STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT

The Kirk Session

The charity trustees of the congregation are the members of its Kirk Session. Under the congregation's governing document, The Code, the book of the constitution and government of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Kirk Session seeks to watch over and promote the spiritual interest of the congregation and of persons not connected with any congregation who are within its bounds. It ensures pastoral care is in place in the congregation and seeks to further the contribution of the Church to Christian witness and service in the local community. The Kirk Session has delegated to its Congregational Committee the temporal affairs of the congregation including administering all funds and property belonging to the congregation. Members of the Kirk Session are ex-officio members of the Congregational Committee.

The Kirk Session consists of the ordained minister and the ruling elders of the congregation. All members are entitled to propose, speak and exercise equal votes at meetings, except that the Moderator, the minister in active duty in the congregation, has no deliberative but only a casting vote.

Stated meetings of the Kirk Session are held every fourth Tuesday of the calendar month except June, July, August and December. Other meetings of the Kirk Session are arranged as required.

To be chosen for the office of the eldership in the congregation a person must be a voting member and a regular attendant on its ordinances. The selection of those proposed to be called to the office can be either by the congregation or by the Kirk Session. Members are elected if they obtain two-thirds of the votes off those who vote.

Presbytery

Under the Presbyterian Church in Ireland form of governance the corporate oversight of a congregation is the responsibility of a Presbytery which superintends generally the spiritual and temporal affairs of the congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. McQuiston Memorial congregation of the Presbyterian Church has been assigned to the East Belfast Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The membership of the Presbytery consists mainly of the active ministers of congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly, ministers who have retired from active duty and an elder appointed by the Kirk Session of the congregation.

The General Assembly

The General Assembly is the supreme court of the Church, representing in one body the whole Church and acting as its supreme legislative, administration and judicial authority, in dealing with all matters brought before it. The General Assembly is normally constituted during June for worship and to conduct its business. This year the meeting was held from 20 June to 22 June 2024. At the end of business it is dissolved. The membership of the General Assembly consists mainly of the active ministers of each congregation, retired ministers and a representative elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE

The charitable purpose of the congregation is the advancement of religion.

McQuiston Memorial congregation of the Presbyterian Church is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, as a Reformed Church within the wider body of Christ is grounded in the Scriptures and exists to love and honour God through faith in His Son and by the power of His Spirit, and to enable her members to play their part in fulfilling God's mission to our world.

The congregation's mission purpose is "Jesus centred – People focused". This is demonstrated as follows that by the grace of God, to help people of all ages become fully devoted followers of Jesus Christ. Our vision is, by the grace of God, to be an inclusive, welcoming community of Christ's people of all ages, which:

- is increasingly characterised by love for God, and love and concern for others;
- is committed to the historic Christian gospel as revealed in the Bible;
- is relevant to people of this time and place.

The congregation aims to live out its Mission and Vision as a family of God's people by being:

- A Covenant Community: where our relationships are rooted in the promises of God by living faithfully toward Him and toward one another.
- Intergenerational Community: where adults intentionally take the lead to engage with, encourage and nurture younger members to maturity in Christ.
- An Outward looking Community: where we want the blessings of God that belong to us in the gospel to become blessings for others beyond the bounds of our community.

As a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, we believe that the Bible is the supreme authority over all we do, and that the Westminster Confession of Faith, along with

the Larger and Shorter Catechisms set out what we understand the Bible teaches on key matters of Christian faith and practice.

ACTIVITIES AND OBJECTIVES

The congregation meets for worship every Sunday and welcomes visitors to worship with us. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is observed on several occasions during the year and all those who have been baptised and who have made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are admitted to the Lord's Supper. The congregation holds Bible study meetings (Discipleship Groups) and prayer meetings each fortnight on a Wednesday evening. We also have a wide range of organisations and activities including:

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Worship and Prayer

We meet for worship each Sunday at 11.00am and on each evening during September to June at 7.00pm. The Bible Study (Discipleship Groups) provides an opportunity for members to meet together for fellowship, to study the scriptures and for a time of prayer twice a month between September and June. The Prayer Meeting meets twice a month all year round.

