**STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT**

**The Kirk Session**

The charity trustees of the congregation are the members of its Kirk Session. Under the congregation's governing document, The Code, the book of the constitution and government of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Kirk Session seeks to watch over and promote the spiritual interest of the congregation and of persons not connected with any congregation who are within its bounds. It ensures pastoral care is in place in the congregation and seeks to further the contribution of the Church to Christian witness and service in the local community. The Kirk Session has delegated to its Congregational Committee the temporal affairs of the congregation, including administering all funds and property belonging to the congregation. Members of the Kirk Session are ex-officio members of the Congregational Committee.

The Kirk Session consists of the ordained minister and the ruling elders of the congregation. All members are entitled to propose, speak and exercise equal votes at meetings, except that the Moderator, the minister in active duty in the congregation, has no deliberative but only a casting vote.

Stated meetings of the Kirk Session are normally held bi-monthly, with the exception of a summer break. To be chosen for the office of the eldership in the congregation, a person must be a voting member and a regular attendant on its ordinances. The selection of those proposed to be called to the office can be either by the congregation or by the Kirk Session. Members are elected if they obtain two-thirds of those who vote.

**Presbytery**

Under the Presbyterian Church in Ireland form of governance, the corporate oversight of a congregation is the responsibility of a Presbytery which superintends generally the spiritual and temporal affairs of the congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church has been assigned to the Dromore Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The membership of the Presbytery consists mainly of the active ministers of congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly, ministers who have retired from active duty and an elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**The General Assembly**

The General Assembly is the supreme court of the Church, representing in one body the whole Church and acting as its supreme legislative, administration and judicial authority, in dealing with all matters brought before it. The General Assembly is normally constituted in June for worship and to conduct its business. At the end of business, it is dissolved. The membership of the General Assembly consists mainly of the active ministers of each congregation, retired ministers and a representative elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE**

Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church (HHPC) is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, as a Reformed Church within the wider body of Christ, is grounded in the Scriptures and exists to love and honour God through faith in His Son and by the power of His Spirit to enable her members to play their part in fulfilling God's mission to our world.

The congregation's mission purpose is to be: **'A church for all ages – teaching God's love and demonstrating it in the community'**. In 2010 HHPC introduced a mission plan on the theme of **'welcome'**. The mission plan aims to build on this theme by focussing on increasing the welcome experienced by every age group within the congregation and also extending it to those currently without. An updating of the plan is in the process of being undertaken.

HHPC began its life some seventy years ago and grew in numbers as the population of the local area expanded. The other churches in the area are Roman Catholic and Church of Ireland. HHPC has a prominent location very close to Harmony Hill Primary School with which it has positive links. We believe HHPC should be a church which reaches out to everyone in the local area rather than focussing on a particular 'niche'.

Our missional activities have, in the past, included several Alpha courses, holding a 'Welcome Sunday' on several occasions (modelled on the 'Back to Church Sunday' idea from the Church of England) holding a 'Back to School with God' Sunday, and a Holiday Bible Club mission week. Older people have been engaged through activities such as coffee mornings and Sunday lunches. There are also the harder to measure benefits of building up long-term relationships and community goodwill simply by members of the congregation being good ambassadors for Jesus amongst the local community where they go about their day-to-day activities.

In terms of mission overseas, we are the sending church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission workers based in Blantyre, Malawi. We have also had younger members and, on one occasion, some older members, go on short term mission trips with the support of HHPC.

As we look ahead to preparing an updated mission plan, we will seek to evaluate and to build upon that which has proven fruitful in what has gone before, considering whether to continue to engage in a number of the missional activities mentioned above, as well as exploring new options to enable us to reach out to and serve the needs of the community around us.

**Where we seek to go longer term in mission**

We consider it important to have a general idea of our long-term direction. We also have some short-term plans so that the momentum for mission is not lost, however most of these short-term plans have suffered setbacks due to the challenges experienced in the aftermath of the Covid-19 pandemic.

We have identified the following areas to explore and, where possible, develop:

- To be an inter-generational church: To consider the potential for engagement with families with younger children, teenagers and with young adults. Our aim is to be a congregation, which understands what it is to be a covenant community, with people of all ages participating in its life and witness.
- To be a discipling church: Aiming to build an integrated, inter-generational, worshipping community where members go deeper in their faith growing and maturing as disciple-making disciples of Jesus.
- To be a missional church: Developing an outward-looking mindset, remembering that we are called to share the good news of Jesus with those who do not yet know Him and to welcome them in His name. During the 2024 year this area of our thinking has been increasingly shaped by a consideration of the demographics of the area around our church premises.

These will involve an increasing commitment by all members of the congregation to our missional purpose through prayer, financial giving, involvement in Sunday worship plus other group activity/activities where possible, as well as extending the mission of the congregation in the community and in their daily lives, wherever their 'frontlines' place them. Short-term actions will be required as we move towards our longer-term goals and a range of strategies are being prayerfully considered by the church leadership team.

**ACTIVITIES AND OBJECTIVES**

The congregation normally meets for worship every Sunday and visitors are welcome to join. This has been the case throughout 2024, The Sacrament of the Lords Supper is observed regularly during the year and all those who have been baptised and who have made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are admitted to the Lord's Supper. In 2024 there were six communion services.

### **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

#### **Worship and prayer**

Throughout 2024, the church family has come together for worship each Sunday morning at 11am as is their custom. It has been encouraging to see some more members return to gathered worship or resume more regular attendance at gathered worship. Throughout the year services have also continued to be livestreamed to accommodate those who, for a variety of reasons, might find themselves unable to attend worship. Numbers attending worship have remained at a steady level of between 75-100 across the year. Key activities within church life are now taking place 'in-person', although one group continues to use a blend of 'in-person' and virtual approaches.

At 31 December 2024 there were 251 communicant members and 239 families connected with the congregation.

#### **Pastoral care**

Pastoral care in the church is provided through a district model and is leadership-led. We also recognise that some 'informal' pastoral care is delivered amongst members of the church family, one to another, and particularly so within some of our organised activities. Members of the congregation who are unable to attend church due to sickness or age are visited on a regular basis by the minister or a ruling elder. Church services continue to be livestreamed for those who are unable, by reason of age or infirmity, to return to gathered worship and can also be accessed 'on demand' via the church website. Audio copies of the weekly service are also distributed as requested and at Harvest and Christmas gifts from the Church are made to the elderly and indisposed.

In-person visitation remains the primary route for the delivery of pastoral care. Alongside this, the use of telephone 'check-ins' and of messaging apps to maintain regular contact and augment face-to-face visits has been recognised as helpful.

**Mission and outreach**

The congregation's mission and outreach activity has remained largely unchanged for the 2024 year.

We maintain good links with Harmony Hill Primary School, with our minister continuing to hold a seat on the Board of Governors.

Members of the congregation promote the work of Christian Aid by fund-raising events and through an annual Christian Aid Service.

We are the home church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission co-workers based in Malawi. TEEM (Theological Education by Extension Malawi) carries out grass root training of local pastors and students and produces home study material. Producing material, both written and audio, that is grounded in the local African church context forms a crucial part of TEEM's work.

The congregation supports the United Appeal for Mission which is a central fund of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This fund enables congregations to support the wider mission of the denomination and to carry out mission and outreach on a denominational basis, beyond that which the congregation could do on its own. The United Appeal Fund provides financial support for mission personnel at home and overseas, assists congregations with the deployment of locally based staff, enables church planting, provides grant support for the upkeep of church premises, assists with the running costs of Union Theological College, the Church's training college for ministry students, and financially supports congregations in the areas of worship, discipleship, global mission, outreach, leadership, and pastoral care.

**Presbytery**

The congregation is represented at the regular meetings of Presbytery by the minister and one of the elders. This provides an important link between the congregations and the wider structures of the church. Six Presbytery meetings have taken place in person, as normal throughout 2024.

**General Assembly**

The minister and one of the elders are nominated to attend the meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland usually held in Assembly Buildings, Belfast, in June. The General Assembly in 2024 was held from 20th – 22nd June 2024 in Assembly Buildings.

**Property**

The main work carried out on church properties in 2024 was the external painting of the church premises, the fitting of new carpeting in the Welcome Area, the repair/resurfacing of outdoor steps, and the repurposing of a room as an additional small group meeting space.

**Organisations**

**Sunday School**

The Sunday School is available for a wide age range starting with babies in the Crèche and up to the 11 to 16 age group in "Go For IT".

**Crèche**

Crèche facilities are available for children in the age range newborn up to three years old.

**Primary**

This group is for children in the Pre-school to P7 category which meets during the Sunday morning church service. Activities included bible stories and prayer along with the craftwork, singing and playing games.

**Go For IT**

This is a Bible class, which is available each Sunday morning for 11 to 16-year-olds. Scripture Union material was used as a teaching resource. These classes are fun and interactive with the focus of helping the young people develop their faith.

**Flame**

Flame is a Youth Fellowship for 12 to 18-year-olds which met on a Sunday evening up until the end of October 2024. Flame stands for Following the Lord in all my Endeavours. Flame activities include bible studies, prayer, listening to Christian artists and learning from and encouraging each other's journey of faith.

**Men's Group**

The Men's Group meets on the last Monday of each month for Bible study, prayer, discussion and fellowship. The group meets in each other's homes and includes social events. Attendance is not restricted to Harmony Hill members, with some attendees coming from other churches. Meetings attract between 6 and 10 attendees, socials 10 to 20.

**Women's Bible Study Group**

The group has a current membership of approximately twelve, with attendance varying each month, depending on members' family, work and other commitments. During 2024, the group met in-person on the third Monday evening of the month. The group completed their series on 'Questions God Asks' and started a new series on the New Testament book of James.

**Prayer & Bible Study**

A monthly prayer meeting, held on the second Tuesday evening of each month, has continued throughout the 2024 year providing the opportunity to pray for the church family, our local context, and also global matters. In the second half of the 2024 year the prayer meeting moved from the Zoom platform to resume meeting in-person in a newly appointed room within the church. Attendance at the monthly prayer meeting ranged from 6-10 people.

Across the 2024 year a monthly Bible study was held on the third Tuesday evening of each month. In the 2024 year the Bible study group chose to begin exploring the book of Acts, seeking to see what might be learned, as 'church' today, from the birth and growth of the early church and also to draw down learning about how God equips His people to go out as ambassadors for Christ. For the first half of the 2024 year the Bible Study was held on a virtual platform, returning to meeting in-person in the autumn of 2024. Attendance at the monthly Bible study was consistent throughout the year at 8-10 people.

Throughout the 2024 year, the practice of meeting together on the first Sunday evening of each month for a time of shared discussion around God's word following a short teaching input has continued. From January to June 2024 this meeting time was used to engage with the Bible Society's 'The Bible Course', deepening participants' understanding of how the metanarrative of the Bible comes together. From September 2024 onward the Bible Society's 'Bible Book Club' resources have shaped this meeting time, with participants reading a particular book of the Bible in preparation for the meeting and then learning together about its context and key themes alongside exploring how the teaching and themes contained therein might be applicable in the current cultural context and to their lives today. Attendance on Sunday evenings has ranged from 12-24 people, across a spectrum of age groups.

**Presbyterian Women (PW)**

PW met on the third Wednesday of each month from September to April 2023-24 mostly in the afternoon. We had an interesting speaker at every meeting and enjoyed an afternoon outing in October. We also led a Sunday morning service with a visiting speaker in October. We continued to raise funds throughout the year and donated to various charities including to our church towards the IT equipment in the Harold Gray Hall which we and others can now use to our benefit. We also supported our Special Home Project and Special Overseas Project for the year. An average of 25 ladies attended the meetings.

**Ladies Badminton**

The Wednesday morning badminton is enjoyed by a small group of ladies. There is always a chance to have a catch-up chat and a cuppa. New members are always welcome.

**Harmony Hill Craft Group**

We meet on a Thursday morning from 10.30 to 12.15 to enjoy fellowship and a cup of tea or coffee together.

Over the years we have provided various items for a number of charities - namely hats and blankets for maternity departments in hospitals, knitted teddies for the P S N I and the First Responders to the Ambulances, for distribution when on call-out visits. We have also supported the Cancer Centre and the International Meeting Point with a supply of knitted items.

Ladies of all ages are given a warm welcome, whether a knitter or not, and many friendships have been cemented here on a Thursday morning.

**Church Choir**

The choir's role is to support worship at services and on other occasions through leading the congregation in hymns and singing anthems and introits. The choir meets to practice on Thursday evenings in the Harold Gray Hall and there are approximately 12 members, supplemented by additional singers on special occasions, such as the annual carol service. A small group of dedicated musicians provides accompaniment.

**Worship Group**

The Worship Group plays on alternate weeks to support Sunday worship. This mostly comprises young people in the church.

**Parents and Toddlers (Mums and Tots)**

The group met on Thursday mornings from 10.00 am to 12.00 throughout 2024. We usually had 15 to 20 children in attendance with ages ranging from a few weeks up to about 3 years. Most children move on to nursery or preschool at about age 3, so we no longer have 4-year-olds in attendance. Mothers, fathers, grandparents and child carers accompany the children. We have a wide range of toys and craft equipment available. We have craft time, play time, snack time at the table, singing and activity songs. A great deal of fun is enjoyed by everyone including the 6 loyal leaders.

**Barmbrack DIY**

This small group of retired people 6 in number met each Monday morning during 2024 from 10 until 12.30. We undertake various tasks around the church premises such as minor maintenance and repair jobs. We also tidy up after Sunday services and prepare the buildings for the coming week's activities.

**Ladies Bowling Club**

The Ladies Bowling Club met every Wednesday in 2024 from 2- 4pm during Indoor Bowling season. We have Cross Community membership with a total of 14 full members. Attendance was good for the year. Matches were played each week and the Bowling scores carried over. The winner for 2024 was presented with the Bowling cup at the end of year bowls lunch which was enjoyed by all.

**Knitting, Crochet and Craft Group**

This group increased its membership from 15 to 20 members during the year and continued to meet twice per month on a Wednesday evening in the Harold Gray Hall. The group makes knitted, crocheted and hand stitched items some of which are donated to charity. Members learn and share their skills and encourage and inspire each other. New members are very welcome.

**PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT**

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland meets the public benefit requirement by providing benefit to its members and the general public by making known the Christian Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ through the advancement of religion.

The direct benefits which flow from the purposes of the Church include the gaining of an understanding in Christian beliefs as set out in the Bible and in the Church's subordinate standards (the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Shorter and Larger Catechisms) leading to spiritual and moral development and opportunities for response to Bible teaching. In turn, this framework leads to practical expressions of Christian beliefs and standards in the local community such as through the care of those in need (including the sick, disabled and bereaved).

Generally, the above benefits are delivered locally by congregations and their members, or are facilitated through presbyteries or are organised and delivered centrally. Local delivery is facilitated by central resources in almost all cases. Public access is made known through the use of noticeboards, printed material, press advertisement, websites, and social media or in other ways.

The benefits are demonstrated through regular evaluation of the services and informal and ad-hoc feedback from members, their families, and members of the public.

The purpose does not lead to harm. The only private benefit flowing from our purpose is related to Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, Irish Mission workers and Lay Agents who receive benefits as a result of their holding office or employment. However, this is incidental and necessary in order to further our charitable purpose. There are no other private benefits. The beneficiaries of this purpose are members, their families, other individuals that the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is in direct and indirect contact with, the community in which pastoral services are provided and other communities throughout Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and worldwide which benefit from our engagement with and support for both Christian and other secular organisations, charities and individual members of the public.

The Kirk Session has had regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit requirement statutory guidance.

**FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The congregation's main source of income is members' contributions through the Weekly Freewill Offering. There were 168 contributors during the year [173 in previous year, 2023] donating a total of £89,766 (£85,916 in previous year, 2023).

Total comparable Income of the congregation during the year was £174,875 against £163,264 in the previous year. This includes income to restricted funds as Buildings & Development and special collections such as United Appeal. This shows income to be increasing.

Total expenditure increased from £179,622 in 2023 to £194,589 in 2024. The main reason for the increase in expenditure is a further catch up on property maintenance and an increase in giving to charities.

**RESPONSIBILITIES IN RESPECT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The Trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the congregation and the financial activities for that year. In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently.
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Funds will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the fund's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the congregations and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities (1 January 2015)". They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the congregation and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**GOING CONCERN**

The activities of the congregation are dependent on ongoing contributions from its members. The Trustees are of the opinion that the congregation has sufficient resources at the date of approval of these financial statements to meet commitments which will arise in the year from the date of signing this report and subject to the continuing support from members to fund on an ongoing basis the congregation's current activities and other financial commitments.

**RESERVES POLICY**

The Trustees have considered the level of unrestricted cash reserves that it is appropriate to hold taking account of current and ongoing commitments. The Trustees believe it prudent – to hold cash reserves to the equivalent of 6 months normal expenditure (i.e. circa £75,000).

At the year-end, unrestricted cash reserves were £79,351

The policy of the Trustees concerning the Buildings and Development Fund is to hold reserves of £50,000.

At year-end, restricted reserves of cash for Buildings and Development were £57,433,



**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**BASIS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the congregation is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their affiliation to another body, nor those that are informal gatherings of church members.

**FUND ACCOUNTING**

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be retained either permanently or at the congregation's discretion; the income derived from the endowment is to be used either as restricted or unrestricted income funds depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established in the first place.

Restricted funds comprise (a) income from endowments which is to be expended only on the restricted purposes intended by the donor and (b) revenue donations or grants for a specific congregational activity intended by the donor. Where these funds have unspent balances, interest on their pooled investment is apportioned to the individual funds on an average balance basis.

Unrestricted funds are income funds which are to be spent on the congregation's general purposes. Designated funds are general funds set aside by the congregation for use in the future.

