A summary of the Charity's main activities to further its purposes for the public benefit and the main achievements in the year

We also worked on Girlguiding Skill Builders and Unit Meeting Activities. We completed our Have Adventures Skill Builder learning vital new skills and completed the Aviation Badge. We also completed the Girlguiding Ulster Goes Wild Badge, culminating in a visit from Amy's Animal Ark when we got to see and learn about lots of different animals.

We celebrated World Thinking Day by making a video to be shown in church and completed our Thinking Day badge activities.

We also had a great night learning to sew with a workshop from Sew Ready,

We enjoyed several trips including a night walk around the local area followed by hot chocolate, a shopping trip to Forestside, a trip to Lorne for an Adventure Agents' day where we tried crate climbing and bushcraft and a trip to the cinema to see Moana 2.

It was a successful year and the girls developed numerous skills and grew in confidence. It was also encouraging to see friendships developing amongst the girls who come from different schools.
