A summary of the Charity's main activities to further its purposes for the public benefit and the main achievements in the year

Our unit had 6 consistent Rangers during the period of 1st January 2024 to 31st December 2024. During the year, Rangers took part in several activities to gain badges such as Chinese New Year, Skills For My Future Theme Award, Young Leader Qualifications and they are currently working towards their Queens Guide Award and Duke of Edinburgh Awards.

The Rangers had the opportunity to get out into the world, experience new challenges, and enjoy spending time with their friends while building important life skills. Throughout the year, they took part in a variety of activities including a Halloween party, Christmas crafts, Chinese New Year crafts, Easter crafts, and several adventures that encouraged teamwork and independence. These activities helped the girls develop their creativity, confidence, and communication skills, as well as strengthen their friendships within the unit.

In addition to these experiences, several Rangers have been actively volunteering with the Rainbow, Brownie, and Guide units each week as part of their Young Leader qualification. This has given them valuable opportunities to gain leadership experience, plan and deliver activities, and act as positive role models for younger members.

The girls also completed the Girlguiding Ulster-Scots badge, learning about local traditions, language, music, and history, which helped them develop a greater sense of pride in their community and appreciation of their shared heritage. The year concluded with a joint summer BBQ for all sections — Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, and Rangers — featuring games and bouncy castles, providing a fun and relaxed way to celebrate everyone's achievements before the holidays.