**(i) Recognition of incoming resources**

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the congregation becomes entitled to the resources

**(ii) Incoming resources with related expenditure**

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising income) the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

**(iii) Grants and donations**

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the congregation has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

**(iv) Tax reclaims on donations and gifts**

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

**(v) Contractual income and performance related grants**

This is only included in the SoFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

**(vi) Gifts in kind**

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

**(vii) Donated services and facilities**

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

**(viii) Volunteer help**

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

**(ix) Investment income**

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

**(x) Investment gains and losses**

This includes any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

**EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES**

**(xi) Liability recognition**

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the congregation to pay out resources.

**(xii) Governance costs**

These are shown within charitable activities and include the costs of preparation and examination of accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

**(xiii) Grants with performance conditions**

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SoFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

**ASSETS**

**(xiv) Tangible Fixed Assets**

Tangible fixed assets for use by charity are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £2,500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is recorded on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life as follows

Buildings:	- over 50 years
Fixtures, fittings and equipment	- over 10 years
Motor Vehicles	- over 4 years
Computers, software and technical equipment	- over 4 years

**(xv) Investments**

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange are valued at market value at the year end. Other investment assets are included at trustees' best estimate of market value.

**7. PENSION COSTS**

The minister of the congregation is a member of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009). This is a scheme operated by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, a separate registered charity. The congregation pays an assessment to the Presbyterian Church in Ireland equivalent to the employer’s pension contribution for the Scheme and based on the stipend paid to the minister. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) is a funded Scheme of the defined benefit type, providing defined benefits based on career average revalued salary. The Scheme has assets held in a separately administered fund managed by a board of trustees. The Presbyterian Church and the Scheme Trustees have agreed a funding plan to ensure the Scheme is sufficiently funded to meet current and future obligations. A formal schedule of contributions was drawn up on 25 November 2015 whereby the Presbyterian Church agreed to pay from 31 December 2015 contributions of 24% of pensionable salaries to cover the accrual of benefits for future service, expenses, the cost of insuring death in service benefits and funding the scheme deficit.

**The Kirk Session**

The charity trustees of the congregation are the members of its Kirk Session. The Kirk Session has delegated to its Congregational Committee the temporal affairs of the congregation, including administering all funds and property belonging to the congregation. Members of the Kirk Session are ex-officio members of the Congregational Committee.

The Kirk Session consists of the ordained minister and the ruling elders of the congregation. All members are entitled to propose, speak and exercise equal votes at meetings, except that the Moderator, the minister in active duty in the congregation, has no deliberative but only a casting vote.

Stated meetings of the Kirk Session are normally held bi-monthly, with the exception of a summer break. To be chosen for the office of the eldership in the congregation, a person must be a voting member and a regular attendant on its ordinances. The selection of those proposed to be called to the office can be either by the congregation or by the Kirk Session. Members are elected if they obtain two-thirds of those who vote.

**Presbytery**

Under the Presbyterian Church in Ireland form of governance, the corporate oversight of a congregation is the responsibility of a Presbytery which superintends generally the spiritual and temporal affairs of the congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church has been assigned to the Dromore Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The membership of the Presbytery consists mainly of the active ministers of congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly, ministers who have retired from active duty and an elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**The General Assembly**

The General Assembly is the supreme court of the Church, representing in one body the whole Church and acting as its supreme legislative, administration and judicial authority, in dealing with all matters brought before it. The General Assembly is normally constituted in June for worship and to conduct its business. At the end of business, it is dissolved. The membership of the General Assembly consists mainly of the active ministers of each congregation, retired ministers and a representative elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE**

Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church (HHPC) is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, as a Reformed Church within the wider body of Christ, is grounded in the Scriptures and exists to love and honour God through faith in His Son and by the power of His Spirit to enable her members to play their part in fulfilling God's mission to our world.

The congregation's mission purpose is to be: **'A church for all ages – teaching God's love and demonstrating it in the community'**. In 2010 HHPC introduced a mission plan on the theme of **'welcome'**. The mission plan aims to build on this theme by focussing on increasing the welcome experienced by every age group within the congregation and also extending it to those currently without. An updating of the plan is in the process of being undertaken.

HHPC began its life some seventy years ago and grew in numbers as the population of the local area expanded. The other churches in the area are Roman Catholic and Church of Ireland. HHPC has a prominent location very close to Harmony Hill Primary School with which it has positive links. We believe HHPC should be a church which reaches out to everyone in the local area rather than focussing on a particular 'niche'.

Our missional activities have, in the past, included several Alpha courses, holding a 'Welcome Sunday' on several occasions (modelled on the 'Back to Church Sunday' idea from the Church of England) holding a 'Back to School with God' Sunday, and a Holiday Bible Club mission week. Older people have been engaged through activities such as coffee mornings and Sunday lunches. There are also the harder to measure benefits of building up long-term relationships and community good will simply by members of the congregation being good ambassadors for Jesus amongst the local community where they go about their day-to-day activities.

In terms of mission overseas, we are the sending church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission workers based in Blantyre, Malawi. We have also had younger members and, on one occasion, some older members, go on short term mission trips with the support of HHPC.

As we look ahead to preparing an updated mission plan, we will seek to evaluate and to build upon that which has proven fruitful in what has gone before, considering whether to continue to engage in a number of the missional activities mentioned above, as well as exploring new options to enable us to reach out to and serve the needs of the community around us.

**Where we seek to go longer term in mission**

We consider it important to have a general idea of our long-term direction. We also have some short-term plans so that the momentum for mission is not lost, however most of these short-term plans have suffered setbacks due to the challenges experienced in the aftermath of the Covid-19 pandemic.

We have identified the following areas to explore and develop:

- To be an inter-generational church: More focussed engagement with families with younger children, teenagers and young adults. Our aim is to be a congregation, which understands what it is to be a covenant community, with people of all ages participating in its life and witness.
- To be a discipling church: Aiming to build an integrated, inter-generational, worshipping community where members go deeper in their faith growing and maturing as disciple-making disciples of Jesus.
- To be a missional church: Developing an outward-looking mindset, remembering that we are called to share the good news of Jesus with those who do not yet know Him and to welcome them in His name.

These will involve an increasing commitment by all members of the congregation to our missional purpose through prayer, financial giving, involvement in Sunday worship plus other group activity/activities where possible, as well as extending the mission of the congregation in the community and in their daily lives, wherever their 'frontlines' place them. Short-term actions will be required as we move towards our longer-term goals and a range of strategies are being prayerfully considered by the church leadership team.

**ACTIVITIES AND OBJECTIVES**

The congregation normally meets for worship every Sunday and visitors are welcome to join. This has been the case throughout 2023 with the removal of all Covid restrictions. The Sacrament of the Lords Supper is observed regularly during the year and all those who have been baptised and who have made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are admitted to the Lord's Supper. In 2023 there were six communion services.

**ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

**Worship and prayer**

2023 continued the restoration of normal patterns of gathering for worship with the encouragement of seeing some members return to gathered worship or to more regular attendance at gathered worship. That said, throughout the year services have also continued to be livestreamed to accommodate those who have been unable to attend worship or who do not yet feel comfortable doing so. Numbers attending worship have remained at a steady level of between 70-100 across the year. Most key activities within church life have now resumed 'in-person', whilst others remain on virtual platforms or use a blend of 'in-person' and virtual approaches.

At 31 December 2023 there were 263 communicant members and 256 families connected with the congregation.

**Pastoral care**

Pastoral care in the church is provided through a district model and is leadership-led. We also recognise that some 'informal' pastoral care is delivered amongst members of the church family, one to another, and particularly so within some of our organised activities. Members of the congregation who are unable to attend church due to sickness or age are visited on a regular basis by the minister or a ruling elder. Church services continue to be livestreamed for those who do not yet feel ready to or are unable to return to gathered worship and can also be accessed 'on demand' via the church website. Audio copies of the weekly service are also distributed as requested and at Harvest and Christmas gifts from the Church are made to the elderly and indisposed.

The return to normal patterns of in-person visitation has been greatly appreciated. Alongside this, the continued use of telephone 'check-ins' and of messaging apps to maintain regular contact and augment face-to-face visits has been helpful and a useful learning point drawn down from the requirements of the Covid pandemic.

**Mission and outreach**

The congregation's mission and outreach activity has remained largely unchanged for the 2023 year.

We maintain good links with Harmony Hill Primary School, with our minister continuing to hold a seat on the Board of Governors.

Members of the congregation promote the work of Christian Aid by fund-raising events and through an annual Christian Aid Service.

We are the home church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission co-workers based in Malawi. TEEM (Theological Education by Extension Malawi) carries out grass root training of local pastors and students and produces home study material. Producing material, both written and audio, that is grounded in the African church forms a crucial part of TEEM's work.

The congregation supports the United Appeal for Mission which is a central fund of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This fund enables congregations to support the wider mission of the denomination and to carry out mission and outreach on a denominational basis, beyond that which the congregation could do on its own. The United Appeal Fund provides financial support for mission personnel at home and overseas, assists congregations with the deployment of locally based staff, enables church planting, provides grant support for the upkeep of church premises, assists with the running costs of Union Theological College, the Church's training college for ministry students, and financially supports congregations in the areas of worship, discipleship, global mission, outreach, leadership, and pastoral

**Presbytery**

The congregation is represented at the regular meetings of Presbytery by the minister and one of the elders. This provides an important link between the congregations and the wider structures of the church. Presbytery meetings have taken place, in person, as normal throughout 2023.

**General Assembly**

The minister and one of the elders are nominated to attend the meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland usually held in Assembly Buildings, Belfast, in June. The General Assembly in 2023 was held from 21<sup>st</sup> – 24<sup>th</sup> June 2023 in Assembly Buildings.

**Property**

The main work carried out on church properties in 2023 was further digital screens fitted within the sanctuary, repairs to valley/guttering along the minor hall and an upgrade to the heating system in the Manse.

**Organisations**

**Sunday School**

The Sunday School covers a wide age range starting with babies in the Crèche and up to the 11 to 16 age group in "Go For IT".

**Crèche**

Crèche facilities are available for children in the age range newborn up to three years old.

**Primary**

This group is for children in the Pre-school to P7 category which meets during the Sunday morning church service. This Sunday School met on alternate weeks with an average attendance of 2-3 children. Activities included craftwork, singing, playing games, along with the bible stories and prayer.

**Go For IT**

This is a Bible class, which is held each Sunday morning for 11 to 16-year-olds. There were about four regular attenders. The Scripture Union "Rooted" was used as the main teaching resource. These classes are fun and interactive with the focus of helping the young people develop their faith.

**Flame**

Flame is a Youth Fellowship for 12 to 18-year-olds which meets on a Sunday evening. Flame stands for Following the Lord in all my Endeavours. There was an average regular attendance of 6-8 young people. Flame activities include bible studies, prayer, listening to Christian artists and learning from and encouraging each other's journey of faith. On the third Sunday in the month, the 16–18-year-olds meet to look deeper into their faith and discuss some of the issues facing our teens in today's society.

**BASE**

The Base has now ceased to exist following the decision of Kirk Session to close it down.

**Men's Group**

The Men's Group meets on the last Monday of each month for Bible study, prayer, discussion and fellowship. The group meets in each other's homes and includes social events. Attendance is not restricted to Harmony Hill members, with some attendees coming from other churches. Meetings attract between 6 and 10 attendees, socials 10 to 20.

### **Prayer & Bible Study**

A monthly prayer meeting, held on the second Tuesday evening of each month, has continued throughout the 2023 year providing the opportunity to pray for the church family, our local context, and also global matters. Having consulted with those who attend the prayer meeting, we have continued to hold this meeting on a virtual platform to enable a broader range of participants to maintain their involvement. Attendance at the monthly prayer meeting ranged from 6-12 people.

Across the 2023 year a monthly Bible study was held on the third Tuesday evening of each month. In the 2023 year the Bible study group chose to undertake an introductory tour of the five books of the book of Psalms, recognising the overarching theme of each section and considering some of the different types of psalms contained within this book of the Bible. The studies used a variety of psalm genres as a means of exploring going deeper in our prayer lives wherever the circumstances of life find us, pointing to Jesus' life and example as a crucial guide to doing so. Again, the decision was made to continue to hold the monthly meeting for Bible study on a virtual platform to facilitate access for those wishing to come along on a regular basis who would find it more difficult to do so in person. Attendance at the monthly Bible study was consistent throughout the year at 10-12 people.

The autumn of 2023 also saw the continuation of meeting together on the first Sunday evening of each month for a time of shared discussion around God's word following a short teaching input. In the church year commencing September 2023, this has been based on 'The Bible Course' produced by The Bible Society which aims to increase competence with and confidence in God's word to us in Scripture by showing how all the books, characters, and events encountered in the Bible fit together to form one big story, from Genesis to Revelation. It was decided to use this course as a follow-on from a summer sermon series exploring the metanarrative of the Bible with the aim of further deepening understanding of the same and also of encouraging participants to regularly spend time reading and reflecting on Scripture and how it might be applied to our lives and contexts today. Attendance on Sunday evenings has ranged from 18-24 people, across a broad spectrum of age groups.

### **Women's Bible Study Group**

The group has a current membership of approximately twelve, with attendance varying each month, depending on members' family, work and other commitments. During 2023, the group had a mix of in-person and online meetings, (via the Zoom platform), continuing to meet on the third Monday evening of the month. The group completed their series on 'Prayers in the Bible' and started a new series on 'Questions God asks'.

**Presbyterian Women (PW)**

PW met on the third Wednesday of each month from September to April 2022-23 mostly in the afternoon. We had an interesting speaker at every meeting and enjoyed an afternoon outing in October. We also led a Sunday morning service with a visiting speaker in October. As everything got back to normal after COVID, we were able to, once again, raise funds and donate to various charities. We also supported our Special Home Project for the year which was the International Meeting Point and Special Overseas Project, Evangelical Christian Church in Timor. An average of 25 ladies attended the meetings.

**Ladies Badminton**

The Wednesday morning badminton is enjoyed by a small group of ladies. There is always a chance to have a catch-up chat and a cuppa. New members are always welcome.

**Harmony Hill Craft Group**

Our group meets on a Thursday morning at 10.30, where there is a warm welcome for all ladies. Many firm friendships have been made over a cup of tea or coffee.

During the year we have provided baby hats and blankets for the maternity departments in hospitals. We had a visit from the local First Responders when they gratefully received knitted teddies as did the local PSNI. Other items for charities have been completed as well. We hosted our friends from St Colman's Craft Group and look forward to visiting them very soon.

**Friendship Club**

After a period of dormancy, the Friendship Club was formally closed down in 2023 and all funds transferred to the church accounts.

**Church Choir**

The choir's role is to support worship at services and on other occasions through leading the congregation in hymns and singing anthems and introits. The choir meets to practice on Thursday evenings in the Harold Gray Hall and there are approximately 10 members, supplemented by additional singers on special occasions, such as the annual carol service. A small group of dedicated musicians provides accompaniment.

**Worship Group**

The Worship Group plays on alternate weeks to support Sunday worship. This mostly comprises young people in the church.

**Mixed Bowling Club**

Following a period of dormancy, the Mixed Bowling Club was formally closed down during 2023 and all remaining funds transferred to church accounts.

**Parents and Toddlers (Mums and Tots)**

The group met on Thursday mornings from 10.00 am to 12.00 throughout 2023. We usually had 15 to 20 children in attendance with ages ranging from a few weeks up to about 3 years. Most children move on to nursery or pre school at about age 3, so we no longer have 4-year-olds in attendance. Mothers, fathers, grandparents and child carers accompany the children. We have a wide range of toys and craft equipment available. We have craft time, play time, snack time at the table, singing and activity songs. A great deal of fun is enjoyed by everyone including the 6 loyal leaders.

**Barmbrack DIY**

This small group of retired people 6 in number met each Monday morning during 2023 from 10 until 12.30. We undertake various tasks around the church premises such as minor maintenance and repair jobs. We also tidy up after Sunday services and prepare the buildings for the coming week's activities.

**Ladies Bowling Club**

The Ladies Bowling Club met every Wednesday in 2023 from 2- 4pm during Indoor Bowling season. We have Cross Community membership with a total of 14 full members. Attendance was good for the year. Matches were played each week and the Bowling scores carried over. The winner for 2023 was presented with the Bowling cup at the end of year bowls lunch which was enjoyed by all.

**Knitting, Crochet and Craft Group**

This group, which has about 15 members, met twice per month on a Wednesday evening in the Harold Gray Hall. The group makes knitted, crocheted and hand stitched items some of which are donated to charity. Members learn and share their skills and encourage and inspire each other. New members are very welcome.

**PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT**

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland meets the public benefit requirement by providing benefit to its members and the general public by making known the Christian Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ through the advancement of religion.

The direct benefits which flow from the purposes of the Church include the gaining of an understanding in Christian beliefs as set out in the Bible and in the Church's subordinate standards (the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Shorter and Larger Catechisms) leading to spiritual and moral development and opportunities for response to Bible teaching. In turn, this framework leads to practical expressions of Christian beliefs and standards in the local community such as through the care of those in need (including the sick, disabled and bereaved).

Generally, the above benefits are delivered locally by congregations and their members, or are facilitated through presbyteries or are organised and delivered centrally. Local delivery is facilitated by central resources in almost all cases. Public access is made known through the use of noticeboards, printed material, press advertisement, websites, and social media or in other ways.

The benefits are demonstrated through regular evaluation of the services and informal and ad-hoc feedback from members, their families, and members of the public.

The purpose does not lead to harm. The only private benefit flowing from our purpose is related to Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, Irish Mission workers and Lay Agents who receive benefits as a result of their holding office or employment. However, this is incidental and necessary in order to further our charitable purpose. There are no other private benefits. The beneficiaries of this purpose are members, their families, other individuals that the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is in direct and indirect contact with, the community in which pastoral services are provided and other communities throughout Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and worldwide which benefit from our engagement with and support for both Christian and other secular organisations, charities and individual members of the public.

The Kirk Session has had regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit requirement statutory guidance.

**FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The congregation's main source of income is members' contributions through the Weekly Freewill Offering. There were 173 contributors during the year [184 in previous year, 2022] donating a total of £85,916 (£84,205 in previous year, 2022).

Total comparable Income of the congregation during the year was £163,264 against £160,332 in the previous year. This includes income to restricted funds as Buildings & Development and special collections such as United Appeal. This shows income to be holding steady.

Total expenditure increased from £161,747 in 2022 to £179,622 in 2023. The main reason for the increase in expenditure is a catch up on property maintenance which had fallen behind during covid.

**RESPONSIBILITIES IN RESPECT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The Trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the congregation and the financial activities for that year. In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Funds will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the fund's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the congregations and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities (1 January 2015)". They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the congregation and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**GOING CONCERN**

The activities of the congregation are dependent on ongoing contributions from its members. The Trustees are of the opinion that the congregation has sufficient resources at the date of approval of these financial statements to meet commitments which will arise in the year from the date of signing this report and subject to the continuing support from members to fund on an ongoing basis the congregation's current activities and other financial commitments.

**RESERVES POLICY**

The Trustees have considered the level of unrestricted cash reserves that it is appropriate to hold taking account of current and ongoing commitments. The Pandemic during 2020 demonstrated how unforeseen events can quickly, adversely, impact organisations. While the financial impact upon our organisation was contained, the Trustees believe it prudent – over the time period (2020 to 2025) - to increase our cash reserves to the equivalent of 6 months normal expenditure (i.e. circa £100,000).

At the year-end, unrestricted cash reserves were £81,600

The policy of the Trustees concerning the Buildings and Development Fund is to hold reserves of £50,000.

At year-end, restricted reserves of cash were £76,000,



I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2022 set out on pages to 23 - 36.

**Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner**

As the charity's Trustees you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008.

It is my responsibility to:

- follow the procedures laid down in the general Directions given by the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland under section 65(9)(b) of the Charities Act; and
- state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

**Basis of independent examiner's report**

I have examined your charity accounts as required under section 65 of the Charities Act and my examination was carried out in accordance with the general Directions given by the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland under section 65(9)(b) of the Charities Act.

My examination included a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. **1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**BASIS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the congregation is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their affiliation to another body, nor those that are informal gatherings of church members.

**FUND ACCOUNTING**

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be retained either permanently or at the congregation's discretion; the income derived from the endowment is to be used either as restricted or unrestricted income funds depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established in the first place.

Restricted funds comprise (a) income from endowments which is to be expended only on the restricted purposes intended by the donor and (b) revenue donations or grants for a specific congregational activity intended by the donor. Where these funds have unspent balances, interest on their pooled investment is apportioned to the individual funds on an average balance basis.

Unrestricted funds are income funds which are to be spent on the congregation's general purposes. Designated funds are general funds set aside by the congregation for use in the future.

**(i) Recognition of incoming resources**

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the congregation becomes entitled to the resources

**(ii) Incoming resources with related expenditure**

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising income) the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

**(iii) Grants and donations**

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the congregation has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

**(iv) Tax reclaims on donations and gifts**

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

**(v) Contractual income and performance related grants**

This is only included in the SoFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

**(vi) Gifts in kind**

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

**(vii) Donated services and facilities**

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

**(viii) Volunteer help**

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

**(ix) Investment income**

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

**(x) Investment gains and losses**

This includes any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

**EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES**

**(xi) Liability recognition**

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the congregation to pay out resources.

**(xii) Governance costs**

These are shown within charitable activities and include the costs of preparation and examination of accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

**(xiii) Grants with performance conditions**

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SoFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

**ASSETS**

**(xiv) Tangible Fixed Assets**

Tangible fixed assets for use by charity are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £2,500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is recorded on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life as follows

Buildings:	- over 50 years
Fixtures, fittings and equipment	- over 10 years
Motor Vehicles	- over 4 years
Computers, software and technical equipment	- over 4 years

**(xv) Investments**

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange are valued at market value at the year end. Other investment assets are included at trustees' best estimate of market value.

**7. PENSION COSTS**

The minister of the congregation is a member of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009). This is a scheme operated by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, a separate registered charity. The congregation pays an assessment to the Presbyterian Church in Ireland equivalent to the employer’s pension contribution for the Scheme and based on the stipend paid to the minister. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) is a funded Scheme of the defined benefit type, providing defined benefits based on career average revalued salary. The Scheme has assets held in a separately administered fund managed by a board of trustees. The Presbyterian Church and the Scheme Trustees have agreed a funding plan to ensure the Scheme is sufficiently funded to meet current and future obligations. A formal schedule of contributions was drawn up on 25 November 2015 whereby the Presbyterian Church agreed to pay from 31 December 2015 contributions of 24% of pensionable salaries to cover the accrual of benefits for future service, expenses, the cost of insuring death in service benefits and funding the scheme deficit.

**STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT**

**The Kirk Session**

The charity trustees of the congregation are the members of its Kirk Session. Under the congregation's governing document, The Code, the book of the constitution and government of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Kirk Session seeks to watch over and promote the spiritual interest of the congregation and of persons not connected with any congregation who are within its bounds. It ensures pastoral care is in place in the congregation and seeks to further the contribution of the Church to Christian witness and service in the local community. The Kirk Session has delegated to its Congregational Committee the temporal affairs of the congregation, including administering all funds and property belonging to the congregation. Members of the Kirk Session are ex-officio members of the Congregational Committee.

The Kirk Session consists of the ordained minister and the ruling elders of the congregation. All members are entitled to propose, speak and exercise equal votes at meetings, except that the Moderator, the minister in active duty in the congregation, has no deliberative but only a casting vote.

Stated meetings of the Kirk Session are normally held bi-monthly, with the exception of a summer break. To be chosen for the office of the eldership in the congregation, a person must be a voting member and a regular attendant on its ordinances. The selection of those proposed to be called to the office can be either by the congregation or by the Kirk Session. Members are elected if they obtain two-thirds of those who vote.

**Presbytery**

Under the Presbyterian Church in Ireland form of governance, the corporate oversight of a congregation is the responsibility of a Presbytery which superintends generally the spiritual and temporal affairs of the congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church has been assigned to the Dromore Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The membership of the Presbytery consists mainly of the active ministers of congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly, ministers who have retired from active duty and an elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**The General Assembly**

The General Assembly is the supreme court of the Church, representing in one body the whole Church and acting as its supreme legislative, administration and judicial authority, in dealing with all matters brought before it. The General Assembly is normally constituted in June for worship and to conduct its business. At the end of business, it is dissolved. The membership of the General Assembly consists mainly of the active ministers of each congregation, retired ministers and a representative elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE**

Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church (HHPC) is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, as a Reformed Church within the wider body of Christ, is grounded in the Scriptures and exists to love and honour God through faith in His Son and by the power of His Spirit to enable her members to play their part in fulfilling God's mission to our world.

The congregation's mission purpose is to be: **'A church for all ages – teaching God's love and demonstrating it in the community'**. In 2010 HHPC introduced a mission plan on the theme of **'welcome'**. The mission plan aims to build on this theme by focussing on increasing the welcome experienced by every age group within the congregation and also extending it to those currently without. An updating of the plan is in the process of being undertaken.

HHPC began its life some seventy years ago and grew in numbers as the population of the local area expanded. The other churches in the area are Roman Catholic and Church of Ireland. HHPC has a prominent location very close to Harmony Hill Primary School with which it has positive links. We believe HHPC should be a church which reaches out to everyone in the local area rather than focussing on a particular 'niche'.

Our missional activities have, in the past, included several Alpha courses, holding a 'Welcome Sunday' on several occasions (modelled on the 'Back to Church Sunday' idea from the Church of England) holding a 'Back to School with God' Sunday, and a Holiday Bible Club mission week. Older people have been engaged through activities such as coffee mornings and Sunday lunches. There are also the harder to measure benefits of building up long-term relationships and community good will simply by members of the congregation being good ambassadors for Jesus amongst the local community where they go about their day-to-day activities.

In terms of mission overseas, we are the sending church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission workers based in Blantyre, Malawi. We have also had younger members and, on one occasion, some older members, go on short term mission trips with the support of HHPC.

As we look ahead to preparing an updated mission plan, we will seek to evaluate and to build upon that which has proven fruitful in what has gone before, considering whether to continue to engage in a number of the missional activities mentioned above, as well as exploring new options to enable us to reach out to and serve the needs of the community around us.

**Where we seek to go longer term in mission**

We consider it important to have a general idea of our long-term direction. We also have some short-term plans so that the momentum for mission is not lost, however most of these short-term plans have suffered setbacks due to the challenges experienced in the aftermath of the Covid-19 pandemic.

We have identified the following areas to explore and develop:

- To be an inter-generational church: More focussed engagement with families with younger children, teenagers and young adults. Our aim is to be a congregation, which understands what it is to be a covenant community, with people of all ages participating in its life and witness.
- To be a discipling church: Aiming to build an integrated, inter-generational, worshipping community where members go deeper in their faith growing and maturing as disciple-making disciples of Jesus.
- To be a missional church: Developing an outward-looking mindset, remembering that we are called to share the good news of Jesus with those who do not yet know Him and to welcome them in His name.

These will involve an increasing commitment by all members of the congregation to our missional purpose through prayer, financial giving, involvement in Sunday worship plus other group activity/activities where possible, as well as extending the mission of the congregation in the community and in their daily lives, wherever their 'frontlines' place them. Short-term actions will be required as we move towards our longer-term goals and a range of strategies are being prayerfully considered by the church leadership team.

**ACTIVITIES AND OBJECTIVES**

The congregation normally meets for worship every Sunday and visitors are welcome to join. This has been the case throughout 2023 with the removal of all Covid restrictions. The Sacrament of the Lords Supper is observed regularly during the year and all those who have been baptised and who have made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are admitted to the Lord's Supper. In 2023 there were six communion services.

**ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

**Worship and prayer**

2023 continued the restoration of normal patterns of gathering for worship with the encouragement of seeing some members return to gathered worship or to more regular attendance at gathered worship. That said, throughout the year services have also continued to be livestreamed to accommodate those who have been unable to attend worship or who do not yet feel comfortable doing so. Numbers attending worship have remained at a steady level of between 70-100 across the year. Most key activities within church life have now resumed 'in-person', whilst others remain on virtual platforms or use a blend of 'in-person' and virtual approaches.

At 31 December 2023 there were 263 communicant members and 256 families connected with the congregation.

**Pastoral care**

Pastoral care in the church is provided through a district model and is leadership-led. We also recognise that some 'informal' pastoral care is delivered amongst members of the church family, one to another, and particularly so within some of our organised activities. Members of the congregation who are unable to attend church due to sickness or age are visited on a regular basis by the minister or a ruling elder. Church services continue to be livestreamed for those who do not yet feel ready to or are unable to return to gathered worship and can also be accessed 'on demand' via the church website. Audio copies of the weekly service are also distributed as requested and at Harvest and Christmas gifts from the Church are made to the elderly and indisposed.

The return to normal patterns of in-person visitation has been greatly appreciated. Alongside this, the continued use of telephone 'check-ins' and of messaging apps to maintain regular contact and augment face-to-face visits has been helpful and a useful learning point drawn down from the requirements of the Covid pandemic.

**Mission and outreach**

The congregation's mission and outreach activity has remained largely unchanged for the 2023 year.

We maintain good links with Harmony Hill Primary School, with our minister continuing to hold a seat on the Board of Governors.

Members of the congregation promote the work of Christian Aid by fund-raising events and through an annual Christian Aid Service.

We are the home church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission co-workers based in Malawi. TEEM (Theological Education by Extension Malawi) carries out grass root training of local pastors and students and produces home study material. Producing material, both written and audio, that is grounded in the African church forms a crucial part of TEEM's work.

The congregation supports the United Appeal for Mission which is a central fund of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This fund enables congregations to support the wider mission of the denomination and to carry out mission and outreach on a denominational basis, beyond that which the congregation could do on its own. The United Appeal Fund provides financial support for mission personnel at home and overseas, assists congregations with the deployment of locally based staff, enables church planting, provides grant support for the upkeep of church premises, assists with the running costs of Union Theological College, the Church's training college for ministry students, and financially supports congregations in the areas of worship, discipleship, global mission, outreach, leadership, and pastoral

**Presbytery**

The congregation is represented at the regular meetings of Presbytery by the minister and one of the elders. This provides an important link between the congregations and the wider structures of the church. Presbytery meetings have taken place, in person, as normal throughout 2023.

**General Assembly**

The minister and one of the elders are nominated to attend the meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland usually held in Assembly Buildings, Belfast, in June. The General Assembly in 2023 was held from 21<sup>st</sup> – 24<sup>th</sup> June 2023 in Assembly Buildings.

**Property**

The main work carried out on church properties in 2023 was further digital screens fitted within the sanctuary, repairs to valley/guttering along the minor hall and an upgrade to the heating system in the Manse.

**Organisations**

**Sunday School**

The Sunday School covers a wide age range starting with babies in the Crèche and up to the 11 to 16 age group in "Go For IT".

**Crèche**

Crèche facilities are available for children in the age range newborn up to three years old.

**Primary**

This group is for children in the Pre-school to P7 category which meets during the Sunday morning church service. This Sunday School met on alternate weeks with an average attendance of 2-3 children. Activities included craftwork, singing, playing games, along with the bible stories and prayer.

**Go For IT**

This is a Bible class, which is held each Sunday morning for 11 to 16-year-olds. There were about four regular attenders. The Scripture Union "Rooted" was used as the main teaching resource. These classes are fun and interactive with the focus of helping the young people develop their faith.

**Flame**

Flame is a Youth Fellowship for 12 to 18-year-olds which meets on a Sunday evening. Flame stands for Following the Lord in all my Endeavours. There was an average regular attendance of 6-8 young people. Flame activities include bible studies, prayer, listening to Christian artists and learning from and encouraging each other's journey of faith. On the third Sunday in the month, the 16–18-year-olds meet to look deeper into their faith and discuss some of the issues facing our teens in today's society.

**BASE**

The Base has now ceased to exist following the decision of Kirk Session to close it down.

**Men's Group**

The Men's Group meets on the last Monday of each month for Bible study, prayer, discussion and fellowship. The group meets in each other's homes and includes social events. Attendance is not restricted to Harmony Hill members, with some attendees coming from other churches. Meetings attract between 6 and 10 attendees, socials 10 to 20.

### **Prayer & Bible Study**

A monthly prayer meeting, held on the second Tuesday evening of each month, has continued throughout the 2023 year providing the opportunity to pray for the church family, our local context, and also global matters. Having consulted with those who attend the prayer meeting, we have continued to hold this meeting on a virtual platform to enable a broader range of participants to maintain their involvement. Attendance at the monthly prayer meeting ranged from 6-12 people.

Across the 2023 year a monthly Bible study was held on the third Tuesday evening of each month. In the 2023 year the Bible study group chose to undertake an introductory tour of the five books of the book of Psalms, recognising the overarching theme of each section and considering some of the different types of psalms contained within this book of the Bible. The studies used a variety of psalm genres as a means of exploring going deeper in our prayer lives wherever the circumstances of life find us, pointing to Jesus' life and example as a crucial guide to doing so. Again, the decision was made to continue to hold the monthly meeting for Bible study on a virtual platform to facilitate access for those wishing to come along on a regular basis who would find it more difficult to do so in person. Attendance at the monthly Bible study was consistent throughout the year at 10-12 people.

The autumn of 2023 also saw the continuation of meeting together on the first Sunday evening of each month for a time of shared discussion around God's word following a short teaching input. In the church year commencing September 2023, this has been based on 'The Bible Course' produced by The Bible Society which aims to increase competence with and confidence in God's word to us in Scripture by showing how all the books, characters, and events encountered in the Bible fit together to form one big story, from Genesis to Revelation. It was decided to use this course as a follow-on from a summer sermon series exploring the metanarrative of the Bible with the aim of further deepening understanding of the same and also of encouraging participants to regularly spend time reading and reflecting on Scripture and how it might be applied to our lives and contexts today. Attendance on Sunday evenings has ranged from 18-24 people, across a broad spectrum of age groups.

### **Women's Bible Study Group**

The group has a current membership of approximately twelve, with attendance varying each month, depending on members' family, work and other commitments. During 2023, the group had a mix of in-person and online meetings, (via the Zoom platform), continuing to meet on the third Monday evening of the month. The group completed their series on 'Prayers in the Bible' and started a new series on 'Questions God asks'.

**Presbyterian Women (PW)**

PW met on the third Wednesday of each month from September to April 2022-23 mostly in the afternoon. We had an interesting speaker at every meeting and enjoyed an afternoon outing in October. We also led a Sunday morning service with a visiting speaker in October. As everything got back to normal after COVID, we were able to, once again, raise funds and donate to various charities. We also supported our Special Home Project for the year which was the International Meeting Point and Special Overseas Project, Evangelical Christian Church in Timor. An average of 25 ladies attended the meetings.

**Ladies Badminton**

The Wednesday morning badminton is enjoyed by a small group of ladies. There is always a chance to have a catch-up chat and a cuppa. New members are always welcome.

**Harmony Hill Craft Group**

Our group meets on a Thursday morning at 10.30, where there is a warm welcome for all ladies. Many firm friendships have been made over a cup of tea or coffee.

During the year we have provided baby hats and blankets for the maternity departments in hospitals. We had a visit from the local First Responders when they gratefully received knitted teddies as did the local PSNI. Other items for charities have been completed as well. We hosted our friends from St Colman's Craft Group and look forward to visiting them very soon.

**Friendship Club**

After a period of dormancy, the Friendship Club was formally closed down in 2023 and all funds transferred to the church accounts.

**Church Choir**

The choir's role is to support worship at services and on other occasions through leading the congregation in hymns and singing anthems and introits. The choir meets to practice on Thursday evenings in the Harold Gray Hall and there are approximately 10 members, supplemented by additional singers on special occasions, such as the annual carol service. A small group of dedicated musicians provides accompaniment.

