity car-parking events in December, Group Chair Matthew Jamison presented a cheque for £150 to Canon Kevin Graham of The Black Santa Appeal outside Saint Anne's Cathedral.

Explorers Max Boyd, Daniel Carson, James Patterson, Adam Price and Jack Robinson received their top Chief Scout's Gold Award Certificates from NI Chief Volunteer Stephen Bell and Lord Mayor Micky Murray at Belfast City Hall on January 4th. The Scout Troop undertook the Creative Challenge Award in the spring. Senior Explorers Cameron Colgan and Oliver Mercer began their top Scouts of the World Award journeys by completing a Discovery Weekend in February. About 100 pupils took part in the annual 5 a-side football competitions at this time. 10 Explorers received their Duke of Edinburgh's Awards in March. The Scout Troop resumed its good relationship with Warhammer at this time.



There are numerous other events taking place throughout the year at Group, District, County, Northern Ireland, and United Kingdom levels as well as partnerships with the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme and charities like Habitat for Humanity Northern Ireland and Storehouse Belfast.
