Charity's constitution

The constitution of 1st Hillhall Scout Group is aligned to the constitution of the National Scout Association, of which it is a part. This provides a framework as to how the group is run including the aims, the programme, the structure of the Association and key policies such as child protection and safety amongst others. The constitution also states how the group is managed as well as how the Group Executive Committee is elected.

Activities during 2024/25

The group has four sections:

The Squirrel Drey is for children aged 4–6. During the 2024/25 year there were approximately 12 children in the drey. The Squirrels enjoyed a full programme of crafts, games and outdoor activities throughout the year.

The Beaver Colony is for children between the ages of 6–8. During 2024/25 there were approximately 28 Beavers in the colony. The Beavers met in the church hall at Hillhall Presbyterian Church and enjoyed a varied programme of games, crafts and scouting skills. The annual Beaver camp was again a highlight of the year.

The Cub Pack is for children between the ages of 8–10½. During 2024/25 there were approximately 20 Cubs. The Cubs met at the youth hall at Hillhall Presbyterian

Church and continued to develop their scouting skills, including backwoods cooking, fire safety, camp furniture making and team challenges.

The Scout Troop is for young people between the ages of 10½–14. During 2024/25 there were approximately 15 Scouts at Hillhall. The Scouts met at the youth hall and attended outdoor activities and camps, including residential activities developing their skills in water-based activities, climbing and adventurous pursuits.

In total, approximately 75 young people were members of the group during the year 2024/25.

Public Benefit

The benefit which flows from our purpose is that young people are empowered to make a positive contribution to society through being engaged and supported in their personal development, including physically, intellectually, socially and spiritually. The group operates on a Wednesday night and is open to all members of the public within the defined age limits. The group always endeavours to accommodate all of the children who wish to attend and, through the recruitment of more leaders, all of the children were accommodated this year.

The children who attended further developed their skills in areas such as cookery, knot tying, camping and working as a team. These skills will help the members throughout their lives and will, hopefully, also help the members make a positive impact in their communities; preparing young people to be active citizens; embracing and contributing to social change. The success of the programme is shown by the number of children within the group.

Scouting operates within a framework of safety to enable young people to take part in adventurous activities safely. The group follows the best practice guidance provided by the National Scout Association to ensure this is the case. The Trustees are not aware of any private benefit received by anyone, even as an incidental benefit. In planning the programmes for the different sections for the year, consideration has been given to the guidance provided by the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland to help ensure that the charity's purpose is met.


Review of the Financial Year

During 2024/25, the accounts of 1st Hillhall Scout Group include the combined receipts and payments of three bank accounts: the main Hillhall Scouts account, the Squirrel Drey account, and the Beaver Scout Colony account (which covers both Beavers and Cubs). During this year, the Beaver and Cub sections experienced difficulty accessing their bank account and, as a result, a number of expenses were paid in cash by leaders and documented through receipts. These cash transactions are included in the accounts.

Total combined income for the year was £10,768.50. The main sources of income were annual subscriptions and fees collected from parents and guardians across all sections (£7,868.50), an external grant received from the Education Authority (£1,800.00), and other income of £1,100.00 received into the scout account from a linked account.

Total combined expenditure for the year was £7,664.96. The largest single expenditure was capitation fees paid to the Scout Association via Lisburn District (£3,225.00), covering liability insurance and national membership costs. Camp and outdoor activity costs amounted to £2,412.00. Hall rental costs were £915.00. Leader expense reimbursements totalled £610.00, and costs relating to uniforms, badges, equipment and general expenses were £502.96.

The group achieved a combined surplus of £3,103.54 for the year. The group's combined funds at the end of the year stood at £7,918.50 across all three accounts plus cash in hand. The Trustees feel these funds are sufficient to support the Scout Group and enable it to operate in the forthcoming year.



Note: These accounts consolidate three separate bank accounts operated by 1st Hillhall Scout Group and reflect the full financial activity of the charity for the year. Opening balances: Hillhall Scouts £2,479.34; Squirrel Drey £960.35; Beaver & Cub Colony £1,617.90 (combined opening £5,057.59, matching the 2023/24 closing balance). Expenditure includes £242.63 in respect of a Squirrel Drey cheque paid to a section leader which cleared the bank during the 2023/24 year but was not included in the prior year accounts due to a missing bank statement page. This payment has been included in the current year's accounts.

The Beaver & Cub Colony closing balance of £6,219.44 is estimated from the subsequent statement period (August 2025) as the final page of the in-period statement was not available. During 2024/25, the Beaver and Cub sections experienced difficulty accessing their bank account; as a result, several expenses were paid in cash by leaders and documented through receipts. These cash payments are reflected in the expenditure figures above. The Cub section operated a separate cash float, with £1.00 remaining at year end.