**Worship Group**

The Worship Group plays on alternate weeks to support Sunday worship. This mostly comprises young people in the church.

**Mixed Bowling Club**

Following a period of dormancy, the Mixed Bowling Club was formally closed down during 2023 and all remaining funds transferred to church accounts.

**Parents and Toddlers (Mums and Tots)**

The group met on Thursday mornings from 10.00 am to 12.00 throughout 2023. We usually had 15 to 20 children in attendance with ages ranging from a few weeks up to about 3 years. Most children move on to nursery or pre school at about age 3, so we no longer have 4-year-olds in attendance. Mothers, fathers, grandparents and child carers accompany the children. We have a wide range of toys and craft equipment available. We have craft time, play time, snack time at the table, singing and activity songs. A great deal of fun is enjoyed by everyone including the 6 loyal leaders.

**Barmbrack DIY**

This small group of retired people 6 in number met each Monday morning during 2023 from 10 until 12.30. We undertake various tasks around the church premises such as minor maintenance and repair jobs. We also tidy up after Sunday services and prepare the buildings for the coming week's activities.

**Ladies Bowling Club**

The Ladies Bowling Club met every Wednesday in 2023 from 2- 4pm during Indoor Bowling season. We have Cross Community membership with a total of 14 full members. Attendance was good for the year. Matches were played each week and the Bowling scores carried over. The winner for 2023 was presented with the Bowling cup at the end of year bowls lunch which was enjoyed by all.

**Knitting, Crochet and Craft Group**

This group, which has about 15 members, met twice per month on a Wednesday evening in the Harold Gray Hall. The group makes knitted, crocheted and hand stitched items some of which are donated to charity. Members learn and share their skills and encourage and inspire each other. New members are very welcome.

**PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT**

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland meets the public benefit requirement by providing benefit to its members and the general public by making known the Christian Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ through the advancement of religion.

The direct benefits which flow from the purposes of the Church include the gaining of an understanding in Christian beliefs as set out in the Bible and in the Church's subordinate standards (the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Shorter and Larger Catechisms) leading to spiritual and moral development and opportunities for response to Bible teaching. In turn, this framework leads to practical expressions of Christian beliefs and standards in the local community such as through the care of those in need (including the sick, disabled and bereaved).

Generally, the above benefits are delivered locally by congregations and their members, or are facilitated through presbyteries or are organised and delivered centrally. Local delivery is facilitated by central resources in almost all cases. Public access is made known through the use of noticeboards, printed material, press advertisement, websites, and social media or in other ways.

The benefits are demonstrated through regular evaluation of the services and informal and ad-hoc feedback from members, their families, and members of the public.

The purpose does not lead to harm. The only private benefit flowing from our purpose is related to Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, Irish Mission workers and Lay Agents who receive benefits as a result of their holding office or employment. However, this is incidental and necessary in order to further our charitable purpose. There are no other private benefits. The beneficiaries of this purpose are members, their families, other individuals that the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is in direct and indirect contact with, the community in which pastoral services are provided and other communities throughout Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and worldwide which benefit from our engagement with and support for both Christian and other secular organisations, charities and individual members of the public.

The Kirk Session has had regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit requirement statutory guidance.

**FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The congregation's main source of income is members' contributions through the Weekly Freewill Offering. There were 173 contributors during the year [184 in previous year, 2022] donating a total of £85,916 (£84,205 in previous year, 2022).

Total comparable Income of the congregation during the year was £163,264 against £160,332 in the previous year. This includes income to restricted funds as Buildings & Development and special collections such as United Appeal. This shows income to be holding steady.

Total expenditure increased from £161,747 in 2022 to £179,622 in 2023. The main reason for the increase in expenditure is a catch up on property maintenance which had fallen behind during covid.

**RESPONSIBILITIES IN RESPECT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The Trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the congregation and the financial activities for that year. In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Funds will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the fund's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the congregations and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities (1 January 2015)". They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the congregation and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**GOING CONCERN**

The activities of the congregation are dependent on ongoing contributions from its members. The Trustees are of the opinion that the congregation has sufficient resources at the date of approval of these financial statements to meet commitments which will arise in the year from the date of signing this report and subject to the continuing support from members to fund on an ongoing basis the congregation's current activities and other financial commitments.

**RESERVES POLICY**

The Trustees have considered the level of unrestricted cash reserves that it is appropriate to hold taking account of current and ongoing commitments. The Pandemic during 2020 demonstrated how unforeseen events can quickly, adversely, impact organisations. While the financial impact upon our organisation was contained, the Trustees believe it prudent – over the time period (2020 to 2025) - to increase our cash reserves to the equivalent of 6 months normal expenditure (i.e. circa £100,000).

At the year-end, unrestricted cash reserves were £81,600

The policy of the Trustees concerning the Buildings and Development Fund is to hold reserves of £50,000.

At year-end, restricted reserves of cash were £76,000,



**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**BASIS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the congregation is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their affiliation to another body, nor those that are informal gatherings of church members.

**FUND ACCOUNTING**

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be retained either permanently or at the congregation's discretion; the income derived from the endowment is to be used either as restricted or unrestricted income funds depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established in the first place.

Restricted funds comprise (a) income from endowments which is to be expended only on the restricted purposes intended by the donor and (b) revenue donations or grants for a specific congregational activity intended by the donor. Where these funds have unspent balances, interest on their pooled investment is apportioned to the individual funds on an average balance basis.

Unrestricted funds are income funds which are to be spent on the congregation's general purposes. Designated funds are general funds set aside by the congregation for use in the future.

**(i) Recognition of incoming resources**

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the congregation becomes entitled to the resources

**(ii) Incoming resources with related expenditure**

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising income) the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

**(iii) Grants and donations**

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the congregation has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

**(iv) Tax reclaims on donations and gifts**

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

**(v) Contractual income and performance related grants**

This is only included in the SoFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

**(vi) Gifts in kind**

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

**(vii) Donated services and facilities**

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

**(viii) Volunteer help**

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

**(ix) Investment income**

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

**(x) Investment gains and losses**

This includes any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

**EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES**

**(xi) Liability recognition**

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the congregation to pay out resources.

**(xii) Governance costs**

These are shown within charitable activities and include the costs of preparation and examination of accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

**(xiii) Grants with performance conditions**

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SoFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

**ASSETS**

**(xiv) Tangible Fixed Assets**

Tangible fixed assets for use by charity are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £2,500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is recorded on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life as follows

Buildings:	- over 50 years
Fixtures, fittings and equipment	- over 10 years
Motor Vehicles	- over 4 years
Computers, software and technical equipment	- over 4 years

**(xv) Investments**

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange are valued at market value at the year end. Other investment assets are included at trustees' best estimate of market value.

**7. PENSION COSTS**

The minister of the congregation is a member of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009). This is a scheme operated by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, a separate registered charity. The congregation pays an assessment to the Presbyterian Church in Ireland equivalent to the employer’s pension contribution for the Scheme and based on the stipend paid to the minister. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) is a funded Scheme of the defined benefit type, providing defined benefits based on career average revalued salary. The Scheme has assets held in a separately administered fund managed by a board of trustees. The Presbyterian Church and the Scheme Trustees have agreed a funding plan to ensure the Scheme is sufficiently funded to meet current and future obligations. A formal schedule of contributions was drawn up on 25 November 2015 whereby the Presbyterian Church agreed to pay from 31 December 2015 contributions of 24% of pensionable salaries to cover the accrual of benefits for future service, expenses, the cost of insuring death in service benefits and funding the scheme deficit.

**STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT**

**The Kirk Session**

The charity trustees of the congregation are the members of its Kirk Session. Under the congregation's governing document, The Code, the book of the constitution and government of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Kirk Session seeks to watch over and promote the spiritual interest of the congregation and of persons not connected with any congregation who are within its bounds. It ensures pastoral care is in place in the congregation and seeks to further the contribution of the Church to Christian witness and service in the local community. The Kirk Session has delegated to its Congregational Committee the temporal affairs of the congregation, including administering all funds and property belonging to the congregation. Members of the Kirk Session are ex-officio members of the Congregational Committee.

The Kirk Session consists of the ordained minister and the ruling elders of the congregation. All members are entitled to propose, speak and exercise equal votes at meetings, except that the Moderator, the minister in active duty in the congregation, has no deliberative but only a casting vote.

Stated meetings of the Kirk Session are normally held bi-monthly, with the exception of a summer break. To be chosen for the office of the eldership in the congregation, a person must be a voting member and a regular attendant on its ordinances. The selection of those proposed to be called to the office can be either by the congregation or by the Kirk Session. Members are elected if they obtain two-thirds of those who vote.

**Presbytery**

Under the Presbyterian Church in Ireland form of governance, the corporate oversight of a congregation is the responsibility of a Presbytery which superintends generally the spiritual and temporal affairs of the congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church has been assigned to the Dromore Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The membership of the Presbytery consists mainly of the active ministers of congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly, ministers who have retired from active duty and an elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**The General Assembly**

The General Assembly is the supreme court of the Church, representing in one body the whole Church and acting as its supreme legislative, administration and judicial authority, in dealing with all matters brought before it. The General Assembly is normally constituted in June for worship and to conduct its business. At the end of business, it is dissolved. The membership of the General Assembly consists mainly of the active ministers of each congregation, retired ministers and a representative elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE**

Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church (HHPC) is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, as a Reformed Church within the wider body of Christ, is grounded in the Scriptures and exists to love and honour God through faith in His Son and by the power of His Spirit to enable her members to play their part in fulfilling God's mission to our world.

The congregation's mission purpose is to be: **'A church for all ages – teaching God's love and demonstrating it in the community'**. In 2010 HHPC introduced a mission plan on the theme of **'welcome'**. The mission plan aims to build on this theme by focussing on increasing the welcome experienced by every age group within the congregation and also extending it to those currently without. An updating of the plan is in the process of being undertaken.

HHPC began its life some seventy years ago and grew in numbers as the population of the local area expanded. The other churches in the area are Roman Catholic and Church of Ireland. HHPC has a prominent location very close to Harmony Hill Primary School with which it has positive links. We believe HHPC should be a church which reaches out to everyone in the local area rather than focussing on a particular 'niche'.

Our missional activities have, in the past, included several Alpha courses, holding a 'Welcome Sunday' on several occasions (modelled on the 'Back to Church Sunday' idea from the Church of England) holding a 'Back to School with God' Sunday, and a Holiday Bible Club mission week. Older people have been engaged through activities such as coffee mornings and Sunday lunches. There are also the harder to measure benefits of building up long-term relationships and community good will simply by members of the congregation being good ambassadors for Jesus amongst the local community where they go about their day-to-day activities.

In terms of mission overseas, we are the sending church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission workers based in Blantyre, Malawi. We have also had younger members and, on one occasion, some older members, go on short term mission trips with the support of HHPC.

As we look ahead to preparing an updated mission plan, we will seek to evaluate and to build upon that which has proven fruitful in what has gone before, considering whether to continue to engage in a number of the missional activities mentioned above, as well as exploring new options to enable us to reach out to and serve the needs of the community around us.

**Where we seek to go longer term in mission**

We consider it important to have a general idea of our long-term direction. We also have some short-term plans so that the momentum for mission is not lost, however most of these short-term plans have suffered setbacks due to the challenges experienced in the aftermath of the Covid-19 pandemic.

We have identified the following areas to explore and develop:

- To be an inter-generational church: More focussed engagement with families with younger children, teenagers and young adults. Our aim is to be a congregation, which understands what it is to be a covenant community, with people of all ages participating in its life and witness.
- To be a discipling church: Aiming to build an integrated, inter-generational, worshipping community where members go deeper in their faith growing and maturing as disciple-making disciples of Jesus.
- To be a missional church: Developing an outward-looking mindset, remembering that we are called to share the good news of Jesus with those who do not yet know Him and to welcome them in His name.

These will involve an increasing commitment by all members of the congregation to our missional purpose through prayer, financial giving, involvement in Sunday worship plus other group activity/activities where possible, as well as extending the mission of the congregation in the community and in their daily lives, wherever their 'frontlines' place them. Short-term actions will be required as we move towards our longer-term goals and a range of strategies are being prayerfully considered by the church leadership team.

**ACTIVITIES AND OBJECTIVES**

The congregation normally meets for worship every Sunday and visitors are welcome to join. This has been the case throughout 2023 with the removal of all Covid restrictions. The Sacrament of the Lords Supper is observed regularly during the year and all those who have been baptised and who have made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are admitted to the Lord's Supper. In 2023 there were six communion services.

**ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

**Worship and prayer**

2023 continued the restoration of normal patterns of gathering for worship with the encouragement of seeing some members return to gathered worship or to more regular attendance at gathered worship. That said, throughout the year services have also continued to be livestreamed to accommodate those who have been unable to attend worship or who do not yet feel comfortable doing so. Numbers attending worship have remained at a steady level of between 70-100 across the year. Most key activities within church life have now resumed 'in-person', whilst others remain on virtual platforms or use a blend of 'in-person' and virtual approaches.

At 31 December 2023 there were 263 communicant members and 256 families connected with the congregation.

**Pastoral care**

Pastoral care in the church is provided through a district model and is leadership-led. We also recognise that some 'informal' pastoral care is delivered amongst members of the church family, one to another, and particularly so within some of our organised activities. Members of the congregation who are unable to attend church due to sickness or age are visited on a regular basis by the minister or a ruling elder. Church services continue to be livestreamed for those who do not yet feel ready to or are unable to return to gathered worship and can also be accessed 'on demand' via the church website. Audio copies of the weekly service are also distributed as requested and at Harvest and Christmas gifts from the Church are made to the elderly and indisposed.

The return to normal patterns of in-person visitation has been greatly appreciated. Alongside this, the continued use of telephone 'check-ins' and of messaging apps to maintain regular contact and augment face-to-face visits has been helpful and a useful learning point drawn down from the requirements of the Covid pandemic.

**Mission and outreach**

The congregation's mission and outreach activity has remained largely unchanged for the 2023 year.

We maintain good links with Harmony Hill Primary School, with our minister continuing to hold a seat on the Board of Governors.

Members of the congregation promote the work of Christian Aid by fund-raising events and through an annual Christian Aid Service.

We are the home church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission co-workers based in Malawi. TEEM (Theological Education by Extension Malawi) carries out grass root training of local pastors and students and produces home study material. Producing material, both written and audio, that is grounded in the African church forms a crucial part of TEEM's work.

The congregation supports the United Appeal for Mission which is a central fund of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This fund enables congregations to support the wider mission of the denomination and to carry out mission and outreach on a denominational basis, beyond that which the congregation could do on its own. The United Appeal Fund provides financial support for mission personnel at home and overseas, assists congregations with the deployment of locally based staff, enables church planting, provides grant support for the upkeep of church premises, assists with the running costs of Union Theological College, the Church's training college for ministry students, and financially supports congregations in the areas of worship, discipleship, global mission, outreach, leadership, and pastoral

**HHPC TRUSTEES ANNUAL REPORT (cont'd)**

**Presbytery**

The congregation is represented at the regular meetings of Presbytery by the minister and one of the elders. This provides an important link between the congregations and the wider structures of the church. Presbytery meetings have taken place, in person, as normal throughout 2023.

**General Assembly**

The minister and one of the elders are nominated to attend the meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland usually held in Assembly Buildings, Belfast, in June. The General Assembly in 2023 was held from 21<sup>st</sup> – 24<sup>th</sup> June 2023 in Assembly Buildings.

**Property**

The main work carried out on church properties in 2023 was further digital screens fitted within the sanctuary, repairs to valley/guttering along the minor hall and an upgrade to the heating system in the Manse.

**Organisations**

**Sunday School**

The Sunday School covers a wide age range starting with babies in the Crèche and up to the 11 to 16 age group in "Go For IT".

**Crèche**

Crèche facilities are available for children in the age range newborn up to three years old.

**Primary**

This group is for children in the Pre-school to P7 category which meets during the Sunday morning church service. This Sunday School met on alternate weeks with an average attendance of 2-3 children. Activities included craftwork, singing, playing games, along with the bible stories and prayer.

**Go For IT**

This is a Bible class, which is held each Sunday morning for 11 to 16-year-olds. There were about four regular attenders. The Scripture Union "Rooted" was used as the main teaching resource. These classes are fun and interactive with the focus of helping the young people develop their faith.

**Flame**

Flame is a Youth Fellowship for 12 to 18-year-olds which meets on a Sunday evening. Flame stands for Following the Lord in all my Endeavours. There was an average regular attendance of 6-8 young people. Flame activities include bible studies, prayer, listening to Christian artists and learning from and encouraging each other's journey of faith. On the third Sunday in the month, the 16–18-year-olds meet to look deeper into their faith and discuss some of the issues facing our teens in today's society.

**BASE**

The Base has now ceased to exist following the decision of Kirk Session to close it down.

**Men's Group**

The Men's Group meets on the last Monday of each month for Bible study, prayer, discussion and fellowship. The group meets in each other's homes and includes social events. Attendance is not restricted to Harmony Hill members, with some attendees coming from other churches. Meetings attract between 6 and 10 attendees, socials 10 to 20.

### **Prayer & Bible Study**

A monthly prayer meeting, held on the second Tuesday evening of each month, has continued throughout the 2023 year providing the opportunity to pray for the church family, our local context, and also global matters. Having consulted with those who attend the prayer meeting, we have continued to hold this meeting on a virtual platform to enable a broader range of participants to maintain their involvement. Attendance at the monthly prayer meeting ranged from 6-12 people.