As well as our regular services during the year we acknowledge God's gift of new life at Sacraments of Baptism but we had no baptisms this year. In addition we had 14 members who died during the year and sought to comfort those who had been bereaved during the year.

A Remembrance Day service was held in November. In December we held our annual carol service which was well attended and was also streamed live.

On 31 December 2024 there were 89 communicant members and 188 families connected with the congregation. The average weekly attendance at morning worship was just over 85 persons.

A What's App prayer group (operating by mobile texting) continues faithful ongoing prayer cover for Church members and other non-members, as well as prayer for situations at home and overseas. A joy continues to be the many answers to prayer.

We continue to support our food bank with groceries/essential food items which are given to the needy in the area. Our Outreach team continued to ensure that the food is distributed to members of the local community in need.

Safe Guarding

Taking Care is the name of the safeguarding policy and programme of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Our aim is to create and promote a safe environment for all. We believe that next to proclaiming God's Word and the love of Christ, nothing could be more important than keeping our children and young people safe.

Our church is also registered as a "Safe Place" for those suffering from domestic abuse.

Mission and Outreach

The congregation supports the United Appeal for Mission which is a central fund of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This fund enables congregations to support the wider mission of the denomination and to do mission and outreach on a denominational basis beyond what the congregation could do on its own. The United Appeal Fund provides financial support for mission personnel at home and overseas, assists congregations with the deployment of locally based staff, enables church planting, provides grant support for the upkeep of church premises, assist with the running costs of Union Theological College, the Church's training college for ministry students, and McQuiston Memorial Presbyterian Church

financially supports congregations in the areas of worship, discipleship, global mission, outreach, leadership and pastoral care. It is pleasing to note that the congregation reached its *"Target of Honour"* set by the Presbytery.

The congregation also contributes to the denomination's annual World Development Appeal, The Presbyterian Children's Society, the Samaritans Purse Shoebox Appeal at Christmas and other special appeals.

During the Easter period our senior members received an Easter greetings card and a small gift. Our work with Elmgrove and Euston Street Primary schools continued as they held a lovely colouring competition and prizes were awarded to the winners. Our outreach work continued to develop in two local primary schools. Working with P7 classes continued with cookie decorating, planting summer bedding plants and arts and crafts work. The annual Easter arts competition continues to be a popular event.

Just prior to Christmas 70 bags of shortbread were distributed to local neighbours either side of the church building and shops / businesses on the Castlereagh Road.

On 5 May 2024 Belfast held its annual marathon and we deferred our morning worship to a later time whilst cups of water were offered to the runners and tea/coffee and bacon baps to the spectators.

Presbytery

The congregation was represented at the regular meetings of East Belfast Presbytery by our minister and / or one of the elders. This provides an important link between the congregations and the wider structures of the church. A report of each Presbytery meeting is given to the Kirk Session.

General Assembly

The Minister and one of our elders were nominated to attend the meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland held in Assembly Buildings, Belfast. Our Minister and representative elder attended and were greatly impressed by the way affairs were conducted. A report is given to Kirk Session on the work presented.

Mr JC Shivers reported on his attendance at General Assembly in June 2024. This year there was a new format with General Assembly commencing on a Wednesday and finishing on a Saturday. He highlighted the following :-

Property

The general maintenance work carried out in and around the church and manse goes on in an effort to keep the property up to a high standard a high standard. Whilst it was agreed to replace the front doors with uPVC doors. This work has not yet proceeded and it has still to go to Presbytery and the General Assembly Architecture Committee before work can commence.

Organisations

Sunday

Our Services of worship and praise continued throughout the year as already detailed .

Our praise group continued to meet and practise new pieces of praise with a view to introducing them to the congregation.