During 2023/24, the accounts of 1st Hillhall Scout Group include the combined receipts and payments of three bank accounts: the main Hillhall Scouts account, the Squirrel Drey account, and the Beaver Scout Colony account (which covers both Beavers and Cubs).

Total combined income for the year was £14,073.50. The main sources of income were annual subscriptions and fees collected from parents and guardians across all sections (£9,887.50), external grants received from the Education Authority and Lisburn & Castlereagh Borough Council (£3,183.00), and donations including a corporate donation to the Squirrel Drey and a bank compensation payment (£1,003.00).

Total combined expenditure for the year was £12,488.58. The largest single expenditure was capitation fees paid to the Scout Association via Lisburn District (£2,962.50), covering liability insurance and national membership costs. Activity and camp costs across all sections, including residential activities at Share Discovery Village, totalled £5,787.50. Leader expense reimbursements amounted to £2,252.11, and costs relating to uniforms, badges, equipment and general expenses were £1,048.50. Squirrel section activities and materials accounted for £437.97.

The group achieved a combined surplus of £1,524.92 for the year. The group's combined funds at the end of the year stood at £5,057.59 across all three accounts. The Trustees feel these funds are sufficient to support the Scout Group and enable it to operate in the forthcoming year.





The purpose of 1st Hillhall Scout Group is to actively engage and supports young people in their personal development, empowering them to make a positive contribution to society.

Charity's constitution

The constitution of 1st Hillhall Scout Group is aligned to the constitution of the National Scout Association, of which it is a part. The provides a framework as to how the group is run including the aims, the programme, the structure of the Association and key policies such as child protection and safety amongst others. The constitution also states how the group is managed as well as how the Group Executive Committee is elected.

Activities during 2018/19

The group has four sections:

- The Squirrel Drey joined the charity in Autumn 2021 after the merger of Northern Ireland Squirrel Association merged with The Scout Association. The Squirrel drey is for children aged 4-6. During the 2022/23 year there were 24 children in the drey. The Squirrels enjoyed a full year of crafts and activities. They enjoyed a Squirrel fun day hosted at Hillhall Presbyterian Church. The Scout group also celebrated it's centenary this year and the Squirrels joined the rest of the group at Crawfordsburn for an afternoon of activities and a barbeque.
- The Beaver colony is for children between the ages of 6-8. During 2018/19 there were 13 Beavers in the colony. The Beavers meet in the church hall at Hillhall Presbyterian church. The Beavers are led by an experienced team of leaders who provide an exciting and varied program. The average night is a

mixture of games and crafts interspersed with scouting skills such as simple backwoods cooking and knot tying. There were several trips during the year including Sir Thomas and Lady Dixon park and Beaver Rally Day. The annual Beaver camp was again the highlight of the year for many of the Beavers. This years camp was even more special as it was the centenary of the Scout group so both first and second year Beavers were invited.

- The Cub pack is for children between the ages of 8-10^{1/2}. During 2018/19 there were 28 Cubs. The Cubs meet at the youth hall at Hillhall Presbyterian church. The Cub leaders provide a strong program for this age group. There are many different games but also a greater focus on scouting skills in line with the greater abilities of the age group. Thanks to the facilities that are available the Cubs are able to learn to make camp furniture, how to safely light and manage a fire as well as backwoods cooking. During June 2023 our Cubs attended the centenary camp at Crawfordsburn Scout Centre. At the annual camp the cubs get to use the skills they have learnt throughout the year as well as trying new activities.
- The Scout troop is for children between the ages of 10^{1/2}- 14. During 2018/19 there were 18 scouts at Hillhall. The Scouts meet in the youth hall at Hillhall Presbyterian church. The program allows the Scouts to further develop the skills they have learnt in the previous sections. The Scouts took part in the centenary camp at Crawfordsburn. The camp had a full range of activities from water based to climbing along with day trips to local areas.



Review of the Financial Year

During 2022/23 1st Hillhall Scout Group had expenses totaling £8981.49. The largest expense was the capitation fees paid to the district at £3120.5, paid to the Scout Association via Lisburn District to cover expenses including liability insurance. Other large expenses were the camp costs £1603.35, uniform and badges at £1432.2.

Funds were raised by annual subscriptions, camp fees and a small donation totaling £9593. This lead to a small surplus of £611.51 1st Hillhall Scout Group finished the year with funds of £3452.67 available. The Trustee feels these funds are sufficient to support the Scout Group and enable it to operate in the forthcoming year.