Across the 2023 year a monthly Bible study was held on the third Tuesday evening of each month. In the 2023 year the Bible study group chose to undertake an introductory tour of the five books of the book of Psalms, recognising the overarching theme of each section and considering some of the different types of psalms contained within this book of the Bible. The studies used a variety of psalm genres as a means of exploring going deeper in our prayer lives wherever the circumstances of life find us, pointing to Jesus' life and example as a crucial guide to doing so. Again, the decision was made to continue to hold the monthly meeting for Bible study on a virtual platform to facilitate access for those wishing to come along on a regular basis who would find it more difficult to do so in person. Attendance at the monthly Bible study was consistent throughout the year at 10-12 people.

The autumn of 2023 also saw the continuation of meeting together on the first Sunday evening of each month for a time of shared discussion around God's word following a short teaching input. In the church year commencing September 2023, this has been based on 'The Bible Course' produced by The Bible Society which aims to increase competence with and confidence in God's word to us in Scripture by showing how all the books, characters, and events encountered in the Bible fit together to form one big story, from Genesis to Revelation. It was decided to use this course as a follow-on from a summer sermon series exploring the metanarrative of the Bible with the aim of further deepening understanding of the same and also of encouraging participants to regularly spend time reading and reflecting on Scripture and how it might be applied to our lives and contexts today. Attendance on Sunday evenings has ranged from 18-24 people, across a broad spectrum of age groups.

### **Women's Bible Study Group**

The group has a current membership of approximately twelve, with attendance varying each month, depending on members' family, work and other commitments. During 2023, the group had a mix of in-person and online meetings, (via the Zoom platform), continuing to meet on the third Monday evening of the month. The group completed their series on 'Prayers in the Bible' and started a new series on 'Questions God asks'.

**Presbyterian Women (PW)**

PW met on the third Wednesday of each month from September to April 2022-23 mostly in the afternoon. We had an interesting speaker at every meeting and enjoyed an afternoon outing in October. We also led a Sunday morning service with a visiting speaker in October. As everything got back to normal after COVID, we were able to, once again, raise funds and donate to various charities. We also supported our Special Home Project for the year which was the International Meeting Point and Special Overseas Project, Evangelical Christian Church in Timor. An average of 25 ladies attended the meetings.

**Ladies Badminton**

The Wednesday morning badminton is enjoyed by a small group of ladies. There is always a chance to have a catch-up chat and a cuppa. New members are always welcome.

**Harmony Hill Craft Group**

Our group meets on a Thursday morning at 10.30, where there is a warm welcome for all ladies. Many firm friendships have been made over a cup of tea or coffee.

During the year we have provided baby hats and blankets for the maternity departments in hospitals. We had a visit from the local First Responders when they gratefully received knitted teddies as did the local PSNI. Other items for charities have been completed as well. We hosted our friends from St Colman's Craft Group and look forward to visiting them very soon.

**Friendship Club**

After a period of dormancy, the Friendship Club was formally closed down in 2023 and all funds transferred to the church accounts.

**Church Choir**

The choir's role is to support worship at services and on other occasions through leading the congregation in hymns and singing anthems and introits. The choir meets to practice on Thursday evenings in the Harold Gray Hall and there are approximately 10 members, supplemented by additional singers on special occasions, such as the annual carol service. A small group of dedicated musicians provides accompaniment.

**Worship Group**

The Worship Group plays on alternate weeks to support Sunday worship. This mostly comprises young people in the church.

**Mixed Bowling Club**

Following a period of dormancy, the Mixed Bowling Club was formally closed down during 2023 and all remaining funds transferred to church accounts.

**Parents and Toddlers (Mums and Tots)**

The group met on Thursday mornings from 10.00 am to 12.00 throughout 2023. We usually had 15 to 20 children in attendance with ages ranging from a few weeks up to about 3 years. Most children move on to nursery or pre school at about age 3, so we no longer have 4-year-olds in attendance. Mothers, fathers, grandparents and child carers accompany the children. We have a wide range of toys and craft equipment available. We have craft time, play time, snack time at the table, singing and activity songs. A great deal of fun is enjoyed by everyone including the 6 loyal leaders.

**Barmbrack DIY**

This small group of retired people 6 in number met each Monday morning during 2023 from 10 until 12.30. We undertake various tasks around the church premises such as minor maintenance and repair jobs. We also tidy up after Sunday services and prepare the buildings for the coming week's activities.

**Ladies Bowling Club**

The Ladies Bowling Club met every Wednesday in 2023 from 2- 4pm during Indoor Bowling season. We have Cross Community membership with a total of 14 full members. Attendance was good for the year. Matches were played each week and the Bowling scores carried over. The winner for 2023 was presented with the Bowling cup at the end of year bowls lunch which was enjoyed by all.

**Knitting, Crochet and Craft Group**

This group, which has about 15 members, met twice per month on a Wednesday evening in the Harold Gray Hall. The group makes knitted, crocheted and hand stitched items some of which are donated to charity. Members learn and share their skills and encourage and inspire each other. New members are very welcome.

**PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT**

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland meets the public benefit requirement by providing benefit to its members and the general public by making known the Christian Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ through the advancement of religion.

The direct benefits which flow from the purposes of the Church include the gaining of an understanding in Christian beliefs as set out in the Bible and in the Church's subordinate standards (the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Shorter and Larger Catechisms) leading to spiritual and moral development and opportunities for response to Bible teaching. In turn, this framework leads to practical expressions of Christian beliefs and standards in the local community such as through the care of those in need (including the sick, disabled and bereaved).

Generally, the above benefits are delivered locally by congregations and their members, or are facilitated through presbyteries or are organised and delivered centrally. Local delivery is facilitated by central resources in almost all cases. Public access is made known through the use of noticeboards, printed material, press advertisement, websites, and social media or in other ways.

The benefits are demonstrated through regular evaluation of the services and informal and ad-hoc feedback from members, their families, and members of the public.

The purpose does not lead to harm. The only private benefit flowing from our purpose is related to Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, Irish Mission workers and Lay Agents who receive benefits as a result of their holding office or employment. However, this is incidental and necessary in order to further our charitable purpose. There are no other private benefits. The beneficiaries of this purpose are members, their families, other individuals that the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is in direct and indirect contact with, the community in which pastoral services are provided and other communities throughout Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and worldwide which benefit from our engagement with and support for both Christian and other secular organisations, charities and individual members of the public.

The Kirk Session has had regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit requirement statutory guidance.

**FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The congregation's main source of income is members' contributions through the Weekly Freewill Offering. There were 173 contributors during the year [184 in previous year, 2022] donating a total of £85,916 (£84,205 in previous year, 2022).

Total comparable Income of the congregation during the year was £163,264 against £160,332 in the previous year. This includes income to restricted funds as Buildings & Development and special collections such as United Appeal. This shows income to be holding steady.

Total expenditure increased from £161,747 in 2022 to £179,622 in 2023. The main reason for the increase in expenditure is a catch up on property maintenance which had fallen behind during covid.

**RESPONSIBILITIES IN RESPECT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The Trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the congregation and the financial activities for that year. In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Funds will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the fund's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the congregations and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities (1 January 2015)". They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the congregation and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**GOING CONCERN**

The activities of the congregation are dependent on ongoing contributions from its members. The Trustees are of the opinion that the congregation has sufficient resources at the date of approval of these financial statements to meet commitments which will arise in the year from the date of signing this report and subject to the continuing support from members to fund on an ongoing basis the congregation's current activities and other financial commitments.

**RESERVES POLICY**

The Trustees have considered the level of unrestricted cash reserves that it is appropriate to hold taking account of current and ongoing commitments. The Pandemic during 2020 demonstrated how unforeseen events can quickly, adversely, impact organisations. While the financial impact upon our organisation was contained, the Trustees believe it prudent – over the time period (2020 to 2025) - to increase our cash reserves to the equivalent of 6 months normal expenditure (i.e. circa £100,000).

At the year-end, unrestricted cash reserves were £81,600

The policy of the Trustees concerning the Buildings and Development Fund is to hold reserves of £50,000.

At year-end, restricted reserves of cash were £76,000,



**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**BASIS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the congregation is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their affiliation to another body, nor those that are informal gatherings of church members.

**FUND ACCOUNTING**

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be retained either permanently or at the congregation's discretion; the income derived from the endowment is to be used either as restricted or unrestricted income funds depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established in the first place.

Restricted funds comprise (a) income from endowments which is to be expended only on the restricted purposes intended by the donor and (b) revenue donations or grants for a specific congregational activity intended by the donor. Where these funds have unspent balances, interest on their pooled investment is apportioned to the individual funds on an average balance basis.

Unrestricted funds are income funds which are to be spent on the congregation's general purposes. Designated funds are general funds set aside by the congregation for use in the future.

**(i) Recognition of incoming resources**

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the congregation becomes entitled to the resources

**(ii) Incoming resources with related expenditure**

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising income) the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

**(iii) Grants and donations**

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the congregation has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

**(iv) Tax reclaims on donations and gifts**

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

**(v) Contractual income and performance related grants**

This is only included in the SoFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

**(vi) Gifts in kind**

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

**(vii) Donated services and facilities**

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

**(viii) Volunteer help**

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

**(ix) Investment income**

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

**(x) Investment gains and losses**

This includes any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

**EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES**

**(xi) Liability recognition**

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the congregation to pay out resources.

**(xii) Governance costs**

These are shown within charitable activities and include the costs of preparation and examination of accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

**(xiii) Grants with performance conditions**

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SoFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

**(xiv) Tangible Fixed Assets**

Depreciation is recorded on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life as follows

**7. PENSION COSTS**

The minister of the congregation is a member of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009). This is a scheme operated by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, a separate registered charity. The congregation pays an assessment to the Presbyterian Church in Ireland equivalent to the employer’s pension contribution for the Scheme and based on the stipend paid to the minister. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) is a funded Scheme of the defined benefit type, providing defined benefits based on career average revalued salary. The Scheme has assets held in a separately administered fund managed by a board of trustees. The Presbyterian Church and the Scheme Trustees have agreed a funding plan to ensure the Scheme is sufficiently funded to meet current and future obligations. A formal schedule of contributions was drawn up on 25 November 2015 whereby the Presbyterian Church agreed to pay from 31 December 2015 contributions of 24% of pensionable salaries to cover the accrual of benefits for future service, expenses, the cost of insuring death in service benefits and funding the scheme deficit.

**STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT**

**The Kirk Session**

The charity trustees of the congregation are the members of its Kirk Session. Under the congregation's governing document, The Code, the book of the constitution and government of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Kirk Session seeks to watch over and promote the spiritual interest of the congregation and of persons not connected with any congregation who are within its bounds. It ensures pastoral care is in place in the congregation and seeks to further the contribution of the Church to Christian witness and service in the local community. The Kirk Session has delegated to its Congregational Committee the temporal affairs of the congregation, including administering all funds and property belonging to the congregation. Members of the Kirk Session are ex-officio members of the Congregational Committee.

The Kirk Session consists of the ordained minister and the ruling elders of the congregation. All members are entitled to propose, speak and exercise equal votes at meetings, except that the Moderator, the minister in active duty in the congregation, has no deliberative but only a casting vote.

Stated meetings of the Kirk Session are normally held monthly, with the exception of a summer break. To be chosen for the office of the eldership in the congregation, a person must be a voting member and a regular attendant on its ordinances. The selection of those proposed to be called to the office can be either by the congregation or by the Kirk Session. Members are elected if they obtain two-thirds of those who vote.

**Presbytery**

Under the Presbyterian Church in Ireland form of governance, the corporate oversight of a congregation is the responsibility of a Presbytery which superintends generally the spiritual and temporal affairs of the congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church has been assigned to the Dromore Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The membership of the Presbytery consists mainly of the active ministers of congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly, ministers who have retired from active duty and an elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**The General Assembly**

The General Assembly is the supreme court of the Church, representing in one body the whole Church and acting as its supreme legislative, administration and judicial authority, in dealing with all matters brought before it. The General Assembly is normally constituted during the first week in June for worship and to conduct its business. At the end of business, it is dissolved. The membership of the General Assembly consists mainly of the active ministers of each congregation, retired ministers and a representative elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE**

Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church (HHPC) is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, as a Reformed Church within the wider body of Christ is grounded in the Scriptures and exists to love and honour God through faith in His Son and by the power of His Spirit to enable her members to play their part in fulfilling God's mission to our world.

The congregation's mission purpose is to be: **'A church for all ages – teaching God's love and demonstrating it in the community'** In 2010 HHPC introduced a mission plan on the theme of **'welcome'**. The mission plan aims to build on this theme by focussing on increasing the welcome experienced by every age group within the congregation and also extending it to those currently without. An updating of the plan is to be undertaken.

HHPC began its life just over sixty years ago and grew in numbers as the population of the local area expanded. The other churches in the area are Roman Catholic and Church of Ireland. HHPC has a prominent location very close to Harmony Hill Primary School with which it has positive links. We believe HHPC should be a church which reaches out to everyone in the local area rather than focussing on a particular 'niche'.

Our missional activities have, in the past, included several Alpha courses, holding a 'Welcome Sunday' on several occasions (modelled on the 'Back to Church Sunday' idea from the Church of England) holding a 'Back to School with God' Sunday, and a Holiday Bible Club mission week. Older people have been engaged activities such as coffee mornings and Sunday lunches. There are also the harder to measure benefits of building up long-term relationships and community good will. As well as these organised mission activities, the Minister, along with some others from the congregation on an informal basis, have been involved in one-to-one outreach.

In terms of mission overseas, we are the sending church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission workers based in Malawi. We have also had younger members and, on one occasion, some older members, go on short term mission trips with the support of HHPC.

As we look ahead to preparing an updated mission plan, we will seek to evaluate and to build upon that which has proven fruitful in what has gone before, considering whether to continue to engage in a number of the mission activities mentioned above, as well as exploring new activities to enable us to reach out to and serve the needs of the community around us.

**Where we seek to go longer term in mission**

We consider it important to have a general idea of our long-term direction. We also have some short-term plans so that the momentum for mission is not lost, however most of these short-term plans have had to be put on hold or set aside due the Covid-19 pandemic.

We have identified the following areas to explore and develop:

- To be an inter-generational church: More focussed engagement with families with younger children, teenagers and young adults. Our aim is to be a congregation, which understands what it is to be a covenant community, with people of all ages participating in its life and witness.
- To be a discipling church: Aiming to build an integrated, inter-generational, worshipping community where members go deeper in their faith growing and maturing as disciple-making disciples of Jesus.
- To be a missional church: Developing an outward-looking mindset, remembering that we are called to share the good news of Jesus with those who do not yet know Him and to welcome them in His name.

These will involve an increasing commitment by all members of the congregation to our missional purpose through prayer, financial giving, involvement in Sunday worship plus other group activity/activities where possible, as well as extending the mission of the congregation in the community and in their daily lives, wherever their 'frontlines' place them. Short-term actions will be required as we move towards our longer-term goals and a range of strategies are being prayerfully considered by the church leadership team.

**ACTIVITIES AND OBJECTIVES**

The congregation normally meets for worship every Sunday and visitors are welcome to join. This has been the case throughout 2022 with the removal of Covid restrictions. The Sacrament of the Lords Supper is observed regularly during the year and all those who have been baptised and who have made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are admitted to the Lord's Supper. In 2022 there were six communion services.

**ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

**Worship and prayer**

2022 brought a welcome return to more normal patterns of gathering for worship with the removal of remaining Covid protocols, although throughout the year services have continued to be livestreamed to accommodate those who have been unable to attend worship or who do not yet feel ready to do so. Numbers attending worship have remained at a steady level of between 70-100 across the year. Many key activities within church life were resumed 'in-person', with others remaining on virtual platforms or using a blend of 'in-person' and virtual approaches.

At 31 December 2022 there were 274 communicant members and 278 families connected with the congregation.

**Pastoral care**

Pastoral care in the church is provided through a district model and is leadership-led. Members of the congregation who are unable to attend church due to sickness or age are visited on a regular basis by the minister or a ruling elder. The church's part-time pastoral assistant retired at the end of July 2022 and their additional support in congregational visitation will be much missed. Church services continue to be livestreamed for those who do not yet feel ready to or are unable to return to gathered worship and can also be accessed 'on demand' via the church website. Audio copies of the weekly service are also distributed as requested and at Harvest and Christmas gifts from the Church are made to the elderly and indisposed.

The ability to resume in-person visitation, alongside telephone calls and use of messaging apps, in 2022 has been both welcome and helpful.

**Mission and outreach**

At a local level the congregation has attempted some one-off and new outreach activities in 2022.

All activities associated with The Base, an outreach programme to youth in the community sponsored by the church, ceased in March 2020 due to the Covid -19 pandemic and in 2022, following a thorough and wide-ranging review, the decision was made to cease the programme offered through The Base.

We maintain good links with Harmony Hill Primary School, with our minister continuing to hold a seat on the Board of Governors.

Members of the congregation promote the work of Christian Aid by fund-raising events and through an annual Christian Aid Service.

In the last quarter of 2022, the church trialled opening as a 'Warm Space' for members of the local community for one morning per week. The community was made aware of this initiative through door-to-door leafleting and social media.

We are the home church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission co-workers based in Malawi. TEEM (Theological Education by Extension Malawi) carries out grass root training of local pastors and students, and produces home study material. Producing material both written and audio in the local language forms a crucial part of TEEM's work.

The congregation supports the United Appeal for Mission which is a central fund of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This fund enables congregations to support the wider mission of the denomination and to carry out mission and outreach on a denominational basis, beyond that which the congregation could do on its own. The United Appeal Fund provides financial support for mission personnel at home and overseas, assists congregations with the deployment of locally based staff, enables church planting, provides grant support for the upkeep of church premises, assists with the running costs of Union Theological College, the Church's training college for ministry students, and financially supports congregations in the areas of worship, discipleship, global mission, outreach, leadership, and pastoral care.

**Presbytery**

The congregation is represented at the regular meetings of Presbytery by the minister and one of the elders. This provides an important link between the congregations and the wider structures of the church. Presbytery meetings have taken place, in person, as normal throughout 2022.