A crèche is available every Sunday morning for all pre-school children attending church. At present we have 2 babies and 4 toddlers who are looked after by women from our congregation. A rota system is in operation throughout the year to make sure every Sunday is covered.

Our Sunday school, known as McQuiston Kids continued and 2024 has been an interesting year for the young people in McQuiston. Messy Church, held on a number of occasions continued to supplement our children's ministry. At all times we aim to provide a safe environment for the young people. God is at the centre of all we do and the activities we provide. McQuiston Youth saw our Bible Class restart for those in years 8-11 on Sunday mornings.

We have a consistent number of children weekly with 12 children and young people attending. This number may vary slightly but we are prepared for an increase or decrease in our attendance. The weekly leaders are also helped by a young teen in the church who faithfully attends every week and helps in many different ways. The programme theme each week is the same for all children but we have activities which are specific for both KS1 and KS2 to enhance and support the lessons. We have been working through the themes, "Jesus is our hero" and more recently "The life of Jesus" in accordance with the Gospel of Matthew.

Tuesday

Craic n Coffee

Craic 'n' Coffee, our coffee drop in, continues to provide a warm and comfortable location for anyone to rest and have fellowship with friend and strangers alike. It available each Tuesday from 10.00am to 11.30am except in July and August

Senior Members Fellowship / Friendship Hour

The Seniors Fellowship meets on the second Tuesday of each month at 2.15pm in the DD Boyle room. It was "re branded" in 2024 to be the Friendship Hour and is now open to anyone in the congregation who can come along.

The programme is very varied and ranges from a service of Communion, bus trips, various speakers and singers to the traditional Christmas Dinner.

All we do in Senior Members/Friendship hour is to the glory and honour of our God.

Wednesday

Redcar Crafts

Redcar Crafts continues to provide a useful outlet for those who crochet and knit and are generally creative. We meet on a Wednesday morning in the DD Boyle Room from 10am to 12pm. You can learn new skills, practise and hone old skills. You may also be treated to some pavlova and coffee.

We enjoy each others company and have scones and tray bakes with our tea and coffee. You may also be treated to some pavlova There is always lots of chat along with the knitting and crocheting.

New craft topics like wreath making and tile stencils have been introduce and enjoyed by.all.

Our charity work includes making baby hats, blankets and garments for the Maternity Unit at the RVH, including small items for premature babies and babies born sleeping. Our Craft Sale has provided contributions to Marie Curie Cancer Care and the church heating fund.

Discipleship Groups

Discipleship Groups meet on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of the month from 07:30pm to 09:00pm to study God's word and to disciple each other into having a deeper understanding of the Word. The aim is to encourage greater study resulting spiritual growth.

Thursday

Coffee with Jesus

Coffee with Jesus is exactly what it claims to be, a time of studying God's word, prayer, alongside coffee and cake.

Women from the congregation meet at 9.30-10.30am in the Youth Room (two Thursdays a month) where we have a coffee and catch up and discuss the chapters of the book which we have read in advance.

This years favourite book was Rebekah Lyons's "Building a Resilient Life". Through this book we discovered five practical, life-changing rules of resilience to help you thrive in difficult times.

Each time we meet we end with a time of prayer; praying for one another, the church, the world and anything/anyone else the Lord puts on our hearts.

This group has really been an encouragement to the women involved and their commitment to it has proven how important they think it is as part of their faith journey.

Transformers

Transformers has become established as a part of our Children's Ministry for children in the primary 1 to primary 7 age group. The format of games, crafts, quizzes and bible teaching is very popular with this age group. The programme always finishes with toast and juice. Each Thursday evening ending in prayer with the children.

There is a regular attendance of 25 children from a total of 32 enrolled.

The leaders who are all very enthusiastic feel very thankful that the parents allow us to look after their children for an hour every Thursday evening from 06:30pm to 07:30pm.