**General Assembly**

The minister and one of the elders are nominated to attend the meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland usually held in Assembly Buildings, Belfast, in June. The General Assembly in 2022 was held from 22<sup>nd</sup>-25<sup>th</sup> June 2022 in Assembly Buildings.

**Property**

The main work carried out on our property during 2022 was the coating of the church and hall flat roof sections with Aluminium Bitumen.

**Sunday School**

The Sunday School covers a fairly wide age range starting with babies in the Crèche and up to the 11 to 16 age group in "Go For IT". Sunday school started to meet in person again in 2022.

Crèche facilities are available for children in the age range newborn up to three years old.

**Primary**

This group is for children in the Pre-school to P7 category which meets during the Sunday morning church service. Since March 2022 it has returned to face to face on alternate weeks with an average attendance of 2-3 children. Face to face allows us to return to normal Sunday school activity such as craft, singing, playing games, along with the bible stories and prayer.

**Go For IT**

This is a Bible class, which is held each Sunday morning for 11 to 16-year-olds. There were seven regular attenders. The Scripture Union "Rooted" was used as the main teaching resource. These classes are fun and interactive with the focus of helping the young people develop their faith.

**Flame**

Flame is a Youth Fellowship for 12 to 18-year-olds which meets on a Sunday evening. Flame stands for Following the Lord in all my Endeavours. There was an average regular attendance of 6-8 young people. Flame activities include bible studies, prayer, listening to Christian artists and learning from and encouraging each other's journey of faith. On the third Sunday in the month, the 16–18-year-olds meet to look deeper into their faith and discuss some of the issues facing our teens in today's society.

**BASE**

The Base, an outreach programme to youth in the community, sponsored by the Church, had to suspend all activities in mid-March 2020 due to the Covid pandemic. Unfortunately, it was not possible to restart youth activities operating from The Base for a variety of reasons. During 2022 Kirk Session commissioned a review of the programme consulting widely with interested parties. Following on from this, the very difficult decision was taken to cease The Base activities on a permanent basis.

**Prayer & Bible Study**

A monthly prayer meeting, held on the second Tuesday evening of each month, has continued throughout the 2022 year. In consultation with those who attend the prayer meeting it was decided to continue to hold this meeting on a virtual platform to enable a broader range of participants to maintain their involvement. Attendance at the monthly prayer meeting ranged from 6-14 people.

Across the 2022 year a monthly Bible study was held on the third Tuesday evening of each month. In the 2022 year the Bible study group chose to undertake an in-depth study of the book of Revelation which deepened understanding of “the hope that [we] have” (1 Peter 3:15) and also explored how our future hope brings comfort and strength for living in a broken and disordered world. Again, the decision was made to continue to hold the monthly meeting for Bible study on a virtual platform to facilitate access for those wishing to come along on a regular basis who would find it more difficult to do so in person. Attendance at the monthly Bible study was consistent throughout the year at 12-14 people.

In the autumn of 2022 there was also a recommencement of meeting together on the first Sunday evening of each month for a time of shared discussion around God’s word following a short teaching input. This has been based around the ‘Expressions’ resource prepared by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland which aims to shape conversations, amongst those participating, about how faith can be expressed in everyday life and witness. Attendance on Sunday evenings has ranged from 18-24 people.

**Men's Group**

The Men’s Group meets on the last Monday of each month for Bible study, prayer, discussion and fellowship. The group meets in each other’s homes and includes social events. Attendance is not restricted to Harmony Hill members, with some attendees coming from other churches. Meetings attract between 6 and 10 attendees, socials 10 to 20.

**Women's Bible Study Group**

The group has a current membership of approximately twelve, with attendance varying each month, depending on members' family, work and other commitments. During 2022, the group had a mix of in-person and online meetings, (via the Zoom platform), continuing to meet on the third Monday evening of the month. The group completed their IVP Life Builder series on 'Sabbath: The Gift of Rest' and started a new series on 'Prayers in the Bible'.

**Presbyterian Women (PW)**

PW continued to meet every month on Zoom in 2021-22 from September to March. We ran a couple of our meetings using our own members to entertain us, but we also had several entertaining speakers throughout the year. An average of 25 ladies attended each month and we were pleased to be able to hold our Annual General Meeting in the church hall in March and get together again in person.

**Ladies Badminton**

The Wednesday morning badminton is enjoyed by a small group of ladies. There is always a chance to have a catch-up chat and a cuppa. New members are always welcome.

**Harmony Hill Craft Group**

The Craft Group welcomes people of all ages and is cross community based. It currently meets fortnightly on a Thursday morning in the church hall, following the Covid lockdown. It's twenty plus members have formed strong friendships with each other and continue to produce a range of knitted garments and blankets for premature and full-term babies in the local hospitals, as they also did during the lockdown period from their own homes. We enjoy meeting together and also providing a service to the community.

**Friendship Club**

The Friendship Club, which stopped meeting during the Covid pandemic, has not met during 2022. The club is seeking new leadership to enable meetings to resume.

**Church Choir**

The choir's role is to support worship at services and on other occasions through leading the congregation in hymns and singing anthems and introits. The choir meets to practice on Thursday evenings in the church and there are approximately 15 members, supplemented by additional singers on special occasions, such as the annual carol service. A small group of dedicated musicians provides accompaniment.

**Mixed Bowling Club**

The club, which used to meet on Tuesday evenings, hasn't met in person since mid-March 2020 due to the Covid pandemic. It is unlikely to restart.

**Parents and Toddlers (Mums and Tots)**

The Parents and Toddlers group met throughout 2022 on Thursday mornings between 10.00 AM and 12.00 mid-day. An average of 16 children plus their carers were in attendance under the supervision of 6 dedicated leaders. Everyone enjoyed the crafts, playtime and singing activity songs along with the snacks and fellowship.

**Barmbrack DIY**

This group is made up of retired people who undertake various jobs around the church and halls. Jobs include painting, cleaning and gardening work and indeed anything which is requested within our capability.

The group met every Monday morning throughout 2022 and about 7 members were normally in attendance.

**Ladies Bowling Club**

The Ladies Bowling Club met every Wednesday 2pm - 4pm during the Indoor bowling season. in 2022. We have Cross Community membership. Some of our long-term members have had to give up Bowling due to ill health. Fortunately, we received new members and had a total of 15 for the year.

We continued our weekly matches. The overall winner for 2022 was presented with our Bowling Cup at an enjoyable lunch held locally.

**Knitting, Crochet and Craft Group**

This group was established as a church group during the summer of 2022. The group, which has about 15 members, meets twice per month on a Wednesday evening in the Harold Gray Hall. The group makes knitted, crocheted and hand stitched items some of which are donated to charity. Members learn and share their skills and encourage and inspire each other. New members are very welcome.

**PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT**

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland meets the public benefit requirement by providing benefit to its members and the general public by making known the Christian Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ through the advancement of religion.

The direct benefits which flow from the purposes of the Church include the gaining of an understanding in Christian beliefs as set out in the Bible and in the Church's subordinate standards (the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Shorter and Larger Catechisms) leading to spiritual and moral development and opportunities for response to Bible teaching. In turn, this framework leads to practical expressions of Christian beliefs and standards in the local community such as through the care of those in need (including the sick, disabled and bereaved).

Generally, the above benefits are delivered locally by congregations and their members, or are facilitated through presbyteries or are organised and delivered centrally. Local delivery is facilitated by central resources in almost all cases. Public access is made known through the use of noticeboards, printed material, press advertisement, websites, and social media or in other ways.

The benefits are demonstrated through regular evaluation of the services and informal and ad-hoc feedback from members, their families, and members of the public.

The purpose does not lead to harm. The only private benefit flowing from our purpose is related to Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, Irish Mission workers and Lay Agents who receive benefits as a result of their holding office or employment. However, this is incidental and necessary in order to further our charitable purpose. There are no other private benefits. The beneficiaries of this purpose are members, their families, other individuals that the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is in direct and indirect contact with, the community in which pastoral services are provided and other communities throughout Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and worldwide which benefit from our engagement with and support for both Christian and other secular organisations, charities and individual members of the public.

The Kirk Session has had regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit requirement statutory guidance.

**FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The congregation's main source of income is members' contributions through the Weekly Freewill Offering. There were 184 contributors during the year [188 in previous year, 2021] donating a total of £84,205 (£93,807 in previous year, 2021).

Total comparable Income of the congregation during the year was £160,332 against £181,312 in the previous year. This includes income to restricted funds as Buildings & Development and special collections such as United Appeal. The main reason for the decrease in total income was lower giving to FWO and the Buildings and Development Fund.

Total expenditure increased from £155,180 in 2021 to £161,747 in 2022. The main reason for the increase in expenditure was one off redundancy costs (£9,420) associated with the BASE.

**RESPONSIBILITIES IN RESPECT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The Trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the congregation and the financial activities for that year. In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Funds will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the fund's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the congregations and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities (1 January 2015)". They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the congregation and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**GOING CONCERN**

The activities of the congregation are dependent on ongoing contributions from its members. The Trustees are of the opinion that the congregation has sufficient resources at the date of approval of these financial statements to meet commitments which will arise in the year from the date of signing this report and subject to the continuing support from members to fund on an ongoing basis the congregation's current activities and other financial commitments.

**RESERVES POLICY**

The Trustees have considered the level of unrestricted cash reserves that it is appropriate to hold taking account of current and ongoing commitments. The Pandemic during 2020 demonstrated how unforeseen events can quickly, adversely, impact organisations. While the financial impact upon our organisation was contained, the Trustees believe it prudent – over the time period (2020 to 2025) - to increase our cash reserves to the equivalent of 6 months normal expenditure (i.e. circa £100,000).

At the year-end, unrestricted cash reserves were £81,000

The policy of the Trustees concerning the Buildings and Development Fund is to hold reserves of £50,000.

At year-end, restricted reserves of cash were £95,000, however the backlog of property maintenance items is being addressed and outstanding invoices for completed works amount to approx. £11,000.



**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**BASIS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the congregation is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their affiliation to another body, nor those that are informal gatherings of church members.

**FUND ACCOUNTING**

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be retained either permanently or at the congregation's discretion; the income derived from the endowment is to be used either as restricted or unrestricted income funds depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established in the first place.

Restricted funds comprise (a) income from endowments which is to be expended only on the restricted purposes intended by the donor and (b) revenue donations or grants for a specific congregational activity intended by the donor. Where these funds have unspent balances, interest on their pooled investment is apportioned to the individual funds on an average balance basis.

Unrestricted funds are income funds which are to be spent on the congregation's general purposes. Designated funds are general funds set aside by the congregation for use in the future.

**(i) Recognition of incoming resources**

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the congregation becomes entitled to the resources

**(ii) Incoming resources with related expenditure**

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising income) the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

**(iii) Grants and donations**

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the congregation has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

**(iv) Tax reclaims on donations and gifts**

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

**(v) Contractual income and performance related grants**

This is only included in the SoFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

**(vi) Gifts in kind**

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

**(vii) Donated services and facilities**

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

**(viii) Volunteer help**

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

**(ix) Investment income**

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

**(x) Investment gains and losses**

This includes any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

**EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES**

**(xi) Liability recognition**

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the congregation to pay out resources.

**(xii) Governance costs**

These are shown within charitable activities and include the costs of preparation and examination of accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

**(xiii) Grants with performance conditions**

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SoFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

**ASSETS**

**(xiv) Tangible Fixed Assets**

Tangible fixed assets for use by charity are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £2,500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is recorded on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life as follows

Buildings:	- over 50 years
Fixtures, fittings and equipment	- over 10 years
Motor Vehicles	- over 4 years
Computers, software and technical equipment	- over 4 years

**(xv) Investments**

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange are valued at market value at the year end. Other investment assets are included at trustees' best estimate of market value.

**7. PENSION COSTS**

The minister of the congregation is a member of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009). This is a scheme operated by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, a separate registered charity. The congregation pays an assessment to the Presbyterian Church in Ireland equivalent to the employer's pension contribution for the Scheme and based on the stipend paid to the minister. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) is a funded Scheme of the defined benefit type, providing defined benefits based on career average revalued salary. The Scheme has assets held in a separately administered fund managed by a board of trustees. The Presbyterian Church and the Scheme Trustees have agreed a funding plan to ensure the Scheme is sufficiently funded to meet current and future obligations. A formal schedule of contributions was drawn up on 25 November 2015 whereby the Presbyterian Church agreed to pay from 31 December 2015 contributions of 24% of pensionable salaries to cover the accrual of benefits for future service, expenses, the cost of insuring death in service benefits and funding the scheme deficit.

**STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT**

**The Kirk Session**

The charity trustees of the congregation are the members of its Kirk Session. Under the congregation's governing document, The Code, the book of the constitution and government of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Kirk Session seeks to watch over and promote the spiritual interest of the congregation and of persons not connected with any congregation who are within its bounds. It ensures pastoral care is in place in the congregation and seeks to further the contribution of the Church to Christian witness and service in the local community. The Kirk Session has delegated to its Congregational Committee the temporal affairs of the congregation, including administering all funds and property belonging to the congregation. Members of the Kirk Session are ex-officio members of the Congregational Committee.

The Kirk Session consists of the ordained minister and the ruling elders of the congregation. All members are entitled to propose, speak and exercise equal votes at meetings, except that the Moderator, the minister in active duty in the congregation, has no deliberative but only a casting vote.

Stated meetings of the Kirk Session are normally held monthly, with the exception of a summer break. To be chosen for the office of the eldership in the congregation, a person must be a voting member and a regular attendant on its ordinances. The selection of those proposed to be called to the office can be either by the congregation or by the Kirk Session. Members are elected if they obtain two-thirds of those who vote.

**Presbytery**

Under the Presbyterian Church in Ireland form of governance, the corporate oversight of a congregation is the responsibility of a Presbytery which superintends generally the spiritual and temporal affairs of the congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church has been assigned to the Dromore Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The membership of the Presbytery consists mainly of the active ministers of congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly, ministers who have retired from active duty and an elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**The General Assembly**

The General Assembly is the supreme court of the Church, representing in one body the whole Church and acting as its supreme legislative, administration and judicial authority, in dealing with all matters brought before it. The General Assembly is normally constituted during the first week in June for worship and to conduct its business. At the end of business, it is dissolved. The membership of the General Assembly consists mainly of the active ministers of each congregation, retired ministers and a representative elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE**

Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church (HHPC) is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, as a Reformed Church within the wider body of Christ is grounded in the Scriptures and exists to love and honour God through faith in His Son and by the power of His Spirit to enable her members to play their part in fulfilling God's mission to our world.

The congregation's mission purpose is to be: **'A church for all ages – teaching God's love and demonstrating it in the community'** In 2010 HHPC introduced a mission plan on the theme of **'welcome'**. The mission plan aims to build on this theme by focussing on increasing the welcome experienced by every age group within the congregation and also extending it to those currently without. An updating of the plan is to be undertaken.

HHPC began its life just over sixty years ago and grew in numbers as the population of the local area expanded. The other churches in the area are Roman Catholic and Church of Ireland. HHPC has a prominent location very close to Harmony Hill Primary School with which it has positive links. We believe HHPC should be a church which reaches out to everyone in the local area rather than focussing on a particular 'niche'.

Our missional activities have, in the past, included several Alpha courses, holding a 'Welcome Sunday' on several occasions (modelled on the 'Back to Church Sunday' idea from the Church of England) holding a 'Back to School with God' Sunday, and a Holiday Bible Club mission week. Older people have been engaged activities such as coffee mornings and Sunday lunches. There are also the harder to measure benefits of building up long-term relationships and community good will. As well as these organised mission activities, the Minister, along with some others from the congregation on an informal basis, have been involved in one-to-one outreach.

In terms of mission overseas, we are the sending church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission workers based in Malawi. We have also had younger members and, on one occasion, some older members, go on short term mission trips with the support of HHPC.

As we look ahead to preparing an updated mission plan, we will seek to evaluate and to build upon that which has proven fruitful in what has gone before, considering whether to continue to engage in a number of the mission activities mentioned above, as well as exploring new activities to enable us to reach out to and serve the needs of the community around us.

**Where we seek to go longer term in mission**

We consider it important to have a general idea of our long-term direction. We also have some short-term plans so that the momentum for mission is not lost, however most of these short-term plans have had to be put on hold or set aside due the Covid-19 pandemic.

We have identified the following areas to explore and develop:

- To be an inter-generational church: More focussed engagement with families with younger children, teenagers and young adults. Our aim is to be a congregation, which understands what it is to be a covenant community, with people of all ages participating in its life and witness.
- To be a discipling church: Aiming to build an integrated, inter-generational, worshipping community where members go deeper in their faith growing and maturing as disciple-making disciples of Jesus.
- To be a missional church: Developing an outward-looking mindset, remembering that we are called to share the good news of Jesus with those who do not yet know Him and to welcome them in His name.

These will involve an increasing commitment by all members of the congregation to our missional purpose through prayer, financial giving, involvement in Sunday worship plus other group activity/activities where possible, as well as extending the mission of the congregation in the community and in their daily lives, wherever their 'frontlines' place them. Short-term actions will be required as we move towards our longer-term goals and a range of strategies are being prayerfully considered by the church leadership team.

**ACTIVITIES AND OBJECTIVES**

The congregation normally meets for worship every Sunday and visitors are welcome to join. This has been the case throughout 2022 with the removal of Covid restrictions. The Sacrament of the Lords Supper is observed regularly during the year and all those who have been baptised and who have made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are admitted to the Lord's Supper. In 2022 there were six communion services.

**ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

**Worship and prayer**

2022 brought a welcome return to more normal patterns of gathering for worship with the removal of remaining Covid protocols, although throughout the year services have continued to be livestreamed to accommodate those who have been unable to attend worship or who do not yet feel ready to do so. Numbers attending worship have remained at a steady level of between 70-100 across the year. Many key activities within church life were resumed 'in-person', with others remaining on virtual platforms or using a blend of 'in-person' and virtual approaches.

At 31 December 2022 there were 274 communicant members and 278 families connected with the congregation.

**Pastoral care**

Pastoral care in the church is provided through a district model and is leadership-led. Members of the congregation who are unable to attend church due to sickness or age are visited on a regular basis by the minister or a ruling elder. The church's part-time pastoral assistant retired at the end of July 2022 and their additional support in congregational visitation will be much missed. Church services continue to be livestreamed for those who do not yet feel ready to or are unable to return to gathered worship and can also be accessed 'on demand' via the church website. Audio copies of the weekly service are also distributed as requested and at Harvest and Christmas gifts from the Church are made to the elderly and indisposed.

The ability to resume in-person visitation, alongside telephone calls and use of messaging apps, in 2022 has been both welcome and helpful.

**Mission and outreach**

At a local level the congregation has attempted some one-off and new outreach activities in 2022.

All activities associated with The Base, an outreach programme to youth in the community sponsored by the church, ceased in March 2020 due to the Covid -19 pandemic and in 2022, following a thorough and wide-ranging review, the decision was made to cease the programme offered through The Base.

We maintain good links with Harmony Hill Primary School, with our minister continuing to hold a seat on the Board of Governors.

Members of the congregation promote the work of Christian Aid by fund-raising events and through an annual Christian Aid Service.

In the last quarter of 2022, the church trialled opening as a 'Warm Space' for members of the local community for one morning per week. The community was made aware of this initiative through door-to-door leafleting and social media.

We are the home church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission co-workers based in Malawi. TEEM (Theological Education by Extension Malawi) carries out grass root training of local pastors and students, and produces home study material. Producing material both written and audio in the local language forms a crucial part of TEEM's work.

The congregation supports the United Appeal for Mission which is a central fund of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This fund enables congregations to support the wider mission of the denomination and to carry out mission and outreach on a denominational basis, beyond that which the congregation could do on its own. The United Appeal Fund provides financial support for mission personnel at home and overseas, assists congregations with the deployment of locally based staff, enables church planting, provides grant support for the upkeep of church premises, assists with the running costs of Union Theological College, the Church's training college for ministry students, and financially supports congregations in the areas of worship, discipleship, global mission, outreach, leadership, and pastoral care.

**Presbytery**

The congregation is represented at the regular meetings of Presbytery by the minister and one of the elders. This provides an important link between the congregations and the wider structures of the church. Presbytery meetings have taken place, in person, as normal throughout 2022.

**General Assembly**

The minister and one of the elders are nominated to attend the meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland usually held in Assembly Buildings, Belfast, in June. The General Assembly in 2022 was held from 22<sup>nd</sup>-25<sup>th</sup> June 2022 in Assembly Buildings.

**Property**

The main work carried out on our property during 2022 was the coating of the church and hall flat roof sections with Aluminium Bitumen.

**Organisations**

**Sunday School**

The Sunday School covers a fairly wide age range starting with babies in the Crèche and up to the 11 to 16 age group in "Go For IT". Sunday school started to meet in person again in 2022.

**Crèche**

Crèche facilities are available for children in the age range newborn up to three years old.

**Primary**

This group is for children in the Pre-school to P7 category which meets during the Sunday morning church service. Since March 2022 it has returned to face to face on alternate weeks with an average attendance of 2-3 children. Face to face allows us to return to normal Sunday school activity such as craft, singing, playing games, along with the bible stories and prayer.

**Go For IT**

This is a Bible class, which is held each Sunday morning for 11 to 16-year-olds. There were seven regular attenders. The Scripture Union "Rooted" was used as the main teaching resource. These classes are fun and interactive with the focus of helping the young people develop their faith.

**Flame**

Flame is a Youth Fellowship for 12 to 18-year-olds which meets on a Sunday evening. Flame stands for Following the Lord in all my Endeavours. There was an average regular attendance of 6-8 young people. Flame activities include bible studies, prayer, listening to Christian artists and learning from and encouraging each other's journey of faith. On the third Sunday in the month, the 16–18-year-olds meet to look deeper into their faith and discuss some of the issues facing our teens in today's society.

**BASE**

The Base, an outreach programme to youth in the community, sponsored by the Church, had to suspend all activities in mid-March 2020 due to the Covid pandemic. Unfortunately, it was not possible to restart youth activities operating from The Base for a variety of reasons. During 2022 Kirk Session commissioned a review of the programme consulting widely with interested parties. Following on from this, the very difficult decision was taken to cease The Base activities on a permanent basis.

**Prayer & Bible Study**

A monthly prayer meeting, held on the second Tuesday evening of each month, has continued throughout the 2022 year. In consultation with those who attend the prayer meeting it was decided to continue to hold this meeting on a virtual platform to enable a broader range of participants to maintain their involvement. Attendance at the monthly prayer meeting ranged from 6-14 people.

Across the 2022 year a monthly Bible study was held on the third Tuesday evening of each month. In the 2022 year the Bible study group chose to undertake an in-depth study of the book of Revelation which deepened understanding of “the hope that [we] have” (1 Peter 3:15) and also explored how our future hope brings comfort and strength for living in a broken and disordered world. Again, the decision was made to continue to hold the monthly meeting for Bible study on a virtual platform to facilitate access for those wishing to come along on a regular basis who would find it more difficult to do so in person. Attendance at the monthly Bible study was consistent throughout the year at 12-14 people.

In the autumn of 2022 there was also a recommencement of meeting together on the first Sunday evening of each month for a time of shared discussion around God’s word following a short teaching input. This has been based around the ‘Expressions’ resource prepared by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland which aims to shape conversations, amongst those participating, about how faith can be expressed in everyday life and witness. Attendance on Sunday evenings has ranged from 18-24 people.

**Men's Group**

The Men’s Group meets on the last Monday of each month for Bible study, prayer, discussion and fellowship. The group meets in each other’s homes and includes social events. Attendance is not restricted to Harmony Hill members, with some attendees coming from other churches. Meetings attract between 6 and 10 attendees, socials 10 to 20.

**Women's Bible Study Group**

The group has a current membership of approximately twelve, with attendance varying each month, depending on members' family, work and other commitments. During 2022, the group had a mix of in-person and online meetings, (via the Zoom platform), continuing to meet on the third Monday evening of the month. The group completed their IVP Life Builder series on 'Sabbath: The Gift of Rest' and started a new series on 'Prayers in the Bible'.

**Presbyterian Women (PW)**

PW continued to meet every month on Zoom in 2021-22 from September to March. We ran a couple of our meetings using our own members to entertain us, but we also had several entertaining speakers throughout the year. An average of 25 ladies attended each month and we were pleased to be able to hold our Annual General Meeting in the church hall in March and get together again in person.

**Ladies Badminton**

The Wednesday morning badminton is enjoyed by a small group of ladies. There is always a chance to have a catch-up chat and a cuppa. New members are always welcome.

**Harmony Hill Craft Group**

The Craft Group welcomes people of all ages and is cross community based. It currently meets fortnightly on a Thursday morning in the church hall, following the Covid lockdown. It's twenty plus members have formed strong friendships with each other and continue to produce a range of knitted garments and blankets for premature and full-term babies in the local hospitals, as they also did during the lockdown period from their own homes. We enjoy meeting together and also providing a service to the community.

**Friendship Club**

The Friendship Club, which stopped meeting during the Covid pandemic, has not met during 2022. The club is seeking new leadership to enable meetings to resume.

**Church Choir**

The choir's role is to support worship at services and on other occasions through leading the congregation in hymns and singing anthems and introits. The choir meets to practice on Thursday evenings in the church and there are approximately 15 members, supplemented by additional singers on special occasions, such as the annual carol service. A small group of dedicated musicians provides accompaniment.

**Mixed Bowling Club**

**Parents and Toddlers (Mums and Tots)**

The Parents and Toddlers group met throughout 2022 on Thursday mornings between 10.00 AM and 12.00 mid-day. An average of 16 children plus their carers were in attendance under the supervision of 6 dedicated leaders. Everyone enjoyed the crafts, playtime and singing activity songs along with the snacks and fellowship.

**Barmbrack DIY**

This group is made up of retired people who undertake various jobs around the church and halls. Jobs include painting, cleaning and gardening work and indeed anything which is requested within our capability.

The group met every Monday morning throughout 2022 and about 7 members were normally in attendance.

**Ladies Bowling Club**

The Ladies Bowling Club met every Wednesday 2pm - 4pm during the Indoor bowling season. in 2022. We have Cross Community membership. Some of our long-term members have had to give up Bowling due to ill health. Fortunately, we received new members and had a total of 15 for the year.

We continued our weekly matches. The overall winner for 2022 was presented with our Bowling Cup at an enjoyable lunch held locally.

**Knitting, Crochet and Craft Group**

This group was established as a church group during the summer of 2022. The group, which has about 15 members, meets twice per month on a Wednesday evening in the Harold Gray Hall. The group makes knitted, crocheted and hand stitched items some of which are donated to charity. Members learn and share their skills and encourage and inspire each other. New members are very welcome.

**PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT**

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland meets the public benefit requirement by providing benefit to its members and the general public by making known the Christian Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ through the advancement of religion.

The direct benefits which flow from the purposes of the Church include the gaining of an understanding in Christian beliefs as set out in the Bible and in the Church's subordinate standards (the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Shorter and Larger Catechisms) leading to spiritual and moral development and opportunities for response to Bible teaching. In turn, this framework leads to practical expressions of Christian beliefs and standards in the local community such as through the care of those in need (including the sick, disabled and bereaved).

Generally, the above benefits are delivered locally by congregations and their members, or are facilitated through presbyteries or are organised and delivered centrally. Local delivery is facilitated by central resources in almost all cases. Public access is made known through the use of noticeboards, printed material, press advertisement, websites, and social media or in other ways.

The benefits are demonstrated through regular evaluation of the services and informal and ad-hoc feedback from members, their families, and members of the public.

The purpose does not lead to harm. The only private benefit flowing from our purpose is related to Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, Irish Mission workers and Lay Agents who receive benefits as a result of their holding office or employment. However, this is incidental and necessary in order to further our charitable purpose. There are no other private benefits. The beneficiaries of this purpose are members, their families, other individuals that the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is in direct and indirect contact with, the community in which pastoral services are provided and other communities throughout Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and worldwide which benefit from our engagement with and support for both Christian and other secular organisations, charities and individual members of the public.

The Kirk Session has had regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit requirement statutory guidance.

**FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The congregation's main source of income is members' contributions through the Weekly Freewill Offering. There were 184 contributors during the year [188 in previous year, 2021] donating a total of £84,205 (£93,807 in previous year, 2021).

Total comparable Income of the congregation during the year was £160,332 against £181,312 in the previous year. This includes income to restricted funds as Buildings & Development and special collections such as United Appeal. The main reason for the decrease in total income was lower giving to FWO and the Buildings and Development Fund.

Total expenditure increased from £155,180 in 2021 to £161,747 in 2022. The main reason for the increase in expenditure was one off redundancy costs (£9,420) associated with the BASE.

**RESPONSIBILITIES IN RESPECT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The Trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the congregation and the financial activities for that year. In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Funds will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the fund's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the congregations and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities (1 January 2015)". They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the congregation and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**GOING CONCERN**

The activities of the congregation are dependent on ongoing contributions from its members. The Trustees are of the opinion that the congregation has sufficient resources at the date of approval of these financial statements to meet commitments which will arise in the year from the date of signing this report and subject to the continuing support from members to fund on an ongoing basis the congregation's current activities and other financial commitments.

**RESERVES POLICY**

The Trustees have considered the level of unrestricted cash reserves that it is appropriate to hold taking account of current and ongoing commitments. The Pandemic during 2020 demonstrated how unforeseen events can quickly, adversely, impact organisations. While the financial impact upon our organisation was contained, the Trustees believe it prudent – over the time period (2020 to 2025) - to increase our cash reserves to the equivalent of 6 months normal expenditure (i.e. circa £100,000).

At the year-end, unrestricted cash reserves were £81,000

The policy of the Trustees concerning the Buildings and Development Fund is to hold reserves of £50,000.

At year-end, restricted reserves of cash were £95,000, however the backlog of property maintenance items is being addressed and outstanding invoices for completed works amount to approx. £11,000.



**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**BASIS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the congregation is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their affiliation to another body, nor those that are informal gatherings of church members.

**FUND ACCOUNTING**

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be retained either permanently or at the congregation's discretion; the income derived from the endowment is to be used either as restricted or unrestricted income funds depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established in the first place.

Restricted funds comprise (a) income from endowments which is to be expended only on the restricted purposes intended by the donor and (b) revenue donations or grants for a specific congregational activity intended by the donor. Where these funds have unspent balances, interest on their pooled investment is apportioned to the individual funds on an average balance basis.

Unrestricted funds are income funds which are to be spent on the congregation's general purposes. Designated funds are general funds set aside by the congregation for use in the future.

**(i) Recognition of incoming resources**

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the congregation becomes entitled to the resources

**(ii) Incoming resources with related expenditure**

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising income) the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

**(iii) Grants and donations**

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the congregation has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

**(iv) Tax reclaims on donations and gifts**

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

**(v) Contractual income and performance related grants**

This is only included in the SoFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

**(vi) Gifts in kind**

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

**(vii) Donated services and facilities**

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

**(viii) Volunteer help**

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

**(ix) Investment income**

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

**(x) Investment gains and losses**

This includes any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

**EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES**

**(xi) Liability recognition**

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the congregation to pay out resources.

**(xii) Governance costs**

These are shown within charitable activities and include the costs of preparation and examination of accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

**(xiii) Grants with performance conditions**

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SoFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

**ASSETS**

**(xiv) Tangible Fixed Assets**

Tangible fixed assets for use by charity are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £2,500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is recorded on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life as follows

Buildings:	- over 50 years
Fixtures, fittings and equipment	- over 10 years
Motor Vehicles	- over 4 years
Computers, software and technical equipment	- over 4 years

**(xv) Investments**

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange are valued at market value at the year end. Other investment assets are included at trustees' best estimate of market value.

**7. PENSION COSTS**

The minister of the congregation is a member of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009). This is a scheme operated by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, a separate registered charity. The congregation pays an assessment to the Presbyterian Church in Ireland equivalent to the employer's pension contribution for the Scheme and based on the stipend paid to the minister. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) is a funded Scheme of the defined benefit type, providing defined benefits based on career average revalued salary. The Scheme has assets held in a separately administered fund managed by a board of trustees. The Presbyterian Church and the Scheme Trustees have agreed a funding plan to ensure the Scheme is sufficiently funded to meet current and future obligations. A formal schedule of contributions was drawn up on 25 November 2015 whereby the Presbyterian Church agreed to pay from 31 December 2015 contributions of 24% of pensionable salaries to cover the accrual of benefits for future service, expenses, the cost of insuring death in service benefits and funding the scheme deficit.

**STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT**

**The Kirk Session**

The charity trustees of the congregation are the members of its Kirk Session. Under the congregation's governing document, The Code, the book of the constitution and government of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Kirk Session seeks to watch over and promote the spiritual interest of the congregation and of persons not connected with any congregation who are within its bounds. It ensures pastoral care is in place in the congregation and seeks to further the contribution of the Church to Christian witness and service in the local community. The Kirk Session has delegated to its Congregational Committee the temporal affairs of the congregation, including administering all funds and property belonging to the congregation. Members of the Kirk Session are ex-officio members of the Congregational Committee.

The Kirk Session consists of the ordained minister and the ruling elders of the congregation. All members are entitled to propose, speak and exercise equal votes at meetings, except that the Moderator, the minister in active duty in the congregation, has no deliberative but only a casting vote.

Stated meetings of the Kirk Session are normally held monthly, with the exception of a summer break. To be chosen for the office of the eldership in the congregation, a person must be a voting member and a regular attendant on its ordinances. The selection of those proposed to be called to the office can be either by the congregation or by the Kirk Session. Members are elected if they obtain two-thirds of those who vote.

**Presbytery**

Under the Presbyterian Church in Ireland form of governance, the corporate oversight of a congregation is the responsibility of a Presbytery which superintends generally the spiritual and temporal affairs of the congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church has been assigned to the Dromore Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The membership of the Presbytery consists mainly of the active ministers of congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly, ministers who have retired from active duty and an elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**The General Assembly**

The General Assembly is the supreme court of the Church, representing in one body the whole Church and acting as its supreme legislative, administration and judicial authority, in dealing with all matters brought before it. The General Assembly is normally constituted during the first week in June for worship and to conduct its business. At the end of business, it is dissolved. The membership of the General Assembly consists mainly of the active ministers of each congregation, retired ministers and a representative elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

**DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE**

Harmony Hill Presbyterian Church (HHPC) is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, as a Reformed Church within the wider body of Christ is grounded in the Scriptures and exists to love and honour God through faith in His Son and by the power of His Spirit to enable her members to play their part in fulfilling God's mission to our world.

The congregation's mission purpose is to be: **'A church for all ages – teaching God's love and demonstrating it in the community'** In 2010 HHPC introduced a mission plan on the theme of **'welcome'**. The mission plan aims to build on this theme by focussing on increasing the welcome experienced by every age group within the congregation and also extending it to those currently without. An updating of the plan is to be undertaken.

HHPC began its life just over sixty years ago and grew in numbers as the population of the local area expanded. The other churches in the area are Roman Catholic and Church of Ireland. HHPC has a prominent location very close to Harmony Hill Primary School with which it has positive links. We believe HHPC should be a church which reaches out to everyone in the local area rather than focussing on a particular 'niche'.

Our missional activities have, in the past, included several Alpha courses, holding a 'Welcome Sunday' on several occasions (modelled on the 'Back to Church Sunday' idea from the Church of England) holding a 'Back to School with God' Sunday, and a Holiday Bible Club mission week. Older people have been engaged activities such as coffee mornings and Sunday lunches. There are also the harder to measure benefits of building up long-term relationships and community good will. As well as these organised mission activities, the Minister, along with some others from the congregation on an informal basis, have been involved in one-to-one outreach.