We thank God for each child that comes through our doors. The leaders are privileged to be allowed to teach these young children about the love of Jesus.

The congregation is encouraged to hold Transformers before the Lord in prayer.

Friday

McQuiston Toddlers

Toddlers meets on Friday, of each week from 10.00-11.30. All toddlers/babies of pre-school age and their parents, grandparents or carers are very welcome.

Some of the activities we enjoy each week include soft play and the ball pool, construction toys, puzzles, drawing and colouring, playing with sand, dress up and playing on the cars and bikes. We also love to sing and have snacks.

We will again hold some special events like "Splat" messy play as a bit of a special treat.

Many of the families returned week after week, which has been incredibly encouraging for the leaders. We are so grateful to God for the relationships that have been formed, and continue to pray for opportunities to reach out to those in our local community as we prepare for the year ahead.

The Boys' Brigade

The 19th Company, the Boys' Brigade meets on a night Friday night Our programme is greatly varied and includes team sports, games, quizzes and Biblical teaching. We also love to have special outings to places such as bowling or mini-golf during the year.

We meet every Friday night (excluding school holidays) and the start/finish times are as follows:

Anchors Boys(4-7 years); boys must be started P1 and meet 6:30pm to 7:45pm.

Junior Section (8-11 years) and Company/Seniors Sections(11-18 years) meet 6:30pm to 8pm.

Miscellaneous

Other events such as the ever popular Ladies Nights are held on a regular basis and are always well supported with over 60 women in attendance. Music at McQuiston is a concert which is held in the church once a year. Music and singing covering a wide range of tastes is performed to a very high standard.

In addition to our own church organisations the church halls are used by other external organisations as follows :

Gifts of shortbread biscuits were delivered to the businesses in the local area.

Our Christmas Carols service took place on Sunday evening 22 December with a large congregation. This service was also broadcast live on-line. Some light refreshments were served at its conclusion.

PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland meets the public benefit requirement by providing benefit to its members and the general public by making known the Christian Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ through the advancement of religion.

The direct benefits which flow from the purposes of the Church include the gaining of an understanding in Christian beliefs as set out in the Bible and in the Church's subordinate standards (the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Shorter and Larger Catechisms) leading to spiritual and moral development and opportunities for response to Bible teaching. In turn, this framework leads to practical expressions of Christian beliefs and standards in the local community such as through the care of those in need (including the sick, disabled and bereaved).

Generally the above benefits are delivered locally by congregations and their members, or are facilitated through presbyteries or are organised and delivered centrally. Local delivery is facilitated by central resources in almost all cases. Public access is made known through the use of noticeboards, printed material, press advertisement, websites, and social media or in other ways.

The benefits are demonstrated through regular evaluation of the services and informal and ad-hoc feedback from members, their families, and members of the public.

The purpose does not lead to harm. The only private benefit flowing from our purpose is related to Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, Irish Mission workers and Lay Agents who receive benefits as a result of their holding office or employment. However, this is incidental and necessary in order to further our charitable purpose. There are no other private benefits. The beneficiaries of this purpose are members, their families, other individuals that the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is in direct and indirect contact with, the community in which pastoral services are provided and other communities throughout Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and worldwide which benefit from our engagement with and support for both Christian and other secular organisations, charities and individual members of the public.

The Kirk Session has had regard to the Charity Commissions Public benefit requirement statutory guidance.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The congregation's main source of income is members' contributions through the Weekly Freewill Offering. There were 146 contributors during the year donating a total of £ 70,499.00.

Total Income of the congregation during the year was £149,005.00 compared to £127395.0 in the previous year.

Total expenditure increased from £143,824.00 in 2023 to £148875.0 in 2024

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the annual report and the financial statements of the congregation in accordance with applicable law and generally accepted accounting practice.

As the congregation's total income does not exceed £250,000, the Trustees have elected under Section 64(3) of the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008 to prepare a receipts and payment account and a statement of assets and liabilities.