In terms of mission overseas, we are the sending church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission workers based in Malawi. We have also had younger members and, on one occasion, some older members, go on short term mission trips with the support of HHPC.

As we look ahead to preparing an updated mission plan, we will seek to evaluate and to build upon that which has proven fruitful in what has gone before, considering whether to continue to engage in a number of the mission activities mentioned above, as well as exploring new activities to enable us to reach out to and serve the needs of the community around us.

**Where we seek to go longer term in mission**

We consider it important to have a general idea of our long-term direction. We also have some short-term plans so that the momentum for mission is not lost, however most of these short-term plans have had to be put on hold or set aside due the Covid-19 pandemic.

We have identified the following areas to explore and develop:

- To be an inter-generational church: More focussed engagement with families with younger children, teenagers and young adults. Our aim is to be a congregation, which understands what it is to be a covenant community, with people of all ages participating in its life and witness.
- To be a discipling church: Aiming to build an integrated, inter-generational, worshipping community where members go deeper in their faith growing and maturing as disciple-making disciples of Jesus.
- To be a missional church: Developing an outward-looking mindset, remembering that we are called to share the good news of Jesus with those who do not yet know Him and to welcome them in His name.

These will involve an increasing commitment by all members of the congregation to our missional purpose through prayer, financial giving, involvement in Sunday worship plus other group activity/activities where possible, as well as extending the mission of the congregation in the community and in their daily lives, wherever their 'frontlines' place them. Short-term actions will be required as we move towards our longer-term goals and a range of strategies are being prayerfully considered by the church leadership team.

**ACTIVITIES AND OBJECTIVES**

The congregation normally meets for worship every Sunday and visitors are welcome to join. This has been the case throughout 2022 with the removal of Covid restrictions. The Sacrament of the Lords Supper is observed regularly during the year and all those who have been baptised and who have made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are admitted to the Lord's Supper. In 2022 there were six communion services.

**ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

**Worship and prayer**

2022 brought a welcome return to more normal patterns of gathering for worship with the removal of remaining Covid protocols, although throughout the year services have continued to be livestreamed to accommodate those who have been unable to attend worship or who do not yet feel ready to do so. Numbers attending worship have remained at a steady level of between 70-100 across the year. Many key activities within church life were resumed 'in-person', with others remaining on virtual platforms or using a blend of 'in-person' and virtual approaches.

At 31 December 2022 there were 274 communicant members and 278 families connected with the congregation.

**Pastoral care**

Pastoral care in the church is provided through a district model and is leadership-led. Members of the congregation who are unable to attend church due to sickness or age are visited on a regular basis by the minister or a ruling elder. The church's part-time pastoral assistant retired at the end of July 2022 and their additional support in congregational visitation will be much missed. Church services continue to be livestreamed for those who do not yet feel ready to or are unable to return to gathered worship and can also be accessed 'on demand' via the church website. Audio copies of the weekly service are also distributed as requested and at Harvest and Christmas gifts from the Church are made to the elderly and indisposed.

The ability to resume in-person visitation, alongside telephone calls and use of messaging apps, in 2022 has been both welcome and helpful.

**Mission and outreach**

At a local level the congregation has attempted some one-off and new outreach activities in 2022.

All activities associated with The Base, an outreach programme to youth in the community sponsored by the church, ceased in March 2020 due to the Covid -19 pandemic and in 2022, following a thorough and wide-ranging review, the decision was made to cease the programme offered through The Base.

We maintain good links with Harmony Hill Primary School, with our minister continuing to hold a seat on the Board of Governors.

Members of the congregation promote the work of Christian Aid by fund-raising events and through an annual Christian Aid Service.

In the last quarter of 2022, the church trialled opening as a 'Warm Space' for members of the local community for one morning per week. The community was made aware of this initiative through door-to-door leafleting and social media.

We are the home church for the Glissmann family who are PCI global mission co-workers based in Malawi. TEEM (Theological Education by Extension Malawi) carries out grass root training of local pastors and students, and produces home study material. Producing material both written and audio in the local language forms a crucial part of TEEM's work.

The congregation supports the United Appeal for Mission which is a central fund of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This fund enables congregations to support the wider mission of the denomination and to carry out mission and outreach on a denominational basis, beyond that which the congregation could do on its own. The United Appeal Fund provides financial support for mission personnel at home and overseas, assists congregations with the deployment of locally based staff, enables church planting, provides grant support for the upkeep of church premises, assists with the running costs of Union Theological College, the Church's training college for ministry students, and financially supports congregations in the areas of worship, discipleship, global mission, outreach, leadership, and pastoral care.

**Presbytery**

The congregation is represented at the regular meetings of Presbytery by the minister and one of the elders. This provides an important link between the congregations and the wider structures of the church. Presbytery meetings have taken place, in person, as normal throughout 2022.

**General Assembly**

The minister and one of the elders are nominated to attend the meeting of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland usually held in Assembly Buildings, Belfast, in June. The General Assembly in 2022 was held from 22<sup>nd</sup>-25<sup>th</sup> June 2022 in Assembly Buildings.

**Property**

The main work carried out on our property during 2022 was the coating of the church and hall flat roof sections with Aluminium Bitumen.

**Organisations**

**Sunday School**

The Sunday School covers a fairly wide age range starting with babies in the Crèche and up to the 11 to 16 age group in "Go For IT". Sunday school started to meet in person again in 2022.

**Crèche**

Crèche facilities are available for children in the age range newborn up to three years old.

**Primary**

This group is for children in the Pre-school to P7 category which meets during the Sunday morning church service. Since March 2022 it has returned to face to face on alternate weeks with an average attendance of 2-3 children. Face to face allows us to return to normal Sunday school activity such as craft, singing, playing games, along with the bible stories and prayer.

**Go For IT**

This is a Bible class, which is held each Sunday morning for 11 to 16-year-olds. There were seven regular attenders. The Scripture Union "Rooted" was used as the main teaching resource. These classes are fun and interactive with the focus of helping the young people develop their faith.

**Flame**

Flame is a Youth Fellowship for 12 to 18-year-olds which meets on a Sunday evening. Flame stands for Following the Lord in all my Endeavours. There was an average regular attendance of 6-8 young people. Flame activities include bible studies, prayer, listening to Christian artists and learning from and encouraging each other's journey of faith. On the third Sunday in the month, the 16–18-year-olds meet to look deeper into their faith and discuss some of the issues facing our teens in today's society.

**BASE**

The Base, an outreach programme to youth in the community, sponsored by the Church, had to suspend all activities in mid-March 2020 due to the Covid pandemic. Unfortunately, it was not possible to restart youth activities operating from The Base for a variety of reasons. During 2022 Kirk Session commissioned a review of the programme consulting widely with interested parties. Following on from this, the very difficult decision was taken to cease The Base activities on a permanent basis.

**Prayer & Bible Study**

A monthly prayer meeting, held on the second Tuesday evening of each month, has continued throughout the 2022 year. In consultation with those who attend the prayer meeting it was decided to continue to hold this meeting on a virtual platform to enable a broader range of participants to maintain their involvement. Attendance at the monthly prayer meeting ranged from 6-14 people.

Across the 2022 year a monthly Bible study was held on the third Tuesday evening of each month. In the 2022 year the Bible study group chose to undertake an in-depth study of the book of Revelation which deepened understanding of “the hope that [we] have” (1 Peter 3:15) and also explored how our future hope brings comfort and strength for living in a broken and disordered world. Again, the decision was made to continue to hold the monthly meeting for Bible study on a virtual platform to facilitate access for those wishing to come along on a regular basis who would find it more difficult to do so in person. Attendance at the monthly Bible study was consistent throughout the year at 12-14 people.

In the autumn of 2022 there was also a recommencement of meeting together on the first Sunday evening of each month for a time of shared discussion around God’s word following a short teaching input. This has been based around the ‘Expressions’ resource prepared by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland which aims to shape conversations, amongst those participating, about how faith can be expressed in everyday life and witness. Attendance on Sunday evenings has ranged from 18-24 people.

**Men's Group**

The Men’s Group meets on the last Monday of each month for Bible study, prayer, discussion and fellowship. The group meets in each other’s homes and includes social events. Attendance is not restricted to Harmony Hill members, with some attendees coming from other churches. Meetings attract between 6 and 10 attendees, socials 10 to 20.

**Women's Bible Study Group**

The group has a current membership of approximately twelve, with attendance varying each month, depending on members' family, work and other commitments. During 2022, the group had a mix of in-person and online meetings, (via the Zoom platform), continuing to meet on the third Monday evening of the month. The group completed their IVP Life Builder series on 'Sabbath: The Gift of Rest' and started a new series on 'Prayers in the Bible'.

**Presbyterian Women (PW)**

PW continued to meet every month on Zoom in 2021-22 from September to March. We ran a couple of our meetings using our own members to entertain us, but we also had several entertaining speakers throughout the year. An average of 25 ladies attended each month and we were pleased to be able to hold our Annual General Meeting in the church hall in March and get together again in person.

**Ladies Badminton**

The Wednesday morning badminton is enjoyed by a small group of ladies. There is always a chance to have a catch-up chat and a cuppa. New members are always welcome.

**Harmony Hill Craft Group**

The Craft Group welcomes people of all ages and is cross community based. It currently meets fortnightly on a Thursday morning in the church hall, following the Covid lockdown. It's twenty plus members have formed strong friendships with each other and continue to produce a range of knitted garments and blankets for premature and full-term babies in the local hospitals, as they also did during the lockdown period from their own homes. We enjoy meeting together and also providing a service to the community.

**Friendship Club**

The Friendship Club, which stopped meeting during the Covid pandemic, has not met during 2022. The club is seeking new leadership to enable meetings to resume.

**Church Choir**

The choir's role is to support worship at services and on other occasions through leading the congregation in hymns and singing anthems and introits. The choir meets to practice on Thursday evenings in the church and there are approximately 15 members, supplemented by additional singers on special occasions, such as the annual carol service. A small group of dedicated musicians provides accompaniment.

**Mixed Bowling Club**

The club, which used to meet on Tuesday evenings, hasn't met in person since mid-March 2020 due to the Covid pandemic. It is unlikely to restart.

**Parents and Toddlers (Mums and Tots)**

The Parents and Toddlers group met throughout 2022 on Thursday mornings between 10.00 AM and 12.00 mid-day. An average of 16 children plus their carers were in attendance under the supervision of 6 dedicated leaders. Everyone enjoyed the crafts, playtime and singing activity songs along with the snacks and fellowship.

**Barmbrack DIY**

This group is made up of retired people who undertake various jobs around the church and halls. Jobs include painting, cleaning and gardening work and indeed anything which is requested within our capability.

The group met every Monday morning throughout 2022 and about 7 members were normally in attendance.

**Ladies Bowling Club**

The Ladies Bowling Club met every Wednesday 2pm - 4pm during the Indoor bowling season. in 2022. We have Cross Community membership. Some of our long-term members have had to give up Bowling due to ill health. Fortunately, we received new members and had a total of 15 for the year.

We continued our weekly matches. The overall winner for 2022 was presented with our Bowling Cup at an enjoyable lunch held locally.

**Knitting, Crochet and Craft Group**

This group was established as a church group during the summer of 2022. The group, which has about 15 members, meets twice per month on a Wednesday evening in the Harold Gray Hall. The group makes knitted, crocheted and hand stitched items some of which are donated to charity. Members learn and share their skills and encourage and inspire each other. New members are very welcome.

**PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT**

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland meets the public benefit requirement by providing benefit to its members and the general public by making known the Christian Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ through the advancement of religion.

The direct benefits which flow from the purposes of the Church include the gaining of an understanding in Christian beliefs as set out in the Bible and in the Church's subordinate standards (the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Shorter and Larger Catechisms) leading to spiritual and moral development and opportunities for response to Bible teaching. In turn, this framework leads to practical expressions of Christian beliefs and standards in the local community such as through the care of those in need (including the sick, disabled and bereaved).

Generally, the above benefits are delivered locally by congregations and their members, or are facilitated through presbyteries or are organised and delivered centrally. Local delivery is facilitated by central resources in almost all cases. Public access is made known through the use of noticeboards, printed material, press advertisement, websites, and social media or in other ways.

The benefits are demonstrated through regular evaluation of the services and informal and ad-hoc feedback from members, their families, and members of the public.

The purpose does not lead to harm. The only private benefit flowing from our purpose is related to Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, Irish Mission workers and Lay Agents who receive benefits as a result of their holding office or employment. However, this is incidental and necessary in order to further our charitable purpose. There are no other private benefits. The beneficiaries of this purpose are members, their families, other individuals that the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is in direct and indirect contact with, the community in which pastoral services are provided and other communities throughout Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and worldwide which benefit from our engagement with and support for both Christian and other secular organisations, charities and individual members of the public.

The Kirk Session has had regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit requirement statutory guidance.

**FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The congregation's main source of income is members' contributions through the Weekly Freewill Offering. There were 184 contributors during the year [188 in previous year, 2021] donating a total of £84,205 (£93,807 in previous year, 2021).

Total comparable Income of the congregation during the year was £160,332 against £181,312 in the previous year. This includes income to restricted funds as Buildings & Development and special collections such as United Appeal. The main reason for the decrease in total income was lower giving to FWO and the Buildings and Development Fund.

Total expenditure increased from £155,180 in 2021 to £161,747 in 2022. The main reason for the increase in expenditure was one off redundancy costs (£9,420) associated with the BASE.

**RESPONSIBILITIES IN RESPECT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The Trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the congregation and the financial activities for that year. In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Funds will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the fund's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the congregations and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities (1 January 2015)". They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the congregation and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**GOING CONCERN**

The activities of the congregation are dependent on ongoing contributions from its members. The Trustees are of the opinion that the congregation has sufficient resources at the date of approval of these financial statements to meet commitments which will arise in the year from the date of signing this report and subject to the continuing support from members to fund on an ongoing basis the congregation's current activities and other financial commitments.

**RESERVES POLICY**

The Trustees have considered the level of unrestricted cash reserves that it is appropriate to hold taking account of current and ongoing commitments. The Pandemic during 2020 demonstrated how unforeseen events can quickly, adversely, impact organisations. While the financial impact upon our organisation was contained, the Trustees believe it prudent – over the time period (2020 to 2025) - to increase our cash reserves to the equivalent of 6 months normal expenditure (i.e. circa £100,000).

At the year-end, unrestricted cash reserves were £81,000

The policy of the Trustees concerning the Buildings and Development Fund is to hold reserves of £50,000.

At year-end, restricted reserves of cash were £95,000, however the backlog of property maintenance items is being addressed and outstanding invoices for completed works amount to approx. £11,000.



**1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**BASIS OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the congregation is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their affiliation to another body, nor those that are informal gatherings of church members.

**FUND ACCOUNTING**

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be retained either permanently or at the congregation's discretion; the income derived from the endowment is to be used either as restricted or unrestricted income funds depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established in the first place.

Restricted funds comprise (a) income from endowments which is to be expended only on the restricted purposes intended by the donor and (b) revenue donations or grants for a specific congregational activity intended by the donor. Where these funds have unspent balances, interest on their pooled investment is apportioned to the individual funds on an average balance basis.

Unrestricted funds are income funds which are to be spent on the congregation's general purposes. Designated funds are general funds set aside by the congregation for use in the future.

**(i) Recognition of incoming resources**

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the congregation becomes entitled to the resources

**(ii) Incoming resources with related expenditure**

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising income) the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

**(iii) Grants and donations**

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the congregation has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

**(iv) Tax reclaims on donations and gifts**

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SoFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

**(v) Contractual income and performance related grants**

This is only included in the SoFA once the related goods or services have been delivered.

**(vi) Gifts in kind**

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

**(vii) Donated services and facilities**

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

**(viii) Volunteer help**

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

**(ix) Investment income**

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

**(x) Investment gains and losses**

This includes any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

**EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES**

**(xi) Liability recognition**

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the congregation to pay out resources.

**(xii) Governance costs**

These are shown within charitable activities and include the costs of preparation and examination of accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

**(xiii) Grants with performance conditions**

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SoFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

**ASSETS**

**(xiv) Tangible Fixed Assets**

Tangible fixed assets for use by charity are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £2,500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is recorded on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life as follows

Buildings:	- over 50 years
Fixtures, fittings and equipment	- over 10 years
Motor Vehicles	- over 4 years
Computers, software and technical equipment	- over 4 years

**(xv) Investments**

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange are valued at market value at the year end. Other investment assets are included at trustees' best estimate of market value.

**7. PENSION COSTS**

The minister of the congregation is a member of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009). This is a scheme operated by the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, a separate registered charity. The congregation pays an assessment to the Presbyterian Church in Ireland equivalent to the employer's pension contribution for the Scheme and based on the stipend paid to the minister. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009) is a funded Scheme of the defined benefit type, providing defined benefits based on career average revalued salary. The Scheme has assets held in a separately administered fund managed by a board of trustees. The Presbyterian Church and the Scheme Trustees have agreed a funding plan to ensure the Scheme is sufficiently funded to meet current and future obligations. A formal schedule of contributions was drawn up on 25 November 2015 whereby the Presbyterian Church agreed to pay from 31 December 2015 contributions of 24% of pensionable salaries to cover the accrual of benefits for future service, expenses, the cost of insuring death in service benefits and funding the scheme deficit.

**14. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTION**

One of the Trustees, the minister of the congregation received remuneration of £41,233 and expenses of £7,379 for acting in that capacity. Pension contributions of £9,895 were paid by the congregation in respect of the minister to the Presbyterian Church in Ireland Pension Scheme (2009). None of the other trustees received any remuneration.

During the year the congregation contributed the following amounts to Funds of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland a separate charity
